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## 1999 year in review

July  
July began with the announcement that United States President William Jefferson Clinton would visit neighboring Jackson County and hold a town meeting in Hazard.

Local residents Wayne Stewart and William McClure both members of the Kentucky Highlands Investment Corporation were among local residents who met with President Clinton at the Mid-South Electronics plant in Annville.

The President told the group that he would do what he could to help areas such as Appalachia prosper along with the rest of the country.

It was learned that Integrity Tool and Die of Berea would locate in the Rockcastle Industrial Park #1 and the newly elected council at Rockcastle County High School re-posted the principal's job and began the interview process.

The local 911 board began taking applications for a new director and the Rite-Aid Drug Store opened a new store in Mt. Vernon.

Local youths from the First Baptist Church in Mt. Vernon traveled to Texas to help in a summer program to build and repair homes and the site based council at RCHS could not reach agreement to change their by-laws on the hiring of a new principal.

Work began on widening of Hwy. 461 by-pass and three Rockcastle baseball teams all advanced to state tournament play.

Ruth Allen was chosen as the new principal at RCHS and Brindley Ridge residents were cleaning up after a dangerous thunderstorm moved through the area.

**August**  
Local attorney Debra Hembre Lambert was nominated for a new Circuit Judgeship that deals strictly with domestic problems and the 9 and 10-year old finished runner-ups in the state tournament at Pikeville.

The annual Little World's Fair kicked off in Brodhead and the Cedar Rapids Dolphins finished third in the conference meet.

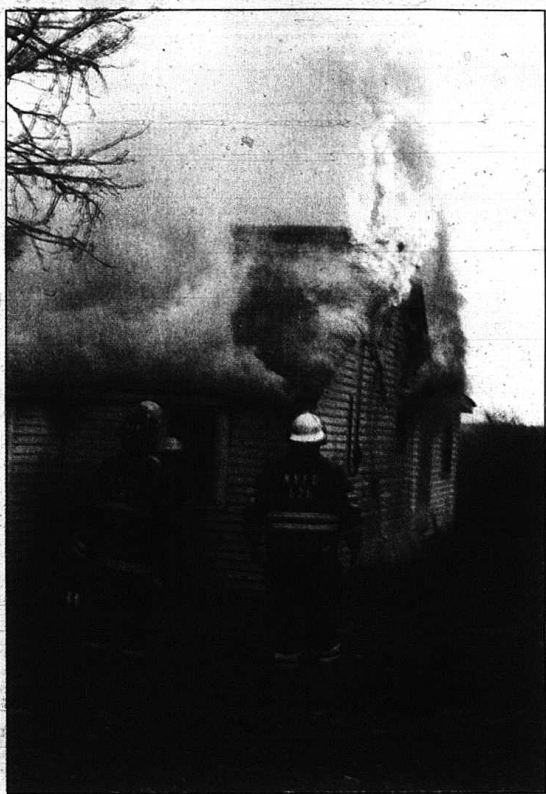
The Mt. Vernon City Council began discussion concerning the raising of city taxes and privilege license fees and Betty Jo McKinney was hired as assistant principal at RCHS.

Debra Lambert was appointed Circuit Judge by Governor Paul Patton and the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court created a new board which will run the events held at the Brodhead Fairgrounds in 2000, including the Little World's Fair in August.

The RCHS Rockets kicked off what would be a very successful 1999 season and the residents again had to boil water after a waterline break at Renfro Valley.

All of the county's taxing districts except for the soil conservation district took their four percent increase in property tax assessments and the Rockcastle Water Association held a ceremonial ground break.

## Tobacco settlement checks currently being mailed

The Kentucky Tobacco Settlement Trust Corporation, chaired by Governor Paul Patton, announced today that the trustee of the National Tobacco Growers Settlement Trust began mailing approximately 252,000 checks to over 167,000 Kentuckians. The Trust was established earlier this year by tobacco state political leadership and the four largest cigarette manufacturers, to offset income lost by tobacco quota holders and farmers as demand for tobacco drops in the wake of last year's \$246 billion settlement between the cigarette industry and 46 state attorneys general.

