## Stewart says President vows to help

### Clinton got more realistic look at assets region has to offer companies

Rockcastle County resident and Chairman of Kentucky Highlands Investment Corporation Wayne Stewart, got to meet a very, very powerful man on Monday.

While he has shook the hands of Presidents Franklin Roosevelt and Jimmy Carter, and had audiences with United States Senators, U.S. Representatives, Kentucky Governors, and even the Vice-President of the United States Stewart had never sat down face to face with the most powerful man in the world before. Not before Monday, anyway.

United States President William Jefferson Clinton was in nearby Jackson County for a meeting at Mid-South Electronics, a company that Stewart's investment and development board had helped to locate in rural Kentucky and one that has created some 850 jobs.

"Whatever your personal opinions may be as to the President, I believe he is sincerely concerned about rural America and economic growth here," Stewart said.

Stewart, who is a retired business man, farmer and administrator of Rockcastle Hospital, was extremely upbeat about the hour and half long meeting with the nation's chief executive.

"He told us he would do everything he could to help depressed areas and benefit from the good things happening in this country," Stewart said.

"We wanted the President to see the better side of Appalachia and that is what he saw. He probably talked with 500 employees at Mid-South where the people are honest, hard-working and proud of what they do," Stewart said.

"We've always known what this area has to offer companies and I think the President of the United States knows it now," Stewart said.

Along with Stewart, nationally known artist and craftsman and local farmer William McClure, also a member of the highlands board met the President.

And his son-in-law, local award winning photographer Doug Brock, was allowed to take pictures of the President as he toured the Mid-South Plant.

"It was pretty awesome being three feet behind the President of the United States and four feet in front of the Governor (Patton)," Brock said.

"It was certainly an experience you won't forget. The 100 secret service agents, the atmosphere of being around the most powerful man in the world, was something else," he said.

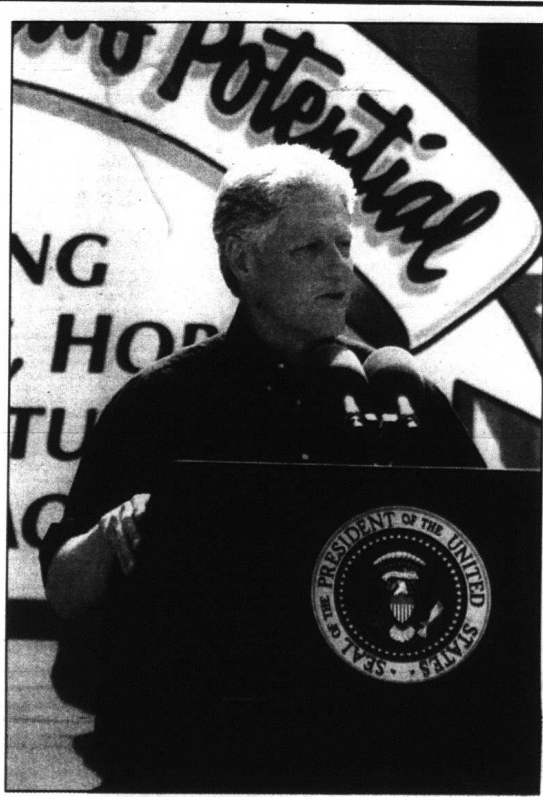
## Two sentenced

Eddy F. Montgomery, Acting Commonwealth Attorney for Rockcastle County, announced that at the June sessions of Rockcastle County Circuit Court two people were sent to prison.

According to Montgomery, Billy Jack Rayburn, 21, of Mt. Vernon, was sentenced to two years imprisonment for the offense of being under the Unlawful Taking, Wanton Endangerment, Criminal Mischief and Receiving Stolen Property. Rayburn is currently serving a five year sentence of imprisonment for probation violation.

