## Safe Bedding for Children

As many as 900 baby deaths each year attributed to Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) may actually be caused by suffocation in soft bedding, such as quilts, comforters, pillows and sheepskins.

Many major retailers are making changes to crib displays in retail stores, catalogs, advertisements and websites. Beginning this Spring, shoppers will see far fewer cribs made up with pillows, quilts and comforters. Many retailers will be including cautionary statements about the use of soft bedding for younger babies in their catalogs, on signs attached to cribs, and on inserts that accompany baby comforters and quilts. When babies are featured in crib ads, they will be pictured sleeping on their backs. Other retailers are going to create bedding - safety brochures for customers and add quilt racks to their nursery product lines.

For babies under 12 months, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the National Institute of Child

Health and Human Development, and the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission recommend the following to help reduce the risk of SIDS:

- Place baby on his/her back on a firm, tight-fitting mattress in a crib that meets current safety standards.
- Remove pillows, quilts, comforters, sheepskins, pillow-like stuffed toys and other pillow-like soft products from the crib.
- Consider using a sleeper as an alternative to blankets with no other covering.
- If using a blanket, put baby with his or her feet at the foot of the crib. Tuck a thin blanket around the crib mattress, only as far as the baby's chest.
- Make sure your baby's head remains uncovered during sleep.
- Do not place baby on a waterbed, sofa, soft mattress, pillow or other soft surface to sleep.

Instructors in the Kentucky Master Logger Program are busy trying to insure there are enough trained personnel available to properly operate under the new guidelines. Approximately 3000 loggers have already passed the training program and 500 additional requests for training have been made. Those who will be taking the training this fall will be issued a letter signifying their intent to complete their training later this year. That letter should be carried with them until they graduate from the program. It is extremely important to understand that they still could be cited for improper harvesting practices if best management practices are not used.

Although the new laws are directed towards loggers, the landowner should allow the logger to complete the best management practices required to harvest timber on that specific site.

It is critical for landowners to know that they will be held responsible for any water pollution problems. One of the quickest ways to get into trouble is to not allow the master loggers to implement the appropriate BMP's.

Landowners are urged to take three important steps to insure their timber is correctly harvested:

1. Contact a professional forester to help with the timber sale.
2. Make sure the logger chosen is a Kentucky Master Logger graduate.
3. Urge and support the logger to use the correct BMP's for their site.

The workshops teach safety and management techniques that protect the logger, the young trees left for future forests and the entire forest environment.

It is estimated that about 75 percent of all the timber being harvested in the state is cut by loggers who have gone through the three-day training course. The plan is to have all of them trained within a reasonable amount of time.

The program is a partnership among the University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service, the Kentucky Division of Forestry, the Kentucky forest Industries Association and is supported by the Kentucky Division of Water. It stresses variety of best management practices that are basically common sense measures used to reduce water pollution and protect the soil from eroding. These practices include leaving some trees around streams, installing water bars

on roads and log beds, and keeping tree tops out of streams.

Recent landowner surveys suggest that hiring a trained logger pays off. Landowners had an 80 percent approval rating for work done by master loggers while the approval rating dropped to about 40 percent for untrained harvesters.

Good quality timber can be produced and the water kept clean, but it will take a concerted effort between landowners and trained loggers to insure that our environment is protected.

## Livingston officer pleads guilty to drunk driving

Livingston police officer Danny Keeney pled guilty in Pulaski County District Court last Friday to a charge of driving under the influence, first offense.

According to court records, Keeney was involved in a non-injury accident in Pulaski County in October of 1998 and when police arrived on the scene they smelled alcohol and asked Keeney to take a field sobriety test, which he failed. Keeney was then given a breathalyzer that showed a reading of .202, twice the legal limit in Kentucky.

District Judge Michael Henry fined Keeney \$200 and court costs and gave him credit for time served. Under state law his license has been suspended for ninety days. Keeney, who was off duty at the time of his arrest was employed as a Burnside city police officer at the time.

Livingston Mayor Sandra Tyree could not be reached for comment, but a 911 dispatcher said Keeney told dispatch that he was currently on medical leave.

## Two different teachers elected to RCHS council

The first site based council election in the county produced some changes for the council at Rockcastle County High School.

On Tuesday certified staff at RCHS held their annual election with three seats on the council up for grabs.

