## Contaminated ground water found locally

State officials are trying to determine just how widespread the contamination of ground water is in the Mt. Vernon area.

A spokesperson with the Division of Water in Frankfort said that contamination of the ground water is being caused by underground storage tanks at the former B & F Gulf Station on Hwy. 25, which apparently leaked.

Samples taken recently in the area show that chemicals from these tanks have gotten into the rock formation and that every time it rains, the contamination spreads throughout the city.

Last week a work crew drilled wells in the general vicinity of the former gas station and placed monitoring devices to help them determine the spread of the chemicals.

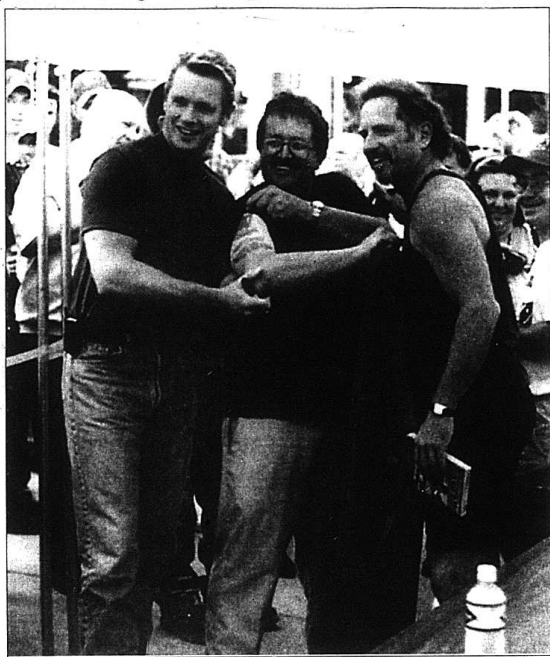

## One arrest warrant leads to others

Rockcastle District Court cases against some members of the same Livingston family were continued on Wednesday.

Jonathan S. Northern, 21, of Livingston will be back in court on Friday, when a public defender will be appointed.

Northern is charged with possession of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia, after he was arrested on August 28 by Livingston Police Officer Danny Keeneey.

Keeneey had wanted Northern's residence to serve a warrant for attempted theft by unlawful taking and criminal mischief, when he found a

bag of marijuana in Northern's pocket. Keeneey also said in his complaint that Northern had a pipe with marijuana in it in his possession.

## State charges local man with illegal dumping

A Rockcastle County man has been ordered to clean up an illegal dump he has allegedly been operating near his home.

Water Douglas III of Flat Lick Road was directed to stop dumping material and take the accumulated waste to a permitted facility. Douglas was also told to pay a \$250 fine and provide proof to the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet that he has paid in advance for the next two years of home garbage service.

Inspectors from the cabinet cited Douglas following an inspection of the Flat Lick Road site on September 5. The site contained stacks of wood pallets that Douglas told inspectors he was reconditioning. Staff from the Division of Waste Management issued a notice of violation to Douglas last week based on their inspection.

Inspectors also discovered three areas at the site where garbage or other material had been burned. Douglas was directed not to burn any material or he could face a \$25,000 penalty. Douglas has been given 30 days to pay his fine and provide proof of home garbage service. Failure to do so could result in maximum penalties of \$5,000 per day from the date the notice of violation was issued.

Cabinet investigators also discovered other illegal dumpsites on Flat Lick Road, and they will work to identify and cite the persons responsible for those sites.

## Richard Lovell gets ten year sentence

U.S. District Court Judge Karl Forester described Richard "Rick" Lovell as a "big dog and mastermind" of a Rockcastle County cocaine smuggling ring last week, then sentenced him to 10 years in federal prison and five years supervised probation.

Lovell and 16 other defendants-most of them family members-sold at least 150 kilos of cocaine they hauled in from Florida then distributed in Eastern and Southeastern Kentucky, prosecutors said.

Lovell faced a sentence of 20 years up to life, but eked out a lighter sentence by cooperating with federal prosecutors. Lovell was not the first to cooperate, but he was an early defendant to do so-a trend that led 14 other defendants to plead guilty.