Glen Thomas Martin, 28, of Rt. 3, Mt. Vernon, was sentenced to a period of eight years imprisonment. Martin was convicted in May by a Rockcastle County jury of the offenses of four counts of Wanton Endangerment, First Degree and one count being a Persistent Felony Offender, Second Degree. Testimony was presented during the trial by witnesses the Constable Dale Miller agreeing to arrest Martin after receiving a complaint to him "buffing" gasoline. Martin then tried to shoot Miller with Miller's gun, however Miller was aware of Martin's prior history of resisting arrest had six-chambered his 9mm handgun. Constable Miller was aided in the struggle by Jesse Mullins, Rodney Mullins and Kelly Mullins all of Snyder Community in Rockcastle County. The four were made all re-

## Utility companies spend millions to avoid a "bug"

Electric utilities around the country are taking steps to make sure the lights stay on as the century turns. And the North American Electric Reliability Council predicts they will be successful.

"We don't feel there's going to be a problem keeping the lights on," says Gerry Cauley, the council's program manager, although he notes, "There are no guarantees."

Utilities have been working for more than two years to nip the so-called "millennium bug" before the next New Year's Eve.

The company that provides electricity to thousands of homes in Rockcastle County, East Kentucky Power, Jackson Energy's wholesale power supplier, has spent more than \$5 million replacing equipment to prepare equipment for the next year. The Year 2000 or Y2K threat is that some computers at utilities and other businesses rely, in part, on the date to do their jobs. The month, day and year are programmed into each computer on what's known as an embedded chip.

For a utility, a malfunctioning computer could shut down a process that makes electricity or sends it to homes and businesses. It could mean that electric meters won't make accurate readings or that bills won't go out on time.

So utilities are working now to identify which process rely on embedded chips with two-digit dates. They're finding some, and they're taking several steps to prevent those

outdated chips from causing problems on the century's biggest New Year's Eve.

Jackson Energy, the cooperative that sends electricity to your home, buys that power from another utility, East Kentucky Power Cooperative. East Kentucky Power has already set the dates on several power generation units ahead so that they have rolled over to the year 2000 and they are operating without any problems.

Don Schaefer, Jackson's Energy's Y2K Team Leader and Engineering & Operations manager, notes that utilities are always working to keep the lights on - no matter what year it is.

"Electric utilities are always prepared for outages," he says. "If there's an outage because of something at a substation, we've probably already thought about how to deal with having that particular substation out of service."

"People's biggest question is, 'Will the lights stay on?' I don't think anybody can answer that with 100 percent certainty, but electric utilities have been pretty good about keeping the lights on so far through all sorts of other challenges."

Jackson Energy Equipment Almost Ready for Y2K  
When it comes to preparing equipment for Y2K compliance, local cooperatives are at an advantage, according to Jackson Energy's Engineering & Operations Manager Don Schaefer.

"We simply don't have as much equipment that's date sensitive, like the large generation and transmission utilities," Schaefer says. He also serves as the co-op's Y2K team leader.

For Jackson Energy, Schaefer explains, there are three main types of equipment on electric lines that could have date problems:

- meter controls, which clear faults on electric lines,
- regulator controls, which assure power voltage and
- capacitor controls, which switch

on capacitors when they are needed.

"All of this equipment has been checked and verified to be Y2K compliant by the manufacturers," Schaefer says.

Other co-op equipment that has been verified Y2K compliant includes the two-way radio communications system used by Jackson Energy employees, the equipment used to read meters and security systems sold through the co-op's diversified services division and marketed through Jackson Energy.

"We are currently waiting on an update for our billing system," Schaefer says, "and most of the PCs used by our office personnel are new computers and are compliant."

Schaefer expects to have Jackson Energy's equipment Y2K compliant by June 1999.

On the national and regional level, two Y2K tests are planned for the country's generation and transmission utilities, which produce the nation's electricity and for the national power grid before the end of the year. The power grid is the national system used to distribute generated electric power on a regional level. One test was April 19 and another is set for September 9. East Kentucky Power, Jackson Energy's wholesale power

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## Council votes to re-post job at high school

The newly elected site based decision making council at the Rockcastle County High School wasted no time last week in discussing and taking action on a new principal for the high school.

