County tax rate lower

Rockcastle County property tax payers can expect tax bills in the mail this week.

This year's county rate is .7260, down from .7427, from a year ago. Property owners in the county with a piece of property valued at \$50,000 will owe the county \$363. If you own a \$100,000 piece of property will cost you \$726.

Rockcastle County Property Valuation Administrator Margaret Offutt said the lower rate came about because the Rockcastle School Board did not raise their rate and the state actually lowered theirs.

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court raised their rate four percent, but was not enough to keep the total rate from going down.

The county's total property assessment is \$234 million.

The City of Mt. Vernon also set their tax rate at .175 up from .170 a year ago.

That means Mt. Vernon will collect \$87.50 on a \$50,000 piece of property inside the city limits. That is on top of the county's tax bill.

The City of Mt. Vernon's total property assessment is \$50 million. At Brodhead the property tax rate is .240. That means a \$50,000 piece of property in Brodhead will cost land owners \$120, on top of the county's tax bill.

Brodhead's property assessment is \$18.6 million.

At Livingston the property tax rate is .250. A \$50,000 piece of property in Livingston will cost land owners \$125 on top of the county's tax bill.

The total property assessment in Livingston is \$3.2 million.

The county and all three cities also collect a tangible tax and the state collects a motor vehicle tax.

Judgeship, Senate seat among races in November

For the first time since the last county primary election, Rockcastle County voters will have a full slate of candidates to choose from in November's General Election.

There will be races for a Circuit Judge in Family Court, a race for the State Senate in the 21st district which includes, Rockcastle, Jackson, Laurel and Knox Counties, races for city councils, school board, U.S. Congressman and President of the United States.

Rockcastle County resident and current Family Court Circuit Judge Debra Lambert will face Assistant Pulaski County Attorney Michael Duncan for the Judges seat in Division III of the 28th Judicial Circuit, which is comprised of Rockcastle, Pulaski and Lincoln Counties. Lambert was appointed last year by Kentucky Governor Paul Patton to the new judgeship, which was created by the 1998 General Assembly.

Besides being a lawyer, Lambert holds a degree in Child and Family Studies and a minor in Special Education.

Duncan has also served as Assistant Commonwealth Attorney and prosecuted cases in all three counties of the Circuit.

Republican State Senator Albert Robinson, of Laurel County, is facing a stiff challenge from Laurel County Democrat Lawrence Kuhl.

Robinson has served in the Ky. Senate since 1994. Before that he was a state representative for 14 years.

Robinson is currently chairman of the Senate's State and Local Government Committee. He is a real estate broker, auctioneer and developer.

Lawrence Kuhl is a well known Laurel County businessman who served as President of London Bank and Trust Company and then National City from 1981 until he retired last year.

Kuhl was named Man of the Year in Laurel County in 1996 and is credited with much of the areas growth and prosperity.

The Circuit Judge's race and the State Senate race are expected to create the most interest in local elections in November.

There are also seven individuals seeking six council seats in Mt. Vernon.

But, at Livingston, only three people filed for the four seats.

And at Brodhead, four people filed for four seats.

In division four school board, which includes Climax and Orlando voting precincts, Martin Vanzant, 59, who is seeking his first full term, faces opposition from Beverly Sexton, 46.

In division five school board, incumbent Sherry Isaacs, 31, who is seeking her second term, faces opposition from three candidates.

Editors Note: The following is a brief history of the Bank of Mt. Vernon, one of Rockcastle County's oldest ongoing businesses.

"A Brief History"

On September 2, 1900, a group of Rockcastle County men met in Jonas McKenzie's store and organized The Bank of Mt. Vernon.

The board of directors included the following: C.C. Williams, J.T. Adams, George Livesay, Jonas

McKenzie, Fritz Krueger, S.H. Martin and A.E. Evans. S.H. Martin was elected as the first president and A.E. Evans was elected vice president.

The group also voted to open the bank's doors for business on October 2, 1900.

W.L. Richards and C.C. Williams were elected to buy the safe and fixtures. W.L. Richards was to buy the books and stationary. A committee of three was appointed to find and rent a suitable building for the bank to occupy. A building on Church Street was located and rented for a term of one year at \$100.00 per year.

