New law would allow county to charge inmates

Those arrested in Rockcastle County may soon find themselves having to pay for their stay in the local detention center.

Rockcastle County Jailor James Miller said this week, that he is considering presenting the Rockcastle Fiscal Court with a proposal that would allow the Detention Center to charge local prisoners for each day they are in jail.

Miller said the 2000 General Assembly passed a law that allows jails to levy such a fee for incarceration and for medical and dental expenses.

Miller said that Daviess County Jailor Harold Taylor made a presentation last week to jailers and Judge-Executives from across the state outlining a plan, he intends to implement in Daviess County on July 1st. His plan calls for local prisoners to pay a booking fee of \$20 and a \$20 a day fee for each day an inmate is in jail.

Miller said that he may initially propose only a booking fee of \$20 to \$25 for each person that is arrested and brought to the detention center. "We have about 20 to 25 arrests in the county a week and just a booking fee alone would generate quite a bit of money for the detention center," Miller said.

Final approval on any type of proposal which would charge prisoners for their stay and associated expenses would have to be approved by the fiscal court.

Rockcastle Buzz Carlotis said Wednesday that he was totally in favor of charging inmates.

Taxpayers have footed all of the expenses associated with keeping inmates in jails long enough, those convicted of committing a crime, should have to pay at least a portion of the cost," he said.

"I researched this very same thing several years ago, but because the state had no policy in place for such a prisoner pay program we were unable to implement one," he said.

Miller admitted that it was very unlikely that all of the local prisoners would be able to pay a fee for their incarceration, but he said there could be other ways for prisoners to take care of their debt such as community service work.

On Wednesday, eighteen local prisoners and 73 state prisoners were being held in the detention center.

The county could not charge state prisoners, because the state is already paying \$26.23 to the county for their keep and they are also responsible for their own medical and dental bills.

Miller and Carlotis both admitted that charging prisoners a fee while they are in jail, is a political issue.

"I'm for it, but I don't know how the magistrates feel about it at this point," Carlotis said.

Livingston man arrested

A Livingston man was arrested Monday night, after members of the Governor's Task Force on Marijuana Eradication reportedly found 38 marijuana plants growing on his property.

Kentucky State Trooper Life Owens arrested J.C. Whitt, 67, of Rt. 2, Livingston at his residence on Gaitley Branch at approximately 5:40 p.m.

According to court records, Whitt was charged with one felony count of cultivating marijuana over five plants. He was released on a \$5,000 property bond and is due in court on July 19.

Bridge at CC condemned

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis announced Wednesday that the county bridge at Copper Creek, where Copper Creek Road and Cupps Chapel Road intersect has been condemned by the state.

Carlotis said the state's highway commissioner has told him that the state may kick in the needed \$4,000 it will take to fix the bridge.

The Judge said that the repairs to the bridge are a top priority because of the heavy volume of traffic, but that as of right now the county does not have the money to fix it, unless they get help from the state.

Although the bridge has been condemned it has not been closed, the Judge said.

The purpose of the forum is to determine strategies and actions needed to help alleviate poverty in

Rockcastle County and to educate public officials, the private sector and the general public about current poverty-related problems and effective strategies for resolving them.

Lunsford receives Robinson scholarship

Elijah Wayne Lunsford of Orlando has been inducted into the University of Kentucky's Robinson Scholars Program, which provides full college tuition, room and board and books during his college career.

Lunsford, son of Debra Bullock of Orlando and Wayne Lunsford of Berea and student at Rockcastle County Middle School, was one of 29 students accepted into the scholarship program at Hazard Community College on Saturday June 10.

The Robinson Scholars Program, which inducted its first class in 1997, provides scholarships valued at up to \$8,000 a year to students who otherwise would be unable to pursue a degree. The students must maintain an acceptable grade point average and graduate from high school to receive their scholarships.

The program is open to eighth graders from 29 eastern Kentucky counties, with selection based on each student's academic potential, the

family's need for assistance with college related expenses, essays and interviews. The parents of the selected students also have not attained a college degree. Students apply for consideration through their schools' guidance counselor.

