## Tobacco farmers to be compensated by year's end

Rockcastle County tobacco farmers will be getting two checks this year, one from this year's crop and one from the 1998 crop.  
Danny McKinney, of Brodhead, Chief Executive Officer of the Burley

Tobacco Grower's Association said Tuesday that checks should be mailed by the end of the year, but that no definite date had been set.  
The checks to tobacco owners and growers are coming from the Phase II part of the national tobacco

settlement.  
McKinney said that Kentucky growers will receive \$112.71 million for 1999 or 26 cents a pound.  
The 26 cents will be paid for the entire quota farmers had in 1998.  
The payments will be split into

thirds, with the quota owner, the grower and the tenant receiving a third.  
It is very simple in layman's terms. If you grew your own tobacco in 1998 on your own farm you will get the entire 26 cents per pound.

For example, a farmer growing his own ten thousand pound of tobacco in 1998 will receive a payment of \$2,600.  
If you leased tobacco in 1998, which means you grew it on your land, you will receive a two thirds payment, or 15.68 cents per pound.  
The quota owner will receive at least 8.65 cents per pound in all cases.  
If you rented tobacco in 1998, you will receive 7.84 cents per pound or for 10,000 pounds rented \$784.

"Next year we may not see a cut in quotas, but that is still up in the air," McKinney said.  
McKinney said that applications for the settlement money are scheduled to be mailed on September 17 and must be returned by October 8.

Owners, growers and tenants will be responsible for completing applications in order to get their money and the applications must be post-marked by October 8, according to McKinney.

The payment schedule was devised by the Kentucky Tobacco Settle Trust Corporation. McKinney is an advisor to the corporation.

## In federal court Kirbys plead guilty to drug related crimes

Four members of a Rockcastle County family have entered guilty pleas in federal court in London to illegal drug dealing.

Dallas Kirby, 49, of Quail, entered a guilty plea to manufacturing less than 100 marijuana plants between March 21 and March 23 of this year.

Kirby, who was indicted last week by a Rockcastle Grand Jury on four counts of receiving stolen property, faces up to five years imprisonment and a \$250,000 fine, followed by at least two years supervised probation, when sentenced December 17, before U.S. District Judge Jennifer B. Coffman.

Mattie Kirby, 73, of Chestnut Ridge, Dallas Kirby's mother, Clarence "Bearcat" Kirby, Mattie Kirby's son, and his wife Lisa Kirby, also entered guilty pleas to drug related incidents occurring in Rockcastle County earlier this year.

Mattie Kirby and Lisa Kirby plead guilty to possessing Tylox and Percocet in the early months of 1999 with the intent to distribute and distribution of drugs.

"Bearcat" Kirby pled guilty to possessing Tylox and marijuana, which he intended to distribute. All three also pled guilty to a forfeiture count.

Mattie, Lisa and "Bearcat" Kirby face up to 20 years in prison, a \$1 million fine and supervised probation for up to three years after their release from prison. They will also be sentenced on December 17.

Three other family members, Gary Legs Kirby, his ex-wife Lagina Kirby Mullins and Charles Kirby have cases still pending in federal court.

All seven were arrested by federal agents in April, as part of the federal government's High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area crackdown.

## Burning ban in Rockcastle

## Glen Hammond arrested last week in GA

A Rockcastle County man who police believe has been involved in illegal drug activity in the county for the past few years, was arrested last week in Georgia.

According to police, Glen Hammond, 42, of Red Hill, was arrested early last Wednesday morning on federal warrants in Peach County, Georgia.

Police said that Hammond was a passenger in a transfer truck, owned and driven by his cousin Lee Hammond, also of Mt. Vernon, at the time of his arrest.

Police in Georgia stopped the truck after they noticed that his license tags had expired.

Lee Hammond was not arrested and was issued only citations for expired tags.

Hammond's residence at Red Hill was raided by federal, state and local police on August 6.

During the raid police confiscated illegal drugs, a stolen four-wheeler, guns and drug paraphernalia.

According to police, Hammond is still being held in a Georgia jail, awaiting transfer to Kentucky.

