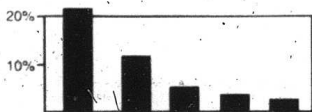

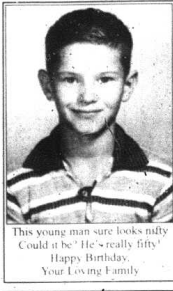

Chocolate Cravings Are Real!
It is time to clean out the old filing cabinet. Today's column is a collection of interesting bits and pieces that I have accumulated over the year.

• Researchers in Arizona have confirmed what many of us have known for years: chocolate cravings are real. Biogenic amines, which are found in chocolate, are also produced in the brain and help to regulate mood. Chocolate may also ease the effects of magnesium deficiency, a condition sometimes linked to premenstrual syndrome. Universities of Arizona researchers say 40 percent of women and 15 percent of men appear to have chocolate cravings. Perhaps this will make you feel better about all that chocolate you ate at Christmas.

• United Health, one of the nation's largest insurance agencies, has decided to let doctors make the decision about what treatment a patient should receive, without the approval of the insurance company. This is welcome news to many physicians and patients. I know from first-hand experience that getting insurance approvals can be a time-consuming struggle. United feels it will save enough money by cutting administrative staff to make up for any extra treatments that may be done. Let us hope that more insurers follow suit.

• Social anxiety disorder is the most common psychiatric problem in the United States after depression and alcoholism. Ten million Americans suffer from this disorder which makes them afraid to appear in public. New medication is available to help. For more information on this disorder, call 1-800-934-6276.

• One of five boys may be sexually abused according to a study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association. This conclusion was based on a review of 166 studies between 1985 and 1997. The authors concluded that sexual abuse of boys is under reported and under rated.

• More doctors are using religion as a part of treatment. Herbert Benson, researchers at Harvard University's Mind-Body Medical Center, says that "evidence has been building about how powerful belief is." (Some people have known that for a long time.) Livestock Assistance Program (LAP)

Rockcastle County has been approved to implement LAP to provide grazing loss assistance through direct payments. Signup for LAP ends Jan. 21, 2000.

To be eligible for LAP a producer must have suffered a 40% or greater loss of normal grazing production for three or more consecutive months during the LAP crop year, possess beneficial interest in eligible livestock (beef and dairy cattle, sheep, goats, swine, equine animals used commercially or kept by owner for food/fiber production) have owned or leased the eligible livestock for at least three months.

In order to complete the application, producers must list the number of eligible livestock head by weight groups and have receipts for purchases and sales for the months of June-November 1st.

Because only a specific amount of money (\$200 million) has been approved for LAP, anational request will be determined if application requests exceed the allocated amount of money. This factor will be announced after the end of signup.

County Committee (COC) Election

The County Committee election usually held in December each year has been postponed until March 2000. However, we want to remind farmers of the importance of voting in the upcoming COC election.

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) needs everyone's help in obtaining names and addresses of all eligible voters before the COC election scheduled for March 2000. FSA continues to seek voters and candidates for the upcoming COC election. All eligible voters, including spouses, are urged to contact their local FSA office if they have not received election ballots in the past.

To work best, the COC must represent the whole of local agriculture. By seeking diversity, FSA will bring a greater range of expertise, different perspectives, and a broader understanding of the various business and marketing aspects to the committee's work.

Cross County Leasing Program
FSA is gearing up for a cross county leasing referendum to take place in the future. The referendum will ask producers "Are you in favor of lease and transfer of burley tobacco quota across county lines within the state of Kentucky beginning with the 2000 crop year?" Additional information on the referendum will follow at a later date.

Marketing Cards
Producers are reminded to return their marketing cards to the FSA office IMMEDIATELY after all sales are final.

If you've not received your marketing card by now, you know you need to complete some form of paperwork in the local FSA office. Producers are reminded to stop by the office and we will assist you in the issuance of the marketing card.

Emergency Conservation Program

Signup for all ECP practices has been extended until January 3, 2000. ECPs, Drought Emergency Measures, provides for assistance for measures to permit grazing of pasture by livestock, supply emergency water for existing irrigation systems serving orchards and vineyards and for emergency water for confined livestock. This practice is considered temporary and is to be cost shared at a rate of 64% of the actual cost, net to, exceed \$300/00 per tank.

EC7, Other Conservation Measures, is a practice to enhance water resources during periods of recognized drought to provide water for livestock. Cost-sharing provided to remove silt from existing water.

impoundment structures that are sited in and limited capacity exists for extended drought at 50% or actual cost not to exceed \$800,00 per structure. EC7 is a permanent practice, with a 10-year maintenance lifespan.