Funded by earnings from coal mining and logging operations permitted on nearly 4,000 acres of the 14,000-acre Robinson Forest in Breathitt, Perry and Knott counties, the program was established by the UK Board of Trustees in 1995. The board utilized the E.O. Robinson Trust to provide increased educational opportunities in eastern Kentucky, where college attendance is historically low compared to other regions of the state.

The trust carried a stipulation that it be used primarily for reforestation and agricultural reforestation and agricultural research or for the benefit of the people of the mountain region.

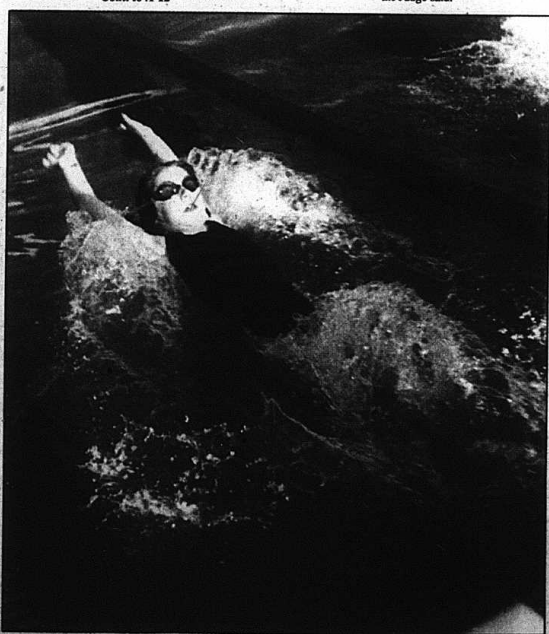

So far all the tests have yielded positive results to Dave Maggard and I are currently putting together a marketing plan for our sure-fired solution to the drought that is plaguing Kentucky.

We don't yet know what to charge to make it rain and Dave is of the opinion that we should just ask whomever feels like he or she needs rain most go through the neighborhood with a big plastic bag and take up collection of hard cash. Put the money in a plain brown wrapper, preferably a sturdy cardboard box, and mail it to us along with directions to both your neighborhood and the nearest fishing lake that allows outdoor motors and we'll be right there, provided you put enough money in the box.

So far this year, every time we've tied the boat onto the truck, rain storms have followed us around until we unloaded back in my front yard. On at least two occasions we haven't actually had to hook up the boat to make it rain here in Paint Lick. All we had to do was catch bait and make solid plans and the clouds rolled in and opened up.

Last week Dave called me up with a proposal to go with his Uncle Ed Maggard's place on Woods Creek Lake in Laurel County. He had just gotten off the phone with Ed who was complaining that his gardens were drying up and Dave promised that we would do something about it. Ed said he didn't know if his two vegetable gardens would make it til the weekend so we made plans to head out early Thursday morning.

We packed our stuff in the boat Wednesday night and on Thursday morning it was floating because the boat was half full of water. Nobody in Paint Lick, I might add, so much as said thank you. Dave called London and discovered they had barely had a sprinkle so we headed down 75 and then rain followed us like a well-trained

pup. It rained so hard that we stopped the truck and turned on the boat's big pump to keep it from filling up and light enough that the truck would pull it.

We finally got ahead of the rain just outside Mt. Vernon so when we got to London we stopped at several places of business and asked them to spread the word that the rain was right behind us. Sure enough, when we got to the dock, it opened up again when we started launching. However, and this has been the rule so far, once we started fishing the rain went away so we had a couple of days and nights of excellent fishing.

We had taken pots and pans to cook with while we stayed in Ed's camper out by the lake but we never so much as built a fire because Mrs. Ed (Carrie Maggard) kept us supplied with thick egg, bacon and cheese sandwiches made with toasted bread. Carrie is one of those people who can just touch food and make it taste ten times better than the average cook because she swore she hadn't done anything special to make them taste so good. I made five meals on her egg sandwiches and I would gladly have had them for five more if we'd stayed longer.

If Carrie hadn't fixed the sandwiches and sent back a bag full every time Ed ran home to check in, we probably wouldn't have caught a fish because that's what we had planned on eating. As it turned out we brought home three pounds of prime trout and catfish fillets because, as I said, the fishing was great.