## Chapter 28 Water Hardships

Just as the smooth glassy waters in the pool above a dam turn to spray, singing, dancing water as it flows over the dam and seeks its way

to its destination, so, do the memories of one sitting idly remembering the cool depth and tranquility of the water above the dam (the past and youth) then becomes invigorated as it reaches the edge of the pool (middle age) and becomes involved with the tumult of descending to another level and finding there are many joys and excitement awaiting them as they enter the stream as it meanders through the wilderness and meadows, sometimes perilously close to oblivion but always finding smooth waters ahead, then reaching the final destination, the ocean or eternity (maturity, old age).

The column I wrote sometime back about the lack of water hardships was only a few of my memories of that period of my life. There is always two sides to everything so maybe I can coax a few from the other side of the problem to surface so you can see all was not bleak existence for me and mine in those days.

For those of you who have never had the privilege and joy of drinking from a dipper hooked over the edge of a bucket of water freshly drawn from a deep well or carried from a spring tucked under a cliff or tucked into a hillside where the shade from

tal trees keep it cool and the gentle overcast keeps the dregs away, this will have no meaning and you have missed a satisfaction to the thirsty that never, ever, comes from drinking a glass of tap water that has come from a creek or river, and purified with chemicals. (7) Water from a deep well containing lead and several strata of rock and earth is cold, not like the cold of a refrigerator but a sweet cold that causes cool droplets to form on the outside of the metal bucket and dipper and satisfies the thirst as no artificially cooled water can. Spring water is a little different, it is pleasantly cool and although not flavored, has almost a sweet taste that makes one want a second dipper full and then allow it to trickle slowly down the throat. This is invariably accompanied by a sigh of satisfaction and "Boy, that is good water."

Buckets and dippers? You bet. A good water bucket and dipper was a necessity and mainstay of the kitchen and back porch before water was piped into the house. Usually a white enamel one with matching dipper was couple zinc ones on the back porch, with aluminum dippers hung over their sides. This was the wash up area. These, of course, had to be frequently washed, dippers especially. Children had to be watched closely to keep their hands off the bucket's dipper and rim of the bucket. But that was a Mommy's job and duty. I still have my dipper left over from the farm. It can be used for so many things, perfect for dipping soap or canning. And of course I know about the water when the men and the person drains from the same vessel but I guess we must have built up immunity to one another for none of my family has become seriously ill or succumbed to contamination from drinking from the same one. If visitors asked for a drink I had glasses available for that purpose.

Now these springs often went dry and the water shortage I write so much about was before water was discovered beneath the area our house sat on and a well was finally drilled and had to be covered. I learned years ago how to take a sponge bath in a wash pan, then maybe mop the kitchen floor with it. Use the same water several times for rinsing off dirty hands, then using it to wash dirty feet.

Laundry water was always carried to the garden or thirsty shrub. The laundry soap was usually made from lye soap which was totally biodegradable as well as a detergent to bugs. So, it served two purposes: I am an old hand at conserving water and handling the barrel. I think and myself saving dishwater when I have only washed a couple things in it. Or letting the rinse water cool so I can water my flowers with it.

Another way of conserving water was using rain barrels placed under the drip of the house, then pray for rain to fill them. This soft rain water was perfect for laundering, bathing and especially good for washing one's hair. The hair would be soft and shiny and clothes a degree whiter when washed in rainwater. Often times the water had to be strained through a cloth to remove foreign matter and if rain was really scarce and the water got too low it became a breeding ground for mosquitoes.

One memory of rain barrel times brings forth a smile or touch of nostalgia as I recall a little boy, Rodney, in one of his research capers. Glancing out the dining room window I saw him bending over a barrel, about two thirds full of water, studiously intent on whatever was going on inside the barrel. Concerned about the precious water inside, I went to see what was going on and what I saw brought forth an exclamation of surprise and probably anger. For here inside the barrel, dripping wet and trying to reach the rim was our house cat. My first question was, "What in the world are you doing and how did she get in that barrel?" With a subdued look of being caught in a naughty act he looked up and said, "Mommy, I was just seeing if cats can swim. Someone told me they couldn't and I wanted to make sure so if one got in the pond or river I would know what to do. My hands were underneath so I could catch her before she drowned." This inquisitive little boy, who would never have hurt a living

creature, was using an animal he loved simply to make sure no cats would ever drown in his presence. I didn't know whether to spank or scold him for ruining the barrel of water or praise him for his ingenuity and research into cat or animal behavior. I probably scolded him for ruining that barrel of water. Looking back, it's always easier to look backward than forward, I see not a barrel of water wasted, but a little boy's curiosity happily satisfied with the results of his own experiment, having to face a state another over the loss of a barrel of water.