At a later meeting held at Jonas McKenzie's store, it was decided to elect W.L. Richards, Chief Ex-

Points East

Every year since 1976 I have been honored to be spokesperson for the National Association of Woolly Worm Winter Weather Watchers better known as NAWWWWW by the majority of my readers because they can never string all the words together correctly.

And every year since he moved back up North 15 years ago, my buddy, Fredrick J. Beste III, drops me little one liners in the mail. These little memos always include the word "cute" and "enjoyed" along with a stinging admonition that "they are never right."

Fred #3 lives in Wind Gap, Pennsylvania, a place where polar bear sightings in the local landfill don't even make the newsworthy. A damp and dismal place at the foot of the Pocono Mountains in the summer time, Wind Gap is a haven for skiers on a budget in the winter months. They simply slash the interstates down after Halloween so that the local folks who can't afford resort prices can take their make do slopes.

But every year, without fail, Fred reads the NAWWWWW forecast from a Kentucky paper and imagines that it also covers Wind Gap. Fred has a big outdoor swimming pool and for several years, when NAWWWWW correctly predicted mild weather for central and eastern Kentucky, he sent out invitations to his Annual Christmas Party suggesting that folks bring along their bathing suits. Heck, most people in Wind Gap drain their indoor pools in the winter time. The water lines stay frozen for months and people take baths by melting snow in a number two wash tub on top of their wood burners.

What we're trying to say here is that you readers who do not live "locally" should not pay any attention to the NAWWWWW forecast even though we have happened upon a report from a NAWWWWW contingent headquartered in Allentown that we will discuss later.

The local NAWWWWW chapter based here in Paint Lick and currently housed under the floor of the Sportsman's Club has just returned from Sydney, Australia. Even though it has gotten attention on NBC, NAWWWWW, chapters from all over the world have converged on Sydney for the Woolly Worm Summer Olympics.

The Paint Lick crew came home early and many of the members are not speaking to each other. However, we were able to get them together over the weekend for this year's prediction and there is a surprising general consensus. The official forecast FOR CENTRAL & EASTERN KENTUCKY follows.

Look for a late and lasting Indian Summer commencing in mid-November and ending around the first of December. There will be some frosty mornings but mostly warm, sunny days in the eighties and perfect weather for nursing the ever small-mouth bass in your favorite stream. This will be followed by a cold snap and a heavy freeze during the first two weeks of December before the weather turns mild again until well after the first of the year. Look for a significant amount of rain during this period and perhaps some snow showers that will melt off before lunch time. Christmas is almost certain to be wet so the chances of a white Christmas are excellent.

January and February promise to be much milder than normal with many days in the fifties and sixties, but look for a continuation of more rain or snow than normal. Again, if the snow falls it will not linger around very long. Look for an early Spring, but be prepared for an interruption by a heavy, lasting snow during the last two weeks of the month or perhaps the first week of April. The worst weather of the season promises to be after the official first day of Spring.

words shocked me into reality, our house on the farm burned last night. Was I dreaming? What was she saying. Oh Mat on the farm, burned? That couldn't be! This house had been the way-station by friends and visitors into the hills and hollows of the Appalachian Mountains. Gone?

I must see this for myself, surely they had had a bad dream, or I was having one now. Somehow, with Polly's help, I got dressed and accompanied them back down the familiar road to the farm. I haven't forgotten the feeling of awe, disbelief, helplessness, that overtakes one when they look, for the first time, at the destruction of fire, or a quick stop when passing by. It has taken a life time to accomplish.

I was still in disbelief when Chuck turned into the driveway, and until I saw the smoldering ashes between the framework of concrete blocks that remained, I considered a suburb of Wind Gap. The fireplace and big stone chimney was still standing guard over the remains of what I had called HOME. There really isn't that pile of smoldering ashes was all that remained of the carefully measured, and sawed by hand, boards that Mat and Dee had painstakingly built into a house that wind and weather couldn't shake or destroy. The quivering inside gradually reached my hands and legs and I knew I was hurting, hurting in a way I had never hurt before. Beneath those

smoldering ashes lay my belongings. Not just the ordinary things like kitchen ware such as stoves, refrigerator, dishwasher, beds, table and chairs and such, there were also the things I had left behind for safe keeping. Antiques handed down for a couple of generations, had made quilts to leave for the next generation to become their antiques. Mat's jewelry and collection of arrowheads and old jewelry. My mind was in a whirl as it tried to remember all the things it had taken years to accumulate and fire had destroyed in one night.

