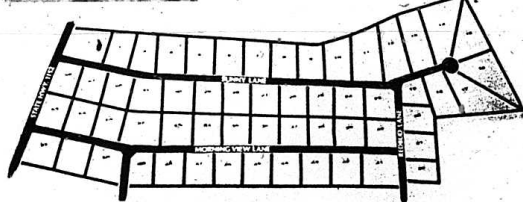

**An Ordinance Providing for the Assessment of Real and Personal Property Subject to taxation in the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky**

**Whereas,** Kentucky Revised Statutes (KRS) 92.280 and 132.200 require cities to provide for the assessment of real and personal property and the levy of an ad valorem tax on such assessments; and

**Whereas,** KRS 132.285 permits cities to use the annual county assessment for property situated within the respective city as a basis of ad valorem tax levies;

**Section One:** Except as provided in KRS 132.487 (motor ve-

**An Ordinance Levying the Annual Ad Valorem Tax on Motor Vehicles for City Purposes in the Corporate Limits of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky**

**Whereas,** KRS 83A.130, 140 and 150 require that the legislative body, by ordinance provide for sufficient revenue to operate city government; and

**Whereas,** KRS 132.487 and 132.488 requires submission to the Kentucky Revenue Cabinet prior to October 1 of each year the annual tax rate to be levied on motor vehicles and motorbats.

**Now Therefore, be It Ordained** by the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky as follows:

**Section One: Tax Levy** - Motor vehicles and motorbats: An ad valorem tax rate of .167 cents on each \$100 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of motor vehicles and motorbats for 2001 subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

**Section Two: Due Date, Payment and Penalty** A. All ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles and motorbats shall be collected by the Mt. Vernon City Clerk in accordance with the provisions of KRS 134.800 and other applicable statutes.

B. Ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles and motorbats shall become due and delinquent as set forth in KRS (34.810) and such taxes not paid when due shall be subject to the penalty and interest as specified therein.

**An Ordinance Levying the Annual Ad Valorem Tax for City Purposes in the Corporate Limits of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky**

**Whereas,** Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 92.280 requires that the legislative body of each city annually levy an ad valorem tax for city purposes; and

**Whereas,** KRS 92.330 requires that all taxes be levied by ordinance; and

**Whereas,** KRS 83A.130 requires that the legislative body, by ordinance provide for sufficient revenue to operate city government; and

**Whereas,** the city has calculated the tax rate(s) for real and personal property in accordance with KRS chapter 132.

**Now Therefore be It Ordained** by the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky as follows:

**Section One: Tax Levy** - Real estate and personal property A. An ad valorem tax rate of .195 cents on each \$100 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of real property subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

B. An ad valorem tax rate of .175 cents on each \$100 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of personal property subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

**Section Two: Due Date, Payment, Discount and Penalty** All said taxes shall be due and payable at the City offices on 30th day of November, 2000. Taxes paid prior to the due date shall receive a two percent (2%) discount. Taxes paid up to thirty (30) days after the due date shall be at face amount. Taxes paid more than thirty (30) days after the due date shall be charged a ten percent (10%) penalty and interest at

the rate of six percent (6%) per annum calculated from the due date.

**Section Three: Effective Date and Use Thereof** This ordinance applies to the 2000 calendar year tax assessment and all receipts shall be used for city purposes and accounted in the 2001 fiscal year and subsequent fiscal years in reference to delinquent collections.

Accordingly, the accompanying financial statement is not intended to present the financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the financial statement referred to above presents fairly, in all material respects, the receipts, disbursements, and excess fees of the County Clerk for the year ended December 31, 1999, in conformity with the basis of accounting described above.

## What is your advice to the World?

In the comic strip "B.C." there occasionally appears a little guru who sits at the top of a mountain. Other characters climb the mountain looking for words of wisdom.

What if you were that guru at the top of the mountain? What if others came to you for advice? What would be the one piece of wisdom that you would share with them? What philosophy of life could you impart to them in a brief period of time that would change their lives?

I know what I would tell them. My one piece of advice that would improve their lives would be very simple: FLOSS. You heard me correctly. I said "floss."

children and spouses! To take time to enjoy life! To cultivate the spiritual comfort of our lives! The possibilities, as they say, are endless.

