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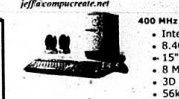

The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet has scheduled a Public Information meeting to discuss a planning study to analyze the need and establish a preferred corridor for a new route between US 150 and I-75 in Lincoln and Rockcastle Counties. The purpose of this meeting is to inform the public of the planning study, discuss various environmental and technical issues concerning the area under consideration, and solicit ideas and opinions that will help the Cabinet make decisions about the study. Anyone having an interest in this planning study is urged to attend this meeting.

This will be an open public meeting with a brief presentation at 6 p.m., followed by an informal discussion session and an exhibit area where officials will be prepared to answer questions and/or receive public input.

Maps and tables describing the various alternatives and their potential impacts will be available for viewing at the meeting. They will also be available for viewing from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. local time for fifteen (15) days after the meeting at the Kentucky Department of Highways District 8 Office, US 27, Somerset, Kentucky.

Local hospital announces \$2 million expansion

The Board of Directors of Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, Inc. unanimously approved a nearly \$2 million expansion and renovation plan at the July 25 meeting.

The plan, which completes the hospital's long-term construction master plan, includes a renovated and expanded Lab, Emergency Department, X-ray Department and Administrative area for a total of nearly 28,000 square feet.

"These changes will create a much more patient friendly hospital by enlarging some of our busiest areas," said Lee Keene, president of RHRCC. "The new ER will be four times larger than our existing one, which means we'll be able to offer a larger, more private area along with a larger staff to care for patients," he said.

The new construction will give the ER six examining rooms, trauma room, decontamination area, waiting area, supervisor and physician offices and a triage area.

The hospital recently changed its system of physician coverage for the ER. Working with the University of Kentucky Medical Center, RHRCC increased the number of doctors available in the department.

"Our female patients will be glad to know that our X-ray Department expansion will make the mammography area more convenient," said Gary Asher, director of construction. "It, along with the Nuclear Medicine Department, will move to the ground floor, so the entire department will be housed in one area," he said.

Other changes to the X-ray Department include a new waiting area and doctors' office.

An addition also will be added to the front of the hospital to accommodate a new lobby, which will house accounts payable and the switchboard. In addition, a new administrative area will move into that section to allow the Lab to expand into the present administrative area.

"One of the things I think patients

will appreciate most is the new canopy drive-through in front of the hospital," Keene said. "Patients can be dropped off right at the door and be protected from adverse weather."

The cost of new construction will be nearly \$2 million dollars, all of which the hospital has in reserve funds for the project. The next step is to

gain state approval of the building plans. Construction is expected to take two-to-and-a-half years once approval is given. Arch II & Associates, Inc. of Lexington developed the construction and renovation plans for the hospital.

RHRCC currently employs 340 people with an annual payroll of

approximately \$8 million. Because of the expansion project, that number will increase, but by how much is not yet clear.

During Keene's tenure at RHRCC, many new programs and equipment, as well as new facilities, have been added such as the Medical Arts Building, new operating rooms, acute care

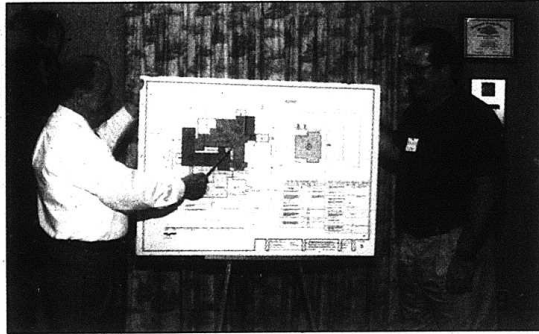
beds and rehabilitation services.

Last August, the hospital received a three-year accreditation by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations and in February, it opened a Home Health Care Program that has recently become licensed by the state.

The hospital board of directors is led by the Hon. Joe Lambert. Other

members are James W. Lambert, Bige Towery, Bill Baiget, Sr., Bill Bailey, Jr. and Wayne Stewart.

Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, Inc. is not-for-profit community hospital. It was established in 1956 and treats patients from across Kentucky and parts of Tennessee.

Orlando man killed in ATV accident

A Orlando man was killed Sunday after the all-terrain vehicle he was riding overturned near Caney Fork section of Russell County.

According to Russell County Coroner Larry Skaggs, Ernest Mark Mason, Sr., 40 of Orlando, died from massive head and chest injuries.

Skaggs said that Mason was attempting to go up a dirt embankment on government property around Lake Cumberland, when the accident occurred around 3:30 p.m., eastern standard time.

Skaggs said that Mason's A.T.V. overturned on top of him.

Mason's 12-year-old son, Matthew and a friend of Matthew's who were also riding A.T.V.'s witnessed the accident.

Skaggs said that Mason was taken to the Russell County Hospital and was to be airlifted to the University of Kentucky Medical Center, but he died before that could happen.

Mason was pronounced dead at 5:30 p.m., eastern standard time.

Mason, who was a truck driver, was not wearing a helmet at the time

Mason is survived by five children, ages 21 to 12.

Every year 54,000 people nationwide are injured and more than 200 killed in ATV crashes. In Kentucky last year, 18 people died in ATV accidents.

