**INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL**

The Rockcastle County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 1 through May 15, 2000. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 2000 assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 2000 will be due about September 15, 2000.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse an may be inspected between the hours 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection period.

Any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property, after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The taxpayer can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a letter, or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.

The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period.

Any taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeals rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administrator.

- (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of his property.
- (2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Property Valuation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- (4) The final decision of the Revenue Cabinet may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

## County loses \$50,000 in state road funding

### May have to lay off workers

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court may have to make some tough decisions on Thursday (today) about the county's road department, after the state failed to make good on a \$50,000 payment.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotus told members of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court last week that he had been notified by the state that the county would not receive their last installment of \$50,000 from the state.

Carlotus said it had been at least twenty years since the state renegotiated a payment that was included in their road department budget and approved by the state.

Carlotus said the state said that one of the larger gas companies in the state had paid a tax on gasoline twice and that the state had had to pay it back to the gas company, creating the shortfall.

But third district magistrate Bill McKinney said it sounded to him like Governor Patton was still upset because he could not get his gas tax passed and he was simply showing the counties in the state who had the power in Frankfort.

"We use that money every year to make it through May and June and it is certainly going to put a hardship on the road fund," Carlotus said.

During Thursday's special meeting the court will decide what steps

to take to make sure the road fund ends the year in the black.

"We will no doubt have to use money from the general fund to get through until June 30 and we may even have to lay some workers off because of the state's action," Carlotus said.

"Laying off workers will be a last resort, but if you don't have money to pay them, you don't have any choice," he said.

This year's road fund budget was \$794,000.

The special meeting is scheduled for 9 a.m.

The Judge also announced this week that the county would receive funding from the state to fix a county road, that was heavily damaged during the reconstruction of Big Hill on U.S. 421.

Carlotus said the state had agreed to pay \$50,000 toward the repair of Burnt Ridge Road, because they had detoured heavy trucks across the road during the work on Big Hill.

"They really tore that road up and we are going to use that \$50,000 to blacktop Burnt Ridge Road as far as we can until we run out of money," the Judge said.

"We have to use that money on that project, because that is the only way the state would pay anything toward its repair," Carlotus said.

"We simply can't take that \$50,000 and replace the other \$50,000 the state shorted us," he said.

## Suit threatened over Oscar Isaacs roadway

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court may end up getting sued again over a county road.

A long running dispute over the Oscar Isaacs Road in the northern part of the county heightened last Thursday when Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotus and road department employees were confronted by landowner Denver O'Neil.

Carlotus said that he and county employees went to the road after he had received numerous complaints about obstructions being placed in the road, which is already very narrow and in bad condition.

Carlotus said that it was his understanding that Mr. O'Neil was the one who had built a concrete object the size of a filing cabinet in the roadway and that was also the one who had driven stakes into the pavement of the road along his property line.

Carlotus said the stakes were on the other side of the ditch line in the road bed.

Carlotus said that Mr. O'Neil told him that a recent survey showed his property line running out into the road and that he (not the county) owned that property.

On more than one occasion, other residents who live along the road

have attended fiscal court meetings asking the county to widen and maintain the road, which was accepted by the county eleven years ago.

After the meeting Commissioner Wilhite toured the community which included a visit to the industrial parks. He commended the improvements made to Rockcastle Industrial Park South.

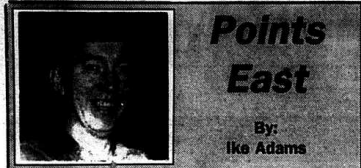
The Commissioner concluded his visit by meeting with the Board's Executive Committee.

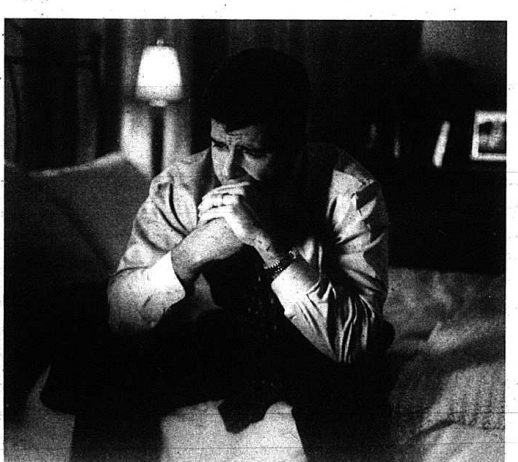

When children can see we value learning, they want to learn. You show you value learning when you:

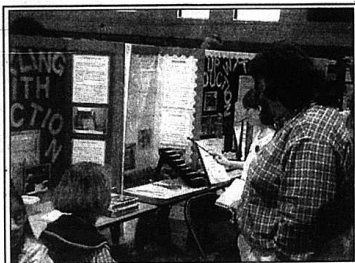
- Stop whatever else you may be doing and talk with children about what they're doing in school, what they like best, etc.

