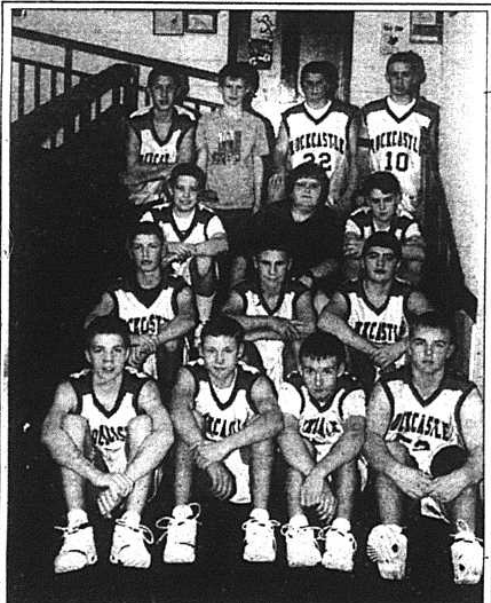
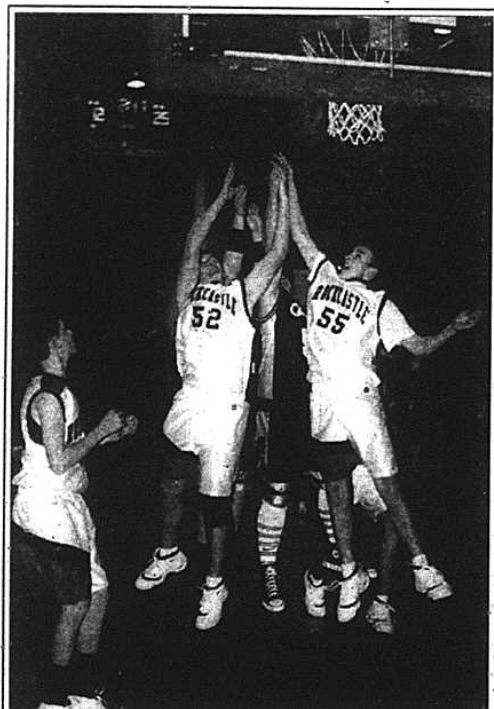