Judge Cain dismisses indictment

An indictment against a local man which dated back to 1996 was dismissed Friday by Rockcastle Circuit Judge William Cain.

John Lamb, 47, of Rt. 2, Mt. Vernon had been indicted in April of 1996, after he was accused of selling illegal drugs to a confidential

informant in November of 1995.

Lamb had been indicted on four counts. He was accused of selling Valium on two different occasions, Tylox once, and marijuana once.

All four counts of the indictment were dismissed. Also on Friday, Eddie Gentry, 23, of Floyd Street, Mt. Vernon was sentenced to five years in prison after he pled guilty to 17 counts of criminal possession of a forged instrument.

Gentry had been indicted in 1999 on two different occasions. The forged instruments were checks drawn on the Trans-Creek Union, Shannon Eaton, 23, of Mt. Vernon was also sentenced to 90 days in jail after he pled guilty to an amended

On Saturday, Mrs. Lucille Carlotis and her family members will host an open house at the family's newest business venture, Rockcastle River Trading Company.

The unique shop is located on the Rockcastle River, on the very site where the Carlotis family built their Indian Village 45 years ago.

Many local citizens will fondly recollect stopping years ago, at Fort Sequoyah the Indian Village and trading post which was located three miles south of Livingston, on U.S. 25. The very same spot where the new business is now.

Established by Carlos Carlotis and his wife, Lucille, Fort Sequoyah, began in 1955 as a replica of a 150-year-old Indian village where Cherokees made pottery, beads and other crafts in the manner of their forefathers. There was even a working blacksmith's shop.

Surrounded by the natural untamed beauty of the Daniel Boone National Forest, it served as a popular tourist outpost where nature and commerce shared top billing.

In the interim, Carlotis passed away and Fort Sequoyah, taken from a Cherokee Indian name, went through a series of starts and stops before it finally closed for good a few years back. But by then, the Carlotis children had matured, and, at last

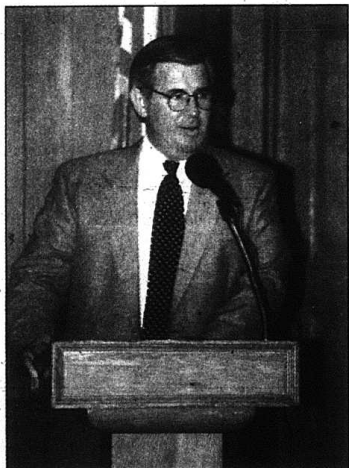

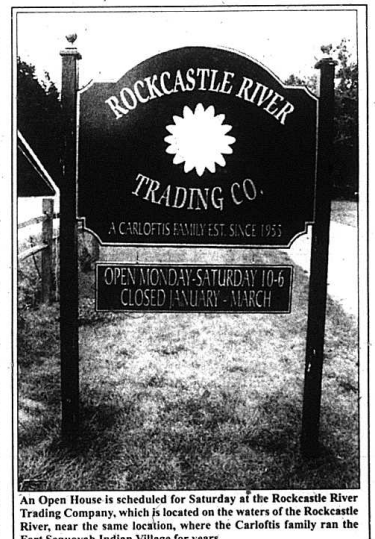

I fall for the same trick every year even though I know better. The trick is called straggling planting whereby you time sowing seeds into the ground a week apart over the course of three weeks so that your sweet corn won't all come in at the same time.

I am of the opinion that all sweet corn of the same variety, planted anytime in May, will be ready for harvest at precisely the same day in July. At least that's been my experience and this year is no different.

Well, actually, this year has been different. I probably should be thanking God that it came in as all because this is the first time in three years that we've had a nice sweet corn crop. The drought and soil conditions that approximate what you'd expect to find under a nuclear waste dump have combined to make my efforts to grow sweet corn in recent years futile and frustrating. The only reason I tried to grow a crop at all this year can be attributed to my hillbilly stubbornness and the fact that I found seed of a variety that I thought was lost.

For years I ordered a variety of sweet corn from Twilley's Seed Company called Bodacious. They stopped carrying it last year and I wasn't able to find it elsewhere until Loretta stumbled upon it at an Amish farm in Lincoln County early this spring. She actually called me long distance from a pay phone to make sure that she had the name right and I told her to buy all they had.

Turns out the Amish folks have the same opinion of Bodacious that I do and they buy seed in hundred pound sacks to grow commercially and I couldn't have hauled all that in my pick-up. Loretta settled for a quart and that's enough to last through the next couple of growing seasons.

I timed my three row planting, one fifty foot row at a time—approximately 100 stalks to the row—exactly a week apart. In theory my corn crop would come in over the course of three weeks. When sweet corn is in

season I can do and eat it everyday and I could do so all summer without ever getting tired of it. It's also nice to gather three or four dozens ears at a time and fill a few freezer bags.

Unfortunately my three week planting is all ready to pick today. Never mind the fact that I hoed the first row the same-day I planted the third. It all tasseled at the same time and it is currently in a state of perfection. Three hundred ears of it! If you call my house at 2:00 a.m. tomorrow morning, don't be surprised if a grump answers the phone. The grump I'm talking about is the corn in a five-gallon stock pot shaving com off the cob.

