Public will get look at new Hwy. 150 plans Oct. 12

 Rockcastle County residents will finally get a look at the new route of Hwy. 150 from Crab Orchard to Hwy. 461 at Mt. Vernon.

A public hearing has been scheduled by the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet for October 12.

The public meeting will take place at the Brodhead Elementary School beginning at 6:00 p.m. and ending at approximately 9:00 p.m.

Officials from the state highway department in Somerset, who will hold the meeting, will advertise it to the public in this publication on September 9 and October 7.

According to the legal notice, submitted by Chief District Engineer, Roger Coffey, the meeting is being held to give all interested persons an opportunity to become better informed and to express their views concerning the proposed project.

According to the legal notice, the public hearing will be conducted in an "open house" format. There will be no formal presentations at this informal type hearing and interested persons may come and go any time between 6:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.

According to the notice, those in attendance will be welcome to review the proposed plans, discuss the project and express their views concerning the social, economic, historic and environmental effects the new road, as proposed, will have upon individuals, businesses, cultural resources and other organizations in the area.

Representatives of the transporta-

tion cabinet involved in the details of the project will be present at the meeting to answer questions, address comments, and assist the public with any information made available.

Also, handouts describing the project's purpose and need, will be distributed at the public hearing. The proposed project's environmental assessment, which was approved by the federal highway administration and the transportation cabinet on May 19, 1999, along with displays of plans, maps and other pertinent dates will be available for review during the meeting.

According to the legal notice, information concerning right-of-way acquisition and relocation assistance procedures will also be available.

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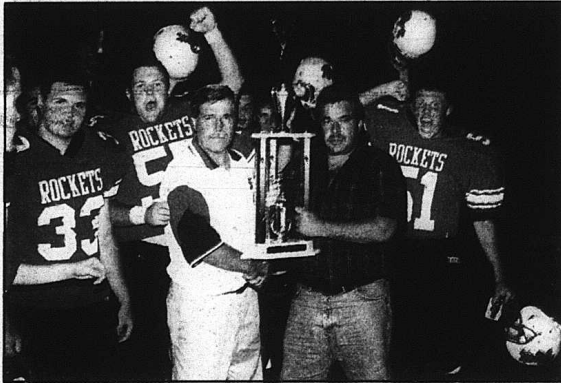
Homecoming at Livingston this weekend

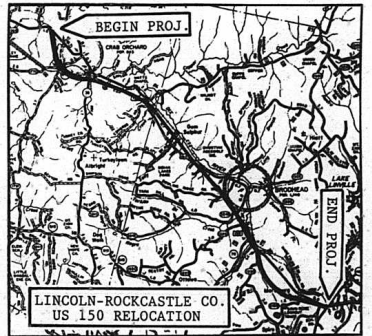

Fiscal court takes four percent tax rate hike

Rockcastle County property owners will be digging a little deeper in their pockets when they pay their property taxes this year.

The Rockcastle County fiscal court did something no other court has done since 1971 on Monday when they took a four percent increase in the fiscal court's tax rate.

The vote to raise the rate was unanimous.

The fiscal court joined three other

taxing districts, the local library board, health board and extension board in taking the four percent increase. The soil conservation district did not take an increase.

According to Kentucky law, each taxing district can take a four percent annual increase, by simply holding a public hearing.

The fiscal court will hold their public hearing on Friday, September 10, at 9 a.m. at the Rockcastle County

courthouse.

After Monday's special called meeting, Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotus said the increase would generate only \$4,265, more in revenue for the county next year and would cost the average taxpayer only about one cent a week.

Carlotus said he divided the county's 9,000 tax bills by the \$4,265 to come up with the one cent a week

Most students score above average on CTBS

 Scores from basic skills tests in reading, language, math, science, social studies and spelling given third, sixth, ninth and tenth graders in Rockcastle County show mixed results over the past year.

The good news is that students scored above the national average in every grade, except for the ninth, which has been a trend now for several years.

Mrs. Claudina Cash, testing coordinator for local schools, said that the low scores in the ninth grade is a national trend but that, in Rockcastle County, the scores have always improved in the tenth grade.

Last year, RCHS, tenth graders, significantly outscored their ninth grade counterparts in every category.

While the freshmen scored below the state and national average in every category, the sophomores at RCHS scored above the state and national average in every category, except spelling and math.

