The water has been tested and passed inspection by the Division of Water, Frankfort. The chlorine level is tested daily.

When water flows in your area each person or family who has a water meter will receive a bill stating the amount of money owed for a month's service. The basic monthly charge for service and the first 2,000 gallons of water is \$17.44. When water usage exceeds 2,000 gallons the additional charge is \$6.19 for each 1,000 gallons. Generally the bills are two months behind. Example: Charges for water usage is for two months earlier. For example: May will be due in July. These charges are established by the Public Service Commission. Persons with a water meter and no water usage are obligated to pay the monthly service fee of \$17.44 monthly.

**IMPORTANT INSTRUCTIONS FOR HANDLING THE BILL.** Go to the water meter with a flashlight. Lift the small metal door. Down inside the meter is the gauge with your numbers. Read the numbers and write them on the bill. The last number is a 0 and will never change. Mail check or post office money order to RWA, PO Box 540, Mt. Vernon, KY 40456. Telephone number 256-5480. If there is a leak in a line or anywhere around the meter call the RWA office as soon as possible.

## 5-year-old calls 911, gets help

One courageous five-year-old girl may have possibly saved her mother's life Monday, when she called the local 911 dispatch.

Little Miranda Didonato told 911 dispatcher Tim Cameron, that her mother Sherry Didonato, 28, was having seizures.

"She was pretty cool about the whole thing, but she did not know where she lived for sure - she just said in Brodhead," Cameron.

Cameron solicited the help of Rockcastle Deputy Sheriffs Sonya Parker and Darrell Doan, while he traced the call.

While Cameron was tracing the call and paging out an ambulance, Doan realized that Sherry Didonato, was the daughter of Betty Eates, who lives in the same area of Bowling Ridge.

Between the three of them, and with the help of the little girl, who told Cameron her mom told her to call 911, ambulance attendants found Didonato's home on Philadelphia Church Road.

Sherry Didonato was taken to Rockcastle Hospital for treatment and on Tuesday, she was transferred to the University of Kentucky.

"Parents really should help their children learn where they live and what their phone number is - this little girl may have saved her mom's life," Cameron said.

Brown, 39, of Lexington, pleaded guilty to the offenses of Operating a Motor Vehicle while Under Influence of Alcohol, Fleeing or Evading a Police Officer and Persistent Felony Offender, Second Degree in Rockcastle County Circuit Court.

According to Montgomery, the charges stem from an incident that occurred on June 5, in which Brown drove off in his vehicle while Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Charles Gray was attempting to cite him for speeding and DUI. Brown led police on a high speed chase for 38 miles before being stopped in Corbin.

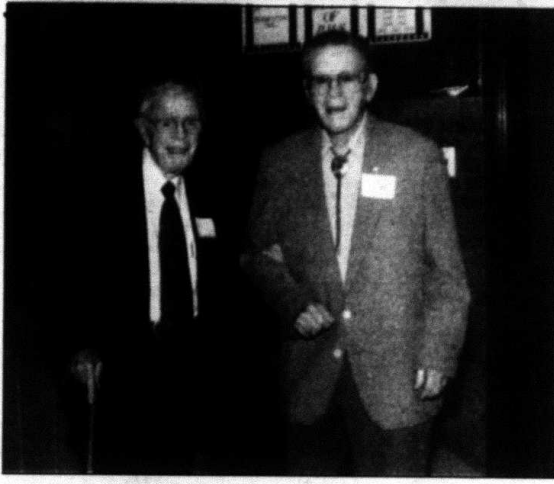
Montgomery added that his office has recommended a sentence of eight years imprisonment. Formal sentencing has been scheduled for May 26.

## After 56 years, WWII Veterans reunite

It may have been 56 years but World War II Veterans still remember the last time they saw each other - at least the last time until Monday morning.

Two young army privates, who had gotten to know each other after both of them were assigned to the 329th Infantry, last saw each other in July of 1944, several days after allied forces invaded Normandy, France. G.D. Leese, 76, who lives at Copper Creek with his wife Hester and Harold Imler, 75, of Tenino, Washington got to know each other in Liverpool, England, while they trained for combat in World War II. The two men, 19 and 20 at the time, were reunited thanks to the Internet.

