Railroad Street Re-development Project

Brodhead to apply for \$1 million to upgrade city

The Brodhead City Council will apply for a \$1 million grant to clean up an area along Main Street and build new houses.
Stacy Epperson, a partner with Will Lender and Associates in Berea told the council on Monday night that the application for the Community Development Block Grant had to be

submitted to Frankfort by July 30. The target area, which runs along the railroad bed in front of Citizens Bank and at least one building beside the bank, includes 17 current structures.
Mrs. Epperson told the council that those structures would be bought and torn down to make way for new housing for low to moderate income

housing.
Mrs. Epperson called the project the Railroad Street Re-Development Project.
"Each year the Kentucky's Department of Local Governments passes eight \$7 to \$8 million dollars in these type grants, with the maximum grant being \$1 million," she said.
Mrs. Epperson said that only one

structure among the 17 may have to stay and be renovated depending on the decision of the state's Historic Preservation Office.
Other than that, Mrs. Epperson said that the other structures could be bought and torn down to make room for a new road and subdivision in the area.
In most cases the homes built are

900 to 1,000 square feet structures.
As part of the project, Mrs. Epperson said the city could make the lots for sale, available to buyers at a cost much lower than market value, so that the families interested would have some equity as part of a down payment on a housing loan.
Mrs. Epperson said the city should be thinking of ways they could make

an in-kind contribution to the project, such as the demolition of the existing structures, or the building of a picnic shelter or just possibly picking up trash in the area after the demolition.
Brodhead Mayor Walter Cash told Mrs. Epperson that the city would do whatever they could to help, but that their resources were limited.

Crab Orchard resident causes problems at nursing home

A Crab Orchard woman was taken to the Appalachian Regional Hospital in Hazard on Friday, after she apparently threatened to harm at least one person at the Sowder Nursing Home in Brodhead.

A petition for involuntary hospitalization was filed on Catherine Sparkman, 34, after she threatened a co-worker and the co-worker's small child, at the nursing home Friday afternoon.

During the episode, which occurred between 2 and 3 p.m. Friday, Sparkman threw a brick through one of the patient's windows at the nursing home.

When police took Sparkman to the Rockcastle Sheriff's office she told police she was Jesus and 3,000 years old.

Brodhead Police Chief Joe Bussell, Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Darrell Doan and other officers helped with the case.

Jury says Conway man should serve eight years

A Conway man was found guilty in Rockcastle Circuit Court last week of four counts of first degree wanton endangerment and persistent felony offender, second degree.

Glen Thomas Martin, 28, was convicted after the two day trial and the jury recommended a sentence of eight years in the state penitentiary.

According to Eddy F. Montgomery, acting Commonwealth Attorney for Rockcastle County, testimony was presented by several witnesses that supported the Commonwealth's theory, that Fourth District Constable Dale Miller attempted to arrest Martin after having received a complaint that Martin was "huffing" gasoline.

Board Chairman Dr. G.W. Griffith asked Superintendent Larry Hammond to explain the situation so that it could be cleared up.

Griffith said that he had had several comments made to him about the threat, which happened the day after the school shooting in Colorado and

Completely new council elected at high school

As of July 1, there will be an entirely new site based decision making council at the Rockcastle County High School.

Tuesday afternoon, teachers at the high school elected three new members to council, from thirteen candidates, who had been nominated.

All three incumbent board members, Debbie Cash, Tom Larkey and Jeff Hayes were defeated in their re-election bids.

Elected to represent the faculty at RCHS were: librarian Janet Wells, English teacher Jennifer Mattingly and History teacher Adam Coleman.

103 parents showed up at 6:30 p.m. to elect the new parent members of the council.

Incumbent parent member Debbie Brown could not run because she does not have a child at the school and the other parent member, Yvonne Carmack, elected not to run.

Cindy Anderkin, a Mt. Vernon Elementary School Guidance Counselor was elected on the first ballot with a majority of the vote.

Local realtor, auctioneer and farmer, Roy Adams was elected after he won a three way run-off between

City police problems discussed at Brodhead

The Brodhead City Council discussed problems and or potential problems with the Brodhead police department at Monday night's regularly scheduled meeting.

Much of the discussion centered around officer Greg Richards.

A resident of Mt. Vernon, Ruth Boyd, began the discussion of the police department by asking Mayor Walter Cash if the Brodhead City Police had any jurisdiction on Rose Hill Lane in Mt. Vernon.

Cash and the rest of the council told Mrs. Boyd that they did not.

Mrs. Boyd told the council that officer Richards was in her driveway around 1 p.m. on Sunday.

