## Forest fires out in Rockcastle; still burning throughout state

For the first time in weeks no fires were burning in the Rockcastle County woods on Wednesday, after a 185 acre blaze at Sand Hill was contained Tuesday afternoon.

Local Forest Ranger Marvin Stone said that his crews have fought 58 fires that have destroyed thousands of acres since July 14.

The largest fire of the season thus far was in the Wolf Creek-New Hope area where crews battled a blaze for days that consumed 363 acres before being contained.

Rockcastle County is also under a 24 hour open burning ban because of the continued dry weather and Stone warned residents that investigators are in the area, trying to locate people who are intentionally setting the fires.

"Ninety percent of the fires we have had in this county have been intentionally set," Stone said.

"The suppression cost of the fires will climb into the thousands and thousands of dollars not to mention the damage done to the forest land in the county," Stone said.

An eleven member Forestry Camp Crew has been brought in to the county on at least ten different occasions and on Monday, the forestry service brought a plane in for a drop on a fire at Sand Hill.

In order for the local burning ban to be lifted, Stone estimates that the county needs nine to ten inches of rain or a four inch snow.

The fires may be out in Rockcastle County, but they continue to burn in eastern Kentucky.

"Since January 1, there have been 2,186 fires, which have burned 83,421 acres, making 1999 the worst fire season in the 90s in Kentucky."

Hundreds of firefighters who have been fighting fires for the past sev-

eral days and in some areas for weeks, are beginning to tire, as well as becoming frustrated, according to a release from the state's Natural Resource and Environmental Protection Cabinet.

According to the release, many of the fires that are brought under control by firefighters have been re-set by arsonists or by homeowners setting backfires.

The Kentucky Division of Forestry is asking citizens to abide by the outdoor burning bans that are in the county and also on the lookout for suspicious individuals in or around fires.

"We need the public's help in putting a stop to this crisis," said Mark Matuzewski, Director of the Kentucky Division of Forestry.

"We have investigators in certain areas to help with the arson problems and prosecutions are likely," he said.

Persons seeing anyone suspicious or around the fires in your area, should call the Target Arson Hotline at 1-800-277-AFson, or the Kentucky Division of Forestry at 1-800-866-0555. There is a \$1,000 reward for information leading to an arrest and indictment of an arsonist.

Arson is a felony and is punishable by fines of \$1,000 to \$10,000 and up to five years in prison.

Backfiring is also against the law. Residents living in Eastern Kentucky and firefighters currently working on fire lines are threatened not only by wildfires, but also by backfires being

set by homeowners to prevent fires from threatening their homes.

Matuzewski said that other measures can be taken to protect property.

If wildfires threaten your home clear brush and debris down to the bare soil in a ten-foot-wide path around all structures. If water is available, wet down the area and keep the hose readily available.

113 counties have enacted burning bans that prohibit any outdoor burning (campfires, warming fires, debris burning, etc.) and more county burning bans are expected. In counties where burning bans have not been enacted, the Division of Forestry recommends that all outdoor burning be postponed until adequate rainfall is received.

The Kentucky National Guard continues to provide air and ground assistance in battling the forest fires via six Blackhawk helicopters and A-9

## Mayor says she will seek net profits tax

# Petitions in circulation opposing tax

An occupational tax that the city of Mt. Vernon is trying to place on local workers has apparently caused an uproar among some local people.

Several petitions against the 1.5 percent tax are being circulated throughout the city and will be presented to the council at their next regular monthly meeting on December 6.

At least one of the petitions in circulation also takes a swipe at the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court's insurance tax as well as the cities tax and reads:

"We, the undersigned employees in the city limits of Mt. Vernon, wish to express our disapproval with the idea of an occupational tax for Mt. Vernon. The majority of the workers in the city make minimum wage or slightly above. By the time all the different taxes, insurance, etc. come out you are lucky if there is enough left to eat and pay necessary living expenses. Everyone already pays city tax (property) in the city limits. There has to be a way without more new taxes."

Mrs. Beverly Carter Sexton, who works in the city, said Wednesday that she was circulating petitions throughout the city on her own time. She said that she did not know

how many people have signed the petitions, but that petitions were being signed at the Rockcastle Hospital and local board of education and would be presented at the next council meeting.

Mt. Vernon Mayor Karen King said Tuesday that she was not aware of the petitions and had actually heard very few complaints about the tax.

She said she had received some complaints about the tax being placed on payroll employees and she was going to ask the council to pass a net profits tax of 1.5 percent to go along with the occupational tax.

The first reading of the occupational tax did not include the net profit tax. The Mayor said Tuesday that she wasn't sure how she would go about including the net profit tax, whether she could amend the occupational tax ordinance or whether the council would have to pass another ordinance.

The second reading of the occupational tax is scheduled for the next council meeting on December 6.

If the council is successful in implementing both the occupational tax and the net profits tax, the city will realize estimated revenues of \$500,000 annually.

## Grand Jury hands down indictments against five

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury indicted five people Friday for alleged crimes ranging from failure to pay child support to first degree assault.

Earl Powell, 40, of Wilson Lane, Berea, was indicted for a October 4th incident in which he allegedly shot Darly E. McNew with a pistol.

Tommy Clay Collins, 19, of Wildie was indicted on two counts in connection with a break-in at the home of Ronnie Baker.

Collins is also accused of entering Baker's home on October 17 and then again on October 21 and stealing several items.