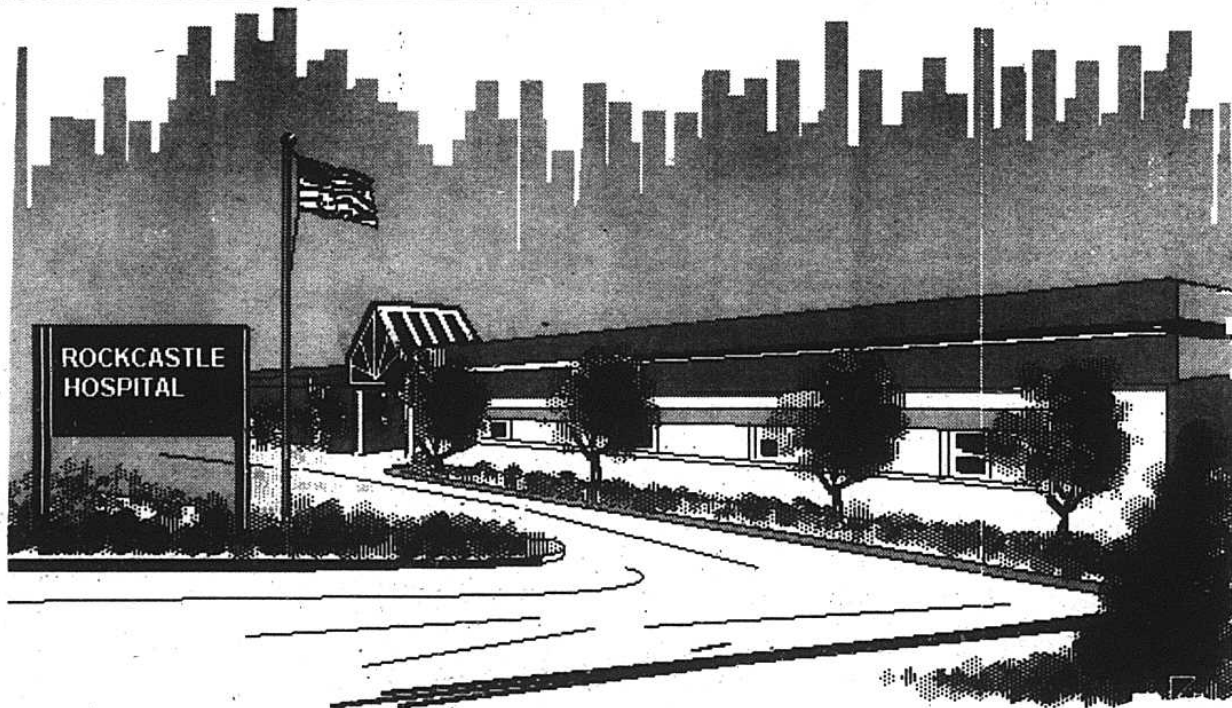

Senior defensive back Derrick Bussell was also named first team all-state as a defensive back.

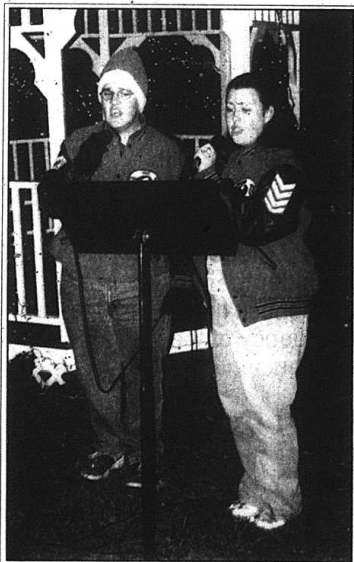
Bussell had eight interceptions this season and had 17 in his career at Rockcastle. Bussell was also the team's leading offensive rusher.

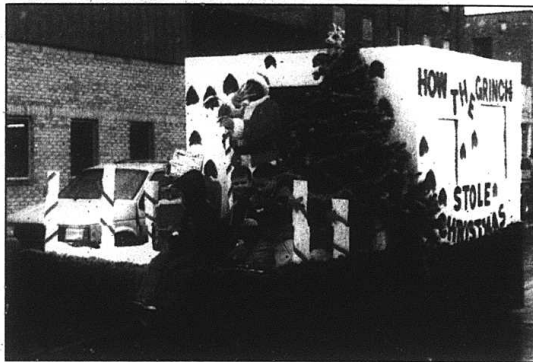

## Sexual harassment cases filed at RCHS

This year, five cases of sexual

harassment have been filed at the Rockcastle County High School.

As a result, Dr. Roger Cleveland, from the Kentucky Department of Education, came to speak with high school students about sexual harassment earlier this month.

Dr. Cleveland told students that sexual harassment is a degrading power issue that makes its victims feel bad.

"It's in the classrooms and hallways - all around you you see sexual harassment. Most offenders don't even realize they're committing a crime," Cleveland said.

RCHS assistant principal Barry Noble said that was the problem with

the five cases already reported this year.

Last year 21 cases of harassment were filed at RCHS. Five of the cases filed last year, were sexual harassment. With this school year not even half over, the exact same number of sexual harassment cases have already been filed.

"The numbers are already so high this year. Myself, Loretta Powell, Director of Student Services and Principal Ruth Allen agreed to bring in Dr. Cleveland to explain to the students what sexual harassment is," Noble said.

As a result of Dr. Cleveland's presentation, RCHS students are now

## EPA forcing Mt. Vernon to clean up pond

The Mt. Vernon City Council will accept bids soon on a project that will clean out the lagoon at the city's water plant at Renfro Valley.

But it will be costly.

Mt. Vernon Mayor Karen King and water superintendent Dennis McClure told the council during their regular monthly meeting on Monday night that the estimated cost of the cleanup was \$43,000 to \$66,000.

King said the city had already been cited by the federal Environmental Protection Agency because of the poor condition of the lagoon, which is actually a settling pond.

The pond is used for back washing when employees at the plant clean the filtering system.

Mayor King said she wasn't sure where the city would get the money for the project, but that it had to be done, or the EPA would shut down the city's water plant.

Once completed, the city will not have to clean out the lagoon for another eight to twelve years.

The city also discussed the construction of a new firehouse on Main Street in the city's lot next to the Rockcastle County courthouse.

Fire department members Brian Hanel and Steve Griffin presented some rough drawings of the new fire house to the city council.

