

Inmate found unconscious at local jail

An inmate at the Rockcastle County Determine Center was apparently beaten unconscious in a fight at the local pill alst Thursday night. Rockcastle County Jailer James Miller said that Roy Lee Sturgill. 26, was found lying in the floor next to a cell door, by a deputy jailer who was making his rounds.

Miller said that Surgill was taken to the Rockcastle Hospital and later transferred to the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

Miller said the deputy jailer had made a cell check only 38 minutes before he found Sturgill.

Another inmate, Frankle Lynn Powell, 20, was charged with first degree assault, after Sturgill got awarrant for him.

Miller said that he, too, would file charges against Powell to recover medical expenses incurred by the detention center for Sturgill's treatment at Rockcastle and U.K.

Miller said that after Sturgill was found unconscious and transported to the hospital his staff did a complete search of the cell where the incident had occurred, but found no drugs or

School Board adopts new policy Tuesday night

All student athletes at the
Rockcastle County High School will
be tested for drug use, thanks to a new
policy passed by the Rockcastle
County Board of Education on Tuesday might

County Board of Education on 1 uesday night.

The new drug testing policy will go into affect at the beginning of 2000-2001 school year in August.

Rockeastle County School Superimedent Larry Hammond said the board had been considering such a policy for the past two years and that numerous other school districts in the area affected had a drug testing in the area already had a drug testing

Hammond said that because students other than athletes are required to go to school, they cannot be tested by law. But because student athletes volunteer to participate in athletics they can be required to take such a

Hammond said that he would form a committee to come up with a procedures policy on the drug testing, which will be in place by the beginning of school.

He said that each athlee in each sport, whethough cheerleaders and student managers would be required to take a drug test at the beginning of each season and that random testing would be done throughout the seawould be done throughout the sea-son. He said that students playing more than one sport, would only be required to take the test once a year, unless they were chosen at random for a test during the year.

The policy adopted by the board on Tuesday night follows:

Eligibility Athletics Determination of athletic eligibil-ity shall be made in compliance with applicable policies, administrative procedures, and Kentucky High School Athletic Association require-

By: Tom Mills County Extension Agent for Agriculture Cattle farmers need to he aware of Grass Tetany during early grazing

Adult beef cows nursing young calves while grazing grass or small grain pastures in late winter or early spring are especially susceptible to an extremely acute disorder known as grass telany. Affected cattle can die suddenly and in fact are frequently found dead before the disorder is discovered.

Although in sorrience losses due to grass tetany from November to May, cows are more susceptible in the late winter and early spring when they graze heavily on the new growth of grass and refuse other they graze heavily on the new growth of grass and refuse other feed offered to them. Each loss is especially damaging, because it is invariably a big sleek cow with a healthy young calf that dies, to fa gross testing of the cow. Weather and soil fertility seem to be factors. Grass tetany occurs when soil temperature is between 40-60 degrees and often during changelle weather. High levels of nitrogen, potassium and moisture in the soil increase the incidence, because they opparently defeases the level of magnesium found in plants naturally.

Symptoms of the disorder usually begin with nervousness and then progress to a stilled gait, staggering, convulsions, coma and death. It always requires with magnesium and the converted that the converte
