Accident near Berea claims life of elderly Wildie woman

A Wildie woman died Friday at the University of Kentucky Medical Center after she was involved in a two car collision in Madison County on

Lucille B. Owens, 73, died nine hours after the noon accident, accord-ing to Kentucky State Police in Rich-

mond.
According to police, Mrs. Owens
was traveling north on U.S. 25, when
an elderly Berea man pulled his 67
Oldsmobile from Slate Lick Road

directly into the path of her Plymouth.

Mrs. Owens, who was not wearing her seat belt at the time of the tent, was taken to Berea Hospita

and transferred to U.K.

The driver of the other car, Asa Forbes, 87, was treated at Berea Hospital for head injuries.

Kirby pulled from burning car; arrested after wreck

A Rockcastle County man prob-ably owes his life to some local people this week but he'll have to wait to get out of gail-before he can thank them. According to Kentucky State Po-lice Officer Jesse L. Owens, Earl Brent Kirby, 43, of Mount Vernon Road Brera, was pulled from a burning car after a head on collision on U.S. 25 Sautrak wight around 6 nm.

After the collision, Kirby's '84 Chevy left the roadway and came to set in a creek, catching on fire.

Local officials seek \$7 million for new tech center at RCHS

Local school officials and others
are seeking \$7 million from the quate
to build a new technical-education
structure adjacent to the Rockcasjle
County High School.
Last week Rockcasjle County
Hammond and Kentucky Technical
Center Principal Donna Hopkins,
wrote a letter to Kentucky Governor
paul Patton asking for his support in
the effort to build the new technicaleducation center.

the effort o build the new technical-culculation center. Kentucky State Representative Danny Ford of Mr. Vernon, and Rockcastle County Hospital Adimi-istrator Lee D. Keere, who is the Governor's liason for Rockcastle County, have also met personally with the Governor on two different occasions concerning the project. "The Governor has told us he would keep-an open mind and con-sider supporting the project if money is available in next year's budget." Ford said.

rd said.
"There are a lot of requests state wide for projects that cost a lot of money, so that will be a major factor, whether or not the funds are there."

Ford said.

"I think because of the good economy in the state the money will be there—it is just going to be a master of getting the Governor's full support and getting the support we need in the legislature, which of course Danny will be the major factor there" Keene said.

Mrs. Hopkins said that a new center is needed for various reasons. "We simply don't have enough space in our current building for all the classes that we need to teach," Mrs. Hopkins said.

She pointed out that even now some of the vocational/techineal Mrs. Hopkins said.

She pointed out that even now some of the vocational/technical center's classes are held at the center's classes are held at the lack of space. She also pointed out lack of space. She also pointed out hat the hopstall is always expanding and the space may not always be available for the classes.

"Our district survey of industrial and business needs revealed a very high priority for a machine technology program, and currently wear unable to meet this community need because we do not have the space for the class," she said.

Mrs. Hopkins also said that if would be much more effective and efficient if the new structure were located on the high school site.

Representative Ford said that the fact that a new building for the technical center would free up space for analternative school, should give the project more merit with his colleagues and the Governor. That may be the edge we need to get this pushed through the General Assembly," he said.

Of the requested \$7 million \$5.5 would actually be spent on the structure and \$1.5 on new equipment for a machine technology program and for funds to upgrade the existing allied health program.



During the Middle Ages, it was a mutton pie. And some of the earliest recipes called for chopped or mine partiridges, pheasants and hares. Gradually, the meat used became

partridges, pheasants and hares. Gradually, the meat used became beef. Other ingredients were added to transform a meat pie into a special dessert. These ingredients included sugar, apples, molasses, cider, raisins, currants, citron,

cloves, plums and nutmeg. Still some early pies contained as much as six pounds of meat.



State lawmakers will confront issues affecting most every Kentuckian when the General Assembly meets for the first legislative session of the 21 st Century at the State Capitol in Frankfort January 4. In accordance with the Kentucky Constitution, the General Assembly meets every two years for a regular legislative session. Over the course

of 60 legislative days, lawmakers are likely to consider well over 1,000

hely to consider well over 1,000 in page 50 legislation.

