

Boil water advisory in effect here

Rockcastle County Schools reopened on Wednesday although, all customers of the city of Mount Vernon's water plant are still under a boil water advisory.

The city's water users were placed under the boil water advisory on Tuesday after problems with new equipment at the water plant in Reno Valley.

Mt. Vernon Mayor Karen King said she hoped the advisory could be lifted in two to three days and that the plant could resume pumping water on Wednesday.

The problems for the city started on Monday, when a water main line broke near the plant.

King said that after city employees fixed the line and the water was turned back on in the plant, two valves inside the plant burst, causing the plant to completely shut down, while those valves were fixed.

The Mayor said that the extreme water pressure caused the new valves to burst. The actual valves that burst are part of the city's multi-million dollar water expansion project.

"That really shouldn't of happened," the Mayor said. "We need to take a close look at what is causing the problems with the new equipment and get it fixed before the project is completed, around June 1," she said.

After the city fixed the two ruptured valves on Tuesday, they began to pump water into the city's two holding tanks, one of which had gone completely dry, but another valve burst and the plant had to shut down again.

Mayor King said that engineers at the plant were conducting an extensive test on the new valves on Wednesday to make sure that no problems occur when the plant resumes pumping on Wednesday.

"Anytime your tanks go dry, or reach a very low level the state requires a boil water advisory," she said.

"This advisory is nothing like the other one, when some contaminated water from lake Linville got into the plant," King said.

Numerous residents throughout the county reported being without water, mostly people living in higher elevations. Those in lower lying areas have not been without water yet.

Bottled water was provided for students in the schools on Wednesday and school superintendent Larry Hammond said that schools were well prepared for the water situation, mainly because of the same situation a few weeks ago.

Former Western employee files suit

A former employee of the Rockcastle Western Water Association has filed suit against the association and its president Charles Denver Burton.

Mary Bullock, who had worked for the association since 1989 filed suit in Rockcastle Circuit Court on March 30.

She was terminated by Burton on March 5.

In her suit, Bullock alleges that she was ultimately fired because she stood up for a co-worker who was being harassed sexually.

Mrs. Bullock claims that after she complained to Burton and members of the association's board she became the subject of harassment and retaliation, that culminated in her wrongful termination.

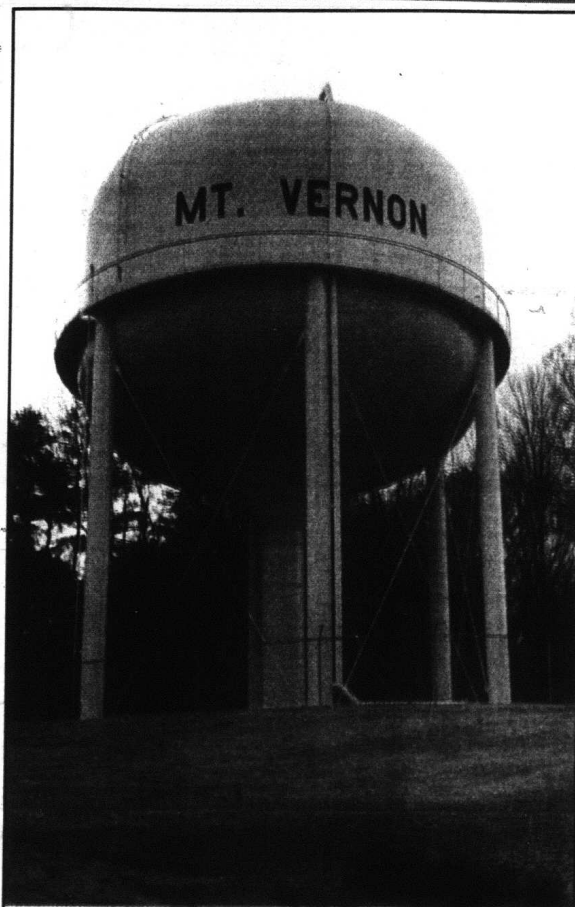
Mrs. Bullock also claims in her suit that the retaliation against her interfered with her job performance, forced her to endure embarrassment, humiliation and other indignities, as well as subjecting her to psychological and emotional distress.

Mrs. Bullock is asking for her job back as well as monetary damages against Burton and the association.

Burton and the association have twenty days in which to answer the suit.

Western Rockcastle Water Association provides water to hundreds of customers throughout Rockcastle County.

A civil suit of this nature, when initially filed, reflects only one side of the case.



