



In early November of 1978, Betty attended an NFB leadership seminar. For several reasons, including the fact that the meeting began on All fact that the meeting began on All Saints Day, the group clamored to be the Saintly Seminar – an impulse that Dr. Jernigan resisted mightily. Even-nally, the weight of reasons for the group's preference beat down his opposition and, one of the many facts about the seminar marshalled by seminarians during discussions, was that Betty Niceley was a member and, while niceness was not exactly sainfliness, she was so very nice that it ought to count for something. This was not the decisive argument, but it was irrefutable that Betry was simply one of the kindest, most considerate people any of us had ever met. Those qualifies didn't make her a push-over however. She fought like at tiger to protect Kennucky's separate agency for the blind. She stood up to the American Praining flouss for the Blind when she thought they were in



Slugs: Easy to Find, Hard to Control

Thin shimy trails and chewed plants are sure signs that slugs have begun fornging in your greenhouse or float beds. While it is easy to spot signs of their visits, these frequent pests are hard to control. Legislative Update

From State Rep. Danny Ford General Assembly Completes

2000 Session sixtieth and final day of the The sixtieth and final day of the 2000 General Assembly arrived on a warm sunny day in the Bluegrass. Though there were major issues yet to be decided, members worked in-gether to complete a remarkable Session. The legislature was able to provide a \$14 billion basically reve-nue neutral budget for the next bien-nium including over seven hundred projects across the state. Offsets of a projects across the state. Offsets of a \$75 million cut in taxes paid into the unemployment insurance fund, combined with a six percent tax on out of state long distance phone calls, enabled the movement of funds to those

state long distance phone calls, enabled the movement of funds to those areas seen to have the most need, like doctaotin, roads, health services, etc., actually lowering the overall tax burden or Kentuckians.

Taxes proposed carlier in the Session were denied by the General Assembly, including gasoline taxes, service taxes, property taxes, limited liability corporation taxes, and the broad communications tax, deemed inappropriate and unnecessary. By holding to a revenue neutral philosophy, reviewing funds on hand, and expecting more diligent oversight on expenditures, the General Assembly demonstrated the potential influence of a more balanced system of representation. This it surn saved the individual tax payer possibly as much as

one hundred dollars a month in out of pocket tax expenses. These are dollars that individuals, rather than the government, can choose to spend on needs for themselves and their families

The General Fund Budget that extends from July 2000 through the end of June 2002, directs increases

end of June 2002, directs increases from all agencies that provide services to Kenuckians, gives significantly more dollars to local schools and universities than past budgets, and includes the entire list of about over 700 suggested community development projects spread throughouth et 120 Kenucky counties.

Though many issues combined to establish the results of the legislative agenda, some are of particular interest and importance. The Early clickhood Development program established in this Session under the Governor's direction is a compretional control of the control of the compression of the control of the co

euses on more than 257,000 children in the state under the age of six. To be funded with 25% of the Tobacco Settlement Phase I dollars, the program includes vision and hearing gram includes vision and screening, a statewide imm program, scholarships for child-care workers to upgrade training, a rating system for child-care facilities, and increased subsidies for low-income

Importantinitatives for those with mental health and developmental disabilities were addressed in several bils. Provisions were established that provide more information to patients of state owned facilities about any of state owned facilities about any vides more funding for assisted the state owned facilities about any office of the same for fifty or more and requires insurance companies to offer the same level of coverage for mental tilness and substance abuse as for physical illness and disease.

One of the last issues to be final-tiled in the Session was the Phase I Master Tobacco Settlement Agreement, HB 611. Kentucky is expected.

Kentucky is expected to receive more than three billion dollarsover the next twenty-five years through this agreement. Twenty-five percent of the funds are allocated for the Early Childhood Development Program. A second twenty-five per-cent is set aside for a Health Insur-ance Initiative that covers national ance Initiative that covers patient protection and establishes a High Risk pool for the individual market. Fifty percent of the settlement is desig nated for agriculture. Thirty-five percent of the agriculture allocation

is directed back to the local counties sed on a tobacco dependency for mula. The other sixty-five percent will be controlled by a statewide board with projects to be determined or their merit through grants in research marketing development and other projects deemed to strengthen the agriculture industry in the state. A provision to supplement a separate \$1.5 million fund that compensates farmers for lost tobacco quota from Phase II will be honored prior to the percentage calculations.

were less extensive than originally expected, but brought some relief from the reforms enacted in the 1996 Special Session. The legislation raises benefits by nearly seventy-five percent for a large majority of employees with permanent partial disabilities, while compensation insurance costs to employees with pern partial disabilities, while com on insurance costs to employers is only expected to raise about ten per-cent. Employers are aided through provisions in the budget that cut the tax paid by employers into the unem-ployment insurance fund by \$75 mil-

Session was legislation to combat adultilliteracy. The Adult Education adult-initeracy. The Adult Education and Literacy program received approval on the last day through the passage of SB 1 and is seen as an important investment in our people. The legislation established the goal of significantly improving opportunities for adult education in Ken-

nities for adult education in Kentucky.

Of the several proposals for Constitutional amendments to be presented to the voters in November, only two were passed. One would abolish the elected position of Railroad Commissioner, a position whose few remaining duties have been transferred to the Transportation Cabinet through a reorganization. The other amendment that will be presented for outers' consideration proposes a thirty voters' consideration proposes a thirty amendment that will be presented for voters' consideration proposes a thirty day General Assembly session fol-lowing the Organizational Session in odd numbered years. Passage of this amendment would remove the ne-cessity for the Governor to call so many special sessions and give law-makers greater oversight of financial and regulatory activity on behalf of

citizens.