Collins is also accused of having a firearm in his possession during the October 17th break-in.

Steve Gibson, owner of Gibson's Body Shop in Pine Knot, was indicted on one count of theft by failure to make required disposition of property, in the amount of \$5,300 cash and \$4 in truck parts.

The charge stems from an April 13th business transaction with Orville L. Childers.

Richard Jay Weston, 29, of Somerset, was indicted for negligent non-support of his two minor children in the amount of \$9,841.

Terry L. Griffin, 33, of Pike Street Broadhead was indicted on six counts in connection with an August 8 arrest

by Kentucky State Trooper Anthony Phillips.

Griffin is accused of third of fence, driving under the influence, operating on suspended license, fail

## Red Hill man shoots self

Funeral services were held Monday for a local man who shot himself last week at his Red Hill home.

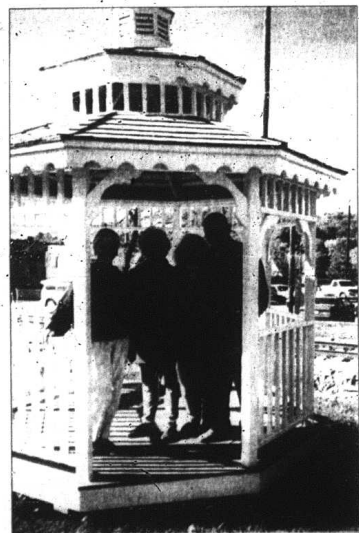
Roger Wayne Rector, 42, of Hwy. 1955, Livingston died Thursday at the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

According to Rockcastle County Deputy Sheriff Sonya Prewitt, Rector shot himself after Deputy Doug Thomas went to his home on Wednesday night to serve an arrest warrant.

Rector, who was indicted in October, accused of raping a female family member less than 16-years-old, apparently told Thomas that he needed to change clothes before going to jail.

Prewitt said that Rector went into a bedroom, shut the door and shot himself in the head with a handgun.

Rector was taken to the Rockcastle Hospital and then transferred to U.K. Hospital where he died. The incident occurred around 7 p.m.

## Dr. Orson L. Arvin dies

Dr. Orson Luther Arvin, 72, a retired physician residing in Lexington and formerly of Mt. Vernon, where he practiced for many years, died suddenly on November 11 in Kigoma, Tanzania, East Africa of an apparent heart attack. He had been serving on a four month medical mission at Kigoma Baptist Hospital since October 1st.

Dr. Arvin was born in Louisville on May 27, 1927, and married Bessie Goodman on July 16, 1955. One of his first jobs was at the Bluebird Pie Company in Louisville at age 15. He was a veteran of the Korean War as a military policeman in Seoul, Korea. He had worked as a welder, heavy equipment operator and foreman in various locations including the Panama Canal, Morocco Africa, and Wyoming, and as a ski patrolter in Jackson Hole, Wyoming and Stowe, Vermont. He had owned automobiles and motorcycles respectively, and was a licensed pilot throughout his

life.

At the age of 35, Dr. Arvin began his premedical education at Eastern Kentucky University and graduated from the University of Kentucky College of Medicine in 1971, where he received the award for Obstetrics and Gynecology. For many years he was noted as the oldest-graduating physician from the College of Medicine. After an internship in Roanoke, Virginia, he practiced Family Medicine for 25 years in Mt. Vernon. At Rockcastle Hospital, he served as chief of staff and president of Rockcastle County Medical Society. He served on the board of directors for Kentucky Medical Association Rural Scholarship Fund, Rockcastle County Health Department and Hospice Care Plus. He was board certified in Family Practice, was a UK Fellow, and a Fellow in the American Academy of Family Physicians.

Dr. Arvin had been actively involved in international medical mis-

sions with the Kentucky Baptist Convention for over 10 years, serving in Brazil, Barbados, twice in Tanzania and six times in Russia. In 1996, Dr. Arvin completed a lifelong goal of flying his airplane on a transatlantic flight, where he delivered medical supplies to a clinic near Moscow, Russia.

Survivors are his wife, Bettye Goodman Arvin of Lexington; two sons, Timothy Arvin and wife, Jenna of Lexington; Dr. Tony Arvin and wife, Rebekah and grandchildren, Ashton and Sydney, of Mt. Vernon and two sisters, Helen Chenshall of Louisville and Mary Kelly of Prairie Village, Kansas. He was preceded in death by his parents, William McK-inley Arvin, Sr. and Mabel Amelia Arvin and one brother, William McKinley Arvin, Jr.

Dr. Arvin had resided in Lexington since October 1997, where he

# Is city tax overkill?

When the Mt. Vernon city council voted last week to assess an occupational tax on employees who work inside the city limits, many people became angry, because we all know that no one wants to pay more taxes.

I had told Mayor Karen King a few weeks ago that if she got the council to go along with her recommendation to impose the tax, she would get beat in the next election and she informed me she wasn't running again anyway.

If that is the case, and it seems to be, look for some more changes in the city limits of Mt. Vernon.

The Mayor has indicated that another change she also wants to make is planning and zoning inside the city limits, which is probably not a bad idea. But that too will cause a furor among many residents.

Back to the new tax - there are a couple of problems with the city's tax.

As it stands now, all of the workers in the city and all the business owners will not pay the tax, only those that are on someone's payroll.