She said that she did not look Richards, "eyeball to eyeball", but that it was a Brodhead police cruiser and a man with short hair was driving it.

Richards told Mrs. Boyd and the council that he was transporting a woman prisoner to jail at the time she said he was sitting in her driveway.

Mrs. Boyd said the cruiser was white and said Brodhead Police, but she did not see a number on the cruiser.

Mrs. Boyd also told the council that officer Richards and her son had had some problems and that the "hassle did not go the way Greg wanted to."

Mrs. Boyd asked the council to make sure the same thing never happened again and to teach Richards

how to act like a police officer.
Richards told the council that he was never on Rose Hill Road at any time and he also told the council after Mrs. Boyd left the meeting, that she was retaliating against him because of the incident with her son.

The council took no action on the matter.

The council then discussed at length, whether or not police chief Joe Bussell and Richards should be allowed to go to Derby City Truck Stop and eat, while on duty and whether or not they should be allowed to go out of the city limits.

Brodhead City Attorney Daryl Day told the council that because Brodhead was a sixth class city that Bussell and Richards had no authority whatsoever outside the city limits.

Councilman Johnny Wilcox said that the council had tried for years to keep officers inside the city limits and that this was only rehabilitating the issue.

Chief Bussell told the council that he was told (by the council) that he was put in charge of the police department and that if there was any problems he would handle it.

"Five people can't run this police department," Bussell told the council.

The Chief also told the council that he had tried to counsel and help Richards become a better police officer but that some of the council members had interfered.

Sweet and Sour

Chapter 15
When we begin looking back over our lives we have a tendency to remember the things we did or had an interest in. We often forget the ones in our lives that contributed to our happiness. So it was with me when I began this series on the people of the Buffalo community. Tom Hall, a man known for his experience in carpentry was one of them. He knew how to measure and saw a straight line as well as choose the right board for the right place. He also knew how to brace a house to withstand the winds that were sure to come and was Mat's right hand man. As I stated before Mat was rather cranky when it came to building our home for he also knew how to build and wanted a home that storms would never sway nor crumble. So, Mat, Tom Hall and Mat's brother, Des, were responsible for the structure and the others the labor to get material to the place needed. Tom was also known for his camping out in strange places like Hawk Creek, and bringing back tales of huge pots and signs of much earlier inhabitants doing strange things with them. He was also known as one of the best moonshiners in the area. He was a fixture in our area for years then suddenly left and I never learned what happened to him.

George Hall, a younger brother of Tom's, and the husband to Della, the good woman who furnished us milk and helped me with the peeling of peaches that was more than I could

handle, was quite different. He always rode a mule when he came by and would stop, hitch up the mule, slide off and talk to me awhile before going on to hunt for Mat. I was glad of the attention, for I was reaching out for friendship anywhere I could find it. He would give attention to Judy then ask me about my own family. Where I had been raised and how I was liking living here. I liked him and looked forward to his short visits. Mat had got acquainted with him when they were surveying the land Mat and Roscoe Norton had bought as a joint venture several years earlier. George knew the countryside like the back of his hand and could take them to any and every corner where they were looking for over the whole 1700 acres so was an important asset. Now you would have to know how the old time surveyors had marked the land to understand the importance of having a man like this to help. A line may run for a few yards before it would make a slight turn one way or the other and that would be called a corner between adjoining parcels of land, or it may go straight ahead for half mile or maybe more before it veered from the straight line and over a cliff or down a steep hill, but each time it changed course it would be a corner. These corners were usually a certain kind of tree or stump of a former tree. (For instance, so and so poles to a large chestnut tree, or where three young oaks are

sanding, etc.) Now this unusual man had the knowledge and memory to remember where these trees or stumps were, or had been and could direct to a surveyor to within feet of it. Mat acquired the same skill and he could even tell by the rotted or dead roots what kind of a tree had stood in an empty stump hole. Mat became an excellent surveyor himself after a few years of study. He had many skills and had learned them by hours of intensive study. He was one who did not believe in beginning any job without knowing exactly what he was doing and to do this it took studying the project he was about to start.

