Local man killed in I-75 wreck

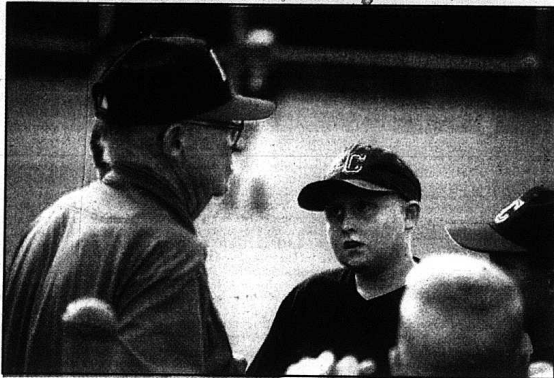
A Calloway man died Tuesday night in an auto accident on Interstate 75.

Killed in the 10:00 p.m. accident was Boyd J. Scalf, 33, of Calloway, according to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell.

Dowell said that Scalf apparently died instantly from blunt force trauma, after being struck by a mini-van. According to Kentucky State Trooper Lefe Owens, Scalf's vehicle was pulled over to the side of the interstate between the 52 and 53 mile marker of the interstate and Scalf was standing beside it, when he was hit by the mini-van. Owens said that the mini-van then hit Scalf's truck causing it to flip over on its top in the slow lane of the interstate.

The driver of the mini-van, Rachael Hennein, 20, of Collegedale, TN, was treated for minor injuries at the Rockcastle Hospital, according to Owens.

Scalf's body was taken to Bowling Funeral Home in London, where arrangements were incomplete at press time.

Allen chosen as principal at high school

Rockcastle County High School finally has a new principal.

On Friday afternoon, the five member site based council at the school, unanimously recommended interim principal Ruth Allen for the job, which has been vacant for nearly a year.

Allen was one of three local applicants interviewed for the job. The other two were Rockcastle Middle School principal John Hale and writing consultant for the State Department of Education, Betty Jo McKinney.

The five member committee spent eight hours Wednesday conducting interviews and discussing the applicants.

The council also discussed the matter for nearly three hours on Friday before making a final decision.

Allen, who taught English at RCHS for more than 20 years, was picked as administrative assistant in 1997.

In 1998, she was named assistant principal and last year, she was placed as interim principal after the firing of then principal Ronnie Cash.

Allen said Tuesday that she was looking forward to the task at hand.

"I appreciate the confidence the council has shown in me and I will work very hard with the staff at RCHS to make this school the best it can be."

she said.

Administrative Assistant Barry Noble was also hired as a full-time assistant principal by the council.

His job title was simply changed after he received his certification.

He has worked in the office at RCHS since 1997 when he was hired the same time as Ms. Allen.

Now, Ms. Allen and a committee appointed by her will seek someone to fill her old position as assistant principal.

Consolidation of Ky's counties

Ever think there would not be a Rockcastle County, Kentucky.

At least not until the end of time, right?

When the Kentucky General As-

sembly meets in 2000, the consolidation of Kentucky's 120 counties and some of its cities will be discussed.

Rockcastle County's State Senator Albert Robinson of London, is chairman of the Senates powerful

state and local government committee that will consider legislation to make it possible for counties to merge with counties and/or cities merge with counties.

Robinson, who also chairs the

task force that is forming legislation for the consolidation of counties, said Tuesday that counties such as Rockcastle shouldn't worry about being lumped in with other larger counties such as Laurel and Madison, if they don't want to be put in with them.

"I will not let anything out of my committee that forces counties or cities to do anything, it will simply be permissive legislation that allows citizens to do what they want to," Robinson said.

"Some people have suggested that I kill the legislation all together, but I don't think that would be wise, because supporters of this measure may come back at a later date and have the votes to force mandatory consolidation across the state," Robinson said.

Rockcastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis, who is against the measure in any form, said Tuesday that such a law would take away local government from the people.

"Right now anyone that wants anything can come in and talk with the Judge-Executive, magistrates, clerks, sheriff or whomever, but if we were lumped with another county that wouldn't be the case," he said.

As for the argument that the consolidation of counties would save money, Carlotis said that was not the case at all.

"Salaries are based upon population and if you put counties together, the elected officials are going to make much more in salary," he said.

He also pointed out that there would have to be satellite offices in each county to take care of the people's business, so in essence you would still have the expense of running a government although the main of-

Storm damage heaviest in the Brindle Ridge area Some residents still cleaning up

A week after a very strong storm blew through Rockcastle County residents in the Brindle Ridge area are still cleaning up from the damage.

Probably the hardest hit in the area was Dogwood Gifts and Crafts and Garden Center owned by Don and Joyce Gabbard.

