## Fatal Accident?

## Treacherous intersection turns deadly

Another Mt. Vernon resident has apparently died as a result of an auto accident at the junction of Williams Street and West Main Street.

Ms. Audrey May Purcell, 75, of Crawford Street, died about 90 minutes after the 3:30 p.m. accident Saturday.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell said that Mrs. Purcell may have had a heart attack before the wreck actually occurred, but that no autopsy was performed.

According to Mt. Vernon Police Sgt. Matt Bryant, Ms. Purcell was driving her Chevrolet Cavalier down Williams Street, traveling along the roadway where the former E.C. Porter Grocery Store was located, when she failed to stop at the stop sign on West Main Street.

Bryant said that a car driven by Nicki Whittaker, 19, of Mt. Vernon was traveling toward the Rockcastle County Middle School from Main

Street when Ms. Purcell entered the intersection.

Miss Whittaker's Pontiac Grand Prix slammed into the driver's side of Ms. Purcell's car, knocking it up on the sidewalk. Miss Whittaker's car turned completely around and was heading back toward Main Street after the impact.

Miss Whittaker and her eleven-year-old sister, Kayla, were wearing their seat belts and were not injured in the accident.

Approximately two years ago, another Mt. Vernon resident, Lola Cromer, died after she was struck by a car at the same intersection. Mrs. Barbara Bennett, who lives in one of the houses at the corner of Williams and West Main Street, knows just what a treacherous spot the intersection is first hand.

### Stewart gets only six years

Elmer Boyd Stewart, 36, of Orland received a six year prison term in Laurel Circuit Court last week, for a 1997 crime.

Stewart and his wife Vonda, were arrested in London in November of 1997, after police found him with 21 pounds of processed marijuana and \$50,000 in cash, while he was staying at a motel there.

All charges were dropped against Vonda Stewart.

At the time of the Stewart's arrest, London police called it the biggest drug bust of the year in that town. Besides his jail sentence Stewart had to forfeit the money seized.

Of the \$50,000, \$9,000 will go to the state's child support division for back child support owed by Stewart.

## Local school system part of First Lady's study on Arts

First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton has released *Gaining the Arts Advantage: Lessons From School Districts That Value Arts Education*, a study by the President's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities and the Arts Education Partnership.

It is the first national study to examine the success strategies of school districts in building and sustaining strong district-wide arts education.

The study represents 91 districts in 42 states with various population densities, total number of students, and funding levels per pupil. The profiles offer insights that could help any district in the country create and sustain arts education.

Rockcastle County Schools is one of only two school districts in Kentucky featured in the study.

"Last September, I issued a call to action to provide arts education in every school in America because we know that instruction in the arts gives children vital elements of a quality education and makes them more successful in school and later on," said the First Lady, who is honorary chair of the President's Committee.

*Gaining the Arts Advantage* finds that the strongest single factor in determining whether a district

composing my skelter-heft missives to you. I've done only a few since the turn of the year. Thanks to those of you who asked about me. And you know why I didn't write more, so I won't get into that. But, you will understand - and may be rejoice - when I say, "Houston, we have RELIEF!" Yes, indeed. I do have significant relief from the insistent lumber misery that has plagued me since ninety-two! And I have a grand, little lady, Indian doctor from Calcutta to thank, along with a team of her assistants who performed a nerve "burn" on me a couple of weeks ago at St. Joseph Pain Management and Rehabilitation Center in Lexington. Let me tell you about it.

First of all, I was sedated, but not

so much that I couldn't converse rationally with Dr. Dabal. I also received several pretty powerful doses of *supernovocaine* deep into the areas around all lumber discs. (I watched all of this in a big mirror set just for me.)

Next, Dr. Dabal deftly sliced a one inch "X" on my back with a six-inch long deft-x-slicing scalpel. Then she used a metal rod about the size of a dip-stick to push a deflated plastic balloon down around the area of the disc where a major nerve begins (and apparently goes all the way to the foot because my pain followed such a route).

Once the balloon was in place she deftly poured and pushed gunpowder down around the really big nerve that had given me no little torment. And then, once the balloon was full, she quite forcefully said, "Fire in the hole!" whereupon she struck a match and set the powder afire. Thank heaven for the supernovocaine! I only felt a really big warmth as the heat from the exploding gunpowder burned and cauterized the nerve that was the root of my persistent discomfort.