Harold Imler did a name search and found two pages of G.D. Leese's listed in the country, but only three in Kentucky.

Imler knew his friend and fellow soldier lived in Kentucky and in March of 1999, he called Mr. Leese on the phone.

From that point, with the help of Leese's daughter, Pat Chasteen, the two survivors of the Normandy invasion began communicating through e-mail and exchanged pictures of their families and friends.

Imler and his wife, Janet, decided to visit the Leeses on Monday, while on a tour of this part of the country. The Imlers flew to Nashville where their tour began and on Monday morning at 2 a.m. they drove to Copper Creek.

They were greeted by Leese, his wife, three of their children and other friends, who had gathered to mark the reunion of two army privates, who had stayed in the same fox hole for nearly a week while under enemy fire and who had parted ways from that fox hole, not to speak again for nearly 55 years.

The Leeses had decorated their home with patriotic items, including an American flag table cloth and other items showing the family's patriotism. Many war Veterans do not like to speak about their time in the service and especially those times while on the battle field.

Both men admitted they were "scared to death" during the invasion, but neither one had problems talking about the week they spent eating K-rations and taking turns sleeping while mortar shells sailed through the air.

During their time on the beach 850 soldiers died and 4,000 were injured.

Both men were among those injured when the same mortar shell hit their fox hole. Both men took shrapnel from the shell.

But both men said they knew they had a job to do and they knew the importance of the war in Europe, so they felt like they should serve their country to the best of their ability.

After the men were removed from their fox hole, they were taken to different field hospitals.

Harold Imler would be given a medical discharge a few months later and sent home.

In 1946 he would marry Hester Ellison and over the next 54 years

## Only athletes will be tested at high school

During coming school year

The Rockcastle County Board of Education discussed their new drug testing policy for athletes at Rockcastle County High School, during their regular monthly meeting Tuesday night.

The board discussed the procedures for administering the test and whether or not other students, who participate in extra curricular activities at the high school should be tested.

Board Chairman Dr. G.W. Griffith said that because of time restraints in getting the policy adopted and in the student handbook by July 1, athletes will be the only students tested at the school this year.

The test will be given at the beginning of each sport and after that athletes in each sport will be randomly tested.

Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond told the board that he had talked with a couple of parents who had voiced their concern about athletes being singled out.

One parent at the meeting told the board he thought they were practicing discrimination by not testing all the students at the high school.

Board chairman Griffith said that because students are required to go to school, they can't be tested unless they volunteer to participate in an extra curricular activity.

Board member Terry Burton said that he too had had some concerns at first about singling out athletes, but he thought that it was well worth the board's efforts if they were able to catch one student and help them with their problem.

The drug testing procedure was discussed at length, but no action was taken because of some particulars that have to be worked out.

A representative with Forward Edge Associates, based in Lexington will attend the next board meeting to discuss the procedure.

The cost of each test will be approximately \$20 with about 200 athletes being tested.

The test will be a urine test and results will be made available to the school within 24 to 48 hours.

If a student tests positive the test will be administered again and if the result is negative it will be dropped. If not, the student's parent will be notified and they will be suspended from that sport.

Options for treatment of the student's problem will then be laid out, but all of that will be discussed at the next board meeting.

Hammond said that next school year, no one but athletes will be tested, but that the board would not doubt reconsider testing other students who volunteer for an extra curricular activity in 2001-2002.

The board also approved a contract with a company, which will provide a drug dog for visits to the high school and middle school.

The cost of the 12 visits, eight at the high school and four at the middle school will be \$6,900. According to Mrs. Loretta Powell, the local school system's safe schools coordinator, the dogs used in the search will be able to detect marijuana, cocaine, alcohol, gun powder, illegal drugs and some prescription drugs.

The board also gave their approval to a request by the Rockcastle County High School JROTC program to provide \$13,000 for rifles and equipment for the rifle team at the school.

Sgt. Major Keith Taylor, the coach of the rifle team made the request, which would enable the RCHS rifle team to compete in the Precision Category as well as the Sniper division.