Kentucky's checks account for 43.4 percent of the total funds being

distributed by the Chase Manhattan Bank, the trustee, throughout the 14 states that are party to the Trust. Kentucky burley producers will receive \$108,882,042.73 of the \$250 million being distributed by the Trust. The funds set aside for Kentucky during the first year of the 12-year program totaled \$113,177,543.43 after administrative expenses of \$603,839.42 paid to Chase Manhattan and \$255,076 paid in federal income tax were deducted. The Kentucky Tobacco Settlement Trust Corporation Board of Directors requested reimbursement of \$728,199 spent by the Commonwealth of Kentucky in the administration of the trust fund. The Board instructed the

Trustee to pay qualified recipients 8.65 cents per pound of 1998 basic quota to quota owners, and 7.84 cents per payment pound, the average of 1998 effective quota and 1998 to 1998 marketing, to growing farms and grower/tenants.

KTSCT announced that recipients will receive a separate check for each category in which they qualify. For example, a tobacco quota owner who raises her/his own quota on her/his

## Committee will meet Thursday to discuss tax

Mt. Vernon Mayor Karen King had hoped that she could get some type of payroll and net profits tax passed before the first of the year, but to date she has been unsuccessful.

After a large crowd showed up in protest of the tax at the last city council meeting in December, the council rescinded the first reading of a payroll tax ordinance they had passed in November.

Then Mayor Karen King said she would appoint a committee to come up with a payroll tax that everyone could live with.

Members of that committee are the Mayor, council members Clark Mullins, Lou Vanhose and Daryl Smith and local residents Carol Bryant and William Gibbons.

The committee has met only once and very little was accomplished.

Mrs. Bryant said that committee members were reluctant to come up with any recommendation for the council until some very important things had been put on the table.

Mrs. Bryant said that the committee asked the Mayor for a plan prioritizing the use of the money and the committee also wanted to know exactly how much the city's deficit actually was.

Mrs. Bryant said that no hard figures concerning the city's debt was presented and that each member of the council was very persistent in their request for those figures.

Mrs. Bryant also said that there was some question as to whether the city was even qualified under state law to impose a tax because they are a fifth class city.

City Clerk Kaye Rader said Wednesday that the Department of Local Government in Frankfort had told her that the city was eligible to impose a tax, but that she was doing further research to make sure.

City Attorney John Clontz is also looking into the qualification matter as is legal counsel for the Kentucky Press Association.

The next committee meeting will be held Thursday night to see if the committee can come up with a recommendation for the entire council which meets on Monday night at 7 p.m. at city hall.

It has been estimated that the original proposed 1.5 percent payroll and net profits tax would generate in excess of \$500,000 annually for the city, but that seems like a very low

estimate.

Tax on employees of two of the city's employers, the Rockcastle County Board of Education and the Rockcastle Hospital would generate in excess of \$300,000 from their wages alone.

Until a tax rate is set and the city receives documentation from all employers, business owners and professionals no one really knows how much money will be realized.

However, some believe at 1.5 percent the city could receive nearly \$1 million annually from the tax.

Mayor Karen King has said that part of the money would be used to give city employees raises, build a new building for the fire department and pay on city projects such as the new city park on Williams Street.

The Mayor has also said that the city owes its own water and sewer department \$250,000, which has been put in the general fund over the years to make ends meet.

Mrs. Bryant said that she and other members of the committee hope the Mayor had the necessary information ready for the committee on Thursday night, so they could complete their recommendation to the council.

At November's meeting most of those in protest of the tax said they understood that they city needed money to operate on, but they thought that 1.5 percent was excessive.