Then the other disc nerves were burned in like manner. And after an hour of recovery and observation, I walked out with Nancy at my side. Dr. Dabal told me I would have some really bad pain for several days as the burned flesh around the nerves healed. She gave me some "breakthrough" pain pills to take when the healing hurt really bad. Those pills were in addition to the other powerful narcotics I had been taking for pain, methadone, to be specific (Methadone was invented by German scientists during WWII when there was a shortage of morphine).

Well, my ten days are over. I still hurt at times due to other degenerative disc problems and old Ahter lites, but the relief given by the nerve burn is so grand that I feel like a new man in addition to the other powerful narcotics.

What? You don't believe me? Beloved, would I lie to you? Yes, I would because I know you would say "Say what?" if I told you that the procedure that has truly lifted me from the Slough of Despond is called a *Radiofrequency Rhizotomy*.

I said "Say what?" when told how much that procedure costs!

So now that I can sit for an hour or more without my lumber trying me down for two or three days, will I be going back to church?

My answer is "No."

Why not?

Because during the winter, unable to exercise, and not careful about what I ate, I've put on so much weight that I cannot get into any of my

front door and inquisitive eyes discover the pretty flowers and busy little hands soon are filled with them to take to Mommy. I will know the joy of having a small girl happily holding the fistful of bright yellow dandelions, held up to me when the little one came in saying, "Look, Mommy, I got you some flowers." Violets attracted the older kids and they too presented their find and a bouquet of violets would fill the vase that showed their beauty to the best advantage. Long stemmed, blue or purple violets have always had a very special place in my life and a small green vase was always ready for them. On top of the ridge, just above my house, was a warm sandy area beside the path where a variety of violets grew. I had never seen before nor since. They had different-shaped leaves and were on long stems. They were deep purple and blue as big as any I had ever seen. I have often wondered if they possibly could have been a local variety of orchids. They bloomed at the same time as wild honeysuckles so it was more than worth my time to climb the hill and stroll over the narrow horseback ridge, breath deeply of the woody smell of air drifting upward from the valleys below, take a long look at the scenery on both sides where trees in all stages of growth filled the hillside as far as I could see, then pick my fill of gorgeous violets and honeysuckle to fill all the vases that would perfume the house with their wonderful aroma. This was my special area but later I introduced it to the kids and allowed them the honor of keeping the vases filled when they were in bloom.

I really hope my readers have had the joy of walking into a house filled

with the perfume of freshly cut wild honeysuckle. Now these weren't the kind that grow on vines and become a pest by spreading and smothering all the other plants. The kind I am talking about are really wild Azaleas and grow on bushes that are sometimes big as lilac bushes.

Other vases were kept handy for the bigger wild flowers that abounded in the woods and Mat faithfully brought me some as soon as they appeared in the spring. I can still almost see him as he entered the door, this tall man in overalls, or work clothes, holding a bunch of red flowers out to me and saying, "I thought you would like some of these, they are the first I have seen." From that day till the snow fell I never lacked for fresh wild flowers filling vases of different sizes to adorn a spot that needed cheering up. Years later, Polly took me to my own wild flower garden under the trees out back that had grape vines twining from one to the other. She, and all the kids that visited from time to time, also made swags of the grapevines. I'll bet every kid that was reared in the country has tales to tell of his/her trees and scimb who could go farthest out on a limb or climb the highest. I know all of mine do. And I also have a few memories tucked away of the same kind of experiences in Ohio.

On the same morning I saw the dandelions in my yard, I went across the street to visit for a few minutes and saw another sight that has always warmed my heart. It was of wild birds coming for their daily feed in the bird feeder I have close to Be's patio. Bright breasted Robins were taking turns at feeding in the larger feeder while tiny grey birds, maybe Wrens, were fighting off intruders and filling up themselves at the smaller one. Since I have never learned the names of all the fowl of the air I might be mistaken in the tiny grey birds but

one thing I remember about them was how they could sing. When Mat was building out our house and had the frame work well on the way, one tiny grey bird made it his business to entertain us every day by sitting in one particular corner and strutting back, with head held high while he poured forth sounds that must have been composed in heaven.

