Highlights of the season include winning the state championship, where all four of our competitors were named to the state all-star team, and winning preliminary competition in Shelbyville where we earned the right to represent Kentucky at the Nationals. Next year begins a new era for the team when they move up to Precision category with equipment provided by the Rockcastle County Board of Educa-

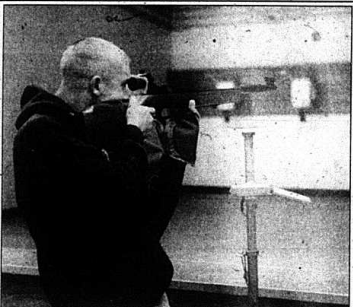

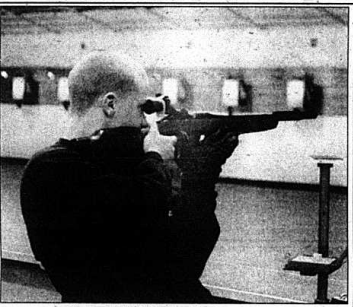

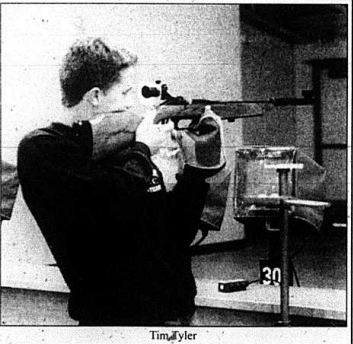

Local Grand Jury returns indictments

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury returned indictments against seven people Friday for crimes ranging from child abuse to theft by unlawful taking.

Calvin Ray Dawson, Jr., 31, of Davis Street, Mt. Vernon, was indicted on one count of criminal abuse.

The alleged incident that resulted in the indictment occurred on April 19 in which he is accused of kicking his son, who is less than twelve years of age, in the head.

Jason Northern, 22, of Mt. Vernon was indicted on two separate charges. He is accused of having a stolen ATV in his possession on April 12 and he is also accused of owing child support in the amount of \$4,800.

Police said they were informed about the ATV by Brodhead resident Mike Gates, who had purchased the ATV from Northern. According to police, Gates told police he did not know the ATV had been stolen until a reward offer appeared in the Signal.

Joseph L. Phillips, 26, of Pineville, an inmate at the Rockcastle County Detention Center was indicted for escape, after he did not return to the jail on time from furlough on May 14.

He was also indicted on a charge of introducing marijuana into the detention center and for being a persistent felony offender.

Kelly D. Prewitt, 39, and Melissa K. Doan, 32, of Mt. Vernon were both indicted for criminal trespass and theft by unlawful taking. They are accused of unlawfully entering the home of Billy Joe Prewitt on May 16.

Dennis James O'Reilly of California was indicted on one count of flagrant non-support of his two minor children. The indictment says O'Reilly owes \$29,000 in support payments.

Livingston man dies before second trial

A local man who was scheduled to be retried on drug charges on August 23 has died.

Ronnie Patrick Johnson, 39, of Rt. 2, Livingston died Saturday night around 9:45 p.m., after he shot himself in the head with a .38 caliber pistol, according to Rockcastle County Bill Dowell who said that Johnson died at the scene.

The shooting took place at Sand Hill, at the home of Johnson's girlfriend, Aline Blackburn, according to police, who also said that Blackburn witnessed the shooting.

According to court records, Johnson was convicted in February by a Rockcastle County Circuit Court jury, of trafficking in a controlled substance and possession of a controlled substance - first degree while in possession of a handgun. The jury recommended a sentence of 15 years for Johnson, but he was released from jail on May 26, after Circuit Judge Dan Venters set aside his verdict and ordered a new trial.

Venters' decision for a new trial came after a motion by defense attorney William Gregory, who contended that the jury was not sworn in before the trial began.

Robbie Lee Miller, 29, of Rt. 5, Mt. Vernon was last seen alive in Richmond on September 30, 1995, and his badly decomposed body was found a week later by hunters in a wooded area off Slate Ridge Church Road in the Lily Community.

Miller had died from a single gunshot wound to the head.

