

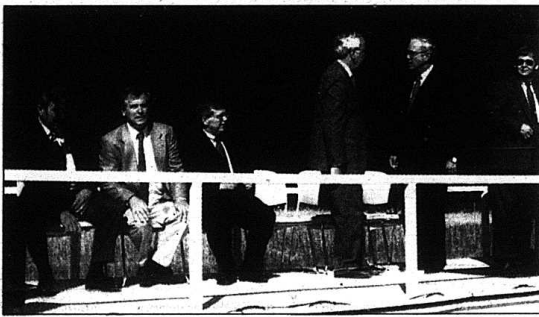
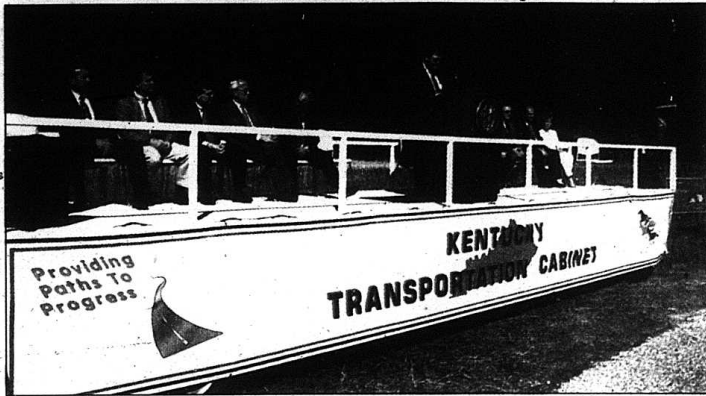

Kentucky Governor Paul Patton, Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotus and State Rep. Danny Ford were among the dignitaries who helped dedicate the new two-mile stretch of Hwy. 421, at Big Hill Friday morning. The project took two and half years and cost the state \$13 million. The road runs through parts of Rockcastle, Jackson and Madison Counties.

Time to pay controversial payroll tax

It is time to pay that highly controversial payroll tax, the City of Mt. Vernon passed earlier this year.

Mt. Vernon City Clerk Kaye Rader said this week that forms were being mailed to employers in the city limits, which would be filled out and sent back with the tax money paid by the employees.

"Employers will have until the end of July to submit the forms along with payment for the months of April, May and June," Rader said.

All other people working in the city either for themselves or on a contract basis will be obligated to pay their tax each year when they file their income taxes. That tax falls under the city's net profits tax, which also includes professionals such as lawyers and doctors.

Most employers in the city have deducted the half percent tax from their employees' check, but not all.

Employees who work at the Mt. Vernon post office and the Renfro Valley post office are going to be responsible for paying their own tax to the city.

Mt. Vernon postmaster Ben Culberson said that the finance office in Louisville told him that there wasn't enough employees working at the two post offices for the finance office to collect the tax and forward to the city.

Culberson said the 18 or so employees of the post office had been given the proper forms and instructed what to do.

All those 65 years and older working in the city limits are exempt from the tax.

The payroll and net profits tax are expected to generate approximately \$600,000 a year in additional income for the city.

Shots fired at Mareburg home

The Rockcastle County Sheriff's office is investigating a shooting incident which occurred in Mareburg last Friday morning.

According to Rockcastle County Deputy Sheriff Darrell Doan, someone fired four shots at the home of Barry and Chrystal Noble around 3:15 a.m. Friday morning.

Noble, who is assistant principal at Rockcastle County High School, said he thought someone was probably shooting at his dog, who was lying on the front porch of the house.

Doan said the shots probably came from a high powered rifle, which had apparently been loaded with

bullets.

Some of the bullets hit Noble's Nissan Pathfinder, flattening three of the four tires.

More bullets hit the side of Noble's home but did not go through the outside wall.

The Noble's dog was hit by a piece of the bullet.

No one in the neighborhood heard any dogs bark and the sound of his car coming out of his tires.

Doan said that whoever fired the shots, was apparently on foot. No arrests have been made and the investigation continues.

At 7:30 on Friday and Saturday nights, the Mud Race will take place and on Thursday from 12 Noon to 4 p.m. Family Day will be held, when all rides on the Midway are 25 cents.

Detention Center garden may help cut food costs

It is growing season in Rockcastle County, whether it be gardens, tobacco, hay or even marijuana.

