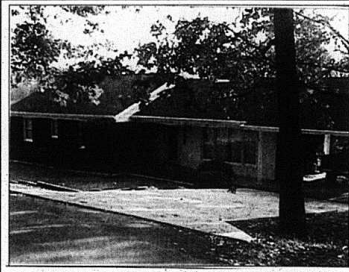

If you become incapacitated or died today, would your family know where to find your financial information? A financial list for the person who will be responsible for taking care of your financial affairs will save you time and money. This helpful list should include your social security number, the name of where your bank accounts are located along with the account numbers, insurance policies, credit card accounts and numbers, the location of your will, contact information for your attorney,

insurance agent, and accountant, if you have one. Don't try to surprise people with the information. If you are no longer able to communicate with them, they may not find everything. There are expenses incurred when trying to find this information without your help that can be costly to you and/or your estate. If you are interested in more information on how to put this information together, call the Extension Office at 256-2403 for a free copy of the publication entitled "Family Financial Records."

Man steals vehicles, arrested by local police

According to the police report, Estep was approached in the Hummel area of the county, after an eight mile chase. Police arrested Estep after he wrecked the stolen truck.

He is wanted in Whitley County on theft charges and will appear in Rockcastle District Court on August 14. He was charged in Rockcastle County with theft, DUI, possession of drugs, evading or eluding and speeding.

Nearly \$33,000 so far Mt. Vernon collects tax

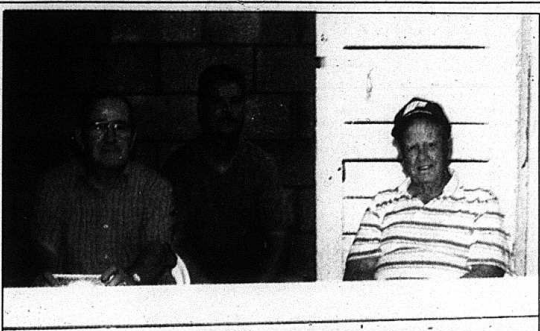
The City of Mt. Vernon has taken in nearly \$37,000 in tax revenue from their payroll tax, which the council passed earlier this year.

Board seats, Judgeship up for grabs

The first Tuesday in November some Rockcastle countians will have the opportunity to vote in a school board race and at least one city council race.

The filing deadline for those offices was Tuesday and two of the three incumbent members of the Rockcastle County Board of Education have opposition.

There are also seven individuals seeking six council seats in Mt. Vernon.

But at Livingston only three people filed for the four seats.

And at Brodhead, four people filed for four seats.

In division four school board, which includes Climax and Orlando voting precincts, Martin Vanzant, 59, who is seeking his first full term, faces opposition from Beverly Sexton, 46.

In division five school board, incumbent Sherry Isaacs, 31, who is seeking her second term, faces opposition from Mike "BoChamp" Burdette, 46.

Jail sued

The Rockcastle County Jail has been named the defendant in a small claims suit filed last week.

Zona and Terry Mink of Eubank are seeking \$1,500 in damages.

They claim in their suit that \$300 was taken from Terry Mink, after he was put in a cell with some state prisoners when he went to the jail to serve time on the weekend.

Mink also claims his pants were cut by another inmate with a pair of scissors while he was in jail.

Rockcastle County Jailor James Miller said that the allegations made by the Minks are false.

"When we checked him in he had \$120 in his wallet and we offered to put it up for him, but he decided to keep it," Miller said.

"At that time we were allowing weekend prisoners to keep their personal stuff while in jail - but that is no longer the case," Miller said.

Local man sues court

Board approves \$6.7 million building at Brodhead

The Rockcastle County Board of Education gave the final approval on the bids for a new school building at Brodhead during regular monthly meeting Tuesday night.

The low bidder on the project was W. Wilburn of Lexington.

Williams' bid was \$6.7 million, with the total cost of the new school

being \$6,670,850.

Rockcastle County School Finance Officer Richard Bray told the board that the total cost includes a \$325,220 fee for the engineering firm and \$127,000 for equipment and furnishings.

Included in the new building will be 20 classrooms and a gymnasium. The new building will be constructed

on the current ballfield and playground on the current school property.

Construction is scheduled to begin within two weeks. Architect Joe Samokar told board members the new building would be ready for use by the beginning of school in August of next year.

The board also approved the new

property tax rate for the coming year, which dropped from 43.1 to 42.4. The reason for the drop was an increase in the assessment of property in the county.

Last year, Rockcastle County's property was valued at \$325 million and this year it is valued at \$355 million. It was the eleventh straight year the school system's tax rate had either stayed the same or decreased.

