Mt. Vernon raises taxes and privilege license fees

During a special called meeting on Friday, the Mt. Vernon City Council raised city property taxes and privilege license fees.

The property tax rate for city residents increased only a fraction from 1.57 to 1.70. The rate the city charges on motor vehicles and water crafts did not change.

But in most cases, businesses and professional people will be paying a little more for the privilege of doing business each year in Mt. Vernon.

Most businesses within the city limits of Mt. Vernon will be charged a flat \$100 per year fee, but there are numerous exceptions and various rates.

Apartment complexes will be charged \$10.00 per unit, per year. The two Rockcastle County banks will pay \$200 per year.

All campgrounds will pay \$10.00 per campsite per year as will motels who will pay \$10.00 per unit, per year.

Restaurants in Mt. Vernon will pay \$100 per year, plus \$100 per seat over 50 seats.

Theaters in Mt. Vernon will pay \$100 per year, plus \$100 per seat for every seat over 50.

As for professional people such as doctors and lawyers, each one of them will be charged \$100 a piece. If a firm has three lawyers it will cost them \$300 per year.

In the revised ordinance that the city passed there was no category for vendors who set up at festivals in the city or at Renfro Valley for a couple of days.

Mt. Vernon Mayor Karen King said that she left those people out of the ordinance purposely because she does think they should be charged for such a short period of time.

Surveillance cameras to be used at illegal dumps

U.S. Representative Harold "Hal" Rogers of Somerset has announced that Rockcastle County has been awarded \$14,000 by the PRIDE program. The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court has been awarded the funding to purchase surveillance cameras for the county in a further effort to thwart illegal garbage dumping.

Rockcastle County Solid Waste Coordinator Nancy Meadows said the \$14,000 will be used to buy two or three cameras with motion detection devices, powered by Marine batteries.

"We will move these cameras

"I think it is a privilege for the city to have these people come to these festivals and in most cases, many of them would not make a \$100 profit while they are here," she said.

The matter was tied up in court for several years, before the entire

Burning ban still in effect

Even though Rockcastle County got some much needed rain on Monday and Tuesday, an outdoor burning ban is still in effect.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carolofus said Tuesday that the state's division of forestry had requested that the ban remain in effect because of the extreme drought conditions the county has been under.

Over the weekend, at least four fires broke out, including one that burned over 130 acres near the Rockcastle River.

Forest Ranger Marvin Stone said that all four fires are suspicious in nature and anyone with information should contact him at (606) 256-5031.

state government officials throughout Southern Kentucky next week.

Local and state officials from nine counties will have the opportunity to comment on local government growth, function and structure before the full interim committee at a public hearing in London Monday. The hearing will begin at 7 p.m. at the Cumberland Valley Area Development District building on Old Whitley Road.

On Tuesday, legislators will visit with local officials from Jackson County at the county courthouse in McKeen before traveling to Corbin for a 1:30 p.m. meeting at the Corbin Civic Center. They will then return to London for a boat tour of Laurel Lake.

A second public hearing will be held at the Rockcastle County Courthouse at 10 a.m. on Wednesday, to

solicit further comment on local government structure and operation.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carolofus is encouraging all Rockcastle residents to attend the hearing.

"It is in this county's best interest that everyone show up and voice their opposition to the consolidation of counties," Carolofus said.

"They have been trying for thirty years to shift the power of local government to a handful of people who would make all the decisions," Carolofus said.

"If counties were consolidated people would basically lose their say and eventually lose interest in local government," Carolofus said.

Local officials from Clay, Jackson, Knox, Laurel, Leslie, McCreary, Pulaski, Rockcastle and Whitley counties have been invited to attend

the legislative meetings in an effort by interim committee Co-Chair Sen. Albert Robinson, R-London to bring government to the people." Robinson is also Rockcastle's State Senator, representing Rockcastle, Laurel, Clay and part of Knox.

"The issue of merger and consolidation is sensitive to many Kentuckians. I believe this is the best way to gauge public opinion on this issue in this region," said Robinson. "Bringing the committee and task force to Southeastern Kentucky makes the legislative process more accessible to those who must travel long distances to the committee and task force to

the fiscal court and required to make annual reports to the court.