30 is considered the state and national average score and RCHS freshmen scored an average of 45.2. Statewide freshman scored 48, also below the national average.

A trend that has always held true in Rockcastle County Schools where third grade students score the best was again the case in 1998.

In every school, Roundstone, Brodhead and Mt. Vernon, third grade students scored well above the national average in every category.

But a possible alarming statistic was the fact that scores at each grade

school, in each category, were lower in 1998 than in 1997.

The best overall scores in the county were once again at Roundstone, but at that school the scores have dropped the past two years. In 1996 Roundstone scored extremely high in many cases, which would account for the drop the past two years.

Scores at Brodhead have also dropped the past two years and, although Mt. Vernon students scored higher in 1997 than they did in 1996, they too dropped in 1998, with their biggest decline coming in math, falling some 13 points from 67.5 in 1997 to 54.4 last year.

The most improved scores in the county came at the Rockcastle County

Child-Lost Lexington Herald-Leader Headline August 24, 1999 - "Careless boy taken from parents by state!"

A little four-year-old boy lost in the woods close to his home, and gone for twelve hours or so, has been placed in a foster home by the cabinet for families and children.

Himmm-poor little guy. This was probably his first experience of wandering too far down the path into the woods with his buddies keeping him company, and the evening dusk deepening into dark hid the path he had been following and he became frightened and began wandering in the woods seeking security. And thanks to two good friends, the dogs, and some kind of home training to not give up when things get rough, he found a barn where he curled up and slept till daylight. I would think this experience alone would be enough punishment for him, if punishment was needed. Personally, I think he should have been rewarded for his ability to think and figure things out as he did. And I know from experience the anxiety his parents must have gone through. And to climax this bit of the unknown and being reunited with his parents he was taken from them to be placed with strangers? Now I don't know the whole story of the past care he had or the conditions under which he was living, but I know little boys and girls to strange things and every parent is not the wisdom of Solomon nor the patience of Job to deal with them. And there are few exceptions to the security of a mother's or daddy's arms when a little one is frightened.

And from what I'll read in the paper the family of this little boy was frantic. One report said the house was unkept, so what? He had been raised from babyhood there so he should have been adjusted to things others would claim unfit. I have seen children raised in these same conditions and some of them turned out quite well.

I think you would be surprised if I quoted a few names of people in high places and exposed what I know of the conditions under which they were born and reared.

Neither am I justifying what a careless mother can do to her innocent child that has to rely on her for care and guidance into adulthood. My mama needs to be close to hear the cries of a child in distress but no mother, especially if she lives in the country where other duties are constantly pressuring her, can nor should, shadow every minute of its life. Each child needs time for experimenting with doing things his/her way. Eventually this little boy went beyond the voices calling for him and I know that parents must have been frantic. And the little boy needed the comfort of loving arms after his venture and the parents needed the comfort of holding him close. And my personal opin-

ion is, the little victim needed someone he loved and trusted to tell his experience to. I hope this was a happy ending. If it was not, the child's presence in his treatment, maybe the mother needs some counseling on parenting and housekeeping. Many people with their roots deep in mountain lore believe in "spare the rod and spoil the child" and raise their children the way they had been. Or, "A burnt child dreads the fire" and turns them loose to do their own thing and lets them suffer the consequences. In other words, most of us do the best we can with what knowledge we have.

I think I have been a good mother, but I guess if we had the child and family care department when my children were small and my neighbors had been nosy enough to report me I may have lost three little ones to some other household. God, forbid.