One of my fondest memories of George was the day he caught me crying and tried to console me. Mat had to go to Somerset for something and I wanted to go along but there was no one to watch the house so I had to stay behind to see nothing was bothered. Oh yes, there were people even back then that would catch a person away from home and carry off anything that struck their fancy. And it was usually that had to protect our belongings. This day I was quite homesick for the sidewalks and busy streets and ice cream cone but it was being denied. So, I picked up my baby and began to rock her and tears of self pity flowed down my face. One of the

workhounds going to the lime quarry had just passed and I mumbled a greeting and he continued on his way and I never saw him out of sight. I heard a voice at the corner of the house saying, "Ms. Graves, what is wrong, did that man hurt you?" It was George. "If he has I will get him and he will surely pay for it." By now he had slid off the mule and was on the porch. Oh no, he didn't do a thing, I just wanted to go to town and Mat said I would have to stay with the workhounds. By now the roof gales had opened and I was sobbing to this almost strange man. He quietly hitched the mule to the corner of the porch, sat down and began to talk. Now, you go right ahead and cry, I know how lonely it must be for you away out here and Mat has to find a way to take you with him more. I don't remember how long he stayed but I did finally wipe away the tears and thank him for his understanding and kindness. And not long after that Mat hired one of the work hands to lay occasionally and so I could go home.

I didn't see much more of George nor his family for they moved away shortly after that and not long after I heard both he and Della had died. But these two very dear people had left their mark of kindness on me.

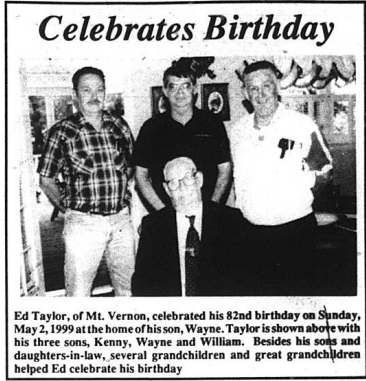

"It Is Written"

Paul had an opportunity to preach to Felix, a governor in Caesarea, and his wife Drusilla. Ac 24:24-25. *And as he reasoned of righteousness, temperance and judgment to come, I felt trembled, and answered, Godly way for this time, when I have a convenient season, I will call for thee." Let us also reason upon these same points today*

First, Paul reasoned about righteousness, that would have involved things like right living, God's righteous standard of conduct, that men fall short of, Rom 3:23. But righteousness would also be God's plan to make of righteous men, righteous in his sight. In Rom 1:16-17, Paul said, *For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God into salvation everyone that believeth, to the Jew first, and also to the Greek. For therein is the righteousness of God revealed from faith to faith; as it is written, The Just Shall Live by Faith."* Indeed, only in the gospel can unrighteous men be made right in God's sight.

Secondly, Paul reasoned about temperance. Temperance means self-control, self-discipline, a much needed quality in the lives of men. Paul said that the man who *"striveth for the mastery is temperate in all things. Now they do it to obtain a corruptible crown; but we an incorruptible." I Cor 9:27* Just as an athlete is temperate or shows self control in all things, even so must we.

Thirdly, Paul reasoned with them about judgment to come. Indeed all mankind, is heading for this awesome day Paul said *"Because he hath appointed a day, in which he will judge the world in righteousness by that man whom he hath ordained: whereof he hath given assurance unto all men, in that he hath raised him from the dead." Ac 17:31* Yes, all will be raised from the dead. In 5:28-29, and all will give answer to God in the judgment day.

Felix was all shook up, about the teachings of Jesus, for the scripture saith that he trembled. But there was a problem, Felix put off obeying Christ, and waited for a convenient season. But the only really convenient season men have, is today, for today is the day of Salvation, II Cor. 6:2. Does Jesus' word affect you enough to believe and obey him?

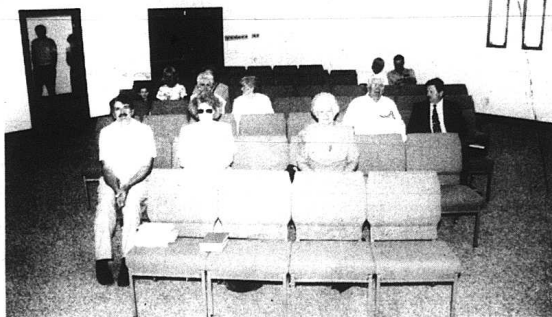

was poured.

All total it took about 13 months to get the building ready for use, according to the Pastor at Crossroads, Bob Nicholson. Bro. Nicholson, who has been the Pastor of Crossroads for the past two years, oversaw the entire construction project and did most of the design work on the new building.

The 4,000 square foot building is basically split in half, with 2,000 feet for the main auditorium and 2,000 feet for classrooms, a nursery, office and bathrooms.

Much of the work done on the building was donated, as was the land it sits on by members of the church and the congregation held some fundraisers to help with the cost of the construction.