The local team has been highly successful in their competition winning the state championship in the Sporter division in December and winning the right to compete in Atlanta in June, during a competition in March, in which they totally dominated the rest of the teams, which participated.

Although the board will take no formal action until the next meeting, each board member voiced their support of the expenditure and praised the JROTC program at the high school.

## Great success

The Rockcastle Soil Conservation District in conjunction with the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court and Mt. Vernon Scrap collected 2000 old appliances last week during a White Goods Collection project at the local scrap yard.

I just polished off a big bowl of ice cream but about all I can tell you is that it was cold and creamy. My smeller ain't working again and my head is throbbing and the doc said that if I concentrated on eating and drinking really cold stuff might help. Not that I need an excuse to eat ice cream.

It says on the box that the flavor is "Deep Dark Secrets." Kemps is the brand name. I've been getting "Double Fudge" and "Homemade Chocolate" Blue Bunny brand, but they don't carry it in Wm. Dixie so I asked one of the women working there to recommend the chocolatist chocolate they had in the store and she literally grabbed me by the hand and led me to Deep Dark Secrets.

I've discovered, over the years, that it is an effort in futility to talk to a male human being about chocolate. If it's brown and edible most men figure it is chocolate and they either like it or not. Most men go out on Valentine's Day and buy an expen-

sive box of serious chocolate candy for wives and girl friends figuring they will put the brand name together with the price and be impressed.

I use Valentine's Day as an excuse to shop for some pricey chocolate for Loretta because I know that I'm going to eat 90 percent of it. Loretta is one of those people who needs one little nibble of chocolate every month or so to be happy. Maybe two little squares of one of those Hershey bars that are blocked off in eight pieces. Normally when I get her a box of candy she looks at the code inside the cover to figure out which piece has a pecan stacked inside it and I eat the rest. I tell her it's a sin to let good fresh chocolate go unappreciated.

My friend, Debbie Spezio, in New Orleans is Catholic and she is typical of several other women I know who are genuinely passionate about their chocolate. Lent is one of those Catholic things where you give up something you like to eat or drink for forty days. Debbie is so serious about her

religion that she gave up chocolate. I know another woman who gave up beer and she told me that she couldn't live until Lent was over because the Irish Whiskey she'd been guzzling was about to give her an ulcer. Unfortunately there is no substitute for chocolate as far as most women are concerned.

I, however, am perfectly happy with a big slice of apple pie or cheese cake if I can't have chocolate. And I have come up with a recipe for apple pie that you need to try.

A few weeks ago, I had my heart set on cheese cake and discovered that I didn't have all the ingredients in the house. On the other hand, I had a bunch of apples that were shriveled up but refusing to rot-toe dried out to eat but too unspoiled to toss in the garbage so I began mulling over the basic concept of cheese cake and apple pie and wondered what a cross might taste like. I call it Cheese Cake Cousin Apple Pie and the recipe follows. This may easily be the best thing you'll get out of my column in the new millennium.

**CHEESE CAKE COUSIN**  
**APPLE PIE**  
(makes 2 nine-inch, deepdish pies)  
10 cups or thereabouts of peeled, thinly sliced tart granny smith apples

18 oz. pack Philadelphia cream cheese  
16 oz. pack sour cream  
1 cup honey  
1 cup sugar  
3 tsp. corn starch  
2 tsp. each, cinnamon, nutmeg all-spice  
1 tsp. vanilla extract  
2 store bought, deep dish pie shells and top crusts\*  
In a large mixing bowl, place cream cheese, sour cream and honey. Microwave on power level 5 for six minutes. Remove and stir until mixture is creamy. Add sugar, corn starch, spices and vanilla and combine with mixer on high speed for a couple of minutes. Place apples in eventamats inside the pie shells and cover with even amounts of filling. Cover with the pie crust and crimp edges. Use a cable fork to punch in few holes in top crust and bake at 325 for 35 minutes, or until crust is golden brown. \*If you can't find the top pie crusts at your grocery, substitute with a Graham Cracker pie crust recipe (on the side of all Graham Cracker boxes) which actually makes it a double first cousin to cheese cake.

This is best served cold or cold. But to get as close to heaven as you can here on earth, I recommend that you have a big bowl of Deep Dark Secrets ice cream on the side.