As I said already, I should simply be thankful and I'm trying very hard to be nothing else than that. I had forgotten how good this stuff is. While waiting on my crop to mature, we've purchased corn from the early birds at the Garrard County Farmers Market and some roadside stands, but there is nothing in the same league as Bodacious in terms of tenderness and flavor. It is so sweet it almost hurts your teeth.

So far I've had Illini Extra Sweet, Kandy Corn, Early Sunglow, Silver Queen and some of those University numbered varieties and I honestly believe that comparing them to Bodacious is like comparing apples to oranges. So write the name and try some next year. It's probably too late to plant it this year, but I have another three rows waist high that should be ready around Labor Day weekend.

You may have to drive to Crab Orchard and follow the signs along Highway 39 to find an Amish greenhouse and seed supplier who will sell you some, but believe me, it's worth the trip. In fact, it's worth the trip even if you don't find any seed corn. Right now the Amish folks can imagine any garden vegetable you can imagine for sale much cheaper than you can grow it yourself. And that includes freshly picked Bodacious sweet corn at \$2.25 per dozen.

when it begins to itch and swell. In other words the small problems of life, ridding up the house, mowing the lawn, doing laundry, cooking whether one feels like it or not, trips to the doctor or grocery and doing the thousand and one things that must be done regardless of health or wealth, or lack of it, can be managed one way or another by those who believe, Where there is a will, there is a way. Those problems, like the dust webs, can be overlooked till another time or done piecemeal, one little task or web at a time. But like the spider web with its poisonous artifice weaving her web, other things must be taken care of immediately. These things can be the roof leaking, broken windows, plumbing electric wiring, and illness. All of which happens unnoticed till the damage has been done. By then it is often too late and the victim can be overwhelmed by the enormity of the consequences.

That is where I am today. The (imagined) spider weaving its web unnoticed until it slipped into my family unannounced and did its dirty work. My brain is in a whirl, or maybe it has become entangled in the webs silently wreaking havoc in the health and well-being of loved ones.

The first indication I had of the silent invader attacking my family once again was when Rod called and told me Helen (his wife) had been in the hospital with infection in her breast. She wasn't responding to medication so a week later she was back for a biopsy. I was anxious of course but tried to be patient and optimistic till the results of the biopsy was completed. The shocking answer a week later was "cancer" and needed immediate attention. Last Friday, one month later, she received her first chemo therapy, which will be followed by three more at the University of Virginia Hospital in Charlottesville, Virginia. Then a mastectomy before a series of other treatments. It was then that I was told about the two spots on her lungs

which will be attended to after the mastectomy. My world was about to crumble, Helen, a model wife, mother and daughter-in-law, was the victim of this vicious destroyer of the human body. Yet I never heard a "why me" or complaint when I spoke to her, she is putting her trust in the doctors ability to help and God's ability to heal.

Then a call this week from Cincinnati that my nephew was having surgery this week for rectal cancer. He has been bedfast with lupus and heart trouble for years. How could he handle this? While I was trying to digest this latest news of the serious illness of this nephew I had held close and cuddled when he was only a few minutes old, the phone rang again and it was my niece in California with other news of her sister-in-law, another nephew's wife being told that she had only a couple months to live. Advanced cancer in both lungs that had escaped detection was so advanced her time is short.

There were other problems for Rod and Helen to deal with that also bothered me: Helen's father, Clayborn Campbell, has been ill for some time but last week he became much worse and has been hospitalized. He had wandered off and was lost for several hours before he was found and is now in critical condition with pneumonia. This fine family of two aging parents, one hospitalized and the other worn out from caring for him needs the support of their two children and their mates. Helen also needs the support of her parents through this trial time of fighting for her life. Now I thought of the prophet Job and his decision. My answer was to bow my head in prayer and thank God for all the blessings, the blessings he had bestowed upon me, my three children, four grandchildren and my very dear daughter-in-law Helen. I then asked him to keep His arm around us and give us strength to accept His answers to our problems.

Dear Editor,

Rowland Moore, a London business man, civic leader, radio Bible speaker and minister, is leading a group to reject the proposed southern route of I-66.

Moore begins his rejection with the simple question, "What happened to the old adage of mathematical truth? The shortest distance between two points, is a straight line." And in reference to I-66, "the straightest line possible."

In consideration of another old adage, a picture is worth a thousand words. The picture map in this paper says it all.

Moore suggests that the interested people and the state engineers go back to the drawing board for a third time and hopefully, a thinking, honest, non-political board that would choose is obvious to anyone who has any ounce of road and terrain knowledge, that the southern route should never have been a consideration, and surely not a final decision.

The first response by some will be, "What does he know about road building?" Much more than you can imagine, and the best contractors in this area will attest to that, having worked with them with my large hydraulic cranes and other construction equipment in the '70's and '80's, most importantly, I know the terrain of both sides of London, north and south, and especially the north route that we will be pleading for further consideration. I know the north route like the back of my hand.