If the council does pass a first reading of a payroll and net profits tax again next Monday night, they must then publish the ordinance in the *Signal* seven days prior to a second reading and final vote.

## CenterNet approved

Hilda Gay Legg, Executive Director of The Center for Rural Development in Somerset, has announced the approval of Rockcastle County's CenterNet site application. CenterNet is a regional network bringing vast new telecommunications capabilities to counties in Southern and Eastern Kentucky. The network, which currently includes 20 counties, will eventually cover The Center's 40-county region.

## David Tapp announces candidacy

David Tapp announced today his intent to seek election as Commonwealth's Attorney for the 28th Judicial Circuit which is comprised of Rockcastle, Lincoln and Pulaski counties. In his first bid for elected office, Tapp emphasized his qualifications: "Since college, I've worked only in the criminal justice system—both in law enforcement and the courts. If the people want a politician in that office, I'm not their candidate. But if they want a prosecutor, that's me."

Tapp has prior experience as a state court felony prosecutor and was responsible for several significant convictions, particularly involving defendants charged with sexual offenses, crimes of violence and drug offenses. In 1994, Tapp secured the conviction and 20 year sentence of a day care worker on five molestation charges. Tapp also represented the Commonwealth in the resulting appeal and won state supreme court approval for children to testify by closed circuit television rather than in the courtroom itself. In 1995, Tapp prosecuted a man for the rape of an eight year old girl in Nancy, and obtained a 40 year sentence. A 1995 Rockcastle County child pornography case prosecuted by Tapp resulted

in two convictions: a Brodhead woman who permitted her own daughter to be exploited received a 15 year sentence; her boyfriend was likewise convicted of 20 counts of using minors in sexual performances, sexual abuse and of being a persistent felony offender and received a 22 year sentence. Also in 1995, Tapp prosecuted a Somerset man responsible for a series of sexual attacks in Pulaski and Boyle counties. That defendant received a 20 term of imprisonment. In his last appearance before entering private practice, Tapp prosecuted a Somerset man for the robbery and attempted slaying of a laundromat employee. That defendant was sentenced to a 30 year term of imprisonment.

Some of Tapp's most satisfying efforts come from cases he was unable to personally finish before leaving public service. Tapp was the attorney initially assigned to prosecute Gary Casper McKinney, who was later convicted in the death of his wife and her two children. "Laying the ground work for that case, and seeing it reach fruition years later with a conviction was gratifying. Everybody likes to feel like they've done a good job. I'm just glad that case was finally resolved. We need more prosecutions like that one. We have too many serious cases which do not receive the prosecutorial at-

tention that they deserve." Tapp likewise expressed his frustration with the unsolved homicides of Cody Gibson and Linda Garrett. "Some day, there will be a break. I hope I'm around when it happens."

Prior to becoming a state court prosecutor, Tapp worked as a contract employee at the U.S. Attorney's Office in the Western District of Kentucky where he assisted in the investigation, prosecution and related forfeitures of numerous federal drug, pornography, gambling and health care fraud offenses. Tapp's prior

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## Agricultural News

**Crop Disaster Program (CDP)**  
The Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2000, and the Omnibus Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2000, included a total of \$1.386 billion for the Crop Disaster Program (CDP). CDP assistance is for farmers who suffered losses to 1999 crops due to natural disasters.

Farmers are eligible for compensation for 1999 crop losses directly attributed to adverse weather and related conditions.

Producers who suffered greater than a 35% loss on insured/noninsured crops such as tobacco and corn and the non insurable crops such as

hay, soybeans and vegetables for commercial use are eligible to receive payment.

Payments to farmers will be provided for all applications as reviewed in order to stay with the program's requirements and budget.

As a condition of receiving benefits under CDP, any producer who elected not to purchase crop insurance on the 1999 crop for which CDP benefits are requested MUST insure that crop for the 2000 and 2001 crop years.

