

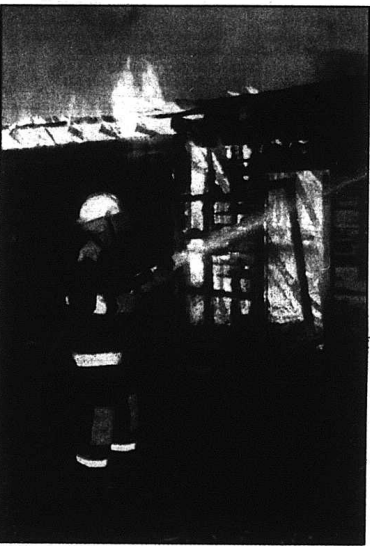

Debra Lambert nominated for Family Court Circuit Judge

A local attorney is among the finalists for a new family/circuit judgeship in Rockcastle, Lincoln and Pulaski Counties.

Debra Hembree Lambert, of Mt. Vernon, wife of Kentucky Supreme Court Chief Justice Joseph Lambert, was nominated along with Jane Adams Venters, of Somerset, wife of Circuit Judge Dan Venters and Michael Louis Duncan, of Somerset, an assistant county attorney in Pulaski County.

The three were nominated by the 28th Judicial Nominating Committee last Tuesday. The names were submitted to Kentucky Governor Paul Patton who is expected to make an appointment in the next few days.

Mason held on failure to pay child support

It seems that local prosecutors are turning up the heat on dead beat dads.

James A. Mason, 34, of Hwy. 150 was indicted last month by a Rockcastle Grand Jury for not paying \$1,024 in child support during the past year.

Mason asked Circuit Judge Dan Venters to take the \$1,024 from a \$2,500 cash bond he had posted to pay his child support and the Judge obliged.

But Mason was later arrested on a Boyle County warrant for non-payment of support in the amount of \$19,000. He is currently being held in the Boyle County jail awaiting further court proceedings.

Federal drug charges filed in local case

A Mt. Vernon man was arrested on drug charges Wednesday, while he was awaiting a hearing on the same charges in Rockcastle District Court.

Federal agents arrested Matthew S. Kirby, 20, at the courthouse, after he was charged by Mt. Vernon police Sgt. Barry Adams on July 24.

According to the citation issued by Adams, Kirby was charged with possession of schedule II narcotics, after Adams found Tylox and other pills in Kirby's pant pockets. Adams also confiscated \$952 in cash.

City council hears numerous complaints

Takes no action on privilege licenses, again

The Mt. Vernon City Council and Mayor Karen King heard numerous complaints during their regular monthly meeting on Monday night. Several of the complaints were from their own employees and one was from a Mt. Vernon resident who has had a flooding problem at her Newcomb Street home for five years.

Water superintendent Dennis McClure told the council that he did not think that people living outside the city limits and not paying city taxes should get the same benefits as those living in the city limits and paying city taxes.

McClure was referring to a fire Saturday night at Burr that completely destroyed the old wooden structure that used to house the Bargain Barn. The water superintendent said that fire fighters drained a 100,000 gallon tank when they used a fire hydrant on U.S. 25, that actually belongs to Kastle Inn Motel and Lumber King.

McClure also said that high pressure caused by so much water flowing through the lines caused a water line to break in the area. The break left several customers without water for sometime, although McClure said that city employees fixed the break that night.

McClure went on to say that he thought the county should pay for water used on county fires and it not be the city's burden.

McClure said that every year when inspections are done by the state the amount of water lost at the city's plant is increased because of

county fires. Mayor King suggested that McClure check into the cost of metering the hydrants so the city would at least know how much water was used in fires for auditing purposes.

McClure said that Kastle Inn and Lumber King pay a monthly fee for the hydrant, but "that it probably shouldn't been put there in the first place."

Councilman Clark Mullins said after the meeting, that using city water to fight county fires was the least of his worries and that "the lake was full of water."

The council and the Mayor then discussed the current privilege license schedule in the city, something they have done for the past several months and something they can't seem to agree upon.

According to police, David Lovell, 31, of Burr, was taken to the Boyle County Detention Center to await a Wednesday hearing.