The board will discuss the matter at next month's meeting.

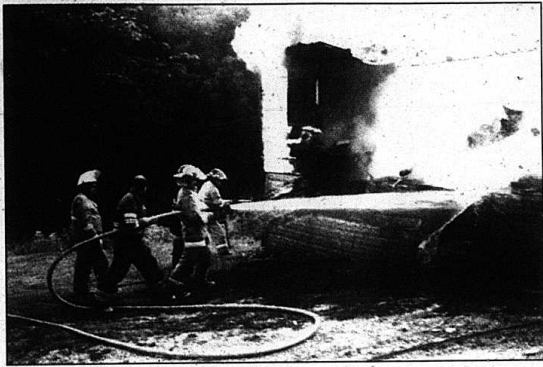
The board also recognized the Rockcastle County High School boys' baseball team and the RCHS Girls' track team on their regional championships.

Firefighters battle fires Wednesday morning

Members of the Mt. Vernon Volunteer Fire Department spent more than eight hours on several different fire calls Tuesday night.

The majority of their time was spent at the residence of Tom Denny on Chestnut Ridge Road, where firefighters responded to three different structure fires.

In each case, firefighters believe the fires were intentionally set, because when they first arrived on the scene, a mobile home, a garage and the actual residence of Tom Denny were all on fire.

Firefighters said the fire that destroyed Denny's home had been set around the fuel oil tank, where its line had been cut.

Fire also destroyed the garage and partially destroyed a mobile home on the property.

Firefighters said that no one was home at the time of the fires and that the first time they were called to the scene they were able to put out the fires at the residence and at the mobile home.

But a short time later they were called back to the scene and found the residence on fire again. This time the residence was completely destroyed.

Rockcastle County Deputy Sheriff Trevor Hemsley said Wednesday morning that an arson investigator with the Kentucky State Police had been called to the scene.

In between the first and second runs to the Denny property, firefighters were called to the home of David Alcorn on Negro Town Hill in Mt. Vernon.

Firefighter Brian Hansel said that Alcorn and his two children were asleep in the mobile home when the fire broke out somewhere in the middle of the mobile home.

Hansel said that Alcorn and his children were lucky to get out of the trailer alive.

"It was pretty heavily involved when they woke up," Hansel said.

Derrick Bussell, Andrew Cash and Jacob Burdette all had two hit games. Taylor, Harper, Neal Childers and Billy Hawckorth, all picked up

Points East

Three hours ago I started writing a column which I finished an hour ago. I was well pleased with my work and I may try to recreate it because, dear reader, if you persevere that's the only option. In the process of cutting and pasting it to email so that I could send it to your favorite weekly paper it simply disappeared. I've spent the last hour trying to figure out what happened and find my work to no avail. And it would not be healthy for Bill Gates to be in the same room with me right now. Suffice it to say that I would make every effort to stick the box and the disks that contain Windows 98 far into the farthest recesses of a particular part of his anatomy that most editors won't let me describe to a readership of easily shocked elderly ladies and adolescents who only read my column to see if I've used a bad word anyway.

I hope they split Bill's company into a million baby Bills and they all go bankrupt in the first six months. In the meantime I have to start over and as far as I'm concerned old Bill deserves the blame.

Anyway, I was musing about pipes and the gist of that follows.

When most folks walk into my office for the first time or into the interior of my house where I have a little say about the decor, they are apt to take notice of the racks and stands that contain dozens and dozens of old smoking pipes that I have sitting around on book shelves, desk tops, clothing chests and like that. They will generally offer a compliment. "Nice pipe collection," they may say, or "Ahh you're a pipe collector I see."

Wrong on both counts. I own a pipe accumulator which, as I will explain later, is vastly different from being a collector. In addition to the hundred or so that I keep on display, I have boxes containing twice that many in my garage where they are waiting for the tendonitis in my right arm to heal to the point that I can grip anything with that hand. They all need a couple hours each of attention and exertion that involves sand paper, steel wool, alcohol and paste wax.

