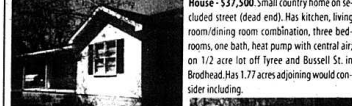

Too Much Anger May Signal Depression

John was an angry man. (All characters are fictitious.) He screamed at his children when they did not move as quickly as he thought they should. He screamed at his wife when she upset him. He kicked the dog when it got in his way. He even screamed at the lawnmower when it refused to start. A couple of times he became so angry that he put his fist through a wall.

John did have a conscience and he felt bad after an episode of anger. "I don't know what causes me to do that," he tried to explain, "but it's like I can't help myself. My dad was the same way. Maybe I learned it from him."

David (also a fictitious character.) had a different problem: he did not care about anything. When he was not at work, he spent most of time on the couch watching television. At one time he had been an avid fisherman, but he had not had his boat in the water in six months. He did not want to go anywhere. It was all he could do to get himself to work each morning. His wife tried to interest him in family activities, but to no avail. "I don't feel like it" was his answer to every invitation.

David and John do share one thing in common: they are both depressed. Depression in men does not always look the same as in women. Sadness

does not always accompany depression in males. Two of the most common symptoms of depression for men are anger and apathy.

According to an article in a recent issue of *Reader's Digest*, 20 percent of all women suffer from depression and 10 percent of all men. Some question that latter figure, because men are more reluctant to seek help when depressed. There may be more men suffering from depression who have never been counted.

What causes depression in males? Some of the same things that cause depression in women: neurotransmitters (chemicals that relay messages from one brain cell to another), hormonal imbalances, negative life experiences, such as losing a job or childhood abuse, and alcohol. Major league pitcher Pete Harnisch became depressed when he quit chewing tobacco.

Depression can be fatal. Mike Wallace, CBS news correspondent for "60 Minutes," had suicidal thoughts when he became depressed. He checked himself into a hospital and was treated with antidepressants. Depression can also shorten men's lives. A study by Johns Hopkins University found that men who have suffered from depression can cause a tremendous amount of pain for the family. Harold (a fictitious character) was physically and verbally

abusive to his wife. He would hit and kick her until she would bleed. She made several trips to the emergency room. Harold was depressed, and it was only when he got help that the abuse ended.

Treatment of depression is available and very effective. Medication, counseling and exercise are three treatments that are proven to help depression.

Men who seek help get better. Men who see depression as a sign of weakness and do not seek help continue to suffer.

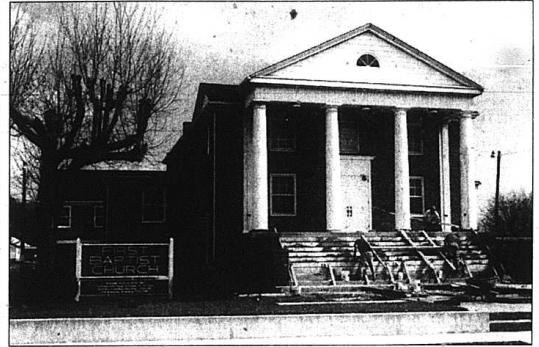

At least 10 men have been ordained by the church to the gospel ministry. Dr. Maynard Head is pastor of First Baptist Church where he has served since 1995.

Inmate found unconscious at local jail

An inmate at the Rockcastle County Detention Center was apparently beaten unconscious in a fight at the local jail last Thursday night.

Rockcastle County Jailer James Miller said that Roy Lee Sturgill, 26, was found lying in the floor next to a cell door, by a deputy jailer who was making his rounds.

Miller said that Sturgill was taken to the Rockcastle Hospital and later transferred to the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

Miller said the deputy jailer had made a cell check only 38 minutes before he found Sturgill.

Another inmate, Frankie Lynn Powell, 20, was charged with first degree assault, after Sturgill got a warrant for him.

Miller said that he, too, would file charges against Powell to recover medical expenses incurred by the detention center after Sturgill's treatment at Rockcastle and U.K.

