She said that she did not look Richards, "eyeball to eyeball", but that it was a Brodhead police cruiser and a man with short hair was driving it.

Richards told Mrs. Boyd and the council that he was transporting a woman prisoner to jail at the time she says he was sitting in her driveway.

Mrs. Boyd said the cruiser was white and said Brothead Police, but she didnot see anumber on the cruiser.

Mrs. Boyd also told the council that officer Richards and her son had had some problems and that the "hassle did not go the way Greg wanted to."




