## Drug testing for athletes begins on August 1

Drug testing for Rockcastle County High School athletes will be held on August 1 and 2 at the Rockcastle County High School, according to Rockcastle County Director of Student Services Loreita Powell.

Rockcastle County High School athletic director and football coach Tom Larkey said that football players and golfers would be tested on August 1, and that cheerleaders and members of the cross-country team will be tested on August 2.

The testing will take place from 8 a.m. to 12 noon.

Larkey said that all students participating in a high school sport, regardless of age, will be tested.

Any athlete that refuses to be tested, or simply does not show up for the test will be declared ineligible.

At Thursday night's meeting of the Rockcastle School Board, the board accepted the bid of Forward Edge, a Lexington company, who will do the drug test. The cost will be \$20 per test.

The board also discussed the construction of the new Brodhead School building.

Bids for the project will be opened on August 3 at 2 p.m. at the Central office.

The new building is scheduled to be occupied by the beginning of school in 2001.

## Local man pleads guilty

A Mt. Vernon man pled guilty Wednesday in Rockcastle District Court to possession of a scheduled three narcotic, criminal trespassing and theft by unlawful taking.

Jeff Winstead, 29, of Purr Rigby Road, who was arrested May 27 in Mt. Vernon, along with Donnie Lunsford, 25, of Mt. Vernon by Mt. Vernon police will serve no time in jail, for his guilty plea.

According to court records, Winstead will be placed on two years probation, will serve 60 hours of community service, which will include speaking at local schools concerning the adverse affects of drugs. He will also be required to spend 30 days in a drug treatment program and submit to a urine test every 30 days.

According to the order, Winstead will also be required to continue to cooperate with police in an ongoing criminal investigation.

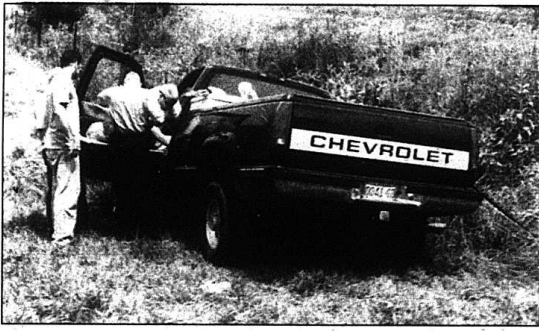
Lunsford, who has been held in the Rockcastle Detention Center since his arrest in May, awaits proceedings in district court.

## Magistrates and Judge named in Dog suit

A lawsuit filed against the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court last week, apparently made members stand up and take notice, concerning their obligation to take care of stray dogs in the county.

The Trixie Foundation, a group which looks after the well being of stray dogs in the state of Kentucky and several individuals, including Mrs. Mary VanWinkle of Copper Creek, filed suit in Franklin Circuit Court listing a total of 397 defendants.

Among those named in the suit were Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlolfs and all five magistrates: John Holbrook, Jack Bradley, Bill McKinney, Fred Mullins, Jr., and Donald Bullock.

Kentucky's Commissioner of Agricultural Billy Ray Smith was also named in the suit.

The lawsuit alleges that the county judge/executives and magistrates in 70 counties, along with Smith, are in non-compliance or "sham" compliance with Kentucky's animal control and welfare statutes.

According to a release from the Trixie Foundation, the suit was filed after the Foundation researched the stray dog problem in Kentucky for the past four years.

Currently the county employees a dog warden in Harlan "Buck" Farthing, but they have no dog pound.

Rockcastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carlolfs said Wednesday that although the county currently had no dog pound, it was the court's position that they were named in the suit in error.

"It is up to the Commissioner of Agricultural to correct any actions of a fiscal court, which is incorrectly enforcing the laws concerning stray dogs," Carlolfs said.

"We have never heard anything from the Commissioner, so therefore we must have been acting correctly," he said.

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeffrey T. Burdette, who is in the process of answering the suit, agreed with Carlolfs about the actions of the Commissioner of Agricultural.

Burdette has urged the fiscal court on several occasions to contract with another county to house stray dogs or begin building a facility of their own, so they would be in complete compli-

ance with state law.

But on Tuesday, Burdette said, "It is ridiculous to assert lack of compliance with the law when a county has interpreted their duty and with it complied legally as evidenced by the Commissioner's lack of enforcement against the county."

"If the commissioner is of a mind to enforce dog laws, that's fine, but we contest the authority of the Trixie Foundation and the other plaintiffs in telling the county how to interpret the law pertaining to stray dogs," Burdette said.

Although Carlolfs and Burdette claim the county was sued in error, on Tuesday the court passed several motions concerning the handling of stray dogs in the county.

The court will establish a new phone just for the dog warden.

A county employee will man the phone line eight hours a day five days a week—the rest of the time the caller will get an answering machine.

The county will establish a \$500 line of credit for the purchase of dog food so the dog warden does not have to pay for it out of his pocket.