Miller said that after Sturgill was found unconscious and transported to the hospital his staff did a complete search of the cell where the incident had occurred, but found no drugs or alcohol.

Miller said that Sturgill told them after he regained consciousness that he and Powell had been drinking some "home brew" they had made.

Miller said that he did not know how many other inmates had drunk the liquid, but that three of the inmates in the cell were trustees and worked in the jail's kitchen.

Miller said he thought that they had been saving the fruit that they were supposed to be eating and had used some bread, kool-aid and water to make the substance in a trash bag.

"They had had to make the stuff in the last week, because that cell was searched eight to ten days before the incident," Miller said.

Miller said that the trustees who worked in the kitchen had been stripped of their privileges and put in lock down because of the incident.

Miller said that he was continuing his investigation into the incident, but that he did not think any of the deputy jailers at the detention center were involved.

He said that about a week ago, some "home brew" was found in the kitchen, but that none of it had apparently been drunk.

Miller said that all detention centers have the problem of "home brew" because it is so easy to make and it is hard to find trustees that can be trusted to work in the kitchen.

"Some of those inmates in that cell are alcoholics and they would do anything for a drink," Miller said.

"We even have to keep our cleaning chemicals under lock and key, because of the alcoholics being held," he said.

According to court records, Sturgill is listed as a witness in a case against Powell, which may have ignored the altercation.

Miller said that when a new prisoner is brought into the detention center, they are asked a number of questions, including whether or not they would have a problem with any other inmate.

Miller said Sturgill told them he did not and when Miller told him he would be put into a cell with Powell and other local inmates, he said it was o.k. because they were friends.

According to Miller, Sturgill said that Powell put some dominos into a sock and used it as a weapon to strike Sturgill in the head the night he was found unconscious.

Miller said his staff found the sock full of dominos when they searched his cell.

Powell is being held in lock-down and will appear in Rockcastle District Court on Monday to face the assault charges.

Sturgill, who was being held for unpaid fines, has filled bond and was released from jail.

Five injured in two car crash

Five Rockcastle County residents were injured, three seriously, in a two car crash on Hwy. 25 near Burr Tuesday afternoon.

According to Rockcastle County Deputy Sheriff Darrell Doan, the wreck occurred after Rockcastle County High School freshman Paul Douglas Hayes, 16, of Mt. Vernon lost control of pick-up as he traveled toward Livingston on 25, shortly after school was dismissed.

Doan said that Hayes' pick-up became sideways on the wet pavement and struck a Chevrolet Blazer driven by Roy Baugh, 44, of Orlando, as Baugh and his wife Kathy, 42, traveled toward Mt. Vernon.

After the two vehicles collided, Baugh's Blazer struck a rock wall and Hayes' vehicle left the roadway and struck a tree.

Members of the Livingston and Mt. Vernon Fire Departments had to use the jaws of life apparatus to free Michael Wyatt, 19, a passenger in Hayes' vehicle from the wrecked pick-up. Another passenger, Coy D. Kirby, 18, of Mt. Vernon received only minor injuries. Wyatt is a senior at RCHS and Kirby is a sophomore.

All five people were treated at Rockcastle Hospital. Wyatt and the Baughs were later transferred to the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington with multiple injuries. Hayes was admitted to Rockcastle for a possible head injury and Kirby was treated and released.

Doan said that he did not think any drugs or alcohol were involved in the wreck and that the wet pavement probably caused Hayes' truck to hydro-plane.

Athletes at RCHS will be tested for drug use

School Board adopts new policy Tuesday night

All student athletes at the Rockcastle County High School will be tested for drug use, thanks to a new policy passed by the Rockcastle County Board of Education on Tuesday night.

The new drug testing policy will go into effect at the beginning of 2000-2001 school year in August.

Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond said the board had been considering such a policy for the past two years and that numerous other school districts in the area already had a drug testing policy.

Hammond said that because students other than athletes are required to go to school, they cannot be tested by law. But because student athletes volunteer to participate in athletics they can be required to take such a test.