The eye clinic, a dentist office, a repair garage, car wash and small grocery store with gas pumps, complete the business section I can see from my window. The hillside beyond, also visible from my window, added another touch of nostalgia to my early morning reveries and I can't remember the last time I saw any other reminder of life on the farm. Various shades of green from a variety of trees and an occasional patch of what looked like freshly graded ground could be seen. (Garden spots maybe?)

By now I had forgotten the morning paper. A new idea was being born. Why this was almost a dream come true. I had the best of two worlds. Hmm, I had to take a better look and compare what I am seeing with my dream of once again living in town where I could walk on sidewalks, have street lights at night so one could find the number on a house or avoid the rough patches in the side-walk and where I could see traffic and hear the accompanying noise that is always present and I had missed since moving to the country. I have always loved the noises that go with living in a busy world. The sound of a train whistle blowing as it enters the station, the sound of street cars passing by, the knocking of hooves from an always present and I had missed (that one sometimes got on my nerves), the sound of factories operating and whistles blowing at noon telling all within sound it was lunch time. All these things I was familiar with and loved the feeling of security that all was well when I had a job.

When I moved to the farm all I could see was trees, a few spaces of half cleared ground for gardens and men in overalls at work. And the only sounds were of birds singing, hens clucking to their little chicks or roosters crowing at the break of day. Or a cow mooing at the mil parlor when milking time was near. Even those sounds, except the birds singing, weren't there when I first arrived. The ringing of hammers and whining of saws when the house was being built was music to my ears. But time did go on and as it passed I became aware of other sounds of life and learned to love them. These were not the harsh sounds of horns, and whistles nor the constant clanking of machinery from the factory, these were the soft sounds of birds singing in the early morning or twittering in late evening when they were going to bed. The sound of a whippoorwill at night as he called to a mate and the answering call from some distant place in the depths of the woods. It was the sound of tree frogs filling the air with their message, "spring is here."

The hooting of a hoot owl or the laughter of laughing owls when they gathered for their convention in late fall. These were not noises, these were life creatures, singing a heavenly chorus and each did his part beautifully. There were other sounds of course that caused concern to a city girl beginning a family in the isolation of an undeveloped part of Rockcastle County and made her wish to be back in the city. This was the sound of a sick child crying out in the middle of the night and the closest doctor 22 miles away and no way to get there. Or the sound of a shot somewhere in the distance and one knew there was trouble ahead. These were the frightful sounds that was a part of being in an isolated section of the mountains. My disliking for the sight of trees began soon after our move to what was later known as the farm. There were trees, some not much more than

## New Drug Labels

Do you ever feel like you need a medical device to follow the directions on over-the-counter drugs?

Wouldn't it be nice if labels were easier to follow and understand? The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) thinks so. That's why it's requiring over-the-counter medicines to carry new, easier-to-read labels. The new labels use simple language and larger type to convey key information, such as the product's use and proper dosing instructions. The new labels also clearly list the

drug's active and inactive ingredients. Warnings and possible side effects appear in bold type. While the new labels contain the identical information as current labels, the hope is that the new, easier format will help consumers find the right products for their needs and use them safely. Many products will begin carrying the new labels within 2 years. The FDA is also requiring that dietary supplements carry similar standardized labels. These labels simplify information about the supplement's ingredients and uses.

**"It is Written"**

I heard a comment by a clothes designer and he was talking about summer fashions, and the comment was made: "that is what summer is about, showing skin". This is a perfect example, that godly people walk to the beat of a different drummer. Look at the disastrous results of a woman who was showing too much skin, the story of David and Bathsheba. I Sam 11:1ff I hope that all of us will develop that spirit of shamefastness, which will reflect itself in dressing modestly and not by "Showing Skin".



## That Old Time Religion Is Alive and Well

George Jones was seriously injured in a car wreck in 1999. Jones is the popular country music singer whose hits include "I Don't Need No Rocking Chair" and "He Stopped Loving Her Today." While recovering from his physical injuries, Jones slipped into a deep depression. Gradually he pulled away from everyone in his life, including his wife, Nancy.