Business owners including the Mayor herself, doctors, lawyers, etc., that are not on a payroll will not pay



the tax. Only the employees on their payrolls will pay.

The second problem is that the tax seems excessive - if it actually generates \$400,000 a year which the Mayor says it will.

Taking into consideration just the estimated payrolls of the board of education and the Rockcastle Hospital, the \$400,000 is probably a close estimate.

If the city had passed the tax on all wage earners, and not just employees, they could have passed a much lower rate, maybe one half a percent or three fourths of a percent and generated enough revenue.

Mayor King said this week that she would go to push for a new profits tax of 1.5 percent to go along with the

payroll tax, so all wage earners would have to pay their share.

She didn't say anything about lowering the rate and she had few answers about what she was going to do with all of the extra money the city will receive each year, which probably be in excess of a half million dollars now.

The Mayor says that the city does not have enough money to operate on and it is hard to meet the expenses on a monthly basis.

While that may be true, no one, except maybe City Clerk Kaye Rader really knows how much of a revenue problem the city really has.

When they (the Mayor and City Clerk) are questioned about the short-fall and how they are able to continue to operate they say it is a balancing act, "robbing Peter to pay Paul."

The Mayor did say a couple of weeks ago that the budget was around \$90,000 short of what the city needed to operate on.

If that is true, and it very well may be, that leaves the city hundreds of thousands of dollars in excess funds.

Mayor King said "this week that she really didn't have any plans for the extra money, except to give employees raises and possibly build a new building for the local volunteer fire department."

She said having the excess money would be a nice problem to have for the city.

Local residents biggest gripe seems to be that they wonder what kind of additional services they will receive from the city for their extra money.

And if you think about it - it is a very good question.

The city provides fire protection - but not really. The fire department is totally volunteer and for the most part self sufficient. Other than provid-

The message from the preacher in the little country church tucked away in the hollow or on the hillside, seemed to be clearer and had more meaning to the ones who had walked several miles in the glow of the moonlight to listen to his message. **Marketing Cards**  
Marketing cards have been mailed from the county office to producers on Oct. 25th. To all producers who have failed the necessary paper work, the paper work includes: MQ 38, AD 1026 and FSA 570. Producers or tenants who have not completed this paper work will not receive the marketing card until these forms are completed.

**Emergency Conservation Program**  
Sign-ups for all ECP practices have ended as of November 16, 1999. The deadline for ECP, Drought Emergency Measures, was October 29, 1999. The deadline for ECT, Other Conservation Measures, was November 16, 1999.

**Office Closure**  
FSA Office will be CLOSED Thursday, November 25th, in observance of Thanksgiving Day. The office will reopen Friday, November 26th at 7:30 a.m.

**1999 Burley Tobacco Assessment Rate**  
The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation has announced the 1999 burley tobacco assessment and pen-

alty rates. No net cost for the producer will be 3,000 cents per pound and 3,000 cents per pound for the purchaser. The marketing quota penalty is \$143 per pound.

**Phase II Tobacco Settlement-Late Applications**  
The deadline for submitting all Phase II Tobacco Settlement applications was Friday, November 12, 1999. All applicants submitted after this date will not be considered for a payment from the National Tobacco Growers Settlement Trust in 1999.

**Burley Tobacco Disaster Leasing**  
Producers who feel they have a 20% shortage on the current effective quota and wish to disaster lease may file an ASCS 574, Application for Disaster Credit, as soon as the disaster occurs.

Producers who have suffered losses to burley tobacco crops as a result of drought and storms consisting of rains, high winds and hail MUST file an ASCS 574, Request for Disaster Credit. In order to file for the disaster, leasing, the following conditions must be met:  
1. The crop must have been af-

ected by a natural disaster while still in the field.

2. For natural disasters occurring before harvest, a farm visit must find the crop was cared for in a workmanlike manner- losses resulting from poor management practices will not be eligible for disaster relief.

3. Sufficient acreage must be planted to produce the farms effective quota.

4. COC must approve the application.  
Producers who have a tobacco loss and think they may want to disaster lease should contact the Rockcastle Co. FSA Office BEFORE destroying the tobacco.

