



Mt. Vernon will set aside \$20,000 annually to go to fire department

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted Monday night to set aside \$20,000 a year for their volunteer fire department to be used toward the construction of a new building or the purchase of a new fire truck.

Councilwoman Lonetta Daugherty made the motion and Clarence Kirby, Jackie Renner, Wayne Bullock and Lou Vanhose voted in favor. Clark Mullins was not present.

Daugherty's motion came after two members of the department, Brian Hansel and Steve Griffin, told the council that members of the fire department were somewhat disgruntled about the condition of the fire house.

"When it rains outside it rains in the fire house - I have never seen anything like it," Hansel told the council.

Steve Griffin also told the council that members of the volunteer department were ready to walk off unless something was done.

"We don't want to leave the city without fire protection, but we will if the council doesn't help us out," Griffin said.

"I think you guys do a great job and I would hate to see that happen," Mrs. Vanhose said.

Griffin and Hansel also reminded Mayor Karen King that one of the things she said she wanted to do with the new tax money generated by the city was to build a firehouse on the city's Main Street lot.

King told Griffin and Hansel that she had tried to lease a new building for the fire department and police

department, but she was unable to do so. She also said the city had applied for a grant to build a new firehouse and police department through the Cumberland Valley Area Development District in London.

The council also agreed to accept bids to fix the roof over the fire department. Those bids will be accepted until August 31.

The city also discussed their new

Carloftis pushing for mandatory garbage collection in Rockcastle

Court turns down request by Laurel Garbage for permit to haul garbage in Rockcastle

Kentucky Governor Paul Patton may be a Democrat and Rockcastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis a Republican, but they certainly agree on one thing.

Patton has said he would push mandatory garbage pick-up statewide during a legislative session in February and last week Carloftis told the Rockcastle Fiscal Court that they should pass mandatory garbage collection for the county.

Carloftis told members of the

court that the county would probably never qualify for federal grants through the PRIDE (Personal Responsibility in a Desired Environment) program if they did not make it mandatory that county residents have their garbage disposed of properly.

That has always been a trend in Rockcastle and last year's results were no exception.

Carloftis has brought the subject before the fiscal court on several occasions and each case it has basically fallen on deaf ears.

Carloftis also told the court that the 1990 Solid Waste Ordinance was outdated and did not have enough

teeth in it.

"We really need to work on that ordinance and we really need to make mandatory garbage collection a law in the county," Carloftis said.

Carloftis said there were several ways the county could take care of the county's garbage.

"We could bid it out for the entire county, by magisterial district or we could even do it ourselves," Carloftis said.

Carloftis' remarks concerning the garbage received almost no comment from the magistrates.

In other action concerning garbage, the court once again denied the request of Laurel Garbage to do business in the county.

Roundstone leads way in county's CTBS scores

Scores for third graders are best by far

The Kentucky Department of Education released the scores for the 2000 Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills (CTBS) on August 1 and show that district wide Rockcastle County students scored better this year than they did a year ago.

The CTBS is given in April to Rockcastle students exiting the third,

sixth, ninth and tenth grades.

The test is set up to gauge student skills in language, reading, math, social studies and spelling.

The scores, reported in percentiles, count five percent toward the overall Commonwealth Accountability Testing System (CATS). CTBS allows for nationwide comparison, with a score of 50 being considered the national average.

Rockcastle County students in the third grade did much better overall than did the students in the sixth, ninth and tenth grades.

That has always been a trend in Rockcastle and last year's results were no exception.

Local man charged with sexual crimes

A Rockcastle County man was released from jail last Friday, after he filed a \$1,000 cash bond.

William D. Campbell, 43, of Philadelphia Church Road, Brodhead had been arrested on August 7 and charged with sexual abuse first degree and sodomy first degree.

According to a citation issued by Kentucky State Police Detective Stacy T. Anderkin, Campbell admitted to sexual contact with an 11-year-old member of his family, about five years ago.

Campbell was ordered to have no contact with the victim. The case was continued to October 25.