School Superintendent Larry Hammond also announced his personnel actions to the board.

They included the hiring of substitute teachers: Elizabeth Jean Jones, Judy Doyle, Lydia Napier, Cathy Allen, Jamie Bryant, Sara Coquer and Angela Blanton.

Brandon Hargis was hired as asst. football coach at the middle school, Jenny Sweet was hired as Coordinator of 21st Century Community Learning Center. Karen Wilson was hired as a district wide speech pathologist. J.D. Harris was hired as a

special education teacher at the middle school and Gina Wilson Bussell as a primary teacher at Brodhead.

Steve Bullock was hired as coordinator of the new Alternative School. Stephanie Jill Whitaker, math teacher at the middle school, Melissa Bruner special education teacher Brodhead, Greg Bullock, elementary teacher, Brodhead, Dana Bullock, special education teacher, Mt. Vernon and April

Suit filed over burial

A somewhat unusual law suit was filed in Rockcastle County Circuit Court last week in an effort to stop the burial of a local man in Ohio.

According to the suit, some family members of Ernest Mark Mason, Sr., 40, through their attorney Willis G. Coffey, asked that Mason's body be returned to Kentucky for burial.

The suit was filed by Mason's oldest daughter, 21-year-old Tara Terina Mason, against her stepmother, Mason's apparently estranged wife, Cathy Mason and Hodapp Funeral Home in West Chester, Ohio.

Mason was killed July 30 in Russell County after an all-terrain vehicle turned over on him as he attempted to climb an embankment.

Mason died at the Russell County Hospital about an hour after the accident and his body was originally taken to Dowell and Martin Funeral Home in Mt. Vernon. Funeral Directors there said that original plans were to hold services there and bury him in the county.

That was until Monday morning when Mason's estranged wife decided to move his body to Hodapp Funeral Home in West Chester, Ohio.

At that point, Mason's oldest daughter from a previous marriage,

Terina, his mother Cookie and sisters, Alecia, Pam and Michelle went to Coffey to see what legal means they could take to stop their brother's burial in Ohio.

Alecia Benge, Mark Mason's oldest sister said that Mark and his estranged wife had not lived together since August of 1999 and that her brother had filed suit in August of 1999 seeking a divorce from his wife.

On Wednesday, Circuit Judge William T. Cain denied the request for the restraining order, citing the fact that Mason's body was already in Ohio and he had no jurisdiction in that state.

It is really a shame, I thought the family had a legitimate case and Mason should have been buried in Rockcastle County," Coffey said.

In his suit seeking the restraining order, Coffey pointed out that in Kentucky, a surviving spouse, or "next of kin" is entitled to possession of a dead body if the parties have been living in normal relations of marriage at the time of death. "It is clear that Mark and Cathy Mason had not been living in normal relations of marriage," Coffey said.

Mason's father, Ernest Mason of Mt. Vernon, said that all of the problems started after an altercation be-

tween his daughters, his ex-wife Cookie and Mason's wife, Cathy.

"They tried to beat her (Cathy) up on Monday morning for no reason and they caused the problem," Ernest Mason said.

"That is when she decided to move him to Ohio to keep down the problems with his sisters," Mason said.

Mason also said that his son and daughter-in-law were not getting a divorce.

However, a suit, in which Mark Mason was seeking a divorce from Cathy Mason was filed in Russell County Circuit Court in August of 1999. Case number 99-CI-00259 was filed on August 20 of last year.

Coffey also pointed out in his suit that Mark Mason gave a deposition on June 26 of this year in an effort to finalize his divorce.

"Mark's oldest children, who are 21 and 19 should have been the ones to take care of his arrangements - what happened just wasn't right," said Alecia Mason Benge.

To make matters worse for the three sisters, when they arrived in Ohio for the visitation at Hodapp Funeral Home, they were told that they, nor their three husbands could

I went to Lexington this morning only because I couldn't convince the people I needed to talk things over with to come south. Unless they're trying to get you to sign up for a free demonstration of the latest innovation in vacuum cleaning technology or they've come to pull an audit on the company that employs you, it's difficult to get most Lexingtonians out of town.

They love those plastic horses to much and they can't bear the thought of leaving them for any length of time.

On the other hand, somewhere around 300 million people who live on other parts of the state commute to work in Lexington every day. The time-it so that they can arrive at their job just a few seconds before it's time to punch the clock. In the evening there is a mad scramble to see who can be the first one to cross the city limits on any major traffic artery on the way out of town.