History teacher Adam Coleman was re-elected to the council, but the two other incumbents, English teacher Jennifer Mattingly and Librarian Janet Wells were defeated by Business teacher Connie Riddle and Special Education teacher Dana Singleton.

Parents of students at the high school will elect the two parent members on Tuesday May 16. The deadline for parent nominations is Monday May 8. Elections at the Rockcastle Middle School are Monday May 8 as are the parent elections at Mt. Vernon. The teacher election is Wednesday May 10 at Mt. Vernon. Both the teachers and parent elections at Brodhead and Roundstone will be held Thursday May 18.

## Work release inmate arrested in McCreary

A work release prisoner who walked away from a work detail at the state highway garage a couple of weeks ago has been returned to the Rockcastle County Detention Center.

John B. Mayfield, 37, of Somerset was arrested by McCreary County Sheriff's deputies at the home of his girlfriend last Tuesday, according to Rockcastle County Jailor James Miller.

Miller said he would seek an indictment for escape against Mayfield, who is facing another one to five years in jail. The jailer said that any time an inmate walks away from a work detail, they are taken off the detail and held in lock down. Currently over ten prisoners work on a daily basis with county and state work crews and are available to work with other non-profit organizations.

## Fiscal Court votes to sue over Oscar Isaacs Road

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court voted Thursday to file suit against a northern Rockcastle County landowner, who they have been involved in a dispute with for a couple years over a county road.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlolifis said he thought he had done everything possible to settle the dispute with landowner Denver O'Neil involving the Oscar Isaacs Road.

Last week Carlolifis and members of the county road department removed stakes and a concrete structure from the Oscar Isaacs Road. Carlolifis said the stakes and structure were placed in the roadway by O'Neil. Carlolifis said that his property line ran into the county road and that it was his right to put up the stakes and structure.

Thursday during the special meeting Carlolifis told the court that the Oscar Isaacs road had been a county road for eleven years and that he thought the county should seek an injunction against Isaacs because of his actions on the road.

Last week Carlolifis said that O'Neil threatened to sue the county over the road and that by the county bringing suit, the disagreement could be settled once and for all. Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette said he would have the suit ready to file in a few days.

## Probation revoked for two Rockcastle County men

Acting Commonwealth Attorney Eddy F. Montgomery announced Tuesday that the probation of Darrell Blackburn, 35, of Mt. Vernon and Tommy Wilson, 54, of Conway Road, Berna, was revoked in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

According to Montgomery, Blackburn was sentenced on February 19, 1996 to a period of two years imprisonment with the sentence being probated for five years for the offenses of trafficking in marijuana and two counts of trafficking in a controlled substance, after Blackburn admitted to selling illegal drugs to a confidential informant.

During the hearing Blackburn admitted to taking illegal drugs, failing to attend GED classes, failing to keep a full time job, failing to pay probation supervision fees and getting a DUI. Blackburn was ordered to serve his original sentence of two years imprisonment.

Montgomery said that Wilson, who also had been sentenced to two years and probated for five for cultivating marijuana over five plants had tested positive for two different controlled substances on five different occasions. He had also left his area of supervision. Wilson's full two year sentence was imposed.

## Brodhead man pleads to possession of marijuana

A Brodhead man pled guilty Tuesday in Rockcastle District Court to possession of marijuana under eight ounces.

Robert LaFavers, 21, of Castle Village Apartments, Brodhead, had been charged with trafficking in marijuana by Brodhead Police Chief, after a juvenile, who also lives at Castle Village told his parents he had gotten the drugs from LaFavers.

District Judge Mike Henry sentenced LaFavers to six months in jail, but probated for two years on the condition that LaFavers stay away from the juvenile and that he maintain good behavior.

## Appliance Collection project nets over 800 items during first days

If you've got an old stove, refrigerator, air conditioner, water heater, stove or other large appliances, now would be a good time to get rid of it.

The Rockcastle County Conservation District, the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court and the folks at Mt. Vernon Scrap Yard is sponsoring a white goods collection this week at the local scrap yard.

As of noon on Wednesday, well over 800 appliances had been brought into the scrap yard for disposal.

"We are averaging two tractor trailer loads a day of these old appliances," said Mt. Vernon Scrap owner Gary Miracle.  
They are actually working us to death, it has been a steady flow for the past two days," said Gary Miracle, Jr.