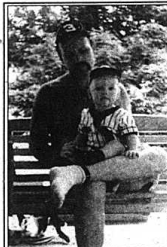

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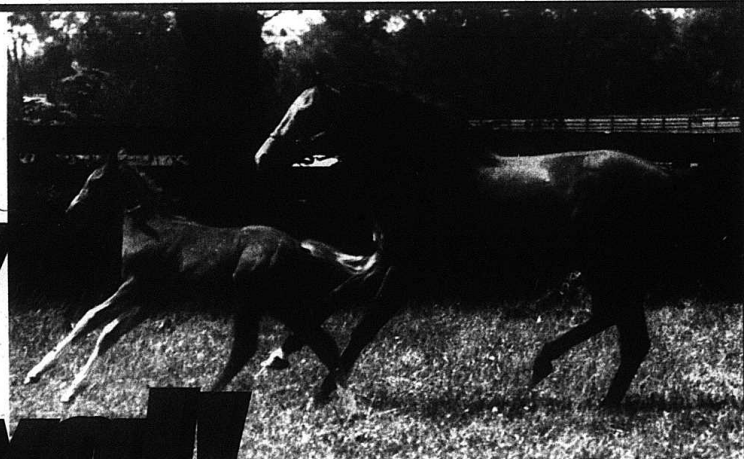

## Busy week for police, several local people jailed

It has been a very busy week for Rockcastle County law enforcement officers.

Last Thursday, Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Charles Gray arrested James Steven Bradley, 36, of Hwy. 618, Mt. Vernon and charged with theft by unlawful taking. He is accused of stealing a Honda 4 Wheeler owned by Barbara Newcomb on September 8.

Newcomb's 4 Wheeler was recovered. Bradley is in jail awaiting an October 2nd court date.

Gray is also investigating another theft of a 4 Wheeler from the home of Larry Bullock on Tully Payne Road. That took place last Tuesday.

Deputy Trevor Hensley is also investigating the theft of a 4 Wheeler from the residence of Jack Gilbert on Red Hill Road the same day.

Kentucky State Police Officer Millard Root is also investigating the theft of a 4 Wheeler from Freddie Mason's home in Livingston over the weekend. Police have leads in that case and expect to make an arrest.

## Hydrants to be flushed

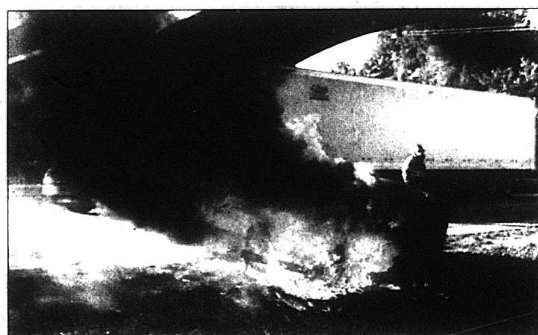
Monday, September 25, 2000 being flushed at 6:00 p.m. the City of Mt. Vernon Fire Department will be flushing fire hydrants within the city limits.

## Probation revoked in two cases

Eddy Montgomery, Commonwealth Attorney for Rockcastle County, announced last week that Donovan Dean McGuire, 26, of Castle Village Dr., Mt. Vernon, and John William Lawson, 36, of 887 Jacks Branch Road, Gray Hawk, had their probation revoked and were sentenced to prison.

According to Montgomery, McGuire entered a guilty plea in 1998 for the offense of Assault Under Extreme Emotional Disturbance. McGuire admitted that he did in fact cause injury to his son, Jordan Dean McGuire. McGuire was probationed for a period of three years for this offense.

During a hearing held on August 25, McGuire admitted that he had failed to report to his probation officer, failed to obtain his GED, failed to work regularly and to being ar-

rested in Madison County for the offense of Theft by Unlawful Taking under \$300.00.

McGuire was sentenced to the maximum term of imprisonment for this offense which was five years.

Montgomery further stated that Lawson had entered a guilty plea and was probationed for a period of five years for the offense of Fraudulent Non-Support in 1998. Lawson admitted during his guilty plea that he had failed to pay child support and was in arrears approximately \$40,000.

During a hearing held on August 25, the Court found that Lawson failed to refrain from the use of cocaine, failed to pay his child support, failed to maintain employment, failed to report to his probation officer and moved to a new residence without notifying his probation officer. Lawson was sentenced to a period

of two years imprisonment.

Montgomery added that he was pleased with the probation revocations and hoped that they would send a message to everyone on probation that if you mess-up you will be sent to prison.

## County left out of Patton's plan for fixing Appalachia

Rockcastle County leaders learned last week that their application for the Community Development Initiative (CDI) through Kentucky Governor Paul Patton's office was denied.

The local group, which included members of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court, Mt. Vernon City Council and the Rockcastle County Development Board had made application to the Governor's office on January 14.

Local leaders had asked for \$27 million in their application, which would have been used to develop jobs and make massive capitol improvements throughout the county.

The application called for a four phase project that would have cost an estimated \$27 million and taken approximately ten years to complete.

Phase one called for the completion of the Kentucky County Music Hall of Fame project at Renfro Valley, which is currently underway. That project will continue on schedule.

Phase one also called for the construction of a civic center in the Renfro Valley area.

Phase two would have included the clean up of the Rockcastle River Basin and the restoration and revitalization of Main Street in Mt. Vernon.