I read somewhere recently that

Lexington was like the seventh most likely place on the planet to get killed by someone running a red light. Actually, this is yet another sport that has caught on in the bluegrass. In order to make the commute at least a bit interesting drivers try to kill other people. I saw a pedestrian try to cross Nicholasville Road this morning and before it was over 13 big SUV's (please pardon the redundancy) had crashed into each other head on in attempts to be the first one to nail him. A lot of people claim that the only reason they work in Lexington is because getting to and from work is so much fun.

Hardly any of them claim that it's because of the culture and that's a crying shame because they are paying huge amounts of money collected in the form of occupational taxes to support it. The culture is, of course, horse and art. At least, that is what the Mayor and City Council call it.

Anyone who has some old sculptures of horses lying around might

want to give Lexington's elected officials a call. They will come to your house, pay you a handsome price for it and haul it to Main Street or your favorite mall where they will put it atop concrete blocks and rig up a fountain to spray on it. If you can carve horses or mold them out of brass or sheet metal you need to call the Mayor as soon as you get through reading the paper because there is a job waiting for you in Lexington and they'll pay you whatever you think you ought to be making to become a bona fide horse artist.

In the meantime, because the collection was not coming together as fast as they would like it, Lexington has run of 300 million (one for each commuter) life size plastic horses and they have literally commissioned all the artists in town to draw stuff on them. They've strategically placed them everywhere in town that has six square feet of vacant space. And since the parking garage on Main Street isn't being used for much else, you can safely guess what is being planned for it. From the first of last month until time ends, the Lexington Herald Leader will be featuring a color photograph of a different plastic horse on its state and regional front page every day of the year and six times on national holidays.

The artists have painted some of them up to look like zebras, Dalmatians, and name your favorite animal. Others have stuff like sea shells, egg cartons, and beer cans etc., glued onto them so that folks will stuff like "how original" or "what an interesting interpretation" or some other funky utterance to give the impression that they are real connoisseurs. But don't you ever in a million years make the mistake I did this morning (Cont. to A9)

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"What Is Written"

Today we want to look at the Biblical pattern for the organization of the new testament church:

In the universal church, the people of God throughout the world, there is no organic structure. Every Christian is to submit to the head, Jesus Christ, Eph. 1:21-23. But in the local church there is an organizational structure. Phil 1:1 describes, "Paul and Timotheus, the servants of Jesus Christ, to all the saints in Christ Jesus which are at Philippi, with the bishops and deacons." Bishops are overseers, or elders, or pastors. In Ac. 20:18-28 we read, "And from Miletus he sent to Ephesus, and called the elders of the church... Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over the which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers, to feed the church of God, which he hath purchased with his own blood." Notice Paul called for the elders, who he called overseers (which is another translation of bishop) and they were to feed, which comes from the word translated pastor or shepherd. So pastors are bishops, bishops are elders, elders are pastors, the same office or function in the local church. Take note there is to be a plurality of pastors or bishops or elders in a local church, cf. also Ac. 14:23: Elders are to oversee the flock that is among them, 1 Pet. 5:1-2, "The elders which are among you I exhort, who can also be an elder, and a witness of the sufferings of Christ, and also a partaker of the glory that shall be revealed. Feed the flock of God which is among you, taking the oversight thereof, not by constraint, but willingly; not for filthy lucre, but of a ready mind." Bishops do not oversee and pastor other flocks, no, Peter said the flock that is among you. Local churches are autonomous, that is, self governing. The qualifications for bishops and deacons (appointed servants for the local church, cf. Ac. 6:1-5) are found in 1 Tim. 3:1-13. We do not read about any earthly headquarters, synods, one pastor in a church, pope, or archbishop in the new testament. God's pattern for organization is simple!

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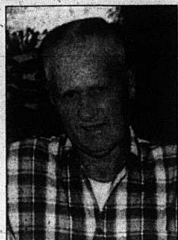

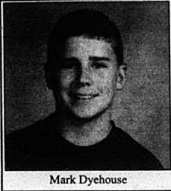

Eastern Kentucky University has put out the welcome mat for new students from Rockcastle County.

If a new student doesn't feel at home academically and socially on the EKU campus by the time classes begin Monday, August 21, it will be because they stayed at home or locked themselves in their residence hall rooms.

New Student Days, August 13-18, will include departmental open houses, seminars on how to succeed in college and other topics, picnics, free breakfasts and midnight meals, concerts, comedians, recreation, dancing and more. The new initiative is designed to ensure that freshmen and transfer students get off to a good start in their new surroundings. "At Summer Orientation, the new students were handed their first homework assignment: to read "Into Thin Air," an autobiographical account by Jon Krakauer of a 1996 expedition to the peak of Mt. Everest that resulted in the death of nine climbers. The bestseller "ranks among the great adventure books of all time," according to the Wall Street Journal.

