The <u>Rockcastle</u> County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May i through May 15, 2000. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 2000 assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 2000 will be due about September 15, 2000.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse an may be inspected between the hours  $\frac{8:00 \text{ a.m.}}{\text{a.m.}}$  and  $\frac{4:00 \text{ p.m.}}{\text{c.m.}}$ 

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first reques with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection p Any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property, after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The taxpayer can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a letter of other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.

The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period.

Any taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeals rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.



## **County loses** \$50,000 in state road funding

Carloftis said it had been at least twenty years since the state reneged on a payment that was included in their road department budget and approved by the state.

Carloftis said the state said that one of the larger gas companies in the state had paid a tax on gasoline twice and that the state had had to pay it back to the gas company, creating

It dack to the gas company, cleaning but shortfall.

McKinney said it sounded to him like,Governor Patton was still upset because he could not get his gas tax passed and he was simply showing the counties in the state who had the power in Frankfort.

"We use that money every year tomake it through May and June and it is certainly going to put a hardship on the road fund," Carloftis said. . During Hunrsday's special meet-ing the court will decide what steps

ends the year in the black.
"We will no doubt have to use we will no doubt nave to use money from the general fund to get through until June 30 and we may even have to lay some workers off because of the state's action," Carloftis said.

occaios of the state's action, "Laying off workers will be a last resort, but if you don't have money to pay them, you don't have any choice," he said. This year's road fund budget was 574,000. The special meeting is scheduled

The Judge also announced this week that the county would receive funding from the state to fix a county road, that was heavily damaged during the reconstruction of Big Hill on 115.421 ing the red U.S. 421.

Carloftis said the state had agreed to pay 55,000 at the state thad agreed to pay 55,000 toward the repair of Burnt Ridge Road, because they had decoured heavy trucks across the road during the work on Big Hill.

"They really tore that road up and we are going to use that 550,000 in blacktop Burnt Ridge Road as far as we can until we run out of money," the Judge said.

"We have to use that money on that project, because that is the only way the state would pay anything toward its repair, Carloftis said.

"We simply can't take that \$50,000 and replace other other \$50,000 the state shorted us," he said.

Many peopie teet that the people we have helpdare only single mothers; one welfare, who don't want to better themselves; have a child every year to continue on welfare; are drug abusers; alcoholics; worthless; or other undesirable traits. SORRY, SO. DO YOU REALIZE THAT YOU CAN BE HOMELESS IN THE BLINK OF EYE-OR HUNGRY VERY QUICKLY. Ask some of the people we have helpdan distent to their story of why they are hungry, or why they are homeless. I was informed one year ago that it was felt that we had not served the people during the time that I had to have beat surgery. The First Baptist Church decided that they would have a food bank and clothing closet. The Migrant Program

in Mt. Vermon and from throughout the county are in the process of opening their own food and clothing bank on Church Street in Mt. Vermon.

"If they are put back they will be removed - and if they want to bring suit they can go right ahead, that is a county road and we are going to treat it as such," Carloftis said.



According to some scientists, we have not always had soil on the earth. Soil is the product of two processes; the decomposition of rock and the, decay of plant and animal life. Volocanic action and the disintegralmoof large masses of rock left a blanket of linear lameterial over most lower of the surface of the earth known as the regolith. These mineral particles mixed with organic materials accumulated from deap plants; roots and decomposing animals. The few inches of productive toposil on which aerioccomposing animais. Increwinches of productive topsoil on which agri-culture depends today required thou-sands of years for development. Although soil covers our land in an almost continuous blanket, it dif-

fers in how it is used by man in each region and on each farm. For many region and on each farm. For many years, soil was associated with the lowly position of the farmers who tilled it and was not considered worthy of study or conservation. Most people had the opinion that the soil had always been here and, always would be in existence. Perhaps, that opinion would have become fact had it not been for man. Soil depletion and erosion began to take their toil during the early days of our nation's settlement. Most of the colonists, who settlement. Most of the colonists, who settlement. Most of the colonists, who came here, came from countries where the rain fell gently. They did not know how to handle soil in the North American climate. They began cutting down the forests along the eastern coast, building their homes, clearing fields to plant crops, and plowing more land to grow food for the increasing population.

A few "old" farmers began to notice a change in the soil after many years. At first, the soil had been so durk that it was almost black but it was becoming lighter in color. When heavy rains come, the loose soil mixed with the water and flowed down the

with the water and flo owed down the hills, carrying away the topsoil or

In his 1796 final message to Congress, he urged the legislators to form a board of agriculture. Congress did not recognize the need. (It would be over sixty years before the United States Department of Agriculture would be created during President Lincoln's administration.) Thomas Jefferson was another who was constantly looking for ways to improve his soil's production. He introduced a system of horizontal plowing that would be the forerunner of contouring. ing. However, people simply were not concerned about soil damage because there was so much virgi land. They failed to look to the past of e future, only using the present soil Early in the 20th Century, Presi

odore Roosevelt called for the first conference to consider con

the first conference to consider con-servation of our natural resources.
Hugh Hammond Bennett, the "Father of Soil Concervation," and a soil surveyor in the 1920s, was con-stantly calling attention to what the termed "the serious cerosion" he found while surveying. Bennett and others involved in the soil conservation movement were blessed with the glift of soil hindsight and foresight. They tried to arouse interest in a corrective program. Their movement was given a big push in 1933 when the soil crossion service was set up in the de-partment of the interior: Bennett was made chief of the first erosion control made chief of the first erosion control agency. He went on to find out what was known in 1941 as the Soil Con-servation Society of America. We, today, owe much to these early pioneers of soil conservation. We must

One writer suggested that parents should be banned from all little league baseball games. Perhaps it will not come to that if we treat our children

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

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
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