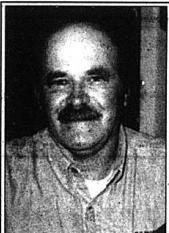

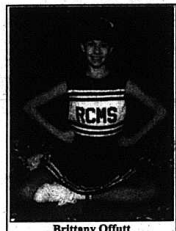

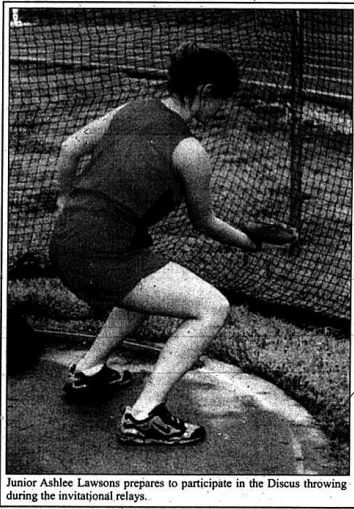
The 800-meter relay team of Cheyenne, Tara, Rachelle and Sheena ran a superb race and finished second with a season's best effort of 1:53.94.

Junior Greg Harper picked up his sixth win of the season in as many starts.

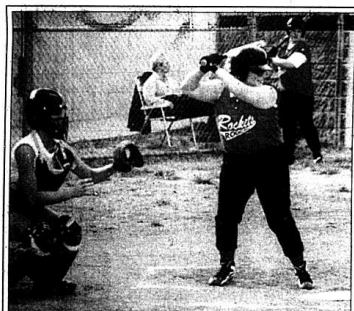
The Rocket ace struck out eleven Tigers and walked only one over the six innings he pitched.

Harper got help on the offensive side from third baseman Andrew Cash, short stop Derrick Bussell and second baseman Shea Taylor, all of whom homered in the contest.

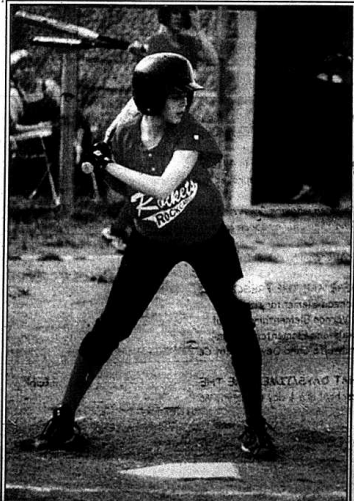

# REAP closes due to lack of funding

Rockcastle Emergency Assistance Program (REAP) has had to close the doors to the local food pantry due to a lack of funding, according to LuEd Nielsen, who has been coordinator of REAP for the past ten years.

REAP was founded in 1987 and has served thousands of local families with food, clothing, and other emergency assistance.

There is good news however, for local people who depend on a food or clothing bank from time to time. Volunteers at First Baptist Church

in Mt. Vernon and from throughout the county are in the process of opening their own food and clothing bank on Church Street in Mt. Vernon.

One of the coordinators Mrs. Kim Singleton said she hoped the mission would be open by June 1, but that it may be later in the summer.

The food and clothing bank will be in the building that use to be home to the Lambert law offices years ago.

The First Baptist Mission will be open at least three days a week, or when an emergency occurs and will be staffed totally by volunteers.

will be working with them and will continue to receive clothing. At this time the mission is not yet open.

We took care of all the people during that time the same way we have for several years. The applications are taken by Daniel Boone Development Council and processed, as they have a computer system.

There are records that must be kept so that we can apply for funds to operate. The food boxes were made up several times a week by my granddaughter (I could not lift and I was not allowed to do anything for several weeks, but we still came in to make up boxes) and the people were taken to REAP and given their food. We have not tried to handle clothing for some time as it is a lot of work and time consuming to sort, and throw away the bad clothing that we would get.

Rockcastle Emergency Assistance Program will stay in existence to continue with the issues of helping people with problems, and I will try to get grant money to carry this out. My office is in my home and I can be reached at 256-3217 in the evenings, or days at 256-1618. There are still many things to be done for me to retire.

