Divers from Ohio will once again search Lake Herrington in Mercer County for the body of a man who apparently drown in the Lake Herrington on May 22.
Jesse Ray, Harness, of Nicholasville and formerly of Bec Lick, drowned while boating with friends, but his body has yet to be found.

Harnesses parents Jesse Marvin and Connie Harness, have had to seek the help of state law-makers, such as Rep. Danny Ford, in trying to get cooperation from Mercer officials to look for their

Unemploymentremained low throughout Kentucky and in Rockcastle County during the month of April, according to the workforce development cabinet in Corbin. Rockcastle had a rate of 5.4

percent unemployed, compared to 6.7 percent in Jackson, 7.0 percent in Knox and 7.9 percent in Clay.

#### Police say they have suspects in murder case

It has been nearly four years since Michigan teenager was so tragi-ally killed in a incident on interstate

cally killed in incident on interstate 75 and still no arrests. But, Kenutcky State Police Detective Gary Lane, who is investigating the careless actof vandelism, adult his week that he has suspects in the case and is closer to an arrest now than ever before. On October 12, of 1995, a Michigan family was traveling through Rockeastle County on their way to Georgia in hopes of seeing the Virgin Mary when someone threw a bead stone marker from the Sand Hill bridge near the 54 mile marker of 1-75.

The headstone went through the front windshield of the van and killed 17-year-old Stephanie Kuhar of New Hudson, Michigan.

Miss Kuhar was asleep in the middle seat of the van when the middle seat of the van when the marker was thrown from the bridge around 2 a.m.

At the time of the incident, all east three people, probably juveniles at the time, were seen on the bridge by a truck driver from Corbin.

Local residents were shocked by the senseless and that it would for the Kuhar family was established locally. Det Lane said that it would be in the best interest of anyone that knows anything more about the death to come forward.

Some of the cases are almost 15 years old and at least one of the unsolved murders was a double homi-

cide.
A 73-year-old Brodhead man was
murdered around May 1st of 1985,
when someone struck him in the back
of the head with a blunt object.
Virgil Lee was found dead about
20 feet from his Brodhead home by a
neighbor who had not seen him for
several days.
Police said that robbery was the
motive for the murder.
No arrests were ever made in the
case.

In October of 1986, Jackie McHargue, 25, and Emma Ingraffia, 40, of Mt. Vernon were shot several intes before their bodies were burned beyond recognition in the back seat of sattain wagon at Mullins Station.

At the time of the murders police said there were indications that the murders were the result of a drug deal gone bad, but no arrests were vande in the brutal murders.

Whomever killed the couple placedold tires on their bodies before setting them on fire, but autopsy reports later indicated that both McHargue and Ingraffia were prob-

#### Accused murderer has another day in court

A hearing has been scheduled for Thursday in Pulaski County Circuit Court to hear motions on behalf of David Lovell, 31, of Burr, who along with his wife, Barbara, 25, have been indicted for murder by a Rockcastle Grand Iury.

with mis was, and a moder by a Rockcastle Grand Jury.

The hearing will likely result in a order by Circuit Judge Dan Venters to either release Lovell on bond or make him stay in jail, while he awaits proceedings in his case.

In April, an agent with the Federal Drug Enforcement Agency seized \$50,000 in cash as Lovell tried to post bond in the Rockcastle Circuit Court Clerk's office.

The agent told Lovell he thought the money was proceeds from illegal

drug activity.

However, Lovell's father Floyd

However, Lovell's father Floyd told the agent the money was from the sale of property. In a hearing on April 23, Lovell's attorney, Warren Scoville, of London told Judge Venters that Lovell had met the requirements set forth in Circuit Court and should be released on bond

on bond.

Venters had said he would make a ruling with-in 30 days of the April 23 hearing, but a secretary in his office said that due-vo\_a beavy trial load, he was unable to do so.

