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Bowling Ridge man jailed after shooting

A Bowling Ridge man is still behind bars this week, after a shooting incident at his home on Saturday night.

According to police, Benjamin Franklin Jones, 54, of Bowling Ridge, apparently shot Bobby Lee McClure, 44, of Castle Village Apartments in Brodhead around 7 p.m., during an argument between the two men.

McClure was taken to the Rockcastle Hospital and flown by helicopter to the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

According to police, Jones shot McClure twice, once in the right hand and once in the left forearm.

Jones is being held under a \$20,000 cash bond and with three other stipulations.

Jones cannot have any firearms in his possession, have no contact with McClure and break no laws, if he is released on bond. His next court appearance is September 20.

Garrard man charged with escape, DUI

A Garrard County man escaped Saturday night for a brief time from authorities.

According to Rockcastle Jailor James Miller, James Hammond, 20, of Paint Lick, had been arrested for driving under the influence and was awaiting transfer to Boyle County Detention Center when he managed to crawl under the cage of the transport car and escape through one of the front doors of the car.

Miller said that deputy Jailor Bill Lawrence was in the courthouse waiting to pick up another prisoner when the incident occurred, around 11:30 p.m.

Carlotis said that Stevens Road would be closed for at least two weeks, maybe longer.

Seven indicted by grand jury Friday

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down seven indictments last Friday, for alleged crimes ranging from kidnapping to burglary.

Benjamin F. Jones, Jr., 30, of Sand Hill, was indicted on eight counts stemming from an August 15th incident in which he allegedly kidnapped his wife Nell and their 10-year-old daughter and took them into the woods.

Jones is also accused of beating his wife with a gun and hitting his daughter with his fists.

Jones is currently being held under a district court bond and is scheduled to appear in circuit court on the other charges next week.

Christopher Sean Mullins, 24, and his wife, Crystal Gayle Mullins, 22, of Carter Drive, Mt. Vernon were indicted on several counts of possession of forged checks ranging from \$75.00 to \$290.00.

Only two question tax hike

Only two people showed up Friday at a public hearing to discuss the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court's four percent tax rate hike, they have taken for 1999.

At a special meeting last month, the court voted to take the increase for the first time since 1971.

Donald Clark and Quinton Barnett voiced their opposition to the increase, but to no avail, as the court remained solidly behind their decision to take the increase.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis said that the court should have always taken the increase because of lack of funds to operate the county on.

Carlotis said that if the increase had been taken by other fiscal courts over the years, the county probably would not have had to put a four percent tax on insurance premiums paid in the county.

The fiscal court was not the only taxing district to take an increase. The local extension service, the library board and health department, all took their four percent increase. The soil conservation district kept their rate the same and the Rockcastle County Board of Education lowered theirs.

State finally allows local jail to open

Nearly a year behind schedule

Rockcastle County Jailor James Miller will finally get to hang out a welcome sign at the newly renovated and expanded Rockcastle County Jail. Nearly a year behind schedule, and thousands of dollars over budget, the county's lock-up will be home to Rockcastle County prisoners for the first time since the fiscal court voted to close the facility last July in order to speed up the renovation project.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis announced Tuesday, during the Fiscal Court meeting, that the state department of corrections had finally given their approval for the jail to re-open.

The court had hoped the jail would pass its first inspection on May 11, but that did not take place and the jail failed another inspection later in the summer.

The reopening of the jail is expected to greatly improve the county's financial situation, which has been hit hard by the closing of the jail and the renovation project itself.

The new jail has 66 beds, compared to 30 in the old jail, and Miller said Wednesday the state has promised to keep the jail full of state prisoners, which will bring in about \$27 per day for each prisoner.

"We will try to keep about 50 state prisoners at all times," Miller said.

If the jailer is successful in keeping that many prisoners, the county would net about \$80,000 per year.

Miller said the only thing he does not have figured into his budget is expenses for indigent prisoners, such as major surgery or extended hospital stays.