Phase three would have seen the construction of a natural gas pipeline, expansion of the industrial park space and construction of a new Kentucky Technology Center adjacent to the Rockcastle High School.

Phase four would have included the construction of much needed sewage treatment facilities and development of recreation facilities in the Lake Linnville and Rockcastle River areas.

Rockcastle County was one of only eight counties in the Appalachian Regional Commission's area of eastern Kentucky to turn in an application.

"Rockcastle County was the county farthest west, and the ARC funding which is federal could have completely transformed the development of our county and our county's future," said Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlifus.

"I am absolutely convinced that no county eligible for the funding could have benefited more than Rockcastle," Carlifus said.

The Judge also pointed out that Rockcastle County was the only

county along Interstate 75 to make application.

No other location in Kentucky could have showcased what the Appalachian Commission's funding can do for Appalachia as much as Rockcastle simply because of our exposure to millions of travelers on I-75," Carlifus said.

The two CDI grants awarded by the Governor's office went to Johnson County and Harlan County. In Harlan County the cities of Benham, Lynch and Cumberland will participate.

Harlan is a Democrat county and Johnson County is a Republican county.

## Frederick's home raided

Last Saturday, Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette issued a search warrant for the property of Roy and Linda Frederick, six miles south of Mt. Vernon off Chestnut Ridge Road in Rockcastle County.

At approximately 5:30 p.m. officers from the Kentucky State Police, Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department and the Mt. Vernon City Police executed the search warrant recovering several illegal drugs along with drug paraphernalia, according to a news release from the Kentucky State Police.

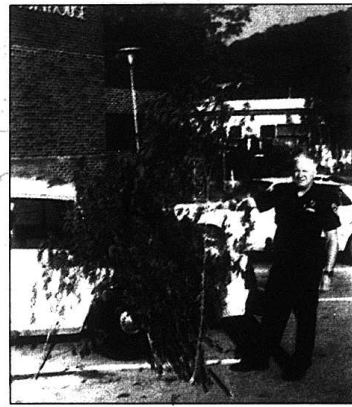

I guess the only reason that I don't like this time of year better than Spring has something to do with the fact that these cool mornings are harbingers of frost. Frost means that everything in the garden gets wet from the snowing and runs eyes and Rudolph nose and the ringing in my ears in exchange for warm weather year round, but relief from the sinus pain I go through this time of year makes me grudgingly appreciate nippy weather.

For the record, we had our first icy windshields here last Saturday morning. I was in such a hurry to get out among the yard sales that I had to run back into the house and run a couple of quarts of hot water to splash on the glass before the wipers could even get it. I've been told time and again that one of these days that hot water is going to make my windshield shatter, but it hasn't happened yet.

I have to do something because the only way my truck will heat up enough to make the defroster work is when I let it sit and idle with the air conditioner on for awhile. The compressor puts enough strain on the engine to make her warm up a little, otherwise I might as well not have a heater. Please don't send me any advice about thermostats either. I've tried everything that will fit in the water pipes and none of them do any good. I've just got a cool running truck and that's a handy thing to have for most of the year anyway.

Speaking of things in the garden, I need to thank Beulah Ashley of Vico, Kentucky and Mrs. Mary Ann Conn from Cartersville for the winter onion sets. I start caring just write

ing about them, they are so strong but there is no doubt about the fact that they are onions.

Also, Marion Blair from Madio, Kentucky, and I'm ashamed to admit I'm not sure where Madio is, sent me sweet yellow onion sets that are as sweet as sugar. Maybe they just taste so sweet because I'm eating them with the winter onions but they sure go good with all the mustard, ketchup and collard greens that I'm fixing out of the garden.

A big plate of greens, onions seasoned with some fat back, half a dozen green onions, and about half a pound of cornbread is all I need for supper every other day between now and Thanksgiving. On the other days I pretty much switch fall beans for greens. We won't talk about gas here except to say that the cat won't even sleep with me.

That brings up another reason I like these late summer days when fall is in the air. I like to open all the windows turn off the air conditioner and throw an extra blanket on the bed. Get a little breeze going and it doesn't matter if you pass gas. But the neat thing is to be able to go to sleep listening to screech owls, katydids, crickets and even the occasional great horned owl Wuhhh-HOOing on the ridge in front of my house.

It's nice to get up at dawn to wake the crickets and try to sneak within casting distance of a big small mouth bass when the water is 15 degrees warmer than the atmosphere. Fish, especially smallmouth, seem to fight harder and jump higher this time of year than in the spring or summer. Flowers and yellowing leaves seem to have much brighter colors because the haze is gone. It's a good time to be out and about and I believe the mind works better because everything seems rested and relaxed.

