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Divers to look for drowning victim

Divers from Ohio will once again search Lake Herrington in Mercer County for the body of a man who apparently drowned in the Lake Herrington on May 22. Jesse Ray Harness, of Nicholasville and formerly of Bee Lick, drowned while boating with friends, but his body has yet to be found.

Harness parents Jesse Marvin and Connie Harness, have had to seek the help of state law-makers, such as Rep. Danny Ford, in trying to get cooperation from Mercer officials to look for their son.

The search for Harness has been officially called off, but a family member said that the Harnesses are paying for the cost of the diving operations. The next search will be this Saturday.

Unemployment remains low in Rockcastle and in Kentucky

Unemployment remained low throughout Kentucky and in Rockcastle County during the month of April, according to the workforce development cabinet in Corbin. Rockcastle had a rate of 5.4 percent unemployed, compared to 6.7 percent in Jackson, 7.0 percent in Knox and 7.9 percent in Clay.

The lowest unemployment rate for the state county local areas was in Laurel County, where only 5.2 percent were unemployed. The state's unemployment rate is 4.5 percent.

In April, 5,967 Rockcastle residents were in the labor force, and 5,643 were employed.

Heart attack claims life of local fish and game warden

Rockcastle County Fish and Game Warden Dean Ratliff, 51, of Berea, died Monday at the Pattie A. Clay Hospital in Richmond, after suffering an apparent heart attack while playing basketball. He had worked Rockcastle County for the past two years, taking over for Warden Randy Brumback, who was shot in Jackson County by an East Bernstadt man.

Funeral services for Ratliff will be Thursday at 1 p.m. at Oldham Roberts and Powell Funeral Home in Richmond.

Police arrest local man for transporting

A local man was arrested Saturday, after he was stopped by local police at Chestnut Ridge. Pedro A. Denny, 38, of War's Trailer Park, Mt. Vernon, was charged with illegal transport of alcoholic beverage in a dry territory and illegal possession of alcoholic beverage in dry territory. According to Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Sonya Prewitt, Deputy Danny Keeney found 55 cases of beer in Denny's vehicle when he was stopped. Assisting Kenney, were Mt. Police say they have suspects in murder case

It has been nearly four years since a Michigan teenager was so tragically killed in an incident on interstate 75 and still no arrests. But, Kentucky State Police Detective Gary Lane, who is investigating the careless act of vandalism, said this week that he has suspects in the case and is closer to an arrest now than ever before.

State Police post in London at (606) 878-6622 or 800-222-5555. While the death of the young Michigan girl is still the freshest on the minds of Rockcastle Countians, it is not the only murder in the county to go unsolved. Some of the cases are almost 15 years old and at least one of the unsolved murders was a double homicide.

On October 12, of 1995, a Michigan family was traveling through Rockcastle County on their way to Georgia in hopes of seeing the Virgin Mary when someone threw a headstone marker from the Sand Hill bridge near the 54 mile marker of I-75.

A 73-year-old Brothead man was murdered around May 1st of 1985, when someone struck him in the back of the head with a blunt object. Virgil Lee was found dead about 200 feet from his Brothead home by a neighbor who had not seen him for several days.

The headstone went through the front windshield of the van and killed 17-year-old Stephanie Kuhar of New Hudson, Michigan. Miss Kuhar was asleep in the middle seat of the van when the marker was thrown from the bridge around 2 a.m.

In October of 1986, Jackie McHargue, 25, and Emma Ingraffia, 40, of Mt. Vernon were shot several times before their bodies were burned beyond recognition in the back seat of a station wagon at Mullins Station.

At the time of the incident, at least three people, probably juveniles at the time, were seen on the bridge by a truck driver from Corbin. Local residents were shocked by the senseless act and a fund for the Kuhar family was established locally.

At the time of the murders police said there were indications that the murders were the result of a drug deal gone bad, but no arrests were ever made in the brutal murders. Whoever killed the couple placed old tires on their bodies before setting them on fire, but autopsy reports later indicated that both McHargue and Ingraffia were prob-



A Negro Creek family lost their home and most of their belongings in a Wednesday morning fire. Walter and Fronie Collins were not at home when the fire broke out around 7 a.m., according to Brothead Fire Chief Brian Bussell. Bussell said that the fire apparently started in the back of the house, and the home was heavily involved when fire fighters arrived. Bussell said the Collins were apparently visiting a sick grandchild at the time. Above fire fighters Nelson Graves and Rusty Owens look inside the burning structure, after firefighters Tim Albright and Stanley Payne went through the home to make sure no one was inside. Units from the Mt. Vernon and Crab Orchard fire departments helped at the scene.