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## Getting The Most Out Of Fast Foods

Fast food won't win a prize as the most nutritious food around, but for parents with young children, it's hard to beat the convenience and predictability. Since fast food meals typically contain 40 to 50 percent fat, you won't want to make a habit of them. But as an occasional treat for youngsters (and an inexpensive kitchen escape for parents), your family can enjoy fast food without going off the nutritional deep end.

While fast food can't be recommended as a staple diet, it's unrealistic to think that adults can keep children away from fast food settings. Fast food is not all bad. Many fast food companies responding to consumer pressure for better nutrition, are offering more low fat items and fresh foods.

Parents need to make up for shortcomings of fast food by serving well-balanced meals and snacks at home. If most of a child's meals are nutritionally sound, an occasional fast food meal is not a problem.

Here are some tips for getting the most nutrition from fast food:  
 \* When ordering combination meals for children, substitute fruit juice or low fat milk for the soft drink.  
 \* Look for a salad bar. Many children like fresh fruit, carrot sticks, broccoli flowerettes, cottage cheese and yogurt.  
 \* Order the smallest, plainest hamburger or cheeseburger on the

menu. These usually contain a lot less fat than the deluxe or super burger, because they are smaller and served without sauce or special dressing. Beef sandwiches often have less fat than hamburgers.

\* Try a plain baked potato. Let your child top the "spud" with selections from the salad bar, like crunchy raw vegetables, cottage cheese and/or grated cheese.

\* If french fries are the choice, order the smallest size.

\* If available, try a grilled chicken sandwich. Regular chicken nuggets and sandwiches are usually deep-fried and loaded with fat.

\* A soft taco or tostada with beans and a small amount of cheese are a good choice at a Mexican fast food outlet. Get guacamole, sour cream and extra cheese on the side to control the amount. Avoid crisp tortillas (fried).

\* Select the thin-crust pizza and choose vegetable toppings like green peppers, onions and mushrooms. Lean ground beef is also a good option.

\* For thirst quenchers, choose fruit juices, low fat milk or even water.

\* For dessert the best bet is a soft-serve cone or low fat frozen yogurt. If you need to watch calories, fat, cholesterol, or sodium, ask the restaurant cashier for the nutritional contents list for the foods that they offer. Most restaurants have these available for customer use.

## Farm News

### Phase II Tobacco Checks

Rockcastle tobacco farmers and quota holders received bonus tobacco check in the mail Monday from the Phase II Tobacco Settlement. This payment, which many may consider a windfall, actually comes on the heels of a 2 year quota cut of 30 percent. Payments are to ease the pain caused by lowered consumption following recent tobacco tax hikes as well as the settlement between tobacco companies and states.

Kentucky will receive 1.5 billion over 12 years through the Phase II Settlement. The 1999 payment to Kentucky farmers at just over 110 million will drop in the 2<sup>nd</sup> year to just over 90 million and rebound in the 3<sup>rd</sup> parts (the quota one), growing farm, and grower/tenant), separate checks were written for each part.

If farmers operate on more than one farm serial number (FSN), then multiple checks for each farm were created. Each check has the FSN on the left hand side, which may help in sorting checks. Farmers are also reminded to keep the top half of the check for 1999 tax records.

As the Kentucky General Assembly convenes this week for the bi-annual session, all eyes will be on how the Phase I money will be used. Phase I money is funds directly to the Kentucky state government in the amount of 3.45 billion over 25 years. Kentucky agriculture leaders are concerned that part of this money will be used to ease the pressure caused by farmers growing 30 percent less tobacco as well as an anticipated 20-30 percent additional cut possible to the 2000 crop.