I know several pipe collectors and occasionally I'll across a pipe that I may sell to one of them for as much as \$250.00. Sometimes they snicker behind my back because they got a pipe for say, a hundred dollars, that is easily worth twice that amount. Most of the time I got it for less than a dollar so I don't know why they're laughing.

I accumulate pipes off internet auctions, at yard sales and lots of folks just give them to me because they have no use for them. I enjoy refinishing them and making the grain of old briar roosts from which they are carved pop out in nice relief because it is one of Mether Nature's finest artistic endeavors. Most evenings I will tamp a generous measure of Captain Black into one and let the smoke chase away mosquitoes as I

make use of a front porch swing and meditate on the miracle of being alive.

Pipe smoking and meditating go hand in hand like they were made for each other and I firmly believe that God wouldn't have come up with the Mediterranean Briar if he hadn't intended for some of us to smoke pipes. I admit that I have friends and even close relatives who wonder why I have to indulge in "that stinky old pipe" and I have long since given up trying to explain it to them. I have lived long enough that I have no patience with people who seem to have nothing better to do than worry about or advise me about dying of cancer.

Pipe collectors pay out the big bucks for pipes that were made by particular manufacturers in particularly rare shapes with unique trade marks and other minor features that generally have nothing to do with how well a pipe smokes. I accumulate pipes that nobody else really want and make them appeal to my own sense of beauty and distinction and I don't care much who made them. When I have one that is worth 50 bucks or more, I generally sell it because I figure the guy willing to pay that much for it is going to howl if off the way I would and that's really all I want to accomplish in the first place.

Collectors generally have big egos and they look for bragging rights about having something that nobody else does. In theory their collection will appreciate in value over the years so they consider it a form of investing.

I get my satisfaction out of turning something that was probably ideal for the garbage dump back into a self-satisfying piece of art. It's sort of like running an orphanage on one hand or an old folks home on the other. Most of my pipes don't have any other place to go. Occasionally someone will give me a pipe because they don't want to toss it and then, after I doll it up, they want it back. If they tell me it belonged to a father or grandfather and they promise to put it on a mantle or book shelf where it stands some chance at becoming the subject of conversation, I'll generally give it back. Sometimes one of my buddies will offer to pay for a pipe to smoke and I'll give them one after they swear an oath to keep it cleaned up and give it back if they ever feel like they can't take care of it.

After all, I suppose, the highest compliment one can pay a pipe is to use it for its intended purpose.

The older I get, the more I realize that the ultimate luxury in the human experience is to have some sense that one is serving one's purpose here on this earth. It just happens that one of my purposes is accumulating old pipes that someone down the road may really appreciate if members of my family don't sneak them into the coffin when it comes time to plant me.

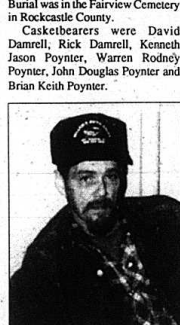

First Baptist Church breaks ground for Educational Building

Wendell Belew became pastor in 1948 and led the congregation to complete the Sunday School rooms in the basement, establish 8 mission stations, and add the current educational building.

Participating in the groundbreaking were the long range planning committee, the church deacons, the church pastor, Dr. Maynard Head, and members of the congregation. The new facility is expected to be completed in late fall.

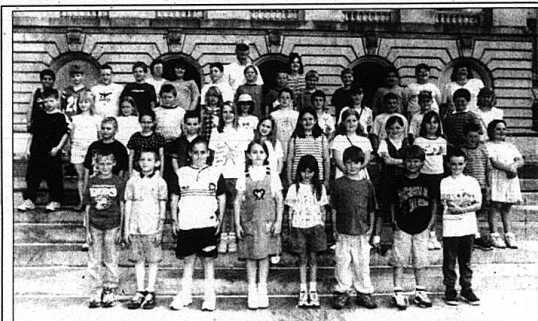

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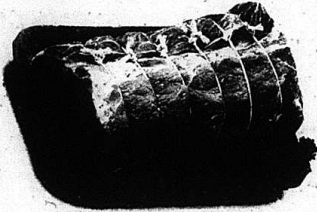