The Assemblies of God donated 125 of the 150 chairs that now sit in the main auditorium and have also donated \$400 for teaching supplies.

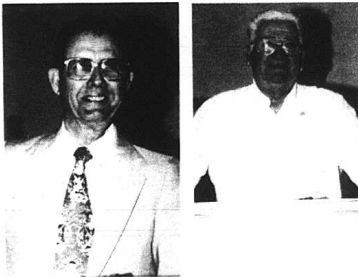

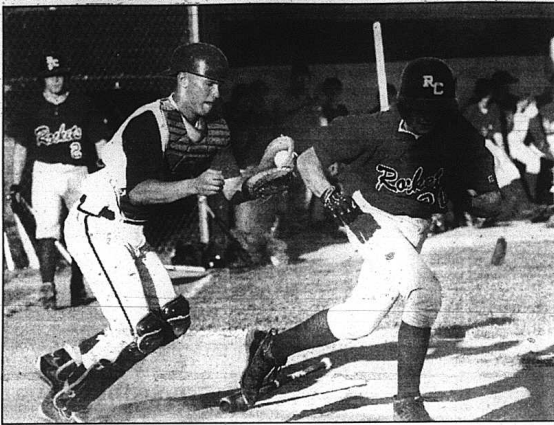

Girls' track team places third at Meet of Champions; boys place eleventh

Rockcastle's varsity track and field teams recently participated in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes Meet of Champions at Cumberland College in Williamsburg. Over forty boys' and girls' teams were on hand for the annual competition featuring many of Kentucky's best track and field teams and athletes.

Rockcastle's girls had an awesome meet. They finished in third place overall with 73 points. Defending state champion Western Hills took first place and Johnson Central finished second, narrowly beating the RCHS girls by three points on the final race of the day. Rockcastle managed to defeat class 3A state power Dunbar and 2A power West Jessamine. Both teams are ranked in the top ten in their classes.

The girls had many strong performances, highlighted by the 800 meter relay team. The team of Cheyenne Carmack, Tara Abney, Rachelle Hammond and Sheena Swimney ran a season's best time of 1:52.49 and placed first overall. This was also the best time of the season so far in class 2A and ranks the team first in the state in this event.

Mindy Bullock jumped a personal record 4'10" in the high jump competition and placed an impressive second overall. Mindy is also two inches away from the RCHS record of 5'. Mindy also finished seventh in long

jump with a leap of 14'2". In the triple jump competition, Mindy jumped a personal best 27'4.5" and placed ninth overall.

In the 100 meter dash, seven grader Sheena Swimney ran a great race and finished third overall with an impressive time of 13.5. Cheyenne Carmack was one of the favorites to win the race, but was met with some misfortune as she was disqualified for a false start; however, Cheyenne did not get discouraged. She bounced back and ran very impressive races in the 400 and 200 meter dashes.

In the 400 meter dash, Cheyenne ran her best race of the year and nearly broke her own RCHS record set last year at the state championships. Cheyenne ran an impressive 1:01.07 and easily placed first in the event. Teammate Rachelle Hammond was not far behind. Rachelle finished fifth overall with her second best time ever, 1:06.42.

In the 200 meter dash, Cheyenne ran a great race and finished second overall with a time of 27.4. This marked the first time that Cheyenne has been beaten in an individual race and ended her undefeated streak that dated back to the first meet of this season. Sheena Swimney placed eighth in a great race with a time of 29.7.

Rachelle Hammond put together two impressive performances in the long jump and the triple jump. In the

long jump competition, Rachelle leaped 14'8.5" and placed sixth overall. In triple jump, she also performed very well and leaped 28'11" for sixth place.

Tara Abney and Theresa Chislum carried the load in the hurdle races. In the 100 meter high hurdles, Tara ran a great race and finished fifth with a time of 18.3. Theresa also ran well and placed ninth in 19.5. In the 300 meter low hurdles, Tara broke her own personal record with a time of 53.22 and an impressive sixth place finish. Theresa was not far behind. She ran a great race and finished ninth in 54.13.

The most impressive individual performance of the day belonged to RCHS freshman thrower Clarissa Hubbard. Clarissa put her new spin technique to good use in the discus throw. She threw an amazing 105'3" on her way to a first place finish. Clarissa shattered the previous RCHS record of 97'6". She now ranks third in the state in this event. Teammate Britany Owens also threw exceptionally well. Britany placed third overall with a personal record throw of 85'9.5". In the shot put competition, Clarissa also threw very well. She placed third overall with an impressive throw of 30'10". Angie Ford also threw well and placed 12th with a throw of 23'11.5".

