## Legislative Update

By State Rep. Danny Ford. Almost four months after the 2000 Session ended, debate continues as to the value of legislation passed by the Kentucky General Assembly. A look at several new laws shows that this session could reap benefits for law-abiding citizens but certainly be expensive for criminals. Several important laws take effect this month addressing the issue of crime.

House Bill 4 tackled identity theft, which many experts say is the fastest growing crime in America. The measure addresses instances in which people wrongfully obtain another individual's name, social security number, bank account numbers, etc. and use them in obtaining a new credit card, accessing existing credit cards, getting cell phone service, opening a new bank account, and securing loans. An estimated 500,000 people will unknowingly fall victim to this kind of crime this year.

Thanks to House Bill 4, perpetrators will now face felony charges of identity theft. First time offenses will be punishable by up to a five-year sentence and a \$10,000 fine. Manufacturing or trafficking stolen identities will also be a felony punishable by up to 10 years and a \$10,000 fine. In addition, the law allows victims to file financial restitution for unlawful account and card changes as well as any losses associated with restoring their credit history.

The General Assembly also passed Senate Bill 263, which stiffens penalties for criminals using drugs or illegal substances to commit rape and sexual assault. This law prohibits shock probation and limits availability of probation for violent offenders. It also strengthens efforts to notify communities when a sex offender moves into the area through creation of a Kentucky State Police website listing offenders and their locations.

According to the Kentucky State Police, alcohol was involved in 5,222 traffic accidents in this state in 1998 alone, 187 of those fatal. Those same accidents resulted in 208 deaths and 3,882 accidents. In an attempt to hold drivers accountable, the General Assembly passed House Bill 366 lowering the legal limit of the blood

alcohol level to .08. Congress will likely do the same within the year. Penalties for habitual offenders will also increase. Once again, the legislature has moved to ensure that those convicted of a crime simply be held responsible for their actions.

With the growing incidents in identity theft, an increased focus on sex crimes, as well as the on-going effort to combat drunk driving, the 2000 Session was successful with passage of measures that address these important issues. The General Assembly has taken additional steps to ensure that crime doesn't pay, but that criminals do!

Most of the legislation enacted during the 2000 session of the General Assembly went into effect this month. ## "What Is Written"

We have been studying the past few weeks concerning the idea of the pattern or blueprint for N.T. Christianity. Last time we saw in Jn 4:23-24 that we are to worship in spirit and in truth. Let's look at the 5 acts of worship described under N.T. order.

In Acts 2:42&47 we read, "And they continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and in prayers... Praising God, and having favour with all the people. And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved." Here we have the 5 acts listed in 2 short verses.

1. **Apostolic Doctrine** The inspired teachings of the apostles is to be preached and taught "So, as much as in me is, I am ready to preach the gospel to you that are at Rome also." Rom 1:15. Not the catechisms, creeds, traditions of men, the writings of the "church fathers", the decrees of the Pope, (ad nauseam) are to be taught.

2. **Fellowship** Fellowship carries the idea of sharing, giving a share, having a share. This involves the saints giving to the work of the Lord. In 1 Cor 16:1-2 we read, "Now concerning the collection for the saints, as I have given order to the churches of Galatia, even so do ye: Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store, as God hath prospered him, that there be no gatherings when I come." So we see the pattern for giving was to be done on the first day of the week by the saints. Not to go and beg the community, nor to establish some church business to make money nor to take up nightly collections.