Students at Roundstone Elementary School led the county in scoring and they also ranked in the top ten in the state, according to Principal David Pensel.

"The credit should go to everyone, students, staff and parents, because they work hard every year," Pensel said.

A Rockcastle County couple is behind bars this week after a shooting incident on Sunday night.


According to a citation issued by Kentucky State Police Trooper Scott Miller, the shooting incident occurred on John Cash Road around 10:30 Sunday night.


Karl Wayne Pittman is accused of hitting his wife in the nose with the butt of a shotgun.

Okay, before you read past the end of this sentence, I want you to go down the house and get every calendar in the place along with a stack of notepaper and something you can write on so you can tack it to the refrigerator door with one of those funky little magnet things. Hurry up because I'm not writing another word until you get back.

(Long pause)

I'm assuming that everybody is aware that you've tested your yink pen to make sure it writes.

Now I want you to turn to the page that has September on your calendar and pose your pen above Saturday, September 2nd. If you already have something written down for that date, either erase it or mark it out. Now write down Paint Lick Sportsman's Club Fish Fry, 4 til 8 and don't let it even cross your mind to do anything else on September 2nd.

Make at least a dozen notes to yourself that you can stick where you're apt to see them. Some places that I would recommend are the rear view mirror on your truck or automobile, in the middle of your television screen, on the side of your favorite coffee cup and on your spouse's forehead. And of course, on the door of the fridge.

If you don't have a refrigerator door magnet, send me a self-addressed, stamped envelope with 66 cents postage on it and I will mail you one. The address is 301 Charlie Brown Road, Paint Lick, KY 40461. This is not a joke. I'm simply trying to bring you into the world of modern conveniences and I have ready access to a bunch of magnets.

The last time we had a fish fry more than a dozen people called to see if it was still on. There were tornado warnings all over the place and Paint Lick was in the process of getting an inch or so of rain while the lightning flashed and the thunder rolled. And of course the fish fry was on. You don't draw out five hundred pounds of filets and then not have a fish fry and you certainly don't let a tornado blow you away.

Several hundred people showed up in the down-rain and several of them now have umbrellas lying in tobacco fields as far away as Fletcher County. It was either turn loose of the umbrella or get carried away with it, but the fish kept frying.

Nobody went away hungry. We have a clubhouse, if you've never been here. And there's plenty room to eat come rain or shine. So don't let the weather scare you off nor use it as an excuse to keep from getting down here and eating with us as well as helping enable our club to continue.

carrying out its primary mission of doing good and avoiding evil.

In other news, I just got out of the garden where I've been since 6 p.m. until it got so dark I couldn't see on this wonderful second Monday in August. I've plowed up the summer bean and squash patch and sowed it back in mustard, kale, collards and spinach. If the weather holds, I'm going to get out tomorrow night and spend another three hours working up enough ground to plant some late beans, snow peas, cucumbers, zucchini, golden crook-neck, beets and a big turnip patch. I'm also going to see if I can find some onion sets but they are a rare commodity here in the Highlands this time of year.

Roma II bunch beans and Blue Lake will make it if you plant them before the end of the month and if you soak the seed in warm water for 24 hours before planting them. So will all the other stuff I mentioned, but soak your squash and cucumber seed too if you want to beat the frost.

If you have peppers and egg plant in your garden, now is a good time to work the ground around them really good, hill them up and side-dress them with a liberal helping of 10-10-10 fertilizer. Or mix Peter's Professional Miracle Grow exactly three times as strong as they recommend on the package and soak the ground

around your plants once a week for the next three weeks and then every two weeks after that until frost gets them. I mix mine up in a five gallon bucket and I use 3 tablespoons of Peter's to the gallon instead of the one spoonful that the recipe calls for.

I douse each plant with about a quart of this mixture, but it rained enough here all summer that I'm going with the dry fertilizer instead of the liquid because it's easier, cheaper and you only need to do it one time to get your plants back into the production mood. Most varieties of tomatoes will also make a great come back if you give them some food and a little attention and folks, I must prefer vegetables that grow in the fall than the stuff that comes in during hot weather. They may be a bit smaller, but they are much crispier and they have a much more robust flavor. You can literally cover the plants with plastic and have fresh veggies until way up in November unless we get a hard freeze.