Finally there was one person he wanted to see, and he asked for her specifically: Vestal Goodman. If that name is not a familiar one, let me explain. When I was growing up in Western Kentucky, I listened to gospel music on Nashville television stations. On Sunday mornings "Gospel Singing Jubilee" brought southern gospel music into many homes, including ours.

One reason that had a distinctive look and a distinctive sound was a group of Kentuckians from Madisonville, The Happy Goodman Family. Sam, Rusty, Howard and Vestal Goodman could even turn a television studio on Sunday morning into a lively place. They were of the Pentecostal persuasion and could preach and sing with the best. Rumor had it that Sister Vestal was the best preacher of the bunch.

Their signature song was one called "I Wouldn't Take Nothing for My Journey Now."

I wouldn't take nothing for my journey now,  
Gonna make it to heaven somehow.

Though the devil tempt me and try to turn me around,  
He's offered everything that's got a name.

All the wealth I want, worldly fame,  
But if I could, still I wouldn't take nothing for my journey now.

Vestal Goodman was the one person that George Jones wanted to see when he was so depressed. Vestal was on the road touring when she received the call. She said simply, "I'll be there tomorrow." Her visit to George marked the turning point in his depression. As Vestal puts it, "I went up there and prayed the devil out of George."

I learned all this while watching the "Happy Goodman Family 50th Anniversary Show" on TNN Saturday night. After telling the story Vestal began to sing "O Come, Angel Band," the song she and George recorded after his recovery.

As she finished the first verse, George Jones appeared from the wings. He sang the second verse, as only George can do, and then they joined together on the chorus:  
O come, Angel Band,  
Come and around me stand.  
Oh, hear me away on your song wings.

To my immortal home,  
When they finished singing, the audience was standing and I had chills bump all over. Something special had happened to Mr. Jones that day that Sister Vestal "prayed him out."  
All I could think was, "That old time religion is alive and well."

# Agricultural News

## Tobacco Leasing

Quotas for the 2000 crop year were mailed on April 7, 2000. Leasing for the crop year 2000 began April 10th and will continue through July 3rd.

## Small Grains

Producers growing small grains (wheat) must report their acreage by May 31, 2000. If crop acreage is not filed timely and producer applies for a Loan Deficiency Payment, then a charge of \$26.50 will be applied for a late file.

## Pasture Recovery Program (PRP) Signup Is Back!

Eligible farmers whose pastures were damaged by drought in 1999 may be able to receive payments to help them re-establish forage crops. Established pasture is eligible where livestock are normally grazed and that was so damaged by drought that seeding is required to re-establish the forage crop. No assistance is authorized for hayland.

To be eligible for PRP, producers must meet ALL of the following

guidelines: be an owner or operator of eligible land who normally grazes livestock on such land; as owner or operator, be responsible for restoring and maintaining the forage crop on the affected land for 1 year after the program is completed; not have an annual gross income in excess of \$2.5 million; certify that the pasture land was so damaged or destroyed by the drought in 1999 that seeding is required to re-establish the forage crop.

The Pasture Recovery Program signup period ended on Friday, April 14, 2000 and required a request for funds report. Regulations for PRP have not yet been published in the Federal Register and payments are not to be issued until funding is available. For this reason, PRP has been extended until further notice.

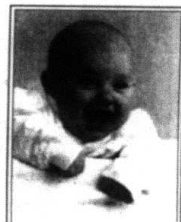

## Farm News

### Rotational Grazing Means More Money

Rotating livestock on pastures improves a grazing system and increases income. Rotating can be as simple as closing gates. The manager should determine when animals graze a field instead of running over the entire farm. All grass needs a recovery time, and rotation between fields allows grass to re-grow between grazing cycles.

The cheapest feed on a livestock farm is the feed animals harvest for themselves. Nutrients harvested by grazing cost less than half as much as nutrients harvested and fed as stored feed like hay or grain.

Improving a grazing system increases pasture utilization and fertility, as well as forage quality and supply. Rotational grazing can increase pasture utilization by at least 10%. Depending on the forage, rotating results in pasture use of 60% or more, compared to use of 50% or less when pasture is continuously grazed.