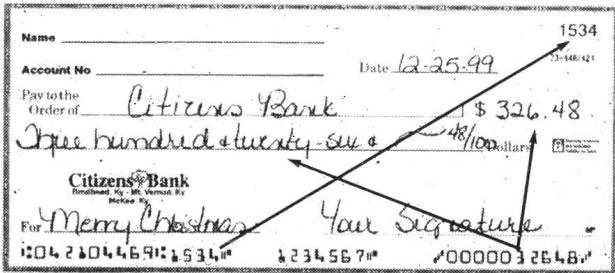

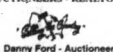

Crab Orchard woman killed in single car wreck

Several auto accidents occurred in the county before and after the Christmas holiday, one of which claimed the life of a Crab Orchard woman.

According to Kentucky State Police in London, Helen Nikky McKinney, 23, of Crab Orchard was driving a 1990 Ford Probe west on U.S. 150, 1 mile west of Brodhead last Wednesday morning, when she apparently lost control of her vehicle after it dropped off the roadway overturning and ejecting her from the vehicle.

A passing motorist, who spotted the wreck and members of the Brodhead Fire Department responded to the accident, but McKinney apparently died instantly in the wreck.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell, who pronounced McKinney dead at the scene, said that McKinney died of massive head trauma after the

vehicle landed on her.

On Thursday, members of the Brodhead and Mt. Vernon Fire Departments responded to another injury accident in the city limits of Brodhead on Hwy. 150.

Firefighters had to use the jaws-of-life apparatus to free one of the three people injured in the head-on collision.

Brodhead Police Chief Joe Bussell said the 11:30 a.m. wreck occurred after Jeffrey Hurst, 30, of London, crossed the center-line and hit a Louisville couple head-on.

Richard Owens, 77, and his wife, Jewell Owens, 81, were enroute to visit Owens' brother, C.B. Owens, Jr. of Brodhead, when the wreck occurred. Richard Owens had to be cut from the Buick Park Avenue he was driving.

A description of the subject observed in the hunting area was submitted to police. The man was later identified as Mark Stephens, 24, of East Maple Street.

Lewallen had taken a photograph shortly after the kill was made, which was later used to identify the deer. A copy of the photo was sent to Officer Zalla, who was able to match the deer's antlers with the suspect's animal.

Three weeks ago a new puppy joined our family and made its first trip to the vet for the normal shots, wormer, and flea treatment. I went back to pick her up and was informed that she had a heart murmur that would almost certainly be fatal within a couple of weeks. I was asked what I would like to do in that tone of voice that suggested euthanasia was a viable option then and there.

But Lovely June, as I have named her, was far too full of life and too anxious to find something new on which to chew for me to even consider that. And as cruel as this may sound I am not financially positioned to afford a heart transplant on a dog I rescued yet when I needed to bring her back to the lid live - next round of shots, spraying schedule and all that. To do me, my wife, matter of fact, she wouldn't live that long. Gulp. As the time wore on, the heart murmur was alive. Animals that have I learned in columns past have met untimely deaths so I don't talk much about our family pet in the paper anymore. Some of Lovely June has lived more than a week longer than her prognosis. I figured that maybe put into the paper might serve as an indicator of her reversal of fortune.

At this writing she shows no outward signs of ill health. She has gone

through three old tennis shoes that I was saving to finish up in the streets catching bait and pursuing the ever wild minnow and one of those raw hide bones lasts only a couple of days. Her feed conversation ration would be the envy of any pork producer because she can eat a pound of food and gain two pounds.

Just before I started writing the column we did a mile and a half hike along the old railroad grade. Actually I did a mile and a half and the probably did three as she nosed through fence nosed and scampered back and forth across hay fields looking for anything new and different. She's causing me to get more exercise on any given day than I normally get on a week this time of year.

I am mentally prepared for her to keel over with a heart attack at any moment but I'm equally determined that if that happens, she will die a happy pup. In the meantime, her master is the one who has to watch his heart rate out hiking in this cold weather.

I had forgotten how silly and rambunctious puppies can be. Lovely is a half blood hound and half dog. Bloodhounds are supposed to be slow and lazy and had back. Unfortunately she is going to look, move and move like a blood hound is supposed to.

look, but the other half is where her personality is coming from. She is exactly the opposite of laid back and lazy. When she gets in the track with the other dogs to drive. When she sees another dog of any age she wants to engage in full contact karate on the spot.