Accused murderer has another day in court

A hearing has been scheduled for Thursday in Pulaski County Circuit Court to hear motions on behalf of David Lovell, 31, of Burr, who along with his wife, Barbara, 25, have been indicted for murder by a Rockcastle Grand Jury. The hearing will likely result in a order by Circuit Judge Dan Venters to either release Lovell on bond or make him stay in jail, while he awaits proceedings in his case.

drug activity. However, Lovell's father Floyd told the agent the money was from the sale of property. In a hearing on April 23, Lovell's attorney, Warren Scoville, of London told Judge Venters that Lovell had met the requirements set forth in Circuit Court and should be released on bond. Venters had said he would make a ruling with-in 30 days of the April 23 hearing, but a secretary in his office said that due to a heavy trial load, he was unable to do so. The Lovell's are accused of murdering Charles "Toddy" Baker, 32, of Mt. Vernon in 1997 and burying him 13 feet below the earth's surface at Tark Hill.

In April, an agent with the Federal Drug Enforcement Agency seized \$50,000 in cash as Lovell tried to post bond in the Rockcastle Circuit Court Clerk's office. The agent told Lovell he thought the money was proceeds from illegal

Since we have been concentrating on children and youths this summer, I'd like to give you some interesting statistics from the Kids Count Data Book. According to this book, by the year 2005:

- Children under age 18 will increase by 5%. While children will decrease by 3%. Black children will increase by 8%. Hispanic children will increase by 30%. Asian and Pacific Islander children will increase by 39%. Native American children will increase by 6%.

- From other selected sources: One million American children between the ages of 12 and 17 cannot read above the third grade level.

- Eighty-five percent of the juveniles who appear in criminal court are functionally illiterate.

- One third of all mothers on welfare are functionally illiterate.

- Half of a child's intellectual development occurs between birth and four years of age. Children who

ably still alive when their bodies were set on fire.

And in September of 1988, three-year-old Belinda Mills of Mt. Vernon was struck and killed by a motorist on West Main Street.

The little girl had just gotten off a church bus with her family when she ran into the path of a car.

She died at the Rockcastle Hospital and the car never stopped.

Police impounded one vehicle for tests, but it was not the car that hit the little girl and no arrests were ever made.

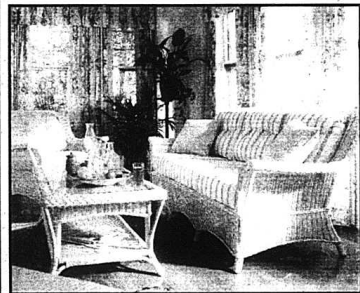
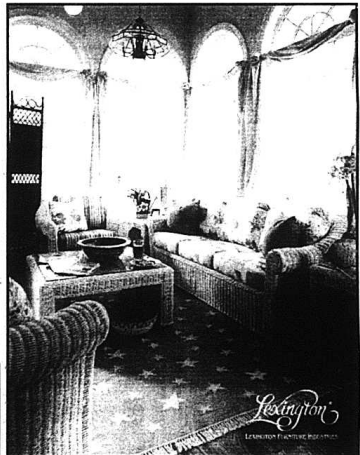

Farm Field Day

Extension Service are taking part in the Plastic Pesticide Container Recycling Project. Proper rinsing and recycling of pesticide containers is easy-to do, saves money, and helps protect the environment.

- How can you participate?
- 1) Triple rinse or pressure rinse all containers when emptied. Remember, it is best to rinse containers immediately after they are emptied. Some pesticide residues solidify quickly and become difficult to remove from the container if left in the jug.
 - 2) Dispose of the Pesticide Caps and remove sleeves and labels from containers. The Pesticide Caps are made of a different plastic material that can not be currently recycled.
 - 3) Bring all properly rinsed, five gallon or smaller, plastic containers to the listed collection sites on your dates and times specified for your county. Keep empty containers in a dry, secure place until the collection date. Each empty pesticide

container returned will be inspected to ensure it has been properly rinsed. Unrinsed containers will not be accepted.