When Judy was a very small toddler, perhaps two years or less, we bought our first cow and pastured her a half mile or so from the road. For a gets there we had to go out a path for a ways then up a steep bank to where a little fenced in area held a baby calf, and where the mama cow was milked twice a day. Mat often took Judy along and for her pet the calf while he did the milking. One day I put her bonnet on and sat her outside to play while I finished some chores and it wasn't five minutes later I called to her and didn't hear an answer. Then I took out the little boy and girls and out back and called loud, no baby voice anywhere. I was getting pretty upset, where could she be? At that time there was no barn to hide in so she had to be in the woods I found the path, down to the spring. By now I was crying and shaking and screaming JUDY! Then I thought of the path up to the call pen. I was out of breath when I saw her close to the log with her little sand bucket in her hand and calling out, cow-speak, cow-speak. Her words were backward but her meaning was clear, she had come to do the milking. Another time I was washing on the board, on the shady side of the house, with her playing close by and suddenly I missed the chattering of her baby voice and looked up and saw her there. Again I went through the scene, Judy, where are you? She was no where to be found. Once again I went to the call pen but no baby voice was calling for the cow. Again I was becoming frantic as I reached the house, one more place I hadn't looked, the spring. Oh, Lord! If she is there she may have fallen in, so I sped up and what I saw took the breath out for a minute. There directly above the small body of water was Judy's little bucket stuck up in the air. She had a red dress and matching panties on so there was no mistaking it was her behind above the water and one leap brought me close enough to see the wet face as she lifted it up with little bucket in hand, she was getting water for me.

I called, and listened for an answer, no answer, then finally I thought I heard a baby crying in the distance and listened more closely. Yes it was his voice from somewhere out toward the new-ground Mat was plowing. This was a ten acre plot of land so the bridge could be finished had cleared for crops, and to get to it one had to walk a half mile or so on the dirt road then turn off on a faint path leading through the woods another half mile, and somewhere on this road my little boy was crying and hunting for his daddy. Oh, yes, I still called him the baby although he resented it, and Mat answered, "He was just here, look around." She called and got no answer. She whistled her come here this minute whistle and still there was no answer. Then the search began. It had only been a few minutes so he could not possibly be far so she went one way Mat the other with no results. Barns were

searched, the pond and the springs were traversed as far as they thought he could have traveled in that length of time. Fear took the place of aggravation. Of all times for it to happen, the phone was out of order and our closest neighbor with a phone was a few miles away, so help could not be called for without driving somewhere to make the call. So Polly did that while Mat stayed close to the house and searched the immediate area. By that time she got home neighbors who had heard about him being gone began coming in to help with the search. Trucks passing by saw the commotion and stopped to join. By now Mat had went down Buffalo Creek all the way to Highway 80, a distance of three or four miles to see if by chance anyone in that area had seen a little boy and two dogs go by.

Oh yes, he also had his two pet dogs along. That was the strange part of it, ordinarily when they heard Polly's whistle they would have barked back, but today they kept their silence and simply protected their charge. By now the message was on the airway via truck CBs. The rescue squad had been notified and was on the way when Manuel Shepherd, the Sheriff at that time arrived. He was not with the Sheriff, but a good friend of the family, and had known Chad since birth, so immediately went up to Mat and Polly to find out how long he had been gone, what happened, etc. While he was talking to Polly and asking who he was wearing, he suddenly stopped and said, "Is he wearing blue?" At that question, he pointed over to the hill behind the house and sure enough a little boy with a blue wind breaker could be seen coming down the faint path with his two dogs close by. In three or four jumps Manuel was down the embankment and his strong arms picked Chad up

and held him tight as he carried him back up to the yard, giving him an extra hug before he handed him over to a thoroughly relieved and crying mother and grandpa. Happy neighbors and anxious truck drivers went on their way.

The only thing I remember being told he said was, "I took a nap by a big hollow tree and my dogs lay beside me. And another, I knew I wasn't lost for my dogs knew how to come home and I was on Grandpa's farm so the path would take me back to the house. (And so it did.)

Carelessness? No. Lack of attention? No. A little boy's inquisitive nature of what lay beyond the fence and his trust in his dog and grandpa's path leading to and from the house was all the assurance he needed for a safe return when he was ready to come back.

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court will hold a Public Hearing on September 10, 1999 at 9 a.m. at the Rockcastle County Courthouse for the purpose of obtaining comments from the public regarding the proposed tax rate.

The tax rate levied last year was 7.4 and produced revenues in the amount of \$156,538. This year's compensating rate is 7.2 and will produce revenues in the amount of \$160,911. The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court proposes a tax rate of 7.4 which will produce a total of \$165,384 in revenues.

(This new rate will increase the average taxpayer's county share of taxes by one cent per week/50¢ a year* \$4,265 divided by 9,000 taxpayers)

Revenue expected from New Property is \$4,265.
 Revenue expected from Personal Property is \$37,827.
 Revenue expected from Motor Vehicles is \$44,886.

