Teresa Cromer says she was fired because she questioned one percent tax

ormer Image Entry employee files suit cted Deaton about the one percent first shift, although she was a super visor and had been with the company

A former employee of Image
Entry Inc. in Mt. Vernon has filed
suit in Rockeastle Circuit Court
against her former employer.
Teresa Cromer, a supervisor at
Image Entry, who had worked at the
data processing plant in the
Rockeastle Industrial Park since it
opened in 1994, filed suit against the

Deaton of London.

In her suit filed Tuesday, Cromer claims that she was fired on March 26 of this year because she questioned the legitimacy of a one percent payroll deduction on her check for the City of Mt. Vermon.

Cromer claims that the City of Mt. Vermon has no occupational tax

defrauded Cromer of one percent of her pay check by knowingly misrep-resenting that such at ax existed, when they knew they were not entitled to this conversion of a portion of Cromer's salary. According to the suit, Cromer's accountant Mrs. Karen King, who is also the Mayor of Mt. Vernon, con-

tacted Deaton about the one percent deduction.

During the conversation Deaton asked King, which of his employees had complained about the deduction asked King, because it was Cromer. In her suit, Cromer claims that after Deaton learned that she was complaining about the deduction she was fired. "Cromer claims that she was complaining about the deduction she worngfully discharged eassing her to experience suffering, humiliation and tot earnings and benefits. Cromer also said on Tuesday that she was advised by her attorney, Ned Pillersdorf of Prestonsburg, not to comment, "because the complaint spoke for itself."

But she did say that when Image Entry closed their third shift at their Mt. Vernon plant, she was the only employee not moved to second or

visor and had been with the company since it opened in Mt. Vernon in 1994.

Cromer said that she also received a check from Image Entry for over \$500, apparently re-paying her for the one percent that had been withheld from her check the past five

Other Image Entry employees, who asked not to be identified, also confirmed that they also received a

confirmed that they also received a check from the company for the one percent tax that had been withheld. Cromer said altertfromthecompany accompanied her check and thanked the employees for helping Image Entry to expand into other counties in Kentucky. Basically they were thanking us for us allowing them to use our money, "she said.

Venters criticizes federal drug agent's actions

Lovell asks to be released on bond on bond immediately because his par-ents had come up with the bond money.

By: Richard Anderkin Rockeastle Circuit Judge Dan Venters said in open court on Friday that the actions of a federal DEA officer who seized \$50,000 from a local man as he attempted to post bond, were "arrogant, offensive and distasteful." Venters' comments came near the

Venters' comments came near the end of a hearing for accused murdeere David Lovell, of Burr, who was returned to jail, while he awaits a ruling on the matter from Venters.
The hearing was held at the request of Lovell's attorney, Warren Scoville, after afterdar drug enforcement agency officer walked out of the Rockcastle County Courthouse on April 12 with \$50,000 in cash that Lovell had brooght tothe Rockcastle Circuit Clerk's office, where he attempted to post bond. npted to post bond.

Scoville told Venters that his cli-

Scoville told Venters that his cli-ent, Lovell, had met the requirements set forth by the Judge on March 31, when Venters set Lovell's bond at \$50,000 cash and that Lovell should be released on bond, instead of being held in the Boyle County Detention

held in the Boyle County Detention Center.

Several people including, Circuit. Clerk Teresa Vanzant, deputy clerk Teresa Amos and DEA agent Jerry Carmack were subpoened for the hearing which took over two hours. Ohio man arrested

Mt. Vernon police arrested an Auckland, Ohio man Saturday who told them he had traded \$400 in crack cocaine to a Hamilton, Ohio man for use of his 1995 Jeep Grand Chero-

kee.

However, when Sgt. Matt Bryant ran the tags on the vehicle it was reported stolen from Fairfield, Ohio. Christopher Black, 26, told police he had had the vehicle for five days and had been living out of it.

He was lodged in the Boyle County jail charged with receiving stolen property, evading police, giving a false name to a police officer and alcohol intoxication in a public place.

In a motion filed in Rockcastle Circuit Court on April 15, Scoville wrote that Lovell should be released

ents had come up with the bond money.

Brought into court in a black, and-white striped jail suit, David Lovell watched sitently, saying not a word, as the lawyers argued before Venters Friday.

Lovell's bond proceeding was "thwarted by the federal government," Scoville told Venters, because "there is no way the DEA could have known for sure that Aunt Sally in Seattle didn't send him that money."

Such seizures of bond money by the DEA could have a "chilling effect" on lawyers being willing to accept assignments of bond money to them as their automey's fees, Scoville said.

"I think it sets a bad precedent," said Scoville, who is seeking to be paid for defending the Lovells through

a bond assignment himself.