I was born and reared up at what we called "the overhead bridge" area, commemorating the old I. & N. railroad bridge for the cow city road that existed prior to the US 25. Our farm land has been taken three times to build US 25, new US 25, and I-75. It began 79 plus years ago, so I do know the area and terrain of the northern exposure, having played, fished, swam, hunted and worked in the area. In my teens and as a young adult, I have accessed the area by walking, riding a mule, an old 4-W drive jeep and a bicycle, about all that could be accessed at the time. The overhead bridge area, for those who may not know, is located at the junction of old US 25 and Ky Highway 30, at midway between East Bernstadt and Pitsburg, Ky.

In reference to Ky. 30 highway. What happened to the plan of the new highway running close to existing 30 and using the old weigh station, just vacated at the exit to access I-75, that was more than fifty percent in place, and would have helped local business in the area. That was too practical, not enough of a challenge, and too much saving of money. I understand they have a plan that will remove the road far from people, out in the country of rough terrain again. This is my point-- Why do they do these things?

My further experience of the area, after serving three and a half years in World War, with some flying experience. I enrolled in flying school at old Jody field, and my first training under the G. I. bill, in order to get my pilot license to be able to fly officially. Much of my training and later flying was performed in the late afternoons, traversing Laurel County, flying the northern terrain of where I grew to manhood, I was all of 25 years old then, and how I loved to look down at the farm, and all of our neighbors farms, the new cut fields, the woods, and ponds, the

crocks, the animals and the creeks, especially Cromer, big and little Gillis, Hazel Patch, Woods Creek (yes, Woods Creek), not wood creek, in remembrance of an early Woods family, and the "creek in the woods" where I had spent so much time. There were the small streams in the ravines, forming little lakes, the big and small Laurel rivers, the dynamic meandering Rockcastle River, to see the traffic winding around the hills and ravines, mostly the natural terrain of creeks and rivers. We lived in an area, where the creek ran up the road, and the road ran up the creek, but it was majestic splendor.

So, with all this experience of the north passage, the flying beginning in 1947, and continued for many years, having worked in construction, building and engineering, I feel I am speaking with a background of knowledge, which I believe has been lacking up to this point and time. It looks to me, thus far that everything has been political. The people to the south must have great political influence with the powers that be. This simply has to be the reason for such an ill-conceived proposed route. As a taxpaying citizen of Kentucky and Uncle Sam, I don't like the see our money wasted to appease some political interests. The proposed south route will cost almost twice the

amount of money rather than use the less expensive north route that was one of the proposals. There are at least three excellent locations, where I-66 could go under or over using the north route. I would be happy to point them out to people in authority. It seems to me that some more search and research needs to be done, especially with the low-flying helicopters. I can't see how you could possibly not choose the north route, which will disturb less and destroy less of everything that we love and is dear to our hearts. It would be less of a construction challenge, and before you ask it--you can build bridges cheaper than you can cut mountains and fill ravines and bridges look better. This all translates in the saving of big

bucks. Facing reality, why would you ever in this world want to choose the southern route? Lets get together

RHRCC offers free cholesterol tests

If you've been wondering about your cholesterol levels, now is the time to find out where you stand. Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, Inc. is offering free cholesterol tests at the hospital lab during the entire month of August. No appointment is necessary, but participants should fast at least 12 hours before their test. Results will be sent to participants' primary care doctors. The test is a \$70 value. "It's important to understand how cholesterol affects your health," said Lee Keene, RHRCC president. "The tests are also offering information on cholesterol from the American Heart Association to all

had cholesterol.

According to the American Heart Association, approximately 52 percent of adult Americans have borderline high blood cholesterol, and 20 percent have high cholesterol levels.

The American Heart Association recommends the following guidelines for keeping cholesterol levels low.

- If you are a healthy adult over 20, test your blood cholesterol levels at least once every five years.
- Eat no more than 300 milligrams of cholesterol a day. (One egg yolk has about 213 milligrams of cholesterol.)

Limit your total fat intake to less than 30 percent of calories, with less than 10 percent coming from saturated fats. You can accomplish this by choosing more fruits, vegetables and whole-grain eating fish, poultry without skin and lean meats, and consuming low-fat or skim milk dairy products.

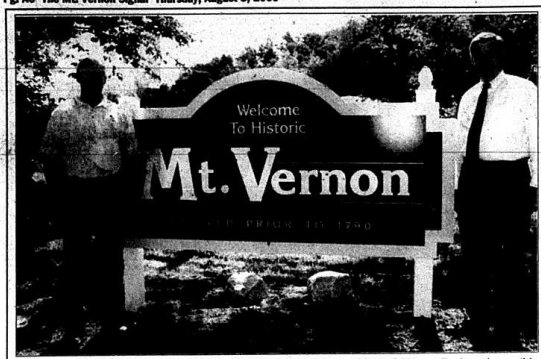
who come in for a free test." Although there is plenty of information available about cholesterol, it can be confusing. The basic principle is simple - too much cholesterol in the blood is among the top four risk factors for heart disease. The other three are smoking, high blood pressure and lack of exercise.

Cholesterol is a soft, fat-like substance that is found in all body tissues. Blood cholesterol levels are determined by genetic makeup and by the amount of fat in the diet.