Hammond said that he would form a committee to come up with a procedures policy on the drug testing, which will be in place by the beginning of school.

He said that each athlete in each sport, including cheerleaders and student managers would be required to take a drug test at the beginning of each season and that random testing would be done throughout the season. He said that students playing more than one sport, would only be required to take the test once a year, unless they were chosen at random for a test during the year.

The policy adopted by the board on Tuesday night follows:

Eligibility Athletics

Determination of athletic eligibility shall be made in compliance with applicable policies, administrative procedures, and Kentucky High School Athletic Association requirements.

DRUG TESTING PROGRAM

The District has established drug-testing program for student athletes for the following reasons:

1. The District has reason to believe that some student athletes are using illegal drugs.
2. Student athletes often serve as role models for other stu-

dents.
3. Through participation in athletics, students using illegal drugs pose a threat to their own health and safety, as well as to that of other students.

Each student who plans to participate in athletics at the high school level and his/her parent or guardian shall sign a written consent for drug testing as a prerequisite to the student's participation in an athletic program.

The Superintendent shall develop procedures to reasonably ensure student privacy during the taking of samples, security of samples once obtained, and designation of laboratory services that are accurate and reliable. Appropriate measures shall be taken to protect student confidentiality throughout the testing process and in the handling of test results.

Holbrook is currently serving a second term as the county's only democrat office holder.

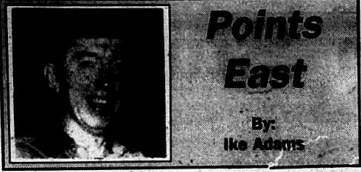
He takes over as chairman from LeRoy Brown, who did not seek reelection to the post.

Flowers East

When I was growing up and especially when I was a little feller, one of my favorite places to hide when playing hide and seek was behind this bushy, pale-green, hedgey looking row of plants that grew near the edge of the yard.

It was just high enough and wide enough that when you got behind and you heard whomever was "It" coming, you could sort of scurry around to either side and stay out of sight. Mom considered it a flower because it would have tiny, yellow blossoms on it around the first of July, but other than that being a good hiding place, I never considered it much more than another nuisance that was a pain in the behind to mow around.

We moved, now I was up in high school, with one of those contraptions that when you push, the wheels had gears attached to them that made a set of blades rotate and shear the grass off. It wasn't that bad in the straight stretches where you could build up a little speed so that anything that got in the blades got snapped right off. But when you had to do a lot of slow, stop and go pushing around flower beds and stuff, something as small as chicken wing feathers would get caught in the blades and lock her up like they'd been welded shut.

L.C. Adams, my first cousin and next door neighbor, finally bought an electric lawnmower which I thought

to be the slickest piece of modern machinery on the face of the earth in the late fifties. You just wanted to be sure that the grass was dry as powder though, because when I got the least bit damp, it would short out and who ever was pushing it turned into a lightning rod. It would knock the fire right out of you until somebody finally figured out that you could wrap an old piece of inner tube around the handles and keep from getting juiced.

Mom called the plant you've already forgotten about, now that I have you interested in old lawn mowers, spar grass. Somebody had told my Grandpa that you could eat it so he had ordered a bunch from Starks Brothers and set it out but it never did bear anything. (My Grandpa prided himself on having at least two plants of everything Starks Brothers ever had in their catalogue.) Local speculation was that the plants were all one sex so they couldn't pollinate. But a bunch of women on Blair Branch thought it was pretty enough that they wanted a start of it so Mom would dig them up some, cause you started it from the roots and it would come back every year. A lot of yards had pretty little clumps of spar grass in the fence corners with the snow ball bushes and hydrangas on Blair Branch.

I was in high school before we

finally got a gasoline mower, and I made a point of running it over the spar grass before I had a chance to get much of a start. You couldn't do that with the push mower because it would bind the blades up so bad that it took thirty minutes to get them unangled so it was less trouble to just let the darn stuff grow instead of trying to mow it down. After a couple or three years of being mowed by the gas mower, it finally died off and I don't know that anybody missed it that much.