Although the city of Mt. Vernon's multi-million dollar water expansion project is nearing completion, the city has experienced major problems at the plant this week, that has resulted in another boil water advisory for the county. Part of the expansion project includes a new water tank just off U.S. 25 and the 461 by-pass. The tank project is 99 percent complete, but still does not house water.

Court to spend \$18,000 on lights at Brodhead

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court voted Tuesday to pay for lights on the new senior league field at the Brodhead fairgrounds at a cost of \$18,000.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carloloffs told the court that the Little League baseball program in the county was certainly a great asset to the county and basically self-sustaining.

Carloloffs said that he thought the county could pay for the new lights out of the insurance tax money received in the next quarter.

However magistrate Bill McKinney said that while he agreed with Carloloffs about the Little League's worth to the county, he thought the county should seek out some type of grant money for the project before using general fund money.

Holly Scoville, a field representative from U.S. Senator Jim Bunning's office, who was present at the meeting told the court that there was a bill in the U.S. Congress sponsored by Representative Harold Rogers of Somerset, that would make \$12 million available to Kentucky for parks and recreation.

None the less, the court approved the project, by whatever funding means they could find.

The court also approved a payment of \$3,755 for new lights on the old field at the park and voted to do the necessary landscaping, grading and sanding at the two fields.

The fiscal court also agreed to renovate the scorers booth at the old field, which stands along third base line.

In other business the court took no action on an advanced revenue program, provided by the Kentucky Association of Counties.

The program basically borrows money from the county and pays them interest.

Two years ago, the county received about \$3,000 from the program, by participating, but last year they did not participate.

Judge Carloloffs told the magistrates that the \$3,000 was nice, but the amount of paper work for Fiscal Court Clerk Anna Rose Mullins may not be worth it.

The court also took no action on a request from Joyce Whitt, a cosmetology instructor from Orlando.

Whitt had asked the court to use a room in the courthouse for thirteen days from May to December for continuing education classes for

cosmetologist, cosmetology instructors and nail technicians.

Magistrate Bill McKinney pointed out the court that Whitt's business was a private one and that if the court allowed private business to use the courthouse they were, "open-

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Indictments

Five indictments were handed down by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury last week.

Steven H. Still, 32, of Mt. Vernon was indicted for first degree criminal abuse. He is accused of intentionally beating and torturing his stepson, who is less than twelve year of age, on February 10 of this year.

Peter M. Segedy, 37, of Mt. Vernon Road Berea was indicted on two counts.

He was charged with possession of cocaine and with being a persistent felony offender.

Frankie Woodall, 39, of Brodhead was indicted for flagrant non-support of his two minor children. The state claims Woodall owes \$6,684 in back child support.

Larry Senters, 42, of Livingston was indicted on one count of second degree assault.

He is accused of hitting Billnita Mason with a metal flashlight on February 14.

Eugene Whiter, 46, of Stanton Michigan was indicted for perjury.

He is accused of lying under oath in a civil case between Eugene Whiter and Janet Reed in October of 1998.

On drug charges

Federal agents charge seven family members

Seven members of the same Rockcastle County family were arrested last week by federal agents on drug charges.

Mattie Kirby, 72, of Chestnut Ridge, four of her sons, a daughter-in-law and a former daughter-in-law were all arrested by federal agents and charged with distributing illegal drugs such as cocaine and marijuana.

Mattie Kirby, Clarence "Bearcat" Kirby and Lisa M. Kirby, were charged with distributing prescription drugs; namely Tylox tablets, (Schedule II narcotic), Percocet tablets (Schedule II narcotic) and Lorazepam tablets (Schedule III narcotic) as well as distributing marijuana and conspiracy to distribute prescription drugs.

In the criminal complaint signed by a special agent, the alleged crimes occurred in Rockcastle County on January 28, February 7, February 14 in Rockcastle County.

Gary "Legs" Kirby, Lagina Kirby Mullins, his ex-wife and Charles Kirby were charged with possession with intent to distribute cocaine and conspiracy to possess with intent to

distribute cocaine.

The same special agent claimed those crimes happened in Pulaski County on November 14 and December 2, 1997.

Dallas D. Kirby, was charged with cultivating marijuana and possession with intent to distribute marijuana.

Mattie Kirby, Charles Kirby, Dallas Kirby, Lisa M. Kirby and Lagina Kirby Mullins were all released on a \$10,000 unsecured bond.

Gary "Legs" Kirby, who is on parole and Clarence "Bearcat" Kirby were held without bond until a hearing in federal court on Wednesday.

Under federal law, Gary Kirby will not be eligible for bond because he is currently on parole. A bond may have been set for Clarence "Bearcat" Kirby but details were not available at press time.