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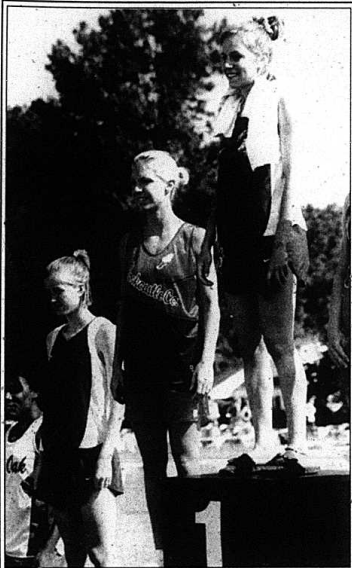

The RCHS girls' track and field team recently competed in the Class 2A State Track and Field Championships held at the University of Kentucky's track in Lexington. The girls' team qualified in several events by placing at least the top two in the regional championship meet. Those events included the 100-meter dash, 200-meter dash, 400-meter dash, 100-meter hurdles, long jump, triple jump, high jump, shot put, 800-meter relay and the 1600-meter relay. The girls' qualified more competitors in more events than ever before. The preliminaries for most events were held on Friday, with the finals being contested on Saturday. The only event that RCHS competed in that was contested as a final on Friday was girls' long jump. At the state level, competitors must compete very well in the preliminaries in order to make it to the finals. Only the top nine girls in each event qualify for the finals. Of those nine, the top eight receive medals and score points based on their particular finish.

Junior hurdler Tara Abney competed in the 100-meter hurdles at the state level for the first time ever. Tara has had an outstanding year in the RCHS and has established new RCHS records in both the 100-meter and 300-meter hurdles this season. She also spent much of the season ranked in the top ten in the state in the 100-meter hurdles. Tara holds the 55-meter and 60-meter hurdles indoor records as well. She has been a very consistent scorer this season and has put up significant scoring totals every single meet she has competed in. In the preliminaries at state, Tara ran an exceptional 100-meter race and narrowly came a shot at the finals. She finished 15th overall with an impressive time of 18.09, despite losing a great deal of speed during the race from hitting some hurdles. In the process, Tara defeated the girl who narrowly defeated her at the regional championships.

Junior Rachelle Hammond competed in the long jump competition for the second year in a row. Rachelle was ranked in the top ten for the entire year and finished the season ranked 10th in the event. She also broke her own record earlier in the season and remains the only RCHS girl to ever break the 16' barrier. In the preliminaries consisting of three jump attempts, Rachelle was very impressive, leaping an amazing 15'8.25". This was easily good enough to qualify her for the finals. During the finals, each of the nine competitors was given three more attempts to improve upon their best marks. Rachelle's mark from the preliminaries proved good enough to keep her in medal contention. She finished eighth overall with her outstanding performance.

Eighth grader Sheena Swinney and Junior Cheyenne Carmack hoped to qualify for the finals in the 100-meter dash. Sheena and Cheyenne finished 1st and 2nd, respectively, in the regional championships. Both girls have ranked in the top ten in the state nearly the entire season. Sheena ranked 10th in the final regular season rankings and also broke the RCHS record for the event during the regional finals. Cheyenne ran an exceptional race and finished 13th overall out of twenty qualifiers with an impressive time of 1:34.3. Sheena also ran well and finished 4th with a time of 1:35.5. Both girls just missed qualifying for the finals.

The 800-meter relay team of Tara Abney, seventh grader Casey Taylor,

seventh grader Johnna Abney, and Sheena Swinney hoped to improve upon their regional runner-up performance with an impressive showing at state. Despite having the youngest relay team to qualify for state with an average grade level slightly above eighth, the girls performed exceptionally well. The team did not make the finals, however, they did finish 15th overall with a time of 1:57.41. The team gained valuable experience from the competition, especially considering the fact that two members had never competed at the state level before. The girls should be the regional favorites next season in the event and will have another excellent opportunity to compete for the state championship.