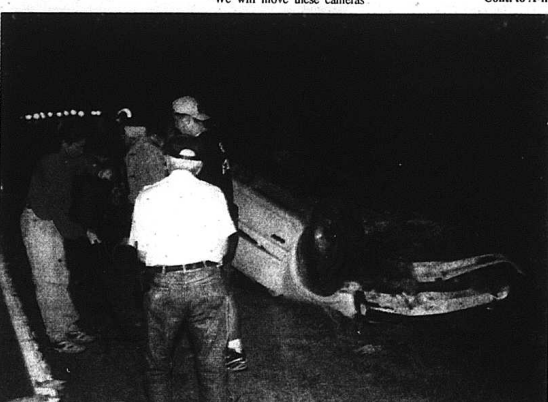
Appointed to two year terms were: Keith Smith, Preston Parrett and a member of the Rockcastle County Little League board, a person not yet appointed by the Little League Board.

I spent the early part of the week high in the mountains of West Virginia where the confluence of the Bluestone and Greenbrier Rivers form the wild and majestic New and the map is dotted with little towns or villages called Jumping Branch, Matoaka, Shady Spring, Lilly Grove, Pipestem and several dozen other names that evoke an outsider's curiosity as to their origin.

Pretty names, they are, that trip off the tongue so pleasantly that if you are the passenger in the front seat you casually announce to the driver and the folks in the back seat that you have just entered Winona and then a minute later you vocally acknowledge leaving Winona only because you want to say it twice.

Someone will wonder if that's where Wynona Judd got her name and a pointless argument will ensue along the line of whether Naomi can spell better than everybody in West Virginia or vice versa.

The fellows in the back seat will cheerfully note that the apples are about to break the limbs off certain trees and wonder aloud what are those pretty red flowers blooming this time of year where the drive asks, "What flowers. Where? What kind of apples?"

I didn't see no sign."

Because, you see, if the driver took his eyes off the road for more than his instant, chances are very good that he would collide with the apple trees or go skidding through a flower bed that some sweet and tenderhearted elderly lady has weeded and watered meticulously since back in March when she told the kids from the Easter Seals Society that she had to save all her spare change to buy Miracle Gro but if they would come back in September she would give them a bouquet of the lovely red roses her great grandmother brought over from Scotland during the War of 1812.

Driving along the back roads in the hills of West Virginia is like learning to write calligraphy on a roller coaster. You have to hang on tight and somehow still manage to stay between the lines. The only sights a driver will see while moving will be narrow twin yellow lines that look like a writer holding two pens got started drawing an S and couldn't stop and before you know it, he's been all over the whole page.

So when you plan your trip make sure you take someone else along so that whenever you drives in doesn't have to drive back to it. It would be a ter-

rrible shame to make the trip and not be able to see anything except two-lane blacktop.

I'm writing about the hills of West Virginia because they take the brunt of far too many Internet jokes and even Kentuckians like to snidely suggest that somehow even we command some level of intelligence that we smugly believe to be superior to West Virginians.

I hesitate to even suggest that any large number of Kentuckians take a tour of the West Virginia Hills because the place is so beautiful. There are no beer cans, beer cases, fast food wrappers, baby diapers, whiskey bottles, dead dogs or other garbage littering the sides of the rural roads that would have left them after the last big rain.

If you put the right group of Kentuckians over there they could trash the place in a weekend. At least that's how long it takes them to make a mess of Highway 52 between my house and Lancaster after 200 school kids burn their butts for a week sprucing it up.

I'm all for Congressman Rogers' initiative called PRIDE (Personal Responsibility in Desirable Environment) but from the looks of things, about half the population of Kentucky — including Lexington, lest the horse set feels left out — consid-

ers, anything outside their homes and automobiles to be a public dump.

The region of West Virginia I just came from is at least as economically depressed as Appalachian Kentucky and it is a shining example of the fact that you don't have to be filthy just because you're poor. And if you don't believe me, get off the interstate at Beckley and take Route 3 through the mountains to Pipestem and see for yourself.

When you cross or drive alongside the streams you will not see piles of jugs along the banks or disposable diapers hanging off the limbs of trees where high water left them after the last big rain.

