## Former Image Entry employee files suit

A former employee of Image Entry Inc. in Mt. Vernon has filed suit in Rockcastle Circuit Court against her former employer.

company and its owner William Deaton of London.  
In her suit filed Tuesday, Cromer claims that she was fired on March 26 of this year because she questioned the legitimacy of a one percent payroll deduction on her check for the City of Mt. Vernon.  
Cromer claims that the City of Mt. Vernon has no occupational tax

and that Image Entry intentionally defrauded Cromer of one percent of her pay check by knowingly misrepresenting that such a tax existed, when they knew they were not entitled to this conversion of a portion of Cromer's salary.  
According to the suit, Cromer's accountant Mrs. Karen King, who is also the Mayor of Mt. Vernon, con-

tacted Deaton about the one percent deduction.  
During the conversation Deaton asked King, which of his employees had complained about the deduction and King told Deaton it was Cromer.  
In her suit, Cromer claims that after Deaton learned that she was complaining about the deduction she was fired.  
Cromer claims that she was wrongfully discharged causing her to experience suffering, humiliation and lost earnings and benefits.  
Cromer also said on Tuesday that she was advised by her attorney, Ned Fillersdorf of Prestonsburg, not to comment, "because the complaint spoke for itself."

But she did say that when Image Entry closed their third shift at their Mt. Vernon plant, she was the only employee not moved to second or

first shift, although she was a supervisor and had been with the company since it opened in Mt. Vernon in 1994.  
Cromer said that she also received a check from Image Entry for over \$500, apparently re-paying her for the one percent that had been withheld from her check the past five years.  
Other Image Entry employees, who asked not to be identified, also confirmed that they also received a check from the company for the one percent tax that had been withheld.  
Cromer said a letter from the company accompanied her check and thanked the employees for helping Image Entry to expand into other counties in Kentucky. "Basically they were thanking us for allowing them to use our money," she said.  
A spokesperson in William

Deaton's London office said that because of the pending litigation, Image Entry had no comment on the matter and referred all questions to Lexington Attorney, Ed Henry, who the spokesperson said was conducting an investigation into the matter.  
Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis said that it was his understanding that because the fiscal court had agreed in 1994 to participate in two programs provided by the Kentucky Economic Cabinet, Image Entry could deduct the one percent from the employee's wages.  
"By deducting the one percent, the state kicked in another four percent of matching funds," Carlotis said.  
"It is just one tool counties in depressed areas use to attract new industry," he said.

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## Venters criticizes federal drug agent's actions

# Lovell asks to be released on bond

Rockcastle Circuit Judge Dan Venters said in open court on Friday that the seizure of a federal DEA officer who seized \$50,000 from a local man as he attempted to post bond, were "arrogant, offensive and distasteful."

on bond immediately because his parents had come up with the bond money.  
Then on April 12, Greer went to court in a black and-white striped jail suit, David Lovell watched silently, saying not a word, as the lawyers argued before Venters Friday.  
Lovell's bond proceeding was "invented by the federal government," Scoville told Venters, because "there is no way the DEA could have known for sure that Aunt Sally in Seattle didn't send him that money."

Lovell is being held in the Boyle County Detention Center, Greer testified.

Venters' comments came near the end of a hearing for accused murderer David Lovell, of Bur, who was returned to jail, while he awaits a ruling on the matter from Venters.  
The hearing was held at the request of Lovell's attorney, Warren Scoville, after a federal drug enforcement agency officer walked out of the Rockcastle County Courthouse on April 12 with \$50,000 in cash that Lovell had brought to the Rockcastle Circuit Clerk's office, where he attempted to post bond.  
Scoville told Venters that his client, Lovell, had met the requirements set forth by the judge for a \$21,000 bond. Venters set Lovell's bond at \$50,000 cash and that Lovell should be released on bond, instead of being held in the Boyle County Detention Center.