## Sri'weet and Sour

**Apples - Part 2**  
So, you want to know more about apple butter, huh? Well, you see it's like this. There are tricks to all trades and since using the beautiful supply of nature's most versatile fruit by turning it into apple butter, applesauce, cobbler with crisp double crusts or pan pies bubbling up through the slits cut in the crust, juice drizzled with sugar and broiled till the top was evenly browned and served with or without whipped cream. I could call it my trade. It didn't take trickery for me to turn a big pan of apples into something pleasing to the pallet. What it did take was choosing the apples that produced the flavor and texture for what I chose to make. Those two big apple trees in my front yard, were the secret. The one with red striped apples was used for apple butter. When it was fully ripe the deep red skin would burst open revealing the mealy meat inside dripping with tart juice that gave the apple butter its exceptional flavor and texture. After washing them in water from the spring, a sharp paring knife would remove the blemishes and core but leaving was left on so most of the flavor was lost. Very little water was used to cook them for their own juice was sufficient. And very little pressure had to be used to get them through the colander used to remove the residue from the peeling.

Now came the finishing touches, seasoning them with sugar and my favorite spices. That was the tricky part. I didn't measure anything. I'd just open a bag of sugar, pour it in, I guessed would be the right amount, knowing if it wasn't I could always add more and did the same thing with the spices I had lined out on the counter. I would begin with a big spoonful of cinnamon, a heavy dash of allspice, couple dashes of nutmeg, dash of ginger, one of cloves then stir thoroughly, taste, add a bit more of this or that, smell the aroma, taste again, hmmm, just right, or will be

when it is cooked for an hour or so. Before I learned about the oven method of making-apple butter I would have to you to "put it in a big open kettle and cook on a medium slow fire stirring constantly to keep from sticking and spattering." It would sputter anyway, and blisters would pop up on hands and arms where ever I landed. But since every day of olden times when everything was done the hard way I had learned things could be done differently. So now I put the mixture in my big outdated roaster, and pop it in the oven. Check and stir it every fifteen minutes or so, and when it reaches the thickness I want for a spread, it is ready for canning. And since I made it hit or miss to suit my own taste, it is good and the kind I like.

The second tree, the one closer to the house was what I called "the applesauce tree." The pale green peeling with may be just a hint of yellow when they ripened, covered the white, crisp meat inside that crackled when bitten into and tart, not sour, juice dribbled from each bite taken. They were different from the other one in color and size but the quality of texture and flavor and the finished products, applesauce and apple butter, could never be questioned.

Applesauce made from these apples was white and I took very little heat to turn them into sauce with nary a lump to be found. Sugar was not necessary but enhanced the flavor if one wanted it. Mother Graves wanted hers without it. After hearing her say, "That is the best applesauce I ever ate." I was sure she got a dozen pint jars every year.

When I learned there was a community canning project in Shipwreck the government furnished for the convenience of the local residents and saw women with bags of farm produce to can taking advantage of it I decided that was the way to take care of my ample supply of apples. Certain days of the week were set

## On The Go? Take Breakfast Along

Want to eat breakfast but just don't have time? Does the thought of food at 6:00 a.m. make your head swim?

Breakfast to go is your answer. Breakfast to go can be eaten anytime and most anywhere. It's perfect for those who aren't ready or don't have time to eat before leaving the house. Here are a few ideas.

Beverages like milk and juice travel best in containers with tight-fitting lids. Use clean bottles with screw-on tops that once held single servings of juice, soda or water. Wash the bottles with hot, soapy water before each use. Rinse in clean water. Soak the bottles to remove labels if you like. Purchased plastic "sipper" bottles are another choice.

Food choices for eating on the run vary widely. Try:

- \*Dry ready-to-eat cereal packaged in a plastic container or bag. Eat out of hand.
- \*Muffins or slices of fruit bread. These can be made ahead and frozen. These breads thaw quickly. Once thawed, eat as is or heat first. Wrap in a paper towel to catch crumbs and keep hands clean.
- \*Scrambled eggs wrapped in a soft tortilla. Add salsa, ketchup, cheese or another topping.
- \*Sandwiches. Make these from

peanut butter and jelly, cheese, or leftover meats.

\*Fruits and vegetables. Grapes, apples, pears, peaches and bananas are packaged to go by nature. Also, try celery or carrot sticks, radishes, or zucchini slices.

\*Hard-cooked eggs. Make and peel a day or two ahead of time. Place each egg in a small plastic bag. Store in the refrigerator until you need to grab and go.

Breakfast to go can be eaten on the way to school or work. It also can be eaten once you arrive before your work day or classes begin.

Avoid eating in the car if you are the driver. Drivers should stay focused on traffic and road conditions, not food. Children may eat in the car on the way to school or day care. Ask the car owner's permission before eating or drinking during the trip if you or your children ride with someone else in the morning. Eating and drinking are often not allowed on public transportation.