Then I looked at Polly, she was just as heartbroken as I was. This was not only my loss, it was her loss too. She had lost the home of her childhood, and what she had dreamed of having her future one as well. Many of her belongings already filled the valet car spaces left behind when I moved to Mt. Vernon. Now these were also smoldering amidst the rubble, except blackened by smoke.

The old part of the house was built before her time, but she helped with every phase of the new part. The addition that was the pride and joy of our life. It was she and I that designed the kitchen with the most modern cabinets, and arrangement for cooking and baking. Everything had its place and space, including the serving window between the kitchen and dining room, with dishwasher and sink in reaching distance. Since she lived close by she became Mat's right arm, and extra legs. It was she that helped dig the drainage bed for the septic tank and basement. Now all their work, her dreams and many of her valuable lay in ashes. What lay before us in ashes, was memories of the past and dreams for the future. Time heals wounds, the scar being the only thing left of the lingering memories.

Judy, Rod and Polly, still celebrate my birthday in one way or another and since it follows that one big tragedy so closely, at least one of them is with me when it comes around. Judy and Geoff are here now and will be for a day or two. Rod and Helen were here last weekend, and Polly and Chuck of course are and out most daily. So, I do have support in remembering days on the farm when all was well.

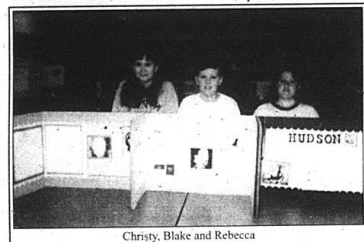

Dietary Supplements: More Is Not Always Better

Many people are attracted by ads for vitamins and minerals that imply that they will improve appearance, prevent or cure diseases, and even lengthen life. But there is, as yet, little scientific evidence to back most of these claims.

Doctors occasionally prescribe dietary supplements to correct deficiencies diagnosed in their patients. For example, people who have osteoporosis a condition causing thin, brittle bones - may be advised by their physicians to take calcium supplements, usually in combination with vitamin D. Sarcoid dieters, heavy drinkers, and those who are recovering from surgery or an illness may need certain preparations.

But too often people take high-dose supplements of various vitamins and minerals without a doctor's advice in the hope of preventing or curing a disease or condition. This can be a waste of money or, worse, a threat to health.

Large amounts of some supplements may upset the natural balance of nutrients that the body normally maintains. Too much of some of them can affect the way

others act. Although extra amounts of some nutrients are not absorbed and pass out of the body, others can build up to dangerous levels.

Scientists have identified a large number of nutrients that are essential to health, but supplements contain only some of these. A well-balanced diet - one that contains a wide variety of foods - provides all the necessary nutrients. In addition, there are other substances in foods, which, although not essential for life, are beneficial to health. Foods may also contain some essential nutrients that have not yet been identified.

Phase II Tobacco Payments

Tobacco growers/tenants, quota owners and growing farm operators who produced tobacco in 1999 and shared in the risks of production are eligible to receive a portion of Kentucky's share of the National Tobacco Growers Settlement Trust (Phase II). The funds will be divided equally with 1/3 for quota, 1/3 for land and 1/3 for labor.

Applications will be mailed, like last year, to all farm operators involved in tobacco production. The forms will be due back at the end of October. Applicants will find this year's form looks a bit different than last year's. It's easier to understand and easier to complete.

A toll-free phone help line will be up and running a week before applications are distributed. You can get answers to funds by calling 1-877-549-2537 beginning September 10th. Funds will be distributed by Decem-

ber 31, 2000. Exact rates for payment will be known after November 15, 2000.

The Farm Service Agency has been authorized to help operators fill out the Phase II forms by phone at 256-2525 or in the office on Mondays and Tuesdays only. If anyone needs assistance completing their applications on other days, we encourage you to call the Rockcastle County Extension Office at 256-2403 or the toll-free number of Phase II.