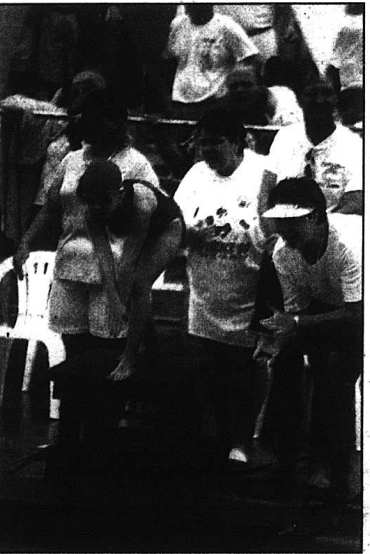

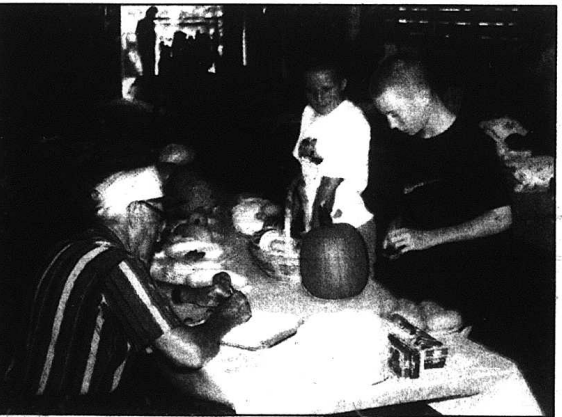
Dolphins Third

or perhaps a week-long leg here or there along the way. There is nothing magic about doing this alone or with somebody else as long as I do it.

Last Saturday, Dave Maggard, his son, Travis and I spent most of the day between locks 8 and 9 which I would guess to be a distance of some 12 or so miles. We saw majestic

herons perched on old stumps waiting for minnows to wander within striking distance and we watched kingfishers swoop wriggling meals out of the current. We saw wild ducks and geese and turtles and muskrats and a thousand birds we couldn't see created a wonderful, nonstop chorus of sound effects when we killed the boat motor. We marveled at towering cliffs and rugged old willows along the banks, but during the entire day we only saw three other people on the river.

I want that experience for days and nights on end. I want to know the Kentucky River as well as I know the community in which I live and God willing, it's a present I intend to give myself. I'll let you know more about the plan as it progresses.

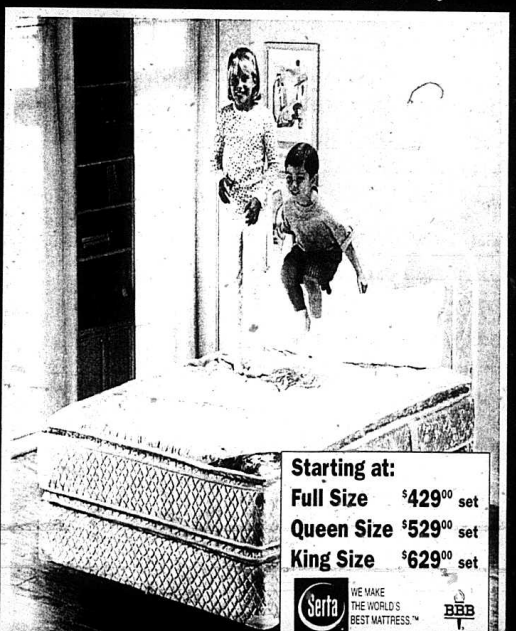

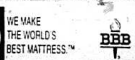

Once again, I want to remind our patrons about the videos we have at the library from KET. This is the book club series that focuses exclusively on modern Kentucky books and authors from Kentucky. These series are featured on KET in three timeslots each month but for those who aren't able to view them, we have the videos. The newest one is "Shiloh and Other Stories" by Bobbie Ann Mason. This was the feature for July. For those of you who would like to watch the series in August, the times are 8:30 p.m. the first Tuesday, 11:30 p.m. the second Tuesday and 9:30 a.m. the second Friday. Six of the videos are now available.

For anyone interested in library science classes, the Lexington Community College is offering online undergraduate credit courses designed to meet certification requirements of Kentucky public library employees. LCC began offering online classes in spring 1998. Since that time almost 200 students from public libraries across the state have taken these classes. The fall 1999 courses have been developed with assistance from the new Kentucky Commonwealth Virtual University as a pilot project for the inaugural year of the KCVU. One of our staff persons took one of the classes in 1998 and three have signed up for the new classes in 1999. There will be a course orientation session in Lexington on Saturday, August 21, 1-3 p.m. Deadline for application for admission is August 13th. Cost is \$222 for Kentucky residents. Anyone may use the online form to register for the classes at www.uky.edu/LCL/LB.