The Lovell's are accused of murdering Charles' Toddy' Baker, 32, of Mt. Vernon in 1997 and burying him 13 feet below the earth's surface at

13 feet below the earth's surface at Tark Hill.



ing on children and youths this sum-er, I'd like to give you some inter-esting statistics from the Kids Count Data Book. According to this book, by the year 2005:

"Children under age 18 will in-crease by 5%. White children will increase by 8%. Black children will increase by 8%. Black children will increase by 8%. Hispanic children will increase by 3%. Asian and Pacific Islander children willincrease. by 39%. Native American children will increase by 6%.

There was 42 million dollars made available for eligible producers who have incurred multi-year crop and

Twelve million will be used to compensate livestock and nonlivestock producers with eligible flooded land that was inaccessible or incapable of crop production, grazing or haying during FY 1998, and 30 million dolcrop production, grang or haying during FY 1998, and 30 million dollars for all eligible producers who have insured multi-year crop and grazing losses because of flooding. Eligibility criteria is if a farm savi inaccessible or incapable of producin at all times during FY 1998 because of flooding and has been subject to continuous flooding since October 1, 1992.

Signup for FCP is scheduled to begin on May 17, 1999 and end on July 2, 1999. Producers may file an application for benefits anytime during this signup period in the court where the loss occurred. NONINSURED CROP DISAS-TER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM The Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) provides crop loss protection for growers of many crops for which FCIC insur-ance is not available.

Eligible crops are commercial crops grown for food and fiber. Also included are floriculture, ornamental nursery. Christmas tree crops, turfgrass sod, seed crops, aquacul-ture (including ornamental fish) and industrial crops. Also, losses result-ing from natural disaster not covered

information trops. Assistance and the trop insurance policy may be eligible for NAP assistance. NAP does not include trees grown for wood, paper or pulp products.

NAP crops are eligible when the expected "Area "Yield" is less than 65 percent of normal. NAP payments are made to eligible producers when individual crop losses are in excess of 50 percent of the individual's approved yield at 60 percent of the crop's average market price (determined by FSA). Producers must report losses within 15 days of the crop losses within 15 days of the crop loss.

Unlike previous disaster as tance program, producers must file an acreage and production report with the local FSA office prior to the crop reporting date of July 15th. If acres and yields are not reported on time, producers may not be eligible for producers ma,

This brief column cannot do justice to the spirit and substance of the study at St. Mildred's. Thank you, brothers, for allowing me to share that time with you.







Sex Offenders Prey on Young Family Members

Who are they? They are the people most likely to be victimized by sex offenders, according to an extensive inmate-based study by the Bureau of Justice Statisti

Justice Statistics.
The study, which canvassed some 14,000 inmates imprisoned in 1991 or earlier for violent crimes, for or earlier for violent crimes, for did that two-thirds of conviced sex offenders victimized a child, and one-third raped or sexually assaulted their own child for stepchild.
Of an estimated 61,000 offenders serving time for violent crimes against victims under 18, nearly 10 percent

had been convicted of the murder or manslaughter of a child; 15 percent had been convicted of forcible r and 57 percent had been found gu of other types of sexual assault in cluding sodomy, statutory rape and lewd acts. An estimated 30 percent had attacked more than or during the incident for which the

The Child is Always the Victim

A seductive or promiscuous child often is the result, but never the cause, of sexual abuse. One characteristic common to sexual abusers is a capac ty for rationalizing their actions, mentally justifying an illegal, unacceptable, and inappropriate behavior as necessary and all right. Perpetrating the myth of the seductive or sexually promiscuous child by claiming its the child's fault is one way of doing this. Through this type of rea-soning, the abuser shifts the blame soning, the abuser shifts the blame forhisher actions onto someone else. In the same manner, incestuous partes often justify their own sexual behavior as a way of teaching the child or keeping him off the street. These justifications ignore the abuser's responsibility as an adult, the child's vulnerability and dependency on the adult, and the long-term harm to the child. 
