

Tobacco Loss Assistance with Regard to Estates.

With regard to Estates.

With regard to the reçent TLAPOO applications pertaining to estates for which ownership was not determined and the TLAP application was not complete; the following is being provided.

Several States have requested idance regarding ownership proof eligible to receive a TLAP00 pay ment. After careful consideration and in the spirit of protecting small farms and avoiding civil rights impacts, FSA is authorized to take a certification from the best source available. For example, where there are multiple heirs that are the rightful owners of a

property, FSA may take a certifica-tion from one or more of the owners as to the identity of the other owners and their share of the tobacco quota. In 'heir property' TLAP00 applica-tions, where some but not all heirs applied for a payment, the other heirs who wish to apply may file an appli-cation for payment through Decem-ber 1, 2000. Each payment approved under this late-filed provision must be concurred with by the Kentucky be concurred with by the Kentucky State FSA Committee (STC).

Organizations can plan a group outing by calling a farmer they know and asking for permission to glean his fields. Gleaning helps the

The Rockcastle County Road Department cleaned up a dumpsite on Vanzant Road near Burr last week. The dumpsite cleanup cost the county \$1,572. Work release prisoners from the county jail also helped out. The county has also identified two different waste tire dumpsites. The smaller tire dump was located in Exit 62 within a few hundred yards of the interstate ramp and had 341 tires in it. The second tire dump was located oner Buffalo, off the Sand Springs Road and contained approximately 3,000 tires. The county had only enough funds to dispose of 484 tires from the second dump, but were able to completely cleanup the first dump. The county will apply for federal funds to help pay for, the cleanup at the second dump. Waste tire dumps are prohibited on public or private property by state law.