At the Rockcastle County Detention Center the preferred crop is a wide selection of vegetables in a huge garden on the outskirts of Mt. Vernon.

Rockcastle County Jailor James Miller said Monday that he was experimenting with the garden to see if it could save the local jail some money on food costs.

Because the local lock-up averages keeping 90 prisoners a day, food costs are a big portion of the jail's \$658,000 budget.

Miller said the garden was being grown, by one of the cooks, Rissie Ballinger and himself along with help from the work release prisoners.

"So far we have spent just \$91.00 on the garden and we hope to be able to harvest several thousand dollars worth of food from the garden," Miller

said.

The state will not allow Miller to cook or freeze any of the food grown, so it must be used when it is fresh.

"Anything we may have left over can be donated to a charity," he said.

Pot found Thursday

Kentucky State Police Detective Gary Lane is investigating a cultivating marijuana over five plants case, according to a news release from the Kentucky State Police in London.

Last Thursday at approximately 12:45 p.m., Kentucky State Police and deputies from the Rockcastle County Sheriff's office responded to a complaint of subjects growing marijuana at a residence five miles south of Mt. Vernon on the Jack Hard Road.

Nine plants were located, several

of which were in plain view, according to the news release.

The residents, Joleen and Bruce Shoemaker of Mt. Vernon, were not arrested, pending action of the Rockcastle County Grand Jury. The case is still under investigation, according to the news release.

Mrs. Shoemaker was a full-time dispatcher with the county's 911 system and has since resigned her position.

Legislative Update

State Rep. Danny Ford
November Ballots will decide fate of Railroad Commission - While both local and national media have focused on a number of Kentucky's highly contested congressional and legislative races this fall, there are certainly other races and issues appearing on ballots throughout the state.

According to the State of Board of Elections, there are approximately 25 candidacies for office this year in congressional, legislative and local races. Likewise, there are also local initiatives to decide such as the proposed merger of Jefferson County and Louisville.

In a repeat of 1998's General Election, Kentuckians will once again vote to decide if the General Assembly will meet annually in Regular Session as opposed to the current system of every other year. Another Constitutional Amendment on the ballot for November will allow voters to decide the fate of the Office of Railroad Commissioner.

The Commission is made up of three members who are elected every four years to represent one of the state's three Commission Districts. In our House District, Lincoln County is located in the 2nd Commission District while Rockcastle and Pulaski are located in the 3rd Railroad Commission District. Commissioners are paid \$3,000 per year and are reimbursed for any travel expenses that are related to their job duties. The Chairman of the Commission receives \$3,600. Currently, the Commission employs only one full-time staff person who serves as executive secretary.

The Commission does, however, employ an attorney and consultant on a contract basis. According to the

gentleman who holds the current contract, Steve Sanders, the total annual budget for the Commission is approximately \$70,000.

When the Commission was created in 1891 its responsibilities were much larger than they are today. Much of its original jurisdiction has been taken over by the federal government. Today's Commission members can investigate citizen and business complaints relating to public safety. However, the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet has authority over the railroad crossings, installation of safety lights and maintenance of cross arms. Commissioners may administer oaths in obtaining evidence and gathering information in regard to complaints.

Voters had similar opportunities to eliminate the Railroad Commission in 1973 and 1992. The question in 1973 differed from this year's because it was tied to an amendment that would have also replaced the elected position of Superintendent of Public Instruction with one appointed by a State Board of Education. That amendment failed to win approval by a vote of 186-157 to 159-000.

In 1992, the issue again appeared before voters. Like before, the issue was only part of an amendment that would have allowed gubernatorial appointment of the Secretary of State and Treasurer. That attempt also failed for the State Senate to approve the appointment of "inferior state officers and members of boards and commissions." Again, it failed by a vote of 64-708 to 408-234.

Interestingly, one of the most vocal proponents of eliminating the Commission is current Commissioner John E. Combs. Since being elected in 1987, Combs has consistently campaigned on the platform of abolishing the Railroad Commission. Proponents of this amendment have questioned whether the two previous attempts were because of public concern over eliminating the Superintendent of Public Instruction and giving the Governor the authority to name both the State Treasurer and Secretary of State.

On the other hand, opponents have argued that eliminating the office and moving the responsibilities of the Railroad Commission to a state agency would increase both the bureaucracy and ultimately the cost of carrying out its duties. Eliminating the Railroad Commission is just one of many topics we covered during the Regular Session and I will continue passing along more information about our bills that were enacted and how they will affect our State.