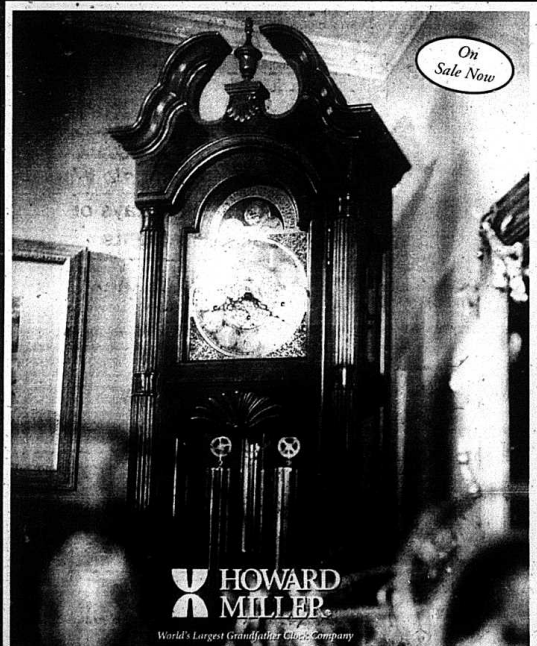

## What Motivates Abusers?

Norm abuses his wife. (All characters are fictitious.) He is fifty years old and holds a responsible position in his community. Most of the abuse is verbal, though he has pushed her and kicked her a couple of times in the last few years. He often calls her fat, lazy and other names that cannot be printed here. When she talks of leaving him, he threatens that he "won't give her a dime." Since she is dependent on him for money, she stays.

Sam also abuses his wife. He is worse when he is drinking or doing cocaine. Sam has not held a steady job in years and requires his wife to work. She gives him her money, and he pays the bills, sometimes. He broke her jaw last year, but she lied and told the doctor that she fell. He tells her that if she ever leaves him, he will kill her. Not surprisingly, she stays.

What motivates abusers like Norm and Sam? Why would someone deliberately hurt the woman he says he loves?

The primary motivation for most abusers is THEIR OWN INSECURITY. They feel so uncertain about themselves that they think they must hold onto their spouses to keep them from leaving. The verbal abuse and the hitting are designed to keep the

woman close by. "Keep her feeling bad enough, and she'll stay" is their motto.

Most abusers are emotionally dependent on their victims. They feel they cannot live without their women and must keep them close at all costs. When the woman leaves, an abuser may fall apart emotionally. He will visit everyone he knows, crying and telling them how much he loves her and how much he wants her back. He

is devastated because the woman on whom he is emotionally dependent has left, and he will do anything to get her back.

Another motivation for abusers is anger. Most abusers are very angry and do not know how to deal with that feeling. The anger is so strong that it will come out no matter how the victim behaves. She may feel it is something that she does to provoke the anger, but that is not true. The anger is there and it will come out, usually at the person closest to the abuser. More and more courts are ordering abusers into anger management classes to deal with this part of the problem.

The anger of the abuser may be a symptom of depression. I have seen abusers who have become considerably less angry when treated for depression with medication and counseling. Most abusers refuse treatment except under court order. Abusers usually do not see that they have a problem, preferring to blame the abuse on the victim!

Why are these men angry? Sometimes it is because they have themselves been abused as children. Not every abuser grew up in an abusive home, but many did. When Dad beat them, they could do nothing about it. Naturally they felt hurt and anger but no outlet for these feelings. The anger built up until as an adult they began to take it out on others.

Alcohol and drugs do not cause abuse, but they can worsen the problem. Alcohol loosens his inhibitions so the abuser may demonstrate his anger more forcibly than when he is sober. Other drugs seem to intensify the anger. An angry man who drinks or does drugs is a disaster waiting to happen.

Again the primary motivation for abusers is their own insecurity. They will do whatever they can to control their spouses and keep them at home.

## DUI convictions here above state average

Most Rockcastle Countians won't even remember but, it wasn't too many years ago (1991) that a special prosecutor and judge were appointed to Rockcastle County to help clean up the back log of Drunk Driving cases in Rockcastle District Court. But now, according to a story in Sunday's *Lexington Herald-Leader*, if you are arrested on a drunk driving charge in Rockcastle County there is an eight out of ten chance you will be convicted.

The story centered mainly on the lack of DUI convictions in some Kentucky counties and it highlighted the counties with the most dismissed and amended cases.

Rockcastle County was not one of those counties. The statewide average for conviction of those charged with drunk driving is about 68 percent. Rockcastle County's DUI conviction rate is currently 77 percent.

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette, who has aggressively prosecuted DUI offenders since taking office in 1994, said that he hopes people understand all the facts surrounding dismissal or amendment of a DUI case, something the *Herald-Leader* didn't do in their story.

Burdette admitted that it is apparent in some counties that Judges and prosecutors seem to be lax, when it comes to enforcing the law, but he said in Rockcastle County that isn't the case.

"Not every case is a sure fire conviction - there are often time problems with the arrest and in some cases a breath test is lower than the legal limit of .10 or a urine test or blood test comes back flawed," he said.