Containers will be collected Tuesday, June 29th at the Farm Field Day at the Carl Lewis Family Farm at 6:00 pm.

June is National Dairy Month

Most people know that calcium is a mineral that helps build strong bones and teeth. But did you know that calcium also:

- * helps your muscles contract and relax
- * helps your heart beat
- * helps your nerves send messages

So what happens if you don't supply your body with enough calcium to perform these important functions? Your body takes the calcium it needs from your bones. Your bones act as a kind of savings account for calcium. If your diet supplies enough calcium, your body deposits some in your bones. If your diet is low in calcium, your body makes a withdrawal from your bones.

A diet low in calcium has been linked to several health problems: Osteoporosis - a crippling bone disease. Bones become so brittle that they break easily. Bone loss in the jaw - this can lead to difficulty in chewing, tooth loss, and poor fitting dentures. Hypertension - high blood pressure can lead to strokes and heart attacks in some people.

If you are like most Americans, you may not be getting all the calcium you need. To provide your body with enough calcium, you need to make daily "deposits". The Food Guide Pyramid recommends the following servings:

Age/Stage:	Servings/day
2 - 3 years	2 - 3 servings
4 - 13	4 servings
14 - 18	3 servings
19 - 30	3 servings
31 - 50	3 servings
51 - 70	3 servings
71 and over	3 servings

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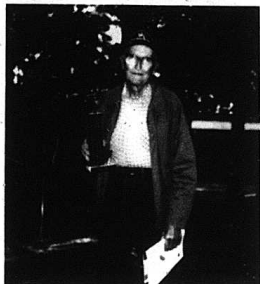

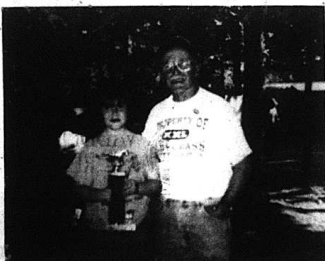

The Family Room

Being a Father Is a Privilege

During the past two weeks I have had the privilege of visiting with some of the men at St. Mildred's Catholic Church in Somerset. We gathered to study "Fathering" and used the Parable of the Prodigal Son as our guide. We also studied the painting "The Return of the Prodigal Son" by Rembrandt and the book of the same name by Henri Nouwen.

The painting is a powerful one, as Rembrandt depicts the father and his two sons on the occasion of the younger son's return home. The younger had collected his half of the inheritance and spent it in wild living. He came home expecting to be chastised, but his father welcomed him with open arms. The older son, who had been faithfully working at home, was jealous of the attention given his brother and would not come inside for the celebration. The father

was also most kind and forgiving in dealing with him.

Several of the men from St. Mildred's spoke from their own experiences of being sons and fathers. Seldom have I been in the midst of a group of men who were as open and honest as these. I learned more from what they had to say than from any points I attempted to make.

They asked me to summarize our study at the end of each session. I have read, taught and preached this Scripture passage many times but never in the light of the painting nor in the company of these men. I will never look at this passage the same way again.

Part of our study involved remembering our own fathers. Touching stories were told by the men who were present about the influence of their fathers in their lives. They made

"What Saith The Scriptures"

Today we want to look at the High Priesthood of Christ. It was prophesied in the Old Testament, "The LORD hath sworn, and will not repent, Thou art a priest for ever after the order of Melchizedek." Psalms 110:4 We see this fulfilled in Christ Jesus, "So also Christ glorified not himself to be made an high priest; but he that said unto him, Thou art my Son, to day have I begotten thee. As he saith also in another place, Thou art a priest for ever after the order of Melchizedek." Hebrews 5:5-6 Jesus did not assume this role, no. 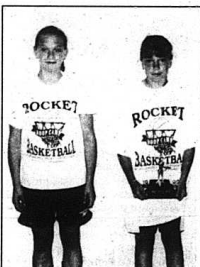

TOBACCO LEASING DEADLINE IS HERE!