The only funding that we have been receiving for REAP is \$50.00 a month, from a small church who has supported REAP for a long time. We received \$345.00 for Christmas. FEMA funding has been cut every year, and now is not practical to try to meet the many needs our people have with such a small amount of money. This year the money will go to Daniel Boone Development Council, to carry

on their programs. CAP has cut back on their grants, and we would not be eligible to apply anytime soon. For a number of years I donated our building, my appliances (all clothing was washed and dried) and freezers and refrigerators. It has reached the point that I can no longer donate my time. With the stroke that my husband suffered, and the death of our daughter, we are faced with raising several grandchildren and depend on child support and social security to live on. Believe me, it doesn't go far enough.

I want to thank Renfro Valley for the many years they have sponsored the "Love Trip" at Christmas. This has meant so much to the 50 children that we were able to help each Christmas. Thanks also to those who have supported us through the years. There are too many to mention, but you know who you are.

The building is now occupied by Daniel Boone Development and Ashlee's Homeless Shelter. I appreciate the help and support I have received from them in the past several years. I will miss working with all of the people who have needed assistance, but I am thankful that we were able to help during a critical time in their lives.

Fears of the last two years have become reality. Rockcastle Emergency Assistance Program has had to close the doors to the local food pantry due to lack of funding.

REAP was founded in 1987 and during this time thousands of local families have been fed, clothed, and offered other emergency assistance. Hundreds of thousands of meals have been given out to deserving families. Christmas has been a very special time for several hundred children and families each year, and I am deeply regretful that the food pantry will not be a part of helping the hungry.

Many people feel that the people we have helped are only single moth-

ers; one welfare, who don't want to better themselves; have a child every year to continue on welfare; are drug abusers; alcoholics; worthless; or other undesirable traits. SORRY, THIS IS NOT NECESSARILY SO. DO YOU REALIZE THAT YOU CAN BE HOMELESS IN THE BLINK OF EYE-OR HUNGRY VERY QUICKLY. Ask some of the people we have helped and listen to their story of why they are hungry, or why they are homeless.

I was informed one year ago that it was felt that we had not served the people during the time that I had to have back surgery and then three weeks later had to have heart surgery. The First Baptist Church decided that they would have a food bank and clothing closet. The Migrant Program

### Phase II Tobacco Payments

The Kentucky Tobacco Settlement Trust (Phase II) Board voted Tuesday to base the 2000 Phase II payment on the 1999 data base of active quota owners and growers. Farm Service Agency records of the quotas and marketings of the 1999 crop year will be used as the data base.

The 2000 distribution will be just like last year where the quota owner will receive 1/3 of the distribution funds, the growing farm receiving 1/3 and the owner/tenant also receiving 1/3 of the funds. Payment pounds for quota owners will be based on the 1999 basic quota, while payment pounds for growing farms and grower/tenants will be based on an average of 1999 marketings and effective quota. Although payment pounds will be lower than last year due to quota marketing cuts, the per-unit payment will be slightly higher resulting in total 2000 Phase II payments being equal to last year's \$114 million dollar distribution. State legislators transferred a portion of

the states Phase I monies to keep 2000 payments for farmers at last year's level.

Specific payment levels will be finalized once the 1999 marketing data are released. Details on the application process are also being finalized. When information is available, a countywide meeting will be held to assist owners, growers and tenants in completing applications correctly.

#### TOBACCO MEETING:

A Tobacco Outlook meeting will be hosted by the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association on Wednesday, May 3, at 7:00 pm at the London Community Center located on Main Street just south of the Laurel County Courthouse. This regional meeting will look at pool stocks, no net cost fund, cross county leasing, contracting and overall tobacco outlook. All farmers and spouses are invited to see what is going on with Rockcastle County's and Kentucky's most important cash crop.



### Young Farmers Win At State

State contests were recently held for the Kentucky State Young Farmers Organization. Rockcastle County YFA had three regional winners that continued on to compete in the state contest. Allen Hood, left, won first place in the State Dairy Production Contest, and Michael Brown, right, won first place in the State Burley Tobacco Production Contest. ## Antiques and Collectibles

Antiques can be an enjoyable and profitable investment if they are selected or purchased carefully. Defining an antique is sometimes a little confusing, however. A 1930 law probably led to the popular belief that an antique must be 100 years old.