Sixth grader Chere Embs ran the grueling 800 meter run for the first time in her brief track career. She performed exceptionally well and ran the best time of the season for a varsity runner. She finished the race in strong fashion with an impressive time of 2:56.78, more than ten seconds better than any other RCHS runner this season.

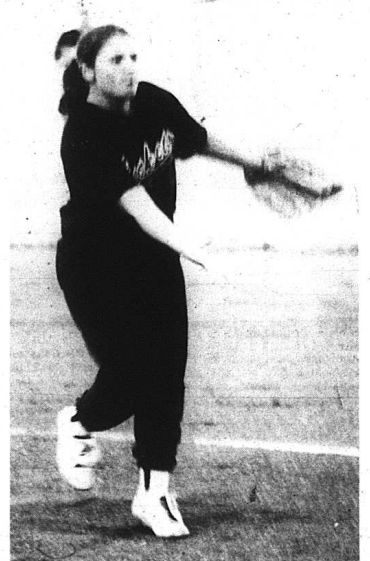

The boys' team had a great meet and placed 11th overall out of over forty boys' teams that were present. The boys faced many of the state's best teams including many top-ranked class 3A teams.

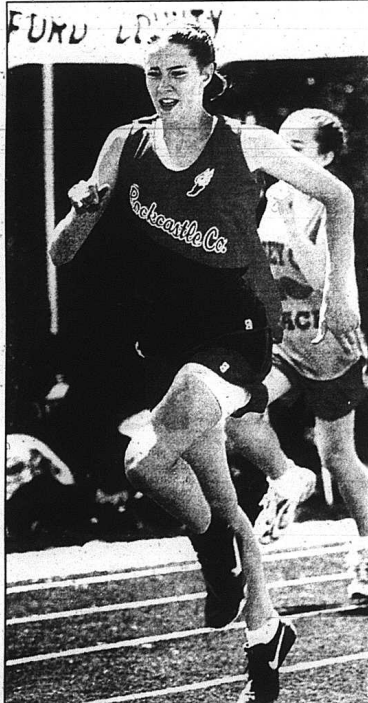

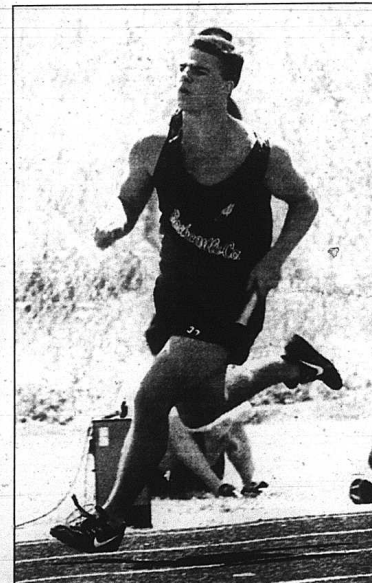

Councilman Larry Doyle told Mrs. Epperson that the city could possibly plant some trees in the area and maybe work a gazebo planned for the area.

City Attorney Daryl Dig suggested that the city could waive water sewer taps as part of an in-kind contribution.

"This project would make our town if we could get the funding," Councilman Doyle said.

Besides the residential structures in the target area, Simpson Feed Mill would also have to be re-located, but Mrs. Epperson said that part of the \$1 million dollars could be used as re-locations for that business.

Two other structures currently not being used, the building housing Past Times Pool Hall and the Old Brodhead Cafe are part of the target area for the project.

The council voted to hold a public hearing on the project on May 24 at 6:00 p.m. at city hall.

The public is invited to attend and make comments and/or suggestions concerning the project. The council also briefly discussed their new city park, which may open as early as mid-July.

The city park is located on property already owned by the city bounded by Tyree, Tate, Albright and Pike Streets.

The new city park will have a 650 foot five foot wide walking track, a 40 x 60 basketball court, playground equipment, horse shoe pits, barbecue pits and a shelter.

Councilman Curt Brown, who is heading the project, said much of the work is being done by council members and city and private citizens.

"I'll guarantee you that we don't have \$400,000 in it when we get done and we are going to have a nice park," Mayor Cash said.

ally happened. Hammond told the board that a student at the high school had told assistant principal Barry Noble that someone had called the pay phone at the high school and said that there was a bomb either in the school or somewhere in the community or simply somewhere, "he wasn't sure."

Hammond said that Noble followed procedures to the letter and had to be checked into it, he realized that the student was trying to pull the prank.

"Some other students at the high school told Noble that the student had asked them to go along with the prank, but that they would not," Hammond said.