July 1st is the deadline to sign-up for tobacco leases! Producers are minded leases filed and/or on file in the county must have all signatures (transferring farm and receiving farm) by the deadline to be approved. Leases with all signatures not obtained by the deadline of July 1st shall be disapproved.

FSA ANNOUNCES DISBURSEMENT OF \$20,000 IN COMMODITY CREDIT CORPORATION PAYMENTS FOR HARD HIT DAIRY FARMERS
 The Farm Service Agency County Executive Director, Warden Alexander, announced FSA issued a total of \$20,360 to Rockcastle County dairy farmers suffering financially record low milk prices hit.

The CCC Dairy Market Loss Assistance program was implemented based on a dairy operation's production of milk in 1997 or 1998. Payments are limited to the first 26,000 hundredweight of production in the selected year. This was done so as not to dilute the assistance available to eligible farmers who may be in the most need of the assistance and spread the payments more equitable among all dairy operations. All dairy farmers who produced milk during the last quarter of calendar year 1998 were eligible to sign up to receive payments under the program. Sign up for the program ran from April 12 to May 21, 1999.

CCC is a federal corporation established by law within USDA, CCC aids farmers through loans, purchases, payments and other operations to stabilize and protect farm income and prices. CCC also authorizes payments on agricultural commodities to other government agencies and to foreign governments, and food donations to domestic, foreign or international relief agencies. CCC is managed by a board of directors who are USDA representatives headed by the Secretary of Agriculture.

FLOOD COMPENSATION PROGRAM

On September 10, 1997, the Secretary of Agriculture declared a major disaster in the State of Kentucky because of damage to crops due to heavy rains and flash flooding, that occurred on June 16 and 17, 1997. Rockcastle County was one of the four counties that was declared eligible for Federal disaster assistance including FSA farm Service Agency emergency (EAM) loans.

There was \$42 million dollars made available for eligible producers who have incurred multi-year crop and grazing losses because of flooding. Twelve million will be used to compensate livestock and nonlivestock producers with eligible flooded land that was inaccessible or incapable of crop production, grazing or haying during FY 1998, and 30 million dollars for all eligible producers who have incurred multi-year crop and grazing losses because of flooding. Eligibility criteria is if a farm is inaccessible or incapable of production at all times during FY 1998 because of flooding and has been subject to continuous flooding since October 1, 1992.

Sign up for FCP is scheduled to begin on May 17, 1999 and end on July 2, 1999. Producers may file an application for benefits anytime during this sign up period in the county where the loss occurred. If there are any questions please call 606-256-2525 or stop by the Farm Service Agency during normal working hours.

ACREAGE REPORTS

Farm acreage reports of crops are now being taken for the current year. Producers are encouraged to report acres of crops for history, disaster programs and loan deficiency programs. Producers who have final reporting date, a late reporting fee will apply. The final reporting date for other crops, except small grains and tobacco is July 15th.

FARM CHANGES

Producer who have produced or sold land need to contact the local FSA office for proper reconstitution of farms. Farms not enrolled with FPC have until the deadline of July 1st to file for farm reconstitutions. Remember to bring your deed and/or to notify the new owner to do so. Also notify this office of any/all address changes. Remember our records are only as current as producers inform this office.

NONINSURED CROP DISASTER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) provides crop loss protection for growers of many crops for which FCIP insurance is not available.

Eligible crops are commercial crops grown for food and fiber. Also included are floriculture, ornamental nursery, Christmas tree crops, turfgrass and seed crops, aquaculture (including ornamental fish) and industrial crops. Also, losses resulting from natural disaster not covered by the crop insurance policy may be eligible for NAP assistance. NAP does not include trees grown for wood, paper or pulp products.

NAP crops are eligible when the expected "Area Yield" is less than 65 percent of normal. NAP payments are made to eligible producers when actual crop losses are based on 50 percent of the individual's approved yield at 60 percent of the crop's average market price (determined by FSA). Producers must report losses within 15 days of the crop loss.

Unlike previous disaster assistance programs, producers must file an acreage and production report with the local FSA office prior to the crop reporting date of July 15th. If acres and yields are not reported on time, producers may not be eligible for NAP assistance.