Miller said the state would be

required to pay any medical expenses for prisoners they send the county. The new jail is complete with a drunk tank, maximum security area and indoor and outdoor recreation areas and twenty two beds for work-release prisoners.

Most of the prisoners will also be required to wear black and white uniforms and will not be allowed to have any personal belongings with them.

Keene resigns from council

Rockcastle Hospital Administrator Leo D. Keene has resigned from the Mt. Vernon City Council.

The council accepted Keene's resignation on Monday night, although he tendered it about a month ago.

Keene was re-elected to the council in November and was in his ninth year on the council.

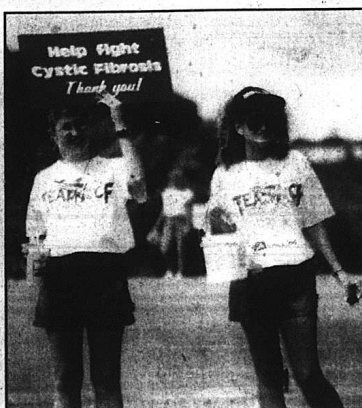
Mt. Vernon Mayor Karen King said that she would accept names from the council during a special called meeting on Friday morning at 8 a.m. as to who will replace Keene.

The Mayor will recommend someone to fill the remaining 15 months of Keene's term, but whom-

ever she recommends must be approved by a majority vote of the five remaining council members.

The council has 30 days to fill the vacancy.

Also during Monday's meeting the council approved a new personnel policy manual for all city employees which includes a two and a half percent pay increase now and another two and half percent raise after the second reading of the ordinance.

Thanks to the Internet, I can again have long discussions with friends and college buddies across the country for hours at a time and help develop solutions to world problems the way we did in dormitory rooms and smoke-filled coffee dives back in the sixties.

Remember a few years back when President Clinton admitted that he had tried marijuana but he never inhaled? Well, I have friends who never exhaled.

I'm not going to get into the details of how to do it, but it is very easy to get five way discussion going in "real time" among people located in five different countries. And since most of my readers seem to be from eastern Kentucky and in their seventies and eighties, let me say simply that it is just like being on a party line except you have to type in whatever you have to say.

The best part of it though, is that there are no long distance charges. If mom, Lynda Caudill, Tina Inon, and some of their friends (God rest their souls) were still alive America on Line and Compuzack would be trading about twice the current going rate and none of us would be able to afford a share of ICQ even if one might be available.

Any way I get into discussions with my folks, none of whom want it publicly known that they associate with me, that commence with a few minutes of rambling on the merits of agriculture prices, apparel and then deteriorate into a jangling about whether it is better to live in the country or the city.

My position is that I wouldn't live in Boston or Lexington for that matter if they gave me a deed to every single square inch of real estate inside the city limits. I'm proud to get my mail at a Pann Lack address but for the record, I still live a mile and a half from town and have no desire to be any closer.

One guy asked me last night how we stood that terrible noise that chickens make at the break of dawn every day. As if it could be worse than the noise the garbage compactor makes about the same time in any city in the USA.

The difference is, of course, that a crowing rooster is announcing that it's a new day and a good time getting started making it a better day than it was yesterday while a garbage truck is being driven without a muffler by a guy who pulls up under your bedroom window and revs the engine to a screaming roar with the sole pur-

pose of assuring that you start the day mad. It's a pretty obvious distinction, at least to me.

"Dogs bark all night," the city guy complains of country life.

"Yeah, I don't know how we ever get to sleep without the lovely sound of police, ambulance, fire truck, and other emergency sirens at thirty second intervals throughout the night.

Here on Lovell Branch, when we hear a siren up on the main road we call someone to find out what's wrong and we don't go back to bed until we know.

I can't get any satisfaction out of going to New York because I spend all of my time worried about whose house is on fire or what somebody did to get into that much trouble with the law.

When an ambulance goes through Pann Lack we want to know whether the wreck was or who had a heart attack and we worry about it until we find out.

And if a car goes by at a normal speed on Charlie Brown Road between midnight and 6:00 AM, it's cause for at least a minor concern. We want to know who and why because we figure it is somebody who either had trouble or is out to cause some.