If you see anyone with onion sets for sale, let me know. I sure would like to have some scallions to eat with all these greens I plan on having in 45 days. Or just box up a pint and send them to me along with a bill for whatever it may be for them.



The Dark Demon of Depression

"When it hits, I don't know what to do," Sara told me. (All characters are fictitious.) "I wake up in the morning and I feel horrible. I dread the day. Nothing that is happening can get me excited. I'd rather hide in bed all day than go out and face the world."

Sara has been suffering from depression for more of her forty-two years. "I can remember being depressed as a child," she added. "Mom always thought I slept a lot. I'm sure she didn't realize that was part of my depression. I didn't want to go to school, and I cried every day through my whole first year. Mom and Dad worried about me."

Sara continued her story, "I have a good job and some days I enjoy what I do. The people I work with are great, but sometimes I dread going to work. When I have a special project or a meeting, I dread it."

"I worry about many things," Sara told me. "I worry about money. I worry about my work. I worry about whether my friends really like me. I worry that I will make a big mistake and embarrass myself."

Sara was on a roll and she kept right on. "Sometimes I still want to sleep a lot, just like when I was a kid. I walk by the couch and it seems to have a magnet in it, pulling me toward it. Though I've had plenty of sleep, I still want to lie down and sleep some more. Sleep is an escape from the worry."

"My family can tell when I'm depressed," Sara continued. "My temper gets short and I get irritable with them. My kids and my husband are great, but I want to blame them for everything when I'm depressed. Though I know I'm doing this, it is

still hard for me to stop."

"Doctor Sara said, 'I've tried everything I can think of. I am already taking an antidepressant and it does help. I can tell I'm better off with it than without it. I exercise for thirty minutes four times a week. I have been to counselors and psychiatrists. All of this has helped me, but I still have some of depression. Why can't I get rid of it once and for all?'"

Sara paused as if she had exhausted her supply of words. "What is worrying you now, Sara?" I asked. "I am meeting with my staff this week to plan for the next year," she answered. "I don't think they are going to like what I have to say. I want to do things differently in this coming year. I have some dreams about what we can accomplish if we all work a little harder and a little smarter. I'm not sure they are going to want to make the sacrifice."

"What are you worried will happen, Sara?" I inquired. "It's hard to say," she began tentatively. "I guess I am afraid they will quit and it will be my fault. I am afraid they will be angry with me. I always want everybody to like me, so I guess I'm afraid they won't after I tell them my plans."

When I asked Sara if she had these fears before, she smiled. "Sure," she answered. "I've had this fear all my life!"

Sara's face appeared brighter than before. "How do you feel now?" I asked. "Better," she replied. "It does help me to face my fears. The fear is still there, but not as strong as before."

If you are like Sara, seek help. Treatment for depression may include counseling and medication. Most people who are depressed can be helped. Don't wait!

Maintain Healthy Weight

This morning while you were dressing, did your skirt or pants seem a bit snug? Did you have to hold in your stomach to fasten the buttons? Did you have donuts or pastries for breakfast and fast food for lunch? Did you skip your afternoon exercise session to watch television? Do you smoke or drink alcoholic beverages regularly? If you answered "yes" to most of those questions, you probably need to change a few of your bad habits.

Everyone's lifestyle includes a few bad habits - poor eating habits, lack of regular exercise, lack of enough rest, and not using common sense in listening to their body. Often, it's those bad habits that contribute to us feeling run down and sick. Worse, some bad habits can have serious negative consequences. Many people presently have health problems, such as heart disease, that were caused by their lifestyle. Bad habits are not easy to change, but with determination they can be reduced or eliminated. Modifying bad habits for the good increases your odds of feeling good and living healthy.