There was another unusual sight I remember of the breath taking beauty of birds in winter. Two very large double windows in our dining room looked out over the side yard where a wood fence separated it from the old orchard we had planted years and years ago and was becoming gnarled and picturesque, especially so when laden with freshly fallen snow. This was our favorite place to sit and watch squirrels scamper across the fence, or an occasional fox creep under the trees in search of a tidbit of something in the garage, and especially the birds that fed under the window. One day in mid-winter a heavy snow had fallen during the night so the trees in the orchard were loaded with it. Every twig was outlined with snow two or three inches deep. This in itself was a sight to store in ones memory box but was nothing to compare with the next scene. While we were enjoying this one, a beautiful bright red Cardinal settled on one twig and in a few minutes all its flock joined it. Soon the whole tree was covered with them. Then the astonishing thing happened that nearly took our breath away. In the next tree, a bright blue bird perched itself on a twig and soon that tree also was filled with them. These were large Bluebirds, perhaps Bluejays, and they literally covered the tree. That sight was one indelibly stamped in my memory. This wild fowl of the air had put on a show for us not seen by many people in today's world of concrete and subdivisions. And my camera could not capture the beauty without disturbing the ones peering on the show.

provides arts education is the community's insistence, support and participation in making it happen. So everyone who has a stake in our children's success should see arts education as their cause.

The two-year study identifies interrelating factors that contribute to the creation of strong, district-wide arts education. The factors include a community consensus that enables a school board and administration to fund art education; central office leadership and a cadre of building principals that see the arts as a core school subject; strong arts teachers who continue to practice their art inside and outside the school; and the active presence of community arts and cultural organizations in the district's schools, including the use of school performing arts venues.

How these and other factors contribute to arts education programs is explored in case studies of eight different school systems, including New York City's Community School District #25 in Queens; Greenville, SC; Las Cruces, NM; Miami-Dade County, FL; Milwaukee, WI; Redondo Beach, CA; Vancouver, WA and Wyoming, OH.

An additional 83 school districts, including Rockcastle County, were selected for follow-up interviews and information-gathering after responding to surveys and submitting district applications. Additional contact and demographic information is included at the Web site.

Initially, each district considered for study was recommended to the President's Committee and Arts Education Partnership by national and state arts and education leaders based upon the quality of the districts' overall arts education program. Criteria included a commitment by the district over a number of years to art education as part of the core curriculum in all schools; funding to support arts teachers; materials and facilities; a record of student achievement in the arts and evidence of advanced programs comparable to those in other school subjects.

"Case study" districts were visited by the study's research teams, which included school superintendents as well as arts education researchers.

U.S. Secretary of Education Richard Riley praised the researchers and school districts discussed in the report.

"Three months ago, I released the results of a national assessment of what our eighth graders across the United States know and are able to

do in the arts," Riley said. "The results were discouraging and fully justified the First Lady's call to action to restore the arts to all of our schools."

"This new study tells us in the words of local school board members, administrators, teachers and parents - exactly how it can be done. Not to act on their advice would be inexcusable."

"Education in the arts is essential if our young people are going to succeed and contribute to what Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan describes as our 'economy of ideas,' an economy fueled by imaginative, flexible and tough-minded thinking. The arts uniquely nurture that ability."

William Ivey, chairman of the National Endowment for the Arts, affirmed the critical role of arts education to the American society.

"This is a nation forged by the creativity of our citizens. Our heritage and our future depends on our fostering the creative abilities of every single child. That can only be done if the arts are a central dimension of education in America. I join in congratulating these school districts - and others across the country who share their commitment and success."

The following is the profile of Rockcastle County Schools included in the report and can be found on the internet.

The Rockcastle County School District is in a lightly populated area in the middle of Kentucky. In fact the entire county is home to only about 15,000 people. Despite its small size and lack of resources, the Rockcastle district has still been able to establish a commendable arts education program. By seeking help beyond local sources, the school district formulated an arts program that would benefit its students.

In 1989, there was no organized arts education program in the district. Music specialists had been serving every grade level, although formal visual arts instruction was available only to high school students. Nonetheless, research indicated that a number of teachers were, in fact, integrating the arts on a daily basis. The leaders of the school district - then Superintendent Bige W. Towery, Jr., the school board, and central office staff - appreciated their students' need for a strong background in the arts,

but they also understood that they did not have the resources to establish an arts program.

Therefore, the school system sought financial support from the state level and eventually received a grant of \$9,600 from the Kentucky Arts Council to assist with development of a program over three years. The district used the money to establish a basic arts program within the district. During this three-year period, the school district slowly began allotting its own funds toward arts education and eventually was able to fund the program autonomously.