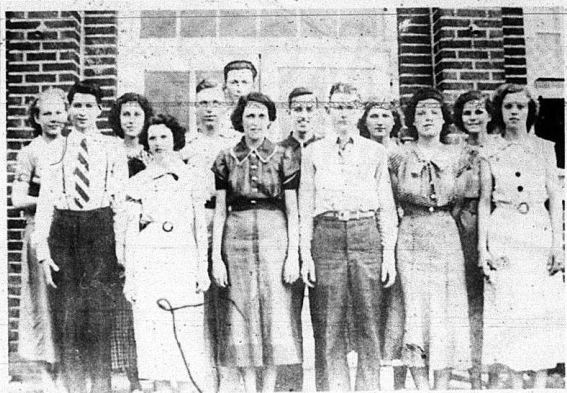

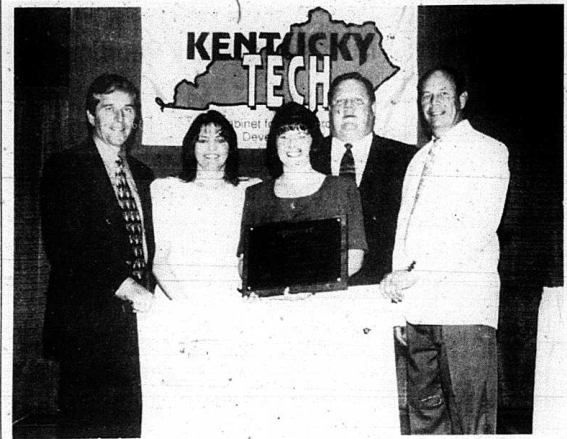

Surgeon General Says It Is Time To Confront the Suicide Issue
Last year in the United States 30,000 people committed suicide. That compares with fewer than 13,000 homicides. Suicide is the eighth leading cause of death. Each year more than half a million Americans attempt suicide.

Older men are the most likely group to take their own lives. Also at heightened risk are American Indians and gay and lesbian youth.

Surgeon General of the United States David Satcher is calling for all Americans to confront the issue of suicide. What was once only whispered about must be discussed openly, Satcher says.

Suicidal thoughts and actions are almost always symptoms of depression. Depression is a very treatable illness, but many are not aware of that fact. Doris Smith of Atlanta said of the suicide of her 27-year-old son, "I did not know that depression was a disease that could be treated."

Others who are depressed are too ashamed to seek help. Unfortunately, in the minds of some people, there is still a stigma attached to depression. It is seen as a sign of weakness, craziness or lack of faith. Depression is none of those things. One of the causes of depression is an internal chemical imbalance over which the individual has little control. This imbalance is often inherited. Depression is no more a sign of weakness than is diabetes, which is also caused by a chemical imbalance.

Treatment for depression includes medication, counseling, exercise, healthy eating and socialization. A person who is depressed can almost always be helped.

Anxiety may also play a role in causing suicide. One 37-year-old male suffered from panic attacks that no one seemed to understand. In 1994 he took a walk on his father's farm with a shotgun in his hand. He saw no other way to escape his misery. Before he pulled the trigger, he said he was able to grasp the faintest notion that somewhere help was available. Today he says, "Suicide is preventable."

There are some myths that prevent Americans from dealing with the suicide issue. One myth is that "anyone who talks about suicide will not do it." Any talk of suicide must be taken seriously. People who are contemplating suicide may indeed discuss it with others. They may give signs that show that they are getting

ready to "go away." Someone who talks of suicide must see a doctor or a counselor for an evaluation immediately."

Another myth is that "it won't happen in my family." There are many families who will tell you that they once thought the same thing. Unfortunately they were wrong.

A conference on suicide prevention was held last year in October. The recommendations of this conference are being taken very seriously

by the surgeon general. They recommended the following:

1. Educating the public that suicide is preventable and working to diminish the stigma of mental illness, substance abuse and suicide.
 2. Working with misery and entertainment media to present balanced portrayals of suicide.
 3. Increasing research on suicide risk and prevention program.
- One does not have to be crazy in order to attempt suicide. Subjected long enough to the misery of depression and anxiety, many would be pushed in that direction. Thankfully there is hope.