Below are some good basic habits to include in your lifestyle:
*Stay away from limit visits to fast food restaurants. Many of their selections are high in calories and fat.
*Know your cholesterol number and

limit your intake of cholesterol-rich foods. You should maintain your cholesterol level below 200 milligrams per deciliter of blood.
*Include an adequate amount of starch and fiber in your diet.
*Limit your use of salt and sugar.
*Taste your food before adding any salt or sugar. Stay away from sweets.

*Include fruits and vegetables in your diet daily.
*Behavior plays an important role in your eating habits. It is common to overeat. Overeating is usually triggered by a situation - anger, stress, frustration or boredom. If you are a person who reacts by overeating, change this habit by exercising to work off the anger or other emotions you are feeling. If you must eat, reach for something healthy such as apples, carrots or celery instead of the chocolate cookies.

*To avoid overeating at mealtime, try using a smaller plate; eating slowly; taking smaller bites; drinking plenty of water before eating (8, 8-ounce glasses of water per day lowers the stomach's capacity). Also avoid food shopping when you are hungry and keep junk food out of sight and out of mind - don't buy it.







Signed Up For Your Free Money?

FSA offices across the state are now accepting applications for the 2000 Tobacco Loss Assistance Program. If in the 2000 crop year, you are a landowner with a tobacco quota, a land operator with a tobacco quota or a producer who markets tobacco in your name then you are eligible to receive payment. The TLAPO applications are available at your local FSA office. REMEMBER: SIGNUP ENDS SEPTEMBER 1ST. Late filed applications will not be accepted!! One last note-ALL OWNERS OF THE FARM MUST SIGN THE TLAPO APPLICATION EVEN IF YOU ARE GETTING 0% SHARE. This pertains to husband and wife as well as other owners.

Report of Burley Tobacco Loss Before Harvest

Farmers who have suffered a burley tobacco disaster loss are reminded to file a report with FSA prior to harvest to retain their eligibility to lease quota away under the disaster lease provisions.

The disaster lease provision was implemented to provide relief to producers that suffer a disaster loss and are unable to produce and market the farm's effective quota. To be eligible:

1. Persons who own and sell hogs or pigs in the U.S. in their own name;
2. Persons who import hogs, pigs, pork, pork products in the US in their own name; and
3. Persons who are designated to cast the single vote for a business entity that owns and sells, or imports hogs, pigs, pork or pork products into the U.S.


Within a month we will begin to witness a dramatic transformation of the countryside, as autumn colors will begin to blaze across the landscape. Tawny brown leaves accented by burnt orange and flaming crimson will replace the once green colored foliage signifying the maturation of yet another growing season. The color changes in nature's flora are a beautiful reminder of fall, and a harbinger of harvest activity. Farmers are currently reviewing their harvest checklist for things that need to be done before harvest can begin in earnest. In addition to preparing all the farm equipment for harvest, producers also have to think about having their paperwork in order before the combines can roll. Currently the Farm can concentrate on harvesting, assured that the maximum allowable assistance for the delivered grain is automatically locked in. In this way FSA is helping farmers receive the best possible assistance they need to remain competitive during these inequitable times of substantial commodity prices. By visiting the local FSA office before fall harvest, producers can file the necessary LDP forms for both program and non-program crops.

Remember: Signup for the Tobacco Loss Assistance Program runs through Sept. 1, 2000.

Service Agency (FSA) has a number of ways to help producers during these times of historically low commodity prices. Loan Deficiency Payments (LDPs) are available on most small grain, coarse grain and oilseed crops. LDP eligibility for program crops like wheat and corn, has previously been restricted to those acres covered by a Production Flexibility Contract (PFC). But now non-receiving farm production can receive LDPs on bushels that were previously considered to be ineligible.