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Take impressive 24-14 win Rock grounds big play Cards

The Rockcastle County Rockets scored a big, big win Friday night when they defeated visiting South Laurel 24-14.

Against Harrison County in the Death Valley Bowl, the Rocket offense had looked somewhat lackluster but, on Friday night, they came alive and put up 350 yards of total offense to stun the 4A school, which had beaten the Rock the past two seasons.

The week before, the Cardinals had run and thrown with ease against Clark County but, on Friday night, the Cardinals found the going much tougher against defensive coach Tony Saylor's swarming defense.

After putting up 350 yards of of-

fense against Clark, the Cardinals could muster only 280 against the Rockets.

Cardinal quarterback Neil Warren is good and he had a pretty good night, just not good enough. He was held to just 200 yards of offense compared to 450 a week ago and only two touchdown passes.

For the Rockets, the turning point of the game was probably the tremendous catch by Greg Harper, in the fourth quarter, on a 4-22 play from the Cardinals 30. Parsons dropped back, threw the ball and Harper caught it in the end zone over the outstretched arms of a Cardinal defender to give the Rockets the lead.

To begin the game, the Cardinals

came out strong on their first possession, moving the ball from their own 22 to the Rockets 16 yard line in eight plays and with the help of a flag against the Rockets. But Travis Ingram broke through on the next play to sack the quarterback and put the Cards back to the 21 to make it 3rd and 14. Greg Harper stopped Warren after a five yard pickup and the Cardinal kicker couldn't make the 33 yard field goal.

The Rockets first score came on their next possession. Derrick Bradley and Derrick Bussell combined to move the ball to the Cardinals 34 yard line. A false start by the Rockets moved the ball back to the 39 but, two plays later, Parsons found Harper for a 24 yard pass play to the 15. On the next play, Bussell scampered off right tackle and into the end zone. Terry's kick made it 7-0 with seven seconds left in the first quarter.

The Cardinals wasted no time in the second quarter, tying the score at 7 all on seven plays at the 10:07 mark.

The Rockets threatened on their next possession when Derrick Bradley broke loose for a 53 yard run to South Laurel's 23, but two plays later, a Rocket fumble gave the ball back to the Cardinals on their own 19.

South Laurel also mounted a threat on their ensuing possession. Warren threw two passes, the first good for 5 yards and the second good for 26 in the Rockets 47 where Josh Hale, the last Rocket defender between the receiver and the goal line, managed to bring him down. Following a pass attempt which Harper knocked down, Warren dropped back and threw the ball into the end zone. The only problem, it was a red shirt, worn by Derrick Bussell, who pulled in the pass.

The Cardinals had the ball to open the second half but, due mostly to two quarterback sacks by Harper and Joel Deatherage and Travis Ingram and Shawn Smith, the Cardinals had to punt the ball away.

The Rockets began their first possession of the half from their own 39 and, after one first down on a quarterback sneak by Parsons, following two runs by Bradley, Hale got loose off right tackle and ran the ball to the Cardinals 15. Bradley got 5 on the next play but Hale lost 3 and Parsons threw an incomplete pass to bring up a 4th and 8. Coach Tom Larkey then called on Terry for the 30 yard field goal attempt and it sailed through the uprights to put the Rockets up 10-7 at the 5:34 mark.

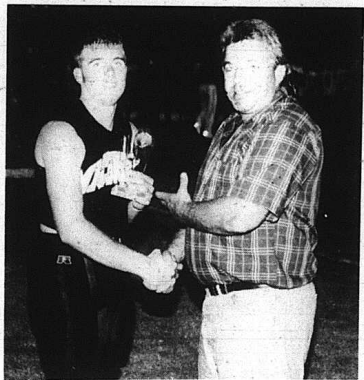
Terry's onside kick was executed beautifully by the Rockets and they took over on South Laurel's 43. However, the Rockets fumbled on their first play and the Cardinals recovered on their own 46.

Warren found a runner open on the Rockets 18 and, two plays later, found another open in the end zone and, after the extra point kick, the Cardinals led 14-10 at the end of the third quarter.