Initially, the Rockcastle County School District's "Basic Arts Program" was created to provide only the fundamental levels of arts education. However, in the years since its inception, the Basic Arts Program has evolved to the point where it can no longer be considered just basic. Besides covering the fundamentals of music and the visual arts, the program has both expanded and become more interdisciplinary.

Interestingly, H. Allen Pensol, Basic Arts coordinator, pointed out, "when the Kentucky Education Reform Act (KERA) became law in 1990, many other districts were slow to realize that the arts and humanities would eventually be included in the Accountability Index on the Kentucky Instructional Results Information System (KIRIS) by 1993." Due to the foresight of the school district leaders, "district-wide arts instruction had already been initiated. Students and teachers with little or no prior interest in the arts were becoming comfortable and even eager to incorporate an arts and humanities dialogue into their schedule and daily lives." Furthermore, Pensol added, "Now that the Kentucky Department of Education has constituted a State Core Content and set Standards for Kentucky Schools, teachers in Rockcastle County are seeing how the district's initial groundwork in arts instruction is accommodating and complementing instruction in other disciplines."

Since Superintendent Towery's retirement in 1995, the arts education program of Rockcastle County has received the enthusiastic support of Superintendent Larry B. Hammond. In addition to encouraging the school board to increase arts education funding and advocating for arts education at state and national conferences, he makes his support manifest. "Quite often," Pensol noted, "Superintendent Hammond engages in year-round classroom arts activities along with the students."

My skin crawls everytime I hear tires squeal," Mrs. Bennett said.

Mrs. Bennett said the state told them there was not enough traffic on Williams and West Main to warrant a signal.

Sgt. Bryant agreed that something needed to be done.

"It's our most active intersection, as far as the number of accidents that happen there," he said.

Last Saturday's collision was the third accident at the intersection in less than one week.

Mrs. Bennett said her next step was to write the Governor about the problem. "Maybe it will do some good, maybe it won't, but we need something to be done," she said.

**Rockcastle Co. awarded \$3,484 for Emergency Food and Shelter programs**

Rockcastle County has been chosen to receive \$3,484.00 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in the area.

The selection was made by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and consists of representatives from The Salvation Army, American Red Cross, Council of Jewish Federations, Catholic Charities, USA, National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A. and United Way of America which will provide the administrative staff and function as fiscal agent. The Board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high-need areas around the county.

A local board made up of Rockcastle County Judge Executive Buzz Carlfox, Daniel Boone Development Council, et. al., will determine how the funds awarded to Rockcastle County are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service organizations in the area. The Local Board is responsible

for recommending agencies to receive these funds available under this phase of the program.

Under the terms of the grant from the national board, local government or private voluntary organizations chosen to receive funds must: 1) be nonprofit, 2) have an accounting system, 3) practice nondiscrimination, 4) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and shelter programs and 5) if they are a private voluntary organization they must have a voluntary board. Qualifying organizations are urged to apply.

Rockcastle County has distributed Emergency Food and Shelter funds previously with Daniel Boone Development Council and Rockcastle Emergency Assistance Program participating. These agencies were responsible for providing 8,608 meals, 154 nights of lodging and 26 utility bills. Further information on the program may be obtained by contacting: Betty J. Carter at Daniel Boone Development Council Inc., 3rd Floor of the Rockcastle County Court House no later than April 2nd. The deadline for applications is April 2, 1999.

This sentiment was echoed by Ronald Mascher, a small farmer and publisher of *Small Farms Today* magazine. As opening speaker at the Farmers marketing conference he said "Traditional agriculture's got some real challenges. Niche farming puts more money in farmers' pockets."

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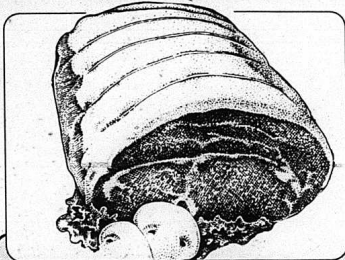

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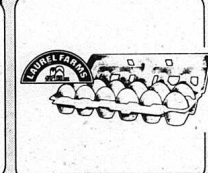

# Agricultural News

**By Warden Alexander, FSA Director**  
**MARKETING CARDS**  
 There are a few producers who still have not returned the marketing card. Producers are reminded to return marketing cards to the FSA office immediately to avoid the loss of quota.