Then I went off to college and one day early in the spring, the cafeteria had a big serving pan full of stuff labeled "spargrass with Hollandaise Sauce." That was not the first thing that I ate in college either that I wouldn't have had a clue about if they hadn't put a label on it. Crab cakes and brussel sprouts come immediately to mind.

Anyway, I told Raymond Ratliff, my room mate from Grundy, Virginia, that the asparagus looked a lot like spar grass when it first started coming up and Ray allowed that it sure nuff did that. (Raymond's take on brussel sprouts was that it was the sorriest excuse for cabbage he'd ever seen and the college must be going through awful hard times if all they could afford to serve a person was the suckers growing on old cabbage plants.)

But we thought the asparagus was fine stuff and maybe the best thing we'd learned all semester after we looked it up in the encyclopedia and discovered that it was, in fact spar grass.

A couple of weeks ago, Mary Hixon, the Garrard County Extension Agent at Home Economics and I saw a man with a virtual arm load of asparagus that her parents grew and I partially lived off of for several days. I normally get a bunch off Ralph King who has a nice bed but he has to share it with a bunch of other people too and I feel guilty about taking as much as I'd really like to have.

Asparagus is good with the sauces and such, but the best way to fix fresh asparagus is to put it in a casserole dish with a bunch of butter, couple tablespoons of water, and a little salt and pepper. Cover it with saran wrap and pop it in the nuke for about three minutes until it gets steamed and eat it like. I don't care how else you fix it, you can't beat that recipe for my particular palat. Ralph says the best way to eat it is to break it off and much it down while you're standing beside the bed, and he has a pretty good argument for that.

I've looked for plants, now that I own a place where I plan on staying for a long spell, to set out myself and

I've been to at least a dozen gardening centers since the first of February who have all told me that I should get some spar grass now. So now I've called Starks Brothers and I'm patiently waiting for the catalogue to

get here so that I can order a few dozen plants.

Grandpa would be proud of me that I'd be ten dollars better off now, a hard time believing how you go about eating spar grass.

Uh-huh, he got you didn't he? Spring fever is often the first signs of the arrival of, "my imaginary bee," and many mistake it for a real honey bee.

When a woman looks toward a window and says, "just look at that, I can hardly see outside, these windows must be washed, and those curtains perhaps to come down before they rot from the embedded dirt. And while we are at it something has to be done to the walls. Either clean them or put up new paper. But before we get into all that the cabinets must be emptied and cleaned. Now I had not forgotten my orders to never climb a ladder or step stool to reach above my head to clean the fans, wash the windows, take the curtains down and perhaps do a little wall papering but the urge to do so got the best of me and since help was scarce I was willing to try. The lower plates that needed attention couldn't be done till the upper ones were taken care of. Then Alice came to my rescue and we began on the windows. The kitchen and dining room were taken

care of, and Ahah now I could see the bright green grass and tiny green leaves on the trees in my yard. Then Judy and Geoff stopped by their way home from Florida to Flint, Michigan and immediately took up where Alice and I had stopped the day before. That little old bee had been busy and bitten my constituents of, "don't you dare climb on a ladder, or go down those tricky stairs to the basement." My sting is healing nicely, and after another long neglected job or two is finished I will be content to scullie down and await the next blue next spring.

During the time between my first urge to get this house cleaned up before some one comes by and catches it in this mess, and my help to do so appeared at my door, I applied my energy to things I could do. Sorting and storing winter clothes, and filling

boxes that would go to a yard sale or donation to a worthy cause was a real chore and was piece-mealed between other ones. I have found out we do things quite differently when our memory takes a back seat to orderliness and organized plans. This is kind-a-like my schedule went. Read the morning paper, about half way through it, remember to get a fresh cup of coffee, that takes me past the dishwasher full of clean dishes so they are put away, that leads me past the dining room where the glassware goes, so I remember to finish the job I had just begun, but, oh, no, the game I was playing last night must be put away. 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Obituaries

Tips for Parents 2000 Spring Assessment April 17-28

1. Help your child feel confident about taking the test. Express confidence in your child's ability to do well.

2. Have a relaxed environment. Avoid any activities and conversations that may arouse anxiety, confidence or unpleasantness.