Along about that time, one day I heard voices in the backyard and two teenage girls, daughters of our neighbors a couple of miles away, were standing there with a little package under one arm. Howdy, Zai, and without further comment said, "We came up to get you to give us a permanent." I was taken aback, for I had never given anyone a permanent, but I did know it took gallons of water to do so and all the water I had in the one big barrel. I invited them in and while they chatted with Judy, they were her age and schoolmates of hers, I explained my inexperience, secretly hoping they would go elsewhere. But this didn't bother them a bit, they trusted me and all they wanted was a permanent. They thought this would make them more attractive to the boys. Really they didn't need it for they were already pretty and attractive. But how could I deny these pretty girls the joys of going to church Sunday with their hair all frizzy with a new perm? So, begrudging the water

I was about to use, which I had been saving for my laundry the next day, I said, "Which one's first?" and began. At the end of the day both girls, young ladies, really had frizzy curls and I had no water left for the laundry. But I did know how to give a home permanent and the satisfaction of a permanent. They thought this would make them new look. What more could I ask? They are mature women now and have long been gone from Buffalo and I wonder if they remember their first permanent?

People can find happiness and joy anywhere. One time when I was young and forgot the discomforts of isolation, bad roads and the lack of sufficient water to accommodate the needs of a family. This has been proven to me many times as we traveled in the joy of visitors in our humble little home. One summer time when Judy was in high school. She went to Shoville in Pulaski County so her new friends were not the local kids that grew up with her. These were young people from different backgrounds but the same zest for fun and adventure. One time when Judy wasn't long of a car on the road, or if the road was impassable the sound of voices coming into the clearing and

know Judy's friends would soon appear for an evening of fun and games. On one of these occasions when Judy had devoured bowls of popcorn and started on the peanuts one of them politely asked me that what he should do with the peanut shells, with tongue in cheek, I innocently looked up at him and replied, "Why honey, on the floor. I do recall it every Saturday." He caught the joke as I pointed to containers I had placed around the room, and the ice was broken. We had a wonderful relationship after that. This kind of refreshments called for a lot of water and soon the buckets were empty. One day we were drinking coffee, not tea, there was no way to keep them cold for we didn't have electricity then, so someone had to go to the spring. It has been missing rain all evening so whoever went would surely come back wet. So, they decided to go and bring back two buckets of water. That way they would share in the fun of going to the spring after dark with a lantern and flash light shared between them. The spring they had to go to was quite away from the house and down a steep embankment with one narrow path leading around the hillside. When they finally got back to the kitchen they were dripping with water and the dripping leaves from the overhanging trees

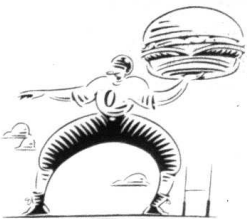

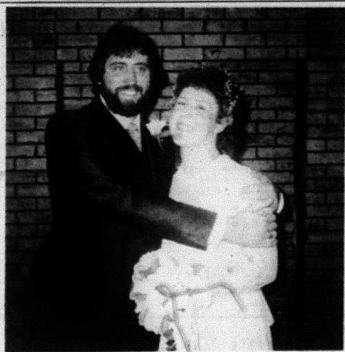

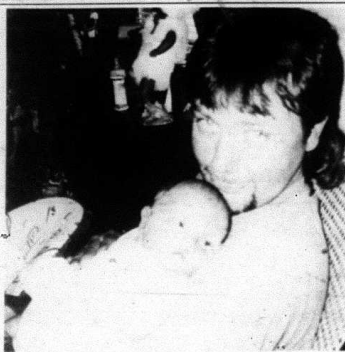

**Burley Tobacco Disaster Leasing**  
This just in - Producers who feel they will have a 20% shortage on the current effective quota and wish to disaster lease may file an ASCS 574. Application for Disaster Credit, as soon as the disaster occurs and NOW! HAVE UP TO THE TIME THE CROP IS MARKETED.

