

"Employers will have until the end of July to submit the forms along with payment for the months of April, May and June," Rader said. All other people.

city either for themselves or on a
contract basis will be obligated to
sup their tax each year when they file
their income taxes. That tax falls under the city's net profits tax, which
also includes professionals such as
lawyers and doctors.
Most employers in the city have
deducted the half percent tax from
their employees' check, but not all.

The payroll and net profits tax are expected to generate approximately \$600,000 a year in additional income for the city.

In a repeat of 1998's General Election, Kentuckians withonce again once to decide it the General Assembly will meet annually in Regular Session as opposed to the current system of every other year. Another Constitutional Amendment on the ballot for November will allow voters to decide the fate of the Office of Raifroad Commissioner.

The Commission is made up of thre? members who are elected every four years to epresent one of the

four years to represent one of the state's three Commission districts. In our House Districts our House District, Lincoln Cou located in the 2nd Commission district while Rockcastle and Pu-liski are located in the 3rd Railroad ers are paid \$3,000 per year and are reimbursed for any travel expenses that are related to their job duties. The n of the Comp sion receive S3,600. Currently, the Commission employs only one-full time staff person who serves as executive sec

The Commission does, however, employ an attorney and consultant on a contact basis. According to the

When the Commission was created in 1891 its responsibilities were much larger than they are today. Much of its original jurisdiction has been taken over by the federal government. Today's Commission members can investigate etitize and business complaints relating to public safety. Commissioners may admini-ster oaths in obtaining evidence and gathering information in regard to

Voters had similar opportunities to eliminate the Railroad Commission in 1973 and 1992. The question in 1973 and 1992. The question in 1973 differed from this year's because it was tied to an amendment attant would have also replaced the elected position of Superintendent by a State Board of Education. That amendment failed to win approval by a vote of 186,157 to 159,005.

In 1992, the issue again appeared before voters. Like before, the issue as only part of an amendment that would have allowed gubernationial appointment of the Sceretary of State and state Treasurer. That attempt also

called for the state Senate to ap ent of "inferior state the appointment of "inferior state officers and members of boards and commissions." Again, it failed by a vote of 643,708 to 408,234.

commissions. Again, it issues by a vote of 643,705 to 408,234. Incressingly enough, one of the most vocal proponents of climinat-ing the Commission is four-thing to-missioner folhs. Combis. Since being elected in 1987, Combis has consis-rently campaigned on the platform of abolishing the Raifroad Commission. Proponents of this amendment have questioned whether the two previous attempts were lost because of public concern over eliminating the Surreimedent of Public Instruc-

the Superintendent of Public Instruc-tion and giving the Governor the authority toname both the state Treas-urer and Secretary of State. On the other hand, opponents have

argued that eliminating the office and moving the responsibilities of the Railroad Commission to a state Railroad Commission to a state agency would increase both the bu-reaucracy and ultimately the cost of

carrying out the duties. Eliminating the Railroad Com Eliminating the Railroad Commis-sion is just no of many topics we covered during the Regular Session and I will continue passing along more information about our bills that were enacted and how they will af-fect our state.

Some chircians disagree with this theory they believe that to ignore the sexual interest with the server is to avoid the central issue. There is a recognized clinical conjudention, pedophila, which describes a persistent and long-term sexual interest with children or have co-existing sexual relationships with adults of his/her same age group. 

Vinegar

When you think of vinegar. you probably think of food. But, vinegar has many uses related doothings. To add other to your patent leather shoes, moisten a soft cloth with evinegar and wipe your shoes. When letting out a seam or hem, campen a cloth with withe vinegar and place it under the section to be pressed. Pressing will remove holes and stitch marks. To remove slight scorch from

parodinead Water Works routinely monitors for constituents in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws, as does our water supply system, Mt. Vernon Water Works. Some dates are from testing in 1997, these are noted by dates and are required by law only every 3 years.
