



Contaminated ground water found locally

State officials are trying to determine just how widespread the contamination of ground water is in the Mt. Vernon area.

A spokesperson with the Division of Water in Frankfort said that

contamination of the ground water is being caused by underground stor-age tanks at the former B & F Gulf Station on Hwy. 25, which appar-ently leaked

Samples taken recently in the area show that chemicals from those tanks have gotten into the rock formation and that every time it rains that every time it rains, the mination spreads throughout the

Last week a work crew drilled wells in the general vicinity of the former gas station and placed moni-toring devices to help them deter-mine the spread of the chemicals.



local man with illegal dumping

A Rockcastle County man has been ordered to clean up an illegal dump he has allegedly been operating near his house. Walter Douglas III of Flat Lick Road was directed to stop dumping material and take the accumulated waste to a permitted facility. Douglas was also told to pay a \$220 fine and provide proof to the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet that he has paid in advance for the next two years of home garbage service. Inspectors from the cabinet caled.

Douglas following an inspection of the Flat Lick Road site on September 5. The site contained stacks of wood pallets that Douglas told inrecompaties and Douglas fold in-spectors he was reconditioning. Staff from the Division of Waste Manage-ment issued a notice of violation to Douglas last week based on their in-spection. Inspectors also discovered three areas at the site where garbage or other material had been bruned. Douglas was directed not to burn any material or he could face a \$25,000 penalty. Douglas has been given 30 days to pay his fine and provide proof of home garbage service. Failure to do so could result in maximum penalties of \$5,000 per day from the date the notice of violation was issued. Cabinet investigators also discovi-

Cabinet investigators also discovered other illegal dumpsites on Flat Lick Road, and they will work to identify and cite the persons responsible for those sites.

Citizens in Kentucky can report illegal dumping activities to the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet by calling 1-888-NO-DUMPS (a toll-free number) or by visting wawkydumps.org on the World Wide Web.

Richard Lovell gets ten year sentence

U.S. District Court Judge Karl Forester described Richard "Rick" Lovell as the "big dog and master-mind" of a Rockeastle County co-caine smuggling ring last week, then sentenced him to 10 years in federal prison and five years supervised pro-bation.

Lovell and 16 other defendantsmost of them family members-sold at least 150 kilos of cocaine they hauled in from Florida then distribwited in Eastern and Southeastern Kentucky, grosecutors said. Lovell faced a sentence of 20 years up to life, but eked out a lighter

sentence by cooperating with federal prosecutors. Lovell was not the first to cooperate, but he was an early defendant to do so-a trend that led 14

other defendants to plead guilty.

The Lovell family has had other run-ins with the law. David Lovell, also indicted in the drug case, faces a murder charge alleging that he killed Charles "Toddy" Baker of Mt

n his residence on August 28.



Rabies vaccination clinics scheduled

Dr. Adams, DVM and the Rock-castle Veterinary Clinic (Dr. Chism, DVM) in conjunction with the Rock-castle County Health Department are sponsoring rabies vaccination clinics for dogs and cast. The clinics will be held during the week of September 18th. Dog and cat owners are necessity. 18th. Dog and cat owners are encour-aged to bring their pets to have them vaccinated for the first time or to

vaccinated for the first time or to receive a boaster vaccination. Dogs at least four rhombs of age are required to be vaccinated against rabies, which is usually spread by wild animals like satursk, roxes, rac-coons and bats. Any mammal can get rabies including dogs, cats, horses, cows and humans. Animals that are not mammals, such as birds, snakes and fish, do not get rabies. Rabies is caused by a virus and is spread by contact with the saliva of an animal with the disease. Symp-toms of rabies in animals may in-clude a change in behavior, sickness, unable to cat and swallow, increased drooling or a silvation, or aggression.

drooling or salivation, or aggression.
Wild animals may appear to be tame
or sick. Some animals, especially in or sick. Some animals, especially in the early suggest of risks, may appear normal. There is no cure for rables. Usually death will occur within tendays of symptodiavoid conact with stray or wild animals. Stray cast and dogs may not have been vaccinated against rables. Report stray animals to an Animal Control Official. If an animal bites a person, wash the wound with soap and water for at least five minutes. See your medical doctor for additional treatment and

report the animal bite to the local health department. Officials from the health department will quarantine the animal for ten days or order the ani-mal to be tested for rabies. If the animal that has bitten someone cannot be found, then the person bitten is referred to his or her physician. The physician will then determine if the victim should be treated for rabies. Treatment usually consists of five indecitations in the upper arm and one in the buttocks.