On the morning of Christmas Eve we had five inches of snow here in the valley and drifts in the lawn nearly a foot deep. Lovely bounded into the snow over her head, rolled and cavorted, chewed some of it and when it melted in her mouth, cocked her head over sideways in the ultimate expression of curiosity.

What farmers really need to focus on in this point is the future. What we can do to stop the bleeding and prepare for a rebound? That is the key issue for growers, and for Farm Bureau. We need to look at all available marketing methods, old and new, and see what best serves the long-term interests of producers. We need to examine the operation of our leaf handling cooperatives, and determine if there are changes needed to head off the accumulation of surpluses that could, if they grow too large, endanger the very existence of the tobacco program. And we need to look at the impact of mounting tobacco imports.

All these issues are complex, and opinions vary widely on what the answers should be. Farm Bureau will be working with all tobacco interests to find solutions. We especially need the involvement of growers, quota holders and others with a financial stake in the crop. We also need to work a good portion of Kentucky's tobacco settlement money for agriculture. We're urging Kentuckians to contact their state legislators to seek support for agriculture's unified development plan.

We're working on behalf of tobacco, and we're working on behalf of agriculture. Together, we can find a way to keep both on a growth track for the future.

Our Readers Write

Dear Editor,
Tobacco growers are facing the toughest times they have experienced. Burley markets, which opened a week late and never really caught fire, are now in Christmas recess. Huge amounts of this year's crop have gone into the pool, adding to the surplus stocks from last year. There's talk of another major quota cut in the offing, and next year's modest cost assessment will surely rise. These are disturbing trends, causing considerable anxiety among farmers and threatening serious economic damage to our state.

As president of Kentucky Farm Bureau, I want to convey to Kentucky's farming families that our organization is working with all its resources to find short-term relief and long-term answers for the problems afflicting the agricultural industry. Ultimately, the factors which will impact our futures are both economic and political. Economic trends are often harsh in their effects on farmers, but in many ways they are more tolerable than are the political storms which cause us the greatest harm.

In recent years, tobacco has been

subjected to an unprecedented assault from federal and state governments, cash-hungry plaintiffs attorneys and interest groups whose sole purpose is to eradicate the crop and the products from existence.

Some national leaders in the anti-tobacco movement recently had a news conference telling farmers that tobacco companies were the culprit in today's declining tobacco market. That message was both amusing and misleading. No farmer holds the tobacco companies in any great level of affection, given their erratic buying patterns and ever-changing legal critics. But even the most ardent critic of the companies knows that when cigarette sales drop, purchases of our tobacco will follow.

What we also know is that much of the decline traces directly to the actions of those anti-tobacco interest groups. Their lobbyists proclaim with a straight fact that they only want to hurt the tobacco companies, and that they have the farmer's best interests at heart. But farmers see this spin for what it is, a public relations ploy. When these groups hurt the companies, they invariably hurt farmers. In terms of tobacco product sales, the interests of the companies and the farmers are inseparable.

"WHAT SAITH THE SCRIPTURES"
In John 15:1-6 we read, "I am the true vine, and my Father is the husbandman. Every branch in me that beareth not fruit he taketh away and every branch that beareth fruit, he purgeth it, that it may bring forth more fruit. Now ye are clean through the word which I have spoken unto you. Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself except it abide in the vine, no more can ye, except ye abide in me. I am the vine, ye are the branches: He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit; for without me ye can do nothing. If a man abide not in me, he is cast forth as a branch, and is withered. If a man gather them, and cast them into the fire, and they are burned." Now this text is sometimes used by folks to seek to justify human denominationalism. We are told that Jesus is the vine and these branches are the various denominations. This sounds good on the surface, but a little close reading shows the fallacy of this theory. Notice verse 6, "If a man abide not in me, he is cast forth as a branch, and is withered." The branches are not men, individual human beings that are each connected to the vine. No friends, there is no scripture to justify division and denominationalism, that men promote and endorse!

UK's impact stretches into Rockcastle

During the 1998-99 academic year, Kentuckians from Paducah to Pikeville and Covington to Cumberland felt the impact of the University of Kentucky on their lives.

As the state's ninth largest economic enterprise, UK had an impact of nearly \$4.4 billion on Kentuckians.

Meanwhile, more than 388,000 patients rely on the UK Chandler Medical Center for their health care, including 221 Rockcastle County residents receiving treatment as inpatients.