From what I saw of the West Virginia Mountains, Kentuckians have nothing to sneeze at. Our leaders might be well advised to tuck their tails between their legs and go over and talk to theirs to find out how they keep the garbage off the public roads and out of the rivers.

There is profound truth and justifiable pride in the late John Denver's song, "Take me home Country Roads, to the place below West Virginia — "Almost Heaven," the song says, and it is, and the people who live there know it and want to keep it that way.

Don't you wish that Kentuckians felt the same way about their homeland?

Dear Editor,
As one who has relatives buried in the old Pleasant Valley Baptist Church Cemetery at Buffalo, Rockcastle County, I am appealing for help in restoring the cemetery to some degree of normalcy. We simply must show grandsons the way to the next!

My grandparents, great-grandparents, two aunts and an infant cousin are resting(?) there in this overgrown weed field surrounded by old abandoned farm machinery. Most of this equipment is obviously no longer usable and should certainly be removed.

Another eyesore is an abandoned sawmill, with the leftovers from bygone days. If the owners are still living, we would greatly appreciate their cooperation in clearing away the debris accumulating within, and near, the boundary lines of the cemetery. A business of this kind should never have been located in such close proximity to a burial ground. But, of course, the owner/operator cannot be totally blamed. This is what we family members deserve for our own untimely negligence and lack of attention in past years. This gave the distinct impression that we knew little, and cared less, about what happened to the place. So there's plenty of blame to go around.

Having confessed to personal shame and neglect, I would now like to rectify this by trying to do better. The cemetery needs a fence and an entrance gate. And surely there are enough of us descendants still around to see that the place gets moved a couple or three times a year. Please, let us try! Perhaps the Baptist Association still has some of the property, providing a copy of the deed or boundary lines for erecting a fence. But just keeping the weeds and trash under minimum control would be an improvement, and we might have to settle for that.

It's only in recent years that it became known, through genealogical research, that my great-grandfather, a Civil War veteran, lies there among other long forgotten. I was assumed to find that one has no identifying marker at his grave; probably never had more than a rough field stone. One of his granddaughters, now deceased, was able to direct us to the spot, having often visited her as a child. She and her mother planted flowers on the grave and kept them watered. Unfortunately, she was unable to pinpoint the graves site of an aunt, now unmarked, which they also tended.

I should like to arrange for a military monument for my great-grandfather — and I have all the required information — but a shiny new stone in those surroundings would look like the proverbial petunia in an onion patch! Several relatives, from far-away places, report having visited the cemetery and come away sadten, not only at the lack of maintenance and care, but also because there's nothing to show that our old soldier ever passed this way, let alone participated in one of the bloodiest wars in American history.

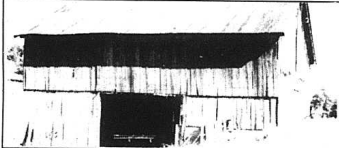

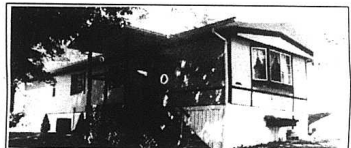

All of the properties will be sold at the location of Property 2 (Mobile Home and 8.3 acres).

Property 1 is located approximately 3 1/2 miles south of Mt. Vernon on Kentucky 1249 (Sand Springs Road). The property contains 100 acres, more or less, with approximately 93 acres located on the east side of 1249 and 7 acres on the west side. The property has approximately 11 acres of cropland and the balance in woodland. There is some marketable timber on this tract. The property is improved with a 36x36 tobacco barn. A well-known landmark in this area, the Fletcher Cave, joins the property on the west side. Choose A Diet Moderate In Salt & Sodium

Sodium and sodium chloride - known commonly as salt - occur naturally in foods, usually in small amounts. Some people add salt and salty sauces, such as soy sauce, to their food at the table, but most dietary sodium or salt comes from foods to which salt has already been added during processing or preparation. Although many people add salt to enhance the taste of foods, their preference may weaken with eating less salt.

In the body, sodium plays an essential role in regulation of fluids and blood pressure. Many studies in diverse populations have shown that a high sodium intake is associated with higher blood pressure. Most evidence suggests that many people at risk for high blood pressure reduce their chances of developing this condition by consuming less salt or sodium. Some questions remain, partly because other factors may interact with sodium to affect blood pressure.