During their first meeting as a council, the five members voted unanimously to re-post the principal's job at the high school for 30 days.

But, because the job has already been posted before hand, the council can and likely will begin interviews of the applicants in about two weeks.

Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond said Tuesday that he had officially re-posted the job last Friday and that as of Wednesday morning, he had no new applicants to turn over to the new council.

The new council will try to do something last year's council at RCHS was unable to do, after interviewing three local candidates.

Hammond said that all three, Rockcastle County Middle School Principal John Hale, Interim Principal Ruth Allen and former RCHS teacher and now a consultant for the state department of education Betty Jo McKinney had indicated to him that they were still interested in the job and wanted to be interviewed by

the new council.

Hammond said that none of them had to formally reapply for the position.

The job opening at RCHS occurred last August when longtime principal Ronnie Cash was fired.

After months of delay, the old council at RCHS interviewed McKinney, Hale and Allen, but because their decision had to be a unanimous one, no principal was hired and Allen served as interim principal the entire school year.

Superintendent Hammond said that at last week's meeting the council discussed changing the by-laws of the council from it being mandatory for a unanimous vote to four to one majority vote.

Hammond said that the council took no action, but agreed to discuss the changing of the by-laws at their next meeting on July 13.

Board member Jennifer Mattingly was elected as vice-chairman of the committee in the absence of a full-time principal.

Current members of the council at RCHS are teachers, Jennifer Mattingly, Adam Coleman and Janet Wells. Parent members are Roy Adams and Cindy Anderkin.

## President's limo breaks down in Rockcastle Co.

Although the leader of the free world didn't make any stops in Rockcastle County on Monday, part of President Bill Clinton's staff and at least one of his limousines made a brief unscheduled stop.

As staff members were taking Clinton's car back to Bluegrass Field from Hazard, so it could be transported to Memphis, it broke down on the interstate just across the Rockcastle River in Rockcastle County.

Apparently members of the President's staff contacted state police and state police contacted David Eaton of Central Body Service in Mt. Vernon.

"I told them I would be glad to haul the President's car to Lexington for them, but before I got there they had gotten it running again and were on their way up I-75," Eaton said.

The car that hauls the President weighs approximately 8,500 pounds and has a wheel base of 12 and a half feet.

"The only problem may have been that it would have drug because it was so long, but I told them we'd check that when I got there," he said.

"I'd say it probably just overheated because of its size on its trip through the mountains," Eaton said.

## President Clinton tours Mid-South

Jerry Weaver, who went out on a limb to build the Mid-South Electronics plant in nearby Jackson County, was one of the most powerful men in the world Monday.

Mid-South was a focal point of President Bill Clinton's trip to Eastern Kentucky Monday to highlight his "new markets" initiative. Clinton is trying to lure companies into areas that have not benefited as much as the rest of the county amid a booming national economy.

Weaver, who lives in Alabama but attended school at Annville Institute, decided years ago to give something back to the community that raised him by bringing much-needed jobs to Jackson County.

It was a risky venture to build a manufacturing plant in a rural area some 30 miles from a major highway. But Weaver's faith paid off, and Mid-South now employs 850 people, some of those from Rockcastle County. Weaver also owns Highland Diversified Services in London.

Touring Mid-South provided

Clinton with a perfect example how initiative and capital can combine with local work ethic to form a successful venture in economically depressed areas.

Mid-South will soon complete a \$6 million expansion financed in part by a loan from the federal empowerment zone program, which Clinton initiated several years ago.

Weaver said the loan played a key role in giving him the confidence to expand capacity and jobs at the plant.

Weaver said he also thinks Clinton's new market initiative could help the region.

"I think it'll take the whole Appalachian area and assist it, if business people participate," he said.