Three of the Gabbard's four greenhouses were completely destroyed and the main building was damaged in the Tuesday evening storm that swept through the county.

Mrs. Gabbard estimated the damage to her business at around \$10,000, and there was no insurance.

Mrs. Gabbard said that her son was trying to put down the sides on the greenhouse during the storm and was actually piked up by the high winds and thrown to the ground.

The national weather service has

estimated that winds were exceeding 70 miles per hour that night.

Mrs. Gabbard said it would take months for her family to re-build the greenhouses, but that they intended to do so.

Not far from the Gabbard's business, a mobile home owned by Darron Sigmon was moved nearly 20 feet off its foundation by the high winds.

Also, most of the crop damage reported after the storm was in the Brindle Ridge area.

Corn and tobacco were hit hardest, but Rockcastle County Agricultural Agent Tom Mills said that most of the crops had rebounded nicely from the damage.

"A lot of tobacco and corn that was on the ground after the storm has stood back up and a lot of farmers weren't hurt as bad as they originally

thought," he said.

Gloria Robbins, with the local Farm Service Agency, said that farmers who had losses from the storm should come to her office on Hwy. 150 and file a 574 form for disaster credit, whether they have insurance or not.

Former resident indicted for not paying support

A former Rockcastle County man was arrested in Texas last week after he was indicted for failure to pay child support.

Bill Plummer, 44, of Benbrook, Texas was indicted on July 9.

He is accused of failing to pay \$19,890 in child support to an infant daughter over a 12 year period.

Plummer was arrested in Texas on July 16 and Rockcastle Sheriff Shirley Smith, his wife Libby and deputy Charles Gray, picked him up at the Fort Worth Detention Center on July 23.

Plummer was released on bond on July 27.

However, he was required to post

Agricultural News

FSA Programs net Rockcastle County farmers over \$311 thousand during past year

As farm commodity prices continue to fall, local farmers have been able to benefit from programs administered by the local Farm Service Agency (FSA). From July 1, 1998 through June 30, 1999, Rockcastle County farmers have received \$311,342.00 in cash payments, with \$148,231.00 coming in the past three months.

"Our agricultural economy has been declining in recent years," Rockcastle County FSA Director Warden Alexander said, "and in response to this decline, Congress has made additional funds available to help strengthen the AG economy."

The most recent program payments to farmers have come from the Dairy Market Loss Assistance Program, which resulted in \$20,360.00 being distributed to county dairy producers.

"The Dairy Market Loss Assistance Program resulted in dairy farmers receiving 22.48 cents per hundredweight on their production losses," Alexander said.

Other significant payments to local farmers in the past year came from other one time programs such as the Crop Loss Disaster Assistance Program (\$126,449.00), the Small Hog Operation Payment (SHOP) Program (\$702.00), and the Market Loss Assistance Program for corn and wheat (\$46,655.00).

Farmers have also received payments from ongoing programs such as the Production Crop Flexibility Payments (\$111,275.00 for 1998 and 1999).

"We realize that program payments do not offset the farmers' total loss by any means," Alexander said, "but they do provide needed cash flow."

Loans Available to Assist Farmers

The local FSA office also provides loans to assist farmers in purchasing farm land and for operating expenses. According to Bobby Hornsby, Rockcastle Co. FSA Farm Loan Manager, FSA currently has direct and guaranteed loans available to Rockcastle County farmers.

FSA makes loans to farmers who cannot obtain needed credit from private sources at rates and terms they can meet. "The majority of the loans we make now are guaranteed loans where a private lender, such as a bank or Farm Credit Services provide the funds, with FSA guaranteeing the loan to the lender," Mr. Hornsby explained. FSA also makes direct loans for operating expenses and farm ownership (real estate), Mr. Hornsby said.

Farmers can apply for direct operating loans up to a maximum of \$200,000. Direct farm ownership loans are also available up to a maximum of \$200,000.

FSA has a combination guaranteed operation and farm ownership loan with a maximum of \$700,000. The interest rate on these loans is negotiated between the borrower and lender.

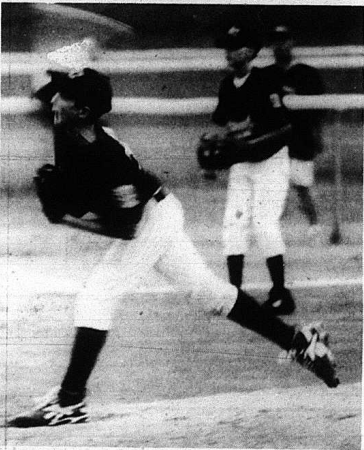

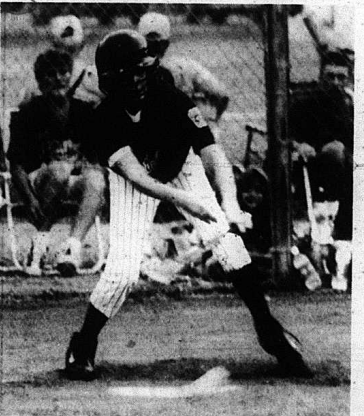

ices would be in another county. State Representative Danny Ford, of Mt. Vernon, who is the House Minority Leader in Frankfort, said that he is against the consolidation of counties as well.