**EMERGENCY RELIEF FOR FARMERS-EXTENDED**

The emergency relief for farmers deadline has been extended until April 9, 1999. Under the emergency relief for farmers - Farmers are required to receive payments for either losses incurred for the 1998 crops or losses in any three or more crop years between 1994 and 1998. Farmers can receive payments under either the single or multi-year provisions, but not both and USDA will make payments at the higher of the two levels. Rockcastle County eligible crops for payment are insured/noninsured crops such as tobacco and corn and the non insured crops such as hay, soybeans and vegetables for commercial use. Producers who suffered greater than a 35% loss on the above listed crops should provide the office with sale bills/weight tickets and receipts for fertilizer, chemicals and related materials. Producers receiving payments must agree to buy crop insurance for the 1999 and 2000 crop years. **REMEMBER:** Sign up ends April 9, 1999. Producers should contact their local USDA Service Center or FSA office for more information.

**DAIRY MARKET LOSS ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (DMLA)**

The Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 1999, provides that \$200 million is available to provide assistance to dairy farmers. On March 8, 1999, Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced that the Department of Agriculture (USDA) will make \$200 million in direct cash payments to dairy producers facing greatly reduced milk prices.

Producers qualify for the direct cash payments if their dairy operation marketed milk commercially in the United States anytime during the fourth quarter of 1998 (Oct. 1, 1998 through Dec. 31, 1998). Eligible producers may receive a direct payment per hundredweight (cwt) on the first 26,000 cwt of milk marketed commercially from the dairy operation during the 1997 or 1998 calendar

year. Each dairy operation has a choice of using 1997 or 1998 calendar year milk marketings for the base period. Producers who operate a joint dairy operation will receive a payment based on their share of the first 26,000 cwt marketed from the dairy operation. The actual rate will be determined after sign up and will be calculated by dividing the amount available by the total eligible cwt of milk from all approved dairy operations.

The application period for the DMLA begins on April 12, 1999 and ends on May 21, 1999. During this sign up period, producers will be required to apply for the program at their local FSA office.

Producers will be required to certify that the dairy operation was marketing milk during the fourth quarter of 1998. FSA will have an application form that producers will fill out when they sign up for the program. It is expected that the form will require producers to include: (1) the name of the dairy operation and a list of persons involved in it, and (2) the 1997 or 1998 calendar year milk marketings of the dairy operation. The form is also expected to include (1) a statement affirming that the dairy operation marketed milk during the fourth quarter of 1998, and (2) a statement affirming that the producer is aware that USDA will be conducting spot checks. For those dairy operations selected for a spot check, responsible producers must provide additional information as requested. Any producer who receives a payment for the dairy operation based on erroneous information will be required to repay USDA. Also, any producer who receives a payment on a fraudulent application will be required to repay USDA and may face criminal prosecution.

Responsible producers must provide milk marketing statements to support: (1) 1997 or 1998 calendar year milk marketings indicated on the application as the base period, (2) fourth quarter of 1998 milk marketings of the dairy operation, (3) milk marketings from all persons involved in the dairy operation, (4) the name of the milk handler, (5) name of the dairy operation, and (6) date of when milk was commercially marketed. Payments will be made about two to three weeks after the end of the sign-up.

**Some People Are Extra Special**

My mother-in-law, Evalave Vaughn Corder, died last week. Born in 1911 she knew what it was to face adversity. As a child, she was diagnosed with a bone disease, in the days called "white swelling." The possibility of losing a leg was a real one. The place to get help was Children's Hospital in Louisville, but her parents, who lived in Wayne County, had no car and no money. At this point a neighbor stepped in and furnished both the car and money.

Evalave had surgery and spent six months in the hospital all alone. Her parents could not afford to visit her. Here she learned to relate to all kinds of people. She kept this skill for the rest of her life. From the folks back home to the president of the University of Kentucky, Evalave could talk to them all.

I was first introduced to my future mother-in-law in 1970. She was a good mother-in-law and, considering the son-in-law that she had, that was quite an achievement. Only her patience kept me from being thrown out of the family long ago.

She was married 58 years to George Delbert Corder who died in 1992. Some called him George and some called him Delbert. Evalave joked that she was married to two men: George and Delbert. This union produced one child, a daughter, Sharon.

Several years ago Evalave's health was so bad that she was confined to her house and required 24-hour-a-day care. We thought she would die at any time. Most of her time was spent in her recliner, because she could barely walk!