Tobacco Loss Assistance with Regard to Estates

With regard to the recent TLAP00 applications pertaining to estates for which ownership was not determined and the TLAP application was not complete; the following is being provided.

Several States have requested guidance regarding ownership proof requirements for determining who is eligible to receive a TLAP00 payment. After careful consideration and in the spirit of protecting small farms and avoiding civil lawsuits, FSA is authorized to take a certification from the best source available. For example, where there are multiple heirs that are the rightful owners of a

property, FSA may take a certification from one or more of the owners as to the identity of the other owners and their share of the tobacco quota. In their property TLAP00 applications, where some but not all heirs applied for a payment, the other heirs who wish to apply may file an application for payment through December 1, 2000. Each payment approved under this late-filed provision must be concurred with by the Kentucky State FSA Committee (STC).

In order to meet the statutory payment disbursement deadline, TLAP00 sign up is being implemented as a certification program. For purposes of TLAP00 only, landowners will not be required to produce a legal document to confirm ownership if not readily available.

Burley tobacco farmers applied at FSA offices for compensation under the Tobacco Loss Assistance Program (TLAP) by the deadline of Sept. 15, 2000. USDA will distribute \$340 million to compensate tobacco farmers who suffered a reduction of tobacco quota or acreage for the 1999-2000 crop years. Kentucky's share is \$140 million.

As directed by Congress, farmers of this late-filed provision must receive a portion of the \$340 million to help defray lost income resulting

from declining quotas and allotments. Individual farm payments for burley tobacco will be split three ways between farmers, quota owners, and those in control of the quotas (farm operators). Payments under the second year of TLAP will be based on the 2000 crop quota.

REMEMBER: DECEMBER 1st, 2000 is the deadline for late filed applications pertaining to estates!

Loan Deficiency Payment

Producers who retain beneficial interest in commodity eligible for a loan or a loan deficiency payment (LDP) are eligible for payment. For the following remain with the producer:

- Control of the commodity
- Risk of loss
- Title of the commodity

One of the eligibility requirements for Loans and LDP's is the crop must have been produced on contract acreage (AMTA), exception to soybeans.

A recent bill will now allow non-contract crops to be eligible for LDP's for 2000 year only.

For further information on the LDP program contact the local FSA office.

Producers who signed up for the Pasture Recovery Program by the deadline of September 30th or by October 2nd or the practice will be disapproved.

FSA Quiet Time

The Farm Service Agency will be processing payments on Wednesday mornings; therefore, limited service will be available during these quiet hours. Applications and other documents may be left on the front counter. The quiet time became effective Wednesday, September 20, 2000.

The Challenges & Opportunities of Harvest Season

As farmers watch their crops turn from green to tawny brown, they anxiously await the dry-down of their valuable moisture levels. The waiting is always difficult as an entire

growing season worth of effort stands at the threshold of maturity, exposed and vulnerable to adverse weather. Recently heavy winds flattened thousands of acres from corn and central Illinois just days before it would have been dry enough to shell. Now those producers hit by high winds who have a difficult time harvesting the downed crop and will struggle to recover what they can. Significant field loss is inevitable when mature corn is hit by field robbing winds.

In the past when livestock fences lined the countryside, farmers could graze cattle or other livestock in fields for weeks after harvest allowing the animals to capitalize on the field loss. But today few fences remain as producers tend to specialize in crop production or livestock production instead of trying to manage both. Once a farmer's crop is on the ground it may be irrevocable, because conventional equipment can only harvest production that is standing or attached to the stalk. Without a mechanical means to gather without field loss, a farmer is once again subject to yet another agricultural loss.

For organizations like bee scouts, girls scouts or other groups, the farmer's loss could be a gleaming opportunity for those abled bodied persons who want to raise money. Unharvested cars of corn are a field pennies scattered across a farmers field, and with the producers permission, supervised children could gather up field loss corn to benefit a charity of their choice. A similar opportunity exists in orchards where apples are left on the trees, or in pumpkin and squash patches where leftover produce remains. Other potential gleaming situations are available during the harvest season for those who are willing to perform the task of hand picking that which can not be mechanically harvested. Organizations can plan a group outing by calling a farmer they know and asking for permission to glean his fields. Gleaning helps the farmer clear his fields while reclaimed produce can be sold for a worthwhile

cause. Produce recovery is a win/win situation that is available at harvest time to those who are willing to work.