Cheyenne Carmack sought her first outdoor state championship in the 400-meter dash. Cheyenne came into the race as the defending indoor state champion and had finished fourth in the event during the outdoor season the past two years. At the end of this year's regular season, Cheyenne easily ranked first in the final state rankings and had maintained her ranking nearly the entire season. In the preliminaries, Cheyenne hoped to run a strong race and simply qualify with a decent time for the finals. She ran exceptionally well and finished second in her heat with a time of 1:00.44, easily qualifying her for the Saturday's finals.

Cheyenne and teammate Sheena Swinney next competed in the 200-meter dash preliminaries. Coming into the event, both girls were favored to make the finals due to their top ten rankings from the regular season. Cheyenne finished the season ranked fourth in the state and Sheena was ranked fifth. The girls also dominated regional competition with Cheyenne winning the regional title and Sheena placing with a time of 27.44 while Sheena also qualified with a time of 28.03. This guaranteed that at least one of the pair, if not both, would earn a medal in Saturday's finals.

The last preliminary race for the girls came in the form of the 1600-meter relay. The team of Cheyenne, Tara, Rachelle and Sheena had hoped to build upon their inspiring first place performance of the regional championships with a spot in the relay finals on Saturday. Coming into the event, the girls had enjoyed a top ten ranking in the event nearly the entire season and were a definite contender for the state title. The girls ran a tightly contested race three-fourths of the way through; however, anchor leg Sheena Swinney ran into difficulties causing her to be unable to put forth her best effort. The team still managed to finish 11th overall with a time of 4:29.54, not a bad time, but around sixteen seconds away from their best.

Senior Dustin Crawford was the only RCHS boy that qualified for the state championships. Dustin's impressive second place finish in the 300-meter hurdles had earned him a well-deserved spot at state. Dustin had an outstanding year for RCHS, including a new record in the 200-meter dash, as well as top ten rankings in the 100-meter dash, 200-meter dash, and the 300-meter hurdles. Dustin ran a great preliminary race at state and finished 15th overall with an exceptional time of 45.28. He narrowly missed qualifying for the finals. Dustin's accomplishment is even more impressive considering the fact that he had competed in the 300-meter hurdles in only one meet before region and had only practiced

the event a few times.

Saturday's finals proved to be very exciting for the girls' team, as well as several individual competitors.

Sophomore Clarissa Hubbard competed in the shot put competition for the first time ever at the state level. Clarissa ranked second in the state in the event during the regular season and claimed her first indoor state championship in shot put last spring. She also broke her own RCHS record twice during the season. Clarissa threw very well in the preliminaries, but fell short of her best. She placed 11th overall with a throw of 29'4.25", nearly six feet short of her personal best. Nevertheless, Clarissa put forth a great effort and finished with an awesome overall season. She will be the favorite for the state title next season with her nearest competitor throwing nearly three feet less than her best.

Junior Cheyenne Carmack, hoped to continue her brilliance in the 400-meter dash with three regional championship and an indoor state title under her belt. Cheyenne sought to win her first outdoor title in the 400 against two of her longstanding foes from rival schools. Cheyenne's game plan was evident early on in the race as she sprinted the first hundred meters. Cheyenne's lead had been significant that she didn't feel the girl's presence until the very end.

Cheyenne finished the race with an awesome second place state runner-up finish and a personal state championship best time of 59.64. Since Cheyenne finished the regular season ranked first in the state in the 400, her state championship runner-up performance should earn her a place on the 400-meter all-state first team. Only two girls in the state in Class 2A are selected for this honor. Cheyenne received the second team all-state award in the 400-meter dash last season.

Junior Rachelle Hammond, coming off her eighth place performance in the long jump competition on Friday, hoped to do equally well in Saturday's triple jump competition. Rachelle also hoped to defeat the former triple jump champion from Western Hills as she had in long jump the day before. The girls began with a series of three jumps. The top nine would advance to the finals. Rachelle performed exceptionally well and made it to the finals with a great series of jumps. Rachelle's best overall effort was 33'5" and placed her seventh overall in the event. Her

amazing state performance came on the heels of her first regional championship in the event. She ranked in the top ten in triple jump for much of the regular season and held a fourth place ranking at season's end. She will be a top contender for the indoor and outdoor state titles next season.