Hammond said that the student who told Noble about the phone call was very un-specific and "not at all excited about the possible threat of a bomb."

"I have a child at the high school and as a parent I think Mr. Noble handled the situation appropriately," Hammond said.

Board member Martin Vanzant told Hammond that he thought all threats should be taken seriously and it was better to "err on the side of safety" than not.

"What would have happened if he (Noble) had been wrong," Vanzant asked.

The day of the threat Supt. Hammond was out of town and board members asked Hammond about who would be in charge at the central office in such a case.

Hammond said that it was outlined in the school system's crisis procedure manual with Loretta Powell and Glen Vanwinkle taking such calls.

He also said that any of the six department heads at the central office, Powell, Vanwinkle, Richard

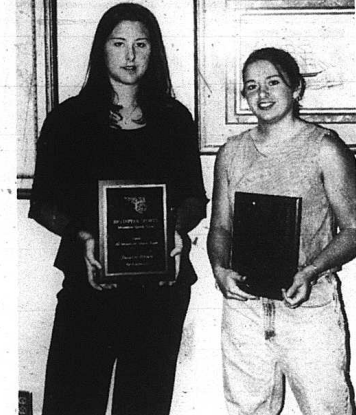

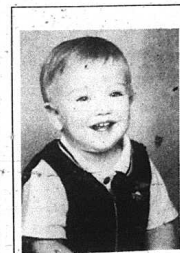

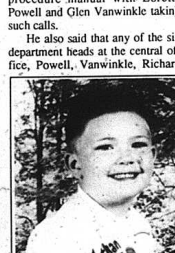

Broadhead Police

Councilmen Larry Doyle and Curt Brown told Bussell and Richards that they had had several complaints about Broadhead officers being out of the city limits and they asked Richards about a particular incident on Saturday night when Richards was in Mt. Vernon, in his Broadhead uniform, helping Mt. Vernon officers work a road check.

Richards said he was off duty at the time and that he only checked on one car, at Mt. Vernon's request and that he was not going to try and make an arrest or anything.

Richards said he was at the road check after the prom at Rockcastle County High School.

He said that he had asked Chief Bussell if he should go to the prom with other officers from the area, because officials had received threats about possible bombs in the area and/or other problems at the prom.

Richards said that he even rode to the prom with a Mt. Vernon officer because he was not officially on duty.

But, Chief Bussell said that he went to Mt. Vernon during the road check and told Richards that he should not be in a Broadhead uniform and working the road check. Councilmen Doyle and Brown also told Richards that they did not want such things as that to happen again.

Chief Bussell told the council that he had been told by at least two judges that when another officer calls for help he had better respond, or he would have to answer to that judge.

He also told the city attorney that he thought he was wrong about not having any jurisdiction outside Broadhead.

The Chief also told the council that he had taken the police job at Broadhead twelve years ago to "help people, not arrest them," and that if he was not allowed to travel outside the city limits when he was called upon for help he would consider re-

signing his position.

"I've done a pretty good job in judgement, you have never had a law suit in twelve years," Bussell said.

The city attorney told the council that the fiscal court could pass an inter-county ordinance that would give Broadhead officers authority outside the city limits in case of an emergency and that he would work on getting that passed.

Councilman Brown told Bussell and Richards that if the fiscal court agreed to pass the ordinance, "that did not make them county police officers," they were still to work in Broadhead only, except for emergencies.

As for the officers going to Derby City, the council let that up to Bussell as well, but Doyle and Brown told the Chief that if he got any complaints he should bring them to the council and if they got any complaints they would bring them to Bussell. "You've gotten complaints in the past and haven't brought them to us," Doyle said.