Mt. Vernon Scrap buys old appliances anyway and they are paying what they normally would, which is \$20 a ton, plus the Soil Conservation District is paying the extra \$5.00.

All total the Soil Conservation District has \$10,000 to spend on the project.

District Conservation Clerk Sandy Whitaker said her office wrote a grant proposal for \$10,000, which is funded through the state's Division of Conservation.

And the Rockcastle Fiscal Court had to make a contribution of \$2,500 before the grant could be approved.

"That \$2,500 is money well spent," said Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlolifis.

"We (the fiscal court) are making an all out effort to clean up the illegal dumps in the county and it is my understanding that many of the appliances being brought in are being picked up at illegal dumps," he said.

neighbors, safety and security are prime considerations during Census 2000. Census takers undergo security screenings.

"Our goal is to hire and train local people who are committed to a successful count in their neighborhoods," said Local Census Manager Tommy Faulkner. "They are hired, in part, because they know our streets and neighborhoods. They speak our language and are familiar with our culture."

Data gathered from questionnaires already processed through the mail-back campaign and earlier interviews will be supplemented by employees of the Corbin Census Office.

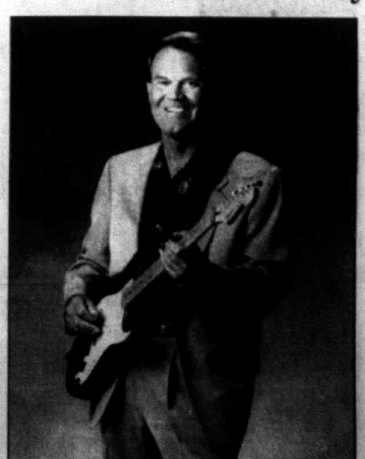

## Our Readers Write

Dear Editor,

I do not know what I attended high school, general science perhaps over 40 years ago. I believe I was taught that when electricity flows through O<sub>2</sub> oxygen gas in the atmosphere, that the O<sub>2</sub> oxygen gas is changed into O<sub>3</sub>, ozone. Decatur, was located in the center of the state known as the "Great Plains." I remember the trip as being an endless expanse of fields of corn and what I later found out was soybeans. This was before my days on the farm and I didn't know, nor cared to learned, the difference of what was growing on these miles and miles of green fields surrounding us. My real interest, if I remember correctly, was what wasnt the end of these turning miles of endless flat land with nearly a tree in sight.

Had never seen the mid west before and I like the fellow I was told about who was making his first trip east and when saw the mountains in the distance thought they were storm clouds and they had better run for cover. So I, also was fooled by the vastness and thought the vision ahead must surely be the ocean. That country was FLAT.

By evnitude though, the scene changed and we were in the beautiful city of Decatur. The streets were wide and one could see all the way through town till the far side vanished into the night. Yes, I missed the mountains, you see, Cincinnati was built on seven hills and before living there I lived in the foothills of the Allegheny Mountains. So being able to see for miles without the obstruction of a tree covered hillside took some getting used to. But I quickly fell in love with it. I was greeted at church as one of the new pastors family and soon

had an active part in it. I was one of the group of young people dedicated to living for Christ but enjoying life to its fullest while doing so. This was during the depression, but the lack of money didn't interfere with our activities. Many times we stress what money can do and forget the joy of doing things that don't require it. This was an active church with a well mixed congregation and something was always going on. The one occasion I remember so vividly was May Day. For the young people were busy getting things ready for the big celebration that took place on the first day of May. Finally the day arrived and the excitement began at a half a mile from town that was used for this special day. We would leave town just before daybreak and arrive in time to climb the hill and see the sun rise as it appeared on the horizon. The leader, an older brother to two of the girls I buddied with, had left earlier and was already there with a fire ball and the smell of bacon and coffee filled the clear morning air.

When we reached our destination and I saw the hill we were to climb and everyone was so proud of I couldn't believe they really called this a hill. To me it was a few feet high rise of ground with small trees scattered about that gave it the appearance of height. But to them it was a hill worthy of climbing to its top and celebrating May Day with a breakfast cooked on an open fire and songs in praise from the mouths of young people floating over the fields before me. This was my first and last celebration of May Day in Illinois where young people stood at the top of their world and greeted the sun as it arose with a song of praise. But it was one I remembered as one of my happiest days in Decatur, Illinois.