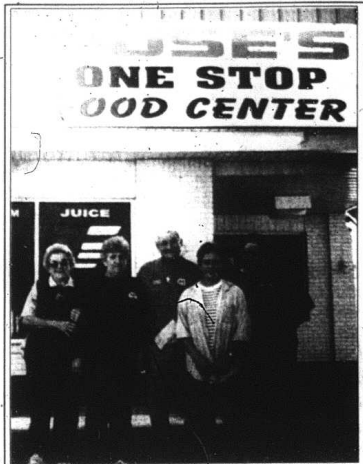

All he has to do to filter money (legally) to the city's fire dept. is to store any of his equipment in the city's fire dept. And he is right about that. The problem here is trust. The city's fire dept. was run by Sam Stallworth, who never reported any financial statements to the city. He never gave any reports to the city like he was legally required to do. Dean says that the firemen earned the money to buy the land in question by themselves. How is the city to know this? How is the city to know that the money didn't come from grants or any other fund raiser that was made to be for the city's fire dept.? Is the city to just take his word for it? The city isn't even sure which trucks or equipment they own. Again without any reports or records the city has to take the word of someone. That doesn't seem right. The city owns Livingston Fire Dept. but, somehow has lost control over it. But the city can regain this. Now Dean wants to open up a second fire dept. That the city has absolutely no control at all. That is asking for a lot of trust. Dean said that this is a good thing for the city. But wasn't that also said about closing the school? Why can't the city fire dept. get their own grants? If it was because of the audits, then the city should come up with the money to get the audits done. Even if it has to borrow the money. So our fire dept. that was financially healthy? Dean says that the second fire dept. is a non-profit organization. However, non-profit does not mean that the board members do not get paid. It only means that they can't show a profit. So if there is a profit they have to spend the money or pay themselves more. 10% of grant money can be used for administrative cost. This alone shows a potential personal gain. 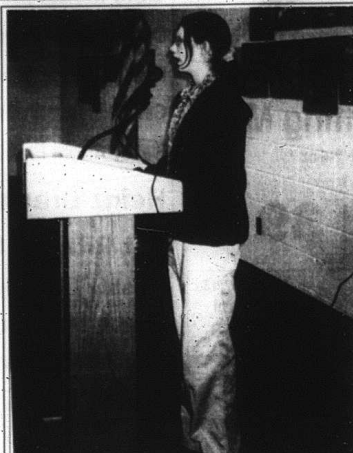

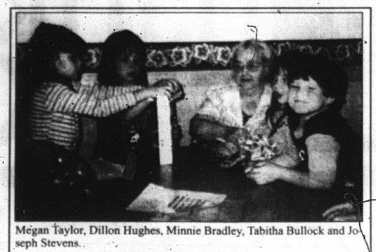

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## Great American Smokeout set for November 18th

Kentucky smokers who want to take the first step on Thursday, November 18 (today).

That's the date for the Great American Smokeout, an annual event sponsored by the American Cancer Society to encourage smokers to quit smoking for at least a day.

Public health officials in Kentucky are encouraging smokers to make an effort to stop smoking to improve their health. Kentucky leads the country in the percentage of its population that smokes.

Nearly 31 percent of Kentucky adults age 18 and over smoke while 47 percent of high school-age students report they smoked within the past month, according to 1997 surveys.

Surveys show that 50 percent of adult Kentucky smokers have tried to quit, according to the 1997 Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance Sys-

tem. "The data indicates many adult smokers want to quit, but they do not have the resources to do so," said Todd Warnick, tobacco control manager for the Department for Public Health. "Of particular interest are the data showing young adults, minorities, and low income groups in Kentucky more likely to attempt quitting. Smoking cessation programs should be accessible to all adults who want to quit."

Stephanie Keelin, the tobacco prevention coordinator at the Green River District Health Department in Owensboro, said smoking cessation programs have become more popular as people become increasingly aware of the health hazards of tobacco use. The health department works with several other local groups in offering the smoking cessation classes.

"By offering reputable smoking cessation classes, such as the Cooper-Clayton Method to Stop Smoking, we are providing the education and support for people who want to quit, but don't know how to go about it," Keelin said. "With our current program offered in the Daviess County community we've experienced a phenomenal 46 percent success rate based on questionnaires given at the end of the classes."

Here are some tips from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to help stop smoking:

1. Don't smoke any number or any kind of cigarette. Smoking even a few cigarettes a day can hurt your health. If you try to smoke fewer cigarettes, but do not stop completely, soon you'll be smoking the same amount again.

Smoking "low-tar, low-nicotine" cigarettes usually does little good either. Because nicotine is so addictive, if you switch to lower-nicotine

brands you'll likely just puff harder, longer and more often on each cigarette. The only safe choice is to quit completely.

2. Write down why you want to quit. Do you want:

to feel in control of your life? to have better health? to set a good example for your children?

to protect your family from breathing other people's smoke? Really wanting to quit smoking is very important to how much success you will have in quitting. Smokers who live after a heart attack are the most likely to quit for good. They're very motivated. Find a reason for quitting before you have no choice.

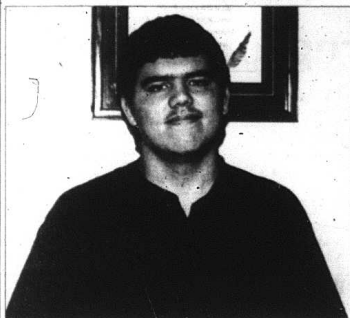
3. Know that it will take effort to quit smoking. Nicotine is habit forming. Half of the battle in quitting is knowing you need to quit. This knowledge will help you be more able to

deal with the symptoms of withdrawal that can occur, such as bad moods and really wanting to smoke. There are many ways smokers quit, including using nicotine replacement products (gum and patches), but there is no easy way. Nearly all smokers have some feelings of nicotine withdrawal when they try to quit. Give yourself a month to get over these feelings. Take quitting one day at a time, even one minute at a time—whatever you need to succeed.

4. Half of all adult smokers have quit, so you can, too. That's the good news. There are millions of people alive today, who have learned to face life without a cigarette. For staying healthy, quitting smoking is the best step you can take.

5. Get help if you need it. Many groups offer written materials, programs and advice in help smokers quit for good. Your doctor or dentist

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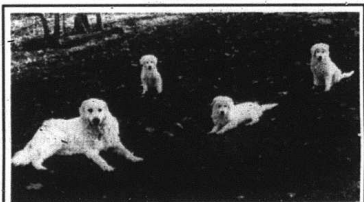
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After win over Sheldon Clark

# ROCK will play for region championship

The Rockcastle County Rockets will go for their first ever regional championship Friday night when they host the Lawrence County Bulldogs.