Speaking of barking dogs though, my city friends are right. While I never want to live any place that the dogs aren't free to come and go where

it's socially acceptable to shoot one if it bites you on the road, I do get aggravated when they start barking all night long.

Nobody pays any attention to barking dogs until they get in bed and go to sleep for an hour or two and wake up because every dog within two miles is barking its fool head off. There is a simple solution to that.

I just take my shotgun out back and shoot the black behind my house three times as fast as I can pull the trigger. Some of them will squeal like they have been hit, but it's like flipping a switch. Instant silence community wide.

Lately I've been keeping firecrackers on my nightstand. When the dogs start barking louder than I can handle, I just raise the window, light a pack and toss them out in the yard. If anything, that works better than the shotgun.

One of my neighbors said she had her dog in the house because it was a female in extraordinary desire for male companionship and, truth be known, the biggest reason that all the other dogs were barking.

Anyway, she said that when the firecrackers went off it didn't alarm her at all, but scared the pooch so bad that the poor thing jumped up in her lap and peed all over her.

to be bride, was the first special treatment I had from him. He insisted I go into the dressing room ad tell her who I was, for of course he couldn't go in. And he said, "So this is Mike's old man, walking into a strange room full of people I had never met with a beautiful blonde young woman half dressed struggling through a pile of white satin with attendants trying to hold the train of her gown from under her feet while she held out welcome arms and greeted me with a half hug, with what part of her arms were still free, and said, "So this is Mike's other grandpa he has told me about." All awkwardness disappeared and another chamber of my heart was filled with joy.

The wedding ceremony was beautiful, as all weddings are, the most unusual part being Mike rolling out the white carpet for her to walk on when she marched in on her father's arm. He wanted to do this last thing for her before she became his bride. Then Mike's little cousin, carrying a cushion with a circle of gold in it and two darling little girls preceded her casting roses petals for her to walk on. Joy was a picture of loveliness as she came down the aisle toward the man of her dreams waiting for her, and soon they were "Man and wife." I wouldn't dare try to mention every thing served but I know there was chicken and dumplings, roast beef, ham and all things that go with them. It was served in the kitchen, or reception room of the church. And when all tables were full the remainder of the guests found their own place. One of the attendants helped me and I wound up using the piano bench for a table and the first few in the church as my seat. My remark was, "Well I have taken the Lord's Supper many times in church but this is my first wedding supper to be eaten there." This is a special occasion indeed.

The wedding I just witnessed was a traditional one according to today's standards of propriety. My memory took me back to days when many weddings were not so formal and were performed in much different

settings. And in many areas courtship and proposals were also handled differently.

Do young men still "go a courting" dressing in his Sunday clothes and knocking on the door of "his girl's" house every Wednesday night and invited in by one of the parents and told to go into the parlor and she would be there, directly? Then she would enter, also dressed in her best and they would take seats in opposite corners. That was at least till they were sure the old folks had settled down that evening papers or sewing. The parlor was usually saved for this special occasion when there were young girls in the family or for when the Pastor made his weekly visit to the home. It was the room with the best furniture and carpets, and where papers were not read and scattered about. The smaller children were seldom allowed to romp and play there. It was a room where you were allowed to talk alone in private, their only chaperon being the parents in the next room. Yep! I went through that. Or if there wasn't a parlor the boyfriend was entertained in the sitting room with the piano in the family. And if we were lucky we could give our goodnight kiss outside the door or at least in the dark of it half closed. When we went to church we were usually accompanied by one of the younger siblings. Of course we were in the same room as the deaconess to keep tongues from wagging.

Do young fellows still kneel before his sweetheart and ask her to marry him? Does still go to father and ask permission to court or marry his daughter? Are mothers still anxious about their daughters virginity being destroyed before marriage? Are they ashamed of the daughter if she bears a baby home without being married to its father? Is a boy reprimanded if he impregnates a girl and told by her parents, "You ruined my daughter! Have you heard of a shotgun wedding lately? Has your name changed a bit? Haven't they?"