3. Try to avoid applying disciplinary measures to any member of the family on the evening before the test.

4. Have your child go to bed early enough to get plenty of rest.

5. Set the clock to alarm a little early in order to allow your child time to eat and dress without rushing.

6. See that the clothes that your child likes and feels comfortable in are laid out so that frantic searches are avoided.

7. Be sure that paper, pencils and other needed school materials are together and located where they will not be forgotten in the morning.

8. You may want to talk briefly about the test in an encouraging way. Let your child know that you understand how difficult tests are, but you are confident in his/her ability to do well.

9. Ask your child to do as well as he/she can. Think of something that would be very pleasing to your child and say that this will be the reward following the test.

10. Let all conversation about testing be casual and brief.

11. Prepare a good breakfast for your child, but not a heavy one.

12. Be sure that your child is not late for school.

13. The test is constructed to be given in a group setting. Children seldom do as well when given the test individually. Therefore, it is very important that your child be in school Monday to start the test and finish with the other students. PLEASE MAKE ATTENDANCE A PRIORITY.

Who are taking prescription medication must provide verification prior to testing. Verification shall be in the form of a copy of the prescription or a physician's signed statement. Students who refuse to provide verification and subsequently test positive shall be subject to the consequences stated in this policy.

Student athletes shall be subject to testing at the beginning of their first athletic season of the school year and random drug testing throughout the season for each sport in which they participate.

CONSEQUENCES/PENALTIES If a student tests positive, a second test shall be administered as soon as possible to confirm the results. If the second test is negative, no further action shall be taken. If the second test is positive, the parents shall be notified, and the Principal or designee shall provide the parent/guardian and the student with an opportunity to be heard before penalties are imposed. For first offenses, the student athlete shall choose one of the following options:

1. Participate in a drug-assistance program acceptable to the District (with costs to be paid

by the student's family) and undergo weekly drug testing for a period of time as designated in administrative procedures, or

2. Be suspended from participation in all athletics for a period of one year from the date of the first test that yielded positive results.

For a second offense, the student shall be suspended from participation in all athletics for a period of one year from the date of the first test that yielded positive results.

For a third offense, the student shall be suspended from participation in all athletics for the remainder of his/her high school career.

After completing a period of suspension from an athletic program, the student shall be reinstated before beginning the next season for which she is eligible.

Offenses shall be cumulative over a student's entire period of participation in all high school athletics and shall accumulate regardless of the sport season in which they occur.

Positive test results shall be turned over to law enforcement authorities.

Access to drug-testing results shall be restricted on a need-to-know basis to those persons in positions designated by the Superintendent.

The District shall endeavor to locate free and low-cost counseling/assistance program options for the consideration of parents whose child tests positive.

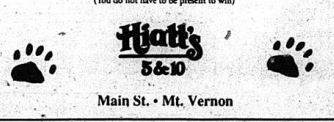

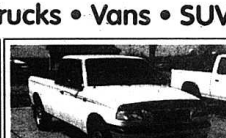

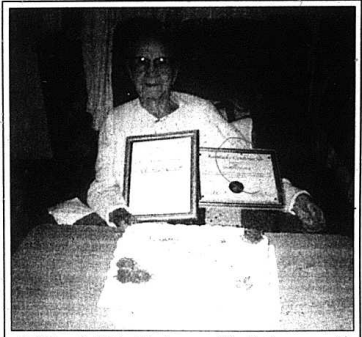

An Ordinance Amending the Comprehensive Personal System for all Departments of the City of Mt. Vernon, as Adopted by Ordinance Number 2-97