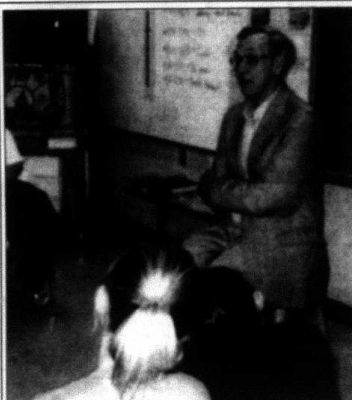

# Museum exhibit honors Rockcastle Co. woman

A new exhibit at the Wings Over the Rockies Air and Space Museum titled, "Dressed for Duty: America's Women in Uniform," was opened on March 24, 2000 in Denver, Colorado.

It features a large collection of women's uniforms and memorabilia from the Civil War through Operation Desert Storm. The collection is dedicated to the memory of Virginia Mason Ponder, of Mt. Vernon, who served in the US Navy W.A.V.E.S. during World War II. She is the daughter of the late Henry and Jamie Mason and the mother of Lyman T. Ponder, Jr. of Richmond and June Ponder Mitchell of Midway, Ky. Her husband, the late Lyman T. Ponder, served in the Army Air Corps during the war.

The collection is owned by Jill Halcomb Smith, niece of Virginia Mason Ponder. Mrs. Smith, a professional international uniform historian, has just completed her sixth book, "Dressed for Duty: America's Women in Uniform, 1898-1973," which was the impetus for the exhibit. The book is also dedicated to Virginia Mason Ponder.

Speakers at the grand opening were Brig. Gen. Wilma Vaught, USAF (ret.), president of the Women in Military Service for America Memorial in Arlington, VA; Marta Bohn-Meyer, SR-71 "Blackbird" pilot and NASA director; Emily Howell Warner, the first American woman to be hired as a commercial pilot and new inductee to the Colorado Avia-

tion Hall of Fame; and Jill Halcomb Smith. Masters of Ceremony were Ed Green and Kim Christiansen of KUSA Channel 9 in Denver.

The opening was attended by Smith's husband, TSgt. Jeffrey N. Smith, USAF, Floyd and Lucille Mason Halcomb of Somerset, sister of Virginia Mason Ponder, and Marlin and June Ponder Mitchell, daughter of Virginia Ponder, of Midway and former Waves, Wasps, Wacs, WaFs, USMC Women's Reservists, Army and Navy nurses and Red Cross members. Veterans attending represented women's service in World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm and active duty members of the armed forces.

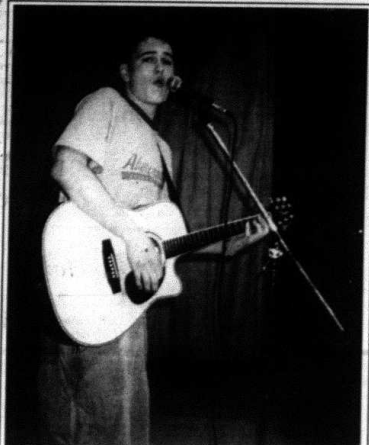

The Rockcastle County Rockets made it back into the top twenty-five last week, and went on to win two of three games against other teams ranked in the top twenty-five.

After being rained out on Monday and Tuesday, and being off Wednesday and Thursday, the Rockets finally took the field against Pulaski County in Somerset on Friday night.

The Maroons were ranked 12th in the state, but Rocket ace Greg Harper shut down the Maroons hold-

ing them to only one run on three hits. He also struck out two and walked five.

The Rocket defense also turned in probably their best performance of the year, committing no errors in the seven inning contest.

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# Girls' track team ranked fourth in state

The RCHS girls' track and field team is currently ranked fourth in the state in the latest Kentucky Track and Cross-Country Coaches Association Class 2A rankings. The girls are ranked only behind Bowling Green, Western Hills, and Fort Campbell. The girls' team defeated the top two teams, Bowling Green and Western Hills, in this season's indoor state championships. The girls also defeated fifth ranked Russell, last year's state champions, by 40 points recently at the Lincoln County Invitational. This is the third week of state rankings. The girls were ranked fifth after week one, seventh after week two, and moved up to fourth the third week. The girls have beaten 14 teams ranked in the top twenty in their respective classes.