Hall of All Americans Will Suffer Mental Illness

"Why me?" Cecilia asked. (All characters are fictitious.) "Why am I the only one that I know who has ever been diagnosed with manic-depression? Everybody else seems healthy." John wondered about the same thing. "All my friends seem so well-adjusted, and I struggle just to get out of bed in the mornings," he declared. "Why am I the only one who suffers from depression?"

Stephen asked a similar question. "Other people drink and don't get depressed," he said. "Why do I have to be the one who becomes an alcoholic? None of my friends have had this problem." A 1998 study financed by the federal government shows that Cecilia, John and Stephen are not alone as they think they are. The study found mental illness more common than researchers had previously believed. According to this study, ALMOST HALF OF AMERICANS EXPERIENCE MENTAL ILLNESS AT SOME TIME IN THEIR LIVES. Almost one-third are afflicted in any given year.

Headed by Ken Kesler, a professor at the University of Michigan, this study involved interviews with 8,098 people ages 15 to 54. The researchers looked for four types of most common mental illnesses, including depression, manic-depression, alcohol and drug dependence, anxiety and panic disorders. Forty-eight percent of those interviewed had suffered from one of these illnesses at some point in their lives.

Some people experience multiple disorders. An anxiety disorder can lead to drinking which can lead to depression. Sometimes it is difficult

for the counselor or physician to know which to treat first.

I visited, with some of my extended family over the past weekend and listened to they talked about our family history. Depression, manic-depression, bulimia and alcohol dependence have all been a part of my family. One of my great-grandmothers died in what was then called the "insane asylum."

Most families can find at least some form of mental illness in the family tree. It is not something which to be ashamed. The stigma that has been attached to these kinds of "illnesses is not as strong as it once was. The "insane asylum" is gone, replaced by hospitals and treatment centers. Mental illness is not a sign of weakness nor a symptom of sin. It is an illness just as are diabetes and cancer.

Finding out about the prevalence of mental illness helped John to feel better. "I guess I'm not as alone as I thought I was," he remarked. "I've even discovered that my grandfather and one of my aunts also suffered from depression."

If half of all Americans suffer from mental illness at some point, this means that there are a large number of sufferers who are not getting help. They feel ashamed or do not understand what is happening to them, and they suffer in silence, not realizing that help is available. Physicians and counselors now know how to treat depression and other such illnesses. No one has to suffer alone and untreated.

As Cecilia said, "I'm just thankful my husband talked me into getting help." If he hadn't, I might not be alive today.

Child Abuse-A Matter of Fact

Why Adults Sexually Abuse Children

There are several theories why adults sexually molest children. These differences probably reflect the wide spectrum of personality types involved. The complexity of the problem, and the difference in types of sexual abuser which occur - from the sadistic "stranger" rape to the long-term incestual relationship. One theory sees child sexual abuse not as a sexual offense committed for sexual gratification, but as an act of power. The child abuser is characterized, for any number of reasons, by an inability to hold his own in an adult-to-adult relationship. To gain control, the abuser believes it is his right to use the bodies of children and that his needs come first, over the needs of those who are weak, defenseless and vulnerable. Some clinicians disagree with this theory they believe that to ignore the sexual aspect in treatment and prevention is to avoid the central issue. They believe that sexual abuse of children, regardless of the form it takes, is a sexual act which results in sexual gratification for the perpetrator.

There is a recognized clinical condition, pedophilia, which describes a persistent and long-term sexual interest with children or have co-existing sexual relationships with adults of his/her same age group. An examination of the wide difference in opinion regarding the causes of child sexual abuse is im-

portant because of two reasons. First, the inability to identify the right or wrong approach brings attention to the human factor in child sexual abuse. Each case, each incident is unique, characterized by the individuals involved. The facts, there is no one cause or reason for child sexual abuse. Second, there is no easy solution to difficult problems. We do not have all of the answers, and there is still much work to be done for children, their families and people who sexually abuse children. Vinegar

When you think of vinegar, you probably think of food. But vinegar has many uses related to clothing care and personal grooming.

To add shine to your patent leather shoes, moisten a soft cloth with white vinegar and wipe your shoes. When letting out a seam or hem, dampen a cloth with white vinegar and place it under the section to be pressed. Pressing will remove holes and stitch marks.