Celebrate National Honey Month

September was designated as national honey month, which commemorates the beneficial contribution honeybees make to agriculture by pollinating the crops across America. Over 25% of the consumer's diet today consists of foods which are made possible by bees that carry pollen from plant to plant. The tireless worker bees live for five or six weeks; and are the only members of a hive that gather the nectar which becomes honey. Worker bees can cover about 55,000 miles and visit over 2 million flowers in order to produce one pound of honey. Bees have maintained a symbiotic relationship with agriculture since the first farmer started raising crops thousands of years ago. The history of beekeeping goes back even further as evidenced by cave paintings that date back to 7000BC.

The honey from bees is a natural sweetener that is very nutritious, and an excellent cooking additive or baking ingredient. While honey primarily consists of glucose, fructose and water, it also contains vitamins, mineral, amino acids and trace enzymes. The natural combination of these components are the source of honey's medical characteristics. Both internal and external applications of honey have been found to have specific health benefits. Everything from skin treatments to cold remedies have incorporated honey as part of their health formula or curative recipe. Honey derives its flavor profile from the various plant sources where the nectar originates. Hives located, for example, in orange groves will produce orange blossom honey while clover honey is extracted from hives bordering clover fields. There are over 300 identifiable floral sources for honey in the United States alone.

Currently, eligible beekeepers can get a honey loan from the Farm Service Agency.

Josh Hale had one yard on one rush and he caught 4 passes for 50 yards and one score.

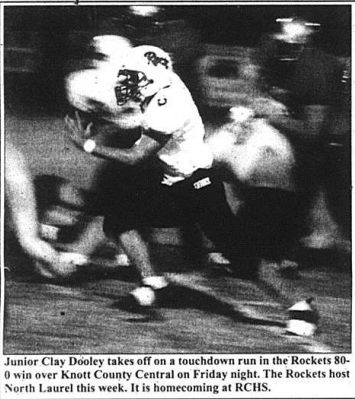
Greg Harper caught three passes for 63 yards and he scored two touchdowns.

Dackery Larkey caught four passes for 28 yards and James Bussell had 19 yards on three carries and he scored once.

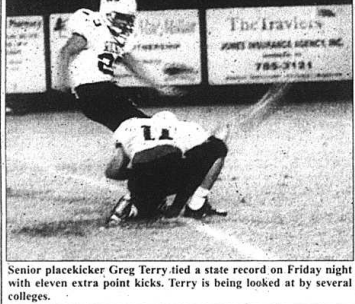

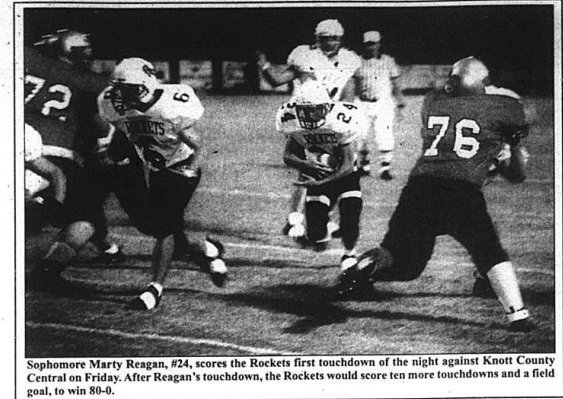
JV win sixth straight 28-7 over Pulaski Co.

In addition, hand-stitched quilts along with other handmade craft items will be on display.

Visitors can see a real wagon train, and, new this year, they can walk through a "History-Mobile," a traveling exhibit which tours nationally, displaying memorabilia and relics of the Civil War in Kentucky. Activities for the children include a petting zoo, puppet show, face painting, balloons and Renfro Valley's first "Tiny Tractor Pedal Pull." Enjoy cloggers and live bluegrass, mountain and gospel music on Friday when Tennessee's "The Larkin Family" takes the stage, pick your favorites in the Country Talent Search on Saturday and Sunday, Sunday being the child and teen categories. Also, since Sunday is "Kid's Day" all children 12 and under are admitted free!