The Lovell family has had other run-ins with the law. David Lovell, also indicted in the drug case, faces a murder charge alleging that he killed Charles "Toddy" Baker of Mt.

Vernon and burned his body in 1997. In exchange for his plea a guilty to operating a continuing criminal enterprise, Lovell will serve the 10-year sentence and forfeit his interest in 10.2 acres on U.S. 25 South in Rockcastle County, along with the mobile homes on that land and \$50,000 seized in April 1999.

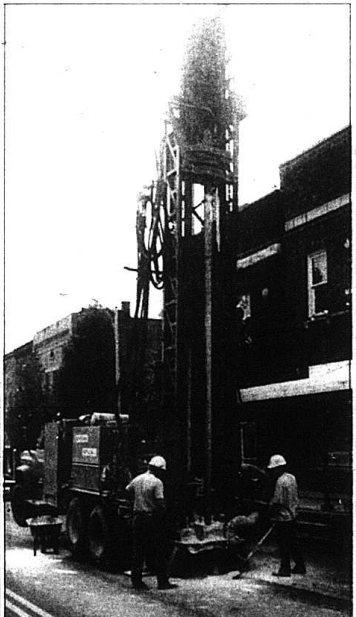
The drug bust in February was the culmination of a five-year investigation in which dozens of law enforcement agencies cooperated.

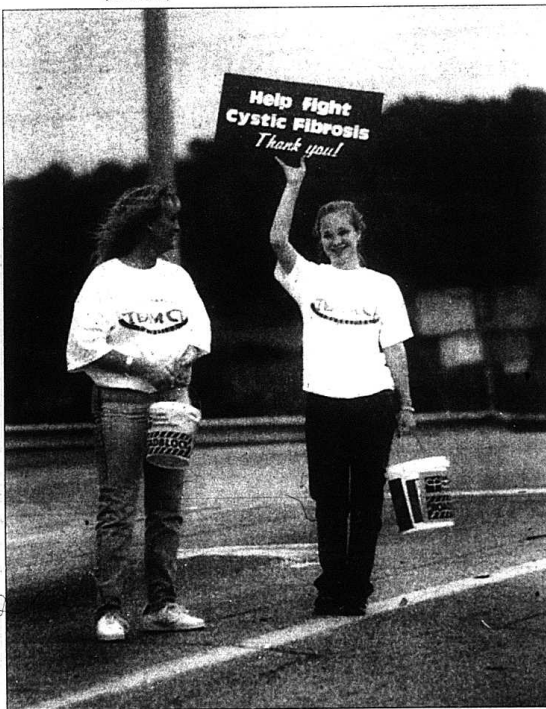

# Sweet and Sour

**Apple Butter**  
For awhile today I thought my followers would have to look elsewhere for a bit of folklore to kill a few minutes of time with. When I went to my memory box it was empty. Not a shred of one was to be found, so thinking I had probably hid them somewhere else or the demon of age (loss of memory) devoured them, probably the latter, I closed up the word processor and headed for the kitchen.

Then I heard Polly and Chuck in the kitchen. Their cheery voices brought reality back and when they told me they had brought something that would keep me busy awhile I knew their instincts for my need of something to do in time of stress had alerted them. So here they were with several containers of peeled and sliced apples ready to be made into apple butter. Chuck had told me a few days earlier they were drying apples from the trees on the farm, I offered to make apple butter if he would bring some of them to me. So here they were, apples from the very trees I had watched grow from seedlings into old crippled ones that still had the courage to put forth fruit. They were from trees Mat had ordered our first year on the farm, and his hired hands had planned heler shelter after removing the tags so we never knew for sure which tree was bearing what. But one thing we did know, from the

stepped in front of me and calmly reached up and plucked it, took a big bite and called to his father, a short distance away, "Look Pa, what I found. It is the only one on the tree, and boy is it ever a good one. (The urge to kill was strong, maybe if his dad hadn't been there a little boy's corpse would have been found in my front yard with a half eaten red apple clutched between his teeth.)"