But acting Commonwealth Attorney Eddy Montgomery told Venters he would agree that bond assignment is a "a fairly common practice,"

ment is a "a fairly common practice, but it's a bad practice. What is the incentive of a person charged with murder to come back for trial withen they know that is not their \$50,000?" Bond assignments are legal, common practices in this country, it simply is a way for an automety or make sure her of she gets pald for their services," local automey and former President of the 'Kentucky Trial Lawyer's Association, Jerry Cox said.

"It is no different than the bank taking out a fien on your vehicle, you get the use of the vehicle, the money up front to buy it and the bank takes a lien on the vehicle, in case you decide you no longer want to pay them, Cos said.

But Judge Venters told the two lawyers that in this case, bond assignments were beside the point, and had no bearing on whether Lovell posted bond and should be released. Floyd Lovell brought-the cash into the clerk 'soffice in his pant pockets, not Corbin. resident. Rebecca. "It is no different than the bank

So I carefully pried it loose and discarded it in a safe pile that would be removed later. Now why in the wold would think of sym shoes and sandals on the feet of every child? When I was a child cup feet from a cleasty toses of tearing up an old sheet for a clear rang to the the foot up with. A kid wold come limping or

hopping on one foot into the house, sometimes crying or whimpering, with blood dripping from the injured foot and say, "Mommy, Leut my foot, will you tie it up? Band aids, sterile gauze and tape were not popular for home use then so clean rags, usually from worn sheets, were kept handy. Different mamas used a variety of methods of cleansing and medicating the wound. Alcohol, salve, iodine, were all used but my mom slavorite were all used but my mom slavorite were all used but my moms favorite was white sugar dampened with tur-pentine. her lap, if it was small enough to sit
here, and you would be surprised at

She and Mom were peeling applies for apple-butter and I was being fed bits as they cut them up. For some reason I rocked the chair and it toppled over. Mom reached to grab me before I hit the rocks beneath the chair and drop her knife. As she grasped my thigh the sharp knife penetrated the flesh and followed the bone down to my ankle.

As a big mouthful would soften she would slap it on the open wound till she finally had my leg covered from crotch to foot, then the bandaging began, the bleeding eased off, my crying quieted down and I was set on the floor and told to go play. Margot told mon to wait for her to come told mon to wait for her to come defined blood sanked one off, washed the direct blood off the wound and healing had already begun. I don't know

what her next step was but I do know I have carried the scar from it all my life. For some reason, perhaps her love for me and mine for her, even though I was too young to remember the accident, when I think of her the accident, when I think of her warm kitchen, remember the big cupboard where she kept her twists of tobacco, the table with the ratablecloth and the gentle hands serving the best soda biscuits and soratum molasses with freshly churned butter I have ever eaten, I get all choked up and wish for those days again.



ALLERGIES: SOMETHING TO SNEEZE ABOUT

neezing. Runny nose. Nasal conges tion. Watery, itchy eyes. Do these symptoms sound familiar? If so, you may be one of 44 million Americans suffering from allergies.

An allergy is an exaggement response

or increased sensitivity to certain substances, such as dust mites food, mold, dander (skin particles from animals), pollens and other harmless elements. Substances that cause an exaggerated response are called allergens.

Once an aller gen has entered the body of an allergy sufferer, anti bodies work to protect the body by releas ing substances, such as histamines

However, the release of histarnines produces allergic symptoms in the skin, nose eyes and chest including swelling of the nasal membranes, itching, irritation and excess mucus production.

Allergic sensitivity often starts in childhood or young adulthood and usually continues for life. The development of allergies tends to be hereditary. If both parents have allergies, then a child has a 75 percent chance of developing allergies

The most common form of allergy is allergic rhinitis (also known as hay fever), which affects more than 20 million Americans. Hay fever produces runny nose, watery eyes, itchy throat, sneezing and excess mucus in the nose and throat Seasonal allergic rhinitis is primarily caused by airborne pollen from certain plants that pollinate during a particular time of the year, such as grasses, trees and weeds. Perennial allergic rhinitis occurs any time of the year and can be caused by pet dander, dust mites or indoor molds

"There are numerous types of allergies and allergic reactions may involve any part of the body," said Dr. Griffith, physician at Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center (RHRCC). "A number of medica-

tions are useful in the treatment of allergies. It is best to work with your doctor to determine the best treatment plan for your allergies.

Allergy testing can be done through skin tests and blood tests. Some treatments available include antihistamines decongestants and allergy shots.

"Another way to decrease the allergy symptoms you experience is to decrease your exposure to allergens," said Dr. Griffith.

Dr. Griffith recommends the following to help eliminate your exposure to aller-

- · Close the windows in your bedroom to keep pollen and mold spores from drifting in;
- · Limit the number of indoor plants you
- · Avoid mowing the lawn and raking leaves (wear a mask if you must perform these activities);
- · Dry your sheets and clothing in a dryer rather than hanging them outdoors;
- Avoid dust, feathers and animal dander;
- When driving keep your windows closed; and
- Vacation in areas that are more pollen free than your home.