The drawings call for the building to face the building housing Silver Threads and Castle Cleaners. The dimensions would be 100 x 60.

The building will have four bays in the front and one in the back.

The total cost of the project has not been calculated, but some estimates range in the \$100,000 area.

City councilman Joe Mullins had asked about the possibility of selling bonds to raise enough money to build the building, but City Clerk Kaye Rader told Mullins that the state says the project is not big enough for a bond sale.

However, Mayor King said the state had a bond pool program, in

which the city could possibly participate. That program offers cities a lower rate than they can get at a lending institution.

The Mayor said the city's new payroll and net profits tax had not generated as much money as expected, as of yet, and could not currently foot the bill for the new building.

The Mayors said after the meeting that while she was in full support of a new fire house - she has hopes of a building being built that would house the city police department and the fire house.

The plans that were submitted Monday night did not include any space for the police department.

Mayor King said she would discuss the matter with the fire department at a later date.

The city also discussed parking on Main Street.

Council member Lonetta Daugherty told the council that a local businessman had complained to her about employees of RTEC parking on Main Street and leaving their cars all day long.

She said the businessman said it was becoming a serious problem.

Asst. Chief Eddie Delaney said that the city allows two hours of free parking, but that he had not been made aware of any problem.

During his police report Delaney said that Mike Peters had been rehired as a full-time officer.

He also said that Brian Doan and Rodney Vanzant had been placed in the first phase testing program at Eastern Kentucky University.

Delaney said that if the two pass the requirements at Eastern, they would be hired as city police officers.

Vanzant and Doan will replace Coby Smith and Barry Adams, who will become Kentucky State Police officers in the near future.

Adams will also receive his sixth award from the Governor's office for his high number of driving under the influence arrests.

## Scholarship in honor of Rader being established

A scholarship fund is being set up in honor of a local man who died in August in an automobile accident.

The Calvin Rader Scholarship will be awarded annually to a Rockcastle County senior, who intends to seek education at a higher level.

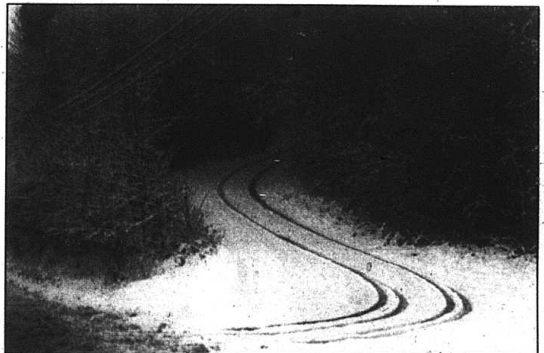
Bank of Mt. Vernon loan officer David Woodall, who was a very close friend of Rader's and who like many other Rockcastle countians, coached with Rader in the Rockcastle Little

League program, is spearheading the effort.

"Calvin loved to work with kids and he touched the lives of so many of them that we thought it was only fitting that we establish some way to remember him by and some way that memory could benefit other children," Woodall said.

Woodall said that a local committee of himself, John McQuary, Johnny Boone Saylor, Steve Phelps

# Sweet and Sour

When fate gives you lemons, make lemonade. I should be able to make pretty good lemonade by now since fate keeps dumping such things as loss of ones livelihood by storm damage to the trees supplying it. Leveling the home place on the farm by fire and now is the cause of me being temporarily out of my home because of fire and smoke damage; that is, if things like these are related to lemons.

My column, "Sweet and Sour," pretty aptly covers the subject. The lemons in my life have been dealt with. Sometimes with tears, often frustration, frequently patience and the impatience view for space to be heard and listened to. When I lost several acres of lumber, ready for harvesting, to a violent windstorm, my first thought was, "The Lord Giveth and The Lord Taketh, Blessed be the name of the Lord." Maybe he has a better use for this land he just cleared by wind. The very next year another violent wind leveled another section including large oaks close to the house and worry about losing my livelihood began to take precedent over patience. One more spring with its strong winds, followed the next winter with the worst ice storms to ever hit this area practically destroyed all timber left on our farm. It was when I was driven through a scene of intricate ice covered trees, the beauty of which could be likened to fairyland, then onto my property, where the devastation of the ice storm was evident in acres and acres of pines, the trees that had escaped the windstorms, broken down and uprooted by the force of the ice, my prayers of thanks for Your Blessings turned to one of, "What have I done God to deserve this?" His answers was, "Lo I am with you always."