The story of how my grandparents courted and married has been handed down for a couple generations and is worth staying in the family on some other generations to enjoy. I think they had been seeing each other in church or community affairs and he became interested in that beautiful golden haired young woman and his mother physically had a very mysterious, chatter attracted her as it did everyone else who ever came in contact with her. The story never told of him walking her home, but I'll bet he did for that was the way things were done back then. The next part said, one morning while she was rolling out biscuit dough for the breakfast meal he appeared at the kitchen door and said, "Well I'm here, I've come to get married, how long will it take you to get ready?" Off came her apron, she wiped her hands on it and said, "I'm ready." The court house was close by and the justice of the peace ready to perform the ceremony and they were man and wife before dinner. That marriage produced nice children and lasted better than fifty years. My dad, Henry Tackett, being the oldest.

Then there was the wedding of the young couple in our neighborhood, son of one neighbor, daughter of another who had been bitten by the love bug and the only cure for it was marriage, so one morning they appeared at our front door dressed in their (as we used to say) Sunday-go-to-meeting clothes and asked Mat to take them to see Preacher Bert Whitaker, a well known minister and jack of all trades who lived and pastored a church several miles away. They had their marriage license and wanted to get married. Since Mat had been called as the "jack of all trades" in our community and was always on call to take anyone anywhere they wanted, or needed to go, he asked if I wanted to go along, and of course I did, so he swept out the truck bed, they climbed over the tall gate and he took me to the church. I was in the front seat with the baby in my arms and we took off for a wedding. We first stopped at the Preacher's Home and was told he was at his saw mill a mile or so up the road and that was where we found him. He and his crew were busy sawing logs and it took a few minutes to get his attention but when Mat finally did he shut down the truck, wiped his nose and then we came up the path to the road with a wide grin on his face and commented on how busy he was but never too busy to perform, "A Holy Matrimonial Service."

That was, if the couple didn't mind having it performed by the side of the road, with the truck acting as the pulpit. NO objections at all came from the happy couple. They just wanted a ceremony making them Man and Wife. So, a well worn testament came out of the Reverend Bert Whitaker's pocket, the scripture read, a short speech about the sacredness of marriage, vows were exchanged and presto, we drove back home with a man and wife ready to take on the joys and problems of a new family in

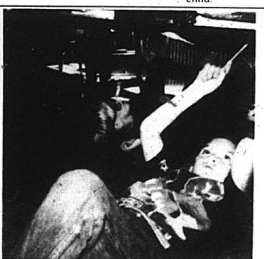

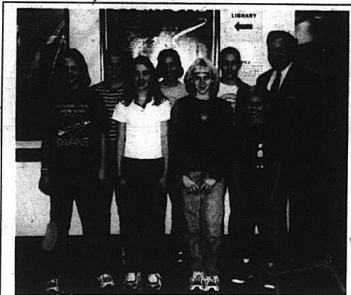

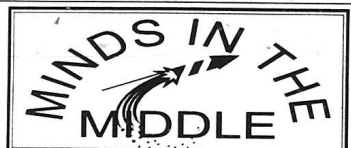

Internship program offers educators real world experiences

The Southern Regional Education Board in Atlanta, Georgia in its '1996 High Schools That Work Faculty survey revealed that teachers are yearning to go "behind the scenes" in business and industry. Academic and vocational teacher responding to the survey listed "visiting the workplace to see how employees use academic skills in their daily work" as one of their top five staff development priorities. School-to-Careers funded by House Bill 724 in the Kentucky Department of Education offers teachers in Estill, Garrard, Jackson, Lincoln, Madison, Powell and Rockcastle counties the opportunity to visit a workplace for three days during the summer or on school breaks.

About thirty elementary, middle, and high school educators from seven counties participated in the School-to-Careers Teacher Internship Program this summer. The educator's job shadowed for three days at sites such as banks, retailers, hospitals, travel agencies, construction sites, manufacturers, retail shops, government agencies, and art centers. The Teacher Internship Program provides educators the opportunity to learn firsthand the knowledge and skills individual employers require of their workforce. With increased expectations for high school graduates there is added responsibility on teacher to deliver academic, technical, intellectual and personal skills needed by youths in the workplace and postsecondary education.