The court also voted to offer the Rockcastle Adoption Agency for Pets both labor and materials toward the construction of a new animal shelter in the Roundstone area of the county, but not near Roundstone School.

The court also agreed to let RAAP use county equipment during the construction of the shelter and they also discussed the possibility of using inmates from the Rockcastle Detention Center to help at the shelter after it is completed.

RAAP representative Terry Lunce said she was happy with the county's offer, but that until the shelter is completed, RAAP has absolutely no way to look after the well being of any animal.

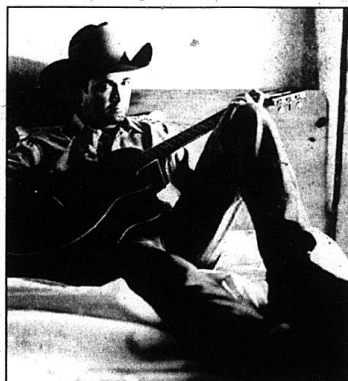
"The only service RAAP is presently able to provide for unclaimed animals is to advertise looking for homes, or refer those finding strays to other county shelters," Mrs. Lunce said.

"Because most of the 250-plus calls we have received so far this year cannot pay an admission fee to any out of county shelter, or transport found animals, or keep them in their own homes, the majority of Rockcastle County's unclaimed pet population continues to starve, get killed on our scenic roadways, or gang up on livestock populations, trying to survive," Lunce said.

Rockcastle Adoption Agency for Pets members and supporters would

Everyone gathered in the street and craned their necks upward to get a glimpse of that new flying machine. Another miracle before my very eyes, "a real live man flying in a contraption made by man."

It was years before I was privileged to soar up into the heavens on one of them and watch the earth below become a speck as we drifted into the clouds. Changes! Oh yes, and everyone of them a miracle to a little girl from Kentucky, trying to learn what progress was about. Looking back from where I am now I see it as an exciting time and I wish I could remember more of it.

Then there were other changes that influenced my life. The automobile was becoming popular and every family wanted one. I remember the first one my brother, Jim brought home one day. Since we had never even been close to one before we thought it was the greatest thing in the world. It was a Metz and the motor was driven with a chain that fastened to the rear part and connected to the motor/some way. I didn't know anything about the way it operated then and still don't. All I know is it had four wheels with tires on them and had a motor that made a loud noise when it was cranked up front and took off when Jim got inside and started it out of the yard. But the automobile and we kids couldn't wait to ride in it. And I don't remember ever doing so. From the first experience I don't think we were ever without a car of some kind. Yet my dad never learned to drive. He could tear one apart and rebuild it till it was as good as new but to get behind the wheel and drive, uh-huh.

Then highways were built. I watched them grow from a two lane winding road to six lane expressways connecting every state and with interchanges that cover miles of what

am hard to fit, but so far in life I have always dressed appropriately. So, since I have always liked to shop in Somerset, that is where we headed for. The first one we went to, no such size as petite 18 in stock. We went down the list of my favorite dress shops, the same answer. One place had one I liked and would have suited the occasion, but it had a big flaw across the back. Belts, I have always found my size there, had one in my size. I bought it although it was not the dressy one I was looking for. After visiting every dress shop in town with no results we had a late

lunch and came home. The next day we began again in another direction. We were sure we could find a simple long dress to wear to a wedding there. 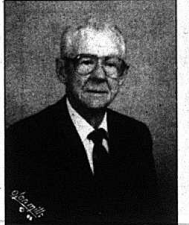

#### Southern Pine Beetle



Kentucky forest are being invaded by the Southern Pine Beetle and experiencing damage to southern pines. Shortleaf pine, Virginia pine, pitch pine, loblolly pine, and occasionally eastern white pine are being affected.

The adult southern pine beetles can easily detect weakened trees because these trees emit a different set of chemicals into the air compared to healthy trees. The adults essentially swarm weakened trees. The adult beetles bore into trees and emit chemicals which attract other adults. Once the adults overcome the tree, they lay eggs and the larva feed on the inner bark killing the tree, as if you had girdled the trunk. Once the tree shows signs of attack, it is usually at a point where it can not be saved. These trees should be removed and destroyed. Spread of the beetles usually occurs from a single attacked tree or group of trees. If dead or dying trees are found to be infested with the southern pine beetle, these trees should be removed as well as other trees surrounding them. Many pine trees have been stressed due to the drought of last year and are extremely susceptible to attack. Breakage due to winter ice storms also adds to the problem.

The insect is indigenous and populations levels are cyclical. Populations tend to reach epidemic proportions in Kentucky at approximately 20 to 25 year intervals. The Daniel Boone National Forest is currently working on sanitation projects on their property in southeastern Kentucky. ### You Can Control High Blood Pressure

What is blood pressure? It is the force created by your heart as it pumps blood to all parts of your body. Therefore, we all have a blood pressure.

