Local man killed in I-75 wreck


A Calloway man died Tuesday nt in an auto accident on Interstate

task force that is forming legislation for the consolidation of counties, said Tuesday that counties such as Rockcastle shouldn't worry about being lumped in with other larger counties such as Laurel and Madison, if they don't want to be put in with them.

"I will not let anything out of my committee that forces counties or cises to do anything, it will simply be permissive legislation that allowscificants to do what they want to," Robinson said.

"Some people have suggested that I kill the legislation all together, but I don't think that would be wise, because supporters of this measure may come back at a later date and have the votes to force mandatory consolidations across the state," Robinson said.

Rockcastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carfolisis, who is against the measure in any form, said Tuesday that such a law would take away local government from the people.

"Right now anyone that wants anything can come in any later way local government, her for whomever, but if we have Judge-Executive, magistrates, clerks, sheriff or whomever, but if we that wouldn't be the case," he said.

solidation of counties would save money, Carloftis said that was not the case at all.

Salaries are based upon populasalances are based upon popula-tion and if you put counties together, the elected officials are going to make much more in salary," he said. He also pointed out that there would have to be satelite offices in each county to take care of the people's

Roger Coffey, who heads the district highway department in Somerset said Tuesday that currently he could not discuss any of the proposed routes for the road, but that all of the potential routes would be displayed and discussed at the public hearing.

Coffey said that he did not have an exact date on the hearing, but that he public would be given plenty of prior notice before the hearing is held. Money has been set aside for the upgrading of Hwy. 150 from Stanford Mt. Vernon. Much of 150 has already been upgraded in Lincoln County and next month the bid on the Cedar Creek Lake project, which involves Hwy. 150, between Crab Orchard and Stanford will be let by the state.

That was when a wash-

board was used and it took a lot of what we used to call "elbow grease" to scrub them clean. And often she would stay till they were all hung to have been used to stay till they were all hung to he because it was the popular thing tood nor because they belonged to a volunteer club helping a selected few, they did it because that was they did it because that was they did when they did it because that was the way they had been brought up. Simply to help when one saw a need for it. In our area most men were quite skilled at neutering a litter of pigs or

skilled at neutering a litter of pigs or helping when a cow was having dif-ficulty delivering a calf and was always available to help his neighbor out when such things were needed. ficulty delivering a calf and was always available to help his neighbor out when such things were needed, with never a thought of receiving pay for his skill or labor doing it. Now, if a farmer needed help for a day's or week's work, he was always paid for the control of the

FSA Programs net Rockcastle
County farmers over
\$311 thousand during past year
As farm commodity prices continue to fall, local farmers have been
able to benefit from programs administered by the local Farm Service
Agency (FSA). From July 1, 1998
through June 30, 1999, Rockcastle
County farmers have received
\$113,42.00 in cash payments, with
\$148,231.00 coming in the past three
months.

S186,25.10/comming non pensus user months: sgricultural economy has been declining in recent years," Rockeastle County FSA Direct Warden Alexander said, "and in response to this decline, Congress has made additional funds available to help strengthen the AG economy." The most recewnt program payments to farmers have come from the Dairy Market Loss Assistance Program, which resulted in \$20,360.00 being distributed to county dairy producers.

producers.
"The Dairy Market Loss Assis-Market Loss Assistance Program resulted in dairy farmers receiving 22.48 cents per hundredweight on their production losses," Alexander said.

Other significant

Alexander said.

Other significant payments to local farmers in the past year came from other one time programs such as the Crop Loss Disaster Assistance Program (\$126,449.00), the Small Hog Operation Payment (\$HOP) Program (\$702.00), and the Market Loss Assistance Program (\$702.00). sistance Program for corn and wheat (\$46,655,00). Farmers have also received pay

ments from ongoing programs such as the Prodution Crop Flexibility Payments (\$111,275.00 for 1998 and 1999).

"We realize that program pay-ments do not offset the farmers' total loss by any means," Alexnder said, "But they do provide needed cash flow."

Loans Available to Assist
Farmers
The local FSA office also provides loans to assist farmers in purchasing farm land and for operating expenses. According to Bobby Hornsby, Rockcastle Co. FSA Farm Loan Manager, FSA currently has direct and guarned cloans available to Rockcastle County farmers.
FSA makes loans to farmers who

FSA makes loans to farmers who cannot obtain needed credit from cannot obtain needed credit from private sources at rates and terms they can meet. "The majority of the loans we make now are guaranteed loans where a private lender, such as a bank or Farm Credit Services proa bank or Farm Credit Services pro-vide the funds, with FSA guarantee-ing the loan to the lender," Mr. Hornsby explained. FSA also makes direct loans for operating expenses and farm ownership (real estate), Mr. Hornsby said.

Homsby said.

Farmers can apply for direct operating loans up to a maximum of \$200,000. Direct farm ownership loans are also available up to a maximum of \$200,000.

FSA has a combination guaranteed operation and farm ownership loan with a maximum of \$700,000.

The interest rate on these loans is negotiated between the borrower and lender.





The Fair Board reserves the right to combine classes when a class has fewer than three entries and/or two exhibitors.

All livestock must be accompanied by an official health certificate in keeping with the State Department of Agriculture health regulations. No individual may take more than one entry in any one class, except that two may be entered in livestock classes.

The Fair Executive Committee reserves the right to interpret and resolve all matters connected with or incident to the fair.

The Fair Board will not be responsible for losses, accidents, injury to persons, animals or other exhibits, but will take precautions to prevent any losses.

Blue ribbons are not to exceed \$30,00 in livestock shows. Money not used in one division may be transferred to another division on the Danish system.

Foods, fruits and vegetable entries are to be made on paper plates. Canned foods are to be exhibited in standard canning jars. Jars that are not sealed will be disqualified.

When there is only one entry in a class, it is the discretion of the judges to determine the ribbon received.