Following the internship experience, teachers are required to complete workplace learning to school goals, Kentucky's Education Reform Act, and classroom instruction and guidance practices. The new information can effect that teacher's entire method of instruction, including raising standards and re-evaluation vocational programs and work-based learning opportunities available to students. Business and industry participants often cite the classroom and even form major partnerships with

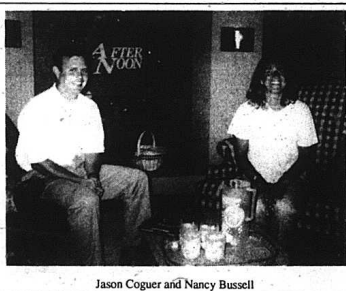
the teachers.

Rockcastle County Educators participating in the Teacher Internship Program this summer were Jason Coguer and Nancy Bussell, Charlotte Bullock, and Regina Little from Rockcastle County Middle School. Jason Coguer and Nancy Bussell are shown on the set of "Afternoon" at WKYT-TV in Lexington. Both educators participated in a detailed tour of the TV station that offered them the opportunity to see all aspects of the industry. Ms. Bussell was asked how this experience would benefit her students, she shared "Close and in depth experiences with the real world of news reporting on TV will give the lessons authenticity and real life learning."

Charlotte Bullock completed a three-day stint between Mt. Vernon Plastics in Mt. Vernon and Integrity Mold and Die in Berea. As a result of her experience Ms. Bullock developed a unit that aligned workplace and classroom expectations. The skills for the unit primarily focus on reading, writing, and mathematics.

While at the Lexington Herald Leader, Regina Little shared "it gave me better understanding of job opportunities and employment procedures." The unit developed by Ms. Little included activities centered around writing but contained information about her experiences while at the Herald Leader.

The program and funding are coordinated through a Local Partnership Council comprised of 51% business, industry, and labor and includes representatives from education, postsecondary, government, and community from all seven counties. Jenny Sweet directed the program and shared "we hope to increase the number of participants in our teacher internship program this year." 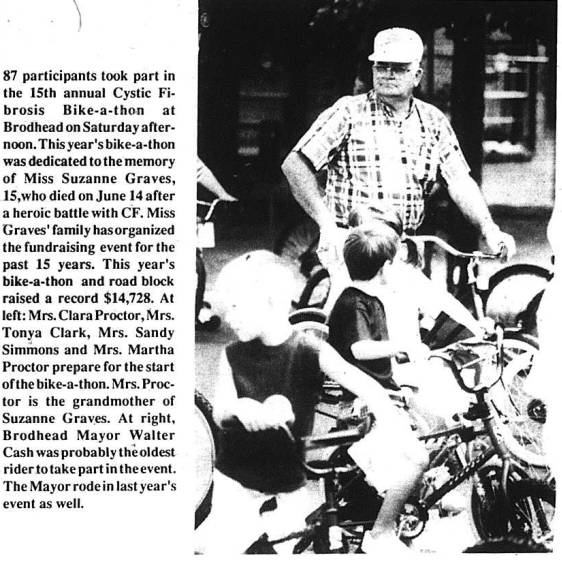

Each FSA farm number with quota will receive an application whether tobacco was

grown or leased away. Farmers who have tenants will need to work with the tenant in getting all the signatures to complete applications.

1. Poster must be created by a currently enrolled 4-H'er.
2. Well know cartoon figures cannot be used because they are copyrighted. (Examples: Looney Tunes, Power Rangers, Ninja Turtles, X-Men, Rescue Rangers, Charlie Brown, etc.)
3. All posters must be designed on or affixed to 0.16 ply construction paper, poster board (solid fiber board) of 14 inch x 22 inch dimensions (one half a standard poster board size). They may be horizontal or vertical. Posters may be produced by any medium, such as watercolor, ink crayon, acrylic, charcoal, oils, or collage, so long as they are not three dimensional.
4. 4-H is to be the topic for the poster. You can show what you think 4-H is, what you do in 4-H, what you think 4-H does for young people.
5. The 4-H'er's name, age, FULL ADDRESS, county, area, teacher, school and grade must be affixed to the back of the poster board in the upper left hand corner.
6. Winners will be chosen by grades 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8.