When you have a blood pressure reading of 140/90 or greater on several successive occasions, you have high blood pressure. The heart must pump with more force and the arteries carry blood that is moving under greater pressure. If this continues for a long time, the heart and the arteries may not function as well as they should. Other organs may also be affected increasing the risk of stroke, heart failure, kidney failure and heart attack.

About 27 percent of women age 18 to 74 have high blood pressure. Most post-menopausal women are particularly at risk, since more than half of all women over age 55 have high blood pressure. In fact, women over 65 are more likely to develop high blood pressure than are men.

Most people with high blood pressure have no symptoms at all. There are no specific warning signs.

The only way to find out if you have high blood pressure is to have your blood pressure checked.

If you have high blood pressure, you can do a great deal to reduce it. First work with your physician to determine the best treatment for you. Then follow these "Ten Commandments" developed by the American Heart Association:


1. Know your blood pressure and have it checked regularly.
2. Know what your weight should be. Keep it at or below that level.
3. Don't use excessive salt in cooking or at meals. Avoid salty foods.
4. Eat a low-fat diet following the American Heart Association recommendations.
5. Don't smoke cigarettes.
6. Take your medicine exactly as prescribed. Don't run out of pills even for a single day.
7. Keep your appointments with your physician.
8. Follow your physician's advice about exercise.
9. Live a normal life in every other way.

The maximum combined payment per farm is \$5,500. Sheep and lamb farmers whose gross income for 1999 was greater than \$2.5 million are not eligible for payments.

Pasture Recovery Program (PRP)

USDA's Farm Service Agency Administrator Keith Kelly has announced that about \$40 million will be issued to producers under the Pasture Recovery Program (PRP).

PRP was established to help farmers whose pastures were severely damaged by drought in 1999 restorable forage crops.

Eligible land included pasture which was normally grazed by livestock, but was so damaged by drought that seeding was required to reestablish the forage crop.

County FSA offices conducted a sign-up from March 20 to June 23, 2000. Since the producer demand exceeded the amount of funds available by approximately \$14 million, a national factor was applied to all requests.

Consequently, producers will receive about 73.5 percent of the amount they qualified for under PRP. Payments will be made by county FSA offices in mid-July provided the reseeded has been established successfully.

All producers who share in burley tobacco either by owning land with quota, land producing quota or by actually producing quota shall be eligible for TLA-P on the 2000 effective quota. Signup should begin in August with payments being issued possibly in October. Watch for further details!

**Loan Deficiency Payment**  
 Producers who retain beneficial interest in a commodity eligible for a loan or a loan deficiency payment (LDP) are eligible for payment if all of the following remain with the producer.

- Control of the commodity
  - Risk of loss
  - Title of the commodity
- One of the eligibility requirements for Loans and LDP's is the crop must have been produced on contract average (AMTA), exception to soybeans.

A recent bill will not allow non-contract crops to be eligible for LDP's for 2000 year only.

**Lamb Meat Adjustment Assistance Program (LMAAP)**  
 As part of the Clinton Administration's three-year, \$100 million assistance plan to help U.S.

sheep and lamb farmers, Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced today that sheep and lamb producers will receive a total of \$30 million in direct cash payments to help improve their production efficiency and the marketability of lamb meat.

Signup for the program began June 19th.

During the first year of the program (July 21, 1999-Sept. 30, 2000) payments may be made for three types of payments:

- Ram payment-payment rate of \$100 per ram purchased during Year 1, 90 days or older at time of purchase, intended for breeding purpose and owned by the operation of at least 90 days.

• Sheep Improvement Program payment-payment rate is \$50 per enrolled sheep and sheep must be enrolled in an authorized sheep improvement program (NSIP).

• Facility Improvement Payment-payment rate is 20% of the total cost

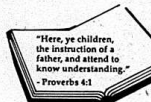

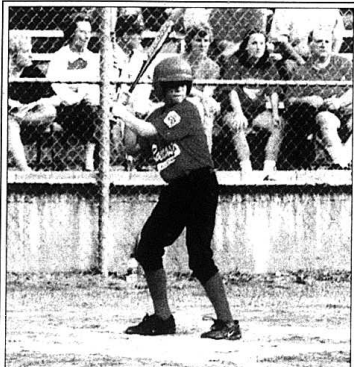

The land for the shelter was donated.

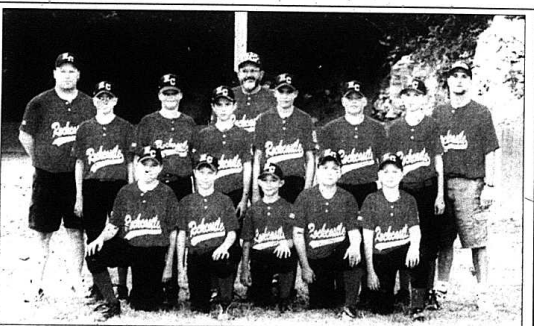