Producers who have suffered losses to burley tobacco crops as a result of drought and storms consisting of rains, high winds and hail MUST file an ASCS 574. Request for Disaster Credit. In order to file for the disaster leasing the following conditions must be met:

1. the crop must have been affected by a natural disaster while still in the field.
2. for natural disasters occurring before harvest, a farm visit must find the crop was cared for in a workmanlike manner-losses resulting from poor management practices will not be eligible.
3. sufficient acreage must be planted to produce the farms effective quota.
4. CMC must approve the application.

Producers who have a tobacco loss and think they may want to disaster lease should contact the Rockcastle Co. FSA Office BEFORE destroying the tobacco.

To avoid the loss of quota - Producers wishing to have planted acreage for 1999 that was destroyed MUST file for P&CP (planted and considered planted) credit by filing a crop report and paying a fee of \$26.50 for P&CP credit. This is a MUST for a producer who did NOT market tobacco or lease tobacco in 1998. REMEMBER: Producers who have two years out of three years with NO P&CP credit will automatically have their quota dropped to zero with no appeal rights.

**Marketing Cards**  
The FSA office will soon be ordering the marketing cards for the current crop. All producers who will receive a check at the tobacco ware-

house must have required paperwork signed and on file in the office prior to receiving the marketing card for price support. The required paperwork includes: and AD-1026 (sodbuster), FSA-670 (insurance waiver) and the MQ-38 (pesticide form). If you as a producer have an address change please notify our office as soon as possible so the marketing card will reflect the correct address.

**Small Hog Operation Payment Program (SHOP)**  
CED, Warden Alexander, stated Vice President Gore has announced that struggling small and medium sized hog farmers will begin to receive about \$100 million in additional cash assistance as early as mid-August.

Sign-up for the new round of assistance is to begin August 9th and end September 24, 1999. Hog farmers who received the earlier payments will automatically receive the new payment in August, and are not required to reapply or fill out additional paperwork. Farmers seeking payments for the first time must apply and will receive checks within a few weeks of their sign-up.

Eligible producers will receive \$10 per slaughter-weight hog marketed during the last six months of 1998 on up to 500 market hogs (or an equivalent number of feeder pigs or other swine). Hog farm operators who received payments under the earlier disbursement would receive a pro-rated amount—being their total payment amount to \$10 per slaughter-weight hog or equivalent. Payments would be limited to hog operations that produced hogs in the US and sold less than 2,500 hogs during the specified marketing period. Further information will be released as available.

The good news is that the Rockets weren't playing a very good team on Friday night.

The bad news is they didn't play extremely well themselves, especially on offense.

However, in the Rockets' 1999 season opener the Rocket defense held Harrison County to just 133 yards and one score in the Death Valley Bowl at Lincoln County High School.

The Rockets won 10-7, after scoring all ten points in the first half and holding Harrison County to one touchdown in the fourth quarter.

The lone Rocket touchdown came on a fumble recovery by senior Derrick Bradley in the second quarter.

Bradley scooped up the ball, after a hard hit by Travis Ingram and scampered 38 yards for the score.

The other score came on a 32 yard field goal by placekicker Greg Terry, as time ran out in the first half.

The field goal was set up by a good defensive stand, which included one of four quarterback sacks by linebacker Travis Ingram.

After the sack Harrison County was forced to punt and on the first play from scrimmage, Quarterback Christopher Parsons found receiver Dackery Larkey on about the five yard line, which set up the eventual kick.

Head coach Tom Larkey said he was pleased with the win, but said his squad had a lot of work to do this week to prepare for a much better South Laurel team.

On Friday night the Cardinals scored 60 plus points on Clark County behind the strong play of quarterback Neil Warren, who accounted for nearly 450 yards of offense himself.

The Cardinals have also won the last two meetings between the two teams and defensive coach Tony Saylor said this week, that this year's Cardinals team is by far the best the Rockets have faced the past four seasons.

"We'll have to play error free football and we will have to have everybody healthy to pull off a victory," Saylor said.

"This may be the best offensive team we face all season long," Saylor said.

On Friday night the Rockets managed only 173 yards of offense, but held Harrison County to just 133 yards themselves.

Parsons threw the football twelve times completing six for seventy six yards. Running back Derrick Bussell, threw one pass for four yards.