Since I don't have the patience of Job, nor his faith, the next blow me the hardest of all, when Polly and Chuck took me early, Sunday morn-

ing, September 20, 1997, my house on the farm was burned to the ground. I lasted the bitterness of a green lemon rind. The timber Mat treasured and had watched grow to maturity was gone. The home we built and raised our three children in was gone. The home away from home for any and all relatives and friends who came, year after year, to partake of the hospitality of Mat and Zi's home, was gone. The home we built and always greeted them, is gone. Those days are now yesterday.

The last lemon dealt me by fate is the one I'm making into lemonade, with both the "Sweet and Sour" of my title column used.

This episode of my losing a bout with fate began in my kitchen when I forgot to turn off the burner under a pan with a small amount of cooking oil in it. When I returned from the mailbox, the kitchen was in flames. "Where does lemonade fit into another disaster in my life? Well, enough is enough, so I again asked God, "Now what do I do?" The answer was clear, "Look around you and see what is there."

What I saw was neighbors, one calling the fire department, one calling the school to notify Polly, two women notifying my lawn hose to spray on the outside of the house until the firemen arrived. Then the arrival of fire trucks with volunteer firemen taking over and doing a wonderful job of extinguishing the fire before it reached other rooms or the roof. I was already beginning to make lemonade out of these lemons fate had dropped from the lemon tree. If my fate was to be one of losses there surely had to be a message hidden somewhere in the wreckage and here it was, in the smoke filled house I have called home for ten years, if life deals you lemons, make lemonade.

Had been dealt the lemons, now where could I find the sugar to sweeten

if? It was then I began counting my blessings and not only found sugar aplenty but a big pot of honey to give additional sweetening and the extra flavor of honey for a bonus.

When the fire machines pulled away and I was told it was O.K. for me to go back in my first concern was for my treasured antique book cases, vanity, and china cabinet. And surprisingly, they had not been touched by the fire or water. The only visible damage was "smoke" which was extensive, but could be taken care of by expert hands. It was then the better taste of lemon rind gave way to one of sweetness when I gave way to the peace of knowing God had blessed me by not allowing everything to go up in smoke and now I not only had a few pieces of treasured furniture left, I had friends and neighbors offering a kind of concern and love that I hadn't taken time to discover before. So, Bea Hensley, Becky Hammons, both made emergency phone calls, Alta Bullock, Jewell Alan, The Renners - all close neighbors, the friends who protected the furniture, yet extinguished the fire quickly, all share in my thanks and the beginning of the "Pitcher of Lemonade" I'm making from the tree of lemons fate has harassed me with.

Each of these neighbors offered for me in their homes. There were sincere offers of love and kindness. Sweetening for the Lemonade.

Polly and Chuck, being old hands at adding sweetening to my life, came to my rescue quickly and took control of things. Her home was my abode for several days, then a few days with Yerna, my sister-in-law, "another cube of sugar in my lemonade," brought the reality of where do I go now? I can't keep going from place to place looking for a place to sleep! Even though I knew I was welcome to stay as long as I liked at either place, or go to Bessie Cromer's, my dear friend whose invitation to come and stay as long as I liked, with her had come as soon as she heard about the fire, was seriously considered before I decided I needed a place I could call mine, whether it be my house on Tevis St. or in a room in a motel. Bessie has sweetened my life with her love and kindness for 50 years or so. But right now in all the turmoil and decisions on where do I sleep tonight, I decided on a motel room. Thanks Bessie, your offer did add another spoonful of honey to my drink.

Often there are people behind the scenes of everyday life who contribute to changes in a persons life of which incident, or tragedy to some, was a lemon or a chance to make lemonade. Such a person was Dr. McElwain and his nurse, Vickie Whaley. After my first night in the motel room at Kasle Inn was spent sleepless when the reality of the situation dawned on me, that this was the first time in my life I had no place of my own to lay my head. It was then depression reared its ugly head and I thought of Dr. McElwain and his wisdom of counseling (instead of a nerve shot). A couple of hours later I was sitting in his office, my distress evident as smile and welcome greeting immediately calming my imagined fears of homelessness and therefore the necessity of, by a quirk of fate, spending my time temporarily in a motel was not the worst thing that could happen. Yes, Dr. McElwain, I have, respectfully read the "Book of Job." Also the life of "Jesus Christ." His birth, His death. They all have strengthened my faith, yet I have my own problems - Huh? Your kind talking too and reasoning with me, then including me in a casual and personal conversation cleared my thinking and added more sweetening to the big container of lemonade. I am making from the fruit of the lemon tree and sweetened by human kindness. Vickie, you have also contributed to that refreshing drink. Your duties as a "perfect" nurse has gone beyond that and has become to me, the attention of a friend. Your invitation to have dinner with you and Chelsea the other night, added a big spoonful of honey to it.

