There are thirteen teacher candidates for the three teaching spots on the council.

Those running are: incumbent board member and science teacher Debbie Cash, history and geography teacher Adam Coleman, English teacher Allene Cornelius, biology teacher Cindy Witt Ham, physics teacher Stephanie Hammack, incumbent board member and agricultural teacher Jeff Hayes, incumbent board member and head football coach Tom Larkey, English teacher Jennifer Mattingly, Spanish teacher Pam Powell, business teacher Connie Riddle, FMD teacher Dana Singleton, JROTC Commander Keith Taylor and librarian Janet Wells.

The teacher election will be held

in the library at 3:10 p.m. on the 11th.

Current parent member Debbie Brown was not eligible to run because she no longer has a child at RCHS and the other parent member, Yvonne Carmack did not run for reelection.

Seven other parents have been nominated for the two parent member seats.

They are: local realtor and auctioneer Roy Adams, Mt. Vernon school counselor Cindy Anderkin, local DES director Gary Asher, assistant Mt. Vernon police chief Eddie Delaney, First Christian Church of Mt. Vernon preacher Eddie Hammond, Rockcastle Health Department health educator Beverly Sexton and Brodhead Baptist Church preacher Mark Whicker.

The last day to apply for a paper absentee ballot for the May primary election will be May 18, 1999. Applications can be made by telephone, by fax, or by mail or in person and can be obtained by the voter, spouse of voter, parents, or children of voter.

Absentee voting on a voting machine in the county clerk's office will begin May 10, 1999 and continue through May 24, 1999. Office hours are Monday through Friday 8:30 a.m. until 12 noon. Voting in the county clerk's office is restricted to those who will be absent on election day, but do not qualify for paper absentee ballot.

## Mt. Vernon may raise price of doing business

The Mt. Vernon City Council, after being questioned about the last suit brought against the city in 1994, that Kentucky's Supreme Court had ruled against the city and struck down the proposed tax.

But a check of the records in the Rockcastle Circuit Clerk's office, showed that the last suit never made its way out of circuit court.

"If we don't do something we are going to have to close the doors," Rader told the council.

Mayor King said that at least twice a week in the past couple of months, the city has had "to rob Peter to pay Paul."

Their comments came during a discussion by the council about privilege license fees in the city limits and whether they should be raised or not.

The current privilege license fees bring in about \$22,000 to the city's general fund and the council discussed raising them to help the general fund shortfall.

"We have to have money to operate on," said councilman Clark Mullins. But the council took no action and tabled any action on the privilege license increase until the next meeting.

During the discussion, Mayor King told the council that as much as \$13,000 was owed by city landowners for past due property taxes dating back to 1991. "We are going to go after that money, we need it," King said.

King also said that some businesses in the city limits had not paid their privilege license for six or seven years and the city would also after those people.

It was also pointed out during the meeting that one of the city's biggest businesses paid no privilege license fee at all.

Renfro Valley Entertainment Center Inc. has been involved in two lawsuits with the city, after the city attempted to place a three percent entertainment tax on all tickets sold in the Valley in 1990.

Renfro contended they were being unfairly singled out to pay more tax than other businesses in the city.

In both cases, Renfro Valley won, and therefore have paid no license fee or entertainment tax for the past

nine years.

Mayor King said in the meeting, after being questioned about the last suit brought against the city in 1994, that Kentucky's Supreme Court had ruled against the city and struck down the proposed tax.

But a check of the records in the Rockcastle Circuit Clerk's office, showed that the last suit never made its way out of circuit court.

On October 28, 1996, Circuit Judge Dan Veners dismissed the suit because neither party had acted on it in over a year.

That means that Renfro Valley won, because they refused to pay the tax and the city did not pursue it any further in circuit court.

The first suit against the city was brought by Renfro Valley Folks in 1991.

Rockcastle Circuit Judge William Cain ruled in favor of the city's ordinance and said they could collect the three percent of ticket sales at Renfro Valley.

But on April 4, of 1994, the Kentucky Court of Appeals overturned Cain's decision and said that the city was unfairly singling out Renfro Valley and Renfro had won.

