





EPA forcing Mt. Vernon to clean up pond

By: Richard Anderkin The Mt. Vernon City Council will accept bids soon on a project that will clean out the lagoon at the city's wa-ter plant at Renfro Valley.

But it will be costly. Mt. Vernon Mayor Karen King Mt. Vernon Mayor Karon King and water superintendent Dennis McClure told the council during their gular monthly meeting on Monday night that the estimated cost of the cleanup was \$43,000 to \$60,000. King said the city had already been cited by the federal Environmental Protection Agency because of the poor condition of the liagoon, which is a studily a settling pond. The pond is used for back washing when employees at the plant clean the filtering system. Mayor King saids he wasn't sure where the city would get the money for the project, but that it had to be done, or the EPA would shut diwn the city's water plant.

Once completed, the city will not have to clean out the lagoon for an-other eight to twelve years.

second half, they were outscored 27-15 for the final 7 point loss.