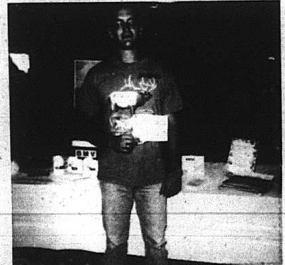

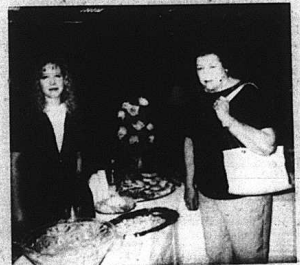

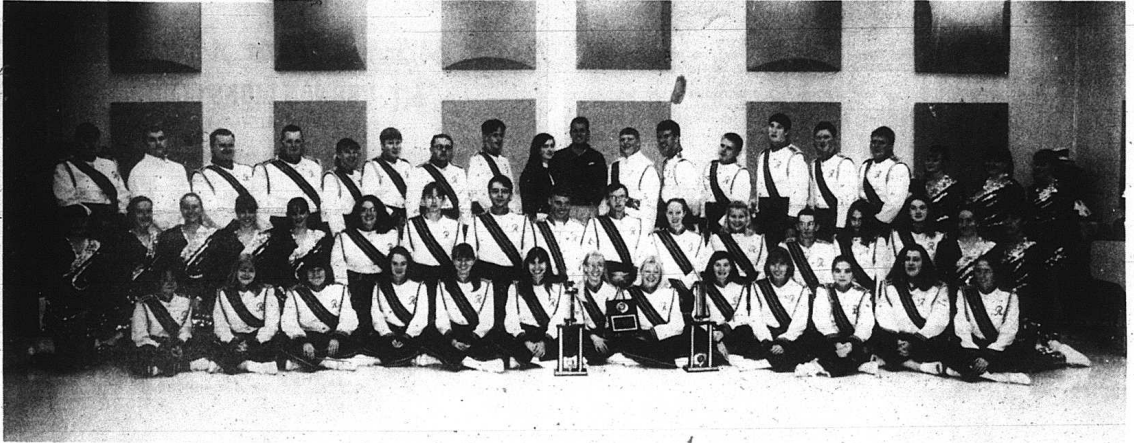

Kiwanis Club promoting community pride

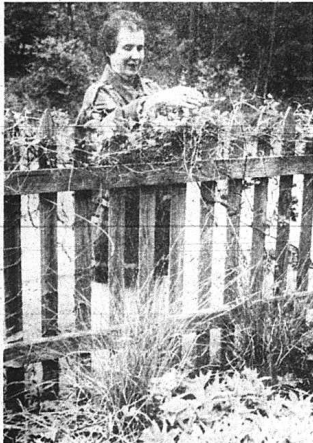

William Shakespeare wrote "I know a bank where the wild thyme blows, where oxlips and the nodding violet grows, quite over-canopied with luscious woodbine, with sweet musk-roses with eglantine..." and I say, "I know that bank and it exists on the other side of Livingston at the home of Lucille Carlotts." The weathered wooden picket fence in front of the house was added a few years ago and is covered with sweet autumn vine and lined inside with yellow and white perennials; goose-neck, daylilies and Japanese dogwood... On the other side of the home is a black iron gazebo covered with wisteria and a small fish pond with hostas and tall hemlock trees offering shade and a place to unwind and rest. Still the path leads to an old one room school house that has been turned into a charming guest house, with a rose garden in the front and a white garden on the side. Jon favors the "old look" with plants that seem to have been there forever and after a tour of these grounds, you will agree that he has been more than successful. Jon attended Livingston School and he graduated from the University of Kentucky with a BA in Communications and then returned for a degree in horticulture that would take him on to New York where he started a very successful roof-top garden and courtyard gardening business. His gardens have been featured in House Beautiful, Metropolitan Home, New York Times, Country Garden, Garden Designs and Country Home. He also has a shop in Lexington called Delaware River Co. that his mother operates. The shop

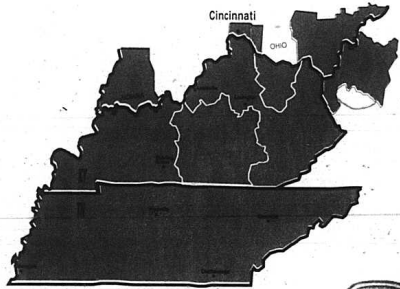

Roberts Bend Land Exchange Proposal

The first week in October 1997, the Somerset Ranger District of the Daniel Boone National Forest began scoping on the proposed Roberts Bend Land Exchange. Most of the federal land in the exchange proposal is located in a bend of the South Fork of the Cumberland River and located in the southwest corner of the Burnside USA Quadrangle. In response to public scoping, the interdisciplinary team developed and analyzed two alternatives: "The proposed action" - proceed with the exchange proposal and the "no action alternative" - reject the exchange proposal. Their analysis is documented in an Environmental Assessment (EA), which is available for public review and comment.

The proposed action has been identified as the preferred alternative. This involves exchanging 489.82 acres more or less of Federal land on the Somerset District (Roberts Bend) and the Stearns District (1 tract with a church and 1 tract with a cemetery) to Laka Cumberland Resort, Inc. for 1,466 acres, more or less of company owned or optioned land in Laurel, McCrory, Pulaski and Rockcastle Counties, Kentucky.