Ordinance #2-2000

Whereas, it is the intent of the City of Mt. Vernon to maintain a current and up to date personnel policy manual; and

Whereas, from time-to-time circumstances and issues coming before the City warrant a review of current policies, procedures and past decisions; and

Whereas, it is the desire of the City of Mt. Vernon to provide for the health, safety and welfare of its employees through the practice of equitable and reasonable policies;

Now, Therefore, Be It Ordained By the City of Mt. Vernon as follows: **Section One:** The comprehensive personnel manual of Mt. Vernon is hereby amended to reflect the changes herein. The changes shall be incorporated into the manual and styled in the format therein.

Part I: Part I of the Personnel Policy Manual, the "Personal Policies and Procedures," amended as follows: **Section 3.7 Compensation Time** City of Mt. Vernon employees are hourly non-exempt employees.

However, Kentucky law does not consider time worked between 37.5 and 40.0

Also, Kentucky law permits employees to take time off during the work week in order to avoid working over 40.0 hours in a week. If an employer permits an employee to work over 40.0 hours in a week, the employer must pay the non-exempt employee for overtime.

Section 6.16 Life Insurance Policy The City of Mt. Vernon provides a \$5,000 term life insurance policy and this will be amended to \$25,000 term life insurance policy.

Administrative Department Class Title: Occupational/Net Profit Tax Administrator

Characteristics of the Class: Performs clerical and administrative tasks relative to the responsibilities of the Office of Occupational/Net Profit Tax Administration as set forth in Ordinance #1-2000. Under minimum administrative direction, prepares, maintains and attests to official records of action taken by the City Council regarding Occupational/Net Profit Tax.

Essential Job Functions: Responsible for all required reports, documents and official records of the Oc-

cupational/Net Profit Tax Office. Responsible for reconciling the bank account; preparing bank deposit; opening and distributing mail; maintaining all official records; preparation of financial reports; maintenance of accounts receivable; supervise subordinate staff. Preparation of mailing all quarterly and yearly reports to businesses. Preparation of reconciling all accounts.

Job Related Physical Activity Requirements: This position is sedentary work which requires the employee to exert up to 10 pounds of force from time to time. Physical activity involved with this position may include reaching, standing, walking, fingering, talking, hearing, carrying, stooping, kneeling and repetitive motions. Visual acuity is required to receive payments, make change and properly mark receipt of payment cancellation on customer stub and to read. An employee in this position will be subject to indoor environmental conditions more than 98% of the time.



Cattle farmers need to
be aware of grass tetany
during early grazing

Adult beef cows nursing young calves while grazing grass or small grain pastures in late winter or early spring are especially susceptible to an extremely acute disorder known as grass tetany. Affected cattle can die suddenly and in fact are frequently found dead before the disorder is discovered.

Although in some seasons Kentucky farmers experience losses due to grass tetany from November to May, cows are more susceptible in the late winter and early spring when they graze heavily on the new growth of grass and refuse other feed offered to them. Each loss is especially damaging, because it is invariably a big, sleek cow with a healthy young calf that dies.

Grass tetany is a result of a magnesium deficiency in the cow. Weather and soil fertility seem to be factors. Grass tetany occurs when soil temperature is between 40-60 degrees and often during changeable weather. High levels of nitrogen, potassium and moisture in the soil increase the incidence, because they apparently decrease the level of magnesium found in plants naturally.

Symptoms of the disorder usually begin with nervousness and then progress to a stilted gait, staggering, convulsions, coma and death. It always requires immediate veterinary treatment.

About 2/3 of the cows treated intravenously with magnesium and calcium compounds recover. However, to prevent relapses, treated cows should be removed from the pasture. They should be fed hay and grain plus 2 ounces of magnesium oxide daily for at least a week.

Because animals do not store up magnesium, their dietary requirements have to be supplied on a day-to-day basis. The only way to prevent grass tetany is to supplement the diet with additional magnesium.