But the very same year, the city amended their privilege license ordinance and attempted to collect the three percent from Renfro Valley again.

That suit, which was referred to Monday night has been dismissed.

Council member Clarice Kirby questioned the council's actions in putting up new street lights, building the new city park and having eight full-time police officers. Mrs. Kirby said she was for the street lights, but that she did not like the way the city was brot.

Asst. police chief Eddie Delaney told Mrs. Kirby that the last three officers the city has hired was through a cops grant from the federal government. But Mrs. Kirby pointed out that the city would have to pick up their salary when the grant ran out.

As the discussion continued about the city's financial woes, Mayor King told the council that the city had a \$17,000 payment due to Fifth Third Bank in Lexington on June 1.

That payment is on a note of \$395,000 that was borrowed by the city to pay for the new city park on Williams Street.

The council members seemed surprised by the news that they owed the payment, although all of them except Kirby voted for the park project last year.

"That (payment) was never brought before the council and we were told that would be paid for with some low interest money through some type of state program," said

of Brodhead.

Current chairman Gary Mink, Garry Hansel and Altonzo McCollum were not re-appointed to the board.

Hansel said Tuesday he did not want to serve again on the board.

And, only two days after the new board was appointed, current director Edwina Anglin unofficially resigned from her post.

Ms. Anglin said she would make an official announcement next week.

The 911 board meets on Thursday at 7 a.m. at the Rockcastle County Courthouse.

# Sweet and Sour

Numbers are like letters to the alphabet, they can perform miracles with their usage.

Why has discipline been taken out of the schools?

M.O. Again we go back to the law makers who have been lax to protect children from abuse and evidently don't know the difference between abuse and discipline. The laws also forbid the parents to correct an unruly child by spanking or a slap on the hand or bottom. Without discipline a child can become a little dictator to the parents, the teachers, neighbors and kinfolk. They now feel free to threaten the teacher with suit from their parents if he or she attempts to discipline him/her. There is no such thing as a set aside hour to catch up on teaching the child the values he is expected to live up to all his life. The very act of holding a baby while it cries, or reading it to sleep, pointing out things of interest while driving it to school, or talking to the teenager while styling her hair, showing a boy how to throw a curve ball, crying at their wedding and opening your first grandchild with green arms are all value time.

Bringing up a child the way it should go and it will not depart from it. Pretty smart advice from an old and well read book, huh?

Now what can we do about the problems we have watched grow from taking a motto off the schoolhouse walls to the viciousness in our learning centers is supposed to supply the next generation with leaders? Write your congressmen and let them know the filth of the air and put uplifting programs in their place. Take control of your own children and teach them right from wrong. Have safe places where the youth of your area can meet for an evenings fun.

Tuesday morning, April 13, 1999, I was notified by Rockcastle 911 Dispatch by order of Gary Asher, Head of Rockcastle D.E.S. to take a Livingston Fire Truck to Rockcastle Hospital and leave it. I called Mr. Asher at the hospital and he confirmed that HE wanted a fire truck parked at Rockcastle Hospital until the water crisis was over. I advised him that I could not leave our fire truck unprotected. I had talked the previous night to Brian Hansel LL, MVEFD and he requested that if Mt. Vernon had a fire to send a fire truck. I told him that I would be in Livingston all day and would respond. Mr. Asher said HE WANTED A TRUCK! I repeated, my concern. He said, "You have hydrants!" I told him that the hydrants are only in the city limits, what about outside the city? He said, "Well you have two trucks!" I told him that he was out of his mind and hung up the phone.

I then called Mt. Vernon Mayor, Karen King and advised her of my phone call and previous conversation with Mt. Vernon Fire Dept. She said that she couldn't understand why Mr. Asher wanted a truck at the hospital.