Several people including, Circuit Clerk, Dan Venters, deputy clerk, Teresa Amos and DEA agent Jerry Carmack were subpoenaed for the hearing which took over two hours.  
At the beginning of the hearing federal prosecutors kept Carmack from testifying as to "why" he seized the \$50,000 in cash, but the prosecutors, who came along simply to advise and counsel the agent, did allow him to testify that he did indeed take the money from Vanzant's personal desk, after she and Amos counted and marked the \$50,000.  
Carmack testified that the money was in mixed denominations of \$50, \$100 and \$20.  
The agent testified that he took the money before Vanzant could collect a \$4 bond filing fee from David Lovell's father Floyd, a move that came into question when Vanzant took the stand.  
Vanzant testified that under the guidelines of Kentucky's Administrative Office of the Courts, a \$4 filing fee must be paid with the bond money before the bond is actually complete.  
On April 31, and his wife Barbara, 25, are accused of fatally shooting Charles "Tuddy" Baker, also 31, of Mt. Vernon and burying his body on land at Tark Hill that the Lovells own. When police found Baker's body earlier this year, it was buried 13 feet below the earth's surface.

But scolding Commonwealth Attorney Eddy Montgomery told Venters he would agree that bond practice is "a fairly common agreement, but it's a bad practice. What is the incentive of a person charged with murder to come back for trial when they know that it is not their \$50,000?"  
"Bond assignments are legal, common practices in this country, it simply is a way for an attorney to make sure he or she gets paid for their services," local attorney and former President of the Kentucky Trial Lawyer's Association, Jerry Cox said.

"It is no different than the bank taking out a lien on your vehicle, you get the use of the vehicle, the money up front to buy the bank takes a lien on the vehicle, in case you decide you no longer want to pay them, Cox said.  
But Judge Venters told the two lawyers that in this case, bond assignments were beside the point, and had no bearing on whether Lovell posted bond and should be released.  
Floyd Lovell brought the cash into the clerk's office in his pant pockets, not Corbin resident Rebecca Greer, according to testimony by Vanzant testified.

At no point was Greer in possession of the money, but she was present when the money was counted, Carmack Vanzant and Greer all testified. It is illegal for a lawyer or his paralegal to post bond for a suspect, Vanzant testified.  
Greer only came along to serve as a guide for David Lovell's parents because they didn't know where the Boyle County Circuit Clerk's office is located in Danville, and that's where they were told April 10 that bond would have to be posted, because

But Judge Venters told the two lawyers that in this case, bond assignments were beside the point, and had no bearing on whether Lovell posted bond and should be released.  
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Greer testified that when Lovell was brought from jail April 12, he and Bernice Lovell signed his partially-completed bond form and they were taken into Vanzant's inner office to count and mark the money.  
"She said she could not accept a bond assignment before the bond was filed," Greer said. Later, on April 15, Greer filed the bond assignment motion for Scoville with Vanzant, who still is arguing the bond was never posted because the filing process was never completed.

# Sweet and Sour

### Chapter 13

Memories are made by curious and unexpected incidents in our lives that pop out when least expected. This happened to me the other day when I was going through the rubble accumulated outside the basement walls of the place I once called "HOME." There are enough memories buried there to fill several books if one had the talent to write them. I will be digging some of them up as I go along with my rambling about the past.

Saturday, I went with Polly and Chuck to "the farm" to provi around while they worked. They keep the place as well groomed as it was when we were living in the house and expecting company for the weekend. Last week, along with all the other things they have done to "keep it alive," wounded but not fatally, a new pump, water tank and spigot that outside the new building they had put close to the well for that purpose, was in use for the first time in nearly two years. So, once again we have water we can use freely.

The old saying, "No one misses the water till the well runs dry" is quite true, but I have had more than a normal share of doing without water because of springs going dry in the middle of summer when it was most needed, and truly was glad I was living in town when this tragedy

occurred and I didn't have to clean out the spring and carry water from it from those two years.

While they were mowing and trimming I was nosing around and stopped to retrieve a bit of something shiny in a pile of rubble beside the basement walls and discovered a pile of broken glass dishes. It was the remains of a collection of depression glass that had been given to me through out the years. I picked up several pieces wondering which particular dish it was from and trying to remember who had given it to me when a very sharp piece, protruding from the ground, struck a chord of caution, "now this has to be removed," my mind told me, "some child running through the yard in his bare foot from it."