Now that I am at peace with myself, at least temporarily, I'll get busy with other events shaping my future. I have no idea what is going on in the house on Tevis St. I've turned that over to the clean up crew (but please hurry up).

I am in a clean comfortable room with excellent service all the way from the office where Larry Carter is supervisor, probably owns, the motel. Hot coffee is available till 11:00 a.m. and I enjoy a cup along with a pleasant and beautiful walk when I can enjoy the scenery and watch the constantly moving traffic on I-75 as I get my needed exercise.

By mid morning mail service is busy clearing up the mess left by occupants of the night before, I haven't met a one I wouldn't gladly

accept as a neighbor or friend. They tidy up my room if I don't object, and leave it as is, if I ask them to. If they have time (I always have plenty of it) we get a little chatting in. And if I need anything such as ice, one of them brings it to me.

I don't know where or how Larry found such a wonderful crew. If they were mine I'd put a sign on each one saying, "Private Property" with name attached - Hazel, Sandy, Kathy, Pauline, Geneva and Michelle.

Now that is only the half of it. The other half is at the Kasle Inn Restaurant across the driveway from me. When I first began going there I didn't know a soul and was quite shy about eating alone. Now when I go in everyone greets me with a smile and I have begun to share bits and pieces of chit chat as I eat or read the morning paper. I often find one on the table where the waitress sit at break time. This finally broke the ice between an old lady eating alone and several waitresses keeping busy (or loafing). So now I never feel alone, there is a comradeship building that I liken to a grandma - looking over a bunch of happy grandchildren - doing their daily chores.

I felt their love and care the other night when they had responded to an invitation to "come see my pretty Christmas tree Polly gave me." One of the maintenance men, Tim, had moved a table under the big window and set it up that morning. And it was too pretty to keep to myself. The multicolor lights flashing as the colors on the tree changed from green to red to purple to yellow was sharing with others whom I had only recently met. They came, they saw and appre-

ciated the invitation to do so enough till in a few minutes when I heard a covey cawing outside I took a peek and here was five or six young fowls decorating the outside of my window with big red bows and tinsel ropes. That act of responding to an old lady who wanted to share some of the beauty in her life brought tears of happiness that bonded us into a family like relationship. Enough so, that a huge Christmas stocking with, Granny Grenville on it is hanging with the others on the counter they are using as a mantle.

Those who decorated my window were David and Tammie Jamison, Felicia Cameron, Kandice Jamison, Kathy Owens and Jesse Owens. Soon others were coming over to "look and see" oh and oh. Then my very dear friend, Alice Cloud (not a waitress) visited and saw some of the bows had blown loose and fixed them. She is always there when I need her. More sugar for the pot of lemonade.

Now why shouldn't I make lemonade from the lemons of disaster that has haunted me when there is so much love being converted to sweetening for it and I appreciate all the sugar and honey available.

The others taking part in my new family and friends, therefore helping with my lemonade stand are from the restaurant Mark Thomas, Janet Robinson, Ruby Mink, Jill Davidson, Melissa Miller, Kathy Brown, Angie Abney, Burn Powell and Heather Riggsby. From the motel, Louise, Charles, Kenny, James. If I have missed anyone I am sorry. My brain space for new names and faces is out of order. "Perhaps I'm out of Chads."

# Legislative Update

## State Rep. Danny Ford

Making money less of an obstacle in the race for a better education

Although Election Day is not quite behind us and we don't know what the future holds for either presidential hopeful, we do know that the future holds a lot of promise for Kentucky. To make the most of our future we need to focus our efforts on ensuring that future generations have the greatest possible opportunity to succeed.