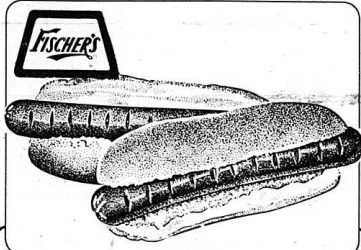

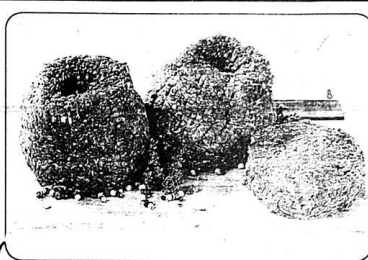

Burley Tobacco Disaster Leasing
 Producers who have been asking for disaster assistance in the form of a cash payment should be advised at this time Rockcastle County has NOT been approved for such a program. However, burley tobacco producers are being reminded that once again disaster leasing is available. Producers who have suffered losses to burley tobacco crops as a result of drought and storms consisting of rains, high winds and hail. Producers who feel they will have a 20% shortage on the current effective quota and wish to disaster lease may file an ASOS 574. Application for Disaster Credit, as soon as the disaster occurs and up to the time the crop is harvested. In order to file for the disaster leasing the following conditions must be met:
 1. The crop must have been affected by a natural disaster while still in the field.
 2. For natural disasters occurring before harvest, a farm visit must find the crop was cared for in a workmanlike manner-losses resulting from

poor management practices will not be eligible.
 3. sufficient acreage must be planted to produce the farms effective quota
 4. COC must approve the application.

Producers who have a tobacco loss and think they may want to disaster lease should contact the Rockcastle Co. FSA Office BEFORE destroying the tobacco.

Small Hog Operation Payment Program (SHOP)
 CED, Warden Alexander, stated Vice President Gore has announced that struggling small and medium sized hog farmers will begin to receive about \$100 million in additional cash assistance as early as mid-August.

Sign-up for the new round of assistance is to begin August 9th and end September 24, 1999. Hog farmers who received the earlier payments will automatically receive the new payment in August and are not required to reapply or fill out additional paperwork. Farmers seeking payments for the first time must apply

and will receive checks within a few weeks of their sign-up.

Eligible producers will receive \$10 per slaughter-weight hog marketed during the last six months of 1998 on up to 500 market hogs (or an equivalent number of feeder pigs or other swine). Hog farm operators who received payments under the earlier

disbursement would receive a pro-rated amount to bring their total payment amount to \$10 per slaughter-weight hog or equivalent. Payments would be limited to hog operations that produced hogs in the US and sold less than 2,500 hogs during the specified marketing period. Further information will be released as available.

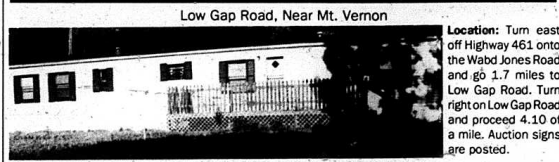

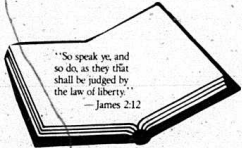

pays no privilege license fee.
Mayor King told the council that she had talked with owner Warren Rosenhall and he was agreeable to paying some type of fee, but the Mayor said she did not know how much and once again, no action was taken to send Renfro Valley Entertainment a bill. They have not paid any privilege license because of a 1992 lawsuit between them and the city which Renfro eventually won.

The council then heard from Cheryl Falin and Loretta Dillingham about a flooding problem on Newcomb Street that has been occurring for approximately five years.
Ms. Falin told the council that it was her understanding that Rockcastle Hospital had agreed to buy most if not all the materials to fix the runoff problem if the city would do the work.

Ms. Falin even went as far as to show a video tape of the flooding that she said happened every time it rains.

Ms. Falin, Mrs. Dillingham and Floyd and Joyce Baker are the homes most affected by the flooding and each home sits at the end of the street at the bottom of the hill.

Ms. Falin said that the water is ruining her home because the water comes up under her house each time it rains.

"I think this is ridiculous that it has been five years and nothing has been done," councilwoman Clarice Kirby said.

Ms. Falin also told the council that she did not understand why it had been so long and nothing had been done.

Water Superintendent Dennis McClure told the council that city workers couple of weeks or so to do the work, but that his staff was already about two or three people short and he didn't know when they could get to it.

He also said that one landowner on the street, Paul Burton said he didn't need a new tile and that was a problem because the problem had to be corrected from the top of the hill to the bottom.

The council then voted to send the hospital a letter requesting that they pay for the materials as well as the labor on the project.