The two types of cholesterol that most often make the news are low-density lipoprotein (LDL) and high-density lipoprotein (HDL). LDL is considered "bad" cholesterol because it slowly builds up in the arteries walls. Together with other substances, LDL can form plaque, a thick hard deposit that restricts blood flow through the arteries, which can result in a heart attack or stroke.

HDL is called "good" cholesterol because it not only carries cholesterol away from the arteries and back to the liver, where it's removed from the body, but it also sweeps away the

Confrontation Can Be Scary
 "My boss scares me," Jane told me. "He goes up to me regularly and when he does, I fall to pieces. I cannot take his criticism of me. I would change jobs but the benefits of this one are too good to give up." (All characters are fictitious.)
 As Jane and I talked, I began to see why she had this fear of conflict. Sometimes persons who are afraid of conflict grow up in households where there was a lot of conflict. Perhaps Mom and Dad fought, either verbally or physically, and when they fought, the child was very fearful. When the child grew up and conflict occurred, she got that same scared feeling that she had as a child when Mom and Dad fought.

That is exactly what happened in Jane's family. "Dad made all the decisions," Jane reported. "I never heard Mom disagree with him."
 "Doesn't that strike you as unusual that your parents never disagreed?" I asked.
 "Why, no," she replied in a surprised tone. "Dad always said that Mom was the perfect wife, and that I should try to be just like her."
 Jane was afraid of conflict because she had never learned how to handle it. She had never been around anyone who had conflict. Paterning after her mother, she grew up deathly afraid of conflict and did all she could to avoid it.

This didn't seem to be true of Jane, however. Her childhood was notable for its lack of conflict. "I'm not ever got mad at my house," Jane remembered. "Things were always peaceful and quiet. Oh, I guess my little sister and I fought some, but Mom and Dad never fought. They never had a cross word."
 "What did they do when they disagreed?" I asked.
 "Jane thought for a long time. 'I never heard them disagree,' she finally said. "Our house was very calm and peaceful."
 What Jane saw as a perfect childhood, I saw as a training ground for fear of conflict. Mom and Dad also were afraid of conflict, so they avoided it at all costs. It is inevitable

that two people living together will have some conflict. The only way around that is if a person gives up all the time and lets the other have his way.
 "You do and your husband ever have conflicts?" I asked Jane.
 "Not if I can help it," she declared. "I guess I do give in all the time in order to avoid a fight."
 "Do you give in to your boss too?" I wanted to know.
 "Yes," she replied, "but he's the boss. I have to let him have his way."
 "Even if he's the boss," I told her, "you have a right to your opinion."
 Jane's saving grace is that she at least learned how to fight with her sister. Perhaps she could use some of that knowledge to stand her ground with her husband and her boss.

Building Families

It is really important for a family to spend time together. When a family spends time together, they grow closer to each other. If a family does not spend time together, they sometimes grow apart. It's important to set aside time each day to work on growing together and growing stronger. Here are some things to do to help your family grow stronger.

Infants: Listen and talk to your baby during the day. Sing songs, say nursery rhymes and smile and coo back at his smiles and coos. Talk to him about what you are both doing and what he hears and sees. "I see you looking at the mobile. I'll touch it to make the animals move back and forth." She loves to set on your lap, hear your voice and be close to you. Play with him and offer him toys he can hold and shake, and soft toys that squeak when squeezed.

Toddlers: Your toddler can do lots of things for himself. He will touch, taste and feel everything in sight. He likes to listen to stories and looks at books by himself. Plan your day so there is time for him to wash,

dress and feed himself. Five him simple directions and praise him for following them: "Please go to your room and get your shoes." "Great! You got your shoes. Now you can put them on." Give him scrap paper and nontoxic crayons and washable markers so she can learn about writing. Talk to her about what she is writing. "You made a line and a dot."

Preschoolers: Your preschooler loves to imitate you and other adults in his life. He wants to please you. Talk to him and include him in discussions with the family. Talk about what you see while traveling to child care or to the store. Make time each day to read to him. Stop during your reading to talk about the

pictures and the story. Let him see you writing and tell him what you are doing. "I am writing a letter to grandma. Would you like to tell her about our trip to the library?" Have writing materials so he can "write." Put the writing material where he can reach it. Give him simple chores to help you. Ask him to set the table, to wash clothes, pick up the newspaper, or clean up his toys.

level, that some traditional buyers may need some additional stocks in the very near future.

What about moving some pool stocks into non-traditional markets like China? While the anticipated opening of the Chinese market does present some opportunities for U.S. tobacco growers, tobacco dealers are unsure of both the short-term and long term effects. One out of every three cigarettes consumed in the world are smoked in China. And up to this point, without any (legal) U.S. burley, cigarette consumption and production peaked a few years ago, but the demand for blended cigarettes is still increasing. This situation has some similarities with the Japanese market back in the late 1980's when the removal of trade barriers increased blended cigarette imports.