Last week's arrest by the federal agents are part of the Federal Drug Enforcement Agency's High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area program, now underway in this area.

Each of the defendants are scheduled for court appearances in federal court on April 29.

Lovell tries to post bond, DEA agent seizes \$50,000 cash

When accused murderer David Lovell, 31, of Mt. Vernon tried to post a \$50,000 cash bond on Monday to get out of jail, he got a little surprise.

The Signal has learned that an agent with the federal Drug Enforcement Agency confiscated Lovell's \$50,000 in cash seconds after he paid it to the circuit clerk's office.

Lovell was returned to the Boyle County Detention Center in Danville, where he and his wife Barbara are awaiting court proceedings in the shooting death of Charles "Toddy" Baker, 31, of Mt. Vernon.

Circuit Clerk Teresa Vanzant said she could not comment on the matter at the instruction of the Administrative Office of the Courts that oversees her office, but she did

confirm that Lovell was in the courthouse on Monday.

According to an anonymous source outside the clerk's office, after Lovell counted his \$50,000 in cash out to Vanzant, an officer with the DEA, who was standing in the clerk's office, presented a badge of identification to Lovell and took the \$50,000.

The agent told Lovell that the federal government had reason to believe that the \$50,000 came from the sale of illegal drugs and he was seizing it.

Lovell and his wife Barbara, 25, of Burr, were named in a six count indictment handed down in March.

They are accused of shooting Baker to death in May of 1997 and then burying his body 13 feet below the earth's surface on property the Lovell's owned at Tark Hill.

Livingston officer assaulted

A warrant has been issued for an East Bernstadt man after he allegedly assaulted a Livingston police officer.

Officer Greg Poynter was allegedly assaulted by Jeremy Holt, 22, of Livingston as he attempted to arrest

Holt last Thursday night.

Holt fled after the alleged assault and has not been arrested.

Kentucky State Police Detective Gary Lane is handling the investigation.

It takes all kinds of people to make up our world and for that we should be thankful. And, did I mention metal detectors? In the Sears Twin Towers, I thought at one point we might have to visit one of our party in jail after he set the metal detectors off for about the fourth time. We were with a group

from the middle school -- the Y Club and we were about 90 strong. Now in a city the size of New York (twice as many people as we have in our state I'm told) you would think that a group of 90 would go virtually unnoticed. Not so. We often found ourselves the object of intense stares to the point that several of our group began to take offense. After all, the thought ran through my mind, who do these people think they are with their museums, theatres, historical sites, fine restaurants and parks. We have fresh air, people we know, everything we need in our small community and we try to be friendly. I commented to Allison that the only people I saw smile on the trip, besides our group, were the homeless people we saw.

One was in the building where we were waiting to board the Staten Island Ferry to view the Statue of Liberty and he was smiling because he had his refreshment in a brown paper bag and was frequently indulging and sharing with a couple of buddies. Another had his earphones on in the subway and was smiling and dancing to the music.

It was interesting and I was generally pleased with the trip. It did serve to lessen my fear of the big bad city. I wouldn't be afraid at all to fly there at some point and spend a few days with just family -- I would never try to drive but then I have trouble occasionally getting around in Mt. Vernon

so that's no slapon New York. Allison even managed to navigate many blocks (I lost count) by ourselves to rejoin our group when we had bowed up one morning and refused to begin the day's activities with the others. Allison, who considers herself quite the independent little spirit, used her better sense of direction than mine to help locate where we were headed, but she also attached herself like a limpet to my side and stayed firmly there with arms entwined until we reached our destination. I haven't decided whether it was because she was afraid I would wander off and get lost or if one of the construction workers who were yelling at her would decide to scoop her up and take her home.

The club organizers did a good job of getting 90 people from one place to another in the crowds and it's my own fault that I missed the stores that I wanted so badly to visit -- there was time built into our schedule for personal jaunts but it just seemed too much trouble.

The plane trip, only my second, was adventuresome, particularly with my older daughter trying frantically to find some other way home because

of her fear of flying finally capitulating and getting on the plane for the return trip. Of course, half way home, as we were being rocked by some pretty heavy turbulence, she informed me that she couldn't handle it any longer. I quickly pointed out that there weren't a lot of options open other than to finish the flight and she finally agreed. There was another adventure at the end of our flight on our way to our car in the parking area but I'll let her tell you about that one -- I could only share it with family and friends.

If you have the chance to visit go. The Metropolitan Art Museum was wonderful -- I am told the United Nations tour was probably the highlight of the trip (though that was the day Allison and I opted to sleep in). Stop was probably very enjoyable to the younger set on the trip -- I can personally only take so much banging

on trash cans and other assorted metal objects, not to mention brooms, etc. and it was fun just to see the Big Apple. But, the trip has slaked my thirst for a look at a big city and it will be a while before I venture there again.