A Rockcastle Kiwanis salute

If you would like to see an intelligent, talented, sharp as a tack, excited, dynamic, full of energy, busy on the go, motivated, determined kind of person, you need look no further than Shirley Cummins of Mt. Vernon, who for the past 15 years has been juggling an unreal work load here in the county and has been loving every minute of it.

She has also shown through her many accomplishments a genuine love for this community and its people and for this the Kiwanis Club would like to recognize and honor her with this special salute. Shirley was born in Mt. Vernon, the daughter of Russell and Margie McFerron. She was one

of four children and has lived in Mt. Vernon all her life. She married Billy R. Cummins and they have three children and two grandchildren.

When her children were young, Shirley spent many hours volunteering for the Rockcastle Historical Society at the Rockcastle County Library where she became involved with the Senior Citizens Center. She became the center's Executive Director and later was instrumental in helping to add a Senior Citizens Center in Brodhead and Livingston. It was during these first few years that Shirley says she became aware of other counties receiving grants for things that this county was in need

of, namely transportation for the elderly. And so in 1987 she began her successful quest for numerous grants that made it possible for her to establish the Rural Transit Enterprises Coordinated, Inc. (RTEC) for the purposes of providing community transportation services.

This successful venture began its operations as a single county operation and has quickly grown to encompass twelve county transit systems with 135 employees and 105 vehicles traveling throughout the state and providing a shuttle bus service for taking people to work, to child care and to job training. And for the elderly it has been a much-needed service to the doctor, drugstore,

grocery, and to the senior citizen centers making it possible to stay a little more independent.

In 1990, with the help of grants, Shirley was able to purchase the former post office facility on Main Street and set up a center for the transit operation. In 1996 she was able to purchase the Parsons' building located on Spring Street to begin its own vehicle maintenance. As RTEC began to stretch out and grow the need for more office space to expand its reservation and administrative offices became evident and Shirley was able to purchase the former facility known as Agnes' Salon of Beauty and Bullock's Barber Shop and the Bryant Building on Main Street.

Last month the public was invited to an open house at RTEC to see the newly renovated and restored buildings and was delighted to see the care in which these old buildings had been transformed to such useful office spaces while carefully protecting their historic value. Shirley has a genuine love for this community and it is evident in the way she has brought new life into these buildings and yet has taken the time and effort to preserve the memories for all of us.

Shirley is not a glory seeker and is quick to point out that she cannot take the credit alone for her accomplishments but feels she has been truly blessed to be surrounded with gifted people who care deeply about the folks they are serving and who, like herself, derives a great amount of satisfaction in this type of work. She is very proud of the dedicated teamwork at RTEC and has always received a lot of support from local officials and the public.

She also gives much credit to her husband and children for their tremendous support they have always given her. She says many meals have been shared around her desk at work when she just couldn't get away. When you talk with Shirley, it becomes quite clear that she has just begun. She clearly has a vision for more additions and growth for the community and RTEC. She talks of a new venture that includes turning a wooded area into a driver range for training, combined with a local historical preservation project. And from her past record I would say that she is the type of person that doesn't just talk about it, she will get it done.

Over the years RTEC and Shirley have received many awards for outstanding achievements. They were awarded Outstanding 5311 Public Transit Grantee for Eastern Kentucky during the years 1989, 1993 and 1995 and Outstanding Public Transit Grantee Statewide in 1991 and 1997. RTEC has taken the lead in its outstanding Participation in Disadvan-

taged Business Enterprises and Shirley was honored as Outstanding Manager in 1993.