Cheyenne and Sheena Swinney, also competed in the finals of the 200-meter dash on Saturday. Both girls ran fantastic races in the finals and finished very strong. Cheyenne ran her best ever 200 at the state championships and finished seventh with an exceptional time of 22.25. Cheyenne missed a fifth place finish by only eight hundredths of a second. Sheena also ran a superb race and remained in contention throughout the entire run. She finished eighth overall with an excellent time of 27.48. This was Sheena's first ever appearance in the 200-meter finals, while Cheyenne completed her third finals competition in the event at the state level. Both girls will be strong contenders for the 200-meter title next season as well.

Junior Mindy Bullock hoped to live up to her top ten state ranking with an impressive performance in the high jump competition. Mindy finished the season ranked fourth in the event. At last season's state championships, Mindy placed sixth overall in her first ever attempt at a state title. Mindy jumped exceptionally well in the preliminaries and her performance with an amazing fourth place finish. She leaped an incredible 4'10" on her way to her second state medal in as many years: Mindy will be a strong contender for the state title next season.

Overall, the girls' team finished with 18.5 points, a new RCHS state competition record, and placed 12th out of over 40 teams that scored at the state level. Around 90 teams participate in track and field in Class 2A. The girls were less than seven points away from an eighth place finish and could have easily finished as high as fourth with a few breaks. The team finished the season with an outstanding record of 111 wins with only three losses. Along the way, the girls won several prestigious invitational track meets and finished no worse than second in any particular meet. The girls broke RCHS records in twelve different events and also broke numerous stadium and invitational meet records as well. During the regular season, the team ranked from fourth to sixth place in the state and maintained this high standard of excellence throughout the entire season, culminating with an impressive regional championship performance in May and extending to the state championships in June. Undoubtedly this was the greatest girls' track season in RCHS history and perhaps one of the most successful girls' teams in the history of RCHS sports.

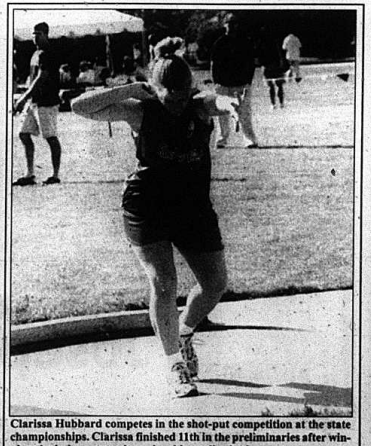

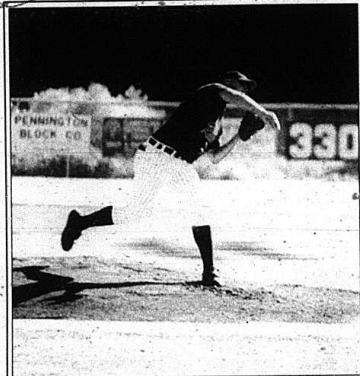

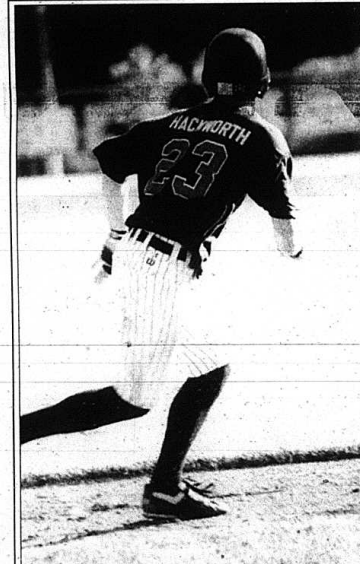

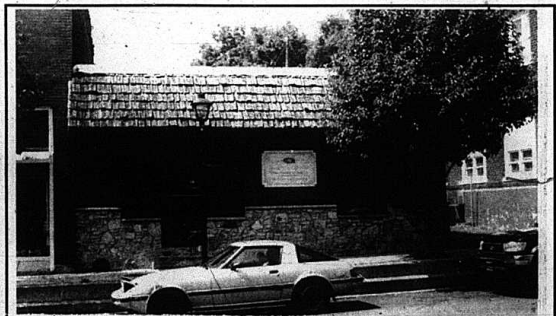

"Sneaky" Pests Can Cause
Minor Damage to Tobacco

Budworms are "sneaky" pests whose undetected feeding often causes serious damage to tobacco plants during this part of the growing season. Typical transplant water insecticide treatments will run out at 4 weeks, leaving plants unprotected. The small green to black worm feed in young plant buds creating round, uneven holes in developing leaves. Budworm injury can top tobacco plants resulting in early sucker growth.