Age is not the only qualifying factor for antique labeling. Historical or cultural significance is also considered when classifying an item as an antique. For example, autos that are 25 years old are eligible for 'special antique auto

registration plates.

Prices of both antiques and collectibles have soared as increasing numbers of people have started attending auctions and visiting flea markets. Many pieces that often were placed in the trash a few years ago are now restored. The best of these objects that have value for the collector because of their beauty, rarity or significance in popular culture. Other less valuable items are often collected because of a special interest or sentiment to the collector.

The monetary value of an object depends on the amount of money that someone is willing to pay for it. Both the investment and market price must be considered. Worth, on the other hand, relates to the importance or esteem in which the object is held. In addition to the dollar value of the object, worth includes the enjoyment, the memories and the family history attached to the object.

Here are some guidelines that will help you make good decisions on the value of antiques and collectibles:

1. Learn all you can about any item of particular interest. This is your best defense against fraud.
2. Make a continuous study of the kinds of antiques and collectible that are available at auctions, flea markets and other sales.
3. Note the collecting trends from year to year.
4. Note the use of Americana as a theme in current national advertising in the media and motion pictures. What trends seem to dominate?
5. Look at books on any American historic theme at your local library.

Do people seem to show more interest in specific areas?

6. Visit and study exhibits at antique shows; museum collections and historic homes.

7. Visit antique, second-hand and gift shops. Note carefully if a major portion of inventory is devoted to certain items. Keep in mind your means, your storage capacity and your lifestyle.

8. Buy the best you can afford, and avoid damaged or repaired pieces.

9. Study the available price guides, but keep in mind that the prices usually represent the highest prices paid for pieces that are in excellent condition.

10. After two or three years of collecting, try a "dry run" and arrange to sell your part of the investment, either through an auction gallery or directly through a dealer's table at a flea or antique mart.

Profits are, of course, subject to appropriate taxation.

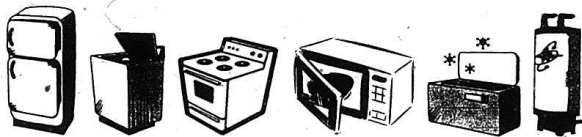

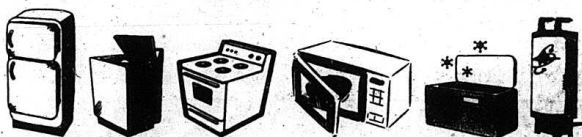

# Hale is first to win state essay contest

Josh Hale, a sophomore at Rockcastle County High School, and the son of Nancy and John Hale, was recently recognized by *The Courier-Journal* as Rockcastle County's first state Area 7, which covers 15 counties, winner in the 1999 Conservation Writing Contest. The writing contest, in its 56th year, is for sixth-through 12th graders. It is sponsored by *The Courier-Journal* in cooperation with the Kentucky Division of Conservation, the Kentucky Association of Soil Conservation Districts, Kentucky Farm Bureau Companies and the Kentucky Department of Education.

More than 107,000 students submitted written works or designed artwork for this year's Conservation Writing and the Jim Claypool Conservation Art contests. Schools sent their winning entries to district conversation offices for judging. After being selected as the Rockcastle County Conservation District's Writing Essay Winner, Josh's composition was sent on to the state level

where he has been recognized as one of nine state-wide Area winners. For composing the outstanding written piece in his Area in the Conservation and Writing Contest, Josh is the recipient of a plaque, a Certificate of Outstanding Merit and a \$150 U.S. Saving Bond from *The Courier-Journal*. He will also be featured as a winner of the contest in a special Young Achiever's section of *The Courier-Journal* scheduled to run on Sunday, May 14, 2000.

The following is the winning essay:

Soil Conservation: Ground for Kentucky's New Millennium  
As Kentucky prepares to enter the new millennium, we must do so with our eyes focused on the past, the present and the future. The theme, "Soil Conservation: Ground for Kentucky's New Millennium," requires us to see from where our soil has come, what we are doing with the soil today and how it will affect our lives in the future.  
In its simplest sense, soil conservation means saving the soil. This would be an extremely easy problem were it not for the fact that, while saving the soil, we have to use it. We must find a way to ensure its productivity for future years.

According to some scientists, we have not always had soil on the earth. Soil is the product of two processes: the decomposition of rock and the decay of plant and animal life. Volcanic action and the disintegration of large masses of rock left a blanket of mineral material over most of the earth. These mineral particles mixed with organic materials accumulated from dead plants, roots and decomposing animals. The few inches of productive topsoil on which agriculture depends today required thousands of years for development.