## Helpmate

Mat and his brother, Dee, might be the best architects and builders of The Farm House, without asking my opinion, except that one time when I asked which room it was when actually it was the whole house they had outlined and wanted to know what I thought about it, and my answer almost exploded back in my face as they yelled in unison, what do you mean -- which room? Why this is the whole house? Yet, they never hesitated to ask for my help when they needed an extra helper after the work hands finished their day and an extra hand was needed to pick up the nails and trash left behind. Also to hold the board in place when either, or both, wanted to work late and do the particular carpentry both were capable of doing.

So, I became the helper after work hours. Even before we moved into the house, I helped lay the sub floor. This was made of shiplapped six inch boards and nailed to the joists beneath, then the nail heads were sanded by tapping a counter punch placed on top of the nail with a hammer and

filling the indentation with wood putty. Each board was pried closely to the first while nailing it in place so there would be a sign of a crack between. Cracks did appear later when the boards were more fully cured and when I had used the forbidden water to clean the floors. This was when I learned the difference in shiplapped and tongue and groove lumber. I was also learning how to do a hammer correctly so a light stroke would be more effective than a heavier stroke with the same hammer held farther out on the handle. And measuring to the tiniest degree of an inch was soon learned by using the steel tape line and marking the spot with a sharp pencil. After the floor was in place, the baseboards, window and door frames had to be installed and Mat would not have dared allow such a particular job as this to be done by anyone but himself. By now his brother, Dee, had finished his part of the building and gone about his other business so guess who his helper was? It was I that was quickly elected to fill that position without much of a chance to say I also had other business to do.

Mat had chosen the best cured pine lumber he could find to do this framing with and, at the same time, choose three inch wide boards of the same quality to put ceilings up overhead. I will admit I thought it was the wrong kind of material for ceilings for I had always been used to plaster overhead, but I will also admit it turned out to be one of the most beautiful and unusual ceilings in the area. Especially after everything was varnished with two or three coats of valparaiso. These jobs all needed two sets of hands to do them so it was left up to me to be his helper and therefore had an honest to goodness part in building our home.

When we first moved to the "Buffalo School area" or "Campbell Ridge," as it was often called, or "the country," as my folks expressed it, I was in for a lot of changes in my life, the most important of them being coming my husband's helpmate. This went beyond keeping house, bearing his children and cooking. It included learning how to assist him in building our home, milking a cow, building and keeping a fire going in a wood burning stove long enough to cook a meal and also learning how to use a crosscut saw, but never an ax, to help in clearing out overcrowded young trees for stovewood or cutting down call timber for market. And, the longer I lived there, the more things I learned to do. Oh, yes, and another was picking up rocks and helping him build or improve the roads that were our only way out to what, at that time, we called civilization.

During the spring and summer, we had to find time and a way to reimburse our dwindling savings since most of it had been spent on building materials and existence. We had timber all around us but, in recent years, it had been cut till only the second growth and call timber were left. So Mat decided to use the call trees and allow the larger ones to grow for later use. I didn't know one thing about timber nor how one saved it down and cut it into usable lengths for market. But, I soon learned -- the hard way. One morning, Mat put a crosscut saw, an ax and some wedges and something for Jerry to ston with on the work and we took out for a section close by that had what he called bug wood on it. These were small, crooked or partly decayed young trees that would never grow