So I carefully pried it loose and discarded it in a safe pile that would be removed later. Now when in the world would I think of a barefoot child in these days of gym shoes and sandals on the feet of every child? And especially so in the yard of a house that was no longer there and where children never came anymore. It was a bit of my past come to life without searching for the key to memory. When I was a child cut feet from carelessly tossed broken glass was a common occurrence and every mama held her share of tearing up an old sheet for a clean rag to tie the foot up with. A kid would come limping or

hopping on one foot into the house, sometimes crying or whinpering, with blood dripping from the injured foot and say, "Mommy, I cut my foot, will you tie it up?" Band aids, sterile gauze and tape were not popular for home use then so clean rags, usually from worn sheets, were kept handy. Different mamas used a variety of methods of cleansing and medicating the wound. Alcohol, salve, iodine, were all used but my moms favorite was white sugar dampened with turpentine. She would hold the child in her lap, if it was small enough to sit there, and you would be surprised at how big a kid can get before he gets past the stage of sitting in his mamas's lap if he/she is scared and hurting, then wash the dirty foot with soap and water, rip a strip of cloth from the sheet, take a small part of it make a pouch to hold the surplus of sugar and turpentine, place it carefully over the cut and begin wrapping the cloth around it. When it was well wrapped a string would be torn from the remaining piece and likewise wrapped securely around the heel. The child was tied to hold it there, kiss the wound and say, "now run and play and watch where you are going."

Another dressing for wound was home grown and cured tobacco chewed into a soft mass and applied directly to the fresh wound then wrapped securely with the bandage. Still another, this one was used on an infected wound and would draw the poison out, it was a piece of fat meat, hog meat of course, placed directly on the swollen red wound and tied up. For we never heard of a child dying from lock-jaw or gangrene back then. The neighbor took charge of an accident where my leg had been cut to the bone from thigh to ankle. This is how it was told to me. I was sitting beside my mom in an old fashioned, the hat, for shade of the house of the friend we were visiting that day. She and Mom were peeling apples for apple-butter and I was being fed bits as they cut them up. For some reason I rocked the chair and it toppled over, Mom reached to grab me before I hit the rocks beneath the chair and drop her knife. As she grasped my thigh the sharp knife penetrated the flesh and followed the bone down to my ankle. By then I was really screaming and both of them saw why. Margot, the neighbor and my godmother, grabbed me and pulled her big apron over the bloody wound, told mom to quite herself and she would take care of me. Then just inside the door to the kitchen she grabbed a sheet and big tureen of home cured tobacco from the

shelf, tore the sheet into strips, and began chewing the tobacco. As a big mouthful would soften she would slap it on the open wound till she finally had my leg covered from crotch to foot, then the bandaging began, the bleeding ceased off, my crying quieted down and I was set on the floor and told to go play. Margot told mom to wait for her to come and change the bandage, took the old blood soaked one off, washed the dried blood off the wound and healing had already begun. I don't know

what her next step was but I do know I have carried the scar from it all my life. For some reason, perhaps her love for me and mine for her, even though I was too young to remember the accident, when I think of her warm kitchen, remember the big cupboard where she kept her twigs of tobacco, the table with the red tablecloth and the gentle hands serving the best soda biscuits and sorghum molasses with freshly churned butter I have ever eaten, I get all choked up and wish for those days again.

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## Track teams compete at Lake Cumberland Classic

Rockcastle's varsity track and field teams recently competed at the 23rd Annual Lake Cumberland Classic in Somerset. Thirteen girls' team and fifteen boys' teams were on hand for the event despite the unbelievably cold weather conditions. The girls' team had a great meet and placed fifth overall with 55 points. The team was plagued with unfortunate circumstances throughout the meet, including the illness of leading scorer Cheyenne Carmack. The girls managed to put themselves in contention, despite their bad luck. Going to the meet, the RCHS girls were the favorites to win. That honor went to

regional rival Pulaski Southwestern, a team the girls defeated by 52 points at the first meet of the season. In the 3200 meter relay, the team of Ashley Lawson, Chere Embs, Amber Thacker and Cassandra Ramsey placed sixth overall in a hard-fought race. The group ran a season's best time of 12:53.4. The 100 meter hurdles was the sight of Rockcastle's first run of misfortune. Luckily, for her and the team, she was all right. The 400 meter relay team of Sheena Swinney, Angela Owens, Theresa Chislum and Mindy Bullock ran a great race and placed fifth overall in 58.1. In the 400 meter dash, Rachelle Hammond ran a great race and placed seventh overall with a time of 1:09.7. This was very impressive considering the weather conditions. Rockcastle missed points due to Cheyenne's unfortunate absence. Going into the meet, she was one of the favorites to win the race. Cassandra Ramsey shouldered the distance load for Rockcastle. In the 1600 meter run, Cassandra fought the cold to run an impressive 7:01.9. In the 3200 run, Cassandra ran very well and placed 12th overall in 15:47.4. In the 200 meter dash, Sheena Swinney led the way with an awesome run. She placed second overall with a personal record time of 28.8. She narrowly missed first place by only three tenths of a second. 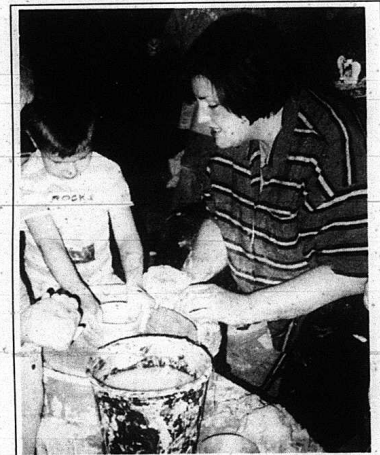
## Arts Night at RES