I then received another call from 911 Dispatch with a letter to read from County Judge Carlotis re-

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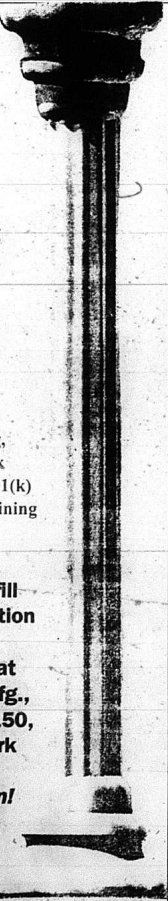
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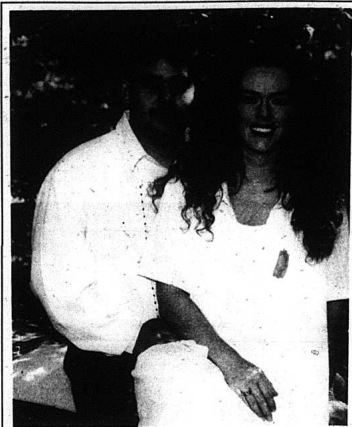
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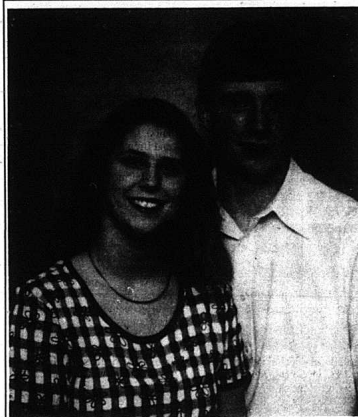

questing a fire truck to be parked at the hospital. I went to the Fiscal Court meeting (in the fire truck, being ready to respond) and asked the Judge about this situation and he said, "Forget the letter, I didn't understand."

If a Livingston Fire Truck was left at Rockcastle Hospital there would not be an operator there to operate the truck. Mt. Vernon Fire Dept., has excellent truck operators, but they are not familiar with our truck controls, as we are not with theirs. If there was a fire anywhere else in Mt. Vernon, the truck would be sitting there unless compromising fire protection.

Mr. Asher has since made the statement that Livingston would not receive one cent of D.E.S. money. This man is dangerous and was trying to endanger hundreds of Livingston area residents by depleting fire protection. Rockcastle Hospital is impor-

tant, but is not the only structure in the county.

Mr. Asher is not doing his job and Rockcastle County needs a head of D.E.S. that will work WITH the Fire Dept. The only time the Fire Dept. hear from Mr. Asher is when D.E.S. does the Army Depot Nerve Gas Drills and we would be hard pressed to show any equipment purchased with D.E.S. money.

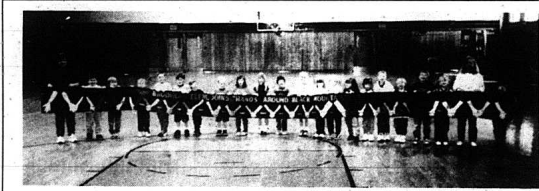

## BES enjoys a growing partnership in the Arts

Sharon Ponder, primary teacher at Broadhead Elementary in Rockcastle County, collaborates with Joanne Guilfoil, professor of art education at Eastern Kentucky University to make connections in visual arts for her students. Broadhead Elementary, like many other elementary schools in Kentucky, does not have an art specialist on staff. A few years ago Allen Pensel, arts coordinator for Rockcastle County Schools, introduced Ponder to Dr. Guilfoil and has encouraged and supported their partnership ever since. "I share with Joanne what we're doing in our classroom and she calls me with ideas for art connections and helps me work with my students on building their art skills," says Ponder. "She's been a wonderful mentor—she helps me feel more confident in teaching art."

selfes and their work, and the college students write back with ideas and encouragement and share what they're doing in their art classes. They also exchange sketches and drawings with each other. At the end of each semester, Ponder's students visit the university to meet their pen pals. They give presentations of their work and what they've learned in art and social studies.

"My students, who are learning to become elementary art teachers, are amazed at the quality of work the Broadhead students share with them," says Guilfoil. "They're extremely impressed with the young artists' ability to present their work and their obvious understanding of art techniques and vocabulary. In my class, students quickly learn the many challenges of teaching art in the elementary schools. They are inspired by the *Different Ways of Knowing* curriculum and the ways elementary teachers are integrating art into their students' learning experiences."