We had planned on being back home early on Saturday afternoon, but no sooner had we commenced loading our stuff back up than the storms rolled in again and we had to sit for another three hours because the lightning was so fierce and because Ed had been so generous that

we decided to let him get a good soaking rain. Rufus Harrison, if you're reading this, I'm sorry we missed you while we were there, but you too have Dave and I to thank for the rain you got. (Rufus is another friend who lives on Woods Creek.)

On the way home I talked Dave into driving up old U.S. 25 so I could stop at Smith's Produce in hopes of finding some fresh green beans. The parking lot at Smith's was dusty even though it had rained non-stop for two hours not ten miles away. One of the guys working at the place took notice of the fact that Dave and I had obviously been in a wetter climate in the not too distant past and shook his head in disbelief when we told him where we'd been.

I told him not to worry because he could expect it any minute. He was literally gawking when we left the

produce store because rain was coming down like it was being poured from a bucket. We stayed on 25 all the way back to Mt. Vernon because Dave has a buddy in Livingston and he was worried that the rain might have missed him.

Right now Dave and I are planning to go back to Woods Creek this coming Friday night, not because they need the rain as much as because we like the trout fishing and egg sandwiches. However, if you hurry up with the collection box, and tell us where the lake is, we might be pleased to visit, your community instead. We'll drive right through the middle of your garden if the price is right and the rain is sure to be right with us. It might even beat us there by a few minutes, if we have to slow down very much at your neighbor's place.

since we hadn't been there for a few days I was glad for her to do the favor. A few hours later, she hadn't returned yet, another neighbor, Etta, came by and asked me to go the grist mill with her. I was nearly out of meal so quickly filled the meal bag with shelled corn, tied it securely, threw it over my shoulder and we took off for the mill. I wonder if any of you remember when we took our corn to the mill to have it ground into meal? Or know what a meal bag was? Well, the meal bag was a specially woven bag that meal could not leak out of as it was carried. After the bag was filled at the mill it would be thrown over the shoulder, if one was walking, and carried, sometimes quite a distance. This was usually done by the men, but if the men were busy the wife would often volunteer to go. This could be an excuse to get out of the house. And if a neighbor joined her she would have someone to talk to. The grist mill and post office were on the same road, Highway 80, but were separated by a mile or so of paved road over a steep hill. The path Etta and I took with our load of corn through our shoulders led to the grist mill by another path that didn't get close to the post office so I had no reason nor chance to stop and see if

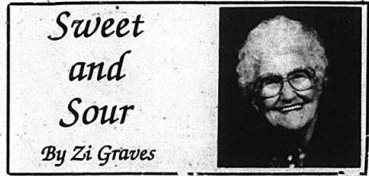
my mail had been taken home. On our way we passed by still another neighbor's house and she called out to me that a telegram for me was at the post office. Knowing E. was supposed to bring it to me I did not go the extra mile to get it but rushed home to see what it was about. When I arrived home there was no sign of E. anywhere and no mail had been delivered. So quickly saying a goodbye to Etta I dropped my bag of meal to I headed back to the post office. This two mile hike was performed much quicker than the first one. By now it was after four o'clock and I did not know what was in the message awaiting for me. I almost stumbled in the door and as I did so E.R. was sitting there still talking, as she had been

doing since early morning. As I entered she looked up at me and said, "Oh, Zi, here you are, I was just about ready to leave so wait a minute and I'll go with you, I'm sure this has had news in it and you shouldn't be alone." It is probably about your mother. There was no answer from me as I grabbed the yellow envelope and tore it open. It was killed in my brother, Jim had been killed in a motorcycle accident. Mrs. Cooper, postmistress and owner of the store, came around from my side, took me in her arms and told me how sorry she was the message had been delayed by the post office and a nosy gossipy woman. E.R. did go along with me but was not comfort, in fact she was a hindrance, she ridiculed the idea of me going to his funeral, said I had better use for my money. My brother, Jim, the oldest one in the family and the first to be taken by death, and me not go to his funeral? What kind of woman was she anyway.

I arrived home shaken by the news and tired to the point of exhaustion from my day's work, and two hikes totalling five miles and most of it with a bag of meal on my shoulder, was almost more than I could handle. What should I do, Mat had no answer. The last bus, one that traveled between Somerset and London at that time, has passed while I was at the store, our truck was not in running condition, there were no other cars in the neighborhood, it was a 17 mile walk to Mt. Vernon, over rough roads, but I had to get there. I was obsessed with the necessity of being with my family at the first tragedy in the family.