Sodium has an important role in the body. However, most Americans consume more sodium than is needed. The Nutrition Facts Label lists a Daily Value of 2,400 mg per day for sodium. In household measures, one level teaspoon of salt provides about 2,300 milligrams of sodium. Most people consume more than this amount. There is no way at present to tell

who might develop high blood pressure from eating too much sodium. However, consuming less salt or sodium is not harmful and can be recommended for the healthy normal adult.

Read the Nutrition Facts Label or food labels to compare and help identify foods lower in sodium within each group. Use herbs and spices to flavor food. Try to choose

foods that are lower in sodium and salt. For more information on choosing foods that are lower in sodium, contact the Extension Office at 256-2403.

Phase II Tobacco Settlement
For producers who missed the first meeting concerning the Phase II Tobacco Settlement we will have a meeting Thursday, September 23, 1999 at 2:00 p.m. at the Bank of Mt. Vernon in the Community Room. This will be an excellent time for producers who have questions to come and seek advice. Once again we may remind you - **FARM OPERATORS are RESPONSIBLE** to insure these forms are completed correctly.

Beginning September 17th, Phase II Applications were mailed from the National Tobacco Growers Settlement Trust to the operators of the farms with a basic tobacco quota. Applications MUST be prepared in **BLACK INK ONLY** and returned to the Kentucky Tobacco Settlement Trust Corporation, PO Box 2025, Frankfort, KY 40602-2025, postmarked **NO LATER THAN October 8, 1999**.

It is **CRITICAL** that you read the step by step instructions that come with this application before you start completion of the form. These forms **CANNOT** be photocopied. Applications must be signed by all eligible parties involved with the farm in the 1998 crop year. You must stay within the blocks when listing the information requested. If a producer needs a continuation sheet these will be available in the County Extension Office and the FSA Office. An application that does not include the signature and social security number of an eligible party will be considered incomplete and payments will not be made.

The FSA office has an informational pamphlet concerning the set-

tlement and 1998 FARM CROP RECORD DETAIL LISTING available for you for verification of the preprinted information on your application. This is available to you by way of mail, fax or by your personally picking the information up from the FSA office. FSA employees **CANNOT** fill out the form for producers, however; the County Extension Office or the FSA Office will assist by answering your questions. Also, you may visit the web site at www.kytobaccotruster.ky.us or by calling 1-888-366-8698. **REMEMBER:** It is the operators responsibility to make sure the form is completed correctly!

Emergency Conservation Program
Rockcastle County has been approved for providing assistance to landowners under the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP).

Drought Emergency Measures (EC6) is the only practice approved to date. ECP provides for assistance for measures to: permit grazing by livestock, supply emergency water for existing irrigation systems serving orchards and vineyards and for emergency water for confined livestock.

The practice is considered temporary and is to be cost shared at a rate of 64% of the actual cost not to exceed \$300.00 per tank. If a participant elects to permanently install a practice considered as temporary, the landowner is responsible for the additional expense. For example, a pipeline and a tank, and fittings only if the landowner elects to bury the

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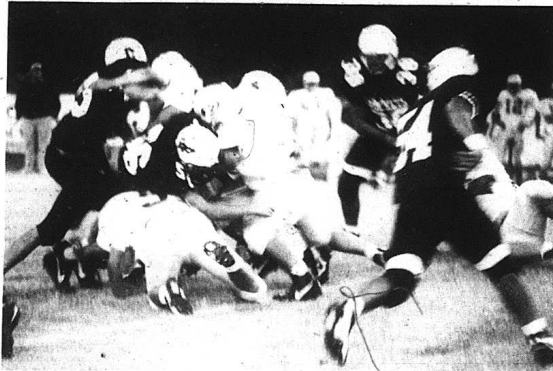

The Rockcastle County High School Rockets rode a 34 point third quarter to their third win of the season Friday night, against a pretty good Estill County team. The Rockets scored the only