Since budworm feeding generally is confined to the bud area and the larvae are small, early signs of damage often go undetected. By the

time feeding holes become obvious, most of the harm has been done.

Budworms are a wide spread problem. Early detection and through spray coverage are essential to limiting crop damage. At weekly intervals, check the bud area of plants for small feeding holes on the leaves and small black insect droppings, resembling ground pepper, that collect on the leaves. Budworm damage can be reduced with properly timed insecticidal sprays.

ENROLLMENT OF SIXTH GRADE STUDENTS

The Kentucky Department of Education requires that certain health documents be on file at school prior to or upon enrollment into the sixth grade.

An immunization certificate reflecting all vaccinations received is required. A second MMR (measles, mumps, rubella) is required for enrolling into the sixth grade. This vaccine can be gotten at either the health department or the doctor's office. A certificate must be presented the first day of school. The local health department can issue a certificate if you have a personal record of the child's vaccination.

A medical examination is required. This second medical examination must have been received within the last year prior to enrolling into the sixth grade. The physical form must be a Kentucky Department of Education Sixth Grade Physical Examination form dated December, 1999. An athletic physical form is NOT acceptable for the 6th grade physical. Two different forms are required when the student will be playing sports. Schools can voluntarily grant a short grace period for the medical examination if an appointment card is presented.

An immunization certificate reflecting a second MMR and a second medical examination are required for sixth grade enrollment. These are required to be on file at the school prior to or upon enrollment.

During the summer months there may not always be someone working in the offices at the schools. Therefore, any medical records should be turned in at the Board of Education office on Richmond Street.

Summer is a very busy time. Please get these services taken care of as soon as possible so that your child will be ready to enroll into the sixth grade this fall.

Agricultural News

By Warden Alexander, FSA Director

Tobacco Leasing
July 3rd is the final deadline to sign tobacco leases! Producers are reminded leases filed and/or on file in the county office must have all signatures (transferring and receiving farm) by the deadline to be approved. Leases with all signatures not obtained by the deadline shall be disapproved. If someone is growing your tobacco quota on a farm other than the farm the quota is established to remember, you MUST sign a lease in the county office by the deadline of July 3rd.

Farm Acreage Reports
Farm acreage reports of crops are now being taken for the current year. When all crops are planted, producers are encouraged to report all acreages of crops for history, disaster programs and loan deficiency programs. The final reporting date for all crops, except small grains and tobacco, is July 15th. Producers failing to file by the final reporting date will be charged a late fee.

Farm Changes
Producers who have purchased or sold land need to contact the local FSA office for proper reconstitution of farms. Farms enrolled with PFC

have until the deadline of June 1st to file for reconstitutions of farms. Farms not enrolled with PFC have until the deadline of July 1st. Remember to bring your deed and/or to notify the new owner to do so. Also notify this office of any and/or all address changes. REMEMBER: our records are only as current as producers inform our office.

Pasture Recovery Program (PRP) Signup
PRP signup period has been an awaiting the publication of PRP regulations in the Federal Register. These regulations were published on June 8, 2000.

PRP approvals cannot be issued or payments made until the signup is concluded and a determination is made whether a payment factor is applicable.

PRP will end on June 23, 2000. For this reason, PRP has extended until June 23, 2000. If you failed to sign up for this program in the first go round please come to the FSA office and sign up now. Request received after June 23rd cannot be approved.

Stewardship Incentive Program (SIP)
Effective June 8, 2000, SIP applications shall be accepted by Service

Foresters and FSA County Offices during an established signup period ending no later than August 31, 2000. Producers interested in this type of forestry practice should contact the local FSA office during this time period for additional information.