It is no secret that UK has a powerful impact on the state. The university's professors provide advice to state officials on many diverse subjects of vital importance, ranging from building roads to lowering costs to helping revenue officials evaluate tax rates," said Charles Haswood, a UK economics professor and longtime adviser to government.

In Rockcastle County, for example, UK's Cooperative Extension Service responded to 25,917 calls seeking information on more healthy living practices, household budgeting, and multiple business options important to both farmers and homeowners. Across Kentucky, families using this service the nation's third largest Extension service reduced their healthcare costs by \$24 million. Meanwhile, farmers saw their revenues rise by \$25 million.

Business people in Rockcastle County made 10 inquiries for information about better methods of calculating future profits and improving competitiveness. The advice offered by consultants of UK's Small Business Development Centers results in an average annual increase of sales by its clients of nearly \$180,000.

Rockcastle County men and women who work in manufacturing plants may have benefited from increased job opportunities created by improved efficiency and productivity, if their employer used the consulting services of UK's Industrial Extension Service. This program, and UK's Lean Manufacturing Institute, advises nearly 350 companies a year

Kentucky's Forestry BMP Board

The General Assembly in its 1998 Regular Session enacted the Kentucky Forestry Conservation Act. While this act is best known for requiring that a Kentucky Master Logger graduate be present on commercial logging operations and Best Management Practices (BMPs) be used on all logging jobs, the act also establishes a Forestry Best Management Practices Board. The Board membership includes five farmer/woodland owners, one logger in good standing (not deemed a bad actor), one member from the Kentucky Division of Forestry, one member from the University of Kentucky Department of Forestry, three members from the Kentucky wood industry, and two members at large who are woodland owners.

The Board was established to review existing forestry BMPs and oversee implementation of BMP education and enforcement by the Division of Forestry. This 13-member Board was appointed by Governor Paul Patton from a list of nominations submitted by the various groups to be represented on the board.

The board convened for the first time on May 24, 1999 at the Department for Natural Resources office in Frankfort and has planned to meet on the last Wednesday of each month. During their four meetings to date, the board has addressed its role in reviewing the proposed administrative regulations for the implementation of the Master Logger (402 KAR 3:020) and Best Management Practices (BMPs) for Timber Harvesting (402 KAR 3:030) requirements of the Kentucky Forest Conservation Act. They unanimously approved the regulations as drafted by the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet during their June meeting. These regulations were resubmitted to the Administrative Regulation Review Subcommittee, which removed the finding of deficiency from the regulations and passed the regulations on August 10, 1999.

The Forestry Best Management Practices Board face many challenges in the future. The Board will review the Best Management Practices over the next year to ensure that water quality is protected during timber harvest operations. Recommendations for changes to BMPs will be submitted to the Agriculture Water Quality Authority which has responsibility for approving the BMPs.

Christopher Parsons hit four three pointers in the fourth quarter, but it was not enough for the victory.

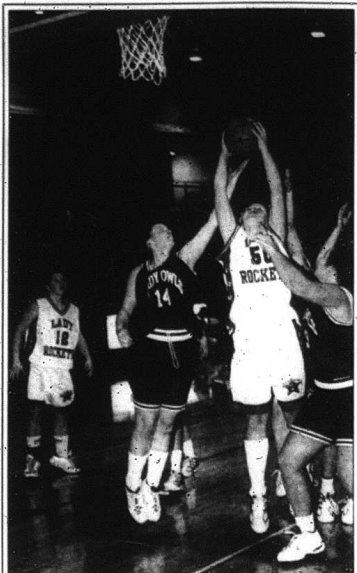
Rockcastle's only free throws in the second half came with 7:1 seconds to go in the game when Andrew Cash was fouled on a three point attempt.

Lady Rockets win in first round of holiday tournament

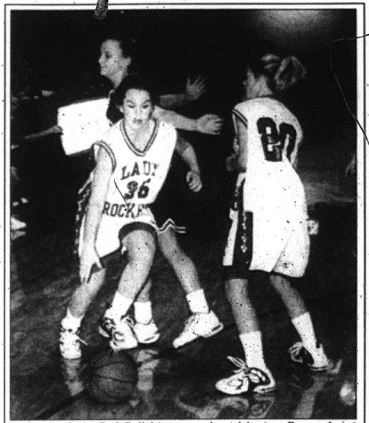

After going ahead 8-6 early in the first quarter, the Owls only managed two points the rest of the first half and the Rockets were ahead 41-10.