Producers also need to be certain that all grain which may go directly to the elevator at harvest is covered by a CCCO-709 field direct form at the FSA office. Farmers should have this form filled out for all their crops just in case harvest conditions would cause a high moisture loss or surplus production that would go directly to the elevator. When grain is dumped at the elevator, beneficial interest generally transfers, and the CCC-709 authorizes the LDP rate for the specific day that the grain was delivered to the elevator. By insuring that all bushels are covered for LDP eligibility prior to combining, farmers will replace the once green colored foliage signifying the maturation of yet another growing season. Community Walking Program

Umbertland Valley District Health Department
The Community Walking Program is for all residents of Rockcastle County who are interested in improving their health. The goal of the program is to walk a minimum of three days a week for thirty minutes or daily, for five days a week for thirty minutes. The program will have a 2 week fall and a 12-week spring session. Participants who complete the program and turn in their walking logs will be eligible to receive incentives or prizes.

Participants will register at the Rockcastle County Health Department. Each person will receive a registration packet with a free gift and a walking log book to track their time or mileage. At the time of registration, walkers will have their height, weight, blood pressure, cholesterol, and pulse recorded. Optional body measurements, such as circumference of waist, hips, and thighs, and arms can also be recorded. These body measurements are optional but will provide the walker valuable information and encouragement as you see positive changes in your body with a consistent exercise program. Follow-up measurements will be offered at the end of the program. (Cholesterol testing will be a small fee.) Walking will be done at each individual's convenience, wherever he or she desires, and a treadmill is acceptable or walkers will be invited to walk as a group with a health department staff member at announced locations. Mileage or time will be documented on the honor system at the end of the program. Walkers that complete the program will be eligible to receive a T-shirt and recognition for their outstanding effort!

If you mail your form, you should contact the Health Department to find out when you can come in to pick up your Registration Packet.



occupational and net profits tax.

Councilwoman Clarice Kirby made a motion to extend the filing deadline each quarter by seven days, until January 1, 2001.

Jackie Renner seconded the motion, but Daugherty, Bullock and Vanhose voted it down.

Daugherty said she thought a month was a long enough period of time for businesses to file and pay their taxes.

City Clerk Kaye Rader said last week that about 18 businesses had not filed their tax forms with the

city, which were due on July 31st for the months of April, May and June.

Rader also said that the city had taken in about \$40,000 so far from the occupational tax.

The net profits tax on businesses will not be paid to the city until next year when those businesses file their income taxes.

Councilwoman Vanhose also said she thought something should be done about the poor condition in the basement of city hall where the police department has their offices.

"They have got mud down there," she said.

The council agreed to allow Water Superintendent Dennis McClure fix the problem by using a two foot drain in the parking lot.

The council also voted to waive all sewer charges for city residents that currently cannot hook to sewer.

In the past the city has charged those people, although city sewer was not available to them.

Mt. Vernon Police Chief Bill Mink told the council that city police arrested 13 people last month for driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

He also said that six of the city's seven police cars are now equipped with radar units and that police officers wrote 68 citations last month for speeding.

"Garbage"

Joe McWilliams told the court his company was a nationally owned company, which would provide good service and low prices to customers in Rockcastle County.

McWilliams told the court his company wanted to get into the dumpster business so county businesses would have a choice when it came to their garbage needs.

"As it stands right now, there isn't any competition, they (BEE) have it all," McWilliams told the court.

"I have talked to a lot of business people who are very interested in what we have to offer," McWilliams said.

McWilliams also told the fiscal court that his company did business in every county surrounding

Rockcastle County.

Magistrate John Holbrook voted to give McWilliams a permit. Carlottis seconded it and magistrate Carlottis seconded it and magistrate Fred Mullins, Jr., Bill McKinney and Donald Bullock all voted no.

McWilliams seemed upset by their vote and asked the magistrates who voted no, why - but he did not get a response.

McKinney did say that large companies like Republic, which owns Laurel Garbage, usually are able to drive out the competition by charging a lot less at first.

"They make it extremely hard on the little guy. It was not against competition, but I think there wouldn't be any if they were allowed to come to the county and I doubt they would provide the good service they say they would," he said.

"You can look at their track record and in most cases they are the only game in town, so they can charge what they want," he said.

Although magistrate Jack Bradley voted for the permit, he told McWilliams that BEE had helped the fiscal court by getting into the business when no one else would. "I don't know what we would have done without them," he said.