Several members of the girls' track team are ranked in the top ten individually, and as part of relay teams. Those individuals include: Cheyenne Carmack - 1st - 400 meter dash, 3rd - 200 meter dash, 7th - 100 meter dash; Clarissa Hubbard - 2nd - shot put, 3rd - discus; Rachelle Hammond - 7th - long jump, 8th - triple jump, 9th - 400 meter dash; Tara Abney - 8th - 100 meter hurdles, 9th - 300 meter hurdles; Sheena Swinney - 8th - 200 meter dash; Mandy Bullock - 5th - high jump; Heather Hammond - 5th - high jump; 400 meter relay (Cheyenne, Tara, Theresa, Sheena) - 5th; 800 meter relay (Cheyenne, Tara, Rachelle Sheena) - 6th; 1600 meter relay (Cheyenne, Tara, Rachelle, Sheena) - 4th.

The past two meets for the girls have a good indication of exactly why they are ranked so high. At the 24th Annual Lake Cumberland Classic in Somerset, the RCHS girls'

team dominated their fourth meet in a row, placing first overall out of 26 teams. They defeated runner-up and last year's regional champion Boyle Co. by 10.5 points, despite the absence of four key RCHS team members. The girls have now defeated 60 teams in four meets for an impressive overall record of 60-0.

Rachelle Hammond had a great meet and placed first in the long jump and triple jump competitions. In long jump, Rachelle won with an impressive effort of 15'3". In triple jump, she leaped a Lake Cumberland Classic record and season's best 32'4" for the win. She broke the previous triple jump meet record by over 1'5". Rachelle also performed well in the 400 meter dash placing third overall with an impressive time of 1:06.2.

Clarissa Hubbard continued her domination of the shot put event. She placed first overall with an awesome throw of 33'8.5". Clarissa also threw well in the discus competition and placed third overall with a season's best throw of 101'4". Teammate Ashley Lawson threw well in both events. She placed 10th in discus with a throw of 72'10". In shot put Ashley performed well and placed 14th overall with an effort of 24'7.5". Cheyenne Carmack dominated the sprints and was Rockcastle's leading scorer in the meet. She ran a great 100-meter dash and placed first overall in 13.7. In the 400-meter dash, Cheyenne easily finished first with an impressive time of 1:01.4, nearly three seconds faster than her nearest competition. In the 200-meter dash, Cheyenne ran very well and finished second with a season's best time of 27.7.

Tara Abney continued her excellence in the hurdles. She placed first overall in the 100-meter hurdles with an exceptional time of 18.0. In the 300-meter hurdles, Tara finished third with an impressive time of 53.3.

Theresa Chishum also ran well in the hurdles. She finished fourth in the 100-meter hurdles with a time of 18.6. In the 300-meter hurdles, Theresa ran very well and finished sixth in 55.7. Theresa also performed well in triple jump finishing with a personal best effort of 26'4".

Sheena Swinney ran very well despite a terrible fall in the 100-meter dash. Sheena stepped in a wet spot on the track and fell very hard. Despite being injured with scrapes and bruises, Sheena managed to run the remainder of her races and turned in many outstanding performances. She placed fifth in the 200-meter dash with an excellent effort and time of 28.8.

Sixth grader Jessica Asher ran very well in the 800-meter run and finished 12th in 2:53, the best RCHS time in three years. Sixth grader teammate Kayla Hayes also ran well finishing 25th in 3:03.3.

In the 1600-meter run, sixth grader Mourine Ramsey ran very well and finished 17th overall with a personal best time of 4:43. She also ran a great 3200-meter race finishing ninth overall with another personal record time of 15:20.4.

The team of Cheyenne Carmack, Tara Abney, Rachelle Hammond and Sheena Swinney placed well in the 1600-meter relay with an awesome race and a season's best performance of 4:25.6.

The 800-meter relay team of Tara, Johna Abney, Casey Taylor and Sheena ran an awesome race and placed third overall with a time of 1:58.0.

The 400-meter relay team of Theresa, Johna, Casey and Kayla Hayes ran very well and finished 10th overall in 57.6.