When the spokesperson was asked why the money was repaid, she replied no comment and referred questions to Henry.

Carloftis said he couldn't understand why the one percent was repaid either.

## Blaming Each Other Wrecks Marriages

When Jesse and Delores came for marriage counseling, their marriage was in deep trouble. (All characters are fictional.) Jesse had a serious drinking problem, and Delores had recently had an affair. Both were very angry.

Jesse began the proceedings. "She had an affair with my best friend! I don't think I can ever forgive her for that. I've known for five years that she had these attractions to other men, and I told her to be careful. Did she listen to me? No, she never does."

Delores quickly voiced her side of the story. "He thinks all he has to do to be a good husband is bring home a paycheck. Well, I don't want to be responsible to someone who spends his whole life in front of the TV, drink. I've told him to quit drinking, but he won't listen to me. If I had a decent husband, maybe I wouldn't have gotten interested in another man."

Jesse chimed back in with his defense. "You knew I drank when you married me. Why is it suddenly such a big problem? And maybe I wouldn't sit in front of the TV with a beer, if you wouldn't hurt you to act like a wife sometimes."

"But, I'm right!" Jesse almost shouted. "You may be right," I responded, "but do you want to be right or be married? You have a choice. I know people who have insisted they were right even as the divorce papers were being signed. It didn't help save their marriages."

"To save this marriage, the two of you need to look at yourselves and solve the personal problems that each has," I told him. "Jesse, to have a good marriage, you have to quit drinking. ## ALLERGIES: SOMETHING TO SNEEZE ABOUT

**S**neezing. Runny nose. Nasal congestion. Watery, itchy eyes. Do these symptoms sound familiar? If so, you may be one of 44 million Americans suffering from allergies.

An allergy is an exaggerated response or increased sensitivity to certain substances, such as dust mites, food, mold, dander (skin particles from animals), pollens and other harmless elements. Substances that cause an exaggerated response are called allergens.

Once an allergen has entered the body of an allergy sufferer, antibodies work to protect the body by releasing substances, such as histamines. However, the release of histamines produces allergic symptoms in the skin, nose, eyes and chest including swelling of the nasal membranes, itching, irritation and excess mucus production.

Allergic sensitivity often starts in childhood or young adulthood and usually continues for life. The development of allergies tends to be hereditary. If both parents have allergies, then a child has a 75 percent chance of developing allergies.

The most common form of allergy is allergic rhinitis (also known as hay fever), which affects more than 20 million Americans. Hay fever produces runny nose, watery eyes, itchy throat, sneezing and excess mucus in the nose and throat. Seasonal allergic rhinitis is primarily caused by airborne pollen from certain plants that pollinate during a particular time of the year, such as grasses, trees and weeds. Perennial allergic rhinitis occurs any time of the year and can be caused by

pet dander, dust mites or indoor molds.

"There are numerous types of allergies, and allergic reactions may involve any part of the body," said Dr. Griffith, physician at Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center (RHRCC). "A number of medications are useful in the treatment of allergies. It is best to work with your doctor to determine the best treatment plan for your allergies."



Allergy testing can be done through skin tests and blood tests. Some treatments available include antihistamines, decongestants and allergy shots.

"Another way to decrease the allergy symptoms you experience is to decrease your exposure to allergens," said Dr. Griffith.