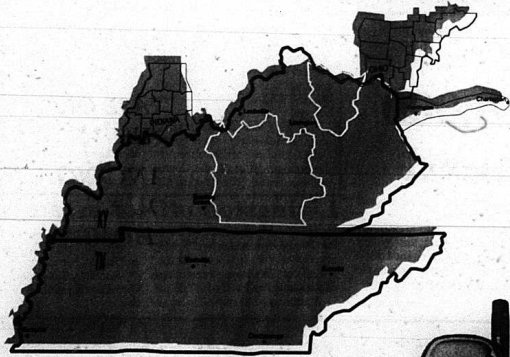

too fast and too far for a lot of us to keep up with. And the farther down the other side of the mountain of life we go the faster time goes.

So when Tilda and I found idle time boring us the other day we put our aches and pains behind us, I dug my seldom used car keys out and we went a visiting old friends in the Buffalo area. The drive down 1249, was much different than it was in the days when our children were little and we would put them in the back of our truck and take them on a picnic to Cumberland Falls or a church picnic in Levi Jackson Park in London. Those were the days before we had this blacktopped road and cars that could whiz around the steep curves and get us to Mt. Vernon in 30 minutes. Tilda was nervous in this area so could tell me more about the roads and how they got to town when she was growing up. And how families managed to raise their children to adulthood when the necessity of a livelihood caused most of them to seek work in another state. Also how a lot of courtships began at, or on the way home from church. The girls seldom, if ever went to church alone, there was always a sister, brother, mother and sometimes the whole family along. Then, on the way home, another young man would shyly join the group or walk close by behind the girl he had caught the eye of at the service. Or in some cases ride his mule or horse close by and say, "hop up behind and I'll take you home." And so a courtship and eventually a marriage was on its way. In an isolated area of the mountains, church was the only recreation the people had. Most elders worshipped there, young folks sang and rolled their eyes about to see what young men had attended service that night, and the young fellows sat in the back row and eyed all the pretty girls up front. And all went home talking about what a good service they had heard, whether they had heard it or not. Country people are all musically inclined I think so usually on the way home from these meetings someone would invariably break into a song and before long everyone would be singing in harmony. They also show a lot of humor. Men had loud guffaw laughter ready to follow out at the least hint of a trick played on someone else and the women with their gales, cackles or deep laughter as readily joined. It seemed to me every one had a laugh tucked up his/her sleeve and wanted to use it often. Tilda is one of these folks, she seems to have a laugh stored in her throat ready for use.

And she began her courting days with Arnold Cromer, her future husband, on her way home from church one night. These church houses were small plank buildings with lamps fastened to the walls or set on the podium where the preacher stood. The seats were usually plain benches, sometimes without a back rest, made from wide oak boards. Song books were handed out to everyone for everyone took a part in the singing. There was seldom a piano so the song leaders stood up and began the song and all joined in. Once in awhile there would be a leader who had learned how to use a pitch pipe and that would be taken from a pocket and the pitch started in the right key. Occasionally a singing teacher would hold singing classes to acquaint the members with the pitch pipe or teach shaped notes to them. There were good voices in those hills and the owners of them were not ashamed to use them. The preachers preached of God's mercy and of Hell's fire and brimstone. There was a mourners bench up front where the sinners knelt in prayer, when they went forward and confessed their sins to God and asked for forgiveness from

them. Men wore their bib overalls to church and women wore their bonnets, especially on Sundays. After the service was over you could hear good nights being said along with "go home with me" or "you all come now." And now, a whole family would be one. Young girls often went home with one another and would lie awake half the night uttering and talking in whispers. When Judy reached this age I pretty well knew who I would find coming down stairs with her the next morning, it would be Pauline, Tilda's daughter or Eva Ann Norton. These were her closest girlfriends at the time.

I realized what a treasure chest of memories I had run into as I slowed my speed to almost a crawl and listened to her tell of her youth and child rearing years here. She was amazed that the new houses and trailers that dotted the roadside where just a few short years ago tobacco and corn fields were plowed and hoed by hand. The old landmark of Elmer and Lola Taylor's store in the curve is still there but now being used as living quarters by its present owners. And Tilda calls her "her other daughter."