Although soil covers our land in an almost continuous blanket, it differs in how it is used by man in each region and on each farm. For many years, soil was associated with the lowly position of the farmers who tilled it and was not considered worthy of study or conservation. Most people had the opinion that the soil had always been there, and always would be in existence. Perhaps, that opinion would have become fact had it not been for man. Soil depletion and erosion began to take their toll during the early days of our nation's settlement. Most of the colonists, who came here, came from countries where the rain fell gently. They did not know how to handle soil in the North American climate. They began cutting down the forests along the eastern coast, building their homes, clearing fields to plant crops, and plowing more land to grow food for the increasing population.

A few "old" farmers began to notice a change in the soil after many years. At first, the soil had been so dark that it was almost black but it was becoming lighter in color. When heavy rains came, the loose soil mixed with the water and flowed down the hills, carrying away the topsoil or

rich soil. By 1775, rivers that once ran clear were described by writers as being "black with mud." The older farmers expressed their concerns but, for the most part, their words fell on deaf ears.

Slowly, the soil's condition became a matter of great concern to some of our early leaders. Patrick Henry is credited with saying, "He is the greatest patriot who fills the most gullies." George Washington, as a farmer, continually sought to conserve his land and prevent erosion. In his 1796 final message to Congress, he urged the legislators to form a board of agriculture. Congress did not recognize the need. (It would be over sixty years before the United States Department of Agriculture would be created during President Lincoln's administration.) Thomas Jefferson was another who was constantly looking for ways to improve his soil's production. He introduced a system of horizontal plowing that was the forerunner of contouring. However, people simply were not concerned about soil damage because there was so much virgin land. They failed to look to the past or the future, only using the present soil.

Early in the 20th Century, President Theodore Roosevelt called for the first conference to consider conservation of our natural resources.

Hugh Hammond Bennett, the "Father of Soil Conservation," and a soil surveyor in the 1920s, was constantly calling attention to what he termed "the serious erosion" he found while surveying. Bennett and others involved in the soil conservation movement were blessed with the gift of soil hindsight and foresight. They tried to arouse interest in a corrective program. Their movement was given a big push in 1933 when the soil erosion service was set up in the department of the interior. Bennett was made chief of the first erosion control agency. He went on to find out what was known in 1941 as the Soil Conservation Society of America. We, today, owe much to these early pioneers of soil conservation. We must follow their example - looking to the past, using soil for the present, while saving it for the future.

In my home county of Rockcastle, we are diverse users of the soil. Primarily, we are farmers and loggers. I believe that these two groups must join together in the fight to save our soil, thus saving their own livelihoods. Much of Rockcastle's agriculture land and forests have been destroyed in the name of development. It is a horrible feeling to see a beautiful field that once produced

crops to be turned into a trailer park or simply to be left bare.

I feel that one of the best pieces of legislation to come from the Kentucky General Assembly was the establishment of the PACE (Purchase of Agricultural Conservation Easement) Corporation in 1994. It ensures that "lands currently in agricultural use will continue to remain available for agriculture and not be converted to other uses." The PACE Corporation is a result of looking at the past, the present and the future.

If we are to continue to use our soil, which we must do in order to live, it is necessary that we learn to prepare for the future use of this most precious resource. We must listen to the warnings of the colonial farmers, H.H. Bennett and others. Even the writer of Ecclesiastes (3:20) recognized the importance of our soil, its

past, present and future "... all come from dust, and to dust all return."

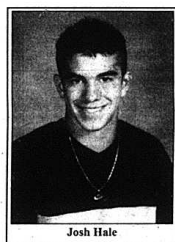

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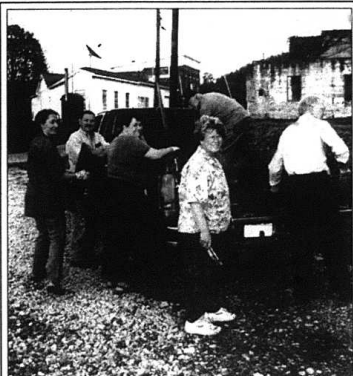
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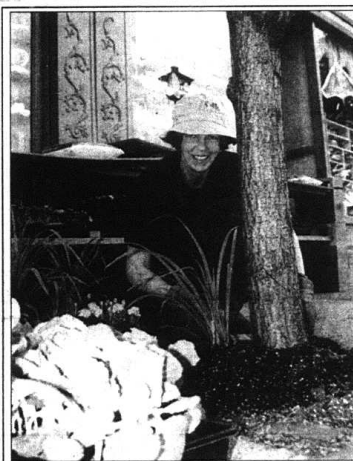

## Baseball Is Only a Game

Thousands of young people are currently preparing for T-ball, coaches' pitch, little league, Babe Ruth league, softball and other forms of the national pastime. Men and women will be giving a tremendous number of volunteer hours over the next months working as coaches, umpires, ticket and concession salespersons and league officials. Without them these baseball leagues could not exist. To the workers I say, "Thank you."