I died my white shoes black, searched the closet for a decent suit I wear, finally ran across a grey suit I hadn't worn for so long it had to be pressed and mended, packed a bag and walked the floor. My big brother, Jim, the one with the contagious laugh, and the whistling that could heard a mile away, gone? But how

Sweet and Sour

Why

The autumn days of 1940 are almost a blur as I look back on them so if I get a few dates mixed up blame it on my poor record keeping of important occasions in my younger years. But things that happened that fall are etched in faint and scrambled incidents that I will try to untangle.

July had started school at Buffalo and had to walk the mile or so alone. She was little more than a baby and the walk through the woods frightened her. I would accompany her through the woods before she joined an older girl, to accompany her the rest of the way. I thought this was the way things were done in that area and I never questioned it. Yet I will never forget her crying and saying she was afraid and I didn't know how to handle the problem. This was the beginning of her education, a lonely walk through the woods to one room school taught by Hitt Mink. I was proud of my little girl with brown curls touching her shoulders and large hazel eyes brimming with tears, marching off to school with her lunch bag and tin drinking cup clasped tightly in tiny hands. Her time in that one room school was short though for soon there were other happenings that changed things.

Things weren't going to well on the farm, it seemed fate was against us in every project we thought would surely be a success this time. We failed when Mat ordered the best white rock baby chicks and raised them to maturity to find there was no market for them. The market was too far away to succeed in raising sweet potatoes so bushels of them had to be destroyed. Sheep, that he had bought fencing for untold acres to keep them in died from eating poison shrubs.

The price of hogs dropped till the government asked people to destroy what they had to reduce the supply. We won prizes for the quality of the honey we produced from the new bees and hives we had invested in, but there was no market in our immediate area to sell to. But there was a market for what was called (bug wood) the small timber that had been damaged by fire or insects, could, and was cut to be sold to mills that ground them up into sawdust. So, Mat sharpened the crosscut saw and we took to the woods to try again. That was when I learned how to use a crosscut saw and rather liked the hum of it as it turned waste timber into money. There is a trick to using one of these, you never push the saw, you allow the other person to pull it across the log. It didn't take long until I was swinging and swaying to the sound of it and logs began to pile up ready for loading onto the truck and taking off to a ready market.

In the meantime we had added a couple of good milk cows, a few heifer calves and a bull calf for fattening to the farm and things seemed to be improving. We at least had plenty of milk, meat from butchered hogs in the meat-house, a cellar full of canned garden vegetables, bins full of potatoes, and sweet potatoes in the loft. One little girl in school and a curious toddler exploring every nook and ladder in the house. What more could one ask for?

Remember now, this was the fall of 1940, other things were in store for us we had not reckoned with. One morning in mid October a neighbor passing by asked if I would like for her to pick up my mail since she was going to the post office anyway, and

could I go? I certainly couldn't walk. The two kids didn't understand what was going on but knew it had to be something terrible for I kept walking the floor and crying. Mat was standing helplessly by offering any consolation he could think of. Then we heard a call from the front gate, "Zi... I was at the door in a flash and saw my friend, Jay Mize, standing there. He blurted out, "I heard you have bad news and came to see if I could help out." Jay, Alice Mize's son, and the mail carrier, was offering to help. He had an old car that he used to deliver the mail in the most remote part of the county at that time and was offering to take me to Mt. Vernon, if his car would hold up till we got there, to catch the midnight bus for Cincinnati. That was only the first step of my journey. I had to get to East Liverpool, Ohio, three hundred miles from Cincinnati before Jim's funeral the next day. We decided if I could get to Cincinnati that night I could get a train to East Liverpool the next morning and make it in time. E.R. was right in one way, I did not have the money for the trip, so we stopped in Sand Springs and borrowed money for the trip from Mat's dad. That was the first money I had ever borrowed but it was worth my embarrassment to ask for it to be able to attend my big brother's funeral and grieve with my family.