The 3200-meter relay team of Jessica Asher, Kayla Hayes, Makaylah Bryant and Mourine Ramsey ran very well and finished 13th in 12:45.7. The boys' team performed well and placed 19th out of a stellar field of 26 teams.

Senior Dustin Crawford had a great meet. In the 100-meter dash, Dustin finished sixth overall with an excellent time of 12.1, just one-sixth off of his season's best time. In the 200-meter dash, Dustin ran an outstanding race and finished fifth overall with a season and career best time of 24.4.

Junior Josh Hale battled injuries the entire meet, but still managed to perform exceptionally well. In the 100-meter dash, Josh placed 10th with an exceptional season's best time of 12.4. Josh also ran very well in the 200-meter dash and finished 12th in 25.5.

Junior Eric Denney performed well in shot put and discus. In shot put, Eric threw exceptionally well and placed 14th overall with an impressive effort of 36'5.5". In discus, Eric threw an amazing 114'10" and finished eighth overall.

In the 400-meter dash, senior Stewart Abney ran a great race and finished 18th overall with a time of 1:00.9. Junior Saptien Hopkins also ran a great race and finished 26th overall with a time of 1:04.6.

The rest of the meet was contested by middle school athletes who did their best to compete against the much older, stronger high school competitors.

In the high jump competition, eighth grader Steven Shackelford performed well and placed 17th with an effort of 4'6". Eighth grade teammate Elijah Lunsford also leaped 4'6" and placed 19th.

In the 800-meter run, seventh grader Brandon Cole performed ex-

ceptionally well and placed 24th overall in 2:47. Seventh grade teammate Matthew Whittaker was not far behind, finishing 26th in 2:49. Both boys also ran well in the 1600-meter run. Matthew eclipsed the six minute barrier with an awesome effort of 5:59 for a 23rd place finish. Brandon was very close behind with a time of 6:02 and a 24th place finish.

Steven Shackelford competed in long jump and continues to show a great deal of promise. Steven leaped 13'6" and placed 30th overall. Steven also competed in the 300-meter hurdles and finished 19th overall with an excellent time of 55.1.

Seventh grader Bill Burdett faced the daunting challenge of the 3200-meter run. Bill ran a great race and finished 19th overall in 12:47.

The 3200-meter relay team of Bill, Matthew, Brandon and Elijah ran very well and finished 16th overall in 11:15.2.

The RCHS track teams next competed in the Fifth Annual Cardinal Relays at South Laurel. Ten girls' and 12 boys' teams were on hand for the annual competition.

Rockcastle's girls' team dominated the competition once again. The girls placed first overall out of the 10 team field with 88 total points, 31 more than runner-up Bell County. This improved their overall season record to 69-0.

Tara Abney set an RCHS record for points in a relay meet with several incredible performances totaling 16.3 points. Tara would have easily won the MVP award if one had been given as it had in the past.

The 400-meter relay team of Cheyenne Carmack, Tara, Theresa Chishum and Sheena Swinney ran the fastest 400 relay in RCHS girl's history. The girls' placed first overall with a new RCHS record time of 54.15, eclipsing the previous mark by nearly two-tenths of a second.

The 800-meter relay team of Cheyenne, Tara, Rachelle Hammond and Sheena ran an awesome race and finished first overall with a season's best time of 1:53.8.

The 1600-meter relay team of Cheyenne, Tara, Rachelle and Sheena ran a great race and placed first with a time of 4:31.42. The sprint medley team of Sheena,

Theresa, Rachelle and Cheyenne placed first overall in a great race with a time of 2:00.43.

Clarissa Hubbard, Ashley Lawson and Tara Abney dominated the shot put relay. The trio placed first overall with an awesome combined effort of 78'6". The same three girls also easily outdistanced the competition in the discus relay. They threw a combined 236'4" and placed first overall. In the 100-meter shuttle hurdles, Theresa, Tara, Rachelle and Sheena Emberson ran an awesome race and placed second overall in 1:10.43.

The most amazing performance of the day came from the distance medley team of Jessica Asher, Theresa, Kayla Hayes and Mourine Ramsey. The group combined for an awesome display of team work and perseverance to come away with the first place win in 15:19.88. The girls also led nearly the entire race.

In the 3200-meter relay, Jessie, Danielle Arnold, Makaylah Bryant and Kayla ran very well and placed fourth in 12:17.42.