Over the past decade we have accomplished a lot along those lines. During the past two sessions the General Assembly has focused specific attention on higher education, specifically how to make college or technical degrees more affordable. We placed the emphasis there because at a time when a college or technical school education is essential for a successful future, paying the tuition bills should be as small an obstacle as possible.

For those of you with young children we created the Commonwealth Postsecondary Education Pre-paid Tuition Trust Fund. This plan will allow anyone - parents, grandparents, family and friends - to lock in today's tuition rates and begin paying for a child to attend college tomorrow. The pre-paid tuition credit can be used at institutions both inside and outside of the state.

We created the Commonwealth Merit Scholarship Program to provide scholarships for students based on their high school grade point averages (GPA) and ACT scores. The Merit Scholarship can be applied to the tuition at any Kentucky college, technical school or university and are renewable if the student maintains at least a 3.0 GPA. A student with a GPA above 2.5 can receive scholar-

ship funds and at least a 15 on the ACT to qualify for scholarship money based on the exam. For example, a student with a 4.0 high school GPA and an ACT score of 28 or above can earn a Merit Scholarship of \$2,500 a year and a total of \$10,000. To find out more about the program, contact your high school guidance counselor or the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority, (KHEAA), toll-free at 1-800-928-8926.

There are many other ways to pay for a college education. Most, but not all, financial aid is based on financial need you will need to figure out whether or not you and your family qualify for assistance by filling out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The forms are available from high school counselors, college financial aid offices, or by contacting KHEAA. Contact the student advisor or financial aid office at the school or schools being considered for additional information.

Here are just a few types of financial aid available:

- **Work-study:** Part-time employment either on or off campus that allows students to earn money to help pay the cost of education.
- **Loans:** Money borrowed to cover the cost of education. Loans must be repaid with interest.
- **Military benefits:** Financial assistance to individuals (or their dependents) who have performed military service. Another option is the National Guard, an organization that offers the best of both worlds with weekend training and educational benefits.
- **Grants:** Assistance that usually does not have to be repaid. Grant awards are usually based on financial need.
- **Scholarship:** Assistance that

doesn't have to be repaid. Scholarship awards are usually based on skill, ability, talent or achievement.

Waivers: Arrangement offered by some institutions to forego specific higher education costs for students who meet unique qualifications. Contact the schools you are considering to find out what specific waivers they offer.

...or to greater than, starch-type supplements such as corn.

The soyhulls are also palatable to calves and less likely to cause founder or acidosis than grains. When available at prices competitive with corn, these products can be excellent feeds to use when forage utilization is a priority. Soyhulls are the seed coats on soybeans left from the processing of soybean meal. Corn gluten is a byproduct of the wet milling process.

Farmers across Kentucky, and particularly in western Kentucky, are feeding more and more soyhulls. The hulls fed for forage are a good source of feed for cattle while saving farmers money.

The key to successful use of the byproduct feeds is to ensure that it contains 13 percent protein to provide the needed protein for the calves development. It may require mixing of products such as a combination of soyhulls and corn gluten to attain that level.