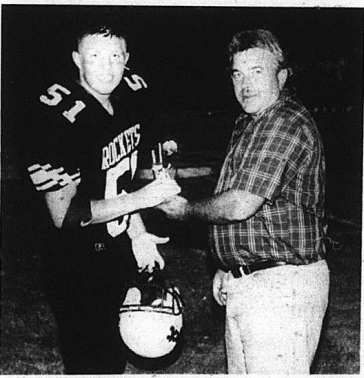

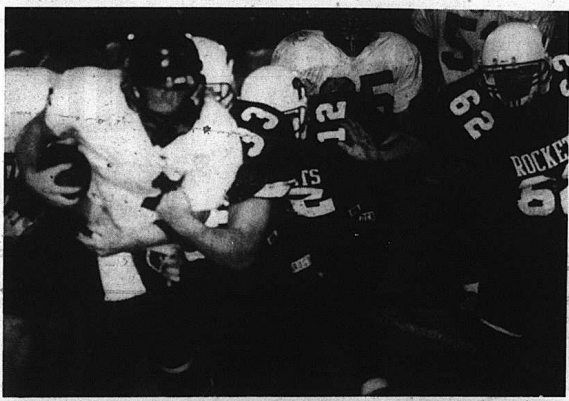

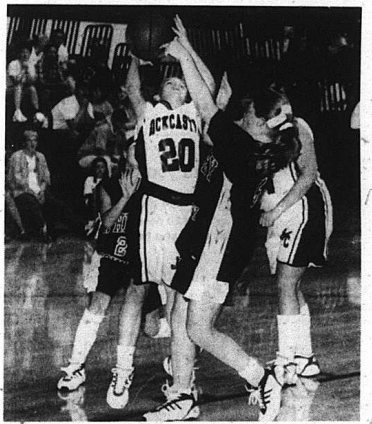

theory.
However property owners with the most property will pay the most tax, more than one cent a week, and taxpayers with less property, will pay less than one cent a week.

The court also accepted the school board's tax rate for next year, which actually dropped from .439 to .431 this year.

The school board gets the lion's share of the property taxes collected in the county. Last week that was just over a million dollars.
But, that million dollars is only about five percent of the school board's total budget each year.

Middle School, where students scored highest in every category except math and higher than the national and state average in every category, except math and spelling.

Sixth graders had an average score of 54, compared to the state and national average of 50.

Most schools only test their students in reading, math and language, but the Rockcastle board of education pays to have local students tested in science, social studies and spelling as well.

The Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills, or the CTBS, is also a completely multiple choice test, compared to the state's new test CATS, Commonwealth Assessment Testing System, which is essay and multiple choice.

Results from that test, which carries all of the weight in Kentucky, will not be made available until sometime in the next several weeks.

He was also indicted on a charge of possession of firearms during and in relation to a drug trafficking crime.

According to Joseph L. Famularo, United States Attorney, who announced the indictment, if convicted Hammond faces a maximum penalty of not less than five years and not more than 40 years in prison, a \$2 million fine, and/or both a term of supervised release of not less than four years.

Hammond was arrested last week in Peach County Georgia on federal warrants.
Matthew S. Kirby, 22, of Quail, was also indicted by the same federal grand jury for allegedly possessing with the intent to distribute Tylox and Oxycotin on July 24 of this year.

If found guilty Kirby faces a 20 year prison term and \$1 million fine.

may be submitted during the hearing, as well as at the district office in Somerset and shall be made part of the official hearing transcript.

A comment sheet will be provided with the handouts for soliciting written comments, and a recorder will be made available for those who desire to make oral statements.

FSA Announces New Amendments to Loan Procedures
Warden Alexander, Rockcastle County Executive Director reminds Rockcastle County farms of the FSA direct and guaranteed Farm Loan Program which enables lenders to extend credit to family farm owners or operators who do not qualify for standard commercial loans.

In general, to qualify for an FSA farm loan, a loan applicant must be actively involved in the day-to-day management of a farm operation and must:

1. be a citizen of the United States or legal resident alien
2. have the legal capacity to incur the obligations of the loan
3. be unable to obtain sufficient credit without a guarantee at reasonable rates and terms to finance the

farming operation.

In addition to meeting the eligibility criteria, the loan applicant must:

1. have a satisfactory credit history
2. demonstrate repayment ability
3. provide sufficient security for the loan.

The lender must determine whether a loan applicant has sufficient financial resources to repay a guaranteed loan. To make this determination, lenders work with the loan applicant to prepare a cash flow budget for the farm or farming operation. The new amendment requires a 1:1 cash flow.