The long jump relay team of Rachelle, Cheyenne and Mandy Bullock placed fourth overall with a combined effort of 35'5.25". An injury to Mandy prevented her from jumping her best, but she courageously gave it her best effort despite her injured ankle.

The boys' team placed 11th overall and had many great relay performances.

The 400-meter relay team of Josh Hale, Dustin Crawford, Steven Shackelford and Elijah Lunsford ran well and placed ninth in 49.68.

The 800-meter relay team of Dustin, Steven, Stephen Hopkins, and Stewart Abney placed 12th overall in 1:50.18.

In the 1600-meter relay, the team of Josh, Dustin, Stephen and Stewart ran an exceptional race and finished seventh overall in 4:05.

In the sprint medley, the team of Josh, Dustin, Steven Shackelford and Stewart ran very well and finished ninth in 14:35.69.

The boys' team scored well in the shot put and discus relays. The team of Stewart, Dustin and Eric Denney, combined in shot put for a total effort of 98'0" and a seventh place finish. In

discus, the trio combined for a total of 243'6" and finished eighth overall.

The distance medley team of Matthew Whittaker, Stephen Hopkins, Brandon Cole and Bill Burdett combined for a great race and finished 10th in 13:43.5.

In the 3200-meter relay, the team of Bill, Matt, Brandon and Elijah Lunsford ran a hard-fought race and finished 11th in 11:02.23.

In the long jump relay, the team of Steven Shackelford, Randy Bussell and Ashley performed very well and finished eighth with a combined total effort of 36'6.25".

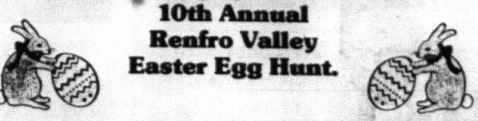

# Mrs. Cynthia Cox's life spans century

Twenty-five year old Miss Cynthia Brewer of Hazelton (a community between Hyden and Wooden) in Leslie County came to Mt. Vernon in 1925 to teach home economics at Langdon Girls Boarding School. The school was on Williams Street in Mt. Vernon where Jeff and Twila Burdette now live and next door to where Mrs. Cox still lives. During the five years she spent teaching at Langdon, Cynthia met and married a young local bank teller, Vernon Cox.

Immediately following their marriage, the Coxes spent four years in Santa Fe, New Mexico where they worked, she as a dietitian, and he as a manual trainer in a Presbyterian girls' boarding school, whose student included mainly Native Americans.

In 1934, when they returned to Mt. Vernon, Langdon was in the process of closing its doors to merge with the new high school, and so they bought from the Presbyterian Board the "model cottage" next door to Langdon, where Mrs. Cox still has

residence. The cottage, built around the turn of the century, was once the parsonage for the Presbyterian Church. When Mrs. Cox taught home economics there, the building was used by the school as a training center for teaching girls practical lessons in home management. Groups of six to eight grade girls spent six weeks living in the cottage. Each week, they assumed the roles of a different family member - mother, father, siblings. The girls shopped, planned meals and budgets, cooked, and cleaned.

The cottage, from time to time, served as a clinic for tonsillectomies. The nursing staff at Langdon assisted Dr. Pennington (from London) in surgery as well as supervising the convalescence. Mr. Cox's tonsillectomy took place there and resulted in a life-threatening hemorrhage which nurses were finally able to control.

Later, during the Depression, Mr. and Mrs. Cox worked as supervisors for the NYA, a government supported program for youths. Mr. Cox built a little stucco building on the back side of their property to use as a shop to teach the boys woodworking skills. It later was made into a dwelling. Among other things, the boys made chairs and tables for classrooms. It was during this time that the youths built the stone wall around the little city park at the corner of Main Street and Richmond Street.

Mrs. Cox taught the girls to sew and the clothes they made were provided to those who needed them. It was during this time that the youths built the stone wall around the little city park at the corner of Main Street and Richmond Street.

After their NYA employment, Mr.

and Mrs. Cox both worked for Ralph Griffin, a local furniture dealer. Mr. Cox also worked some for C.C. Cox Hardware, and Mrs. Cox was employed for several years at the Mt. Vernon Locker Plant located where Jim's Used Furniture Store is now.