Neither player threw an interception.

Junior Dackery Larkey caught three passes for 44 yards. Junior Greg Harper also caught three passes for 38 yards and Sophomore Josh Hale caught one pass for no gain.

Placekicker Greg Terry kicked a 32 yard field goal and hit his only extra point attempt.

Senior Derrick Bradley had 56 yards on 10 carries, while Bussell had 31 yards on 12 carries and Parsons had 6 yards on nine carries. Josh Dooley had no yards on one carry.

On defense the Rockets were led by junior linebacker Travis Ingram, who had no doubt his best game ever as a Rocket.

Ingram picked up 13 tackles and assists, which included four quarterback sacks. He also jarred the ball loose on the play the Rockets scored on and then he sacked the quarterback late in the second quarter to force them to punt, which eventually led to a field goal.

Senior Dustin Crawford also played extremely well on defense, picking up five tackles and assists and intercepting one pass.

Junior Derrick Bussell had the same defensive stats, five tackles and one interception.

Sophomore William Blair got his first varsity start and made the most of it with six tackles and assists.

Matt Smith had five tackles and one sack. Chris Kirby also added five tackles, as did Joel Deatherage and Greg Harper.

Sean Smith had four tackles, while senior Gary Coffey, who is still hampered by a bad knee, had two tackles and one sack.

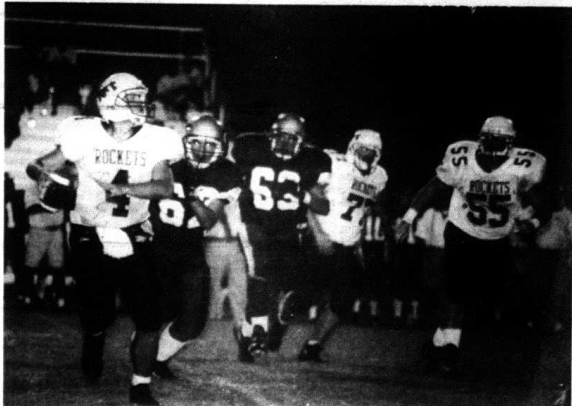

Rockcastle scored all 21 points in the fourth quarter after being down 20-0.

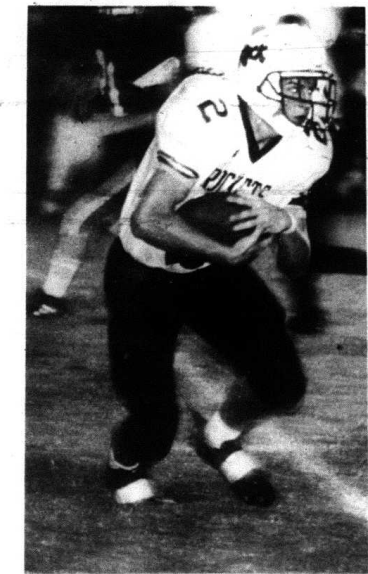
Scoring touchdowns for the Rockets were Clay Dooley and Josh Hale.

Josh Taylor caught a two-point conversion and placekicker Greg Terry kicked the game winning extra point.

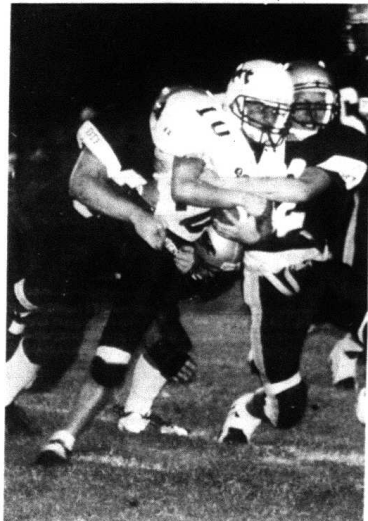

## Johnson loses job after guilty plea to arson

One of the three co-defendants charged with setting fire to a Renoir Valley game room for a non-rehab- less video games in order to collect \$285,000 in insurance money has plead guilty.

Terry Johnson, former chief of the London-Lanier Rescue Squad and sergeant with the London City Police, entered a guilty plea to mail fraud in London's federal court recently as part of a plea agreement. Formal sentencing is set for December 10.