He said that he doesn't think the legislation has much support in the house, but that it is still too early to tell.

He agreed with Carlotfis on the issue of saving money, he doesn't think it will and he also believes that such a measure would limit the average citizens access to local government.

But, he was quick to point out,

that it seems for now anyway, that Kentucky Governor Paul Patton is for the measure.

"We all know that he is a governor that wants to be remembered for big changes in Kentucky during his administration," Ford said.

"If the Governor throws all his weight behind the legislation, that would make it a whole new ballgame," Ford said.

Robinson said that the safeguard for counties that do not want to merge with another one will be the way such a vote is cast on the issue.

"For example you will not have 55,000 people in Madison County and 15,000 people in Rockcastle County going together for a vote," Robinson said.

The 15,000 people in Rockcastle County would vote separately from the 55,000 in Madison and the only way a merger could occur would be if both counties approved it in their own counties," Robinson said.

"If we were put in with a large county like Madison, Laurel or Pulaski how many things do you think the former Rockcastle County would receive from government, very, very little," Carlotfis said.

As it stands now only two other states, Georgia and Texas have more counties than Kentucky.

The consolidation of counties, casino gambling and big hike in gas taxes will be among the hot topics that will take center stage in the 2000 general assembly.

 Instead, Ann chose to live her life as fully as she could rather than give in to the disease. She and I worked together planning and leading conferences. She enjoyed teaching and helping people. Her chosen career was one of service to others.
 Choice did make a difference in Ann's life. While chance affected her, the ultimate quality of her life was determined by the choices she made. She chose to live, rather than to die in bitterness.
 Life is too complicated for one simple answer to work in all situations. Someone may feel that chance has ruined his life. Another may think that she is burdened with more tragedy than she can endure. I would not presume to tell these folks what they "ought" to do in their situations.
 I am convinced, however, that the sign on the church is right: "choice no chance determines our destiny."
 What I make of my life is up to me. It is not simply a matter left to chance.

Does Choice or Chance Determine Our Destiny?
 I drive by the church every day on my way to work, so I could not miss the sign out front: "choice no chance determines destiny." I am grateful to those folks for displaying that thought because it set me to thinking.
 Does choice or chance determine our destiny? Do we have control over what happens to us or are we at the mercy of fate? Obviously whoever posted that sign believes that we have control.

My friend Ann might argue with them. She has post-polio syndrome. That is a particularly nasty disease because it strikes those who were already struck by polio as a child. Not only did she endure polio in the 1950s, but now she is barely able to walk with this latest attack of post-polio. She certainly did not choose to have either of these problems.
 The family of the young man killed in the car wreck might also disagree with that sign on the church. He was not drinking nor did he go to sleep at the wheel. Instead a drunken driver hit him and killed him instantly. Again it seems that chance determined his destiny.
 I can point to many instances where things happen in our world seemingly by chance. In these situations the individual has little choice. Being in the wrong place at the wrong time can bring tragedy. If he had just been a few seconds earlier or later, he would still be alive.
 Do these people deserve what happens to them? Perhaps the illness or accident is punishment for sin. Jesus' disciples once asked him who had sinned that the man should be born blind, he or his parents. They believed that tragedy was the result of sin. Jesus stood that belief on its ear when he said, "Neither." The man's blindness was not the result of sin.
 There does seem to me to be an element of chance in the world. Being human and being alive means one takes chances. Cancer can happen for no known reason. Tornadoes strike at random, leveling one house and leaving the one next door. Car wrecks happen to some and not to others.
 Does choice play any role at all in our lives? Let's go back to my friend Ann. While she had no choice about being struck with polio, she did have a choice as to how she responded to the illness. She could have grown bitter. Especially when post-polio syndrome hit, she could have given up on life and been angry at God and

Tire Amnesty

Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, in cooperation with the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet, will conduct a program to accept waste tires from private citizens, farmers and some small businesses. Program participants must deliver their waste tires to the state Department of Transportation (DOT) garage located off U.S. 25 South behind County San's and Central Baptist Church in Mt. Vernon.

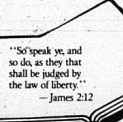