"None of that was pointed out in Sunday's story," Burdette said. But Mike Fox, the County Attorney in Carter County and President

of the Kentucky County Attorney Association, had some harsher comments about the *Herald-Leader* story.

"I can't believe the *Herald-Leader* wasn't more accurate in its story - It is hard to be objective if they would print only one side of an issue and misconstrue the facts the way they have," he said.

Fox said that in his court he had a DUI case where a defendant had a reading of 0.00 on a breath test. "I had no choice but to dismiss that case because there wasn't any evidence to

get a conviction, but that case was included in the *Herald-Leader*'s statistics.

"The county attorney association in Kentucky realizes the importance of getting drunk drivers off the road and in the vast majority of cases, Judges and prosecutors work hard to gain convictions," he said.

Fox also pointed out that prosecutors have an obligation under state law to uphold justice for all.

"When there is a mistake made on a DUI case we have to make that

fact known to the defense, we have a dual role which requires us to make sure the right thing is done," he said.

As for Rockcastle, Fox said he thought the system was working.

"Mr. Burdette took over a somewhat difficult situation and in his first year, in office he had gained over twice as many convictions as his predecessor and in his first four years in office 907 people were convicted of DUI compared to 396 the previous four years.

Burdette also chaired the county

attorney's associations DUI committee which made recommendations to the state legislature on how to more effectively prosecute DUI offenders.

One final note: in comparison, in Pulaski County one of three DUI cases are either amended or dismissed," he said.

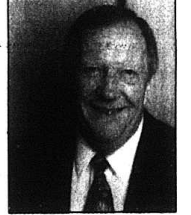
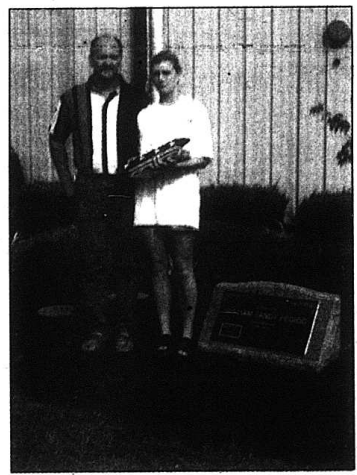
The same judges, Mike Henry and Walter McGuire, preside over Pulaski and Rockcastle.

But in Pulaski, Fred Niekirk is responsible for prosecuting DUI offenders.

Burdette said that prosecutors

have different cases with different facts, different officers of various types of training that result in different statistics. "We are pleased with our numbers, but we will not criticize other courts which have different cases," he said.

In October, the law concerning driving under the influence will change. Drivers who have been drinking will be assumed to be under the influence if their breath test shows a reading of .08, down from the current level of .10.

## Funds will help teens who are using drugs

Family Court Judge Debra Lambert has announced that federal grant monies have been awarded to fund a juvenile drug court in Lincoln. Pulaski and Rockcastle counties according to a news release. Judge Lambert applied for the funding after seeing scores of children in Family Court who had substance abuse issues or no reasonable means of overcoming their addictions. "I was amazed at the number of children in juvenile court for truancy, runaway or beyond control cases who were off-track because of drugs. The problem is severe."

Judge Lambert began looking for a means of rehabilitating these children and applied for funding to pay for drug tests and a drug court coordinator to administer the program. The juvenile drug court is a judge led rehabilitation for non-violent juvenile offenders. Judges volunteer their time and lead the very intensive program.

"It is not a get-out-of-jail-free card," Lambert said. Frequent drug tests, court appearances, as well as school attendance and substance abuse counseling, not just for the child, but for the whole family, are required.

Local agencies have committed to offering the needed services and Lambert looks forward to getting the court up and running as soon as possible. She knows that the job is a difficult one, however, particularly because young substance abusers are often resistant to ending their addiction because they have not yet formed the foundation belief that drugs are wrong.

"I am so excited about having the tools with which to work on the problem. I learned of the funding on the same day I received a juvenile's positive drug test for PCP, an extremely dangerous drug. While I was wondering what in the world I could do to help him, I got the phone call."

Lambert said. Congressman Hal Rogers has been a strong advocate of drug courts, having worked to increase the national drug court budget to \$40 million this year and Governor Paul E. Patton approved the award of the grant funds to be administered under the Byrne Grant program.