Baseball can be both fun and a learning experience for young people. New skills and added self-confidence can be acquired. Why then does baseball sometimes turn into a destructive experience for children that lowers their self-esteem and makes them afraid to try anything new?

We parents and coaches are to blame for that. Something happens when we get to the ballpark that turns us from loving parents into raving lunatics who yell insults at our children and embarrass ourselves and them. Maybe we are reliving our childhoods through Junior. Maybe we don't want to be embarrassed by

our children. Maybe we coaches get our own egos involved and don't want to be known as a "losing" coach. Whatever the reason the verbal abuse needs to stop because we are demanding our young people.

I remember when one little league coach shouted at the third baseman (who was 10), "Get your head in the game! Don't make a stupid play like that!" The player had thrown the ball into right field instead of to second base as he intended. The coach seemed not to understand how a ten-year-old could make that kind of mistake.

Not long afterward I was watching an Atlanta Braves game when Terry Pendleton, the Atlanta third baseman, threw a certain double-play into right field. (He missed the second baseman by a wider margin than did the ten-year-old last year.) Terry Pendleton was paid several million a year and was one of the better third basemen in the National League. If he made mistakes like that, why do we expect that our children will not?

We treat our children as if they should never make a mistake on the baseball field. We shout at our chil-

dren for the very same mistakes that major league ballplayers make. Major leaguers throw the ball away, strike out with the bases loaded, and walk in the winning run in the bottom of the ninth, but we expect our children not to do that.

I propose that this year we parents and coaches promise not to shout negative criticism at any player. This is simply common courtesy and treating those young people with respect. (The manager did not shout at Terry Pendleton when he threw that ball into the outfield.) If we have some corrective criticism to offer, we can do that one-on-one at a later time when the player will not be so embarrassed. (Have you noticed that the higher up one goes in baseball, the less the coaches scream at the players?)

I propose that this year we parents and coaches shout only positive words to our children. "Way to go," "nice catch," "good try," "you can do it," will help them more than will verbal abuse.

One writer suggested that parents should be banned from all little league baseball games. Perhaps it will not come to that if we treat our children with respect.

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## Ford honored as "Taxpayers Best Friend"

State Representative Danny Ford has been named the "Taxpayers' Best Friend" by the Kentucky Taxpayers Union (KTU) organization for his commitment to making state government more accountable to taxpayers.

The award was presented by KTU Chairman Rand Paul during an April 12 award ceremony in front of the Kentucky State Capitol Building in Frankfort. Ford was among only 22 House members honored by the organization, a non-partisan citizen watchdog group formed in 1993 to provide Kentuckians throughout the state with current information on how their elected officials vote on tax increases. An affiliate of the National Taxpayers Union, the Kentucky organization researches the voting records of state lawmakers on key spending and taxation issues and recognizes lawmakers based on that analysis.

After a speech in which he described the award recipients as "Heroes of the General Assembly," Paul recognized each recipient with a certificate. The award Representative Ford said is one that holds special meaning for members of the General Assembly who complete the 2000 Regular Session.

"It truly is a great honor to receive this award, especially with the tremendous emphasis we've placed on providing Kentuckians with the services they deserve without supplementing the Governor's tax package. There isn't one good reason that state government can't be run as efficiently as we expect the men and women of the state to run their family budgets," Ford said.

Ford, who received a 95 percent approval rating from the organiza-

tion, has represented the people of the state's 80th District since 1982, remaining adamant in his stand against unnecessary taxes.

"One of my top priorities and

obligations is to see that each vote I cast is in the best interest of our area, that includes keeping big spending bureaucracy out of the taxpayers pocket," Ford added.



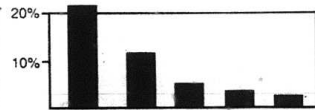
State Representative Danny Ford