Johnson and London businessmen, David and Bill Abrams, are accused of committing arson, using fire to commit a felony, and aiding and abetting each other to do so.

The three defendants allegedly rented property in Renoir Valley under the pretense of opening Speed-

way Family Arcade. They are charged with filling the building with old video games, and setting a fire last May 12. The trio then attempted to collect money from Penn-Amenia Insurance Agency, acquired locally through Dell Sams Insurance Agency, in the amount of \$285,000, a figure they claimed represented the value of the destroyed games.

Investigators in the case valued all 44 machines in the building at \$750, a far cry from the \$3,800 per-machine Johnson claimed to have paid.

Since the defendants used the U.S. Postal Service to file their insurance claim, federal charges were brought against them.

Last December, an eight-day trial of the three men ended in a hung jury. Johnson has been fired from the London Police force.

**Quota Owners:** persons who own farmland for which there is a currently established burley tobacco quota.

**Growing Farmers:** persons who controls the land used to produce burley tobacco and shares in the risk of production.

**Grower/producer:** person(s) that provides labor to produce burley tobacco and shares in the risk of production.

McKinney said that Governor Paul Patton and the Kentucky General Assembly will decide how Kentucky's portion of the Phase 1 money from the tobacco settlement will be spent.

McKinney said that agriculture leaders are advising the governor to put at least 60 percent of the Phase 1 money into agricultural in the state, but that is still to be determined.

The first year the General Assembly will have to decide how to spend \$42 million dollars of the \$3.4 billion Kentucky will receive over a 25 year period. In 2001, Kentucky will receive \$1.4 million.

State Representative Danny Ford of Mt. Vernon said that the settlement money is based on the amount of tobacco consumed and could change, from its original plan.

Ford said that it is very likely that a large portion of that money will go back into agricultural while some could be earmarked for health care.

"Debate will likely be hot and heavy or how that money is spent," Ford said.

McKinney said that although it seems bleak for the tobacco farmer there is actually some positive news for them.

"The current federal tobacco program is pretty safe in Washington, for now, and U.S. Senator Mitch McConnell is working on legislation that would pay tobacco growers a one time \$1.00 per pound for every pound of tobacco they have had cut from their quotas, through a federal disaster farm relief bill," McKinney said.

"That money would be totally separate from the tobacco settlement money and it would also be the first time that tobacco growers would be included in any kind of federal disaster aid for farmers," he said.

The phase II program is set up over a 12 year period and plans for the second year call for \$60 million to be spent on the program, but McKinney said that too could change, depending on consumption.

"The biggest threat to tobacco farmers is contract growing," McKinney said.

"We will have to make some changes to offer better quality and better selection, and be more competitive price-wise, to keep contract growing away from the tobacco industry," McKinney said.

County agents, officers with the farm service agencies and field representative from Farm Bureau are being trained to help farmers with the application process for the phase II money.

tion project, in the northeastern section of the county, and a ground breaking for the second phase in southwestern Rockcastle County.

The funding for the \$2,438,000 Rockcastle County Water Association project included a \$704,000 loan and a \$786,000 grant from Rural Development; \$850,000 Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) grant; and \$98,000 from sign-up fees from the association members.

Project Engineer Darcy Stewart said that the much awaited project is about half completed and that the entire project may be completed by year's end or early Spring 2000.

This project, located in rural Rockcastle County and consisting of 61 miles of new water lines, will supply approximately 326 families with a safe water source. USDA's domestic water and waste programs are examples of the Clinton-Gore Administration's priority of providing rural America with a potable water supply. Providing communities with

necessities such as clean and safe drinking water helps improve the economic infrastructure and expand job opportunities for all who reside in the region," Fern said.

The City of Mt. Vernon supplies the treated water to Western Rockcastle and Rockcastle County Water Associations.

The water treatment plant is being renovated, transmission lines upgraded and a 500,000 gallon water storage tank added. The funding for that \$6,513,200 project included a \$1,700,000 loan and a \$777,800 grant from Rural Development; \$272,500 Department of Transportation funds; \$401,000 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG); \$3,355,000 private bond issue; and \$6,900 from the city.

"With the completion of these water lines, over 85% of Rockcastle County will have access to a safe water source. The citizens of Mt. Vernon and Rockcastle County are to be congratulated on the completion of these projects," Fern stated.

vehicles, box vans and eighteen wheelers," said Nancy Meadows, Rockcastle County's Solid Waste Coordinator.