Taxes. Voters in 1998 approved a constitutional amendment that will allow lawmakers to consider lowering or eliminating the state's prop-

caid patients with smoking-related illnesses. Boosting agriculture programs and health care efforts are a couple of issues commonly cited as priorities for the settlement funds.

Early Childhood Development. With modern research showing that quality care early in a child's life can have lifetime benefits, lawmakers may consider a host of early childhood development proposals. Placing a stronger emphasis on prenatal counseling and parenting skills - as well as the training of childcare workers - are among the issues that may receive attention from lawmakers. Offering more childcare assistance to working low-income families also may be considered.

Adult Education. Newly emerging technologies are prompting many states to develop adult education programs that help make sure adults have the skills to succeed in a fast-changing job market. A task force created by the General Assembly in 1998 has recommended that lawmakers create a network of adult education providers throughout Kentucky to offer both literacy programs and job skills training.

Litter Control. Lawmakers may consider a gubernatorial proposal to expand Kentucky's solid waste control efforts by requiring that every county have curbside garbage collection. Litter control also may be addressed through legislation that would place a small fee or deposit on beverage bottless and cans to help control litter and pay for clean-up effors.




'Our members feel Kentucky Our members feel Kentucky needs to creare a level playing field for health care service provider pric-ing," said David Beck, Farm Bureau's Executive Vice-President. "They believe the current system is discriminatory because it requires individual providers to charge varying fees for the same service, depending on who

the same service, depending on who is providing the health insurance coverage. We believe providers should be allowed to set their own individual rates. However, those individual rates should be consistent for the particular services rendered, regardless of who is paying for the service."

Farm Bureau is in the process of building a coalition of trade organizations to support such legislation recently, adopted similar policy and this coalition is also seeking support from Kentucky's health care providers on this issue, Beek said.

A lack of market competition has been cited as a primary reason for skyrocketing health care and health care insurance costs in Kentucky. Current law creates an unfair advantage and near monopoly for the re-

Season ending game a heartbreaker

Sweat, blood, and tears were present in the huddle after the Rocket's season ending game on November 19.

Their 48-14 loss to Lawrence County gave them their first Class AAA regional runner-up trophy. The Rock's only other regional runners-up came in 91' and 92' while still in Class AA.

Coach Tom Larkey said, "It felt good to be regional runners-up our first year back into AAA. We hadn't been in a regional title game since 92' when we were in AA. I felt like there were five coastanding teams in our region, any of which could have won the title."

Not much was expected from this year's team, especially not a regional runner-up title. After being hit hard by last year's graduation and moving up to AAA, many suspected they wouldn't even have a winning season, much less go three weeks into the post-season.



Disappointment was clear on senior Joel Deatherage's face as he sat in the huddle after Rockcastle's loss to Lawrence County, 48-14.

Larkey also commented, "The expectations of this year's team were fulfilled. It was more than what was expected from the staff and community."

The game started off poorly for the Rockets with quarterback Chris Parsons throwing an interception on their first possession, the first of seven turnovers that Lawrence County could have capitalized on. The Rockets were then faced with the potent Lawrence County offense, which included a nationally ranked receiver.

According to Coach Larkey, "Anytime you have seven turnovers in one game it will affect the outcome. It's like putting the football back into the hands of the other team. It is unusual for us to have that many turnovers in one same."


"More students elected to take the college classes from Somerset Community College than the AP. There was just not enough interest." Stated guidance counselor, Mr. Dale Whitaker.

While there are several gifted students at RCHS who would be more than willing to take these classes, is there enough interest to add these to the curriculum again?

According to Mr. Whitaker, if any advanced placement classes are going to be brought back into the curriculum they will most likely be in the English, science, or history area(s).

If a student passes four advanced placement classes while enrolled in high school, they will receive a Commonwealth Diploma. There are no specific benefits to this, except the acknowledgment and satisfaction of knowing that you completed those classes. The recognition looks good on college and scholarship applications and sets you above hundreds of other applicants.

Also, in several schools, if someone takes an AP or honors course their GPA, or grade point average, is weighted. This makes it possible to have higher than a 4.0 GPA.

10:00am- You're watching the parade on television. If you want a snack, go for the pretzels and not those cheesy Dorito's.