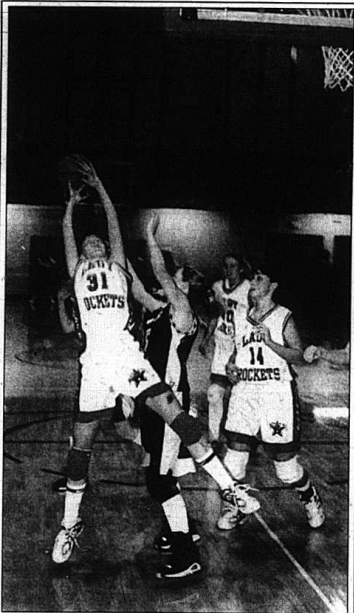

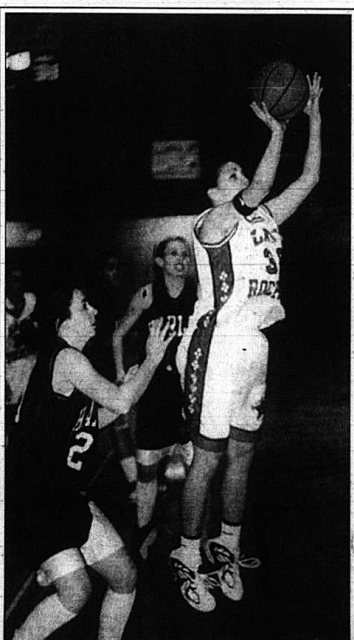

The Tigers got the rebound and a last second shot but to no avail.

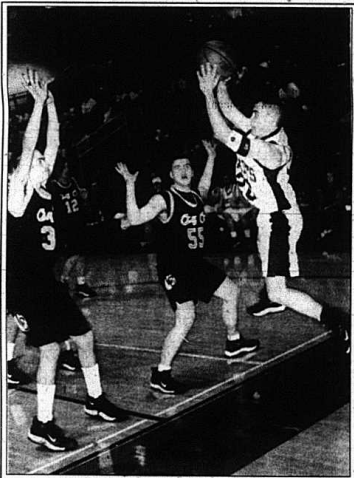

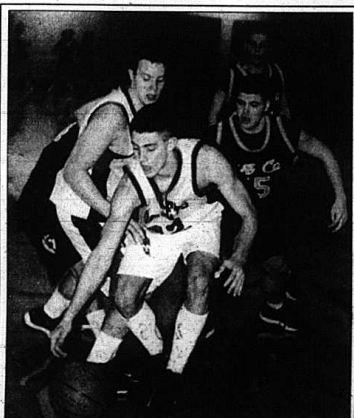

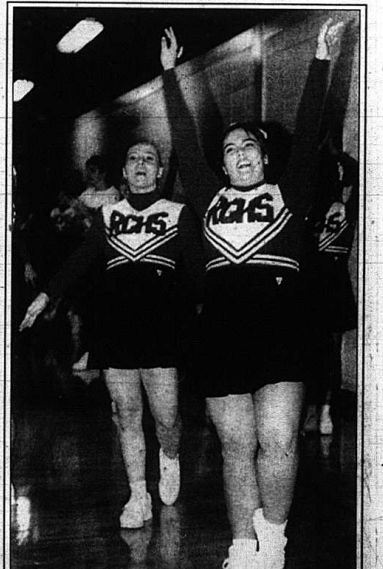

The family of the late Suzanne Graves spearheaded the annual Cystic Fibrosis bike-a-thon at Broadhead which raised a record \$15,000 to help in the fight against the deadly disease.

Lou Vanhoose was appointed to the Mt. Vernon City Council after Lee D. Keene resigned and Mt. Vernon raised privilege license fees and property taxes.

A meeting was held to discuss the consolidation of Kentucky's 120 counties and residents learned that surveillance cameras would be used at illegal dumpsites throughout the county.

Tara Ahney was crowned football homecoming queen and John Clontz received the Everett C. Brown Memorial Award for public service.

A survivor of the Columbine shooting spoke to the members of the Bible Baptist Church in Mt. Vernon.

A large crowd turned out for the

Bittersweet Festival in Mt. Vernon and Governor Patton and Loretta Lynn helped dedicate the Kentucky Country Music Hall of Fame at Renfro Valley.