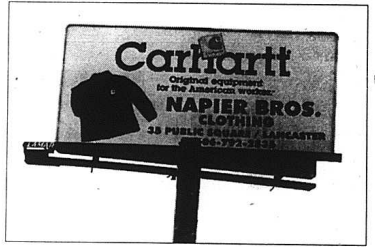
Shirley is a national certified CTM actively involved in Ky. Public Transit Association and has held the office of secretary for three years, a charter member of Kentucky's Drug and Alcohol Consortium, a nationally Certified Community Transit Manager and Charter Coordinator for Southeast Kentucky RTAP, and a member of the Rockcastle County

Agricultural News

Phase II Tobacco Settlement
Beginning September 17th, Phase II Applications will be mailed from the National Tobacco Growers Settlement Trust to the operators of the farms with a basic tobacco quota. Applications MUST be prepared in BLACK INK ONLY and returned to the Kentucky Tobacco Settlement Trust Corporation, PO Box 2025, Frankfort, KY 40602-2025, postmarked NO LATER THAN October 8, 1999.

It is CRITICAL that you read the step by step instructions that come with this application before you start completion of the form. These forms CANNOT be photocopied. Applications must be signed by all eligible parties involved with the farm in the 1998 crop year. You must stay within the blocks when listing the information requested. If a producer needs a continuation sheet, it will be available in the County Extension Office and the FSA Office. An application that does not include the signature and social security number of an eligible party will be considered incomplete and payments will not be made. The FSA office has an informa-

tional pamphlet concerning the settlement and 1998 FARM CROP RECORD DETAIL LISTING available for you for verification of the printed information on your application. This is available to you by way of mail, fax or by personally picking the information up from the FSA office. FSA employees CANNOT fill out the form for producers. However, the County Extension Office or the FSA Office will assist by answering your questions. Also, you may visit the web site at www.kytobaccotrust.org or by calling 1-888-246-8698. REMEMBER: It is the operators responsibility to make sure the form is completed correctly!

Emergency Loan Assistance provided by the FSA has been approved for providing Emergency (EM) loans to help cover production and physical losses in the county due to drought.

Emergency loan funds may be used but are not limited to: replace or essential property, pay bill or part of production costs associated with the disaster year, reorganize farming operation and refinance debts. The loan limit is up to 80% of

actual production losses, or 100% percent of physical losses. Maximum indebtedness under the EM program is \$500. The current annual interest rate is 3.75%.

For more information about this or any other FSA program, contact the local FSA office.

Conservation Program
Rockcastle County has been approved for providing assistance to landowners under the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP). Drought Emergency Measures (ECM) is the only practice approved to date. ECM provides for assistance for measures to: permit grazing of pasture by livestock, supply emergency water for existing irrigation systems serving orchards and vineyards and for emergency water for confined livestock.

The practice is considered temporary and is to be cost shared at a rate of 64% of the actual cost not to exceed \$3000 per acre. If a participant elects to permanently install a practice considered as temporary, the landowner is responsible for the additional expense. For example, a pipeline and a tank, and fittings only. If the landowner elects to bury the pipe, he/she must bear the expense. If the tank is to be permanently installed by anchoring with concrete and placing gravel around the tank, then the landowner must bear the expense.

Hospice Care Plus consolidates

Hospice Care Plus' Board of Directors has approved the decision to consolidate Rockcastle County's Mt. Vernon office with its office in Berea. As a non-profit organization, Hospice provides care for persons with a terminal illness and their families, regardless of ability to pay. As in all aspects of healthcare, Hospice is facing increased expenses to provide this type of care. Hospice's goal to provide quality services has increasingly tapped its financial reserves. For several months, the agency has experienced patients being admitted for shorter lengths to stay, which results in less reimbursement from Medicare/Medicaid.

In order to continue providing comprehensive, quality services, Hospice's Board of Directors chose to eliminate as much overhead cost as possible. In addition to the Mt. Vernon office, the Irvine and McKeel offices have also been consolidated. The Irvine and Richmond offices have been combined and the McKeel and

Berea offices have joined. Hospice continues to serve Jettie Jackson, Lee, Oswley, Madison and Rockcastle counties. Hospice offices are now located in Richmond, Berea and Beattyville.