In response to this market occurrence, the Japanese cigarette monopoly had to increase purchases of higher quality leaf to compete with the onslaught of cigarette imports entering the country. The major difference between China and Japan is the Japanese had the currency to import higher quality cigarettes and leaf. As the Chinese economy rebounds, and as the growing middle and upper income classes continue to emerge, opportunities will likely exist to move some U.S. burley into this enormous market. But this market will evolve slowly over time and will not likely be the immediate answer to the industry's short-term problems.

Farm group officials are continuing to explore every possibility of moving some pool stocks into China to help reduce the current surplus situation. The bottom line is if the burley cooperatives do not move any pool stocks, and if purchase intentions remain at their extremely low 2000 level, the quota formula would call for basic quota reduction for 2001 of approximately 11 percent. With a limited volume of carryforward quota expected for the 2001 season, an 11 percent basic quota cut would reduce the belt-wide effective quota to less than 250 million pounds. This effective quota level appears unrealistic based on an industry that claims that our traditional 600 million pound demand for U.S. burley may now be more in the neighborhood of 400 million pounds during the post-tobacco settlement era. However, to maintain the 2001 effective quota at the 2000 level of 367 million pounds, the co-ops would have to move more than 250 million pounds - another unlikely scenario. At this point, my best forecast is that the cooperatives will use some of the no-net cost funds to purchase perhaps 50 to 100 million pounds of stocks. Assuming purchase intentions remain relatively stable or perhaps increase marginally, the sale of 50 to 100 million pounds of pool stocks would stabilize the 2001 basic quota, but still induce a double-digit percentage decline in the 2001 effective quota. Burley Tobacco Pool Stock Situation



Currently the burley tobacco cooperatives have 415 million pounds (farm-sales weight) in their inventories, approximately one year's supply based on recent market conditions. Obviously this situation threatens future quotas and no-net cost assessments. The burley cooperatives are meeting consistently with tobacco companies and dealers in an attempt to move some of these stocks prior to the 2001 quota announcement. Currently there are approximately \$157 million of no-net-cost funds available to potentially be used to discount the 1994-1999 pool stocks, which have a total loan value of more than \$900 million. Consequently, if all the no-net-cost

funds are used to reduce the price of existing pool stocks, the co-ops could only offer around a 16 percent discount across the board. Tobacco buyers in this chess match indicate that this potential discount level is not enough to move a significant volume of pool stocks given a depressed world tobacco market. Declining domestic consumption, movement of U.S. cigarette production offshore, imports, legal uncertainty, and inventory management strategies are collectively reducing the U.S. burley stocks needed by domestic manufacturers. Despite these adverse factors, the magnitude of recent quota cuts have reduced anticipated marketings to such a low

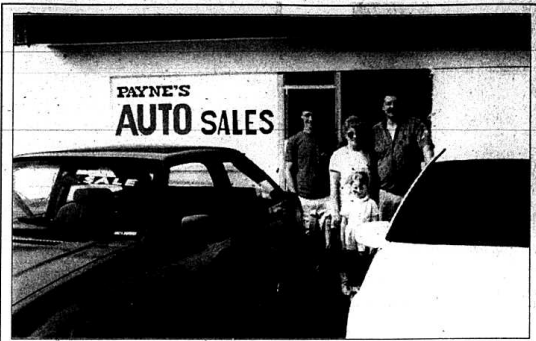

Thanks to Carolfis' son, Jon and his growing reputation as an award-winning designer, you'll find "The Rockcastle River Trading Company" a little more upscale and cosmopolitan than the old Fort Sequoyah, along with unique gardening accents like colorful globe lanterns and whimsically carved stepping-stones, the store will carry fine gifts like Trapp candles, and hand-milled soaps, fragrant creams and lotions. Expect to see the familiar, too, such as the handmade solid cherry furniture that Carolfis carried for years.
The elder Carolfis gives her youngest son the bulk of credit at this new enterprise. As a student at The University of Kentucky, Carolfis received a horticulture degree. He steadily worked his way up to celebrated designer and independent businessman's name. Now 35, Carolfis resides in Erwinna, Pennsylvania but does most of his work in New York City. He specializes in rooftop gardens earning accolades for the lovely English Rooftop Gardens that he manages to create in small confined spaces.
In an interview on June 11, 2000, "The Philadelphia Inquirer" penned an article about Carolfis entitled "A Cultivated Man." It described him as the epitome of a southern gentleman and mentioned that he spoke with an Appalachian accent as thick as molasses. Quiet and dignified, with arresting blue-gray eyes, Carolfis hasn't a trace of the impatient, aggressive New York City slicker stereotype. Stone benches and other natural fixtures contribute to the spontaneous flow of the design.
Carolfis says he honors her to his husband while he honors her son.
"It's a joy to be able to be so close to nature with his son," said Lucille. According to the younger Carolfis he learned a lot by accompanying his father on nature walks. Explained Carolfis, "I've been all over with daddy and he would name plants. Of course, I wasn't too interested then, but if I took hold eventually." Customers can expect to see the younger Carolfis in the Rockcastle River Trading Company giving expert advice from time to time. "This is Jon's home base," said Mrs. Carolfis. "He gets in about once a month for consultations."
Mrs. Carolfis is as humble and respectful about her own success as she is exuberant about her son's. In her wide-brimmed straw hat, Carolfis is the very picture of a Southern lady. Attractive and gentlemanly, she possesses an inner beauty that surrounds her like an aura. And, definitely, she is a woman of substance. Possessing a keen intellect and on-going curiosity, she is listed in the "Who's Who" Bestselling children's stories, she published a cookbook in February 1998 called "Favorite Recipes From a Treasury of Country Inns and Lodges." A companion book called

"Elegant Desserts from a Treasury of Inns," is in the works and soon to be released, as well.