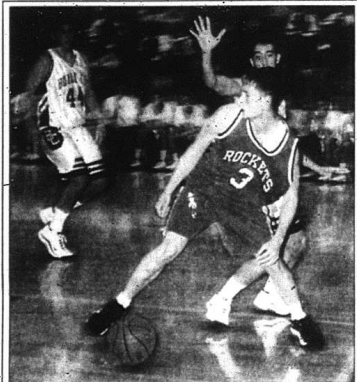

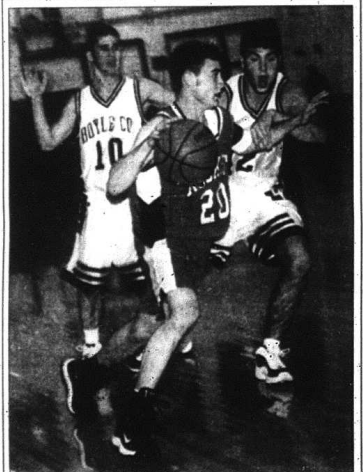
Sophomore Laura Beth Bell drives around a pick by Amy Barnett during the Rockets game with Owsley County.



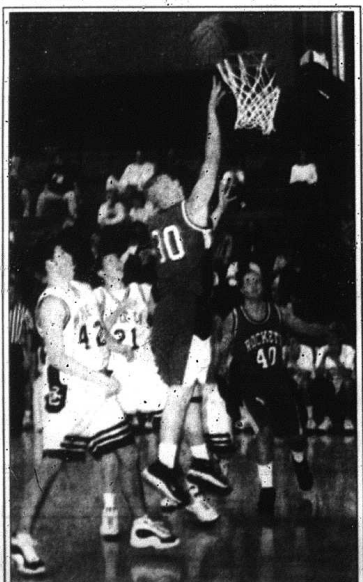

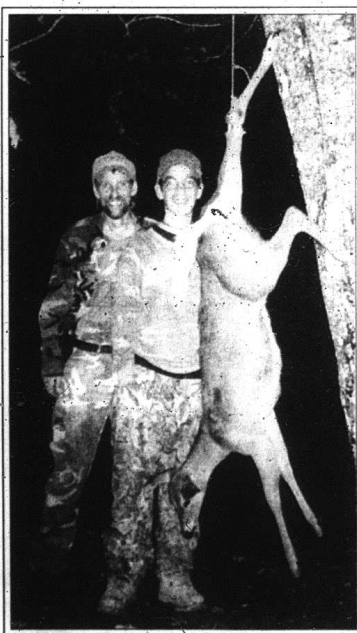

EST Tool and Machine Inc. opened a new company in the former Long Airdox building at Broadhead and the Rockcastle Adoption Agency for Pets delayed construction of a shelter near Roundstone School, after some parents and community members complained about it being too close to the school.

A safety committee for the Rockcastle County School System recommended that metal detectors and surveillance cameras be used in county schools and the Rockcastle Water Association signed contracts on their \$2.4 million water line extension project.

The Rockcastle Area Technology Center was awarded the Flag of Excellence and the Lady Rockets won the first ever district basketball championship at RCHS.

March

A large indoor marijuana growing operation was found at Roundstone and the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court passed the four percent insurance premium tax through the year 2002.

David Lovell, 31, and his wife Barbara Lovell, 25, of Burr were named in a six count indictment, accusing them of killing Charles "Toddy" Baker in May of last year.

An open house was held at the Rockcastle County Detention Center and the Bank of Mt. Vernon's Somerset branch was robbed at gunpoint by a former Rockcastle County man.

A motorist died after yet another auto accident at the junction of West Main and Williams Street in Mt. Vernon and Renfro Valley kicked off their 60th season.

April

Kentucky Governor Paul Patton visited the county in his historic bid for re-election and graduates of Broadhead High School held their annual reunion.

Accused murderer David Lovell tried to post a \$50,000 cash bond, but a Drug Enforcement Agent seized the cash from the desk of Circuit Clerk Teresa Vanzant and Lovell was returned to jail.

Another soil water advisory was issued for the county and a former employee of Western Water Association filed a harassment suit against the association.

Seven members of the same Rockcastle family were charged with drug trafficking by federal agents and well-known renegade Harvey Penrod died suddenly at the age of 67. Charles Napper received the Children's Service Award and a legal group of volunteers went on a mission trip to Honduras.

A former employee of InRege Entry filed suit against the company after she was dismissed. She claimed she was retaliated against because she questioned why the company was withholding one percent of her check, although the City of Mt. Vernon has no payroll tax.