Councilman Clark Mullins disagreed and told the council that the hospital may balk at even supplying the materials if they are asked to pay for the labor as well.

In other business: assistant police chief Eddie Delaney told the council during his report on the police department that morale was low among the city's officers because of low wages.

Delaney also said that some of the officers had applied for jobs elsewhere and that some of them were seeking part-time employment to supplement their salaries.

Delaney said that the officers were most upset over a promised raise they had never received.

Local certified public accountant Joe Clontz presented the June 30, 1997 audit to the city. Clontz said for the most part the city's finances were in order and there were no major problems found in the audit.

The city is also seeking bids on the mowing of the city's two parks. Anyone interested should contact City Clerk Kaye Rader at (606) 256-3437.

According to Lisa Grant, Executive Secretary for the Judicial Nominating Commission, the Kentucky Constitution provides that when there is a judicial vacancy, a nominating commission shall select three persons whose names are then submitted to the governor, who must then appoint one of the three to the judgeship.

The commission met last week in Pulaski County to review applications for the job.

The only other applicant for the job besides the three finalists was Bob Brown, an attorney for the Appalachian Legal Research Defense Supreme Court Justice Martin Johnstone, who is deputy chief justice, served as chairman of the nominating commission, a task normally performed by the chief justice.

The three nominees and Johnstone said they saw no particular problems with the family relations involved.

"I don't think just being married to a judge should disqualify you in any way," Duncan said last week.

The new judge will be in charge of family court in the three county area.

They will handle everything from child support to domestic violence to custody battles and divorces.

As it stands now, some family matters are handled in circuit court, in district court and juvenile court.

The new judge will also have quite a caseload traveling from county to county for family court.

Whoever is selected to serve as the new family/circuit judge will hold office until the fall election in 2000.

Then whoever wins in November of next year will serve out the remaining seven years of the term.

Although the races for district and circuit judges in Kentucky are non-partisan, all three nominees are republicans.

The annual salary for the new judge will be \$100,034.

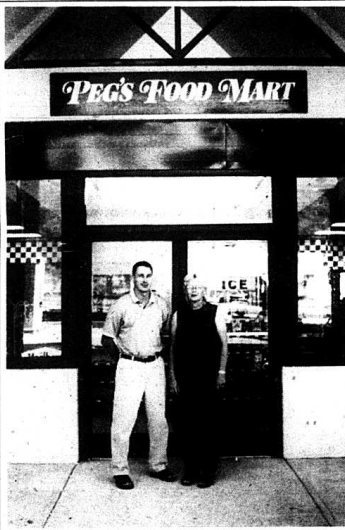

Governor Patton requests federal drought help for Rockcastle

As Kentucky sizzles under a summer heat wave and dry weather, governor Paul Patton is asking for federal disaster help for an additional twenty-seven counties.

The governor has sent the special aid request to U.S. Agriculture Secretary Daniel R. Glickman for the following counties: Rockcastle, Bell, Bourbon, Boyd, Boyle, Clark, Clay, Elliott, Garrard, Grant, Harlan, Jessamine, Knox, Lawrence, Lee, Meade, Mercer, Montgomery, Powell, Scott, Lewis, Owsley, Carter, Bath, Nicholas, Rowan and Greenup.

That's in addition to requests last week for help for farmers in Harrison, Magoffin, Mason, Fleming, Morgan, Bracken and Robertson counties, for a total of 34 counties to date. The governor is monitoring conditions in all remaining counties.

The county judge-executives, in

conjunction with their local Farm Service Agency offices, initiate the requests for emergency loan assistance. The judge-executives notify the governor in writing of problems caused by the drought to farms in their area. Governor Patton then speeds their requests for federal assistance to the federal agriculture secretary by letter.

If disaster funding is made available to the affected counties, farmers may apply for emergency loans through the Farm Service Agency. Currently the funds are depleted. Governor Patton traveled to Washington last Wednesday and told top federal agriculture officials that Kentucky farmers urgently need help.


Governor Patton said, "We'll continue from the governor's office to track this very pressing situation for our farmers and do everything possible to help them."

Laundry Gadgets Won't Lighten The Load

Wouldn't it be great to throw out those heavy boxes and bottles of laundry detergent and replace them with a small, light-weight, money-saving plastic ball? Some businesses claim that their reusable balls, rings and discs, filled with what they say is a special liquid, can take the place of laundry detergents. The manufacturers claim their products "change the molecular structure of water" to force dirt out of the clothing. Internet and television ads claim that their laundry aids, which cost about \$75 a piece, can last for thousands of loads - and save customers hundreds of dollars in detergent costs.