"The response was way beyond our imagination," Mrs. Meadows said.

Three hundred people brought enough waste tires to fill thirteen tractor-trailers for the Ohio firm that was contracted to dispose of the tires.

Mrs. Meadows said the tires

ranged in size from bicycle tires to an old pan tire that was abandoned when I-75 was constructed in the 1960s.

Mrs. Meadows was on hand to greet each participant and give them information on waste tire management. She was assisted by Bill Belcher of the Division of Waste Management.

Two county road crew employees worked each day unloading tires from the local vehicles.

Those employees included: Fred Barnes, Orville Childress, Billy Adams, Dennis Marler, Robert Chestnut and Gilbert Chestnut.

Central Ohio Contracting, (COC) the company which actually collected the tires will cut the tires into small pieces that will be used to protect liners in landfills, according to Mrs. Meadows.

Mrs. Meadows said COC received the contract for removal of waste tires from the eight counties in the Cumberland Valley Area Development District.

"This tire amnesty event will not be repeated," Mrs. Meadows said.

"Consumers and retailers are responsible for properly managing and disposing of waste tires. To do so cost approximately \$2 for each passenger tire - more for larger tires, according to Mrs. Meadows.

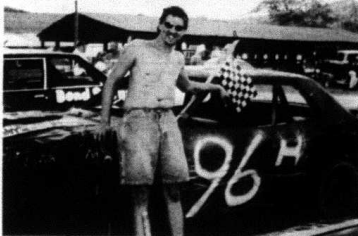

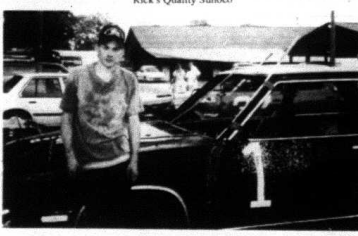

## Ear infections a fact of life for today's children

It's a routine familiar to most parents of young children: The child gets a cold or upper respiratory tract infection and, a few days later, a trip to the doctor's office confirms what the parents suspected: a red, inflamed ear drum, the tell-tale sign of an ear infection.

It's estimated that about two-thirds of all children will have an ear infection (otitis media in medical terms) by their first birthday. By age 3, half of all children will have had three or more ear infections. It's the most common reason children see a doctor.

It may seem to parents that their children get more ear infections than when they were children, which is at least partially true.

"Children always have had ear infections, but some are becoming more difficult to treat because of antibiotic resistance," said Jesse Manaligod, M.D., director of pediatric otolaryngology (ear, nose and throat) at the University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center. "Risk factors - such as exposure to secondhand smoke and to more germs in a day care setting - also play a role in increasing the number of ear infections."

Understanding ear infections requires a bit of an anatomy lesson. When you have a cold, the eustachian tube, a small tube that connects the middle ear to the back of the nose, can become congested, keeping the middle ear from being properly ventilated, so to speak. That creates a vacuum effect, drawing fluid from the lining of the mucous membranes of the middle ear, which creates fluid in the ear. That fluid gets infected, which causes the pain that can make children wake up crying in the middle of the night.

Some ear infections also can be caused when bacteria from nasal or sinus infections reflux up the eustachian tube into the ear.

Antibiotics such as amoxicillin are tried first to combat an ear infection. If that doesn't work, a second line of defense is stronger antibiotics which are more effective in fighting bacteria that are resistant to first line antibiotics.

If oral antibiotics don't work, one-time shot, Rocephin, is an option.

"Antibiotics usually takes care of

### When should infants and toddlers have their eyes examined?

The visual system of the newborn is not fully developed. Within the first six months of life, rapid changes occur in visual acuity, accommodation and binocular vision. Interference with development during this very critical phase may lead to serious lifelong effects on vision. Successful treatment can be obtained more quickly with early intervention.

According to the American Optometric Association Pediatric Eye Exam Guidelines, a child should first visit an optometrist for an initial comprehensive eye exam at six months of age. The optometrist will check for symptoms of eye disease, crossed-eyes, lazy eye and developmental problems. Infants and toddlers too young to talk or to identify letters and numbers are examined with the sophisticated equipment available today.