into marketable timber and there was a market for them in London. I think they were ground into saw dust for some commercial purpose. I do know they brought a very low price and it was hardly worth our time to cut and deliver them but we valued anything that would help with the building and keep us going till something better came along. Then Mat heard of a place buying dogwood for nine times what we were getting. So we went to Highway 80 by using the rocks in and around the yard and garden to do so. Maybe then we could have a lawn for our future children to play on instead of the truck bed for Mat to haul to the horse racks and beat them with a sledge hammer into smaller pieces that wouldn't damage tires or cause other ruts to form on either side. This was backbreaking and sweat-drenching work that was unending. 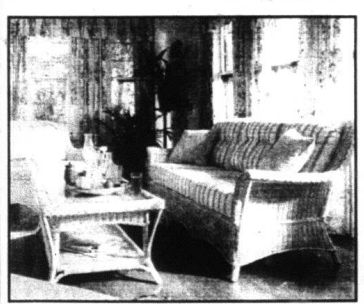
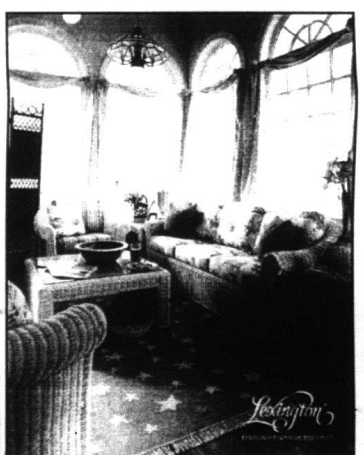
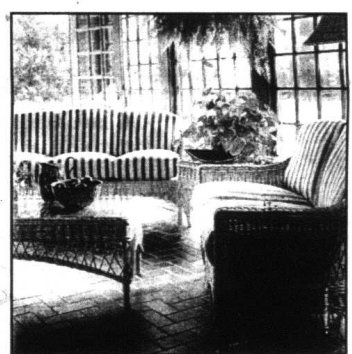


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# Library News

The Summer Reading Program is rapidly coming to a close with only a few days left for the children to finish their reading logs. They must be turned in on Monday, July 12th. The Arts Fest will be held Thursday evening at 6 p.m. There will be lots of fun for the children and the awards will be given out that evening. Lynda will have an article next week with more details about the evening. The children that are enrolled on the bookmobile will also be welcome to participate in the Arts Fest.

I think I have been made more aware this summer of the fact that our young people just aren't reading like they did when they were younger. I remember the young people that used to participate in the Summer Reading Programs and now whenever see them unless they come in to get information for school reports. I realize they do spend a lot of time in homework when school is in session but it would be good to spend some leisure time in reading. In order to help improve on this, we have set up a collection of books for teenagers and young adults. This is located in the adult section next to the fiction books. There is some excellent reading material available for these young people if we could

just get them interested again. I would encourage anyone with teenagers to get them to come in and see what we have to offer. We have a few magazines and I will purchase more if there is an interest.

This is the beginning of a new fiscal year for us at the library. This year has been one of the most successful years that the library has experienced since I have been the director. There have been more advancements in technology than anything field. Some of accomplishments in technology, and others are: 1. Four new computers donated from the Gates Foundation and one computer with video-conferencing from Empower Kentucky have been added and the staff has been trained to assist our patrons with their needs. 1964 people used the computers this year. 2. A first-ever inventory was completed on August 3. A first-ever audit was completed on December 4. A security system and an intercom system is now in use. 5. Approximately 30,200 patrons and guests visited the library this past fiscal year. 6. 29,491 books, 5,385 videos and 2,069 audio tapes were checked out. 7. There were story hours held 48 times with an average

attendance of 10 children each week. 8. The children's librarian received a scholarship to attend the McConnell Institute workshop. 9. A grant from Brodat for children's books gave us 95 new easy and juvenile non-fiction books. 10. And last but certainly not least was the library received a grant in the amount of \$10,000 from the Department For Libraries and Archives toward the automation projects. This was awarded in this last fiscal year but the automation process will not begin until later this year. Our library will be responsible for the balance owing on this project, approximately another \$10,000.

There has been a lot of work done by the staff and the library board in bringing all of these things together, but it has been very rewarding. The library trustees and myself have spent a lot of hours preparing grant forms in order to have these new computers and the grant for automation. Also, many hours were spent in applying for funds from the SLC Foundation to receive a discount on telecommunications. I feel a lot of people take the work done by the board of trustees for granted. They spend a lot of time in working for the library and all but one have full time jobs elsewhere. By working together many accomplishments have been made and these have all been done with limited funds. I am certainly feel good about my part in making this one of the best years ever and I hope this trend will continue for many years to come. There is always room for improvements and we continually look for ways to give better service to the public.