That tree usually bears apples every two years, I never found out what kind it was, but the quality and quantity of the fruit is borne as unbelieveably. When it ripened the multi-colored red skin would burst and reveal an almost red tinted meat inside filled with bursting tart juice. I call this my apple-butter. The apple butter made from it seemed to absorb all the qualities of color and quaint flavor no other apple had.

Then there was my apple-sauce tree. The tree farmed up in the yard also had an exceptional quality of flavor and quantity. The apples on it were almost transparent in color and

the meat inside was white with clear juice dripping from every slice when it was cut. The large smooth, thin skinned, apples were easily peeled and apple-sauce made from them was almost pure white with a flavor that didn't need sugar to enhance it. "Life hands are the devils workshop" brought something to keep them busy. Now I have a pan of apples ready to put in the oven and when it is ready I'll take care of my apple-butter and you have something to read.

Although Christians claim they are less likely to kill because their God commands them not to kill, there exists the distinct possibility that they will, indeed, kill, if they think their God tells them to. We've seen it before, throughout history.

See, I know killing is wrong because my reason tells me it's wrong, but the only thing keeping a Christian

gets to the point of being comfortable with oneself, even to the point of liking oneself. Authentic people accept themselves for who they are and feel no need to put on a mask.

Johnny Cash seems to be such a person. Through the years of rebellion and trouble, he has come to the point at which he knows who he is and accepts himself as such. He neither flaunts his differences nor tries to mimic the fads. He is, simply himself. I wish for all of us that kind of authenticity.

**You Can Go Home Again**  
They say, "You can't go home again," but a few months ago I did. Home for the first eighteen years of my life was Centertown, Kentucky. Located in Ohio County, Centertown is not exactly a booming metropolitan area: three hundred people on a good day and not very exciting. One visitor described it as the only cemetery he had ever seen with street lights.

The three-hour drive passed quickly as I listened to the Stalder Brothers' "Class of '57" and other songs about the past. I crossed the unused railroad track, passed a couple of tile coal trucks, and made my way into town. "Towns" consists of one bank, a convenience food mart, one funeral home, a gas station and one beauty shop.

My first stop was the cemetery. This was my main reason for returning: I came to talk to Dad. There is something about being in that place that makes me feel closer to him. Snow was still on the ground as I made my way down the hill to his grave. I cleared the snow of his tombstone and spent the next hour thinking and talking.

Graveyards are wonderful places: quiet, tranquil and conducive to thinking, especially on a day when there is four inches of snow on the ground. I had the place pretty much to myself. As I stood looking at Dad's grave, I shifted my gaze a little to the right and saw his father's grave, another slight shift of my eyes, and I could see my great grandfather's grave. Three generations were buried within a few feet of each other. Another of my great grandfathers is buried on the other side of the hill.

As I stood amidst the headstones, I felt a connection with them. I also felt a deep sense of gratitude to my father and the others: they worked hard to give me opportunities that they never had. Dad had no chance to go to college. He graduated from high school in the midst of the Great Depression and immediately went to work to support his wife and three children and sisters. He did, however, make certain that his son and daughter had the opportunity to attend college.

When I finished visiting with Dad, I drove around town. Almost every street and corner carried a memory of me: playing ball with Rex, science experiments with Jerry and recess on the playground. Not all memories are pleasant. I saw the house where my first girlfriend lived. She died of cancer several years ago.