Nutrient cycling reduces the need for fertilizer on grazed pastures. Less than 10% of the forages' phosphorus and potassium are

removed by livestock; they return most of it as dung and urine. Phosphorus and potassium levels tend to rise near shade, water and gate areas.

Nutrient removal is much less when pasture is grazed than when it is used to make hay. Thus, starting a good rotational system reduces fertilizer topdressing needed compared to making hay.

Forage quality improves when pasture areas rest between grazings. Animals allowed continuous access to a pasture trample and defecate on significant amounts of forage. These areas often grow up, becoming more mature and lower in quality.

Rotating puts livestock on pasture when the forage is at or near its peak nutritive value. Rotated pastures have higher digestibility because forage is kept in a vegetative and growing stage with less dead and over-mature material, compared to continuously grazed pastures. Animals tend to select only the best and leave the worst.

Rotational grazing systems also

allow use of species that are more productive and responsive to management including alfalfa, native warm season grasses, and red clover. Different species enable farmers to improve the seasonal supply of forage, grow more forage and grow better quality forage. Using these species also can reduce hay harvest costs.

## Rockcastle Middle School host World Asthma Day

In recognition of World Asthma Day on May 3rd, the Rockcastle County Middle School hosted an educational program by the Tobacco Use-Prevention Resource Center. The focus was "the harmful affects of tobacco on people with asthma."

Asthma is a chronic lung disease. That is, people who have asthma live with it everyday. Asthma makes breathing difficult. With asthma, it is very hard to get air in and out of the lungs. Changes in the airways block the flow of air, making it very hard to breathe. The basic cause of asthma is not yet known.

- Asthma may be triggered by:
- Upper respiratory infections (colds) - this is a major trigger for children.
  - Cigarette smoke; wood smoke, scented products, strong odors from fresh paint or cooking, automobile fumes and pollution.
  - Allergies to dander (that is, flakes of skin) from dogs, cats, birds or small rodents; house dust mites; pollen and molds.
  - Exercise.

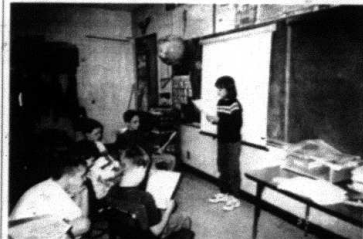
• Emotional stress (can make symptoms worse).

• Changes in weather and/or temperature (asthma can be triggered by cold weather).

Asthma cannot be cured, but it can be prevented and controlled. Members of the Rockcastle Tobacco-Use Prevention Coalition assisted Beverly Sexton, Tobacco-Use Prevention Coordinator in handing out brochures, providing information, and demonstrating the destructive consequences of tobacco use on users and non users; and its effect on people with asthma. Students received book markers, pins, stickers and quizzes.

# Girls' track team finishes second at FCA meet

The RCHS track and field teams recently competed at the Fellowship of Christian Athletes Track and Field Meet in Pulaski County. RCHS competed in the large school division against ten other teams.

The RCHS girls' team had an awesome meet and battled state track power Dunbar High School until the finale. The depth of Dunbar, along with the lack of pole vault at RCHS, proved to be the deciding factor. The girls were defeated in their only really close meet of the season 147-145. Both teams were more than fifty points ahead of third place Pulaski County. Despite the narrow loss, this was the girls' best team performance of the season. Several girls ran personal best times and many RCHS records were broken. The team is now 77-1 on the season's record.

Cheyenne Carmack led the girls in scoring with several outstanding performances. In the 100-meter dash, Cheyenne ran a great race and finished third overall with a season's best time of 13.19. She also ran an unbelievable 400-meter dash, easily placing first with a season's best time of 59.98. This solidified her current first place ranking in the state in the event. Cheyenne's most amazing performance came in the 200-meter dash where she placed first with a new RCHS record time of 26.78.

Rachelle Hammond had an awesome meet and finished a close second in scoring for the team. In long jump, Rachelle performed well and finished first overall with a leap of 15'2.5". In the 400-meter dash, Rachelle had her best performance ever and finished fourth with a personal best time of 1:03.53. The triple jump competition set the stage for the greatest series of jumps in RCHS history. Under extreme pressure to come up with the win, Rachelle broke her own RCHS record with each of her four attempts. When all was said and done, Rachelle had won the competition with a new RCHS record effort of 33'6".