Ponder's students also have mentoring experiences with Guilfoil's art education students. As pen pals, the younger students write about them

project, *A Celebration of Diversity: People, Animals, and Plants*. The project was part of the teacher's *Different Ways of Knowing Year 3* course of study. The team teachers came up with the theme, along with other primary teachers at their school, as a way to connect the new primary D'Wok module, *What's Up in Our Neighborhood*, with the module they'd been using, *America's Family Stories*.

"We were very excited to use the new module," says Ponder. "We decided to take the theme of neighborhood past and present and to focus on the animals and plants they live and grow here, as well as the people of Rockcastle County and particularly the Broadhead community."

The guiding questions for the project were 1) How does our neighborhood's history reflect the diverse cultures of our area? and 2) How do plants, animals and people in our neighborhood depend on each other? The core content focused on informational reading from a variety of sources, the life cycles of animals and plants, the history of Kentucky and the U.S. as a chronicle of diverse people, and a variety of art forms. Students wrote research papers and published facts and articles in their class magazine, "Newsflash." For their research, students were required to read at least two different sources (including encyclopedias, library books, magazines, and the Internet) from which they built a folder of facts. Students combined their facts to create a classroom library on animal topics. Connecting art with science, students sketched animals and

plants they observed in nature and later made three-dimensional paper mache models of them. As a culmination, students adopted the abandoned Alumni Garden on the Broadhead Elementary campus. They planted trees and flowers that they knew would attract local animals. They invited alumni of Broadhead Elementary dating back to the 1950s to a garden celebration.

Field trips to Eastern Kentucky University and materials for this intensive project were paid for by an art grant the Broadhead teachers received from the Rockcastle Arts and Humanities Council. "A professional goal for me has been to apply for an art grant," says Ponder. "This was challenging for me because I had never gone the extra step to write out my plans in a grant form. I'm glad I did it!"

"I've gained valuable insight by doing this project. Teaching through the arts is very challenging and at the same time creates a sense of good feelings that promotes high self-esteem for all involved. I've come to realize that students learn best when their projects are meaningful, connected to the arts, and tied to an instructional theme. I'm grateful for the support of Allen Pensel and our principal Mark McKinney, both of whom helped make this wonderful learning experience possible for the children."

Broadhead Elementary and other schools in Eastern Kentucky are supported in their efforts to integrate the arts and learning by generous funding from the Tremaine Foundation.

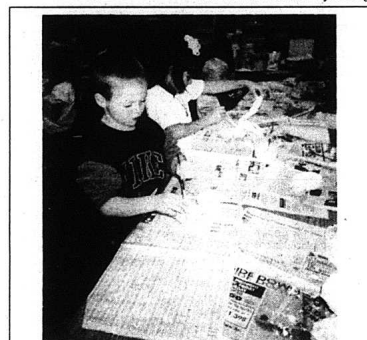

## Girls track team wins Bell Co. Invitational

Rockcastle's varsity track and field teams recently competed at the Bell Co. Invitational Track Meet at Bell Co. High School.

The girls' team had an awesome meet and placed first overall out of 13 teams. They finished with a total of 131 points and defeated host Bell County by 18. This was a great accomplishment since four key members of the team were unable to compete. This was also the second straight year the girls' team had won the meet.

Cheyenne Carmack once again led the team in scoring with several strong performances. She kept her unbeaten streak alive in her individual events with first place finishes in the 100, 200 and 400 meter dashes. Cheyenne earned the meet MVP award given to

the most outstanding female athlete. She scored a total of 32.5 points.

In the 100 meter dash, Cheyenne ran an awesome race and easily placed first with a time of 13.6, despite running into the wind. She ranks fourth in the state (class 2A) in this event. In the 200, Cheyenne ran her best time ever, posting a 26.89. This time eclipsed her previous RCHS record set earlier this season of 26.99. She also broke the meet record set in 1997. Cheyenne currently ranks second in the state in this event. In the 400 meter dash, Cheyenne combined with teammate Rachelle Hammond to blow away the competition. The girls easily took first and second place. Cheyenne ran a 1:02.84 and currently ranks second in the state. Rachelle finished in a personal time of 1:05.87

and now ranks tenth in the state.