This can be done with commercial mineral mixes containing magnesium or with home made mixtures. Mixing 1 part magnesium oxide, 1 part trace mineral salt and 1 part distillers dried grain will fine if it is the cattle's only source of salt.

4-H Camp gearing up for another exciting summer

As the school doors in Kentucky schools close for another summer, thousands of young people will continue the learning process through 4-H camps. More than 10,000 youngsters will be attending one of the state's five residential 4-H camps this summer. Another 15,000 will participate in county day camps held in various local sites across Kentucky.

The 4-H camping experience emphasizes personal development. It is a community-setting in miniature, helping young people to develop and practice social skills, experience leadership roles, make friendships that sometimes last a lifetime.

More than 3,000 volunteers help direct camps. Each camp is also staffed with emergency medical technicians, certified life guards and guides for nature and recreation. 4-H Camp also provides young people with a chance to learn lifetime hobbies. Some will learn to swim, paddle a canoe or square dance. Crafts, nature study, fishing, archery and shooting sports are also

a part of the long list of activities available to keep everyone involved throughout the day.

The Rockcastle County 4H camp is held at J.M. Felner 4H Camp in London, Kentucky. The modern facilities include cabins, dining hall, swimming pool, and a lake for canoeing and fishing. Cost of the five-day residential camp is \$73 per person and partial scholarships are offered. The costs include transportation to and from the camp, 3 meals and two snacks per day, and nights lodging. This year the camp is scheduled for June 12-16.

All of Kentucky's 4H camps participate in the federally funded Summer Food Service Program, operating under guidelines similar to public school lunch programs. Free meal service is based on family size and income.

Rockcastle is just beginning the sign-up process. If you have not signed up yet, there are still camp openings. Openings are on a first come, first served basis so get your application in early. Contact the Rockcastle County Extension Office at 256-2403 for additional information on 4H Camp.

eligible where livestock are normally grazed and that was so damaged by drought that seeding is required to reestablish the forage crop. No assistance is authorized for hayland.

To be eligible for FRP, producers must meet ALL of the following guidelines: be an owner or operator of eligible land who normally grazes livestock on such land; as owner or operator, be responsible for restoring and maintaining the forage crop on the affected land for the 1-year after the date of completing the reseed; not have grossed annual income in excess of \$2.5 million; certify that the pasture land was so damaged or destroyed by drought in 1999 that seeding is required to reestablish the forage crop.

There will be two practice types: re-seeding with seedbed preparation and no seedbed preparation. The Rockcastle County payment rate of \$44.00/acre was determined by the Farm Service Agency State committee to pay for the cost of seed, seeding and fertilizer, not to exceed \$2500 per acre.

Sign up for the program will begin March 20 and last until April 4, 2000. The deadline to complete the re-seeding after sign-up is September 30, 2000. Re-seeding conducted before filling an application for FRP assistance will not be eligible for FRP payment.

Farm Product Safety
The advent of April heralds the planting season for farmers in the Midwest, and machine sheds become a hub of activity where final preparations are underway before heading to the field. As April showers deliver necessary ground moisture, farmers are organizing their seed and chemical supplies, oiling and greasing equipment, and listening to the weather forecast for a hint of when conditions will permit field work.

Preparing for spring planting brings many hazards, like working with solvents, chemical concentrates, and other toxic substances. Because the Farm Service Agency cares about farmers and their families, FSA would like to encourage safety and urge producers to use protective clothing and equipment when working around hazardous materials. Reading and following label instructions can safeguard farmers and their families.

Goggles, gloves and protective gear should be kept away from unprotected family members to avoid accidental contaminant transfer. Pesticides, petroleum products and fertilizer can permeate normal clothing which may allow indirect exposure when holding children, hugging a spouse, or simply bringing gloves and coveralls into the home. Other precautions include thoroughly washing your face and hands before eating. Many times when farming, producers opt for a sack lunch, which is fine, if a wash cloth and towel are part of the meal accommodations. Ingesting even small amounts of toxic concentrate may result in nausea, vomiting or even long term health complications. Farmers can't help but get their hands dirty, but they can remain safe and healthy by washing, and water-

less hand cleaners can be kept handy to facilitate frequent cleanups.