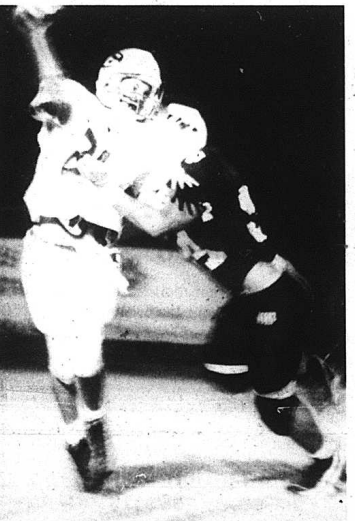

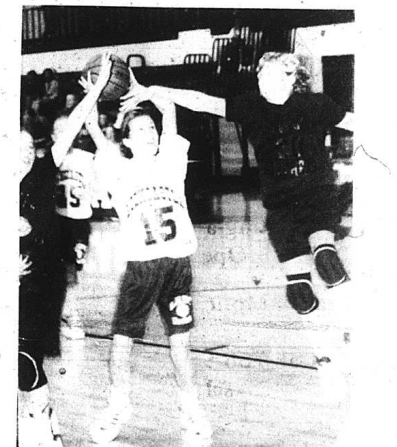

pipe, he/she must bear the expense. If the tank is to be permanently installed by anchoring with concrete and placing gravel around the tank, then the landowner must bear the expense.

Emergency Loan Assistance
Rockcastle County has been approved for providing Emergency (EM) loans to help cover production and physical losses in the county due to drought.

Emergency loan funds may be used but are not limited to: restore or replace essential property, pay all or part of production costs associated with the disaster year, reorganize farming operation and refinance debts. The loan limit is up to 80% of actual production losses, or 100% percent of physical losses. Maximum indebtedness under the EM program is \$500. The current annual interest rate is 3.75%.

For more information about this or any other FSA program, contact the local FSA office.

Tobacco Chemists
Effective October 1, 1999 a new testing laboratory will be used for

chemical analysis of tobacco samples. Tobacco samples are collected by COC for chemical analysis based on receipts that:

- 1. pesticides were not approved by EPA for use on tobacco
 - 2. pesticides were not applied in accordance with label directions
 - 3. pesticide results have been obtained on a sample of tobacco which is under loan
- Upon collection, samples are sent to a laboratory for analysis.
- County Offices then send samples to the new testing laboratory in North Carolina.

Tobacco settlement forms must be postmarked by October 8th

By State Rep. Danny Ford Don't miss out. The Kentucky Tobacco Settlement Trust Corporation will not accept any applications to sign Phase II money from the National Tobacco Settlement that are postmarked after October 8, 1999. Phase II money is the fund agreed to by the tobacco companies to reimburse farmers under the terms of the national settlement for the loss of tobacco quota.

Settlement forms are in the mail to all land owners and quota holders listed with the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). As of now, no tenant farmers to contact the owner of the farm where they raised tobacco to make sure they are included on the application and have the opportunity to sign the application. The law also requires the person filling out the settlement application to include persons who may have provided the labor or held the quota on tobacco raised on each farm. Any settlement funds not claimed will be rolled into next year's fund to be shared by everyone eligible.

There are three categories of persons eligible to participate in the fund. One is Persons providing the labor to raise tobacco and who shared in the risk of production (tenant farmers). Another is persons who own land used to raise tobacco and share in the risk of production. The third is persons who hold tobacco quota and share in the risk of production. Sharing in the risk of production basically means your return on the crop is based on the crop being marketed. The value of the settlement is expected to be about 24.33 cents for each pound of tobacco quota held in 1998. The first payments are expected to be mailed in December for this

YMCA tip of the week: children and friendship

One of childhood's toughest lessons is learning how to be a good friend. Being a good friend means that someone will like you back and that you'll be included and respected. That's important to kids, right? Not always. But it's definitely important to parents! So much so that it can cause stress and put pressure on children. Parents need to understand the emotional steps children take in building friendships. Every child is different, but there does seem to be a process that children follow in learning how to be a friend.

The basic idea of friendship is that one child is learning to be a good friend. Being able to figure out what someone else is feeling and act accordingly. Hardly an easy concept for a 3-year-old to master or even sometimes for an adult.