Additionally, Kentucky's drug court programs have won national awards for their successful treatment of addicted individuals, helping them to restore themselves to productive, non-criminal members of society.

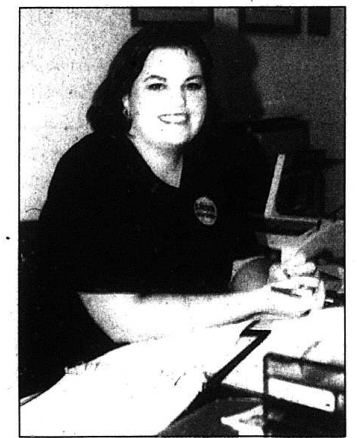

Mrs. Robbins had served as librarian for the ten years, when she took over for Mrs. Alleyne Davis.

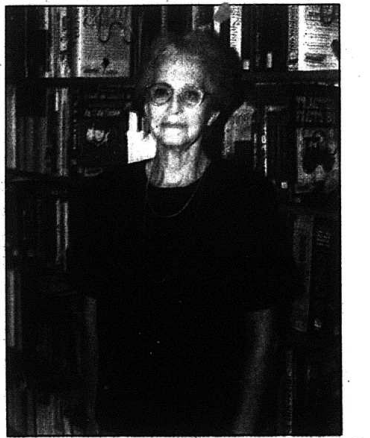
Before that, Mrs. Robbins operated the county's bookmobile for eighteen years.

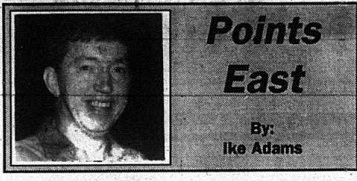
"A lot of older people refuse to learn about computers and how to use them, but in my position I simply told myself that I had to do it and I did," she said.

# Points East

We had two big green Army helicopters flying low over Paint Lick last weekend and everybody was all agitated and up in arms because they thought it was the pot busters. Folks were justifiably upset with the indignation that some body here in the valley might be growing a marijuana patch. The purpose of my column this week is to set the record straight because we're pretty sure there's no pot growing within half a mile of Paint Lick.

Saturday, July 29 from 4 till 8 p.m., on the creek bank behind our clubhouse here in town. At five bucks a head (3 for kids) it will be the best deal on gourmet seafood in the nation. And I really do apologize to you Mountain Eagle readers for not letting you know about it until after the fact. I think you'll be impressed anyway and the next time I will get notice out a bit more timely because I know you will not want to miss it.

The Army was not looking for pot anyway. They were looking for the Paint Lick Sportsman's Club so they could deliver fish.

Years ago a couple of our club members were in combat in Europe during World War II and they hooked up with a company of soldiers from St. Lawrence Island which is located in the northern part of the Bering Sea between Alaska and Russia and got to swapping fish tales. To make a long story short, after the war was

over the guys from Alaska sent a big cooler full of red perch filets heated from the cold and pure Arctic waters back to Paint Lick and our guys sent them a big load of Kentucky River, flathead catfish.

It's a tradition that lives on to this day and that's what the helicopters were doing last weekend. They had flown all the way from Alaska to deliver the fish that we'll be frying up this weekend. And if you saw them over at Booneboro State Park, don't be worried. They were picking up catfish to take back to St. Lawrence Island. In the meantime we've been thawing the perch filets all week-over 500 pounds of them-because they arrive so cold it takes that long to get them limber enough to fry.

The last time we had a fish fry somebody from London wanted to know where we'd bought the meat to make the hush puppies because they were, by far, the best he'd ever eaten and I thought Smith Ledford was going to whip him on the spot. You see, the meat can't be bought. We have contacts up in Harlan County who grow a secret strain of white hickory cane corn that will not produce except in certain bottom land on the upper Cumberland River. A fellow up there has a mule powered mill and a special stone carved out of a cliff on Pine Mountain that is only used to grind our corn. Smith has just enough ground to make hush puppies for our fish fries.

We have another guy who spends the entire month of June traveling across Texas buying sweet onions that win blue ribbons at county fairs and that's another ingredient of the hush puppies. I can't tell you why because I'd be getting to close to divulging the secret recipe.