OFFICE CLOSURE:

FSA Office will be CLOSED-MONDAY, JULY 5th, in observance of Independence Day. The office will reopen Tuesday, July 6th.

me keenly aware of the debt that I owe to my father for the sacrifices he made for me. Thanks, Dad.

My own focus was continually drawn to the older son in this story. He was the "good guy" who had stayed home and dutifully worked on the farm with his father. I can identify with his feelings when his younger brother returns and Dad throws a party to celebrate! He felt his years of labor were unappreciated. Dad had never thrown a party for him.

I can readily identify with the feelings of the older brother because I am so much like him. I too tried to be the good guy who kept all the rules and did what I was told. We good guys have a more difficult time accepting the love of the father than do those who rebel. It is harder for us to enjoy a loving relationship with God than it is for those who rebel and return. We never let (at least in body), and it is more difficult for us to return.

The importance of the father's touch is evident in Rembrandt's painting. The father's hands are firmly on the shoulders of the younger son who kneels before him. The father's left hand is strong and firm, while his right hands looks soft and gentle. Both firmness and gentleness are a part of a father's love for his son.

Touch is absent in many places today. Because it is so powerful, we are afraid of it. The sensitive connection make us shy from physical expressions to love. Touch is essential to the growth of children. Studies of babies who are touched versus babies who receive little touch shows that the babies who receive physical affection grow more quickly and are healthier. Touch is also important as adults. One friend tells me that he calculates it takes eight hugs a day to maintain and twelve to grow.

This brief column cannot do justice to the spirit and substance of the study at St. Mildred's. Thank you, brothers, for allowing me to share that time with you.

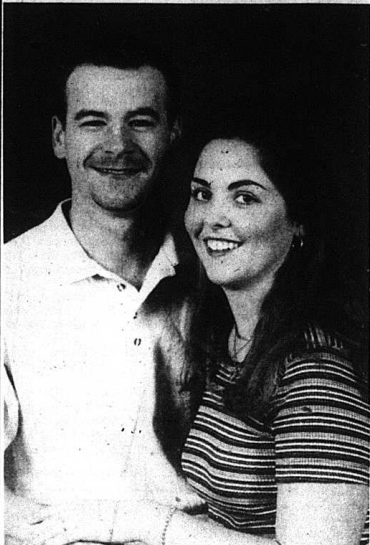

In an effort to bring greater awareness to crime prevention and safety this summer, the Kentucky State Police's 100 Days of Summer campaign offers citizens practical tips on how to keep themselves, their families and their property out of harm's way.

This week's topic is Home Security During Vacations.

Before you hit the road to your favorite destination this summer, the KSP offers these suggestions for keeping your home safe and secure as you travel:

- Ask a trusted neighbor, friend or family member to watch your house while you're away. Leave your vacation address and telephone number so that you can be reached in case of an emergency.
- Arrange for someone to mow your lawn and maintain the landscaping around your home. Burglars will notice if a home is not being properly tended.
- Have someone put your garbage cans at the curb on pick-up day and return them after garbage pick-up.
- Leave shades and blinds in a normal position.
- Stop all deliveries and ask someone to pick up your mail and newspapers EVERY DAY.
- Plug your lights, a radio and televisions into timers. Have them come off and on at appropriate times throughout the day and evening.
- Don't announce your absence on your answering machine!
- Close and lock garage doors and windows. If you only have one car, ask a neighbor to occasionally park in your driveway. If you will be leaving a vehicle in the driveway, ask the neighbor to move it several times throughout the time you will be gone.
- Do not leave valuables in your home. Lock them in a bank safety deposit box.
- If possible, do not kennel your dog. Have a friend, neighbor, family member or professional pet-care provider for your pet in your home. A dog can be an extremely effective deterrent in an otherwise unoccupied house.
- Make sure all windows and doors are securely locked.

Sex Offenders Prey on Young Family Members. They are male. They are 12 or younger. They are usually, they are the people most likely to be victimized by sex offenders, according to an extensive inmate-based study by the Bureau of Justice Statistics.

The study, which canvassed some 14,000 inmates imprisoned in 1991 or earlier for violent crimes, found that two-thirds of convicted sex offenders victimized a child, and that one-third raped or sexually assaulted their own child or step-child.

Of an estimated 61,000 offenders serving time for violent crimes against victims under 18, nearly 10 percent
