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



Carloftis pushing for mandatory garbage collection in Rockcastle

Court turns down request by Laurel Garbage for permit tohaul garbage in Rockcastle

By: Richard Anderkin Kentucky Governor Paul Patton may be a Democrat and Rockcastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis a Republican, but they certainly agree ne thing

on one thing.

Mandatory garbage pick-up.
Patton has said he would push
mandatory garbage pick-up sautevide
during a legislative session in February and last week Carloftis told the
Rockcastle Fiscal Court that they
should pass mandatory garbage collection for the county.

Carloftis told members of the

court that the county would probably never qualify for federal grants through the PRIDE (Personal Re-sponsibility in a Desired Environ-ment) program if, they did not mate it mandatory that county residents have their garbage disposed of prop-erly.

Carloftis has brought the subject Carloftis has brought the subject before the fiscal court on several oc-casions and each ease it has basically fallen on deaf ears. Carloftis also told the court that the 1990 Solid Waste Ordinance was outdated and did not have enough

teeth in it.

"We really need to work on that ordinance and we really need to make mandatory garbage collection a law in the county," Carloftis said.

county, by magisterial district or we could even do it ourselves," Carlofus



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

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

Currently the Farm can concentrate on harvesting, as-

combines can rol. Currently the Farm concentrate on harvesting, assured that the maximum allowable assistance for the delivered grains assistance for the delivered grains automatically locked in. If this way for the basic financial assistance they need to remain competitive during these inequitable times of substandard commodity prices. By visiting the local FSA office before fall harvest, producers can file the necessary LDP forms for both program and nonrogam crops.

Remember: Signup for the Tobacco Loss Assistance Program runs through Sept. 1, 2000.

Service Agency (FSA) has a number of ways to help producers during these times of historically low commodity prices. Loan Deficiency Payments (LDPs) are available on Payments (LDPs) are available on most small grain, coarse grain and oilseed prices. 

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court will hold a public hearing on Friday, August 25, 2000 at 9 a.m. at the Rockcastle County Courthouse for the purpose of obtaining comments from the public regarding the proposed tax rate. Based on state estimates, this will <u>add only one penny per week</u> 1.52c per year) to the average tax bill in Rockcastle County.

The tax rate levied last year was 0.074% and produced revenues in the amount of \$165,381. This year's compensating rate is 0.072% and will produce revenues in the amount of \$117,569. The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court proposes a tax rate of 0.074% which will produce a total of \$176,335

Staying healthy will be key to 2000 campaign

The 2000 Edition of the Rockcastle County High School football team will kickoff on Friday night at Lincoln County.

The Rockets will be looking for their 15th straight winning season and they hope they can repeat last year's excellent season mark of 8 and 2.

They also won two of three in the play-offs to finish second in the region behind highly touted Lawrence County.

But if they are to accomplish their goals, head coach Tom Larkey says the ROCK must stay healthy in 2000.

"We've got some key players it would be very hard to replace - we really don't have a lot of depth," Larkey said.

Larkey, who along with head assistant Tony Saylor begins his 16th season at the ROCK, pointed to seniors Greg Harper, Detrick Bussell, Sean mith and Travis Ingram, as key players who the Rockets would have a hard time replacing.

When the Rockets line up on Friday night they will have quite a bit of new personnel in the line-up, but they will also have several returning starters from a year ago.

On the offensive line, junior William Blair, senior Sean Smith and sophomore Tanner Abney are definite starters. Senior Jason Bullock, junior Jason Ramey, sophomore Michael Brummeit and freshman Jason Leger are all fighting for a job. "They will all play, but we really haven't decided who will start because of injuries and some other circumstances, such as missed practices," Larkey said.

Larkey admitted that it was unusual for a freshman to be a possible starter for the ROCK but he said Leger had what it takes. "He works hard, he has a good attitude and he has the body to play - he is going to be a very, very good football player for us," Larkey said.

In the backfield, the Rockets return two key starters, in senior quarterback Christopher Parsons and senior tailback Derrick Bussell.

Parsons and Bussell are three year starters and they will be joined by two other backs with varsity experience, junior Josh Hale and sophomore Marty Reagan. Junior Clay Dooley has been tapped to fill the fullback spot and junior Josh Taylor will also see action in the backfield.

Seniors Greg Harper and Dackery Larkey will play the end positions and Hale, senior Chaz Cable and senior Heath Payne will see action at the flanker spot.

One of the ROCK's strong points in 2000 will be their kicking game.

Senior Greg Terry is a three

year starter, who is being looked at by several colleges.

Terry is probably the best kicker ever to play at the ROCK, and should be a big part of the Rocket offense in 2000.

The Rockets actually had more holes to fill on the defensive side of the ball than on offense because of graduation, but Coach Saylor is always up to the task.

The ROCK will start four new players on the defensive line in 2000. None of them played on the line last year and three of them will be underclassmen.

Senior Dackery Larkey will start at one defensive end and junior William Blair will start at the other.

Junior Adam Childress will start at one down lineman and sophomore Tanner Abney will start at the other one.

Larkey is the most experienced of the four, but as a group they are very inexperienced.

Another strong suit for the Rockets will be their linebacking corp.

Seniors Travis Ingram, Greg Harper and Sean Smith will make most of the tackles for the ROCK in 2000.

The trio is experienced, strong and mobile.

Ingram has proven that is he is one of the best at his middle linebacker spot, but he has been hampered by a sore shoulder all summer long.



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



Last year the Rockes had to win at Bell to claim the district title, but it was Bell County that was the better team that night, claiming the win and the district title 19-7.


This year Sheldon Clark, a team Rockcastle dismantled in the play-offs has been picked to win the region with Bell County second.