Carlottis also said after the meeting that if the court followed the 1990 ordinance, it was his belief that the fiscal court could not legally reject certification of a permit for any hauler meeting the county's requirements.

Laurel Garbage met all the requirements.

The court also rejected a request for a permit to haul garbage by John Perkins of Berea.

follow, we try very hard to remain focused on providing a quality education at Roundstone." Pensol said.

Roundstone students did better this year than last in every category except spelling. Overall, they scored 69.0 on Mt. Vernon's 61.4 and Brodhead's 55.7.

Roundstone's best scores came in Science where they tallied 72.3.

Mt. Vernon's scores were nearly seven points higher overall than a year ago and students there did better in every category than they did a year ago.

McWilliams' best scores were also in Science with a 68.0.

Scores for students at Brodhead Elementary fell slightly from a year ago to 55.7, from 57.0.

Brodhead students did score slightly higher in four of the six areas on the test.

Brodhead students also scored the best in Science with a score of 58.8.

Third graders as a whole scored fifteen points higher than the state average with a total of 70 and the state's being 55.

The third graders also scored the second highest in the region six area, of which they are included.

Russell County Schools was the only school district to score higher than Rockcastle's third graders with a score of 71. Other scores in the region six area are: Bell County, Adair County, Laurel County, Wayne County, Putaski County, Madison County, Taylor County, Estill County, Whitley County, Clinton County, Lincoln County, Garrard County, Jackson County, Casey County, Clay County, Knox County, Hartan County, and McCreary County.

Sixth grade students at the Rockcastle County Middle School scored lower in every area this year than they did a year ago, with the biggest drop coming in social studies where students scored six points lower this year than last.

Sixth graders scored best in language with a 50.3.

Overall, Rockcastle sixth graders scored one point higher than the region six average and two points lower than the state average of 52.0.

At the Rockcastle County High School ninth and tenth grade students both scored lower last year than a year ago.

Students in the ninth and tenth grades scored better in social studies than any other area. The ninth grade had a score of 50.3 and tenth graders scored 52.0. In both classes, it was the only area in which students scored higher than the national average of 50.

Students in the ninth and tenth grades also scored lower in math. Ninth graders fell nine and half points below the national average with a score of 39.5 and tenth graders fell eight points short of the average with a score of 42.

Scores for tenth graders fell in every area tested, while ninth graders improved in social studies and spelling.

Staying healthy will be key to 2000 campaign

The 2000 Edition of the Rockcastle County High School football team will kick-off on Friday night at Lincoln County.

The Rockets will be looking for their 15th straight winning season and they hope they can repeat last year's excellent season mark of 8 and 2.

They also won two of three in the play-offs to finish second in the region behind highly touted Lawrence County.

But if they are to accomplish their goals, head coach Tom Larkey says the ROCK must stay healthy in 2000.

"We've got some key players it would be very hard to replace - we really don't have a lot of depth," Larkey said.

Larkey, who along with head assistant Tony Saylor begins his 16th season at the ROCK, pointed to seniors Greg Harper, Derrick Bussell, Sean Smith and Travis Ingram, as key players who the Rockets would have a hard time replacing.

When the Rockets line up on Friday night they will have quite a bit of new personnel in the line-up, but they will also have several returning starters from a year ago.

On the offensive line, junior William Blair, senior Sean Smith and sophomore Tanner Abney are definite starters. Senior Jason Bullock, junior Jason Ramey, sophomore Michael Brummett and freshman Jason Leger are all fighting for a job. "They will all play, but we really haven't decided who will start because of injuries and some other circumstances, such as missed practices," Larkey said.

Larkey admitted that it was unusual for a freshman to be a possible starter for the ROCK but he said Leger had what it takes. "He works hard, he has a good attitude and he has the body to play - he is going to be a very, very good football player for us," Larkey said.

In the backfield, the Rockets return two key starters, in senior quarterback Christopher

Parsons and senior tailback Derrick Bussell.