300 people attended a public hearing at Broadhead school to find out where the new Hwy. 150 will go. Many residents were upset when they found that they would lose their homes to the new road.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court found out that their insurance carrier would not pay for any type of legal defense in connection with the posting of the Ten Commandments and the Broadhead Family Health Care Center opened for business.

Brothard area residents learned that construction on their new school building would begin in June 2000 and Allen Pensold and Serena Stratton were re-appointed to the library board.

Circuit Judge Dan Veners moved the murder trial of Earl Brent Kirby, 42, to Lincoln County and the local Kiwanis Club installed their new officers.

Glenn Overby of Mt. Vernon won a national contest and Gary Asher resigned as head of the county's Disaster and Emergency Services.

### November

November began intragay when Cornell Mecece was shot to death in a armed robbery at Foodland Grocery Store in Broadhead. The gunman was wearing a Halloween mask and no arrests have been made.

Mt. Vernon made their first attempt at passing a 1.5 percent payroll tax, which was later rescinded and Democratic Governor Paul Patton, carried Rockcastle County in his successful bid for re-election.

Ninety-five residents and students completed a successful clean-up day in the county and Brady Durham and Marquita Phillips were sworn-in as new council members at Livingstone.

### December

A large crowd turned out to protest the city of Mt. Vernon's new payroll tax, which was rescinded, although Mayor Karen King did appoint a committee to continue to study the proposal.

The Rockcastle County boys basketball team defeated Clay County for the first time in school history and a group of community leaders announced they would apply for millions in grants to upgrade the county and the county spent \$25,000 on disposal fees from the clean-up along Hammond's Fork Road.

Local officials announced they would seek \$7 million in state funding for a new Technical School to be located adjacent to Rockcastle High School and the RCHS Rifle Team won the state title in competition in Owensboro.

Brady Durham resigned from the Livingston City Council and local funeral director Frank Watson died.

own farm with labor she employs will receive three separate checks. Although all the checks were mailed on December 30, it is possible that some may arrive before others. The earliest checks should arrive by January 4, 2000. Recipients who expect multiple checks should have all their payments by January 10th. To verify that payment amounts are correct, Corporation staff encourages recipients to call the pounds reported on their application forms by the appropriate per pound rates of 8.65 cents per pound of basic quota and 7.84 cents per payments pound.

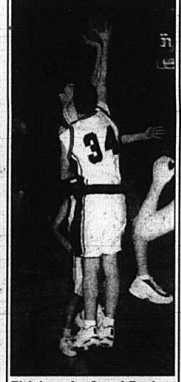

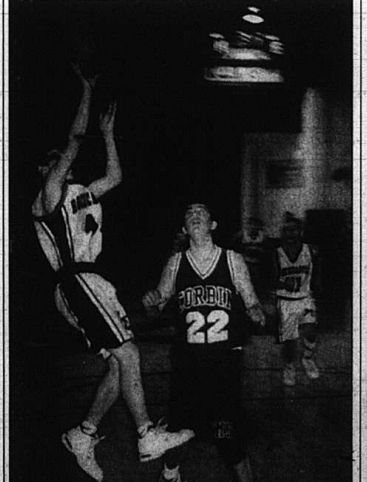

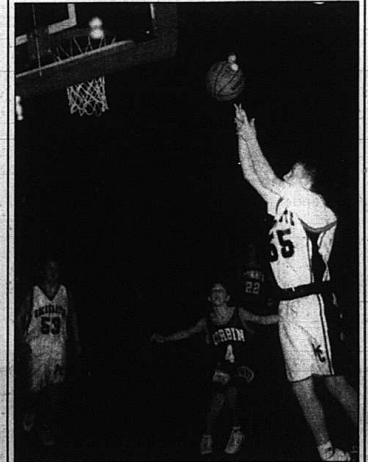
Seventh grader Max Saylor tries for a goal over two Corbin defenders. The seventh graders lost 42-34.