Two new fiction books I would like to tell you about are 1. *Granny Dan* by Danielle Steel. She was the cherished grandmother who sang songs in Russian, loved to roller skate and spoke little of her past. But when Granny Dan died, all that remained was a box wrapped in brown paper, tied with a string. Inside, an old pair of satin shoes, a good pocket and a stack of letters tied with a worn ribbon. It was her legacy, her secret past, waiting to be discovered by the granddaughter who loved her but never really knew her. It was a story waiting to be told. So begins this new

book by Danielle Steel. It tells the wonderful story of Granny Dan and her early life as a ballerina in Russia and the boy she truly loved before coming to Vermont and beginning her life in America.

We also have the audio tape of *Granny Dan*. *The Soldier Spies* by W.E. Griffin. As the Soldier Spies opens, it is November 1942. War is raging in Europe and the invasion of North Africa has begun. In Washington, OSS Chief William I. Donovan finds himself fighting a rear-guard battle against an unexpected enemy: the

intelligence chiefs back home. In Morocco, Second Lieutenant Eric Fulmar waits in the desert for a car containing two top-level defectors or will be full of SS men instead? In England Major Richard Canby gets the mission of his life: to penetrate into the heart of Germany and bring out the man with the Secret of the jet engine, before the Germans grab hold of him. In France, the Allies must find a way to breach the seemingly impenetrable German submarine pens at St-Laizere. The only hope? An experimental, pilotless flying bomb. Or at least that's what a Lieutenant named Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr., thinks.

## Osteoporosis

More and more Americans - as many as 25 million - have some degree of osteoporosis. Osteoporosis is a crippling bone disease.

Osteoporosis develops slowly, so slowly that it often takes years before you realize you have it. But then it's too late. Your bones become brittle. Your hip bone could crack. Your wrist might break. You may get shorter because the bones in your spine collapse. You might even develop a hump on your back.

There is no cure for osteoporosis. And that's tragic - because you can take steps to prevent osteoporosis. And the time to prevent it is now. Your bones grow longer when you're a teenager. But in your 20's and 30's you can make your bones stronger and denser. This is your once-in-a-lifetime chance to build up

your bone deposits. If you eat less than 2 servings of milk, cheese, or yogurt a day, your diet may be low in calcium. And you're not alone. Half of all American women are not meeting the Recommended Dietary Allowance for calcium.

Milk and milk products (cheese, yogurt) are some of the best sources of calcium. In fact, three-quarters of the calcium in the American food supply comes from milk products. Two to three servings from the Milk Group (four if you're under 25), plus the other foods you eat, supply all the calcium you need in a day. And, with so many dairy products to choose from, you can watch your calories and your calcium at the same time.

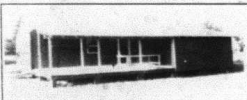

why they don't know right from wrong, and why it doesn't bother them to kill.

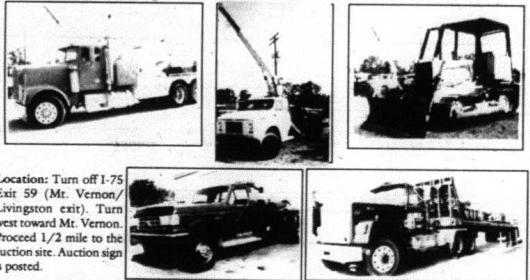
Probably, if we think about it long and hard enough, we can figure it out. I think it has a great deal to do with "we reap what we sow."

## 1999-2000 Rockcastle County High School Dress Code & Discipline Policies

### 1999-2000 Dress Code

Dress code requirements apply to all students (male and female) and are to be followed during school hours, during school-sponsored events, and during extracurricular activities. Students that are participating in Physical Education must also adhere to all dress code requirements before entering the hallways or classrooms. Those teachers of the physical education classes will set the dress codes for the physical education classes. However, shirts (those meeting dress code standards) must be worn at ALL times.