Dr. Griffith recommends the following to help eliminate your exposure to allergens:

- Close the windows in your bedroom to keep pollen and mold spores from drifting in;
- Limit the number of indoor plants you keep;
- Avoid mowing the lawn and raking leaves (wear a mask if you must perform these activities);
- Dry your sheets and clothing in a dryer rather than hanging them outdoors;
- Avoid dust, feathers and animal dander;
- When driving keep your windows closed; and
- Vacation in areas that are more pollen-free than your home.

The key to controlling allergies is to work closely with your doctor, take the appropriate medication and eliminate your amount of exposure to allergens.

## HEALTHY TIPS

### Exercise at Menopause

Even at menopause, fitness can reduce the risk of heart disease, osteoporosis and diabetes. Yet only 38 percent of women over the age of 19 exercise regularly. Fitness and exercise are critical in the menopausal years because women face an increased risk for heart disease, osteoporosis and associated fractures, and chronic diseases, such as diabetes.

Studies have shown menopausal women lose bone density at an annual rate of up to 3 percent. Exercise helps increase bone mineral density.

Regular exercise also has been shown to decrease the incidence and severity of hot flashes, which occur in up to 75 percent of post-menopausal women. Weight-bearing exercise, resistance training and high-intensity fitness regimes can reduce a woman's risk of fractures. Cardiovascular exercise also is beneficial.

Menopausal women typically benefit the most from exercise combined with estrogen replacement therapy. If you have any concerns regarding exercise during menopause, be sure to consult your physician.



## THE TRUTH ABOUT PARKINSON'S DISEASE

**Y**ou probably don't think about buttoning your shirt, tying your shoes or zipping your jacket. But simple actions like these are difficult for those suffering from Parkinson's disease.

Parkinson's disease (PD) is a disorder of the central nervous system that affects more than one million people in the United States. PD may appear at any age, although the risk of developing it increases with age. The disease affects both men and women, but men are affected slightly more often than women. Celebrities such as Muhammad Ali and Michael J. Fox are victims of Parkinson's disease.

The primary cause of Parkinson's disease appears to be the lack of dopamine, a chemical in the brain that enables people to move normally and smoothly. Once the body experiences a large loss of dopamine, movement becomes increasingly difficult.

Everyone experiences different symptoms with Parkinson's disease. The onset of PD is gradual and is characterized by the following symptoms:

- Tremors, usually starting in one hand;
- Slowness of movement;
- Stiffness or rigidity;
- Difficulty walking;
- Soft, slow speech; and
- Fixed facial expression.

"It is important for your primary care doctor to thoroughly examine you if you think you could be suffering from Parkinson's disease," said Dr. Arvin, physician at Rockcastle Health and Respiratory Care Center (RHRCC).

"Different patients experience different symptoms. A complete examination, which includes a history and a physical, can help in diagnosing in PD."

Currently, there is no cure for Parkinson's disease. Despite the fact that PD is incurable, special therapies such as occupational therapy and physical therapy, medications and even surgery along with emotional support can help reduce the

severity of the disease and improve the quality of life.

"In addition, there are several things a patient can do to stay well as long as possible with Parkinson's disease. Regular exercise can help maintain and improve mobility and flexibility. And support groups provide patients and families with extra resources to cope with PD," Dr. Arvin said.

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## Occupational Therapy, skills for the job of living

Most of us give little thought to the everyday activities of living, such as brushing one's teeth, fixing a collar or tie, jumping into a car, grabbing a cup of coffee. That is, unless it comes with pain or a need for assistance.

April is National Occupational Therapy Month. It is a time when occupational therapists seek special opportunities to share the inspiration of their work with their communities and professional counterparts.

Of the many varieties of therapies, Occupational Therapy (OT) is the one that works most closely with helping the disabled or injured to shape and re-shape their environment in a way that allows them independence and freedom to carry out specific tasks of daily living.

OT's work to retrain persons with injuries or debilitations to dress and feed themselves and manage their

own hygiene. In the home, they assess the environment for safety, task simplification and energy conservation opportunities.

In the workplace of an injured employee, OT's assess the work environment and recommend safer work methods to prevent additional injury. Therapeutically, OT's simulate work tasks for the patient to both learn work more safely, and to encourage a speedy recovery.