There is no longer a sign on the front porch, nor an open swinging front door to enter and a cheerful voice ringing out from the bed in the back where Elmer had lain for years paralyzed from a gunshot wound. Nor is Lola, his wife in the next room trying to rest a bit from her load of care giving to him all these years. He loved this little store where they sold odds and ends of a few necessities and candy. It was his way of getting someone to stop by and chat with him. But of course Lola had to do the hard work of keeping it going even though she was also quite ill most of the time. She had cancer and finally succumbed to it, but not before he had passed away. At one time it had been a thriving store that served the whole community but their combined sicknesses couldn't keep it going.

Soon after passing this curve we saw a woman setting out flowers beside the road and knew we had found one of the friends we had come to see. She seemed oblivious to us stopping in front of her house but when I beeped the horn she looked up recognized us and for the next hour or so we caught up on the present and reminisced over the past. This was Ruby Mink Norton, the little girl that went to school with our children and is now a grandmother of grown grandchildren.

Driving past familiar home sites where family members once lived and seeing new houses or trailers in their places, inhibited by strangers, can bring back a flood of memories of loved ones long gone. Finally we reached the dearest one to my heart, my home now in ashes. Calming my emotions I hopped out of the car and Tilda crawled out with her cane in hand and we surveyed the remains with many regrets and memories of the happy hours we each had shared here. Tilda had watched this house grow from a two room house with no conveniences to an eight room house with all conveniences one could wish for. It was then she told me she and Arnold had lived in that little log house that sat where my garage now sits when their first baby was a few months old. Arnold's parents, Boogie and Lena Cromer lived there at the time and Tilda and Arnold stayed with them till they found their own place.

When I first met Tilda, she was a middle aged woman and the mother of 10 children, who had moved into a house on the other side of the hill from us, a mile or so away, according to which path one took. Polly and her youngest child, Janette were toddlers. E.T. Smith deliver her last child, a beautiful fat boy in her own bed at home, she named him Mikey. Since he was one of the first babies I had assisted in delivering he became my pet along with being the apple of his

parents and siblings eyes. Tilda was a real country mother, accepting each child with love and a lot of laughter. And when a new baby arrived it was snuggled between its parents at night and the child that had been sleeping there was taken into the bed of an older sibling. All the children had their tasks to do and even though they may have complained they did what they were told to do. Even to Polly when she was there. Chopping wood and bringing it in was the boys chore, and washing dishes, making beds, cooking and mopping and waxing

the linoleum floors were the girls job. When Tilda and her husband, Arnold moved to our neighborhood with their ten children it gave my three some real playmates. Judy, our oldest was in the age group of her oldest three, Junior, Prezel and Christine. Rodney fit right in with Ralph, Dean and Dalmas and became the closest of buddies till adulthood separated them. Polly, my last child, would have been lost without Jeane, Janette and the baby Mikey. In fact she still calls them her other family. And Tilda calls her "her other daughter."

After they moved to Indianapolis tragedy struck the family. Mikey, the youngest, then grown and living in Colorado, lost his life in a boating accident in Utah. The next year, Paulmas was killed in a unique car accident, when another car went airborne over a hill and landed on top of his car and killed him (the driver of the other car was drunk). Two years later Janette died of cancer. Arnold died two years ago from complications of stroke. Tilda has had more than her share of heartache but with her trust in God she has survived and is still able to break forth in that well known laughter.

some women who plan on Turkey hunting. What we do have is a nice building and a big kitchen and room enough to host a wedding reception, the most recent of which happened last weekend.

Girls win South Laurel Invitational

Rockcastle County's varsity track and field teams recently competed in the South Laurel Invitational held in London. Eleven teams were on hand for what proved to be a very exciting meet.

Rockcastle's girls' team had an awesome meet. Several outstanding individual and relay team performances propelled the girls to their second straight win of the season. The team scored an amazing 127 points and defeated 2nd place rival Pulaski County by 22 points. The girls also defeated regional rival Taylor County by 46 points.

Sophomore Cheyenne Carmack led the girls for the second straight meet. Cheyenne scored an impressive 32.5 points to lead all scorers and earned the MVP award given to the meet's most outstanding female athlete. Cheyenne also won the award at last year's meet. Sophomore Rachelle Hammond wasn't far behind Cheyenne in the MVP race. Rachelle tallied 28.5 points and finished as the meet's second leading scorer.

In the 100 meter dash, Cheyenne and seventh grader Sheena Swinney carried the load. Cheyenne ran an impressive 13.34, despite a wet track surface and easily won the race. She also defeated last year's regional runner-up from Taylor County by almost two tenths of a second. Sheena was not far behind, running an impressive 13.78 and placing fourth.