Rachelle Hammond and Mindy Bullock dominated the long jump competition. Mindy jumped an amazing 14'10.5", her best of the season. She placed first overall. Mindy narrowly beat teammate Rachelle, who nearly jumped a personal best mark with a leap of 14'9.75". Rachelle placed second overall. Mindy and Rachelle ranked ninth and tenth in the state, respectively.

In the high jump competition, Mindy performed extremely well. She leaped an incredible 4'8" on her way to a second place finish and tied her career best mark. In the shot put competition, Clarissa Hubbard threw exceptionally well. She placed third overall with a throw of 29'8". Ashley Lawson also threw very well, but did not place. Clarissa and Ashley both performed well in the discus competition. Clarissa placed second overall with several great throws. Ashley finished a fifth place overall and came close to her personal best.

In the 100m hurdles, Tara Abney and Theresa Chislum ran a very hard-fought race. Tara ran well and placed fifth overall. She currently ranks 10th in the state. Theresa also ran well but did not place. Both girls stumbled in different parts of their races and did not finish as well as they normally do.

Both Tara and Theresa recovered from that grueling race to run their best 300 meter hurdle races of the season. Tara ran an awesome race and finished with a personal record time of 53.27. She placed third overall and now ranks seventh in the state in this event. Theresa also ran an awesome race and finished fifth overall. She ran her best time in two seasons - 53.36. Theresa ranks eighth in the state.

In the 200 meter dash, sixth grader Chere Embs, ran her best race ever. Chere took the place of seventh grader Sheena Swinney, who was involved in the state AAU basketball tournament. Chere ran extremely well and finished with a personal best time of 32.0.

In the 1600 meter run, seventh grader Cassandra Ramsey ran very well. She finished with a time of 6:33, one of her best of the season and placed sixth overall.

The 400 meter relay team of Theresa Chislum, Chere Embs, Amber Thacker and Mindy Bullock ran very well and placed fourth overall.

The 800 meter relay team of Cheyenne Carmack, Tara Abney, Rachelle Hammond, and Chere Embs ran an awesome race and finished first. The foursome ranks eighth in the state in the event.

The 1600 meter relay team of Ashley Lawson, Theresa Chislum, Amber Thacker and Tara Abney ran a tremendously exciting race and came from behind to finish first. The girls' team is currently ranked fifth in the state in class 2A based upon current team rankings, along with other meet results. There are ninety-five schools at the present time in class 2A.

councilmember Clarice Kirby, who was the only council member to vote against the construction of the park.

The \$395,000 was borrowed last year with an interest rate of 5.6 percent, according to the city clerk.

The \$17,000 is due each year for the next 30 years. The 5.6 percent rate was obtained with the help of the Cumberland Valley Area Development District and the payment was originally set up to be paid with funds from the Urban Development Action Grant.

City Attorney Debra Lambert was present at the meeting to discuss the creation of a vice-mayor's post by the council.

In January, Mayor King appointed Jackie Renner as vice-mayor, but after questions by councilmen Clark Mullins and Lee Keene, it was learned that the city probably had to pass an ordinance to create the position, which the Mayor can fill with whomever she desires.

Lambert told the council that they did indeed have to create the position by way of ordinance.

All council members voted to pass the ordinance to create the position, except for Keene, who voted no.

The City of Mt. Vernon has also joined the county's 911 dispatching system. Until now the city had maintained their own radios for their police officers, while all ambulance and fire calls went through 911.

Mayor King and Delaney said that residents of Mt. Vernon could still use the number 256-2121 and also use 911 to get emergency help within the city limits. 256-2121 has been the number for Mt. Vernon police for years.

Delaney cautioned residents not to call 256-2121 anymore to try and reach City Hall because that number will be answered at 911. City Hall's number is 256-3437.

The Mayor said that the money saved by not having to pay three full-time dispatching salaries would be used to give all city employees some type of raise.