May

An entirely new site based decision making county was elected at Rockcastle County High School and the City of Mt. Vernon began thinking about raising privilege license fees throughout the city.

Wendy's began construction on a new restaurant after the state forced them to move because of the new road from 461 to the interstate and a few days after the school shooting in Colorado, a bomb threat was received at RCHS.

The City of Broadhead finalized plans to apply for a \$1 million to upgrade their town and the Crossroads Assembly of God moved into a new building.

62 seniors graduated from RCHS and some Mt. Vernon residents were extremely upset at the city cut down a large tree in an area that had stood in the city park on West Main Street.

The county bought property for a new county garage and some members of the lane pack council at RCHS tried unsuccessfully to hire a principal.

Only three percent turned out to vote in primary election and Drew Davidson won the State 4-H Talk Meet.

The Lady Rockets softball team won the district and the boys finished runner-up after both had successful regular seasons.

June

The newly renovated and expanded Rockcastle County Detention Center talked inspection again and remained closed and the Snack Shack Drive in Mt. Vernon was closed after a grease fire.

The Rockcastle Kiwanis Club hosted their first garden tour and tea and local residents were arrested in a drug bust.

The Rockcastle County Board of Education began paper work for a new Broadhead Elementary School and Donna Helton won another Men's Club Championship at Cedar Rapids.

Well-known Rockcastle County High School student Suzan Graves lost a life long battle with Cystic Fibrosis at age 15 and the official ribbon cutting ceremony for the new historic cabin and craft village at Renfro Valley was held.

Nearly 30,000 children have enrolled in KCHIP

100 local families are receiving help

The Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program has enrolled 29,614 children as of the end of November, the Cabinet for Health Services announced today. 100 families are participating in the program in Rockcastle County.

During November, more than 5,000 children enrolled in the program that provides free health coverage to uninsured children, birth through age 18. Beginning Nov. 1, the income eligibility increased to provide coverage to families with incomes twice the poverty level.

"These excellent enrollment figures show that the hard work by Family Resource and Youth Services Centers, health departments, pediatricians, family practice doctors and other health care providers, community groups and the Department for Community Based Services is paying off," Health Services Secretary Jimmy Helton said.

"We urge local organizations and his businesses to continue to help us sign up children who qualify for KCHIP." When KCHIP began, there were an estimated 123,000 children without coverage living under 200 percent of poverty in Kentucky. In addition to the 29,614 children in KCHIP, an estimated 20,000 children have been covered through the Medicaid program. (These families had applied through KCHIP and it was determined they were eligible for Medicaid.) Enrollment in KCHIP began in mid-1998. The state began a major awareness campaign in the summer of 1999 that included advertising, training and outreach through schools and other community organizations.

Interested families can call a toll-free number - 1-877-KCHIP-18 - to get an application mailed to them to enroll. They can also pick them up at local health departments, Family Resource and Youth Services Centers, local Department for Community Based Services and other locations. (For hearing impaired, call 1-877-524-4719 for KCHIP information).

There is also a new web site for KCHIP information, including a copy of the application. The web address is: <http://cfcchs.chs.state.ky.us/chs/kchip/kchip.htm>. The site includes information about how to apply, eligibility criteria and covered services.

KCHIP Eligibility Requirements
The local department of Community Based Services (DCBS) is responsible for determining eligibility for KCHIP. A child may be eligible to receive KCHIP benefits if they meet the age and income requirements. A family of four can have a gross annual income up to \$33,400 yearly or \$2,784 monthly. Income disregards for dependent care and work expenses will be applied by DCBS when appropriate.

*These income limits change in April each year.

-A family includes the child or children and the natural or adoptive parents residing together in a household.

-For family units of more than 8 members, add \$470 per month or \$5,640 a year for each additional member.

-For certain income levels, a child must not have other insurance coverage for a period of 6 months before applying for KCHIP. There are exceptions if the child loses health insurance coverage for reasons you can't control.

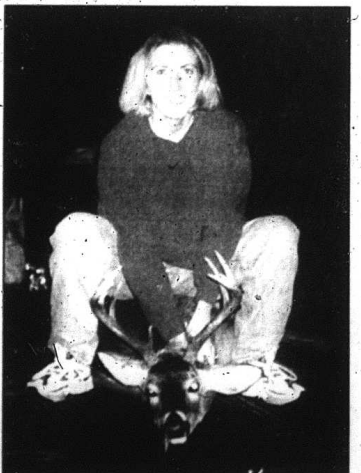