Another one of our members is in Idaho this week, also at county fairs, buying the best spuds known to man. These will be sliced, deep fried, so as not to waste a morsel and served along with cole slaw to complete the meal.

And speaking of cole slaw, do not make an idiot of yourself and ask for the recipe at the big event. Only one fellow knows where the cabbage comes from, but we suspect that it is also from Alaska and shipped along with the fish. After all, then, were two helicopters hovering around last weekend.

The slaw recipe is kept in a vault and no single person knows the entire combination. When it comes time to make sure the recipe is being followed correctly, six guys line up outside the room the vault is kept in

and enter, one at a time, to dial in a single number. Smith Ledford goes in last and makes sure he has the recipe committed to memory. He then calls 11 people who arrive at his house separately, each with a single ingredient for the slaw which mixes in his basement under armed guard.

Similar secrets are closely guarded for the batter recipe and the source of the special oil in which the fish and hush-puppies are fried. Custom-made brass gas burners forged in the Adirondacks are used to maintain even heat on the deep fryers and only a couple of people know the precise temperature the oil must reach before a fillet can be dropped into it.

If you ever attend a Paint Lick Sportsman's Club fish fry you may think that it looks like a bunch of guys casually hunkered around a bunch of pots frying fish and stuff, but now you know the rest of the story. If you can't or didn't make this one, we hope to have another when the second crop of onions comes in this Fall in Texas. I promise I'll give you longer notices.

And whether or not you believe any of the rest of the story, I swear we are having a fish fry late this Saturday (July 29) afternoon and I promise that you won't be sorry if you show up because you will not leave hungry.

## Our Readers Write

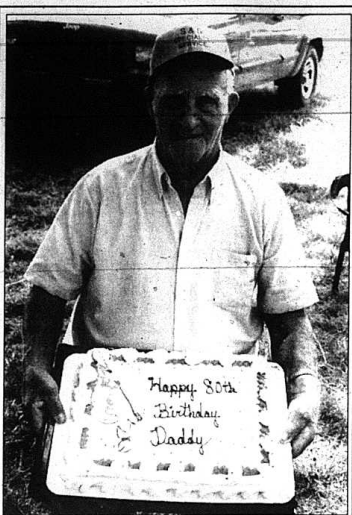

### Agricultural News

**Phase II Applications**  
All recipients of 1999 Phase II tobacco settlement supplemental applications need to submit applications by July 31, 2000. If a farm operator did not submit an application for compensation by October 8, 1999 and has failed to receive a supplemental 1999 Phase II tobacco settlement application by Wednesday, July 26th, please call 1-800-732-9955. For prompt receipt of an application, ChaseMellon shareholders services will verify eligibility and gather current mailing information from the farm operator. Due to the short application period, it is imperative that these applications be completed and returned in a timely manner. Complete compensation will be given to individuals who found it necessary to request an application from ChaseMellon Shareholders by phone.

**Applications For Tobacco Payments**  
Hampton, Henton, Jr., State Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency in Kentucky, has announced that burley tobacco farmers can apply at FSA for compensation under the Tobacco Loss Assistance Program (TLAP) starting July 31, 2000. USDA will distribute \$340 million to compensate tobacco farmers who suffered a reduction of tobacco quota or acreage for the 1999-2000 crop years. Kentucky's share is \$140 million.

As directed by Congress, farmers of designated types of tobacco will receive a portion of the \$340 million to help defray lost income resulting from declining quotas and allotments. Individual farm payments for burley tobacco will be split three ways between farmers, quota owners and those in control of the quota (farm operators). Payments under the second year of TLAP will be based on the 2000 crop quota.

Sign-up at local USDA Farm Service Agency offices will begin on July 31 and ends on September 1, 2000. Late-filed applications will not be accepted. Payments will reach farmers between October 1-20, 2000.

**Noninsured Crop Assistance Program**  
The Noninsured Crop Assistance Program (NAP) may help reduce production risks for producers of uninsurable crops that are adversely affected by natural disasters.