**Johnny Cash** Is An Authentic Human Being  
Johnny Cash was recently honored by the Kentucky Center for The Performing Arts in Washington, D.C. It was an auspicious occasion honoring Cash and four others for their contributions to the performing arts. The tributes to Cash were particularly moving for me.  
His wife, June Carter Cash has described his face as "looking lived in." Cash's face shows the evidence of a life lived on the edge. Each of those wrinkles has a good reason for being there. At one point in his life, Cash was on drugs. At times I looked as if he would never fully live his own prediction, "God has laid his hands on you, Son. I don't know what for, but he's laid his hand on you. In developments for which he gives God the credit, Cash pulled himself up and reclaimed his life.  
Present to honor Cash at this event were singers Kris Kristofferson, Lyle Lovett, Emmy Lou Harris, Pete Seeger and daughter, Rosemary Cash. Seeger recalled how Cash was one of the few willing to come on Seeger's radio show in the fifties when Seeger had been blacklisted by the music industry. Kristofferson sang "Sunday Morning Coming Down" and reflected on Cash's contribution to country music.  
There were not many dry eyes in the house when Kristofferson, Lovett, Harris and Rosemary Cash joined with the choir singing "I'll Fly Away." In fact, I am almost certain that I saw a tear in the eye of fellow Arkansas native Bill Clinton. Cash, with less than an advanced formal education, was honored by two former Rhodes Scholars that evening, Bill Clinton and Kris Kristofferson. The President sang along with the choir on "I'll Fly Away," and he really did know all the words.  
There were also tears in the eyes of the guest of honor. Cash is older and feebler now, his face widened by additional pounds and wisened by new wrinkles. He is still, however, the man in black. His choice of clothing colors is intentional: the black he wears

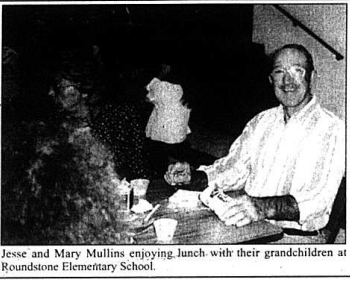

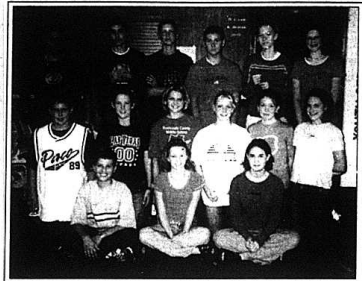

## Middle School students become peacemakers

One goal of the mediation program is for students to understand that they can talk problems out instead of fighting and arguing.

Last week 48 RCMS students were trained to be peer mediators. Mediators are selected by their peers. The students choose well respected peers who have good verbal and listening skills and are fair and trustworthy. Events in the mediation process are kept confidential. Aaron Cash, who has been a mediator for three years states, "Students will tell things to peers that they would not tell to teachers."

During the training, students are taught and able to practice the mediation process. They are also taught effective questioning and listening

techniques. The mediation process involves getting disputants to 1) Identify the problem, 2) Focus on the problem, 3) Attack the problem, not the person, 4) Listen with an open mind, 5) Treat others with respect, and 6) Take responsibility for their actions.

Last year 84 mediations took place at RCMS with only two left unresolved. The peer mediation training was conducted by program coordinators Ken Mattingly and Lesha Cromer.

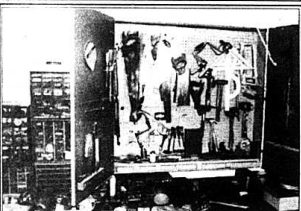
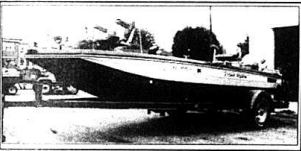

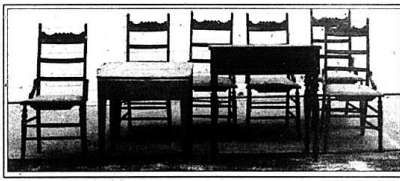

### Hayes receives Ag Scholarship

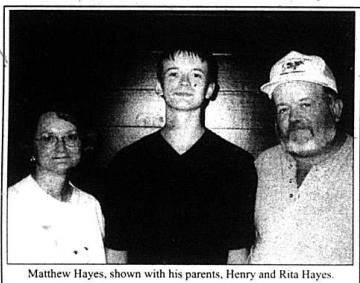

### Quick Breads Make Breakfast Fast, Easy

Quick breads and muffins are stir-and-bake favorites for everyone. This is because they are quick to mix up. Few ingredients are needed, and just a few steps are followed. This makes quick breads a favorite for cooks who don't like to be in the kitchen or who don't have a lot of cooking experience. Both can bake while you shower and dress, or help other get ready. For best results, follow these tips:

\*measure ingredients carefully;  
\*stir ingredients just until moist; and  
\*bake in a preheated oven. Preheating the oven is important for this type of recipe. It is not a step you should skip.