Cheyenne and Sheena also ran awesome 200 meter dash races. Cheyenne ran her best time ever on her way to an easy first place victory. She finished in an amazing time of 26.99, a new RCHS record. Cheyenne barely missed setting a new South Laurel Invitational record as well. In setting the record, Cheyenne broke her own mark of 27.1 set at last year's regional championship. Cheyenne Carmack and Rachelle Hammond teamed up for impressive performances in the 400 meter dash. Cheyenne outdistanced Pulaski County's Rachel Sanford for the second straight meet and took first place. She placed third overall with a personal record time of 1:06.8.

Rockcastle's girls dominated the 800 meter relay. The team of Cheyenne Carmack, Tara Abney, Rachelle Hammond and Sheena Swinney blew away the competition and placed first overall with a season's best time of 1:56.0.

In the 400 meter relay, the team of Johnna Abney, Mindy Bullock, Angela Owens and Sheena Swinney placed third overall. The girls ran very well together and finished with an impressive time of 58.23.

In the 1600 meter relay, Johnna Abney, Ashley Lawson, Amber Thacker and Chere' Embs ran very well and placed fifth overall with a time of 4:51.

Rockcastle's boys' team did not fair quite as well as the girls. They were missing several team members due to spring break vacations. Nevertheless, the boys gave a great effort and performed well overall despite their 11th place finish.

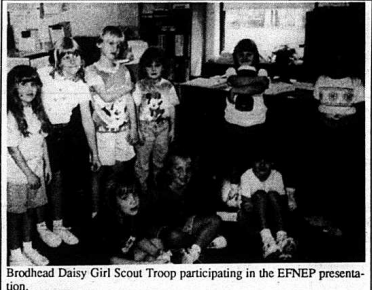

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
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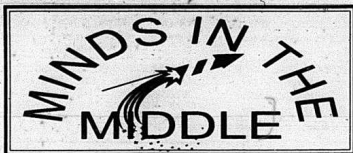

Producers who operate a joint dairy operation will receive a payment based on their share of the first 26,000 cwt marketed form the dairy operation. The actual rate will be determined after sign-up and will be calculated by dividing the amount available by the total eligible cwt of milk from all approved dairy operations.

The application period for the DMLA begins on April 12, 1999 and ends on May 21, 1999. During this sign-up period, producers will be required to apply for the program at their local FSA office.

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the name of the dairy operation and a list of persons involved in it, and (2) the 1997 or 1998 calendar year milk marketings of the dairy operation.

The form is also expected to include: (1) a statement affirming that the dairy operation marketed milk during the fourth quarter of 1998, and (2) a statement affirming that the producer is aware that USDA will be conducting spot checks. For those dairy operations selected for a spot check, responsible producers must provide additional information as requested. Any producer who receives a payment for the dairy operation based on erroneous information will be required to repay USDA. Also,

any producer who receives a payment on a fraudulent application will be required to repay USDA and may face criminal prosecution.

EMERGENCY RELIEF FOR FARMERS EXTENDED UNTIL APRIL 16

Farm Service, Agency Administrator Keith Kelly announced that sign-up for assistance under the new Crop Loss Disaster Assistance Program will continue for one additional week through April 16, 1999. Adding a week will not affect the timing of payments under the program.

Rockcastle County Farm Service Agency is presently taking applications for the CLDAP program which consists of a 35% shortage on burley tobacco, hay, corn or soybeans. If you receive a payment for this disaster program you will be required to

purchase FCIC crop insurance for the next two years. REMEMBER, SIGN UP ENDS April 16, 1999. Producers need to contact their local Farm Service Center for more information.

DAIRY MARKET LOSS ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Rockcastle County Farm Service Center is now taking applications for the Dairy Market Loss Assistance Program. Producers qualify for the direct cash payments if their dairy operation marketed milk commercially in the United States anytime during the fourth quarter of 1998 (Oct. 1, 1998 through Dec. 31, 1998). Eligible producers may receive a direct payment per hundredweight (cwt) on the first 26,000 cwt for milk marketed commercially from the

What I Am Learning After Fifty Years

ing up a can of worms."

The court also passed on a request from East Kentucky Corporation, a recruiter of industry for East-ern Kentucky, East Kentucky Corp., asked the county for a \$1,972 contribution, which they did not receive.

The court once again did not approve salaries for Sheriff Shirley Smith's deputies.

By law the court must approve the Sheriff's budget, which includes the deputies' salaries.

Smith has asked the court to make the maximum he can spend on deputy salaries in 1999, \$120,000.

Carlifos said he thought that figure may be too high and because of a new state law, if the fees collected in the Sheriff's office are not high enough to meet his expenses the county will be required to make up the difference. Carlifos said he thought the salaries request may have to be looked at further.