To qualify for crop loss protection under 2000 NAP, producers of eligible NAP crops must report NAP acreage timely, provide verifiable records, file a note loss within 15 days of the disaster, and comply with general eligibility requirements. The COC does not have the authority now to accept late-filed Notice of Loss for the 2000 crop year. Producers must have requested an appraisal before destroying the crop or converting the

damaged crop to another use. Producers must have made production a matter of record with the FSA Office before commencing production.

Producers applying for 2000 NAP must provide verifiable production records by unit to document production for the 2000 loss year, furnishing or certifying actual production records for prior years to establish an approved yield for program, and maintaining records for three years, if certified records. In order to be eligible for NAP, producers must file required forms for payment limitation "person" determinations, have a qualifying gross income of less than \$2 million in the year of the NAP loss, and comply with HEL and WC regulations.

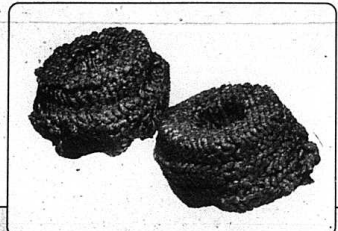

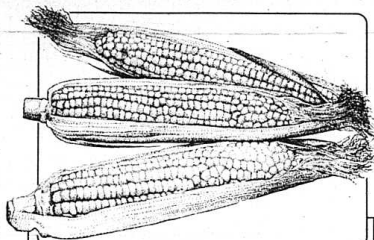

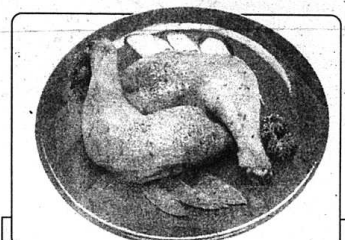

**Farm News**

**Multiflora  
Roses**

Multiflora roses were once promoted to be the living fence as well as an ideal wildlife cover. Many farmers are finding that fields infested with this plant rapidly become a wildlife habitat as they get away from fence rows, but when left uncontrolled, multiflora roses will creep out from fence rows, taking acres of farm land out of production. Controlling multiflora roses seems to be the big problem. When cut off by grubbing, bush-hogging or a mowing machine, they come back. The key is in killing the root system.

Chemicals are now available to control this problem with little danger of affecting other crops. During late summer is an ideal time to control this noxious weed. The key to success is to apply chemicals to actively growing leaves. In our area, this means applying treatments before Japanese beetles have stripped the plant. Chemicals like Roundup and Crossbow, when applied to the leaves, will trans-locate to the root system, killing the whole plant. Approximately 10-14 days after the application, the results will be seen. For large areas, farm sprayers may be needed. However, on small groups or single plants out in the

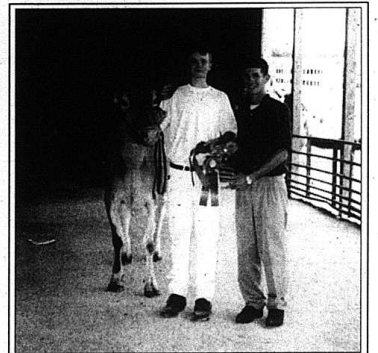
field, small hand sprayers are fine. Mixing 2.5 ounces of Roundup per gallon of water, then applying complete coverage of the foliage, along with 4-6 hours without rain, is all that's needed. Crossbow has the advantage of killing only broad leaf plants without killing the grass in treated areas. Mixture for Crossbow is about 1.5 to 2 ounces per gallon of water. However, continuous agitation is required. Farmers wishing to control this weed are better equipped with new chemicals than in years past.

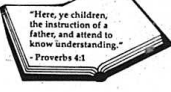

No one has filed in Brodhead and Livingston as of yet, where four seats will be filled on each county.

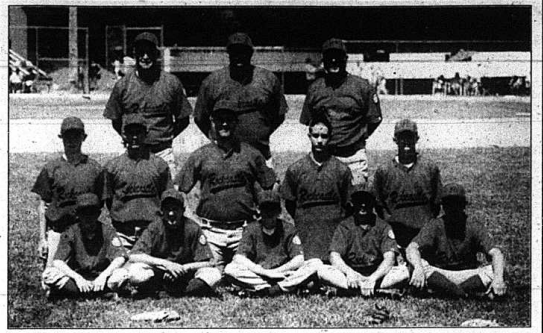
Current Family Court Circuit Judge Debra Lambert of Mt. Vernon will face Assistant Pulaski County Attorney Mike Duncan.