Delaney also told the council that motorist should be aware when they travel city streets now because of the city's new radar.

Delaney said officers were particularly concentrating on West Main Street and Richmond Street, where numerous accidents have occurred.

Delaney said that no one was being ticketed unless they were traveling 15 miles per hour over the 35 mile per hour speed limit. Delaney said that some tickets had been written on West Main Street for speeds in the 70s.

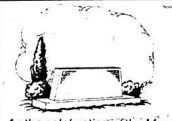

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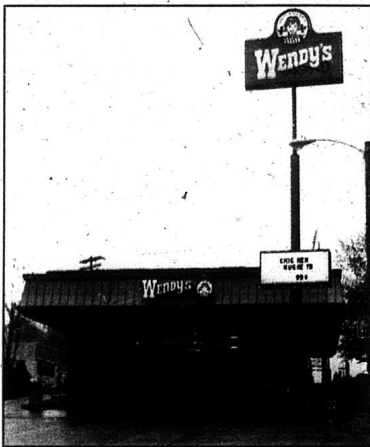
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## Going up and Coming Down

Rockcastle County's first ever fast food chain restaurant is going to the ground in the next few weeks. The good news for Wendy's Restaurant on U.S. 25 is that it will re-open in a new building in June. When it re-opens, it will have a Citgo gas station and food mart in the same building. The Citgo and food mart will be open 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The restaurant now employs 45 people and will employ 60 when it re-opens in June. The new building will be 5,700 square. Wendy's first opened in 1978 as Burger Queen, changed to Druthers and then to Wendy's. The move is being made because of the construction of a third lane of U.S. 25 from Richmond Street to the Renfro Valley exit.

## Former prosecutor has another day in court

Former Rockcastle County Commonwealth Attorney Ray Carmichael, who is currently in the federal prison at Manchester will have another day in court on Friday, May 14 when he begins civil proceedings to retain his salary.

The disqualified prosecutor also has a scheduled hearing in Laurel Circuit Court on several motions in the state's case against him to decrease the salary he continues to draw.

Several motions, including a motion to dismiss, will be heard by Laurel Circuit Judge Roderick Messer, who was appointed as a special judge in the case. The hearing begins at 1 p.m.

Carmichael, who was convicted by a federal jury on charge of attempting to extort at least \$50,000, is acting as his own lawyer, although he has been disbarred.

In his counter claim, he is asking to keep his salary and is also seeking \$45,000 for court expenses he incurred during his legal travails last year.

He filed a motion to dismiss an Attorney General's civil action asking that his \$81,210 salary be

reduced while he is incarcerated. That motion will be heard during the May 14 hearing.

Carmichael maintained in his motion that there is no cause of action to support the attorney general's claim.

He also argued that the law serving as the basis for the attorney general's claim does not provide that a civil action can be filed.

Carmichael presented the argument that it would be necessary to have a judge from another circuit appointed to review the complaint.

He maintained that if the Attorney General's complaint was successful, the sitting circuit judge would have to be named as a defendant in the matter. Since a judge cannot review a case in which he is a defendant, Carmichael says another judge would have to be appointed.

His last argument in support of dismissing the claim was that Pulaski Circuit court does not have jurisdiction to remove him as Commonwealth Attorney—something he says the Attorney General is seeking to accomplish.

In the document seeking \$45,000 for legal expenses, Carmichael said while he was performing his duties as Commonwealth's Attorney, he was allegedly involved in certain acts which resulted in an indictment dated the 12th day of August, 1997.

He continues that as a result, the defendant (Carmichael) did personally suffer actual financial loss, unreimbursed from any source, by virtue of incurring costs and attorney's fees in defense of such action.

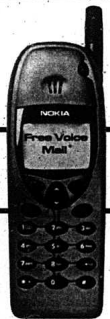
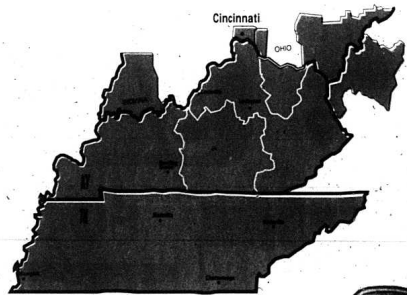
He argues that he believed he was acting "within the scope and course of his employment" and that the acts he committed or omitted were done "in good faith belief that the act or omission was lawful and proper."