Then, something miraculous happened. We moved her to Midtown Care Home in Somerset. Within three

weeks she was up and walking. She walked to meals, to church services and finally all the way around the building. She was happy, smiling and laughing. The change was evident.

Many think of nursing homes as the last resort and a warehouse for the dying. At least in Evalave's case nothing could be further from the truth. Midtown was a gift of life to her.

The people she met in the home brought her back to life. Her roommate, Flonnie Griffiths, and she became like two fourteen-year-old girls at a slumber party. They greeted each other every morning with a hug and kiss and never had a cross word the whole two years. They shared a very special relationship.

Others at Midtown deserve thanks. Brenda and Larry who manage Midtown and Mary, the social worker, were, went above and beyond the call of duty in caring for her. This included visiting her in the hospital after their day's work was finished.

Nothing gave Evalave more pleasure in life than her two grandsons. And it was clear that her greatest joy in life was her daughter. Daughter and grandsons rallied around her to make her last days as happy and comfortable as possible. Her daughter had cared for her during the last six years of Evalave's life.

Evalave loved to sing. She could do the alto lead in "I'll Meet You in the Morning" and make it look easy. She was very sad when she realized that this last illness had left her unable to sing. As we left Midtown for the last time, there was a church service going on in the social room. They were singing "When The Roll Is Called Up Yonder." I thought how many times Evalave had sung that old gospel hymn. I am certain that, when the roll was called on March 23, 1999, Evalave was there to answer it.

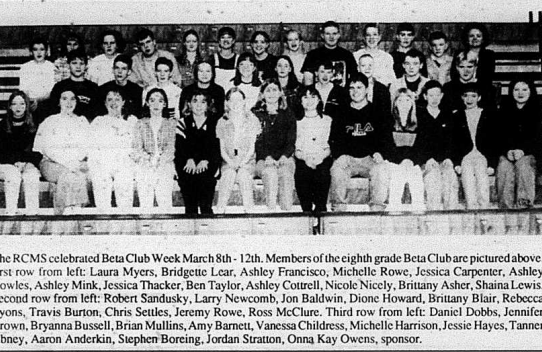

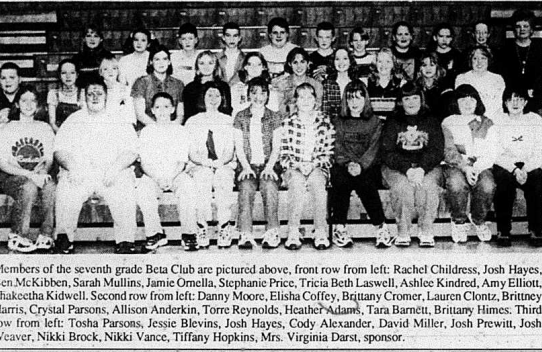

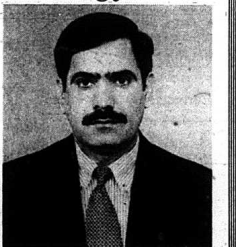

federal prison for illegal drug trafficking. Bradley, who has been held without bond since his August arrest has requested that he serve his time at the Manchester Federal Prison in Clay County. Bradley was arrested along with 50 other people in a federal crackdown in August. He pled guilty to conspiracy to distribute controlled substance and possession of cocaine with intent to distribute.

Under federal drug laws, Bradley will not be eligible for parole for nearly eight years.

## "It Is Written"

From this Pasch the pagan festival of 'Easter' was quite distinct and was introduced into the apostate Western religion, as part of the attempt to adapt Pagan festivals to Christianity."

Indeed, Mr. Vine did an excellent job in his work about the word *Easter* from Ac 12: 4 as used in the KJV. "Wouldn't it be great, if we could get our sectarian and denominational friends to accept this truth?" But folks have a way of getting entrenched and embedded in the traditions of men, and it seems so few will cast them aside for the truth. The traditions of men are one of those things that led me astray from Christ. Col 2: 8 - *How are lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, after the rudiments of the world, and not after Christ*. ## THE FACTS ABOUT MENINGITIS

With the recent occurrences of meningitis in Kentucky, it is important for everyone to be aware of the disease, its symptoms and its power.