"We want our students to know up-front that this is all about academics," Davis said, "and this is their first,

assignment. This book is about courage, opportunity and taking responsibility for your own actions. We want students to understand that EKU is a place of opportunity and that we want them to succeed."

Lou Katschke, another survivor of the ill-fated expedition, will discuss the harrowing experience when he speaks to the students Wednesday, Aug. 16.

Through the daytime hours Aug. 13-18, numerous seminars will prepare new students for what they'll encounter academically and socially. The topics include "EKU Academic Expectations," "Making A Colonel Connection with Your Academic Adviser," "Computing on Campus," "Healthy Lifestyles," "How to Get Involved on Campus," "Alcohol 101" and "Can't Cram for that Exam."

Students who plan to live on campus are encouraged to check into residence halls Sunday, Aug. 13, and the University will waste little time in welcoming them.

EKU Dining Services will host a reception for all students and their families that afternoon, and President Bob Kustra will officially welcome them to campus at 4 p.m.

After dinner, students will begin their educational journey at Eastern at a 7 p.m., convocation followed by an evening of free entertainment.

The annual President's Picnic is

scheduled for the following afternoon, as well as a program on "Making College Count," an outdoor movie, dance and a free midnight breakfast.

Similar activities are planned for Tuesday, Aug. 15.

Academic departments will host open houses Wednesday afternoon, Aug. 16 and a Student Organization Fair will be held at the Powell Plaza. A "Blizzard of Bucks" game show highlights the evening activities.

Throughout the week, students can enjoy free bowling and pool and use the basketball gym and weight rooms.

A morning session Friday, Aug. 18 will focus on transfer and non-traditional students, even those students who attend the University's extended centers in Corbin, Manchester and Danville. That afternoon, a fun event is scheduled for all segments of the campus community.

Additional fun events will continue into the weekend.

The admission deadline for full-time, degree-seeking students at EKU is Tuesday, Aug. 1. Registration for the fall semester will continue through Aug. 26.

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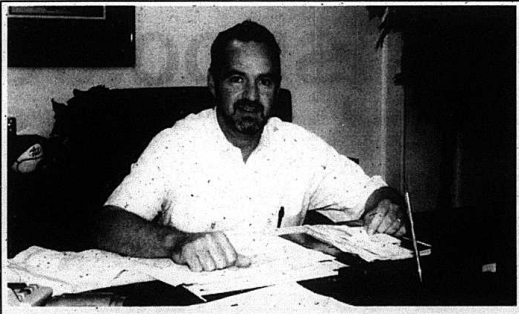

Mark Mason's mother Cooke and his brother Anthony were allowed to go inside the funeral home.

Alicia Mason Benge said this week that Cathy Mason also cancelled the burial of Mark Mason, after Thursday's funeral and told everyone he would be buried sometime this week.

"She told Mark's three older children from his first marriage, she would call them and then Cathy slipped out there the next day and buried him without ever notifying his oldest children," Alicia Benge said.

"Me and Anthony stayed around to see his burial, but they tried to keep us from even doing that," she said. "The law in Kentucky should be made stronger and clearer about who has what authority when someone

Youth Leadership Program wins \$50,000 ARC Grant

U.S. Representative Harold "Hal" Rogers announced that a youth leadership program serving high school students and their adult mentors from distressed counties in Appalachian Kentucky has won a grant of \$50,000 from the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC). The East Kentucky Leadership Network (EKLN) provides leadership skills training sessions for youth from 11 Kentucky counties, including the following counties in Rogers' 5th Congressional District: Breathitt, Clay, Jackson, Letcher, Martin, McCreary, Owsley and Rockcastle.

The East Kentucky Leadership Network gives dozens of high school students a window on being a successful citizen and civic leader," Rogers said today. "This funding will allow this very important program to continue."

The program will serve 112 high school students and 40 adult mentors this year. Recognizing that young people are rarely involved in civic activities, the program encourages youth participation in public institutions such as school boards, fiscal courts of city councils. Students serve on the boards in pairs, with adult members acting as mentors. The program builds an awareness of the need for citizens involvement in public affairs. Past participants say

registrar. "Achieving the Dean's List three times is a significant accomplishment," she said.