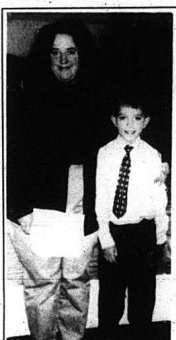

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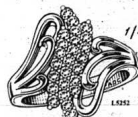
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# From Long Ago

## The Joys and Challenges of Grandparenting

If you still think of grandparents as old and sedentary, with outmoded ideas, maybe you need to study the facts. Grandparents today are likely to be active and agile, employed outside the home, and even at the peak of their careers. They may not have a lot of time on their hands, just wanting to help with babysitting. And compared to past generations, today's grandparents are healthier, more affluent, more mobile and better educated.

Over 90 percent of older Americans with children are grandparents and about half of these become great-grandparents. The age of grandparents ranges from approximately 30 years of age to 110. Today's children can expect to spend half of their lives as grandparents.

Obstacles to the grandparent-grandchild relationship include:

- CONFLICT:** Conflict between grandparents and their adult children over values and childrearing practices can interfere with the opportunity to have a satisfying

relationship with one's grandchildren.

**DISTANCE:** Grandparents separated from their grandchildren by great distances may feel isolated from them, especially if financial resources are limited.

**TIME:** Many family members today suffer from "hurry sickness." With activities filling almost every minute of the day, there simply may be little time left for grandparents and grandchildren to spend together.

**POOR HEALTH:** Health problems can prevent grandparents from participating in activities.

**DIVORCE & REMARRIAGE:** If their divorcing child does not receive custody or regular visitation rights, grandparents may be cut off from seeing their grandchildren.

Sometimes as a result of remarriage, grandparents see their grandchildren less frequently or find the relationship more awkward.

have to learn to live with it. Earlier breeding is one way to do that.

At the University of Kentucky's Research and Education Center in Princeton, a study was conducted by starting the breeding program a month earlier, on April 20. From April 20 to May 20, there were 17 of 20 cows successfully re-bred. From May 20 to June 20, 17 of 21 were re-bred. Then from June 21 to July 21, only 8 of 16, or 50%, of the cows were successfully re-bred.

That certainly supports the thesis that an earlier beginning to the breeding program is better.

UK is continuing to look at the experiment, but it is believed that the previous year's data will be repeated.

Why would a farmer not want to

begin his breeding program earlier? Many people don't want their cows

to calve in February because of the cold but February is really not much colder than March and it may be less muddy, which would be an advantage during calving time. February is also a less busy month for most farming activities which would be an advantage. Also, if the calves were born earlier, the farmer would have increased weaning weight in the fall, because the calves would be a month older.

By starting the breeding season in early May, this would give cows 2 heat cycles, or 2 chances, to get bred before hot weather sets in. Farmers may consider these facts as they plan next year's calf crop.

TOBACCO LEASING

Farmers wishing to lease burley tobacco quotas are reminded July 1st is the deadline to obtain all signatures. Farmers who need assistance in leasing quotas are also reminded that bulletin board space is available in the county FSA office for posting. If interested in posting your quota please call 256-2525 Ext. 101.

DAIRY MARKET LOSS ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Rockcastle County Farm Service Center is now taking applications for the Dairy Market Loss Assistance Program. Producers qualify for the direct cash payments if their dairy operation marketed milk commercially in the U.S. anytime during the fourth quarter of 1998 (Oct. 1-Dec. 31, 1998). Eligible producers may receive a direct payment per hundred weight on the first 26,000 cwt for milk marketed commercially for the dairy operation during the 1997 or 1998 calendar year. Each dairy operation has a choice of using 1997 or 1998 calendar year milk marketings for the base period. Producers who operate a joint dairy operation will receive a payment based on their share of the first 26,000 cwt marketed from the dairy operation. The actual rate will be determined after sign-up and will be calculated by dividing the amount available by the total eligible cwt of milk from all approved dairy operations.