- Shoes must be worn at all times.
- Shorts, skirts, dresses, and skorts (including those worn with leggings, etc.) must be no shorter than three inches from the top of the knee.
- No sleeveless shirts are permitted. This includes both males and females. This policy must also be adhered to while in attendance in physical education courses, both in the building and out of the building. Only those students that participate in a sport or club that have sleeveless shirts that are a recognized part of an official school uniform, will be the only ones to vary from this. Those types of shirts can only be worn during regular practice/competition times following the conclusion of the school day.
- Students are not permitted to possess nor wear sunglasses, hats (unless on a school recognized team/activity that a cap/hat is part of the recognized uniform one to do so such as softball and baseball, or JROTC), caps, nor bandanas.
- No clothing shall be permitted which promotes alcohol or drugs or which bears offensive language, pictures, signs, or offensive insinuations. Examples include, but are not limited to, "Big Johnson", "Co-ed Naked", "Hooters", and numerous other brand names.
- All clothing must be properly buttoned, snapped, or otherwise fastened. This includes the straps on overalls. They must be buttoned properly the entire time they are worn.
- See-through clothing, bare midriffs, and clothing containing holes which show bare skin above the knees are prohibited, as in any article of clothing considered indecent or distracting.
- Shirts must be of length that they could be tucked in and remained tucked throughout the course of the school day. We are not attempting to enforce that shirts be tucked in, but to enforce the fact that shirts must be or proper length to cover the midriff region the entire time the shirt is worn.
- All clothing must be "form-fitting". Clothing that is excessively baggy will not be tolerated. This includes the bell-bottom and barrel-legged pants.
- All pants and shorts must be worn on the waist. The waist is considered for this purposes, the area ABOVE the tip of the hipbones. At no time will any undergarments that are normally worn under the pants/shorts be seen.
- COATS. At no time are trench coats, nor dusters allowed. Any coat or jacket is considered to be excessively large can be required to be removed and placed in the student's locker or the office area at any time the administration sees fit.
- DRESS CODE REQUIREMENTS MUST BE MET WHILE ON FIELD TRIPS/SCHOOL-SPONSORED ACTIVITIES. These trips/activities are viewed as an extension of the school and are within the jurisdiction of the school and the school's discipline policies.
- Dress codes for homecoming, prom, and other school events will be developed by committee well in advance of those events.

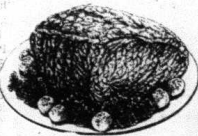

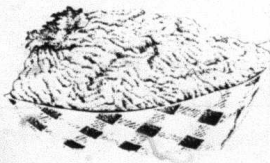

 know will always last.

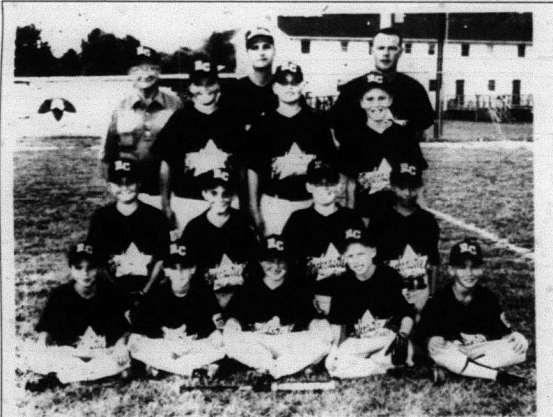

supplier, is already running most of their power generation date equipment in the year 2000 with no problems.

### Consumers Buying Generators Need To Take Precautions

As the turn of the century approaches, managers of rural electric cooperatives agree there's probably no need for consumers to buy backup generators. But if you do bring one home, know this: An improperly installed device can kill a utility line-worker.

"Generators are fine if they're installed correctly," says Jackson Energy General Manager Doug Leary, "but our linemen are in extreme danger when there are generators present."

Here's why: When you connect a generator to your home's wiring sys-

tem, the energy it generates flows back onto the utility's power lines. So even a line that has been knocked down and is verified to be dead by the utility can become energized without warning. If a lineworker touches that line, he'll be electrocuted.

The only sure way to prevent this is to install a double-throw switch that can separate the generator from the utility's service. The switch ensures that the electricity your generator creates flows only into your house, effectively disconnecting your home's internal wiring system from the utility's distribution system.