Reminder To Sign Up For Hog Payment

FSA reminds hog farmers that sign-up for the \$100 million second payment of the Small Hog Operation Payment program has begun. Under the program, struggling small and medium sized hog farmers will begin to receive about \$100 million in additional cash assistance as early as mid-August.

Sign-up for the new round of assistance began August 9, 1999. Hog farmers who received the earlier payments will automatically receive the new payment in August, and are not required to reapply or fill out additional paperwork. Farmers seeking payments for the first time will receive checks within a few weeks of their sign-up.

Hog farmers who owned hogs in 1998 and marketed hogs between July 1 to Dec. 1998 are eligible for payments. Eligible producers will receive \$10 per slaughter-weight hog marketed during the last six months of 1998 on up to 500 market hogs (or an equivalent number of feeder pigs or other swine). Hog farm operators who received payments under the earlier disbursement would receive a pro-rated amount to bring their total payment amount to \$10 per slaughter-weight hog or equivalent. Payments would be limited to hog operations that produced hogs in the US and sold less than 2,500 hogs during the specified marketing period.

Forestry Practices Available
Producers who have more than 10 acres of non-industrial forest land may apply for Stewardship Incentive Program (SIP) benefits. Program includes cost share for establishing or re-establishing stands of trees through planting or direct seeding of trees for conservation and sustainable timber production or forest

improvement and to maintain and improve water quality and soil productivity on forest land and to restore wetlands.

Producers with small orchards are available for the "Tree Assistance Program (TAP). TAP provides assistance for small orchardists for replac-

ing or rehabilitating orchard trees and grapevines damaged by flooding and other natural disasters. Contact our office for more information.

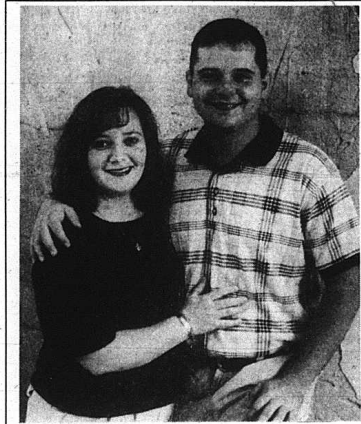

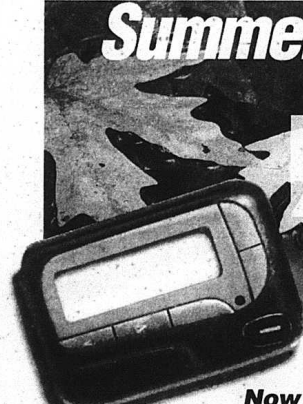

The following first appeared in the *Mount Vernon Signal* on March 1, 1907. It was recently transcribed from microfilm of that issue of the *Signal*. With these submissions, I am sharing these gleanings with the *Signal's* present readers.

Chewning, the Livingston lumber man, was here Wednesday. Victor C. Tate was at home first of the week from Jacksboro, Tennessee. James Chaney of Bloss attended Masonic Lodge here Monday night. Tack Langford and his entire family have been down with the grip. C.E. Settle, the spoke and timber man, is doing a good business. John Pearl and Ruth Landrum have about recovered from their illness. Tip Langford's son, Eddie, is recovering from his recent illness. Mr. W.A.B. Davis and his little daughter, Joe, are very sick at this writing. E. The old blue back speller says that Friday is just as lucky a day as any other. It further says that those who would thrive in the world should rise early in the morning. I have been trying to adopt this rule. I try to rise by six and no later than seven by the farthest. Well, sir, me and Gains Cummins grubbed and cut briars nine days in succession last week, and you know it snowed Wednesday night or we would have worked the other three days. Who's counting out of the snows? I've kepted two since my last report. Twenty more yet to fall. Look out for March and April, if like 10 or 11 years ago, I might say May too. The cackle of the old hens kept Cinda and the children busy running to the hen house. (Cinda is the old woman you know) How many started in the 1st of January to keep account of the products sold, and the amount of dry goods, groceries, etc. bought. **APPENDIX A
 PUBLIC NOTICE**

In accordance with the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act, written policies and procedures have been developed which describe the Rockcastle County School District's requirements regarding the confidentiality of personally identifiable information. Stated in this notice is a summary of your rights under the Act. These rights are passed on to the student at age eighteen. For the purpose of this notice, the student 18 years or older will be referred to as the "eligible" student. Parents, guardians, and eligible students may review and inspect all education records relating to that student by making a request to the Principal of the school where that student attends.