We did make it to Mt. Vernon in time to catch the bus but there was no ticket agent so I had to ride as far as Richmond before I could get one. This was at the beginning of the war and buses were crowded so when I reached Richmond the seats were full and before I could purchase my ticket another person boarded the bus and took the one I had been sitting in. I stood all the way to Cincinnati. We arrived early and I checked the train schedule and found one would be leaving for Steubenville, my next stop, in 30 minutes. The cab driver said he could make it so without eating I said, "lets get started." Just as I dashed up to the loading platform the train was pulling out. The next would be leaving in three hours. Troubles were piling up faster than I could handle them. I spent the next few hours with my sister-in-law who wasn't able to go to the funeral, then back to Central Station and finally was on my way. I set me there and filled me in on what happened. Since

the family knew I was on the way they had postponed the funeral till the next day and the family was waiting for me at my sister's house. I at least was allowed to sit with the family around her casket that night till I fell sound asleep with familiar voices soothing my aching heart and body.

If only that woman had delivered my message that morning in time for me to catch the bus close by none of this would have been necessary. This to be continued...

The Family Room

Abuse
I am tired of hearing the Bible used to justify the abuse and control of women by men. God does not, did not and will not approve in any shape, form or fashion, any attempt to "prove" that abuse is OK by using Scripture as a misuse of Scripture.

The passage that I hear most often quoted by abusive males is Ephesians 5:22: "Wives, submit yourselves unto your own husbands, as unto the Lord." I know of abusive, controlling males who quote this to their wives just after "ordering" them to do what the husband says. Paul, the author of this passage, did not mean that a wife was to accept any kind of treatment that the husband dishes out. Nor did he mean that the wife should stay in a marriage where she is being abused.

"Taking scripture out of context is a favorite past time of those who try to use the Bible to justify their actions. To understand Ephesians 5:22, we must examine it in the context of the passage in which it occurs.

The verse just prior, Ephesians 5:21, says, "Submitting yourselves one to another in the fear of God." Now here is a verse that is not quoted much at all! Especially by abusive, controlling males! This verse calls for the mutual submission of the wife to the husband and the husband to the wife. The Apostle Paul is calling for us husbands also to be submissive to our wives.

This mutual submission implies more of a marriage partnership than the "wives submit" approach. In a partnership marriage there will be times when each leans on the other for support and advice. I have discovered that there are some areas of life

in which my wife is much wiser than I. If I am smart, I will defer to her when a decision is to be made in these areas. At other times I may take the lead in decision making.

There is another verse in Ephesians 5 that is not often quoted by males who seek to control. Ephesians 5:25, says, "Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it." We husbands are to love our wives with the same sacrificial love. Any husband who orders submission must first ask himself if he loved his wife enough.

Yet another verse speaks to husbands. In Ephesians 5:28, Paul says, "So ought men to love their wives as their own bodies." If a man loves his wife as he loves his own body, he will not abuse his wife. That would be like abusing his own body, which would be foolish.

A loving husband does not attempt to enforce submission. He lovingly leads by example and at times submits himself to his wife (verse 21). Submission that is enforced by fear is not healthy submission. No loving husband will attempt to use fear to force his wife to give into his demands.

Men who want to use Ephesians 5:22 to justify controlling their wives had better look closely at the rest of this passage. If 5:22 is to be taken seriously, then the rest of the passage must be carefully heeded as well. Loving your wife as Christ loved the church and loving her as your own body are not easy instructions to obey, but they are a part of the message that the Apostle Paul left for us husbands.

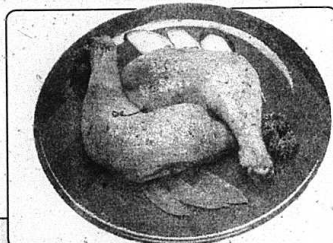

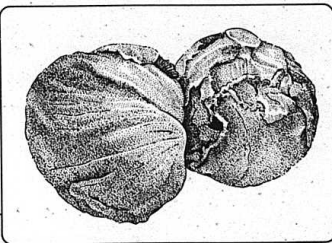

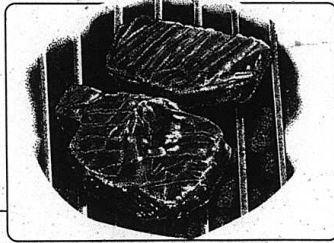

Agricultural News

Tobacco Leasing

July 3rd is the final deadline to sign tobacco leases. Producers are reminded leases filed and/or on file in the county office must have all signatures (transferring and receiving farm) by the deadline to be approved. Leases with all signatures not obtained by the deadline shall be disapproved. If someone is growing your tobacco quota on a farm other than the farm the quota is established to remember: you MUST sign a lease in the county office by the deadline of July 3rd.