Here's some advice for homeowners who buy generators:

- Buy one that's just big enough to run your medical equipment, refrigerator and lights - not an expensive, stand-alone generator that keeps the whole house going. There's no need for a double-throw switch on a small generator if it's not connected to the house's wiring.
- Have a licensed electrician install it.

• Make your electric cooperative aware that you have a generator. That way, the co-op can make a note that there's a generator present if they're working in your neighborhood.

Here are some other tips for consumers concerned about the millennium bug from the Federal Trade Commission.

- If you have a personal computer, PC software, fax machine, camcorder, camera, digital wrist-watch, monitored security system or Global Positioning System unit, contact the manufacturer to see whether your product has the potential for a Y2K problem.

• Make a list of your other household products with a calendar function. Contact the manufacturer by phone or mail to find out compliance status.

• If your credit cards expire after 1/1/00, carry a credit card with an earlier expiration date as a backup in case a retailer's equipment is unable to process the 99 card.

The President's Council on Year 2000 Conversion also has a toll free number for consumers to receive Y2K information. You can call 1 888-USA-

4-Y2K for free information in common areas such as power, telephone, banking, government programs and household products. Information specialists will staff the line from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. (EST), Monday-Friday.

warm without power in January. If you live in a cold climate, there is a very real danger of freezing to death in your own home.

Have enough cash on hand to last for several weeks. Don't expect credit cards or checks to be accepted anywhere. Don't expect ATMs to be working. Do expect price gouging and profiteering.

• Don't fly. Military and commercial planes may not fall out of the sky when their on-board computers tick over at midnight, but the air traffic control system is sure to crash. The FAA is very far behind on Y2K compliance. They don't expect to be done until years into the next century.

• Stay away from nuclear power plants. The NRC may force them to shut down in the days or hours before Y2K, but whatever happens, don't stay downwind from one.

• Stay out of elevators between 12/31/99 and whenever things settle down. Remember elevators are controlled by computers. Even if the computers don't fail, you will be stuck if the power goes out.

• Stay out of subways. Unless you enjoy being trapped in the dark deep underground with hundreds of strangers.

• Stockpile candles, lanterns, flashlights and batteries. Remember, without power, it gets dark after sundown.

• Top off your car's gas tank. Gas pumps don't work without power, and fuel deliveries may be delayed.

• Befriend your neighbors. Pool your resources. Help each other.

## "WHAT SAITH THE SCRIPTURES"

We continue our study of the priesthood of Jesus Christ which is after the order of Melchisedec, as Ps 110:4 said it would be. There are 3 things that relate to the historical priest Melchisedec and Jesus.

First, Melchisedec of old had no genealogical record - "Without father, without mother, without descent, having neither beginning of days, nor end of life, but made like unto the Son of God, abideth a priest continually." Heb 7:3. Now some have mistaken the point - "Without father, without mother, without descent" to mean that he had no earthly parents. No, the writer is simply proving that there was no historical record of his genealogy. Nor does Jesus have to prove a particular genealogy to be a priest after this order. Under the law, men had to prove to be of the tribe of Levi, a descendant of Aaron.

Secondly, we are introduced to Melchisedec - "having neither beginning of days, nor end of life." But coming on the scene, he was priest, and there was no record of his death. So in a sense, he is like Jesus, "but made like unto the Son of God, abideth a priest continually." Jesus' priesthood lasts through the entire gospel age, for he ever liveth.

Thirdly, he is like Melchisedec because he serves both as king and priest. In Heb 7:1 we read, "For this Melchisedec, king of Salem, priest of the most high God, who met Abraham returning from the slaughter of the kings, and blessed him." Notice the prophecy of Zech 6:13: "Even he shall build the temple of the LORD, and he shall bear the glory, and shall sit and rule upon his throne; and he shall be a priest upon his throne; and the counsel of peace shall be between them both." Notice Jesus would be priest upon his throne. If Jesus is not King now as some teach, he is not priest now! But in truth, Jesus is King and Priest!