The RCSD will presume that the parent has the authority to review and inspect records relating to their children unless the district has been advised in writing that the parent does not have legal authority under applicable state law governing such matters as guardianship, separation, and divorce.

Personally identifiable information is not released to another party unless there is written authorization from the parent or eligible student, or there is a "Legitimate Educational Interest" as defined in the policies and procedures for confidentiality. A current list of employees' names and positions who have access to personally identifiable information is on file in each school. The RCSD has described in its policies and procedures the conditions under which personally identifiable information is released to another person without written parental consent.

"Directory Information" is information contained in an educational record which would not generally be considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if disclosed. This information may be released to news media, athletic organizations, scholarship or college entrance committees, or official organizations whose need for data is connected with student help activities. "Directory Information" includes, but is not limited to the student's name, address, telephone listing, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended. The parent, guardian, or eligible student currently enrolled, may request all or part of the directory information be withheld. The request must be in writing to the Principal of your child's school, within 30 calendar days after this notification has been distributed. The written request must specifically state what information may not be classified as directory information.

In accordance with federal regulation concerning the release or transfer of educational records, it is the policy of this school district to forward education records on request to a school in which a student seeks or intends to enroll. Parents may obtain upon request a copy of the records transferred.

The Rockcastle County Schools keeps child and youth records in a secure computer system and in locked files in each school and central office.

Any parent or guardian of a student, or any eligible student, may challenge the content or accuracy of any material or entries in the student's educational records on the grounds that it is inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise in violation of the privacy or other rights of the student. Requests to amend the records are submitted to the principal of your child's school.

For students who have been determined eligible for programs for children and youth with disabilities, educational records will be destroyed at the request of the parent when they are no longer needed to provide educational programs and services. The RCSD will destroy the educational records of a child or youth without a parent's request after the records have been maintained for a minimum period of seven years and are no longer needed to provide educational programs and services. Parents are advised that data contained in the records may be later needed for Social Security purposes. The RCSD retains for an indefinite period of time, a record of the student's name, address, telephone number, grades, attendance record, classes attended, grades completed, and year completed.

Children and youth determined eligible for special education include those children and youth with disabilities who have hearing impairments, vision impairments, emotional and behavior disorders, both deafness and blindness, health impairments, specific learning disabilities, mental disabilities, multiple disabilities, speech and language impairments, physical disabilities, autism, or traumatic brain injuries, and who because of these impairments need specially designed instruction and related services.

The Rockcastle County Schools has an ongoing Child Find system, which is designed to find any child or youth age birth up to 22 years, who may have a disability and need special education. This includes children and youth who are not in school or those who are in school but are not receiving the special education they need if have an appropriate public education.

The Rockcastle County Schools will make sure any child or youth who has a disability, regardless of how severe the disability, is provided an appropriate public education at no cost to the parents of the child or youth.

Parents, relatives, public and private agency employees, and concerned citizens are urged to help the Rockcastle County Schools find any infant, toddler, child, or youth who may have a disability and need special education and related services. The district needs to know the name and age, or date of birth of the child or youth; the name, address, and phone of the parent or guardian; the possible disability; and other information to determine if special education is needed.

Letters and phone calls are some of the ways Rockcastle County Schools collect the information needed. The information the school district collects will be used to contact the parents of the child or youth and find out if the child or youth needs to be evaluated or referred for special education services.

Child Find activities will continue throughout the school year. As part of these efforts, Rockcastle County Schools will use screening information, student records, and basic assessment information it collects on all children and youth in the district to help locate those children and youth who have a disability and need special education.

Any information the district collects through Child Find is maintained confidentially.

Parents, guardians, or eligible students have the right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education related to perceived failures by the district to comply with confidentiality requirements. The address is: Family Policy and Regulations Office, U.S. Department of Education, Washington, D.C., 20202.

Written policies and procedures have been developed which describe the district's requirements regarding the confidentiality of personally identifiable information and Child Find activities.