Tara Abney had a great meet and was the leading scorer for the girls. In the 100-meter hurdles, Tara ran the fastest time in RCHS history. She easily defeated Dunbar's best hurdler for the first place win in an amazing 17.31. In the 300-meter hurdles, Tara also ran her best race ever. She finished a strong second with a personal best time of 51.76. Clarissa Hubbard continued her

dominance of shot put and discus. In the shot put competition, Clarissa had her best performance ever and easily finished first with a new RCHS record throw of 35'6". Clarissa was equally impressive in discus, finishing first overall with an amazing throw of 107'8". This tied her own RCHS record and was nearly twenty feet better than her closest competitor.

Eighty grader Sheena Swinney continued to perform well. In the 100-meter dash, Sheena sprinted to a fourth place finish with an excellent time of 13.34. In the 200-meter dash, Sheena ran her best variety time of the season. She finished second overall with an amazing time of 27.26.

Theresa Chislum had a great meet. In the 100-meter hurdles, Theresa ran an awesome race and finished third overall with a season's best time of 17.95. In the 300-meter hurdles, Theresa also ran very well and finished sixth overall in 55.16.

Mindy Bullock performed exceptionally well in the high jump competition. Mindy leaped to an impressive 5'0" and placed first overall by six inches over her nearest competitor. This tied Mindy's RCHS record set last season. She also placed fifth in long jump with an effort of 13'10".

Ashley Lawson broke her own personal record in the shot put competition with an impressive throw of 26'8.25". She placed sixth in the event.

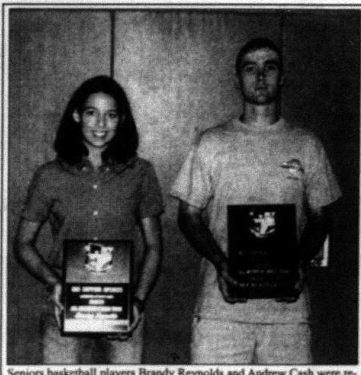
In the 800-meter run, sixth grader, Jessica Asher and Kayla Hayes put on an awesome performance. Jessie ran an record time in the event for an RCHS runner, finishing sixth with an exceptional time of 2:44.42. Kayla was very close behind finishing eighth overall with an awesome time of 2:46.72, her personal best.

In the 400-meter relay, the team of Theresa Chislum, Casey Taylor, Johanna Abney and Mindy Bullock sprinted to a fourth place finish with a great time of 56.12.

In the 800-meter relay, the team of Tara, Casey, Johanna and Sheena ran an awesome race and finished third with an impressive time of 5:55.83. In the 1600-meter relay, Cheyenne, Tara, Rachelle, and Sheena set their sights on a first place victory and the school record. The foursome put together the best performance in school history and easily finished first with a school record time of 4:21.19. No RCHS records were broken.

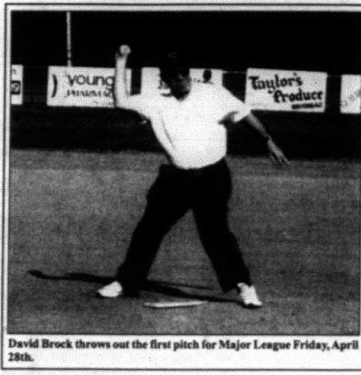

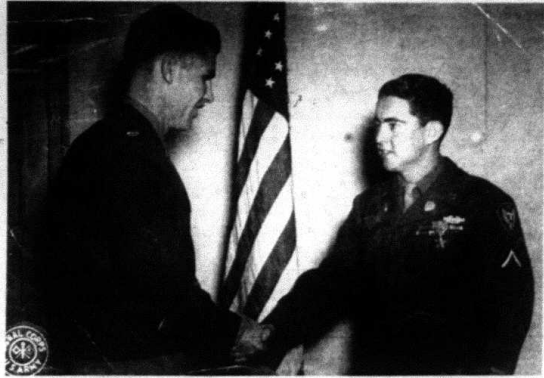
Listed below are the nominees and why they want to serve on the SBDM Council.