To remain competitive in agriculture requires hard work and astute business decisions. Safety is one of the most effective management components a producer can incorporate in his operation. By operating safely, both time and money can be saved, two things that are very high on a farmer's list of considerations. As farmers struggle to become more efficient producers of agricultural products, safety must remain part of the process. The advance planning and precautionary steps a producer takes prior to going to the field will pay big dividends with fewer accidents and injuries, while ensuring a long and healthy life with the family. FSA wants farmers to be successful and that requires a blend of many different skills, and safety practices. Safe farming techniques not only benefits farmers, but their families and communities in which they live. (Robert J. Kaufman, FSA Regional Public Affairs).

Crop Disaster Program Funds
USDA's Farm Service Agency Administrator Keith Kelly announced that approximately 260,000 American farmers hit by natural disasters will receive the final installment of the 1999 Crop Disaster Program. Over \$500 million has already been issued as advanced payments; the balance of the \$1.3 billion total available for the program will be issued starting this week. Because the total of the claim filed exceeds \$1.3 billion, farmers will be paid 69.6 percent of their qualifying losses.

In response to the nation's farm crisis, the United States Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation has already issued over \$17 billion in direct payments this fiscal year for ongoing programs and for programs with emergency funding.

Since enactment of last year's appropriation bills, emergency funds already issued to farmers include nearly \$5.5 billion in Market Loss Assistance Program payments, nearly \$200 million for the Livestock Assistance Program (LAP) and Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP), \$328 million issued to States for delivery of funds to tobacco quota holders, and more than \$50 million for peanut farmers. On March 14, 2000, the Rockcastle County FSA office issued 216 LAP payments equalling \$77,338. On March 8 and April 7, 2000, CDP payments were made to Rockcastle County producers, equalling \$44,180. Producers should contact their local Farm Service Agency office for additional information about these and other USDA programs.

Tobacco Leasing
Quotas for the 2000 crop year will be mailed on April 7, 2000. Leasing for the crop year 2000 will be April 14th through July 3rd.

Tobacco Loss Assistance Program Funds
Governor Paul Patton has requested that the United States Department of Agriculture release \$121,645,774 to the Chase Manhattan Bank for distribution to Kentucky tobacco quota holders and growers. The money is Kentucky's share of the Tobacco Loss Assistance Program, funded by the Agricultural Appropriations bill passed by the U.S. Congress. It will be shared by tobacco quota holders and growers using the same formula that was used to distribute Phase II payments late last year.

The Kentucky Tobacco Settlement Trust Corporation, the state entity handling Phase II payments, is also serving as the point for the distribution of the federal funds. Corporation staff indicated that growers would probably see their payments within the next six to eight weeks. Growers

and quota holders who applied for Phase II funds will not have to reapply.

Oilseed Program Signup Extended

In order to be eligible, a producer must have planted or shared in the production of an eligible oilseed in 1999. Prevented planted oilseed acreage cannot be used to determine 1999 OP eligibility nor can it be used for history or actual yield purposes. 1999 OP payments may be available to producers who planted or shared in the production of the following oilseeds in 1999: soybeans, canola, cranbe, flaxseed, mustard seed, rapeseed, safflower seed, sunflower seed (oil and confectionary).

OP applications shall be submitted to the county that controls payment limitation for the producer. KCMO determined the "control" county for each producer in December 1999. Sign up has been extended until April 14th.

Small Grains
Producers growing small grains (wheat) must report their acreage by May 31, 2000. If crop acreage is not filed timely and producer applies for a Loan Deficiency Payment, then a charge of \$26.50 will be applied for a late file.

FRP Signup
Eligible farmers whose pastures were damaged by drought in 1999 can receive payments to help them re-establish forage crops. The Pasture Recovery Program is funded at \$40 million. Established pasture is