To make serving quick breads even easier, plan ahead. Simply bake one or two breads or muffins another day, on the weekend or on an evening when you're home. Cool on racks. Slice bread. Wrap each muffin and bread slice in plastic wrap or foil. Place in a freezer bag. Freeze.

Grab a muffin or bread slice from your prepared stash the next time you need breakfast on the go. The breads will thaw quickly and will soon be ready to eat. Eat as is or reheat.

Here's a quick muffin recipe which is sure to please.

- Ham and Cheese Muffins**
- 2 cups baking mix
  - 2 eggs
  - 2 cup milk
  - 1 tablespoon oil
  - 1 teaspoon seasoned salt
  - 1/2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese
  - 1/2 cup cubed fully cooked ham.

Preheat oven to 350 degree F. Coat 12 muffin cups with nonstick vegetable spray. Combine baking mix, eggs, milk, oil and seasoned salt in a large bowl. Mix well. Stir in ham and cheese. Spoon batter into prepared muffin cups, dividing evenly. Bake 25 - 30 minutes, or until golden brown—test cool in pan 2 minutes. Then remove from pan and place on a wire rack to cool. Or, serve warm. Store in an airtight container for several days in the refrigerator or freeze for longer storage. Makes 12 muffins.

Cook's tip: For best results: Use regular, not finely shredded cheese. Use leftover ham or other meats.

### Signed Up For Your Free Money? The Days Are Extended!

Darryl Mitchell, FSA Deputy Administrator, Farm Programs, has announced an approved extension of the sign-up period for the Tobacco Loss Assistance Program 2000 (TLAPO) until September 15, 2000. The deadline was extended because of the large number of applicants that have not applied. In Kentucky, approximately 60 percent of the eligible farmers have applied for TLAPO.

USDA will distribute \$340 million under TLAPO to compensate tobacco farmers who suffered a reduction in tobacco quota for the 1999-2000 crop years. Kentucky's share is \$140 million. Individual farm payments for burley tobacco will be split between farmers, quota owners and those in control of the quota.

TLAPO applications are available at your local FSA office through September 15th. Late filed applications will not be accepted. One last note—ALL OWNERS MUST SIGN TLAPO Application for the farm to be eligible to receive payment even if you are getting zero share.

Contrary to rumors you may be eligible to receive payment even if you are not actually growing tobacco on your farm in the 2000 crop year.

### COME ON IN, FILL OUT THE FORM AND LET THE COC MAKE THE DETERMINATION OF ELIGIBILITY!

Tobacco producers who have not applied for TLAPO should contact their local FSA office to apply.

### County Committee (COC) Election

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) is now soliciting everyone's help in obtaining names and address of all eligible voters before the COC election. All eligible voters, including spouses, are urged to contact the local FSA office if they have not received election ballots in the past. Nominating forms are now available from the FSA office for the area of LAA-02, Community B. This area is the southeast section of Rockcastle County bound by Pulaski and Laurel

County. Highway boundaries are Highway 70, Highway 150 and 25. To work best, the COC must represent the whole of local agriculture. By seeking diversity, FSA will bring a greater range of expertise, different perspectives, and a broader understanding of the various business and marketing aspects to the committee's work.

### Phase II Tobacco Payments

Tobacco grower/tenants, quota owners, and growing farm operators who produced tobacco in 1999 and shared in the risks of production are eligible to receive a portion of Kentucky's share of the National Tobacco Growers Settlement Trust (NTGST) funds. The funds will be divided equally with 1/3 for quota, 1/3 for land, and 1/3 for labor.