experience also includes supervision of pre-trial defendants and law enforcement positions both in Kentucky and Hawaii. "As a new deputy sheriff, I learned what it's like to be self-dependent in a rural area. You have to make critical decisions about cases and people without a whole lot of input from more senior officers and without a time delay for consideration. That's a pretty daunting task for any young officer." As an investigator for the Honolulu prosecutor's office, and then a member of the Organized Crime Strike Force, Tapp dealt with

complex criminal enterprises and conspiracies: "I learned a lot from that experience, particularly when dealing with organized groups from other cultures. I also had the advantage of working with tremendously talented and experienced investigators."

In addition to his professional experience, Tapp graduated from Morehead State University with a degree in History and Government. In 1990, Tapp received a Master's Degree in Criminal Justice Administration from Chaminade University of Hawaii. Three years later, Tapp received his law degree from the University of Louisville.

"I've done a lot. I've been fortunate in having the opportunity to work with local officers who are dedicated to providing effective law enforcement," said Tapp. "Four years ago, right before I left public service, I told the local paper that a prosecutor would be better at his job if he also had experience on the other side. I believed that then, and I believe it now. Over the last couple of years, I've had the chance to represent people in my private practice who've been charged with some crime or the other. That experience, learning all sides of a case, learning the defense perspective, will let me anticipate some of the tactics that good lawyers use in representing their clients. I think I'll make a better prosecutor as a result of this experience."

Tapp is married to Patricia Sue Tapp. They have three children, Beth, Adrian and Morgan, all of whom attend Pulaski County Schools. Tapp has been active in local civic groups and area charities. He attends the First-United Methodist Church of

## Somerset.

"I'm really looking forward to this election. I believe in hard work and commitment, and that's exactly how I intend to approach this campaign. If I'm fortunate enough to succeed, that's how I'll approach the job as well." According to Tapp, all three counties could benefit from more jury trials and a generally more aggressive prosecutor's office. "All you have to do is go out and talk to the public in the workplace and in their homes. People are tired of rampant crime. And the perception is that little is being done to curtail it. Even in those cases where a conviction is obtained, it's usually a plea bargain, and it's usually much less than the original charge called for. We can do better than that. We can make a difference... but only if we elect a prosecutor, not a politician."

## KCVL debuts at Rockcastle Library

The Kentucky Commonwealth Virtual Library (KCVL) is now available at the Rockcastle County Public Library, providing comprehensive information resources and services to support the Kentucky Commonwealth Virtual University (KCVLU) and to support the lifelong learning for all Kentuckians.

Beginning November 1, 1999, library users have access to online information resources, either housed in Kentucky libraries or accessible via the Internet, through a "one-stop shopping" gateway.

The KCVL Web site (<http://www.kcvl.org>) offers a common look and feel for information seekers and provides access to the online public access catalogs of the eight public universities and 28 community and technical colleges in the Kentucky Community and Technical College System (KCTCS), along with online catalogs of other Kentucky libraries. This access allows users to find out the holdings of each library and to have the materials delivered to the library nearest them.

There are 32 databases available to the statewide audience, including 16 databases from OCLC Online Computer Library Center, Inc., 15 databases from EBSCO Information Services and the online Encyclopedia Britannica. They contain full text from close to 5,000 journals, magazines, newspapers, news wires and reference books, as well as indexes and abstracts to both scholarly and general interest content.

The KCVL Web site also offers access to a unique Kentuckiana collection; state and federal government information resources organized by subjects and annotated by librarians; an "anytime, anywhere" tutorial to help students and citizens tap into the riches of the Web by showing them step-by-step what the Web resources are, how to use and assess them, and how to use them responsibly; and a Virtual Reference Desk, built as a gateway to non-governmental Web resources that are of value to Kentuckians in general.