The Rockets are getting the opportunity to play the Bulldogs in the regional final thanks to a 31 to 14 win over undefeated Sheldon Clark High School on Friday night.

"It was no doubt the Rockets biggest win of the season because it kept them alive in the state playoffs and

came against an undefeated team on the road.

While the Rockets put up 31 points, it was again their defense that led the way to victory.

The outsized but much quicker Rockets held Sheldon Clark to just 134 yards of total offense for the entire game and, in the second half, Sheldon Clark had a minus eight yards of total offense.

Had it not been for two Rocket turnovers, Sheldon Clark would not

have scored.

On offense junior quarterback Christopher Parsons played outstanding, no doubt his best game ever in a Rocket uniform.

Parsons threw for 275 yards, completing nine of 15 attempts.

Two of his completions were for touchdowns, one an 88 yard toss to junior Derrick Bussell to start the game and the other a 55 yard toss to the same, Derrick Bussell in the second period.

Parsons also ran for one score.

"I thought Christopher made good decisions Friday night, and I thought our offensive line did a pretty good job giving him time to throw," head coach Tom Larkey said Monday.

"We realized pretty early that it was going to be difficult to run on Sheldon Clark - so we went to the air with some different stuff we had worked out last week in practice," he said.

All total Bussell caught six passes for 203 yards and the two touchdowns. He also ran for 68 yards on 22 carries and scored one touchdown on the ground.

Junior place kicker Greg Terry was also perfect Friday night, nailing four extra point attempts and kicking a 30 yard field goal for the Rockets second score.

But again it was the defense that kept Sheldon Clark at bay.

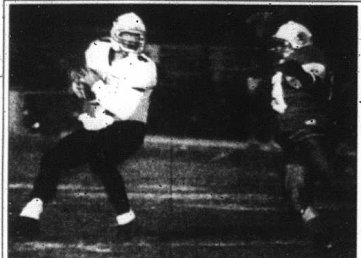

Ingram had 14 tackles and assists to go along with two and a half quarterback sacks.

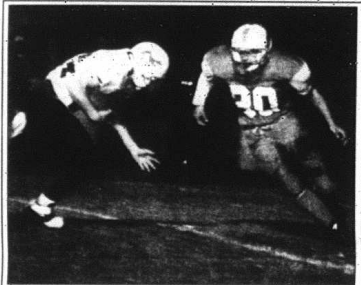
Senior Joel Deatherage turned in another stellar performance with eight tackles, two quarterback sacks and two fumble recoveries.

Senior defensive back Dustin Crawford had five tackles and also picked off a Sheldon Clark pass.

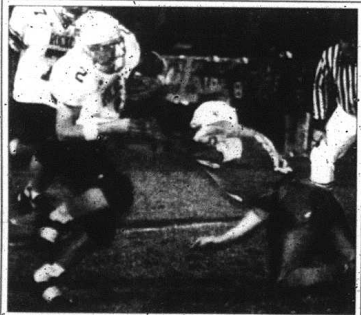

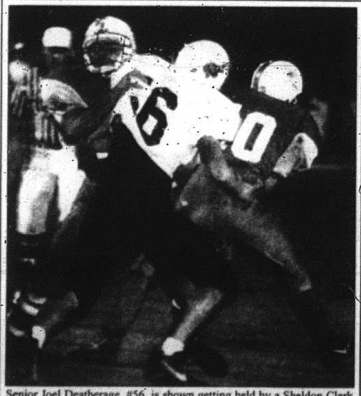

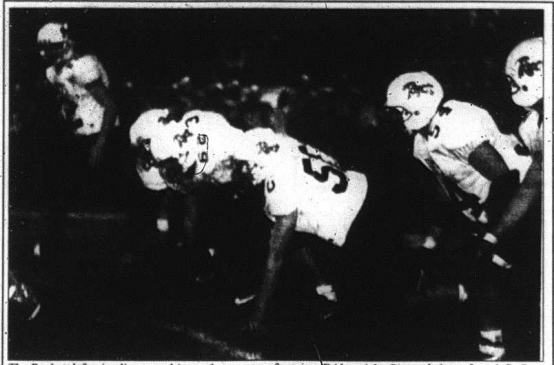

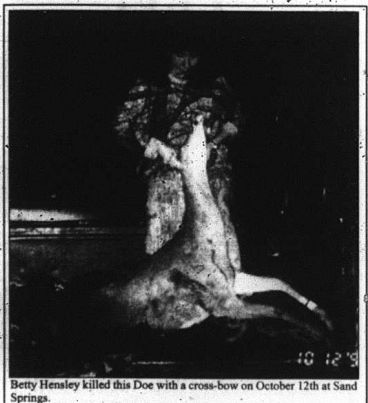

# Wester Water receives \$894,000 from USDA

The Western Rockcastle Water Association, Inc. in Brodhead received a \$897,000 loan and a \$307,000 grant from the US Department of Agriculture's Rural Development mission area. State Director of USDA Rural Development Thomas G. Fern announced, USDA Rural Development administrators a number of programs designed to strengthen rural economies and expand infrastructure in rural areas.

These funds will be used for the construction of approximately 22 miles of waterlines, one 150,000 gallon water storage tank and one booster pump station, with the necessary appurtenances, to serve rural Rockcastle and Boone (Pulaski and Lincoln counties). This project will eliminate a serious health hazard and address a low water pressure problem in the area of the new tank.