Applications will be mailed, like last year, to all farm operators involved in tobacco production. The forms will go out in mid-September and will be due back at the end of October. Applicants will find this year's form looks a bit different than last year's. It's easier to understand and easier to complete.

A toll-free phone help line will be up and running a week before applications are distributed. You can get answers to funds by calling 1-877-549-2537 beginning September 10th. Funds will be distributed by December 31, 2000. Exact rates for payments will be known after November 15, 2000.

The Farm Service Agency has been authorized to help operators fill out the Phase II forms by phone at 256-2525 or in the office on Mondays and Tuesdays only. If anyone has questions concerning their applications on other days, we encourage you to call the Rockcastle County Extension Office at 256-2403 or the toll free number of Phase II.

### FSA Quiet Time

The Farm Service Agency will be processing payments on Wednesday morning, therefore, limited service will be available during these quiet hours. Applications and other documents may be left on the front counter. The quiet time will become effective Wednesday, September 20th.

Remember: Sign up for the tobacco loss assistance program ends September 15, 2000!!!

## Rabies vaccination clinics scheduled

Dr. Adams, DVM and the Rockcastle Veterinary Clinic (Dr. Chism, DVM) in conjunction with the Rockcastle County Health Department are sponsoring rabies vaccination clinics for dogs and cats. The clinics will be held during the week of September 18th. Dog and cat owners are encouraged to bring their pets to have them vaccinated for the first time or to receive a booster vaccination.

Dogs at least four months of age are required to be vaccinated against rabies, which is usually spread by wild animals like skunks, foxes, raccoons and bats. Any mammal can get rabies including dogs, cats, horses, cows and humans. Animals that are not mammals, such as birds, snakes and fish, do not get rabies.

Rabies is caused by a virus and is spread by contact with the saliva of an animal with the disease. Symptoms of rabies in animals may include a change in behavior, sickness, inability to eat and swallow, increased drooling or salivation, or aggression. Wild animals may appear to be lame or sick. Some animals, especially in the early stages of rabies, may appear normal. There is no cure for rabies. Usually death will occur within ten days of symptoms.

A person should avoid contact with stray or wild animals. Stray cats and dogs may not have been vaccinated against rabies. Report stray animals to an Animal Control Official.

If an animal bites a person, wash the wound with soap and water for at least five minutes. See your medical doctor for additional treatment and report the animal bite to the local health department. Officials from the health department will quarantine the animal for ten days or order the animal to be tested for rabies if the animal has bitten someone recently.

be found, then the person bitten is referred to his or her physician. The physician will then determine if the victim should be treated for rabies. Treatment usually consists of five injections into the upper arm and one in the buttocks.

If your dog or cat needs rabies vaccination, bring your pet to one of the following Rabies Vaccination Clinics. A fee of \$5.00 per dog or cat will be charged to cover the cost of the vaccine. This fee is about half the amount charged by veterinarians during regular office hours. Or you may also contact your veterinarian to schedule an appointment during regular office hours (additional charges may apply).

Dogs and cats must be on a leash or in a pet cage or carrier when bringing them to the vaccination.