To remove slight scorch from fabrics, lightly rub white vinegar on the fabric; then wipe with a soft, clean cloth.

Creases will remain longer in slacks if you use a pressing cloth dampened with a solution of one-part white vinegar and two-thirds water. Place a brown paper bag over the crease while pressing.

Vinegar also can help your nail polish last longer. Dip fingernails in a solution of two teaspoons of white vinegar to half a cup of warm water.

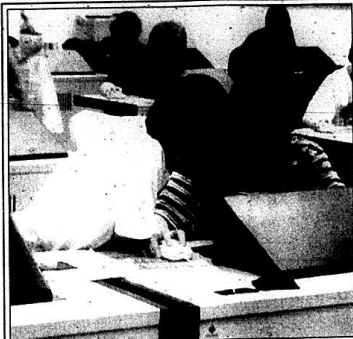
Dry hands aid nails, then apply nail polish.

To remove soapy film from your hair after shampooing, rinse hair in a solution of one tablespoon of white vinegar to one cup of water. Your hair will feel soft and clean.

You can relieve itching from wasp stings, bruises, chapped hands, hives or sunburn by applying white vinegar to the spot.

Remove deodorant and antiperspirant stains on washable clothing by rubbing the stain with white vinegar before laundering. Test the vinegar on a seam first to make sure the dye doesn't change color.

To eliminate mothball odor from stored garments, hang them in the bathroom. Fill the tub with hot water, add one quart of vinegar and close the door. Remove clothing from the bathroom after the water has cooled. You shouldn't be able to smell the vinegar or mothballs.

Slime Molds: Return of the Blob

Slime molds have been common in the last few weeks in the lawn and landscape as well as other settings. Slime molds are fungal-like organisms that live in thatch, mulch, and the upper layer of soil. Their body (called a "plasmodium") is an "amoeboid" mass of protoplasm that creeps along unseen most of the time, much like the Blob of science fiction movies but on a smaller scale. The plasmodium feeds on bits of decaying organic matter and on microorganisms present in their environment. Thus, slime molds are not parasites of plants.

When the plasmodium is triggered to sporulate, it creeps into some position where it is exposed to light

and air movement—such as on the surface of mulch, on tips of grass leaf blades, or on branches in contact with the soil. There the plasmodium turns itself entirely into crusty structures of spore-bearing bodies, many of which can be best appreciated with a hand lens. The microscopic spores are spread by the wind and rain to new locations, where they can form a new plasmodium.

The fruiting structures of slime molds may be easily removed from plant surfaces. Rubbing, lightly sweeping, or spraying with a hose are easy ways to remove them. As mentioned above, slime molds are not parasitic. No control is necessary for slime molds.



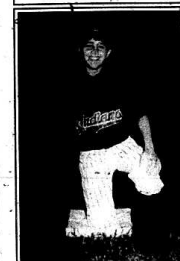

City of Brodhead Drinking Water Quality Report

The Brodhead Water Works and The Brodhead Council are proud to present to you our second annual water report. This report will be provided to you each year. This report is designed to inform you about our water and services we deliver to you every day. Our everyday goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We continually try to improve our process and protect our water resources. Every water company is dedicated to ensuring the quality of water that we provide to you and your family. The Brodhead Water Works purchases water from the City of Mt. Vernon, which is treated surface water from Lake Lanville, located at Renfro Valley.

I, Mayor Walter Cash, am pleased to report that our drinking water is safe and meets federal and state requirements. I'm pleased to inform you that we will continue our best efforts, to supply you with excellent water quality.

If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact Carlos Caldwell at 606-758-9866, or Rebecca Buswell at 606-758-8633, between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. We will also provide to you a copy of our water report in its entirety upon request. This is available at City Hall, located at 7 West Main Street in Brodhead. Each person is a valued customer and we want you to be informed about our water utility. If you want to learn more you may also attend any of our regular meetings. Regular meetings are held on the second Monday night each month, at City Hall at 7:00 p.m.

Brodhead Water Works routinely monitors for constituents in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws, as does our water supply system, Mt. Vernon Water Works. The following table shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1, 1999 to December 31, 1999. Some dates are from testing in 1997, these are noted by dates and are required by law only every 3 years. All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some constituents. It's important to remember that the presence of these constituents does not necessarily pose a health risk.