Keep plastic forks, spoons' and knives as well as paper napkins and plates in your car or at your workstation. That way, you'll always be prepared to eat the breakfast you only had time to grab at home.

### Phase II Tobacco Payments

Tobacco growers/canneries, quota owners, and growing farm operators who produced tobacco in 1999 and shared in the risks of production are eligible to receive a portion of Kentucky's share of the National Tobacco Growers Settlement Trust (Phase II). The funds will be divided equally with 1/3 for quota, 1/3 for land, and 1/3 for labor.

Applications will be mailed like last year, to all farm operators involved in tobacco production. The forms will go out in mid-September and will be due back at the end of October. Applicants will find this year's form looks a bit different than last year's. It's easier to understand and easier to complete.

A toll-free phone help line will be up and running a week before applications are distributed. You can get answers to funds by calling 1-877-549-2537 beginning September 10th. Funds will be distributed by December 31, 2000. Exact rates for payment will be known after November 15, 2000.

The Farm Service Agency has been authorized to help operators fill out the Phase II forms by phone at 256-2525 or in the office on Mondays and Tuesdays only. If anyone needs assistance completing their applications on other days, we encourage you to call the Rockcastle County Extension Office at 256-2403 or the toll free number of Phase II.

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) is now soliciting or help in obtaining names and address of all eligible voters before the COC election scheduled for December 2000. FSA continues to seek voters and candidates for the upcoming COC election.

election. All eligible voters, including spouses, are urged to contact the local FSA office if they have not received election ballots in the past.

Nomination forms are now available from the FSA office for the area of IAA #2, Community B. This area is the southeast section of Rockcastle County bound by Palaski and Laurel County. Highway boundaries are Highway 70, Hwy 150 and 25.

To work best, the COC must represent the whole of local agriculture. By seeking diversity, FSA will bring a greater range of expertise, different perspectives, and a broader understanding of the various business and marketing aspects to the committee's work. FSA Quiet Time

The Farm Service Agency will be processing payments on Wednesday mornings, therefore, limited service will be available during these quiet hours. Applications and other documents may be left on the front counter. The quiet time will become effective Wednesday, September 20, 2000.

- \* Organic Conservation Program (ECP) in the amount of \$12,009.00 in March 2000.
- \* Dairy Marketing Loss Assistance (DMLA) in the amount of \$11,990.00 in April 2000.
- \* Calf Guard Program (CGP) in the amount of \$2,098.00 in May 2000.

\* Agricultural Marketing Transition Act (AMTA) in the amount of \$7,173.00 in August 2000.

\* Marketing Loss Assistance (MLA) in the amount of \$84,755.00 in September 2000.

### Pork Referendum

People and businesses who own and sell hogs or pigs, or pork products during the representative period from August 18, 1999 through August 17, 2000 will be eligible to vote in a referendum to determine if producers and importers for consumption of the Pork Checkoff Program, formally known as the Pork Promotion, Research, and Consumer Information Order.

There are three types of eligible voters: 1) Persons who own and sell hogs or pigs in the US in their own name; 2) Persons who import hogs, pigs, pork, pork products into the US in their own name; and 3) Persons who are designated to cast the single vote for a business entity that owns and sells, or imports hogs, pigs, pork, or pork products into the US.

All eligible voters need to request a ballot at the Rockcastle Farm Service Agency, September 19th - 21st in order to vote.

### Burley Tobacco Lease and Transfer Referendum

Consent has been amended Section 319 in the Agricultural Risk Protection Act of 2000 to clarify that the Secretary may permit the lease and transfer of a burley tobacco quota from one farm to another farm

within the State if a majority of tobacco producers voting, as opposed to a majority of those that could have voted, will be sufficient to approve such lease and transfer by a statewide referendum.

The Secretary has called for a referendum of growers to determine whether they favor or oppose the lease and transfer of quota across lines within the State beginning with the 2001 and subsequent crop years.

The referendum will be conducted by mail ballot during the period October 23 through October 27, 2000. If more than 50 percent of the producers voting in the State referendum are in favor, lease and transfer of burley quota across county lines within the State will be in effect beginning with the 2001 crop.

Rockcastle County tobacco farmers will be applying for nearly \$935,000 as their share of the 2000 Phase II tobacco settlement funds. To assist farmers in completing applications, the Cooperative Extension Service will conduct a producers meeting on Thursday, September 28, at 7:00 p.m. in the RCHS auditorium. Farmers will receive applications from the Kentucky Tobacco Settlement Trust Corporation through First Union National Bank in Charlotte, North Carolina. Applications will be mailed starting

September 18, 2000. Completed applications are to be mailed NO LATER than October 31, 2000.

Farmers receiving applications will be those who, on July 1, 1999, were listed in the FSA office as quota owner or farm operator. Each FSA farm number with quota will receive an application whether tobacco was grown or leased away. Farmers who have tenants will need to work with the tenant in getting all the signatures to complete applications.