In the skilled nursing setting, OT's are responsible for helping patients return home and to their communities. Through sophisticated programming they enhance cognitive functioning and socialization skills, add to physical functioning. They retrain homemaking and kitchen skills, with an emphasis on safety through reorganization of the physical environment. As a result, skilled nursing homes have become the rehabilitation setting of choice, offering a homelike environment with the same quality and level of service as

## Farm News

### Issues Surrounding Distribution of Phase II Tobacco Settlement Funds

Farm Bureau recently hosted Larry Forgy at a tobacco update meeting. The following is Part II of a series on current issues surrounding distribution of Phase II Tobacco Settlement Funds. Check last weeks Mt. Vernon Signal for a complete account.

**What About the Distribution of Payments to Tenants and/or Lessees?** The distribution of potential payments to tenants and lessees is a very complicated and controversial issue. Opinions range from 100 percent of the funds to the quota owner to 100 percent of the funds to the producer. In reality, the funds will likely be split. Some farm groups have recommended that quota owners and lessees split the payments equally, while others have recommended that a larger percentage of the settlement funds be allocated to the parties that share in the production risk. As stated above, the state advisory board will ultimately make the final decision

on the distribution of payments among quota owners, tenants, and lessees.

**Why Is There So Much Concern Over Which Year Will Be Selected As The Base Year?** If the payments are based on the current year production arrangement (i.e. who is the tenant, lessee for a given year), they will undoubtedly affect lease prices and some tenant/landlord crop share arrangements. The potential of settlement payments being bid into current year lease prices or rental arrangements could be minimized if the payments are based on the production arrangement in a fixed base year. For example, one option that has been discussed is to base all payments during the twelve year period on who was quota owner, the tenant or the lessee in 1998. However this opens up a whole host of controversial issues such as: *What if the tenant/lessee has changed since the base year?*

*What if the quota/farm has been sold since the base year?* Another option is to distribute payments based on the production arrangement in the most recent growing season. Thus, the base year to determine the allocation of payment would change annually. For example the payment in 1999 would be based on the production arrangement in 1998, etc. This would not totally prevent the bidding of payments into leasing or rental rates, but could potentially have a tendency to soften their effects.

**What Are Some Other Issues Surrounding Leased Pounds?** If payments are based on the level of basic quota, how are leased carryover (i.e., effective quota) pounds handled? What about disaster leasing?

**What About A Quota Buyout or Buydown?** There has been some discussion of utilizing settlement funds for a quota buyout or buydown. Again several issues complicate this concept. First, the \$8,000/bu quota buyout as part of some legislative proposals last year was based on funding totaling \$20 billion or more. The total funds available in this settlement from Phase II are \$5.15 billion. A significant amount of Phase I money would have to be allocated to a buyout to yield a payment level similar to the ones proposed in last year's legislative settlement bills. It is true, that some other states are pursuing this option. However, given the total settlement funds available to Kentucky, the size of the Kentucky tobacco quota, and the politics of using Phase I money for direct payments to tobacco quota owners, a complete quota buyout realistically is not an option for this state. A potential option that an advisory board may consider is utilizing settlement funds to purchase on a voluntary/sealed bid basis a predetermined amount of quota which could either be redistributed to active tobacco

growers or removed from the system to prevent quota reductions. Concerns surrounding a quota buyout scheme include dilating the state's tobacco political base and the risk that remaining quota owners face regarding potential settlement funds being available to them if the tobacco program is eliminated (and thus the value of quota falls to zero). Also, it remains unclear whether a quota buyout could be designed that did not require federal legislation.

**Will Any Phase I Funds Be Made Available For Agriculture?** Phase I funds are part of the Master Settlement Agreement which settled the existing state lawsuits against the tobacco companies. Kentucky will receive approximately \$3.45 billion over the next 25 years. The question remains whether the federal government will require a portion of the Phase I funds as a repayment for lost federal dollars associated with the Medicaid program. Another option that the federal government might pursue is requiring the states to spend a certain portion of the settlement funds on anti-tobacco programs. Kentucky agricultural leaders have proposed that at least 50 percent of the Phase I money available to the state be reinvested back into agriculture. Ultimately the General Assembly (which is not scheduled to reconvene until January 2000 unless a special session is called by the Governor) will determine the allocation of Phase I funds. Presently, farm leaders are drafting a unified plan for agriculture that they intend to present to the Governor within the next 30 to 45 days.

**When Can I Expect My First Phase II Payment?** While the initial intent was to get this payment out ASAP, it will likely be late fall or early winter before the 1999 payment is made available.

supply. NEVER use a bucket that has contained cleaning supplies or hazardous chemicals.