Meningitis is any inflammation of the meninges, a membrane of fine tissue that surrounds the brain and spinal cord. The spinal fluid, which bathes the central nervous system (both the brain and the spinal cord), circulates in the space between the two meninges. Any infection of this fluid is referred to as meningitis. Spinal meningitis is the most common form of meningitis, where the spinal cord is more affected than the brain.

Viruses, fungi and bacteria can cause meningitis. If meningitis is caused by a virus, it usually is a mild illness that may last as few as 10 days.

Meningitis from bacteria is the most serious form of the disease, requiring antibiotics for treatment. The germs that cause bacterial meningitis may be common in the back of the nose and throat. People of any age can carry these germs without becoming ill. Only certain strains have a tendency to cause severe disease. Everyone, however, may be susceptible to the disease.

Some symptoms of meningitis in children and adults are:

- Vomiting;
- High temperature and fever;
- Violent or severe headache;
- Neck stiffness;
- Drowsiness; and
- Joint pains.

"These symptoms indicate the consideration of the possibility of meningitis in children and adults," said Dr. Tony Arvin of Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center. "Infants also suffer from the disease, and additional symptoms of meningitis in babies include blank expressions, high-pitched crying and blotchy complexion."



Meningitis can be spread by direct contact with mucus or saliva from the nose and/or throat of an infected person with certain bacteria. Approximately 17,500 cases of meningitis are diagnosed each year in the United States.

Antibiotics are the standard treatment for bacterial meningitis. A doctor must diagnose which strain of bacteria is causing the disease before the proper antibiotic can be prescribed. Testing of spinal fluid is the usual way a doctor diagnoses meningitis. In addition, all infants in the United States should receive a vaccine to prevent certain common pediatric bacterial meningitis.

"Bacterial meningitis is a serious and potentially deadly disease," Dr. Arvin said. "If the symptoms begin occurring, talk to your physician immediately. Treatment of bacterial meningitis must begin as soon as possible."

If you are near someone who has meningitis, wash your hands to prevent the infection from spreading. If you have had direct contact with the disease, consult your physician to discuss the need for additional preventive care.

## HEALTHY TIPS

Here's another low-fat recipe to help keep you within those diet rules, compliments of Teresa Blair, dietician at Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center.

### Layered Pizza Dip

- 1 (8-ounce) package nonfat cream cheese product, softened
- 1/2 cup nonfat sour cream alternative
- 1/8 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/8 teaspoon ground red pepper
- Vegetable cooking spray
- 1/2 cup no-salt-added tomato sauce
- 1/4 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1/8 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/8 teaspoon onion powder
- 1/2 cup chopped frozen artichoke hearts, thawed
- 1/4 cup sliced green onions
- 1/4 cup chopped sweet red pepper
- 1/4 cup sliced ripe olives
- 1/2 cup (2 ounces) shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese
- 1/2 teaspoon dried Italian seasoning

Combine first four ingredients in a small bowl; beat at low speed of an electric mixer until smooth. Spread cream cheese mixture in a 9-inch pieplate coated with cooking spray.

Combine tomato sauce and next three ingredients in a small bowl, stirring well. Pour tomato sauce mixture over cream cheese mixture. Layer artichokes and remaining ingredients over tomato sauce. Bake, uncovered, at 350° for 15 to 20 minutes or until thoroughly heated. Serve with no-oil baked tortilla chips or melba rounds. Yield: 12 appetizer servings (48 calories per serving).



## THEY'RE UGLY AND THEY HURT, TOO

Too much stress. Too much sun. A fever. An illness. These are the most common causes of fever blisters.

Nearly 100 million episodes of fever blisters occur annually in the United States. Some studies show that as many as 80 percent of all adults and children have experienced a fever blister.

Fever blisters are contagious. They can be passed from one site to another or one person to another.

"When you have a fever blister, it is important to remember to wash your hands before touching another person," said Dr. Michael Hamilton of Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center. "It also will help keep infection from spreading to other parts of your body."

There is no cure for fever blisters. The virus remains in a nerve located near the cheekbone. For some, the virus may never break into blisters again. However, other people suffer from active blister attacks. It does seem to decline after age 35.

Most fever blisters last from seven to 10 days. And most sufferers describe itching, tingling or burning of the blister location one to three days before the blister appears.

Fever blisters are sometimes confused with canker sores. Canker sores are different from fever blisters because they are not contagious and are confined to the inside of the mouth. There also is no single cause for canker sores.