FSA to Grant Relief on Drought
Hampton Henton, Jr., Ky. State Executive Director, has announced that authority has been granted by Larry Mitchell, Deputy Administrator, to grant partial relief to farmers previously determined ineligible for drought assistance. "Farmers that began work to clean out their ponds during the drought of 1999, prior to making an application for assistance, may now be eligible for assistance from FSA," Henton said.

The Kentucky FSA State Committee may now waive the prior approval rule for producers that meet all of the conditions as follows:

- The county was in a recognized severe drought prior to the date the work began.
- When the silt was removed water became available within 72 hours

for the immediate needs of livestock to prevent further losses.

- After silt removal, the eater impoundment reservoir provided a holding capacity for the water supplied by a spring or water hauled or pumped into the reservoir and used for the immediate needs of livestock.
- The farmer filed a request with FSA with 15 days of the start of the signup period.

Farmers previously notified that they were not eligible for assistance under the EC7 practice should contact their local FSA office to determine if they now meet the eligibility criteria.

Verbal Abuse Causes Pain

Physical abuse is not the only kind of abuse. Verbal or emotional abuse can be just as devastating. The following poem was written by a victim of verbal abuse. For many years her husband treated her as if she were nothing. He was critical of her actions and called her derogatory names. Her writing illustrates the pain of abuse.

Why do you feel you have to step on me
And crush me like a little bug?
Can you see yourself putting your foot
On a roach or a spider
And twisting your shoe
Till the bug's smashed to smattering?

That's how I feel:
Smashed and betrayed by the one person
Who should love me more than anyone else.

Can you see the loss of self-esteem?
Can you feel the crunch as you smash out my soul?
Does that give you pleasure to hurt me so?

The pain is so great
It's hard to cry out and ask you to stop...

But it's too late.

I'm lying here crushed to death.
My life's gone... Destroyed.
WHY?
Just what was my great fault then?
That I'm a woman?

That I'm a Christian?
That I see things differently from what you wanted?

Was I not good enough?
Smart enough?
Good-looking enough?

What could I have done to be what you wanted
And not lose me?

The first time I read this I was moved by the pain that this woman felt and expressed so brilliantly. She speaks for many others who have been hurt by the words of abuse. She speaks for the children who cannot defend themselves against the painful verbal barbs of parents who call them "stupid" and "good-for-nothing." She speaks for the women who are hurt over and over again by the men in their lives with words too ugly to put on paper. And she even speaks for men whose mothers and fathers have stabbed them with verbal swords all their lives.

"What Is Written"

It seems that some in our world are never satisfied with God's order of things. There are many folk in our religious world that refuse to accept God's teachings about women's limitations in the church. Paul said in 1 Tim 2:11-12, "Let the women learn in silence with all subjection. But I suffer not a woman to teach, nor to usurp authority over the man, but to be in subjection." And again in 1 Cor. 14:34-35, "Let your women keep silence in the churches: for it is not permitted unto them to speak: but they are commanded to be under obedience, as also saith the law. And if they will learn any thing, let them ask their husbands at home: for it is a shame for women to speak in the church." There are people who promote the ideas of women preachers, women elders, women apostles. But God has forbade women from being in this role of leadership over men. Women can and should be active in the service of the Lord, but she cannot be in the leadership role. "But I would have you know, that the head of every man is Christ, and the head of the woman is the church, and the head of Christ's body." 1 Cor 11:3. Women are not more subliman because of her submission to man; that is Christ is subdue because of his subordination to the Father. Let us respect divine order in the church!

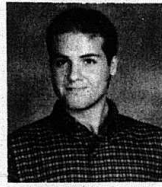

Independent Auditor's Report
We have audited the accompanying statement of receipts, disbursements, and excess fees of the County Clerk of Rockcastle County Kentucky, for the year ended December 31, 1999. This financial statement is the responsibility of the County Clerk. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on this financial statement based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and the Audit Guide for County Fee Officials issued by the Auditor of Public Accounts, Commonwealth of Kentucky. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statement is free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statement. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1, the County Clerk is required to prepare the financial statement on a prescribed basis of accounting that demonstrates compliance with the cash basis and laws of Kentucky, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles.