Store at least 3 gallons of water for each person in your home. Store water in plastic containers such as milk jugs or 2-liter soft drink bottles. Wash and rinse the containers well. Fill with clean water and add 4 drops of plain chlorine bleach for each gallon of water. Tape the lids in place to keep dirt and other contaminants out.

Change your water supply and batteries every 6 months. Rotate your canned food supply them, too.

A basic supply checklist includes:

- \*Water-at least 3 gallons per person
- \*Food-ready to eat canned meats, fruits (packed in heavy syrup), vegetables; peanut butter, crackers.

- \*Manual can opener
  - \*Plastic spoons, forks, cup and plates
  - \*Infant formula or special diet needs
  - \*First Aid Kit
  - \*Prescription medicine
  - \*Canned solid food, matches
  - \*Plain chlorine bleach, for disinfecting
  - \*Flashlight, batteries
  - \*Radio, batteries
  - \*Emergency blanket
  - \*Multi-purpose tool
  - \*Folding shovel
  - \*Rubber gloves
  - \*Toilet paper
  - \*Plastic trash bags
  - \*Hand sanitizer

### "It Is Written"

Last week we looked at the scripture in Matt 22:29, "Jesus answered and said unto them, Ye do err, not knowing the scriptures, nor the power of God." People err or go wrong religiously by not knowing what the Bible teaches or denying what God says. Let's look at few examples.

**By Warden Alexander, FSA Director TOBACCO LEASING**  
 Farmers wishing to lease burley tobacco quotas are reminded July 1st is the deadline to obtain all sign-ups. Farmers who need assistance in leasing quotas are also reminded that bulletin board space is available in the county FSA office for posting. If interested in posting your quota please call 256-2525 Ext. 101.

**DAIRY MARKET LOSS ASSISTANCE PROGRAM**  
 The FSA office is taking applications for the Dairy Market Loss Assistance Program through May 21, 1999. Producers qualify for the direct cash payments if their dairy operation marketed milk commercially in the U.S. anytime during the fourth quarter of 1998 (Oct. 1-Dec. 31, 1998). Eligible producers may receive a direct payment per hundred weight on the first 2000 cwt for dairy marketed commercially for the dairy operation during the 1997 or 1998 calendar year. Producers may use the 1997 or 1998 calendar year marketings for the base period. The actual rates will be determined after the sign-up and will be calculated by dividing the amount available by the total eligible cwt of milk from all approved dairy operations. FSA programs are open to all regardless of race, color, national origin, gender, religion, age, disability, political beliefs, sexual orientation and marital or familiar status. (Not all prohibitions apply to all programs.)

Persons with disabilities who require alternative means for communication of program information (braille, large print, audiophone, etc.) should contact USDA's TARGET Center at (202) 700-2600 (voice and TDD).

**CROP INSURANCE DEADLINE EXTENDED**  
 Farmers who have waited to purchase the catastrophic level of protection (CAT) under Federal Crop Insurance (FCIC) CANNOT do so at this time as the deadline was April 28th.

Those farmers who signed up under the Crop Loss Disaster Assistance Program (CLDAP) should have already purchased the CAT policy and file a copy of the policy with the FSA office. Farmers receiving a CLDAP payment and are producing tobacco which DID NOT purchase the CAT policy will be required to pay back the CLDAP payment plus interest and penalties.

**FARM CHANGES**  
 Producers who have purchased or sold land need to contact the local FSA office for proper reconstitution of farms. The deadline for reconstitution of farm effective for the current crop year is June 1st. Remember to bring your deed and/or notify the new owner to do so. Also notify this office of any/all address changes. Remember, our records are only as current as producers inform us of the facts.

**NOTICE TO CUSTOMERS OF KENTUCKY UTILITIES COMPANY OF APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL OF AN ALTERNATIVE METHOD OF REGULATION**

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that, on April 5, 1999, pursuant to the Kentucky Revised Statutes, Kentucky Utilities Company ("KU") filed with the Public Service Commission ("Commission") in Case No. 98-474, an Amendment to its Application for Approval of an Alternative Method of Regulation of its Rates and Service (the "Amended Application"). In addition to the numerous benefits provided by the proposed alternative method of regulation and application filed October 12, 1996, KU's Amended Application provides:

- Annual reductions in customers' bills for electric service for KU and Louisville Gas and Electric Company ("LG&E") throughout the next five years in the following annual amounts, and allocated between KU and LG&E, consistent with the method approved by the Commission in its Order of September 12, 1997 in "In the Matter of Joint Application of Louisville Gas and Electric Company and Kentucky Utilities Company for Approval of a Merger," Case No. 97-300:
  - Eight Million Dollars (\$8,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 1999 through June 30, 2000;
  - Eight Million Dollars (\$8,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 2000 through June 30, 2001;
  - Eight Million Dollars (\$8,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 2001 through June 30, 2002;
  - Eight Million Dollars (\$8,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 2002 through June 30, 2003;
  - Eight Million Dollars (\$8,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 2003 through June 30, 2004.
- LG&E's gas base rates would not be increased for a period of five years or through June 30, 2004 absent the occurrence of extraordinary circumstances and accepting any changes as the result of the operation of any lawful surcharge or automatic adjustment clause;
- An additional one-year extension of the current KU Merger Surcredit Rider through June 30, 2004;
- An additional one-year extension of KU's current commitment to cap electric rates extending through June 30, 2004, absent the occurrence of extraordinary circumstances and accepting any changes as the result of the operation of any lawful surcharge or automatic adjustment clause;
- KU and LG&E also will set aside the following amounts each year, in accordance with the allocation of the merger savings determined by the Commission in its Order of September 12, 1997 in "In the Matter of Joint Application of Louisville Gas and Electric Company and Kentucky Utilities Company for Approval of a Merger," Case No. 97-300, for qualified organizations for the purpose of assisting low-income customers of KU and LG&E with payment of their essential energy bills:
  - Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 1999 through June 30, 2000;
  - One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 2000 through June 30, 2001;
  - One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 2001 through June 30, 2002;
  - One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 2002 through June 30, 2003;
  - One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) beginning July 1, 2003 through June 30, 2004.

KU's Amended Application requests that the Commission approve an alternative method of regulating KU's rates and service, as well as an Electric Performance-Based Rate ("EPBR") Tariff. The Amended Application, if approved, will change the method of regulating KU from the traditional rate-of-return method of regulation to a method based on KU's operating performance.

The EPBR Tariff, as issued on April 5, 1999, applies all electric rate schedules and special contracts for electric service, effective July 1, 1999. The monthly amount of the rate schedule to which the EPBR Tariff is applicable shall be increased or decreased by the Electric Performance-Based Rate Adjustment Factor at a rate per kilowatt-hour of monthly consumption during the billing calendar quarter computed as follows:

 SQ=Service Quality  
 BR=Bill Reduction expressed as a credit  
 BA=Balancing Adjustment  
 KW/h=Kentucky jurisdictional Kilowatt-hour Sales in the current quarter  
 q=Current quarter shall be the second calendar quarter preceding the billing calendar quarter in which the EPBR Adj is billed

The amended Merger Surcredit Rider, issued April 5, 1999, applies to all electric rate schedules and special contracts effective July 1, 1999.

KU also is requesting that the Commission approve the withdrawal of its Electric Rate Schedule Fuel Adjustment clause after all fuel costs are collected pursuant to the Uniform Fuel Adjustment Clause Regulation (807 KAR 5:056) and final orders are issued in the pending fuel adjustment clause cases of KU concurrent with the approval of the EPBR Tariff; and KU is further requesting that the Commission approve conditions permitting greater tariff flexibility in the future.

The Commission's review of KU's Amended Application may result in a method of regulating KU or consumer rates and services other than the method of regulation and rates described in this notice.

Any corporation, association, body politic, or person may, by motion within thirty (30) days after publication or mailing of this Notice, request leave to intervene in the case before the Commission (Case No. 98-474), any such motion shall be submitted to: The Public Service Commission, 730 Schenck Lane, P.O. Box 615, Frankfort, Kentucky 40602, and shall set forth the grounds for the request for intervention, including the status and interest of the party requesting intervention.

Box 32300, Louisville, Kentucky 40232-2030. Copies of the Amended Application and Testimony will be available for public inspection at KU's offices where bills are paid after April 5, 1999.

# INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The 1999 County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 3 through 17, 1999. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 1999 assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 1999 will be due about September 15, 1999.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior or during the inspection period.

Any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property and the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The taxpayer can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.

The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period.

Any taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administrator.

- (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be fair cash value of his property.
- (2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Property Valuation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- (4) The final decision of the Revenue Cabinet may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax appeals.