The court was also told that the state would be here to inspect the county jail during the last week of April. If the jail passes inspection it may finally open.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that, on April 5, 1999, pursuant to the Kentucky Revised Statutes, Kentucky Utilities Company ("KU") filed with the Public Service Commission ("Commission") in Case No. 98-474, an Amendment to its Application for Approval of an Alternative Method of Regulation of its Rates and Service (the "Amended Application"). In addition to the numerous benefits provided by the proposed alternative method of regulation and identified in KU's original Application filed October 12, 1998, KU's Amended Application provides:

- Annual reductions in customers' bills for electric service for KU and Louisville Gas and Electric Company ("LG&E") throughout the next five years in the following annual amounts, and allocated between KU and LG&E, consistent with the method approved by the Commission in its Order of September 12, 1997, in "In the Matter of Joint Application of Louisville Gas and Electric Company and Kentucky Utilities Company for Approval of Merger," Case No. 97-300:
 - Twenty Million Dollars (\$20,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 1999 through June 30, 2000;
 - Eight Million Dollars (\$8,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 2000 through June 30, 2001;
 - Four Million Dollars (\$4,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 2001 through June 30, 2002;
 - Eight Million Dollars (\$8,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 2002 through June 30, 2003;
 - Eight Million Dollars (\$8,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 2003 through June 30, 2004.
- LG&E's gas base rates would not be increased for a period of five years or through June 30, 2004 absent the incurrence of extraordinary circumstances and excepting any changes as the result of the operation of any lawful surcharge or automatic adjustment clause.
- An additional one-year extension of the KU's current commitment to cap electric rates extending through June 30, 2004, absent the incurrence of extraordinary circumstances and excepting any changes as the result of the operation of any lawful surcharge or automatic adjustment clause.

KU and LG&E will set aside the following amounts each year, in accordance with the allocation of the merger savings determined by the Commission in its Order of September 12, 1997, in "In the Matter of Joint Application of Louisville Gas and Electric Company and Kentucky Utilities Company for Approval of Merger," Case No. 97-300, for qualified organizations for the purpose of assisting low-income customers of KU and LG&E with payment of their residential energy bills:

- Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 1999 through June 30, 2000;
- One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 2000 through June 30, 2001;
- One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 2001 through June 30, 2002;
- One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 2002 through June 30, 2003;
- One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 2003 through June 30, 2004.

KU's Amended Application proposes to make these provisions effective July 1, 1999.

The Amended Application requests that the Commission approve an alternative method of regulating KU's rates and service, as well as an Electric Performance-Based Rate ("EPBR") Tariff. The Amended Application, if approved, will change the method of regulating KU from the traditional rate-of-return method of regulation to a method based on KU's operating performance.

The EPBR Tariff, as issued on April 5, 1999, applies to all electric rate schedules and special contracts for electric service, effective July 1, 1999. The monthly amount computed under each of the rate schedules to which the EPBR Tariff is applicable shall be increased or decreased by the Electric Performance-Based Rate Adjustment Factor at a rate per kilowatt-hour of monthly consumption during the billing calendar quarter computed as follows:

$$\frac{EPBRA(q) - EPBRA(q) / KW(H)}{EPBRA(q) / FCR + MDS + GP + SQ + BR + BA}$$

Where:

- EPBRA=Electric Performance-Based Rate Adjustment Factor
- EPBRA(q)=Electric Performance-Based Rate Adjustment Factor for the current quarter
- FCR=Fuel Cost Recovery
- MDS=Merger Dispatch Savings expressed as a credit
- GP=Generation Performance expressed as a credit
- SQ=Service Quality
- BR=Bill Reduction expressed as a credit
- BA=Balancing Adjustment
- KW=Kentucky jurisdictional Kilowatt-Hour Sales in the current quarter
- H=Current quarter shall be the second calendar quarter preceding the billing calendar quarter in which the EPBRA/F is billed

The Amended Merger Surcharge, RFR, issued April 5, 1999, applies to all electric rate schedules and special contracts effective July 1, 1999.

KU also is requesting that the Commission approve the withdrawal of its Electric Rate Schedule Fuel Adjustment clause after all fuel costs are collected pursuant to the Uniform Fuel Adjustment Clause Regulation (807 KAR 5:056) and final orders are issued in the pending fuel adjustment clause cases of KU concurrent with the approval of the EPBR Tariff, and KU is further requesting that the Commission approve conditions permitting greater tariff flexibility in the future.

The Commission's review of KU's Amended Application may result in a method of regulating KU or consumer rates and services other than the method of regulation and rates described in this Notice.