The key to controlling allergies is to work closely with your doctor, take the appropriate medication and eliminate your amount of exposure to allergens

THE TRUTH ABOUT PARKINSON'S DISEASE

ou probably don't think about but toning your shirt, tying your shoes or zipping your jacket. But simple actions like these are difficult for those suffering from Parkinson's disease.

Parkinson's disease (PD) is a disorder of the central nervous system that affects more than one million people in the United States. PD may appear at any age, although the risk of developing it increases with age. The disease affects both men and women, but men are affected slightly more often than women. Celebrities such as Muhammad Ali and Michael J. Fox are victims of Parkinson's disease

The primary cause of Parkinson's disease appears to be the lack of dopamine, a chemical in the brain that enables people to move normally and smoothly. Once the body experiences a large loss of dopamine, movement becomes increasingly difficult.

Everyone experiences different symptoms with Parkinson's disease. The onset of PD is gradual and is characterized by

- the following symptoms: · Tremors, usually starting in one hand;
- · Slowness of movement;
- · Stiffness or rigidity;
- · Difficulty walking; · Soft, slow speech; and
- · Fixed facial expression.

"It is important for your primary care doctor to thoroughly examine you if you think you could be suffering from Parkinson's disease," said Dr. Arvin physician at Rockcastle Health and Respiratory Care Center (RHRCC)

"Different patients experience different symptoms. A complete examination. which includes a history and a physical, can help in diagnosing in PD.

Currently, there is no cure for Parkinson's disease. Despite the fact that PD is incurable, special therapies such as occupational therapy and physical therapy, medications and even surgery along with emotional support can help reduce the

severity of the disease and improve the quality of life.

"In addition, there are several things a patient can do to stay well as long as possible with Parkinson's disease, Regular exercise can help maintain and improve mobility and flexibility. And support groups provide patients and families with extra resources to cope with PD," Dr. Arvin said

Issues Surrounding Distribution of Phase II Tobacco Settlement Funds

Farm Bureau recently hosted Larry Forgy at a tobacco update-meeting. The following is Part II of a series on current issues surrounding distribution of Phase II Tobacco Settlement Funds. Check last weeks Mr. Vernon Signal for a complete account.

What About the Distribution of Payments to Tenants and/or Lessees? The distribution of Payments to Tenants and lessees? The distribution of potential payments to tenants and lessees is a very complicated and controversal sissue. Opinions range from 100 percent of the funds to the producer. What Are Some Other Issues Surrounding Leased Pounds? If payments are based on the level of basic quota, how are leased carryover (i.e., effective quota) pounds handled? What about disaster leasing?

What About A Quota Buyout or Buydown? There has been some discussion of utilizing settlementfunds for a quota buyout or buydown. Again several issues complicate this concept. First, the \$8.00/lb quota buyout as part of some legislative proposals last year was based on funding totaling \$20 billion or more. Concerns surrounding a quota buyout scheme include dilating the state's tobacco political base and the risk that remaining quota owners face regarding potential settlement funds being available to them if the tobacco program is eliminated (and thus the value of quota falls to zero). Also, it remains unclear whether any type of quota falls to zero). Also, it remains unclear whether any type of quota buyout could be designed that did not require federal legislation.

Will Any Phase I Funds Be Made Available For Agriculture? Phase I funds are part of the Master Settlement Agreement which settled the existing state lawsuits against the choacco companies. Kentucky will receive approximately \$3.45 billion over the next 25 years. The question remains whether the federal government will require a portion of the Phase I funds as a repayment for lost federal dollars associated with the Medicaid program. Another option that the repayment for lost federal dollars associated with the Medicaid program. Another option that the federal government might pursue is requiring the states to spend as certain portion of the stellement funds on anti-to-bacco programs. Kentucky agricultural leaders have proposed that at least 50 percent of the Phase I money available to the state be, reinvested back into agriculture. Utilimately the General Assembly (which is not scheduled to reconvene until January 2000 unless Assembly (which is not scheduled to reconvene until January 2000 unless a special session is called by the Governor) will determine the allocation of Phase I funds. Presently, farm leaders are drafting a unified plan for agriculture that they intend to present to the Governor within the next 30 to 45 days.

When Can I Expect My First
Phase II Payment? While the initial
intent was to get this payment out ASAP, it will likely be late fall or early winter before the 1999 payment is made available.

INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The 1999 County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 3 through 17, 1999. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 1999 assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 1999 will be due about September 15, 1999.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior or during the inspection period.

Any taxpayer still aggreed by an assessment on real property, after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The taxpayer can appeal his assessment by filling in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.

The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period.

Any taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person of by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administrator.

- (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be fair cash
- (2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Property Valuation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- (4) The final decision of the Revenue Cabinet may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax appeals.