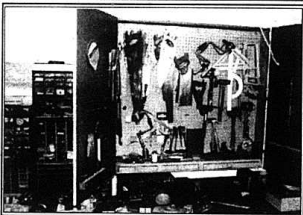

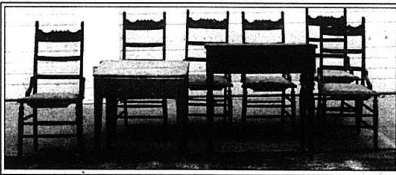

Our students and parents are very excited about this motivational behavior/attendance program. Not only

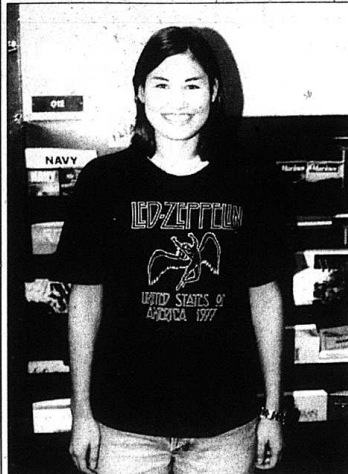

The Rockcastle County Rockets set a school scoring record on Friday night on their way to their fourth win of the season.

The Rockets remained undefeated in the 67-0 route of the Estill County Engineers. The game was played in Irvine and it was the Engineers' homecoming.

What is sad for Estill County is the fact that Rockcastle could have no doubt scored 100 points against them, but the Rocket coaching staff chose to play almost every player on the team, from the starting seniors to back-up freshmen.

Rockcastle's offensive unit rolled up 577 yards, on just twenty five rushing plays and fourteen complete passes.

The Rocket defense held the Engineers to just 126 yards with the varsity defense playing only the first half as a unit.

The Rocket defense got the scoring going in the game, when sophomore Marty Reagan intercepted an Engineer pass and ran it back 20 yards for a score.

Also in the first period senior Derrick Busell scored on runs of 34 and 55.

Christopher Parsons had 174 yards passing and three touchdown passes. He also had five yards rushing.

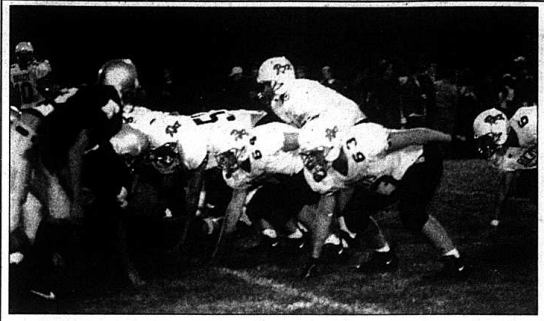
Aaron Anderkin threw for one touchdown and he had 93 yards on four completions.

In the fourth period Devin Taylor scored on a five yard run and Josh Hayes added the extra point to make it 44-0.

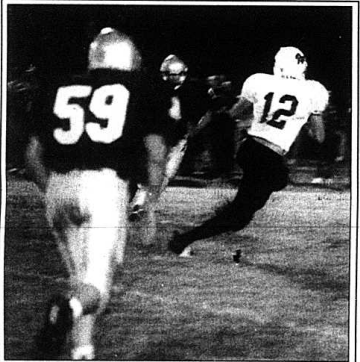
The final score of the game came on a 30 yard run by freshman Josh Brewer. The JV team plays at home next Monday night against Pulaski County. Game time is 6 p.m.

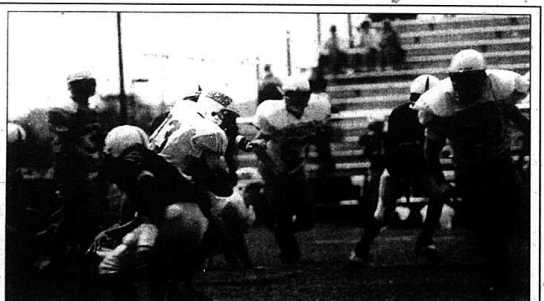

If you are a high school senior considering Eastern Kentucky University but have more questions than answers at this point, you're far from alone.

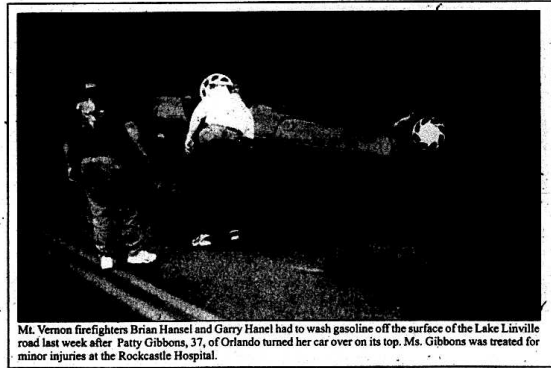
But the best news of all is that you can get many of your questions answered Saturday, September 30 at EKU's first Spotlight Day.