Between the ages of 3 and 7, your child thinks of "friends" as those with whom he/she is playing at that moment or often with. Friendship is not thought of as a relationship that endures over time. Somewhere between the ages 4 and 9, children slowly become aware that other people might think differently than they do. Then friend becomes "someone who does things that please me." Still, there's no real focus on the two-way relationship.

It's not until age 6 through 12 that kids begin to understand the reciprocal nature of friendship. And it's usually not until teen years that friendship is understood as a process in which different people with different ideas and personalities learn to cooperate. The lessons of friendship include learning how to discuss a problem, handle differences in opinion and find ways to compromise. By dealing with other children and comparing his/her own behaviors to theirs, he/she will build a stronger concept of self-esteem.

What does this mean for parents? Relax! Kids can and will work things out. It's not always easy, but it is a natural process. Roots of good friendship start at home. Early communication skills are used later with friends. Make sure your child has regular contact with other kids. Interaction takes place. Listed below are some tips on helping your child make

friends.

- Don't hover. Research shows that the presence of an adult keeps kids from interacting and talking.
- If possible, stay out of conflicts.

Unless you see violence breaking step back. Give children a chance to resolve their own conflict. If you do get involved, use phrases like, "What can we do about this?"

• Don't take children's words too literally: "You're not my friend" can really mean "I'm mad at you right now."

• Relax: Nurture support, but don't push. Be prepared for the hits and misses.

sonable, and treat Renfro Valley Entertainment the same as all other businesses, he would gladly pay his fee. According to the revised ordinance, Renfro Valley Entertainment will pay approximately \$4,000 to \$4,500 per year because they have two theatres, two restaurants, a campground and a motel.

The revised ordinance also calls for a \$37.50 to \$100.00 a day fine, for those business that do not buy a license, or do not do not display it in their place of business.

The ordinance also calls for the City of Mt. Vernon's police department to have the right to enforce the ordinance and issue any needed citations.

Councilwoman Clarice Kirby was the only councilmember to vote no on the property tax increase and the privilege license fee schedule.

Councilman Clark Mullins was not present, but there was a quorum with Kirby, Jackie Renner, Wayne Bullock, and Daryl Smith being in attendance at the special meeting.

When we arrived at the First Baptist Church, at which we are members, she wanted to stop for a minute to attend to some business and I wanted to stay in the car for to that and insisted I go in for a minute or two. It was an effort but I did crawl out slowly and go in. At the foot of the stairs, I saw a crowd of people and almost went back to the car. However, when I heard HAPPY BIRTHDAY ring out in many voices, I realized I had a surprise in store and stepped inside to find one of the biggest surprises in my life waiting for me. There stood the guests I was expecting at my house last year, and a whole room full of people I was not expecting. Tilda Cromer, my friends of many years and the guest I enjoyed so much last spring, was there

with her whole family and their spouses plus most of my old friends from Buffalo. Tilda had planned the whole thing with Polly helping her on this end by contacting the local guests. And, her children helping her on the other. I honestly did not know how to respond, should I burst out in tears? Should I throw up my arms and retreat? For awhile it was a mad house with trying to recognize people I hadn't seen in years but had known as small children. Here was Pauline, the oldest girl who had with Judy, slept upstairs with her where they could giggle all night if they wanted to. And, when she had whooping cough and held onto the big bucket next to the stove for support, my little three-year-old Polly came running and said, "Mommie, Pauline is whooping in my whooping bucket." And, so was that. That was Polly also good for support when she whooped and coughed. And, that all woman with the long black hair was Christine? The little blonde girl that was sent along, or chose to go along with the older girls, when they went anywhere, whether she wanted to or not, she had been in an awkward age group -- a little too young for Pauline and Judy and too old for Gene, Janette and Polly. So, she seemed to go where the most fun was. Gene and Janette were the youngest girls, and so close to Polly's age. Tilda might as well had had three little girls instead of two and a neighbor's kid. Janette was a part of the threesome until cancer took her life several years ago. I recognized Dean immediately for I had seen him last spring, but who owned that familiar face close by? Memory quickly went back to other faces with that same smile and curly hair and I could almost say his name but stammered long enough till he, sor someone, said, "Ralph." For goodness sakes, they had always been so close that when one said Ralph, it was always followed by, "and Dean" or vice versa, and here they were standing next to each other and I was stumbling for a name to finish the beginning, Dean and? (senility?) their being so close together should have been evidence enough for me to have called out his name automatically when I saw Dean. Now these were Rodney's buddies. They were like the Three Musketeers when they were growing up. Where one was seen, there were present. Their one room school years were spent together and a couple of years at Shoville High. Now here they all were except my two oldest ones, Judy and Rodney.