In the following table, you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

- AL= Action Level
- MCL= Maximum Contaminant Level
- MCLG= Maximum Contaminant Level goal
- MFL= Million fibers per liter
- MG= Milligrams per liter
- NIU= Nephelometric turbidity unit
- PCU/l= picocuries per liter (a measure of radioactivity)
- PPM= parts per million, or milligrams per liter (mg/l)
- PPB= parts per billion, or micrograms per liter (ug/l)
- PPt= parts per trillion, or nanograms per liter
- PPq= parts per quadrillion, or picograms per liter
- TT= Treatment Technique
- Non-Detects (ND)- laboratory analysis indicated that the constituents is not present.
- Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l) - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000,000.
- Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter - one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.
- Parts per trillion (ppt) or Nanograms per liter (nanograms/l) - one part per trillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000,000.
- Parts per quadrillion (ppq) or Picograms per liter (picograms/l) - one part per quadrillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000,000 years, or one penny in \$10,000,000,000,000.
- Picocuries per liter (pCi/L), picocuries per liter is a measure of the radioactivity in water.
- Millirems per year (mrem/yr) - measure of radiation absorbed by the body.
- Million Fibers per Liter (MFL) - million fibers per liter is a measure of the presence of asbestos fibers that are longer than 10 micrometers.
- Nephelometric Turbidity Units (NTU) - nephelometric turbidity unit is a measure of the clarity of water. Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is just noticeable to the average person.
- Variance & Exemptions (V&E) - State or EPA permission not to meet an MCL or a treatment technique under certain conditions. (Only systems with a variance or exemption are REQUIRED to include this definition. In addition, it is REQUIRED to provide an explanation of the reasons for the variance or exemption, date issued, status or reauthorization.)
- Action Level - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.
- Treatment Technique (TT) (mandatory language) a treatment technique is a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.
- Maximum Contaminant Level - (mandatory language) the "Maximum Allowed" (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCL's are set close to the MCLG's as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

All drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 800-426-4791.

MCL's are set at very stringent levels. To understand the possible health effects described for many regulated constituents, a person would have to drink 2 liters of water every day at the MCL level for a lifetime to have a one-in-a-million chance of having the described health effect.

As our water supplier, Mt. Vernon Water Works, and your local water supplier, Brodhead Water Works maintains a continuing effort to have a safe and dependable water supply. It may be necessary at times to make improvements in the water system. At the present time the water plant, Mt. Vernon Water Works, located at Renfro Valley is being upgraded from 1.7 million gallons per day to 4 million gallons per day.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons, such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk from cryptosporidium and other waterborne microbiological contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline. The number to reach the Safe Drinking Water Hotline is 800-426-4791.

Total Coliform:
The Total Coliform Rule requires water systems to meet a stricter limit for coliform bacteria. Coliform bacteria are usually harmless, but their presence in water can be an indication of disease-causing bacteria. When coliform bacteria are found, special follow-up tests are done to determine if harmful bacteria are present in the water supply. If the limit is exceeded, the water supplier, such as the public in newspaper, television or radio. To comply with the stricter regulation, we have increased the average amount of chlorine in the distribution system.

Nitrates:
As a precaution we always notify physicians and health care providers in this area if test is over a higher than normal level of nitrates in the water supply.

Lead:

Lead in drinking water is rarely the sole cause of lead poisoning, but it can add to a person's total lead exposure. All potential sources of lead in the household should be identified and removed, replaced or reduced.

Mayor Cash and the Employees of the Brodhead Water Works, work with continuing effort to provide top quality water to every tap in our system. We ask that all customers help us protect our water sources, which are the heart of our community, our way of life and our children's future.

Some people who drink water containing trihalomethanes in excess of the MCL over many years experience problems with their liver, kidneys, or central nervous systems, and may have increased risk of getting cancer.

MCL's are set at very stringent levels. To understand the possible health effects described for many regulated constituents, a person would have to drink 2 liters of water every day at the MCL level for a lifetime to have a one-in-a-million chance of having the described health effect.

A special alert: The water system was not certified until November 1996 that some of the sampling, monitoring, and reporting conducted by the water system had been rejected by the Federal EPA. This has resulted in a violation. Monitoring had been performed in 1998 for the same parameters and all results indicated undetectable values. Monitoring for the full list of constituents will continue in the future.