"The USDA's drinking water and sewer program is targeting public health benefits and economic opportunities to America's rural communities. Through this loan \$3,073 existing and 118 new users will benefit from a safer and more reliable supply of drinking water," said State Director

Fern. "This project meets the objective of the Clinton-Gore Water 2000 Initiative and Governor Patton's Water 2020, to see that all rural Kentucky households will have a safe, dependable water supply. Good drinking water is absolutely necessary for economic stability and growth. Without clean, dependable drinking water, a community has difficulty sustaining economic development or creating jobs through business expansion. Dependable safe drinking water to rural households is as important as rural electric was in the late 1930's, early 1940's," said Fern.

In addition to funds from USDA Rural Development, the Water Association is receiving a \$300,000 Appalachian Regional Commission grant and is contributing \$48,000 to complete the \$1,242,000 project.

USDA's Water and Waste Water programs, administered through USDA Rural Development's Rural Utilities Service, is designed to bring fresh, clean drinking water and sanitary and environmentally sound wastewater facilities to rural America.

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## Forest or wildland fires

The evening of October 7, 1871, might well be termed the most tragic time in American history.

The story of the Great Chicago Fire, which allegedly started when Mrs. O'Leary's cow kicked over a lantern, is well known. Much of Chicago was leveled, with around 300 persons losing their lives. But a lesser known fire that began at the very same time on the very same evening about 250 miles away took the lives

of 1200 people - more than four times the death toll in Chicago.

The pine forest surrounding the little town of Peshtigo, population 1700, in Wisconsin's North Woods; was dry. As in months, and a strong wind was blowing through the trees. The day before, the local newspaper had declared, "unless we have rain soon, a conflagration may destroy this town."

Unfortunately, what the newspaper had feared indeed came to pass

the very next day.

At the same time fire alarm box 342 was ominous red glow over the forest, sent shivers of terror into the hearts of Peshtigo residents, most of whom were doomed to perish within the hour.

One of the survivors wrote:

*In less than five minutes there was fire everywhere. The atmosphere quickly grew unbearably warm, and the town was enveloped by a rush of air as hot as though it were issuing from a blast furnace. The wind lifted the roofs off houses, toppled chimneys and showered the town with hot sand and living coals. The cries of the men, women and children were scarcely audible above the rumble of exploding gas and crashing timber. People were numb with terror, seeing nothing but fire overhead and all around them.*

The only fire engine in Peshtigo, a hand-operated pumper, was overwhelmed and bucket bridge members soon fled the onrushing tongues of flame. Hundreds of car/ol residents were running and crawling out in panic, but they could not outrun the flames. Only those who jumped into the now warm water of the Peshtigo River or sought refuge along its

marshy east bank survived. Within an hour every building in Peshtigo was leveled, as were the buildings in several other nearby towns - and on some 400 farms.

Although word of the Chicago fire soon reached the nation by telegraph, it was not until three days later that news of the Peshtigo fire got even as far as the state capital at Madison. Relief trains, ready to be sent to Chicago from Madison, were immediately diverted to Peshtigo.

Today the Peshtigo Fire Museum stands as a tribute to those who lost their lives in the most destructive forest fire in history. By a strange coincidence, this fire and the Chicago fire - two of the worst fire disasters of time in our nation's history, occurred just 250 miles from each other, and at the very same time!

**Forest or Wildland Fire**  
What is a Wildland Fire? There are three classes of wildland fires:  
1. A surface fire is the most common type and burns along the floor of a forest, moving slowly and killing or damaging trees.  
2. A ground fire is usually started by lightning and burns on or below the forest floor.

3. Crown fire spreads rapidly by wind and moves quickly by jumping along the tops of trees. Wildland fires are usually signaled by dense smoke that fills the area for miles around.

**Danger Zones**

Danger zones include all wooded, brush, and grassy areas - especially those in Kansas, Mississippi, Louisiana, Georgia, Florida, the Carolinas, Tennessee, California, Massachusetts and the national forest of the western United States.

Also a very close cousin to these

areas are the forest areas and towns of Southeastern Kentucky and that means us!

The threat of wildland fires for people living near wildland areas or using recreational facilities in wildland areas is real. Advanced planning and knowing how to protect buildings in these areas can lessen the devastation of a fire.

your entire life. There was so much shame and guilt and of course you have no self-esteem any more. And then the state comes in, and they make you ashamed for saving your own life. How is it a crime to save your own life? (Mary was eventually acquitted in 1983 after killing her abusive husband in self-defense.)  
 Here is Jane's (again not her real name) account of what her abuse was like: "I met him when I was fourteen and we finally got together ten years later. He was so refreshingly funny and positive. I loved him, he was my mentor, he was my best friend. When he started telling me what to do and what to think, I didn't see it as a control issue, I just thought it was his way of telling me to take care of myself. After we were married, our relationship went from 'You're amazing, Jane,' to 'You're worthless.'"  
 "In the beginning I just kept trying to make it better. And then towards the end it was like waiting for a tap on the head. He had me reduced to a child, I was so brainwashed. I think it was the repetitiveness of hearing how stupid and useless I was, that I was never good enough. What I thought didn't matter, what I wanted wasn't important, I was never right, I was always wrong. Over trivial things, a milk can and milk can, canned goods the night-long. He kept saying this to me over and over and over. To the point where towards the end, I really believed there was something wrong with me, that he must be right, I couldn't function in the outside world

without him. I just stayed at home, my whole life revolved around him walking through the front door. It was as though I had lost my personhood." Jane finally realized that trying harder to please him wouldn't change his behavior.  
 These accounts come from the book *A Woman Like You: The Face of Domestic Violence* by Vera Anderson. The book contains photographs and interviews with women who have been abused by husbands and boyfriends. It is available at your public library. If the library does not have it on hand, they can get it for you through Interlibrary Loan. I highly recommend the book. I liked it so much I bought my own copy.