Pursuant to 36 CFR 215.5, this legal notice provides a final opportunity to comment on the proposed land exchange. Comments must be postmarked or received within 30 days beginning the day following publication of this notice in the Lexington Herald Leader. The Forest Supervisor will consider these comments in reaching his final decision. Comments will be addressed in an appendix to the EA. 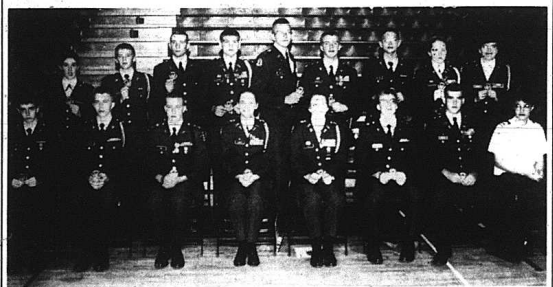

For Some Couples Divorce Brings Out the Best

I almost could not believe what I was hearing. The father of three told me, "My kids deserve the best. I give my wife more child support money than I am supposed to, I am responsible for those kids too, you know." This is not what I typically hear from parents going through a divorce.

Another unusual father is Mark McGwire who plays professional baseball for the St. Louis Cardinals

and who happens to have hit seventy home runs last year. I remember the touching scene at home plate when he picked up his nine-year-old son and carried him to the dugout after that last home run.

McGwire is a part-time father since he and his wife divorced. He reports that he has a good relationship with his ex-wife and with her new husband. He says he is happy that his son has such a good home in which to grow up.

Yes, it is true. Sometimes divorce brings out the best in people. I remember the mother who told me, "I let my kids see their father anytime they want. He called last week and wanted to take them to Gatlinburg. We already had plans but the kids really wanted to go with him, so I let them. He is a good father."

(All these comments about a good relationship) with an ex-spouse assume that there has been no abuse. I am certainly not in favor of the kids being forced to spend time with an abusive father or mother.) Unfortunately for some couples divorce seems to bring out the worst. What was a bad marriage continues to be an unhealthy relationship

throughout the divorce process and beyond. The stories I hear include fathers who refuse to pay any child support and fathers who have all the household utilities cut off in an attempt to force Mom to let him come back home. Then I hear of mothers who will not let their children visit Dad in order to punish him for how he treated her in the marriage.

And who is the victim off all these machinations? The child, that's who. Couples who both claim to love the children dearly will do outrageous things to each other that ultimately

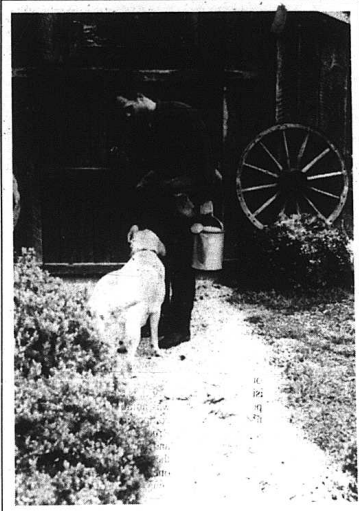
hurt the children more than anyone. The parents are angry and trying to hurt each other but the children suffer the most.

In light of all this I have a suggestion to be used in evaluating a prospective spouse. The question to ask is: will he or she treat me and any children fairly in a divorce. No, I am not suggesting that one go into marriage planning for divorce. I do think, however, that a spouse who will treat the other fairly in a divorce will probably also treat him or her fairly in a

So for all of us parents who claim to love our children "more than anything," let us not throw the children's interests out with the bath water in the divorce process. It is possible to go through a divorce and put the children's interest first. I have seen it done.

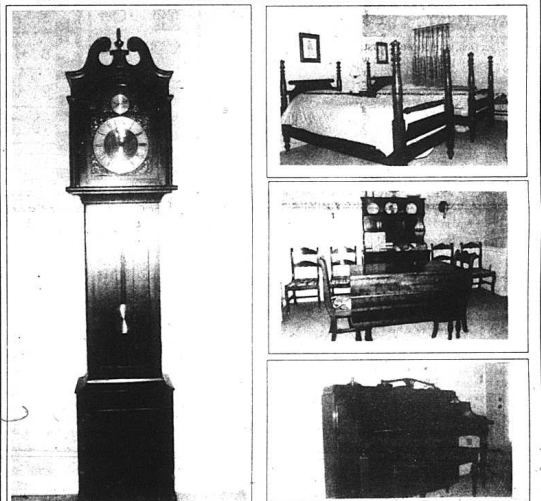