When you have a fever blister, Dr. Hamilton recommends taking the follow-

ing precautions to reduce recurrences and infection of another person.

- Avoid kissing while you have a fever blister;
- Use sun block on lips before

prolonged exposure to the sun;

- Do not pinch, squeeze or pick at the blister site; and
- Remember to wash your hands before touching anyone else.

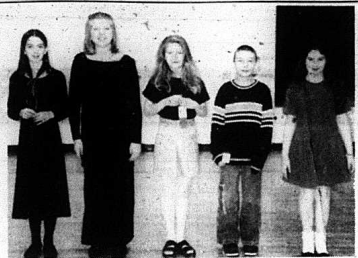

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## Common Causes of Color Loss in Clothing

Some of the most heartbreaking clothing problems are related to the loss of color. According to the International Fabricare Institute's Garment Analysis Laboratory, of the 21,000 problem garments analyzed by them in 1997, more than 5,000 garments (25 percent of garments received) had complaints of color loss.

What causes color loss? There are several reasons that can be attributed to the consumer or the manufacturer. Some dyes are just more susceptible to loss of color than are others. Generally speaking, pink, red, blue, and black are the most troublesome. Here are some tips to minimize color loss:

- Follow the garment care label instructions carefully. It is also important to know, understand and follow sound laundering techniques. Now that we have gone to rare symbols, additional information such as "wash with similar colors, separately..." may not be on the label as in the past. This phrase

frequently indicates that the dye(s) is unstable.

- If you suspect a dye, such as red or pink, will bleed during washing, wash it separately or with similar colors in cold water on a short laundry cycle to minimize any possible color loss and dye transfer. Launder or dryclean all pieces of a matching outfit at the same time. This includes belts.
- Store garments away from natural or artificial light. A cool, dark closet is a good location for storage.
- Treat all spills immediately! Blot do not rub. Remember that even though some spills, like soft drinks, dry invisible, they can show up later.
- Use care when applying perfumes, hair spray and other alcohol-containing substances. Add to this list bleach and skin preparations.
- Perspiration can remove color. To prevent, have garments cleaned as soon as possible after wear.
- To add your drycleaner in

minimizing color loss, be sure to point out any spills and examine the garment beforehand for any type of color loss

\* If you purchase a drycleanable garment that you suspect might have color problems (multiple color), return the garment to the store for a refund.

Keep in mind that some garments may have color problems in spite of the care label and testing. Unfortunately, there is no way to predict color problems 100 percent of the time.

## Farm News

### Fertilizing Float Tobacco Plants

Growing tobacco transplants by the Float Production method has developed many questions on how to fertilize growing plants. Since beds vary in water depth, and plants use fertilizer from the water at varying rates, a cookbook recommendation will not work.

Farmers are using a device call the DIST4 meter to measure fertilizer levels. The DIST4 meter is a device which measures the electric current which will travel through water. As larger amounts of fertilizer are added to water, the higher the DIST4 meter will read. To assist farmers in making a more

accurate estimate, U.K. Extension Specialists have developed a calibrated chart. Using known amounts of 20-10-20 fertilizer in water, DIST4 readings are charted for different parts per million nitrogen.

Research results have shown that tobacco transplants grow best at 100 to 150 parts per million nitrogen. Rates greater than 150 ppm can lead to more disease problems and destruction of plants.

To measure float bed fertilizer levels with a DIST4 meter, a reading is first taken from the water source that was used to fill the bed. Generally, city water will read 3 and some wells or springs may read higher. The initial DIST4 water reading is subtracted from the water bed reading. For instance, a 3 reading from water source subtracted from a float bed reading of 9 would equal 6. Looking this up on the chart shows a 100 ppm nitrogen. Generally speaking, for each difference of 3 the nitrogen level increases by 50 ppm.

Keeping the nitrogen level equal throughout the bed is important. When adding fertilizer, care must be taken to distribute the fertilizer and not allow this to settle in one corner. A sump pump on one end with a water hose leading to the far end will circulate the water best. However, the next best method would be to dissolve the fertilizer then add the solution to different areas then mixing by adding water to these areas.

Caution should be used in purchasing fertilizer. First, the calibration charts are for 20-10-20. Second, DO NOT purchase fertilizer that contains Urea. Ask the fertilizer dealer to show you there is NO Urea in their fertilizer. Urea has been shown to develop ammonia gas which will settle on top of trays and kill young plants.
