Court will move the county road de-partment garage to a new facility at Burr in a couple of weeks.

County Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis has bemoaned the county's

financial situation for the last few years, but said last week that the county road department fund could afford to buy the property. "Because of its location, (near

Interstate 75) I look at this purchase as much as an investment as anything

else," Carloftis said.
The county voted to buy the former Mt. Vernon Pre-Cast property at Burr for \$112,000 from Citizens Bank.
Citizens Bank had foreclosed on the property a few years ago after Mt.

Holbrook said he agreed with the purchase, mainly because of the condition of the old county garage.

"When it rains, it rains inside the garage up there," Holbrook said.

The old county garage is located
on old U.S. 25 near the Elmwood
Cemetery and, according to Carloftis,
is not even big enough for county
trucks to be pulled inside in the winter time to put the snow plows on.

The twenty-seventh graduating class at Rockcastle County High School will receive diplo-mas during ceremonies Saturday


162 graduates will be pre-

Junior said he had a bottom that
hadn't been tended in he didn't know
how lone and he allowed it might be

how long and he allowed it might be just the right kind of soil for a melon

I suggested plow up a strip about feet wide and we'd put us in a tch right down the middle of it leaving room for the vines to g about 15 feet on either side of it om for the vines to grow

Last Monday night Junior called and said he'd have the melon patch ready by noon on Tuesday and for me

to get my seeds and come on over.

I'm bad about going into discount stores around the first of June when ost folks have bout all the seeds most tolks have bout air the seeds they're gonna buy and offer the manager a dollar or two for every-thing he's got left on the seed rack. As a result I tend to have hundreds and hundreds of seed packets to share with my neighbors every year. Any-way, I sorted through my seed boxes and came up with a dozen packets of watermelons and about the same number of cantaloupes and honey

dews-14 varieties in all and drove over to the Heltons in time for Lunch. Molly Helton (Mrs. Junior) is one

of those cooks who can just touch food and it'll be ten times better than it would have been if she hadn't been in the kitchen but that's another story that'll have to wait if we're gonna get

Junior sorted through my seed poke and matter of factly stated that I didn't have near enough seeds while it was my considered opinion that we it was my considered opinion that we had enough for ten or twelve patches. "We'll have to go to Southern States and get some more and we'll need at least a hundred pounds of fertilizer," he said.

pointed side down the middle of the field. Junior was still yelling advice when I got out of hearing distance. We got her planted. We got your Charleston Grays, Carolina Cross, North Carolina Best, Sweet Sugar, Black Diamond, Goorgia Cannon Balls, Florida Giants, Black Beauties and Crimson Sweets all in the water melon family. We got Hales Best, Sweet Sensation, Old Standard, Honey Brew, Long Banana, Burpee's Tradition, Southern Glory and Break-fast Delight in the mushmellon/can-ladoupe family and those are just the ones that I remember.





Rotational Grazing Means More Money

Rotating livestock on pastures improves a grazing system and increases income. Rotating can be as simple as closing gates. The manager should determine when animals graze a field instead of running over the entire farm. All grass needs a recovery time, and rotation between fields allows grass to re-grow between grazing cycles. The cheapest feed on a livestock farm is the feed animals harvest for themselves. Nutrients harvested by themselves. Nutrients harvested by

farm is the feed animals harvest for bemselves. Nutrients harvested by grazing cost less than half as much as nutrients harvested and fed as stored feed like hay or grain. Improving a grazing system increases pasture utilization and fertility, as well as forage quality and supply. Rotational grazing can increase the state of the state of the forage, rotating results in pasture to see the state of the state of the forage, rotating results in pasture use of 60% or more, compared to use of 50% or less when pasture is continuously grazed.

Nutrient cycling reduces the need for fertilizer on grazed pastures. Less than 10% of the forages' phosphorus and potassium are removed by livestock; they return most of it as dung and urine. Phosphorus and potassium levels tend to rise near shade, water and gate areas.

The actual rate will be determined after signup and will be calculated by dividing the amount available by the total eligible cwt of milk from all approved dairy

The application period for the DMLA begins on April 12, 1999 and ends on May 21, 1999. During this signup period, producers will be required to apply for the program at their local FSA office.

Producers will be required to cer-tify that the dairy operation was mar-keting milk during the fourth quarter thy that the darry operation was mar-keting milk during the fourth quarter of 1998. FSA will have an applica-tion form that producers will fill out when they sign up for the program. It is expected that the form will require producers to include: (1) the name of the dairy operation and a list of persons involved in it, and (2) the 1997 or 1998 calendar year milk marketings of the dairy operation. The form is also expected to include: (1) a statement affirming that the dairy operation marketed milk during the fourth quarter of 1998, and (2) a statement affirming that the producer is aware that USDA will be conducting spot checks. For those dairy operations selected for a spot check, responsible producers must provide

additional information as requested.

Any producer who receives a payment for the dairy operation based on eroneous information will be required to repay USDA. Also, any producer who receives a payment on a fraudulent application will be required to repay USDA and may face criminal prosecution.



As you prepare to leave us, all of us here at "The Rock" know we will miss you. We are, however, so very excited for you and all that life offers you.