The application period for the DMLA begins on April 12, 1999 and ends on May 21, 1999. During this sign-up period, producers will be required to apply for the program at their local FSA office.

Producers will be required to certify that the dairy operation was marketing milk during the fourth quarter of 1998. FSA will have an application form that producers will fill out when they sign up for the program. It is expected that the form will require producers to include: (1) the name of the dairy operation and a list of persons involved in it, and (2) the 1997 or 1998 calendar year milk marketings of the dairy operation. The form is also expected to include: (1) a statement affirming that the dairy operation marketed milk during the fourth quarter of 1998, and (2) a statement affirming that the producer is aware that USDA will be conducting spot checks. For those dairy operations selected for a spot

check, responsible producers must provide additional information as requested. Any producer who receives a payment for the dairy operation based on erroneous information will be required to repay USDA. Also, any producer who receives a payment on a fraudulent application will be required to repay USDA and may face criminal prosecution.

### FARM CHANGES

Producers who have purchased or sold land need to contact the local FSA office for proper reconstruction of farms. The deadline for reconstruction of farm effective for the current crop year is June 1st. Remember to bring your deed and/or notify the new owner to do so. Also notify this office of any/all address changes. Remember, our records are only as current as producers inform the office.

Breed Cows Earlier  
For Better Profits

Farmers who begin to breed their beef cows after the traditional recommended May 20 start-up date may be hurting themselves in the pocketbook.

By starting the breeding program a month earlier, University of Kentucky Research suggests that farmers may achieve a significantly higher pregnancy rate among their cattle herds which graze fescue pastures. Several years ago, poor breeding rates were noticed across the state. It was noticed that most

cows were being bred earlier or they weren't conceiving at all.

A look at 10 years data on weather patterns showed that after June 20 the weather typically hovered over 90 degrees. Temperature that high apparently interferes with cattle re-breeding, especially for cattle feeding on high endophyte fescue.

Kentucky has 5 million acres of fescue, and most of it is the high endophyte fescue type. We're not going to get rid of it, so we may

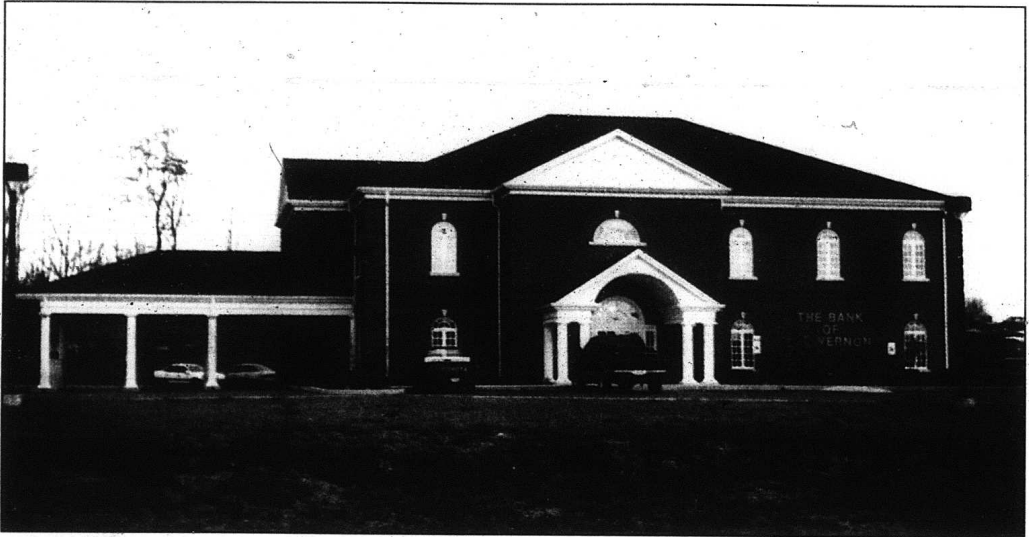