High school seniors and their parents are invited to EKU's first special invitation to visit the Richmond campus for the event, which will be held 9 a.m.-2 p.m., beginning in Brock Auditorium and continuing in various campus locations. Students planning to attend must make reservations by September 2 by calling 859-622-1066 or toll-free 1-800-465-9191. Registration forms also are available from high school guidance counselors.

Effective in Fall 2001, to be granted full admission to EKU, students must have earned a minimum 2.0 GPA on a 4.0 scale in high school, or received a General Equivalency Diploma or completed an EKU-approved home school or distance learning program, achieved a minimum ACT Composite score of 18 (with no standard scores below 18 in English, reading and math); and meet the Kentucky Pre-College Curriculum or its equivalent of ACT scores of 21 in English, a 20 in math, a 22 in reading and a 21 in science.

Provisional admission status will be granted to students who meet the first two requirements for full admission but not the third. Provisional admission will be granted to those who meet the first requirement but have minimum ACT composite scores of 15, 16 or 17.

Students who do not meet probationary admission status may apply for special admission status, which will require their participation in a retention-support program.

new law also allows the Attorney General to work closely with commonwealth attorneys and county attorneys to more rigorously prosecute identity theft cases.

Over the past decade, the guidelines for telemarketers have been tightened and restrictions have been placed on many telemark calls during the evening and morning hours. However, many organizations are exempt from these guidelines and are still able to continue their telemarketing activities. Although a majority of the calls are made by honest and reputable companies, the avenue is becoming increasingly popular with those looking to make a fast dollar at the expense of trusting individuals. Consumer experts advise using caution whenever a telemarketer is on the other end of the phone line. If you question a caller's intentions, you can contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division at 888-432-9257 or 888-671-7701. You can also request a form to add your name to a no-call list that prevents professional telemarketing companies from getting your personal information. Remember that the rule of thumb is considering these calls is *off limits* too good to be true, it probably is.

This rule also applies to the postcards and letters that flood our mailboxes. They usually fall into two categories—those that promise to unlock the secrets of health, happiness and wealth and those that solicit charitable contributions. The best way to

protect yourself from mail fraud is to investigate the organization before you give any personal information or send any checks. You can verify a charity through a national registry by calling 703-276-0100 or by contacting the local Better Business Bureau office.

To stop the "junk mail" before it starts, you can write the Direct Marketing Association and ask to be put on their voluntary Mail Preference Service. The DMA is an industry association that maintains this list as a service to consumers who do not wish to have association members target them. While not all marketers are members of the DMA and the list is voluntary, this may reduce the amount of unwanted mail you receive. The DMA also has a Telephone Preference Service for consumers who do not want to receive unsolicited phone calls. The address to have your name removed from both lists is Direct Marketing Association, PO Box 9014, Farmingdale, NY 11735.

Holding onto your wallet and guarding the information you give out isn't the only way you can prevent someone from getting your personal information. There are more than happy to search through your trash, steal your mail or otherwise use deceit to gather the information they need. After all, the outcome usually involves cracking your bank account, charging credit cards to the limit and even taking out mortgages

and bank loans in your name. As always, I hope you will feel free to contact me, either here in Mt.

## Legislative Update

*Protecting Ourselves From Consumer Fraud*

A century ago consumer fraud meant the snake oil peddler was back in town. In today's technology-loaded world, the snake oil peddler has been replaced by identity thieves, deceptive telemarketers and fraudulent mail schemes. Even so, you need to be aware of the tactics used by these criminals.

In an average day you may write a check at the grocery store, charge tickets to a ball game, mail your tax returns, call home on your cell phone, order new checks or apply for a credit card. You may be greeted at the mailbox by advertisements promising you the secret to getting rich quick. When you finally sit down to dinner, your family meal may be interrupted by a phone call soliciting your business or support for a charity. While these contacts may seem ordinary and are usually harmless, they can cause extraordinary difficulty if you provide personal information and it falls into the wrong hands. Identity theft is one of the fastest

growing crimes in the country but receives comparatively little attention. In 1997 alone, the crime amounted to a loss of over \$745 million. According to testimony given by representatives of the Federal Trade Commission to a congressional subcommittee in July, approximately 54 percent of consumers reported that a credit card account had been opened in their name and an existing account had been used without their knowledge or permission.

The FTC report also stated that an estimated 26 percent reported that someone had opened a telephone, cellular phone or other utility service in their name. Almost 16 percent reported that a checking or savings account had been opened in their name and that fraudulent checks had been written. Another 11 percent reported that the identity theft obtained a loan in their name.