 Do you know someone who has been the victim of domestic violence? Perhaps you have been abused. It happens to all kinds of people in all kinds of economic, racial and religious groups. Listen as Mary (not her real name) tells you how it happened to her.  
 "I didn't want to verbalize what was happening to me because that would make it real. The transformation you go through is so subtle, and it's so progressive. I'm sure every girl when they're a teenager says, 'No man will ever hit me!' And then, when it happens to you, you rationalize it and justify it, because you don't want it to be so. What are you going to do if you've made a commitment to this man, that relationship, this life, and it isn't what you thought it would be? You can't reason with somebody about this when they say, 'Well, you can just leave...' The thing is, you're so cut off from the real world. I guess I had never honestly thought of myself as a battered woman. I thought of myself as not having the best marriage."  
 "When I was arrested there was so much I was going through, so many issues that came up. I mean, this is the man, even though you were terrified of him, part of you hated him, another part of you worshipped the ground he walked on. And here he had, in one fell swoop, killed him and destroyed

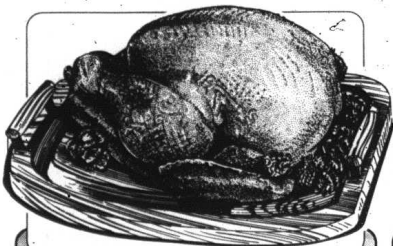

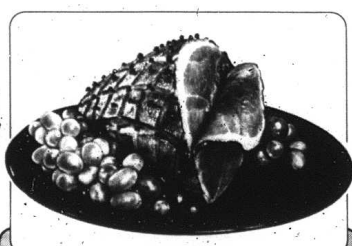

## Preparing The Holiday Turkey

From first-timers to seasoned pros, cooks of all levels may experience anxiety over preparing the holiday turkey dinner.

Here are some of the commonly asked questions:

**What's the best way to thaw a turkey?** Refrigerator thawing is recommended. However, if short on time, submerge the turkey in cold water. Thawing the turkey at room temperature allows bacterial growth and is not recommended.

**Refrigerator thawing:** Thaw breast-side up in its unopened wrapper on a tray in the refrigerator. Allow at least one day of thawing for every four pounds of turkey.

**Cold water thawing:** Place breast down in its unopened wrapper in cold water to cover. Change water every 30 minutes to keep surface cold. Estimate minimum thawing time to be 30 minutes per pound for whole turkey.

**What's the best way to roast a turkey?** Place in a preheated 325 degree F oven. Turkeys that are cooked at a temperature lower than 325 degree F will not reach an interior temperature sufficient to kill bacteria.

Use this roasting schedule as a guideline: start checking for doneness <sup>1/2 hour</sup> before recommended end times.

Net Weight (in pounds)	Cooking Time (in hours)
10 - 18	3 - 3 1/2
18 - 22	3 1/2 - 4
22 - 24	4 - 4 1/2
24 - 30	4 1/2 - 5

Turkey is done when the meat thermometer reaches 180 degrees F deep in the thigh; also, juices should be clear, not reddish-pink when thigh muscle is pierced deeply.

Let turkey stand 15 minutes before carving to allow juices to set.

**How can leftover turkey be stored safely?** Within two hours after roasting, carve meat off bones, then store in refrigerator or freezer. For refrigerator storage, wrap turkey slices and use within three days. For freezer storage, wrap in heavy foil, freezer wrap or place in freezer container or bags. For optimum flavor, use turkey within two months.

**Can I safely stuff the turkey?** The University of Kentucky no longer recommends cooking turkeys that are stuffed. Within two hours after roasting, juice and blood run into the stuffing and are absorbed. If the interior of the stuffing does not reach 160 - 180 degrees F, bacteria may still be present. The safest method for preparation of stuffing is to assemble and bake the stuffing separate from the turkey.

## Farm News

Transplant trees, shrubs this fall for healthy specimens next Spring

Fall is the best time of the year to move trees or shrubs that have outgrown a location, or to set out new ones.

The climate and the plant conditions encourage the reestablishment of trees and shrubs set out in the fall. The best time to transplant is late September through early December, with the exception of plants that are marginally winter hardy and those classified as broadleaf evergreens. Deciduous plants can be moved any time the soil is not too wet or frozen solid.

When plants are dug, up to 90 percent of the feeder roots are cut off. These small roots are responsible for absorbing water and nutrients, and must be reformed if the plant is to become established in the new location.

A plant's root system will grow, forming new feeder roots, most rapidly when the soil temperature is between 32 degrees and 50 degrees. The soil temperature in Kentucky is in this range most of the winter. So, plants transplanted in the fall have the opportunity to become reestablished before the onset of hot, dry summer weather.