In the late 1930s, Mr. Cox made his wife a loom, patterned after the ones at Berea's Churchill Weavers. She taught herself how to use from books and "bluffing her way through" she said. At first, she wore rugs for herself and friends. Later, in 1962 when Mr. Lair opened a craft shop at Renfro Valley, she sold him some of her weavings. Her business steadily grew to include placemats and table runners as well as rugs. Following a severe fall which resulted in injury to her back, Mrs. Cox was unable to supply her regular customers who liked to buy her handmade items, especially for gifts.

According to Mrs. Cox, her husband, who was nicknamed Swifley as a young paperboy by a Judge Brown who was always ready for his paper before it arrived, was quite a designer. He designed and together they crafted almost all of their furniture including chests, buffets, chairs,

tables, beds, and cabinets. They preferred to use either walnut or cherry wood. Their acorn bed was designed after Mr. Cox observed an acorn and reproduced it as exactly as possible. Their cabinets are designed with glass panels in the doors. Despite the fact that Mr. Cox was afflicted with a crippling and very painful arthritis, he was self-suffi-

cient until about four years before his death. Among his other numerous interests and hobbies were drawing, oil painting and gardening.

The skill and artistic ability of these two impressed most of those who took the time to know them, but also of significance in the lives of this couple was their obvious delight in and appreciation of the natural beauty of the earth. Simple things most people overlook or take for granted were noticed by the Coxes. Shiny and new store-bought things did not decorate the Cox house, but rather bouquets of bitterweet or dried flowers from the garden, handmade baskets, and hand-rubbed rods found in the backyard or a piece of driftwood - things that because they cannot be bought in a department store, might

have their beauty and value overlooked.

Appropriately, because they both loved and appreciated good woods, Mrs. Cox chose a solid walnut casket for Mr. Cox when he died and placed upon it a beautiful flowering houseplant they had been awaiting bloom shortly before his death.

Also touching to those who knew them as a couple was the mutual devotion, respect and admiration they seemed to share.

# The Family Room

## Too Much Television Can Make One Depressed

I have the sneaking suspicion that watching too much television can make one depressed. This decision is not based on a research study or on the opinion of someone else. This comes from personal experience. Let me tell you what happened.

"Law and Order" is my favorite television show. In fact, it is the only show that I diligently try to fit into my schedule. It is in reruns each night at 7:00, and I usually manage to see it. It also comes on again at 11:00, but on weekdays that is past my bedtime.

The police/courtroom drama is well-written and well-acted. Jerry Orbach, Sam Waterston, Jill Hennessy, Steven Hill and the others are fine actors. The show also handles sensitive themes such as abortion, euthanasia, AIDS and suicide in a mature fashion.

One member of my family has well over 200 episodes on tape. A month ago I decided to delve into this taped treasure trove and began to work my way through the tapes. With no commercials I could watch a one-hour show in forty-five minutes. I had already seen some of the episodes and could fast forward past those. I could concentrate my atten-

tion on those I had not seen before. I managed to watch one or two shows a day for almost a month. One rainy Saturday with nothing else to do, I watched five episodes.

At the end of that day, I noticed some changes in myself. I was irritable with my family. I was worrying more than usual, and I just did not feel like doing anything. I was lethargic and had no energy. I had a bad case of "the blues".

For me these are the early warning signs of depression. Depression runs in my family so I have learned to watch for it. I have had it before and usually my wife or I can recognize it in the early stages.

Though I knew I was depressed, at first I could not figure out what was causing it. Nothing had happened. No one had died; there had been no financial disaster and everyone was healthy. Why was I feeling this way?

It was then that I began to suspect that my television viewing habits had something to do with causing the depression. "Law and Order" is about homicides - murder. Though not much violence is actually shown, violence is lurking in the background of every show. Children are sometimes the victims of the violence. One particu-

larly memorable episode began with the police and attorneys viewing the carrying out of the death penalty on a man they helped to convict. While the show is a good one, too much exposure to this level of violence was making me depressed.

The other factor may have been simply the amount of time I was spending in front of the television. TV is a "mind-numbing" experience,

putting us into a vegetative trance during which we do little movement or creative thinking. I think this also contributed to my depression. I stopped watching the show last week and since that time I have felt better.

Can I prove that watching too much television made me depressed? No, that is just one man's opinion. Television, however, is a powerful medium, and I think I overdid it.