Before you toss out your tried and true detergents, consider this: Tests show that these gadgets do little more than clean out your wallet. At best, these products are only slightly better than washing clothes in hot water alone, and not as effective as washing them with laundry detergent. At worse, these products are completely useless.

Hear's how to get your laundry clean:

- * Follow the care label instructions.

Cleaning instructions are required on most textile clothing. They are not required on clothing made primarily of suede or leather, footwear, items for the head and hands - such as hats and gloves - or on household items like sheets and towels. However, many manufacturers of these items provide care information voluntarily.

- * Pre-treat stains.
- * Sort by color. Wash whites separately; light and medium colors together; and brights and darks by themselves.

- * Don't overload your washer. Cloths need room to move and enough water to carry away the soil.
- * Follow product instructions. Use

the recommended amount of detergent and other laundry products, and follow the recommended procedures. Some products are added to the water before the clothes; others, like liquid fabric softener, are added at the start of the rinse cycle.

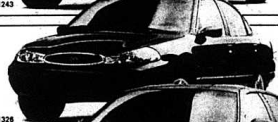

SCHOOL BUS RULES AND REGULATIONS

The privilege of any pupil to ride a school bus is conditioned upon their good behavior and observance of the following rules and regulations. Pupils violating these rules and regulations shall be reported to the principal of the school which the pupil attends for necessary corrective action. Safety is the primary concern in the transportation of pupils. In order to assure proper safety, it is vital that pupils and parents understand the rules and regulations of school bus riding. Following is a list of basic rules and regulations adopted by the Rockcastle County Board of Education and the Kentucky Department of Education:

1. Arrive at bus stop on time. The bus has many scheduled stops and cannot be delayed.
2. Never stand in the road while waiting for the bus. Parents should encourage safety measures for pupils as they wait for the bus and walk home from the bus.
3. Cross a safe distance (10 feet) in front of the bus so the driver can see you.
4. Take a seat upon boarding the bus and do not change seats while the bus is in motion.
5. The driver is in charge of the bus and pupils and has the authority to assign seating arrangements.
6. Keep noise to a minimum so that the driver's attention can be devoted to driving.
7. Do not extend arms, legs or head out the bus windows.
8. Obey the rules posted on each bus.
9. Do not block aisles in any way.
10. Knives/other sharp instruments are not permitted on the bus.
11. Never run toward the bus. Always load and unload when the bus has come to a complete stop.
12. Apply the above rule (No. 11) when transferring buses.
13. Never use the rear exit unless an emergency exists.
14. Ride only on assigned bus unless you have a signed note from the Principal. Parents must write or call the principal to obtain permission for pupil to ride another bus or to exit at a different stop.
15. Report any damages to the bus.
16. Do not occupy more space in a seat than required.
17. Open and close windows in compliance with the driver's instructions.
18. Pupils and parents are to accept the responsibility of listening for dismissal announcements on the radio on days when inclement weather disrupts the regular schedule.
19. The following rules are of particular concern and the activities mentioned are prohibited at all times:
 - a. Use of profane/foul language
 - b. Smoking or other use of tobacco on the bus
 - c. Fighting on the bus
 - d. Destruction of bus property
 - e. Defiance of driver's authority
 - f. Throwing objects on or from the bus.
20. **Disciplinary Action:** Violations of the above stated rules and regulations shall be reported to the appropriate school principal. The principal shall record the incident and determine the appropriate disciplinary action. Should any pupil persist in violating any of these regulations, it shall be the duty of the driver to notify the principal and, after due warning has been given to the pupil and such violation persists, the principal and/or board of education shall then forbid such disobedient pupil the privilege of riding the bus. Written notice of the action of the principal shall be furnished to the parents and the superintendent.



Parents & Teachers School Bus Safety Alert

A child's clothing can be dangerous when getting off the bus. A number of children have been injured or killed when their clothing became caught when exiting the bus.

Dangerous clothing that can get caught in handrails, doors or other areas include:

Jackets or sweatshirts with drawstrings

Backpack straps

Scarves or other loose clothing

Please talk with your children about these Safety Rules:

Stay away from Danger Zones around the bus

If you drop something near the bus, don't pick it up. The driver may not see you. Tell the driver & follow his/her instructions.

Remember that motorists don't always stop for the school bus. Use extreme caution when getting on or off the bus.