The child should have another eye examination at age three. The doctor will check eye health, eye movement skills, focusing abilities and whether or not common vision problems like nearsightedness or farsightedness are present. An estimated one percent of preschoolers are nearsighted and about seven percent are sufficiently farsighted to require vision correction. Astigmatism significant enough to require treatment affects about two percent of preschoolers.

75,000 three year old children develop amblyopia each year. Amblyopia is responsible for loss of vision in more people under 45 year of age than all other ocular diseases and trauma combined. It is estimated that 2-3 percent of healthy infants born each year will suffer visual loss from amblyopia. The important thing to know is that if diagnosed early, it is highly treatable and the child's vision can be saved. Treatment before age five is critical to reverse the condition. After age 6, therapies are much less effective.

Vision screenings often miss amblyopia. Young children don't realize that they are not seeing any differently than anyone else. A comprehensive eye examination by an optometrist is recommended to insure that your child is able to "learn to see and see to learn."

about the size of a grain of rice into the eardrum. Children are under general anesthesia for this procedure.

"The tubes equalize the pressure both inside and outside the ear, which should prevent ear infections," Manaligod said. "It also allows the fluid to drain from the ear in the event of an ear infection, which makes the ear infections less painful and easier to treat."

The procedure doesn't necessarily prevent ear infections completely, and carries a slight risk of scarring of the eardrum, but it's usually effective, he said.

A new procedure, laser-assisted myringotomy, requires only local anesthesia in the ear and can be done in a physician's office. A laser is used to make a hole in the eardrum. Although a tube will keep the eardrum open for six months to a year, a hole created by the laser procedure will

last only about a month. However, Manaligod said, that may be all that is needed for a single bad ear infection that doesn't clear up with antibiotics.

Research points to a few ways to help prevent ear infections besides medication or surgery. Breast-feeding seems to protect babies with a boost in immunity and is associated with fewer ear infections. Also, if the child has allergies, reducing allergens in the home can help. Manaligod also suggested that parents consider food allergies as a possible culprit in ear infections.

Manaligod offers one consolation for parents of young children: By age 6 to 8, most children have fewer ear infections because their immune system is more developed, and the eustachian tube grows and begins to function better.

## Child Abuse—A Matter of Fact

How Can Anyone Abuse or Neglect a Child?

Many of us have been in situations when we felt that life is a little more than we can handle. What stops us from giving up or lashing out are skills and mechanisms we have learned in order to control or divert our anger and frustration, to accept and assume adult responsibilities, to recognize realistic boundaries or acceptable behavior and expectation, and to seek help and support before its too late. When adults are faced with a situation which requires them to use coping skills which they have not been able to develop, child abuse or neglect often is the result. Although this explanation is oversimplified, it does help us understand how abuse and neglect can occur. It also explains the term "cycle of abuse

and neglect." Children learn from their parents. A child who has been raised in a home where violence is an accepted response to frustration grows as an adult tend to react violently. For this child the skills necessary for controlling anger or frustration is never learned. What is learned is violence. In the same way, a parent who lacks self-esteem or maturity cannot instill these characteristics within his/her child. Without significant outside influences, the child is likely to become an adult who perceives himself/herself and life in the same manner as his/her parent does. Thus, this is the cycle of "abuse and neglect." Adults tend to repeat the actions and attitudes which they learned as children.

## KU and LG&E customers will see bill adjustments in Oct.

LG&E Energy Corp. announced the Kentucky Public Service Commission (PSC) approved a settlement agreement that will provide for bill adjustments to all customers for costs previously recovered under the Environmental Cost Recovery (ECR) mechanism.

Last December, the Kentucky Supreme Court affirmed the constitutionality of the state ECR statute which allows Louisville Gas and Electric Company and Kentucky Utilities Company to recover environmental costs incurred after Jan. 1, 1993, which is date that the statute

took effect. However, the high court ruled that environmental projects built and completed before 1993 would not be eligible for cost recovery under the ECR mechanism, so it remanded the case back to the PSC. Since the Supreme Court decision, the utilities had been working with interested parties to determine the proper bill adjustments necessary to comply with the ruling.

The agreement will provide a billing adjustment of about \$19.9 million for all KU customers and approximately \$5.1 million for all LG&E electric customers.