Farm Acreage Reports

Farm acreage reports of crops are now being taken for the current year. When all crops are planted, producers are encouraged to report all acre-

ages of crops for history, disaster programs and loan deficiency programs. The final reporting date for all crops, except small grains and tobacco, is July 15th. Producers failing to file by the final reporting date will be charged a late fee.

Conservation Reserve Program's Continuous Signup

Agricultural Secretary Dan Glickman has announced that landowners can receive more money for participation in the Conservation Reserve Program continuous signup. The new financial incentives - totaling up to \$350 million in the next three years - include signing bonuses and more money for installing and maintaining conservation practices.

Unlike the regular CRP program,

the continuous signup program allows producers to enroll eligible highly environmentally sensitive land anytime, without waiting for a sign-up period of competing against other offers. Conservation practices protect streams and rivers by keeping sediment and nutrients from entering the water, providing cleaner drinking water, enhancing recreation and improving wildlife habitats.

For more information pertaining to CRP contact the local FSA office.

Emergency Conservation Program (ECP)

Farmers that began work to clean out their ponds during the drought of 1999, prior to making an application to CRP contact the local FSA office for assistance from FSA. Farmers previously notified they were not eligible for assistance under the ECP practice should contact the local FSA office to determine if they now meet the eligibility criteria.

Lamb Meat Adjustment Assistance Program (LMAAP)

The Lamb Meat Adjustment Assistance Program (LMAAP) is a 3-year program setting aside \$30 million with a \$10 million target per program year. Year 1 (July 21, 1999-Sept. 30, 2000) will be three types of program.

Ram payment-payment rate of \$100 per ram purchased during Year 1, 90 days or older at time of purchase, intended for breeding purposes and owned by the operation for at least 90 days.

Sheep Improvement Program payment-payment rate is \$50 per enrolled sheep and sheep must be enrolled in an authorized sheep improvement program (NSIP).

Facility Improvement Payment-payment rate is 20% of the total cost of the facility improvement made during Year 1, improvements are used in the operation for three years and

producers submit cost documentation of the improvements made.

Year 2 and 3 involves 2 categories of Sheep and Payment rates:

- Feeder lambs @ \$3.00 per head.
- Slaughter lamb carcasses @ \$5.00 per carcass.

Farm Storage Facility Loan Program (FSFL)

An interim rule announcing the Farm Storage Facility Loan Program published in FR on May 11, 2000 will allow FSA to implement the program and accept public comments before publishing a final rule. The interim rule provides:

• A public comment period of 30 calendar days following the date of publication for not only FSFL provisions but for comments about CCC financing for structures to store commodities harvested as other than grain such as silage, alternative types of storage arrangements such as "condominium storage" and storage facilities for other agricultural products.

• That producers who authorize actions without an approved loan, do so at their own risk and without creating any liability on behalf of CCC except for producers who between Feb. 2nd and May 11th, 2000 took action based on the announcement of the program.

Farm Changes

Producers who have purchased or sold land need to contact the local FSA office for proper reconstitution of farms. Farms enrolled with PFC have until the deadline of June 1st to file for reconstitutions of farms. Farms not enrolled with PFC have until the deadline of July 1st. Remember to bring your deed and/or to notify the new owner to do so. Also notify this office of any and/or all address changes. REMEMBER: our records are only as current as producers inform our office.

In the 60's, most farms were manufacture-grade milk producers. Today all farms are grade A and are regularly inspected to keep their rating. Dairy farmers continue to produce a nourishing product which can be used in a variety of ways. In fact, one could say that going through a day without using dairy products in some form would be unlikely.