To toughen the penalty for those prosecuted for identity theft in Kentucky we passed a bill during the 2000 General Assembly that will require those found guilty to pay back all of the money they gain. The

## Brush Arbor: Rockcastle's newest hidden treasure

Warm memories of carefree, childhood days spent in his grandparents' log cabin in Eastern Kentucky stirred a longing in Jerry Hayes for a return to simpler times. Soon that nostalgic yearning became the driving passion of his life.

"At first, I just wanted an old log cabin in the country, so I could get away from the hectic pace of city life -- even if it was only on weekends," said Hayes.

"But then I began to dream about creating something more -- a living museum of log structures that would honor not only my ancestors, but all the pioneers who endured hardships to settle this country."

In 1992, the self-employed life insurance agent from Hamilton, Ohio, found a 140-year-old log house just a few miles from the site of his grandparents' former log home in Jackson County. The small cabin was in need of repair, but Hayes bought it, putting it in storage until he could find the perfect setting.

Hayes finally found that setting in Hummel, near Renfro Valley, nestled amid the rocky Appalachian foothills at the edge of the Daniel Boone National Forest. Renfro Valley is nationally known for its country and folk music shows, but nevertheless has retained the peaceful, rural simplicity that Hayes sought for his pioneer memorial.

"I wanted a place where it would be easy to imagine myself back on Pa and Granny Clark's cabin where I spent such happy days," Hayes said. He bought 28 acres in the area in 1995, and hired workers to begin restoring his log house the next year.

"It took me four years to work up the courage to tackle what I knew was going to be a very difficult and expensive job, but it's really become a labor of love," he said, looking around fondly at his Brush Arbor Appalachian Pioneer Homestead.

As more people heard about his original cabin, he said he was told about other log buildings. He eventually bought two more cabins, a blacksmith's shop, a barn, a church, a corncrib and a smokehouse.

Hayes, who has spent almost every weekend for the past four years at Brush Arbor, loves to show off highlights:

"A dirt floor trapper's cabin that has the date 1797 etched in its stone fireplace.

"An early 19th century log church where a volunteer preacher holds non-denominational services every Sunday.

"The first cabin he purchased, now furnished with antiques, many of them donated by visitors.

"Many times, someone will bring an heirloom or antique that belonged to their family, saying, 'this is where

it belongs,'" Hayes says. "We catalog all those things so that owners can have them back if they want them later and they can never be sold."

Hayes says many of the antiques were found in Indiana and Pennsylvania, while the mostly pre-Civil War log cabins and outbuildings were discovered in Kentucky, Tennessee and Ohio.

"When we have to take the log structures apart, we number each log and make diagrams so that we can put everything back where it belongs," he says.

That attention to authenticity is important, says Kentucky Tourism Council president Marjeha Sparrow. "In a perfect world, you would keep the structures in their original settings, but saving the logs and reconstructing the structures, as authentically as possible, is certainly better than letting them fall into ruin or be torn down," she said.

Hayes has several volunteers who help give tours, run his nearby bed-and-breakfast and prepare country-style meals for visitors.

"This place just seems to make the past come alive," says volunteer Lucille Ball Pingleton, 65, of nearby Berea.

Cora Rutledge of Blue Mountain, Miss., was a recent visitor with her 73-year-old husband, Barn. They enjoyed the pioneer village so much that they pitched in and helped when a group of antique car club members stopped by for lunch and a tour.

"I love the whole experience," says Mrs. Rutledge, 52, while dish-tossing out fried green tomatoes and cornbread. "It reminds us of the way things were years back when people

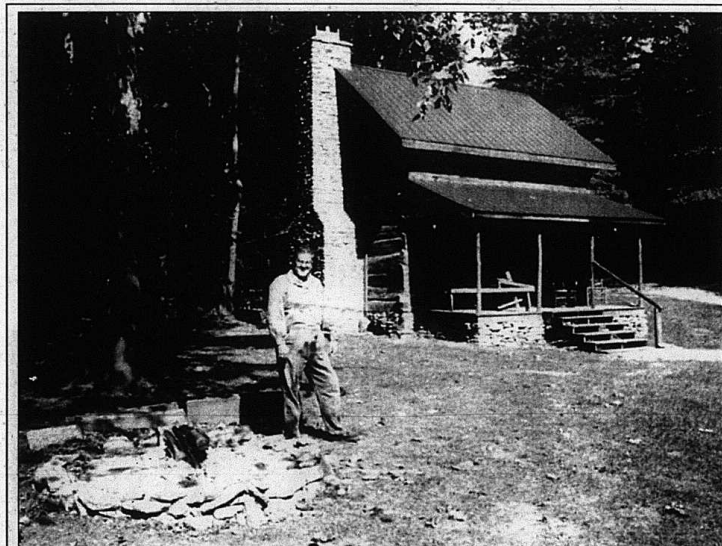