They had made other plans before they knew about my surprise party and couldn't change them. I wish I could make a list of each one here but by the way my memory is now, I am sure I would leave someone out and I wouldn't do that purposefully for the world. So THANK YOU, THANK YOU, THANK YOU. Maybe I can do that later when I get my wish back. But will say a very special thanks to the family that has been such a happy and important part of my life, and made all this possible. This Boss Gave Millions to His Employees

The headline was an eye-catching one: "Boss who sold cog-gives workers \$128 million as thanks." When Bob Thompson of Belleville, Michigan sold his road-building company, he could have pocketed the money and bought his own island on which to retire. After all he received \$422 million for the forty-year-old business. Instead he decided to share the wealth with his employees.

Thompson began the company in his home with \$3500 and his wife as co-worker. What began as an asphalt company soon expanded into a road-building company, and Bob was on his way. Success did not change his life, however. He and his wife still live in a three-bedroom frame house. He still mops floors and washes windows. His office is unpretentious with family photographs on the walls. He does not play the stock market nor belong to a country club. The only boat he owns is the one he inherited from his father, and it is a rowboat.

Bob chose carefully the company to whom he sold his firm. He picked the Dublin, Ireland company because of their record of not breaking up companies or firing workers. He will stay on to run the business.

The boss took \$128 million of his profits and divided it among his 550 workers. For 80 of them, a dream came true: they are now millionaires. Thompson also paid all the taxes on the money, so that each worker can keep what they received.

Hourly workers who have pension plans received \$2000 per year of service. Some checks added up to more than their annual salaries. Salaried workers, most of whom have no pension plans, were given checks or annuities they can cash in at age 55 or 62. Those range from \$1 million to \$2 million apiece. Thompson also gave money to some retirees and widows.

Thompson said he decided to share the money with the salesmen, the secretaries and the men in the gravel pits, because "people work exceedingly hard for us. It's a tough business, and this is a demanding company."

Workers' plans for the windfall include furniture, cars, braces, in-vitro fertilization, care for a mentally disabled child, college tuition and retirement nest eggs. Almost all expressed appreciation to Thompson.

As one worker said, "I've always held my head up high working for this company. Now it's a little bit higher. I'm standing on feet tall."

Those who own and manage businesses incur a special responsibility for the well-being of their workers. This is not only for the good of the workers but it is in the employer's best interest. Workers will treat customers as well as they themselves are

treated by the company. Satisfied workers add to the company's bottom line. Additional salary and benefits pay off in the long run by producing happy workers who stay on the job longer and increase their productivity.

There was a time in this country when the exploitation of workers was the norm. Miners, steel workers, rail-road porters and others were treated as little better than slaves. Today the enlightened view is that workers deserve to be treated as people and that the better they are treated, the better workers they become.

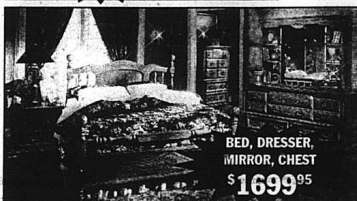

ORDINANCE #5-99

Whereas, it is the interest of the city of Mt. Vernon to maintain a current and to date personnel policy manual; and

Whereas, from time-to-time circumstances and issues coming before the City warrant a review of current policies, procedures and past decisions; and

Whereas, it is the desire of the City of Mt. Vernon to provide for the health, safety and welfare of its employees through the practice of equitable and reasonable policies;

Now, Therefore, be it ordained by the city of Mt. Vernon as follows:

Section One: The comprehensive personnel manual of Mt. Vernon is hereby amended to reflect the changes herein. The changes shall be incorporated into the main therein.