Agricultural News

Tobacco Payments
Hampton Henton, Jr., State Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency in Kentucky, has announced that burley tobacco farmers can apply at FSA for compensation under the Tobacco Loss Assistance Program (TLAP) starting July 31, 2000. USDA will distribute \$340 million to compensate tobacco farmers who suffered a reduction of tobacco quota or acreage for the 1999-2000 crop years. Kentucky's share is \$140 million.

As directed by Congress, farmers of designated types of tobacco will receive a portion of the \$340 million to help defray lost income resulting from declining quotas and allotments. Individual farm payments for burley tobacco will be split three ways between farmers, quota own-

ers, and those in control of the quotas (farm operators). Payments under the second year of TLAP will be based on the 2000 crop quota.

TLAP payments will be made no earlier than Oct. 1st and not later than Oct. 20, 2000. Regulations state beginning Jan. 1, 1999, all federal payments will be made through Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT). Therefore, producers signing up for this program who are not signed up for EFT are encouraged to bring a check at the time of sign-up which can be voided for filing with the SE 1192A Direct Deposit. Producers who do not have a financial institutional account may sign a waiver to receive the TLAP payment by way of check. Sign-up at local USDA Farm Service Agency offices will begin on July 31st and ends on September 1,

2000. Late-filed applications will not be accepted. Payments will reach farmers between October 1-20, 2000.

Disaster Leasing of Tobacco
The lease and transfer of burley tobacco quota after July 1st due to disaster is authorized according to FSA regulations. County offices shall require, as a condition for approving disaster lease and transfer, that the lessor file an FSA 578, Crop Acreage Report, and a FSA 574, Application for Disaster Credit, immediately upon the determination by the producer that production has been reduced by more than 20% in all cases and BEFORE THE CROP IS HARVESTED.

Pork Referendum
People and businesses who owned and sold hogs or pigs or imported hogs, pigs, pork or pork products or imports hog, pigs, pork, or pork products into the US.

Producers voting by absentee ballot may obtain ballot packages from Aug. 18th through Sept. 18, 2000.

Pasture Recovery Program
USDA's Farm Service Agency Administrator Keith Kelly has announced that about \$40 million will be issued to producers under the Pasture Recovery Program (PRP). PRP was established to help farmers whose pastures were severely damaged by drought in 1999 reestablish forage crops. Eligible land included pasture which was normally drought grazed by livestock, but was so damaged by drought that seeding was required to reestablish forage crop.

County FSA offices conducted a sign-up from March 20 to June 23, 2000. Since the producer demand exceeded the amount of funds available by approximately \$14 million, a national factor was applied to all requests. Consequently, producers will receive about 73.5 percent of the amount they qualified for under PRP. Payments will be made by county FSA offices shortly following the re-seeding has been established successfully.

Lamb Meat Adjustment Assistance Program (LMMAP)
As part of the Clinton Administration's three-year, \$110 million assistance plan to help U.S. sheep and lamb farmers, Agricultural Secretary Dan Glickman announced today that sheep and lamb producers during the representative period from August 18, 1999 through August 17, 2000 will be eligible to vote in referendum to determine if producers and importers favor continuation of the Pork Checkoff Program, formally known as the Pork Promotion, Research and Consumer Information Order.

There are three types of eligible voters. One, are people who own and sell hogs or pigs in the US in their own name. The second, is people who import hogs, pigs, pork, pork products, into the US in their own name, and the third is people who are designated to cast the single vote for

a business entity that owns and sells, will receive a total of \$30 million in direct cash payments to help improve their production efficiency and the marketability of lamb meat. Signup for the program began June 19th and ends on October 13, 2000.

During the first year of the program (July, 21, 1999-Sept. 30, 2000) payments may be made for 3 types of payments. The first is a Ram payment. A Ram payment is a payment rate of \$100 per ram purchased during year 1, 90 days or older at the time of purchase, intended for breeding purposes and owned by the operation for at least 90 days. Next, is the Sheep Improvement Program payment which has a payment rate of \$.50 per enrolled sheep and sheep must be enrolled in an authorized sheep improvement program (NSIP). The third payment is the Facility Improvement Payment. This is where

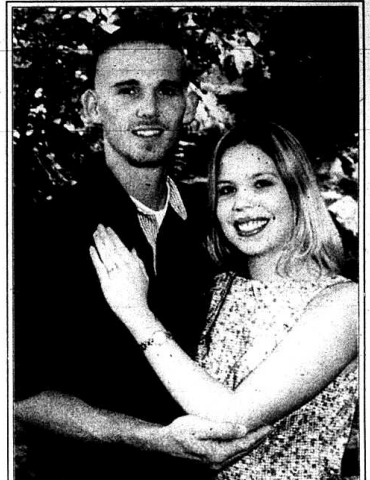

SCHOOL BUS RULES AND REGULATIONS

The privilege of any pupil to ride a school bus is conditioned upon their good behavior and observance of the following rules and regulations. Pupils violating these rules and regulations shall be reported to the principal of the school which the pupil attends for necessary corrective action.