Parsons and Bussell are three year starters and they will be joined by two other backs with varsity experience, junior Josh Hale and sophomore Marty Reagan. Junior Clay Dooley has been tapped to fill the fullback spot and junior Josh Taylor will also see action in the backfield.

Seniors Greg Harper and Dackery Larkey will play the end positions and Hale, senior Chaz Cable and senior Heath Payne will see action at the flanker spot.

One of the ROCK's strong points in 2000 will be their kicking game.

Senior Greg Terry is a three

year starter, who is being looked at by several colleges.

Terry is probably the best kicker ever to play at the ROCK, and should be a big part of the Rocket offense in 2000.

The Rockets actually had more holes to fill on the defensive side of the ball than on offense because of graduation, but Coach Saylor is always up to the task.

The ROCK will start four new players on the defensive line in 2000. None of them played on the line last year and three of them will be underclassmen.

Senior Dackery Larkey will start at one defensive end and junior William Blair will start

at the other.

Junior Adam Childress will start at one down lineman and sophomore Tanner Abney will start at the other one.

Larkey is the most experienced of the four, but as a group they are very inexperienced.

Another strong suit for the Rockets will be their linebacking corp.

Seniors Travis Ingram, Greg Harper and Sean Smith will make most of the tackles for the ROCK in 2000.

The trio is experienced, strong and mobile.

Ingram has proven that he is one of the best at his middle linebacker spot, but he

has been hampered by a sore shoulder all summer long.

Senior Derrick Bussell will play the strong safety spot, while junior Josh Hale will assume the very important role of defensive rover. Junior Clay Dooley will play one corner and sophomore Marty Reagan will play the other one.

Larkey and Saylor both said things could change before Friday night, but unless someone comes up hurt, a line-up change at this point is unlikely.

The Rockets open up on Friday night in Stanford, where they will play host Lincoln County in the Death Valley Bowl.

Game time has been moved up to 6:00 p.m.







The Rockets are playing in the Death Valley Bowl for the second straight year, but they are playing Lincoln County for the first time in several years.

History will tell you that the Rockcastle County Coaching staff has always talked down their chances for a good season.

Usually to hear them tell it, they would be lucky to go 5 and 5.

With the help of scholarships, Southwestern has managed to build a football power in Somerset and last year they were the district champs.

The ROCK lost last year to the Warriors 42-13 in their worst loss of the season.

The Rockets will get a much needed week off on September 8 and then they will travel to Estill County.

Estill County is still in a rebuilding stage with a second year head coach. Last year the Rockets won 34-0.

The next week the Rockets will begin district play and travel to Hindman where they will take on the Knott County Patriots.

Last year the Rockets trounced Knott County 55-0 and it could have been a lot worse.

North Laurel comes to town as the ROCK's homecoming victim for 2000.

The game will also have some added flavor given the fact that Larry Welch, who is now a member of the Rockets coaching staff, was the head coach at North Laurel last season.

Week nine finds Whitley County in Rockcastle for what will be one of the toughest games of the season for the Rockets.

Last year the ROCK went into Williamsburg and escaped with a one point victory over the Colonels.

Whitley County has several starters back and they are extremely big for a high school football team.

"If everyone is healthy we have a good chance to beat Whitley, but if not we could easily get beat that night," head coach Tom Larkey said.

In week ten the ROCK will

travel to Knox Central where they will find a Panther team with a new coach.

Last year the ROCK crushed the Panthers 55-0.

In week eleven the Rockets take the long road trip to Harlan where they will take on the Cawood Trojans.

Cawood is usually a school with a good football team, but in the past few years they have been down. Last year the ROCK soundly trounced the Trojans 63-0.

However the Trojans have their head coach back after a year's sabbatical to the military and they ran all over Middlesboro in a scrimmage last week.

The final week of the regular season finds the ROCK hosting Bell County in a game that is likely to decide the district champs once again.

Last year the Rocketes had to win at Bell to claim the district title, but it was Bell County

that was the better team that night, claiming the win and the district title 19-7.

This year Sheldon Clark, a team Rockcastle dismantled in the play-offs has been picked to win the region with Bell County second.