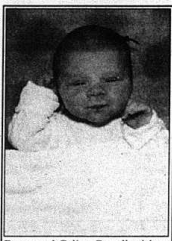

Applications For Tobacco Payments

Hampton Hentox, Jr., Site Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency in Kentucky, has announced that burley tobacco farmers can apply at FSA for compensation under the Tobacco Loss Assistance Program (TLAP) starting July 31, 2000. USDA will distribute \$340 million to compensate tobacco farmers who suffered a reduction of tobacco quota or acreage for the 1999-2000 crop years. Kentucky's share is \$140 million.

As directed by Congress, farmers of designated types of tobacco will receive a portion of the \$340 million to help defray lost income resulting from declining quotas and allotments. Individual farm payments for burley tobacco will be split three ways between farmers, quota owners, and those in control of the quotas (farm operators). Payments under the second year of TLAP will be based on the 2000 crop quota.

TLAP payments will be made no earlier than Oct. 1st and not later than Oct. 20, 2000. Regulations state beginning Jan. 1, 1999, all federal payments will be made through Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT). Therefore, producers signing up for this program who are not signed up for EFT are encouraged to bring a check at the time of sign-up which can be voided for filing with the SE 1199A, Direct Deposit. Producers who do not have a financial institutional account may sign a waiver to receive the TLAP payment by way of check.

Sign-up at local USDA Farm Service Agency offices will begin on July 31st and ends on September 1, 2000. Late-filed applications will not be accepted. Payments will reach farmers between October 1-20, 2000.

Report of Burley Tobacco Loss Before Harvest

Farmers who have suffered a burley tobacco disaster loss are reminded to file a report with FSA prior to harvest to retain their eligibility to lease quota away under the disaster lease provisions.

The disaster lease provision was implemented to provide relief to producers that suffer a disaster loss and are unable to produce and market the farm's effective quota. To be eligible for a disaster lease and transfer, the transferring farm must have: 1. A crop acreage report on file with FSA. 2. Planted an acreage sufficient to produce the farm's current year effective quota. 3. Made a reasonable and customary effort to produce the effective farm marketing quota. 4. Suffered more than a 20 percent crop loss. 5. Met all price support eligibility requirements.

Farms that fail to report losses

before harvest will be a required spot check.

Loan Deficiency Payment
 Producers who retain beneficial interest in a commodity eligible for a loan or a loan deficiency payment (LDP) are eligible for payment if all of the following remain with the producer: • control of the commodity. Risk of loss • Title of the commodity.

One of the eligibility requirements for loans and LDPs is the crop must have been produced on contract acreage (AMTA), exception to soybeans.

A recent bill will now allow non-contract crops to be eligible for LDPs for 2000 year only.

Pork Referendum
 People and businesses who owned and sold hogs or pigs or imported hogs, pigs, pork or pork products during the representative period from August 18, 1999 through August 17, 2000 will be eligible to vote in referendum to determine if producers and importers favor continuation of the Pork Checkoff Program, formally known as the Pork Promotion, Research and Consumer Information Order.

There are three types of eligible voters. One, are people who own and sell hogs or pigs in the US in their own name. The second, is people who import hogs, pigs, pork, pork products, into the US in their own name, and the third is people who are designated to cast the single vote for a business entity that owns and sells, or imports hog, pigs, pork, or pork products into the US.

County FSA offices conducted a sign-up from March 20 to June 23, 2000. Since the producer demand exceeded the amount of funds available by approximately \$14 million, a national factor was applied to all requests. Consequently, producers will receive about 73.5 percent of the

The Accuser is the Doer

Learn many things from the man who came to me for counseling. I will forever be indebted to Debbie (not her real name) who taught me an important lesson.

It happened in a group session in which another woman told how her husband was always accusing her of having an affair. He did so, even though he kept a close eye on her, and she had little chance even to talk to another man. After she told her story, Debbie leaned close to her and said, "The accuser is the doer."

Now certainly this is not always the case, but it is true enough times to bear looking at carefully, when someone accuses his spouse unjustly of having affairs and is extremely jealous even in the face of no evidence, one must wonder what he is doing that would make him so suspicious of his spouse.

Consider the case of Evelyn and Dean (both, fictitious characters). Dean had been jealous of Evelyn from day one of their relationship. When they were dating, he became visibly upset if she talked to another man. At first this felt good to Evelyn.

She thought his jealousy meant that he loved her.

After they were married, he questioned her about all her activities. If she were fifteen minutes late, he wanted a detailed explanation of where she had been and to whom she had talked. "I began to feel as if I were in prison," Evelyn explained.

When he came home from work, he checked the mileage on her car to see if she had gone anywhere. Once he saw tire marks in the driveway and asked who had been there and what she had done with them.
