

in nine of Rockcastles 13 pre-cincts.

Although'it didn't matter, Texas Governor George W. Bush beat Senator John McCain 467 o 31 and Vice President Al Gore defeated Bill Bradley, 126 to 17.

Democrat Michael Vacca defeated Sidney Jane Bailey 63 to 62 in Rockcastle County, but Bailey won overall in the fifth congressional district. She faces an uphill battle in the Fall when she will take on Someriset Republican Harold Rogers, who has been in Congress since 1980.

Rockcastle County Clerk Norma Houk said only 745 people voted Tuesday, or seven percent of those eligible. The fewest voted in West Livingston, where fifteen went to the polis and the most-oided in West Mt. Vernon, where 111 cast ballots. Statewide only 12 percent voted.

For this reason, it is important to protect children from too much wow. Where on the body does skin cancer develop? Skin cancer usually appears on the areas exposed

to the sun-the face, head, neck, hands, and arms. What are the warning signs of skin cancer? The most common warning sign is a change on the skin, especially a new growth or a sore that doesn't heal. The cancer may start as a small, smooth, shiny, pale, or waxy lump. Or, it can appear as a firm red lump. Sometimes the lump cancer can slow start as a flat, red spot that is rough, dry, or scaly. 

sible by youth in our community.







Engaging someone else in con-versation can also fight the blues. Whether I talk about my bad day or about another subject entirely, shar-ing my thoughts with another almost guarantees that I will feel better.

Visiting with positive-unional friends can change my outlook from negative to positive.

Some methods for lighting mild depression do not work well. One of these is eating. Those with a food addiction are inclined to eat when depressed. Stiting on the couch munching jurk food and watching you will be come to be supported to make the depression worse. Also, getting on the scales after an eating binge and discovering a weight gain, almost guarantees that the person will be even more depressed?



Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (ing/l)-one part per million corresponds to minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter-one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000;000

.Picocuries per liter (pCi/L)-picocuries per liter is a measure of the radioactivity in water.

Million Fibers per Litter (MFL) -million fibers per litter is a measure of the presence of asbestos fibers that are longer than 10 micrometers.

Nephelometric Turbidity Units (NTU) – nephelometric turbidity unit is a measure of the clarity of water. Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is just noticeable to the average person.

Action Level AL-the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Treatment Technique (TT)- A treatment technique is a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Maximum Contaminant Level- The "Maximum Allowed" (MCL) is the hight level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCL's are set as close to the MCLG's as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) - the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

All drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Holline at 1-800-426-4791.

MCL's are set at very stringent levels. To understand the possible health effects described for many regulated constituents, a person would have to drink 2 liters of water every day at the MCL level for a lifetime to have a one-in-a-million chance of having the described health effect.

Total Coliform: The Total Coliform Rule requires water systems to meet a stricter limit for coliform bacteria. Coliform bacteria are usualy harmless, but their presence in water can be an indication of disease-causing bacteria. When coliform bacteria are found, special follow-up tests are done to determine if harmful bacteria are present in the water supply. If this limit is exceeded, the water supplier must notify the public by newspaper, television or radio. To comply with the stricter regulation, we have increased the average amount of chlorine in the distribution system.

In our continuing efforts to maintain a safe and dependable water supply it may be necessary to make improvements in your water system. At the present time our water plant is being upgraded from 1.7 million gallons per day to 4 million gallons a day.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persor who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some cledry, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. ## Continuous Sign-Up for CRP

Landowners can sign-up for the Continuous Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) at their local USDA Service Center with the Farm Service Agency (FSA). Program rules have been streamlined and enhanced compared to rules in the general sign-up CRP. Most times, the waiting period for approval is minimal. Balmacrements consist of additional economic incentives and updated rates.

additional economic incentives and updated rates.

"To participate in the continuous sign-up, landowners must meet certain eligibility requirements," says andall Templeman, District Conservationist with the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Rockeastle County/Mt. Vemon. "Crophand is eligible, even if it is not classified as being 'highty rendible. However, crophand must have been planted or considered plantegin araginellural commodity during two of the last five years." "As long as land being offered meets program requirements and includes eligible buffer practices, contracts can be approved," said Templeman. "On top of everything

else, landowners can benefit from additional program incentives."

Extra financial incentives are available when landowners agree to install certain Continuous CRP practices. In Kentucky, eligible practices include filter strips, grassed waterways, contour buffer strips, riparian buffers and shallow water areas of wildlife. wildlife.

Continuous CRP contracts last 10 to 15 years, depending on the applied practice. Contracts will include costpractice. Contracts will include cost-share payments up to 50 percent of the cost of establishing permanent cover and other eligible components. Cost-share payments are made when approved practices are completed.

Annual rental payments are made after October 1, each year of the

atter October 1, each year of the contract period. NRCS provides technical scat-tance to landusers who participate in CRP. USDA agencies are co-located at your local USDA Service Centers throughout the state. For more infor-mation contract Randall Templeman, at the USDA Service Center, located on Hwy. 150, M. 


To the Class of 2000:

Do not be afraid to make decisions which will keep you healthy and strong, spiritually, emotionally and physically. Do not be afraid to pursue your