## Women and Heart Disease

A heart attack is the number one killer of American women. Women account for approximately 247,000 of the more than 520,000 people who die from a heart attack each year. And more than 90,000 women die each year of stroke. By comparison, about 40,500 women die each year from breast cancer; about 41,600 from lung cancer.

On a larger scale, all heart and blood vessel diseases combined claim the lives of nearly 500,000 women each year, compared with fewer than 220,000 for all forms of cancer.

While it is true that more men have heart attacks than women and men have them earlier in life, women who have heart attacks are twice as likely to die from them within the first few weeks.

The good news is that Americans are making remarkable progress in the fight against heart attack and stroke. The death rates for coronary heart disease and stroke have declined.

A heart attack occurs when the supply of blood to part of the heart muscle itself is severely reduced or stopped. This happens because one or more of the coronary (heart) arteries is blocked. The muscle cells in that area of the heart can suffer permanent damage or die, depending on how long the blood supply is cut off.

There are certain risk factors for heart disease that apply to both men and women - lifestyle habits, family history and personal characteristics. Some of these risk factors, however, present unique considerations for women.

**Age:** The older you get, the more likely you are to develop heart disease.

**Sex:** More men develop heart disease and develop it earlier than women, but women narrow the gap starting after menopause.

**Race:** Black Americans have a greater risk of heart disease than white Americans - in large part due to higher average blood pressure levels.

**Family History:** If your close relatives have had heart disease, you are more likely to develop it.

There are also other factors that contribute to heart disease, including smoking, high blood pressure, high blood cholesterol, high triglycerides levels, diabetes, obesity, oral contraceptives, alcohol and stress. Discuss these as well as your other risk factors with your personal physician as a part of your regular check-up. For more information, contact the Extension Office at 256-2403.

### Health Officials recommend booster seat usage

Booster seats do more than sit children higher in vehicles - they save lives.

Just as you would give your child a boost to get a drink of water fountain, you also need to give them a boost in your car. Children who are too tall or weigh too much for car seats, still are to small to fit safely in lap and shoulder belts installed in vehicles.

Although Kentucky law does not require children taller than 40 inches be placed in a car seat, the Kentucky Injury Prevention and Research Center (KIPRC), a part of the University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center and the Fayette County SAFE KIDS Coalition, led by the University of Kentucky Children's Hospital, strongly recommends parents use booster seats for children between 40 and 80 pounds.

"Shoulder and lap belts found in vehicles can cause serious injury to small children in vehicle accidents," said Susan Pollack, M.D., UK pediatrician with KIPRC and a Fayette County SAFE KIDS Coalition member.

"Because shoulder belts ride across the neck and lap belts ride up onto the abdomen, children not in boosters who are involved in vehicle crashes are at risk for spinal cord and abdominal injuries. However, the seat belts are better than not having the child restrained at all."

As long as a child fits into a car seat, he or she should not be moved to a booster seat. Parents can tell if their child has outgrown his or her seat if their child has reached 40 pounds, the child's shoulders are above the top strap slots, or the child's ears are above the back of the child's car seat. A child moved to a booster seat too soon also can be at risk for injury if an accident occurs.

Nationally, only 6.1 percent of children between 40 and 60 pounds are restrained in a booster seat; 75.3 percent are buckled by seat belts alone; and 18.6 percent are not restrained, according to the U.S. Department of Transportation National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

"Clearly parents are not using booster seats," Pollack said. "Just

because state or federal laws do not require children between 40 and 80 pounds be restrained by a booster seat, does not mean booster seats aren't the best thing to do for your child. Seat belts installed in vehicles are not designed for small children. That's the reason we have booster and car seats."

The booster should be a belt-positioning seat that allows the lap belts to fall low across the upper thighs and the shoulder belts to fit snug over the center of the shoulder, avoiding the neck, Pollack said.

"Parents also need to be aware that children like to place the shoulder belts under their arms or behind their backs," Pollack said. "These practices can result in serious injury to the child if a crash occurs."

A child no longer needs a booster seat when the vehicle's seat belts fits low on the child's hips and the shoulder belt crosses the shoulder, which usually occurs at age eight.