Conversely, plants moved in late spring do not reform as many feeder roots before new leaves start making demands for water and nutrients to withstand summer weather.

Another advantage of fall planting is that plants do not have leaves, which is where most water evaporation takes place. With less

water loss, the transplant will become established more easily.

During the fall, consumers can often buy trees and shrubs at a reduced price, because nurseries do not want to maintain them through the winter.

The following guidelines are keys for successful fall transplanting:

- \* Select the proper tree or shrub for the site.
- \* Remove all treated or synthetic burlap and plastic twine.
- \* Dig the planting hole at least twice the width of the soil ball on the tree or shrub.
- \* Do not add peat moss, sawdust, sand or other soil amendments to soil used to fill the planting hole. Amending this soil can hinder root growth by keeping roots from growing into the unamended soil.
- \* Plant trees or shrubs at the same depth as they previously grew.
- \* Provide adequate water to get transplants off to a good start. This is especially important during abnormally dry winters.

This year's drought has created the need for watering newly planted, as well as established, landscape plants. Owners can help plants by low slow waterings.

For trees, allow the hose to trickle a small pencil size stream over 2-3 hours. The effects of this year's drought will be more obvious in 2000 as landscape plants and trees out in the forest are overcome by its stress.

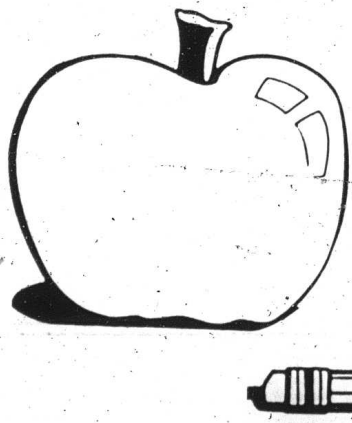

**"What Saith The Scriptures"**

The past couple of weeks we have discussed the Lord's supper, when it is to be partaken of, the first day of the week, and why it is to be done, to remember the death of Christ. Today we want to discuss what the Lord's supper consists of.

*"And when he had given thanks, he brake it, and said, Take, eat: this is my body, which is broken for you: this do in remembrance of me. After the same manner also he took the cup, when he had supped, saying, This cup is the new testament in my blood: this do ye, as oft as ye drink it, in remembrance of me. For as often as ye eat this bread, and drink this cup, ye do show the Lord's death till he come. Wherefore whosoever shall eat this bread, and drink this cup of the Lord, unworthily, shall be guilty of the body and blood of the Lord. But let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread, and drink of that cup. For he that eateth and drinketh unworthily, eateth and drinketh damnation to himself, not discerning the Lord's body." 1 Cor 11:24-29*

Notice, that there are only 2 emblems in the Lord's supper, we eat the bread, to remember his body; and we drink the cup to remember the blood of the covenant. Some have taken an emblem away, by only serving the bread to people. Some have added a 3<sup>rd</sup> emblem, the drinking vessel. Some have substituted the emblems with cake and coke. No, the Lord's supper has only 2 emblems, the bread we eat and the grape juice we drink!

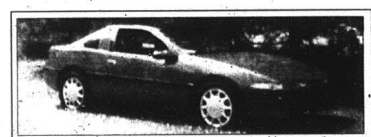

Rockcastle County Schools Plan for Inclement Weather School Closings Early Dismissals

Every effort will be made to keep parents and concerned citizens informed as to school closings, early dismissals and possibly a delay plan.

The number one concern is the safety of students. After an extensive evaluation of road conditions in the county, taking into consideration all roads, a decision will be made in regard to closing school.

School closings will be announced on radio stations and 3 television stations. They are as follows: Radio - WRVK (AM 1460), WVLC (FM 93), WBUL (FM 8.1), WMXL (FM 94.5), WLAP (630 AM), WRSL (FM 96.3), WLKT (FM 104.5) WKQQ (FM 100.1). Television - WKYT (Channel 27), WLEX (Channel 18), WTVQ (Channel 36). If possible, the closing will be announced the evening before the closing date. If a determination cannot be made the day prior to the closing date, every possible effort will be made to reach a decision by 6 a.m. The announcement will be made no later than 6:30 a.m. This will be conformed the same for the delay plan, if it is concluded the delay plan would be the appropriate plan of action.

If the delay plan is used, breakfast will be served upon the arrival of students at school.

Early dismissal of school due to inclement weather will be announced on WRVK. Roads will be closely monitored as school is in session to determine if there is a need for early dismissal. If the need for early dismissal does occur, parents should make arrangements to meet children as they arrive early.

Parents and students **should not** call any radio or television station to inquire about school closings. This could delay the information distribution to the necessary channel by tying up phone lines.

**Rockcastle County School System Delay Plan**  
Occasionally, there are mornings when an additional hour is needed to check bus routes and temperatures/weather conditions sometimes can change between 6 a.m. and 7 a.m. As a result, the Rockcastle County School System will consider a one hour delay in school opening due to weather conditions.  
If a one-hour delay is warranted, the delay will be announced by the following radio stations: WRVK (AM 1460), WVLC (FM 93), WBUL (FM 98.1), WMXL (FM 94.5), WLAP (630 AM), WRSL (FM 96.3), WLKT (FM 104.5), WKQQ (FM 100.1) and the following television stations: WLEX (Channel 18), WKYT (Channel 27), WTVQ (Channel 36), at 6 a.m. or as soon as possible.