Any corporation, association, body politic, or person may, by motion within thirty (30) days after publication or mailing of this Notice, request leave to intervene in the case before the Commission (Case No. 98-474). Any such motion shall be submitted to: The Public Service Commission, 730 Scherck Lane, P.O. Box 615, Frankfort, Kentucky 40602, and shall set forth the grounds for the request for intervention, including the status and interest of the party requesting intervention.

Cancer Center gains weapon

(Editor's Note: Georgia Painter Sayers, graduated from Brodhead High School in 1931. She was the daughter of the late J.J. Painter, and long ago wrote the news from Brodhead for the Signal. Georgia also taught school at Anglin Falls and Rocky Bend. She was married to Roy Sayers who was from Rockcastle County.)

Georgia Sayers retired, years ago from a 25-year career teaching first grade in Parks Hills. Now, she's serving as an educator again - this time as a cancer patient.

Last week at University Hospital, Mrs. Sayers became the first Tristate patient to receive an unusual treatment for melanoma called hyperthermic isolated limb perfusion.

"Everything went very well. The perfusion went smoothly. We'll have to wait and see over the next several weeks to see how the lesions respond," said Dr. Jeff Sussman, a surgical oncologist at University Hospital's Barrett Cancer Center. Melanoma - the most serious and fastest-growing type of skin cancer - is highly curable when caught early enough. But for some patients, like Mrs. Sayers, the disease can spread so fast that radical procedures are needed.

The perfusion therapy that Mrs. Sayers received will be needed by less than five percent of melanoma patients. Doctors say the fact that such a treatment was available in

Cincinnati, rather than requiring travel to an out-of-town cancer center, is one of several signs that local cancer care is becoming more sophisticated.

"As far as melanoma goes, there's nothing that M.D. Anderson (a famous cancer center in Texas) offers that we don't offer here," Dr. Sussman said. "This is the last piece."

A year ago, the Barrett Cancer Center launched a multidisciplinary melanoma clinic that involves teams of dermatologists, plastic surgeons, surgical and medical oncologists.

The clinic offers high-tech lymph node mapping to trace where melanoma cells are spreading. It also has expanded the numbers of patients involved in clinical trials from almost none to more than three dozen in the past year.

Beyond melanoma, UC recently installed an "X-knife" system to treat brain tumors and is nearing completion of the curvy-walled Vonz Center for Molecular Studies, where several cancer-related research projects will be based.

Beginning April 1, the Barrett Center will get its first full-time director in six years: Dr. Kenneth Foon, formerly director of the University of Kentucky's Markey Cancer Center.

The expanding commitment to cancer care could have come at a better time for Mrs. Sayers.

The retired teacher, now 85, dis-

covered she had melanoma two years ago when her podiatrist became concerned about a sore on the bottom of her foot. Dr. Andrew Lowy, a surgical oncologist at the Barrett Center, removed the growth and did tests to make sure the disease had not spread elsewhere.

"Things were fine until a month ago, when two small growths appeared on Mrs. Sayer's leg. The growths were multiplying fast - within three weeks doctors counted at least nine."

"You could see them just popping out on my leg," Mrs. Sayers said. It was clear to the doctors that surgery to cut out the growths would not keep up with the disease.

To prevent the cancer from attacking other vital organs, the doctors were considering amputating Mrs. Sayer's leg - which no one involved wanted to happen.

Enter hyperthermic isolated limb perfusion. In this procedure, doctors use a tourniquet to cut off blood flow to the leg, then they route the blood that's still in the leg through a series of machines.

During the four to six hour process, the machines supply oxygen for the blood to keep nourishing leg tissues, heat the blood to more than 104 degrees and then use the blood to

carry a powerful dose of chemotherapy through the entire leg.

The high temperatures and chemotherapy work in concert to kill the cancer. The blood supply to the leg has to be rerouted because the high doses of medication would damage other organs and such a high fever for the entire body would be dangerous. The perfusion technique has been done for several years at other cancer centers, but the Barrett Center didn't have the equipment. Now, the center expects to do six to 12 cases a year, Dr. Lowy said.

The "response rate" for perfusion therapy is about 80 percent, which means that many patients see their tumors shrink by at least 50 percent. The therapy actually cures melanoma in about a third of patients.

Even without a cure, the therapy can improve quality of life by preserving limbs and reducing pain, Dr. Lowy said.

It will be about three weeks before Mrs. Sayers finds out how well the treatment worked. Meanwhile, she said she wasn't too worried about being the first local patient to try the therapy.

"Well, it was the only thing for me," she said. "I have a lot of faith and trust in God and a lot of trust in Dr. Lowy."