Section Two: Part III of the Personnel Policy Manual, the "Mt. Vernon Pay Plan" is amended as follows, including the attached new pay grades and wage schedule, which is based on the federal minimum wage.

Section Three: An additional section under Section Three (Section 3.7) Compensation shall be as follows:

City of Mt. Vernon employees are hourly non-exempt employees. However, Kentucky law does not consider time worked between 37.5 and 40.0 hours in the work week as overtime. Therefore, a non-exempt employee may take compensation time on or time during the work week for working between 37.5 and 40.0 hours.

Also, Kentucky law permits employees to take time off during the work week in order to avoid working over 40.0 hours in a week. If an employer permits an employee to work over 40.0 hours in a week, the employer must pay the non-exempt employee for overtime.

On October 22, 1986, President Reagan signed into law the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA, Public Law 99-519). The law required EPA to develop regulations, which provide a comprehensive framework for addressing asbestos problems in public and private elementary and secondary schools. On October 30, 1987, EPA published the Asbestos-Containing Materials in Schools Rule [40 CFR Part 763 Subpart E]. This Rule requires all public and private elementary and secondary schools to inspect for friable and non-friable asbestos, develop asbestos management plans that address asbestos hazards in school buildings, and implement response actions in a timely fashion.

To carry out the above activities involving inspections, management plans, and response actions the Rockcastle County Board of Education has utilized accredited personnel. On April 30, 1987, EPA published the Model Accreditation Plan [40 CFR Part 763 Appendix C to Subpart E] required by AHERA, which specifies training, examination, and other requirements for persons who inspect, develop management plans and design or conduct response actions in schools. The Model Plan became effective on June 1, 1987.

In 1988, the Rockcastle County Board of Education retained Barry W. Cooper, P.E. who completed an initial inspection to locate all asbestos-containing building materials (ACBM) and developed and submitted to the State of Kentucky an asbestos Management Plan that includes the results of the inspections. In December of 1988, the Rockcastle County Board of Education began to implement this management plan.

Copies of the management plan are always available for review for those interested persons at the Administration Office at 245 Richmond Street, Mt. Vernon, Ky and at the Principal's Office at each school any time during normal office hours.

Copies are available for duplication at a cost of 25 cents for each 8-1/2x11 page of the Management Plan.

A. Appointment term of office. The Vice-Mayor of this city shall be appointed by the Mayor at his discretion and the Vice-Mayor shall serve at the discretion and pleasure of the Mayor.

B. Qualifications. The Vice-Mayor shall be at least 25 years of age, shall be a qualified voter in the city, and shall reside in the city throughout his term of office and be a member of the City of Mt. Vernon.

C. Vacancies. If a vacancy occurs in the office of the Vice-Mayor, the Mayor may fill the vacancy within thirty (30) days.

D. Power and duties.

1. The Vice-Mayor shall assist the Mayor in enforcing the Mayor's Council Plan, city ordinances and orders, and all applicable statute. He shall assist the Mayor in supervision of all departments of city government and city employees under his jurisdiction.

2. The Vice-Mayor shall have the authority to sign any checks in the absence of the Mayor.

E. Compensation. The Vice-Mayor shall receive no compensation for any work he performs during his appointment as Vice-Mayor.

F. Oath Bond.

1. Oath. Each officer of the city shall, before entering upon the discharge of duties of his office, take the following oath: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm, as the case may be) that I will support the Constitution of this Commonwealth, and the Constitution of the United States, and be faithful and true to the Commonwealth of Kentucky, so long as I continue a citizen thereof, and that I will faithfully execute, to the best of my ability, the office of Vice-Mayor, according to law; and I do therefore solemnly swear (or affirm) that, since the adoption of the present Constitution, I, being a citizen of this United States, have not fought a duel with deadly weapons within this State, nor out of it, nor have I sent or accepted a challenge to fight a duel with deadly weapons nor have I acted as a second in carrying a challenge, nor aided or assisted any person thus offending, so help me God," as established by Section 228 of the Kentucky Constitution.

2. Certification. The person administering the oath of office shall certify in writing that the oath was administered and the date of its administration. The person administering the oath shall file a written certification in the office of the Rockcastle County Clerk.

G. Bond. Official bonds shall, if required, meet the standards of KRS 62.060.