Safety is the primary concern in the transportation of pupils. In order to assure proper safety, it is vital that pupils and parents understand the rules and regulations of school bus riding. Following is a list of basic rules and regulations adopted by the Rockcastle County Board of Education and the Kentucky Department of Education:

1. Arrive at bus stop on time. The bus has many scheduled stops and cannot be delayed.
2. Never stand in the road while waiting for the bus. Parents should encourage safety measures for pupils as they wait for the bus and walk home from the bus.
3. Cross a safe distance (10 feet) in front of the bus so the driver can see you.
4. Take a seat upon boarding the bus and do not change seats while the bus is in motion.
5. The driver is in charge of the bus and pupils and has the authority to assign seating arrangements.
6. Keep noise to a minimum so that the driver's attention can be devoted to driving.
7. Do not extend arms, legs or head out the bus windows.
8. Obey the rules posted on each bus.
9. Do not block aisles in any way.
10. Knives/other sharp instruments are not permitted on the bus.
11. Never run toward the bus. Always load and unload when the bus has come to a complete stop.
12. Apply the above rule (No. 11) when transferring buses.
13. Never use the rear exit unless an emergency exists.
14. Ride only your assigned bus unless you have a signed note from the Principal. Parents must write or call the principal to obtain permission for pupil to ride another bus or to exit at a different stop.
15. Report any damages to the bus.
16. Do not occupy more space in a seat than required.
17. Open and close windows in compliance with the driver's instructions.
18. Pupils and parents are to accept the responsibility of listening for dismissal announcements on the radio on days when inclement weather disrupts the regular schedule.
19. The following rules are of particular concern and the activities mentioned are prohibited at all times:
 - a. Use of profane/foul language
 - b. Smoking or other use of tobacco on the bus
 - c. Fighting on the bus
 - d. Destruction of bus property
 - e. Defiance of driver's authority
 - f. Throwing objects on or from the bus.
20. **Disciplinary Action:** Violations of the above stated rules and regulations shall be reported to the appropriate school principal. The principal shall record the incident and determine the appropriate disciplinary action. Should any pupil persist in violating any of these regulations, it shall be the duty of the driver to notify the principal and, after due warning has been given to the pupil and such violation persists, the principal and/or board of education shall then forbid such disobedient pupil the privilege of riding the bus. Written notice of the action of the principal shall be furnished to the parents and the superintendent.

SCHOOL TRAFFIC GRIDLOCK IS IT A PROBLEM?

School traffic gridlock during an emergency - Did you ever imagine we would be talking about this?

I am not referring to normal student pickup problems, but traffic of a more serious nature. Traffic that could impede the progress of emergency vehicles coming to the aid of your child.

As everyone knows, we are in new and changing times. It seems from my own personal observation that moods and behaviors of our youth change faster than Eastern Kentucky weather. These moods and behaviors have sometimes led to situations at schools that have ranged from minor incidents to situations of a more serious nature.

One of the phenomena of today is traffic gridlock at our schools following incidents, such as natural disasters, bomb threats, fires, or acts of violence within the schools. There are many reasons for this: everyone seems to have a vehicle, large student bodies through school consolidation, instant communication through personal phones, just to name a few.

On the surface this may seem manageable, until you take a deeper look at this situation. If, for example, Smithtown Middle School has a student body of 842 and 842 parents rush to the school when a disaster hits, there is no way to quickly move the injured from the scene to medical services. Of course, as we all know, we can add a large number of curiosity seekers to this list. I have found that within a period of time before the injured can be removed, a state of automobile gridlock occurs around the school to the extent that ambulances cannot enter or exit. This happens within an amazingly short period of time.

What to do, or evermore importantly in this situation, what NOT to do, is vital. DO NOT RUSH TO THE SCHOOL! If your child is injured, medical personnel must have the ability to come and go quickly.

Each school district has a safety plan in place that has an alternate location to pick up your child. In the event of an emergency, please listen to your local radio station for that information.

As a parent of three children, I know how strong the urge to go to the school would be if a serious situation developed. As an experienced State Police officer, I know that all the children will be better off if parents and curiosity seekers do not rush to the school during an emergency.

If we all pull together and keep the emergency exits clear, this will provide the best opportunity for our children's safety. Rushing in and blocking the entrances would be like locking the exit doors when a fire alarm sounds.

We do not want that to happen to our children.

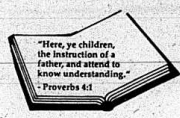

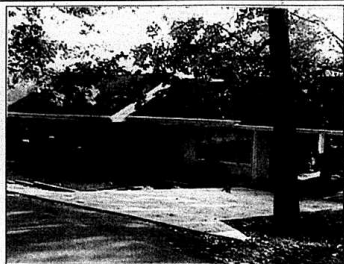