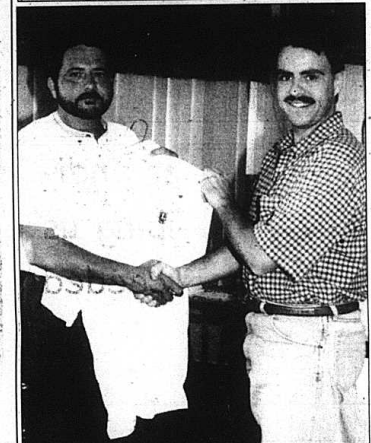

Most children have trouble understanding how others feel. When children misbehave, it is the perfect time to teach them about feelings. Talk about feelings in an honest and open way. Don't be afraid to use words like angry and frustrated. Even two year olds can come to understand the meaning of these words. After all, children have these feelings too. Here are some words you can use with your child.

- "You are feeling frustrated because this puzzle piece does not fit."
- "You are angry because I won't give you candy before dinner."
- Sometimes just putting the feelings into words helps calm an upset child. Children need to learn that what they do can make people feel both good and bad. Here are some things you can say to help your child learn about feelings:
- "Joe is angry. He was working very hard on that building that you knocked down."
- "It made me happy when you helped me put away the toys."
- "When you say please, I want to help you."

It is important to teach children that they can make people feel good, as well as bad. Children learn best about feelings when they are talking about real things that matter to them. Teach your child about his feelings and the feelings of other people.

Independent Auditor's Report
We have audited the accompanying statement of receipts, disbursements, and excess fees of the Sheriff of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, for the year ended December 31, 1997. This financial statement is the responsibility of the Sheriff. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on this financial statement based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and the Audit Guide for County Exec. Officials issued by the Auditor of Public Accounts, Commonwealth of Kentucky. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statement is free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statement. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1, the Sheriff is required to prepare the financial statement on a prescribed basis of accounting that demonstrates compliance with the cash basis and laws of Kentucky, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles. This cash basis system does not require the maintenance of a general fixed asset group or general long-term debt group of accounts. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statement is not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the financial statement referred to above presents fairly, in all material respects, the receipts, disbursements, and excess fees of the Sheriff for the year ended December 31, 1997, in conformity with the basis of accounting described above.

Based on the results of our audit, we have presented the accompanying comment and recommendation, included herein, which discusses the following area of noncompliance:

- The Fiscal Court Should Annually Set The Maximum Amount For Deputies And Assistants Salary.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued a report dated April 3, 2000, on our consideration of the Sheriff's compliance with certain laws and regulations and internal control over financial reporting.

Rogers Scholars is a unique and exciting learning opportunity for forty-eight rising juniors from forty counties in Southern and Eastern Kentucky. During the intensive, one-week session in July, students take classes in engineering, computer networks, video production and webpage development. They also participate in entrepreneurial training sessions where they are challenged by some of the leading business professionals of the region.

"We want to teach the young people of Southern and Eastern Kentucky confidence, skills and a deeper commitment to their hometowns and this region," says Hilda City, executive director and CEO of The Center.

The heart of The Center for Rural Development's mission is "that no young person will need to leave home to find his or her future." These words, spoken by the program's namesake, Congressman Harold Rogers, frame its goals of encouraging youths to seek job opportunities at home while increasing their marketable skills in the field of telecommunications.

During the week, Lambert will

also take part in exercises designed to build leadership and cooperation. "There will be serious instruction, but it will be presented in a fun, exciting, learning environment," says project coordinator Margaret F. Sloan. "Students will develop bonds and relationships that they can carry throughout their lives."

According to Sloan, one of the most exciting aspects of the program is the individual community action plan. Through brainstorming about the needs of their communities, scholars develop projects that they can take home and then implement in their various counties. The Center for Rural Development tracks their progress. Previous successful projects include opening a teen center, beginning an entrepreneurial library and assisting a community in building its CenterNet site.

Being chosen for Rogers Scholars involves a highly competitive process. Lambert had to have a 3.5 grade point average or above and complete an essay entitled, "How telecommunications will affect rural Kentucky in the year 2025." Showing active participation in the community is also a requirement.

Leases with all signatures not obtained by the deadline shall be disapproved, according to Alexander.

Alexander also reminded growers whose tobacco is being grown on a farm other than the farm the quota is established to remember a lease must be signed in the FSA office by the deadline.

Rockcastle County tobacco farmers will be allowed to grow only 1.4 million pounds of tobacco this year, compared to 2.4 last year and over 4 million pounds a few years ago.