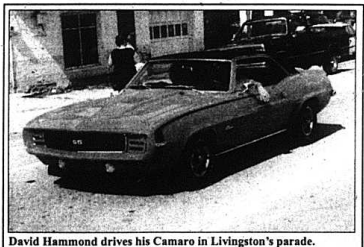

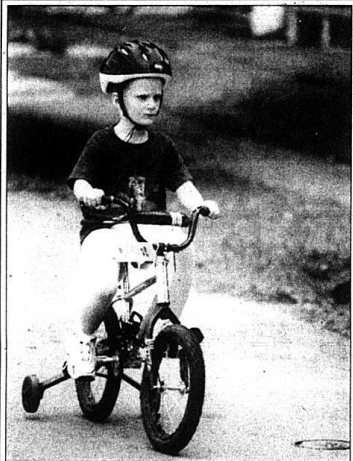

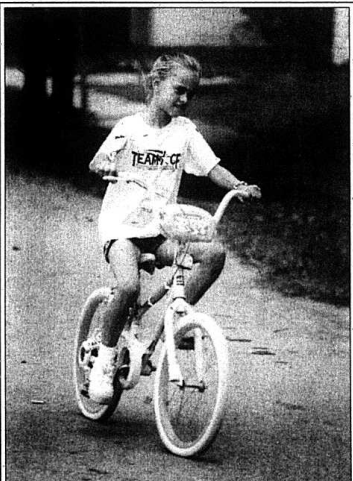

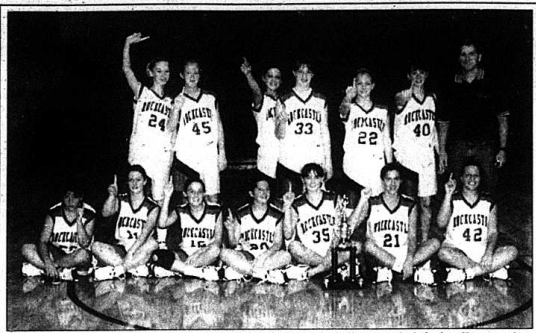

Warrants have also been issued for Jason Northern, who is still at large.

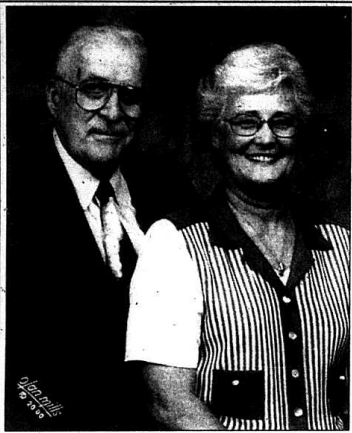

## Public Notification Monitoring Violations

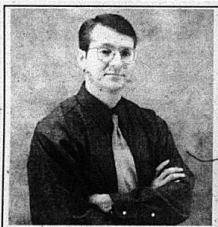

The following appeared in the Mt. Vernon Signal on August 23, 1907. It was recently transcribed from microfilm of that issue of the Signal. With these tributes, I am sharing these gleanings with the Signal's present readers.

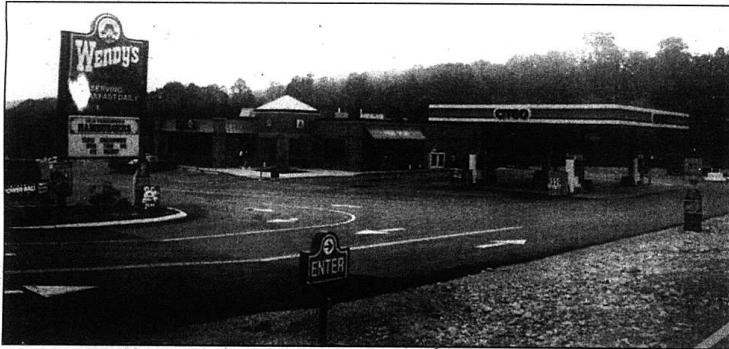

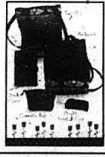

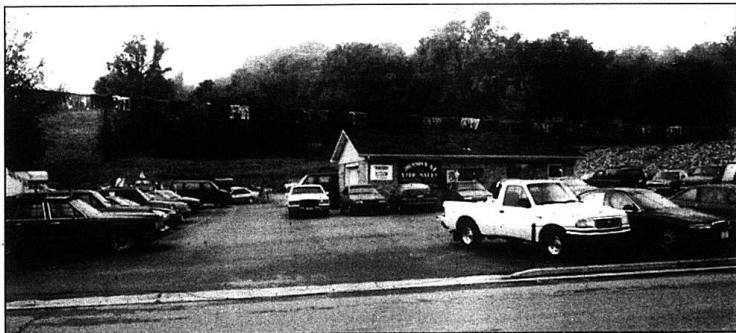