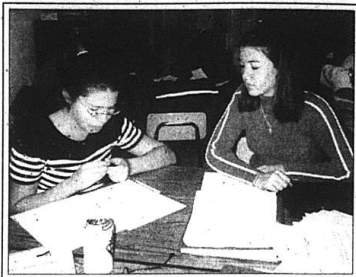

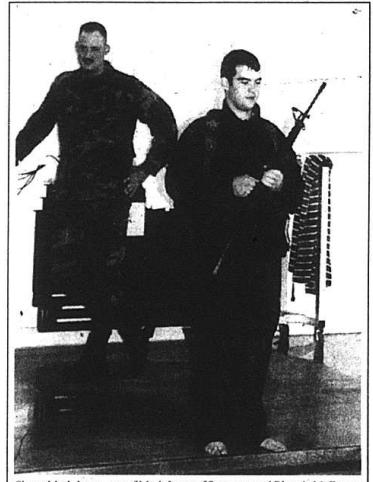

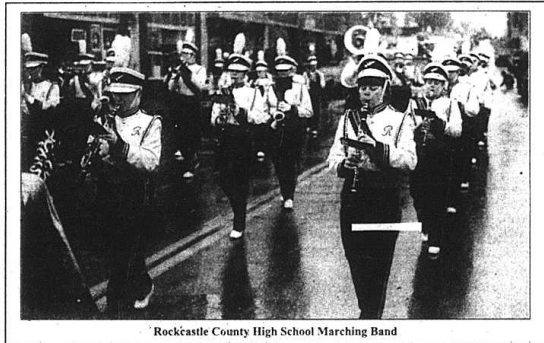

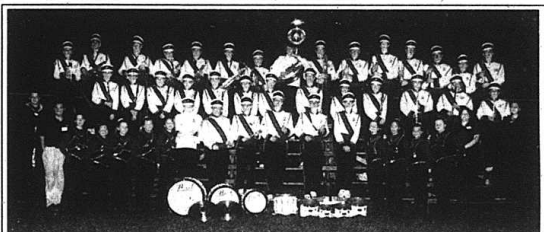

### News from KSP

The Kentucky State Police at London would like to inform all motorists traveling this holiday season and using Kentucky welcome centers they should beware that certain groups of persons have been approaching people at welcome centers and using gambling type con games to deceive and take money.  
All motorists should be aware that these games are illegal and could result in the loss of monies or personal property. These con games may not be strictly limited to the Kentucky Welcome Centers. If you are approached with these actions you should contact the Kentucky State Police, nearest police agency or staff persons at the welcome center.  
With the Holiday season here the Kentucky State Police at London would like to remind motorists of the presence of traffic checkpoints. These checkpoints are utilized to enforce laws relating to the operation of a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicants, licensing of drivers, registration of motor vehicles, and motor vehicle equipment safety.

Other violation or suspected violations of state law observed at the checkpoint will be investigated and enforced.  
The determination of where and when a traffic checkpoint will be held will bear a relationship to a public safety or traffic violation problem, which has been experienced or is anticipated in a particular location.  
Traffic checkpoints will be established on roadways with clear visibility in all directions of travel.  
During the month of November the Kentucky State Police at London worked overtime and extra traffic enforcement to help reduce the number of accidents related to speeding motorist and intoxicated drivers to help make this holiday season a safe one for those driving on Kentucky's highways.  
During the month a total of 2,740 citations were issued 1,023 speeding, 347 seatbelt, 29 child restraint violations and 103 drivers were arrested for Driving Under the Influence.  
The remaining citations were for

other traffic and non-traffic related offenses. A total of 163 accidents were investigated with four fatal accident and five people killed. Of the fatal accidents investigated by the Kentucky State Police, two occurred in Whitley County and two occurred in McCreary County.

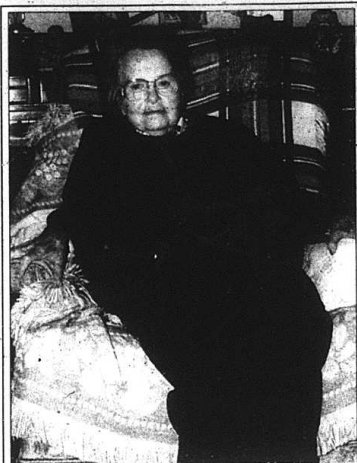

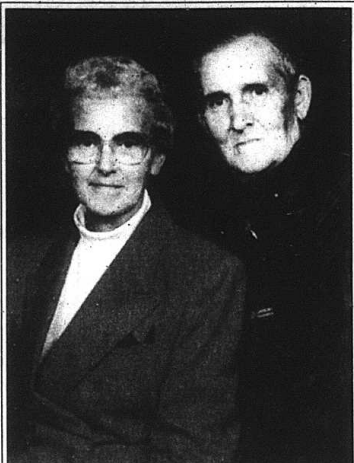


### 98th Birthday Celebration

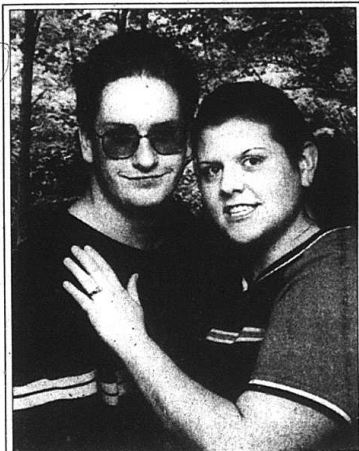

Mrs. Gray still lives in Brodhead in the same house she and Mr. Gray built 73 years ago. Her friends and family wish her many more "Happy Birthdays."



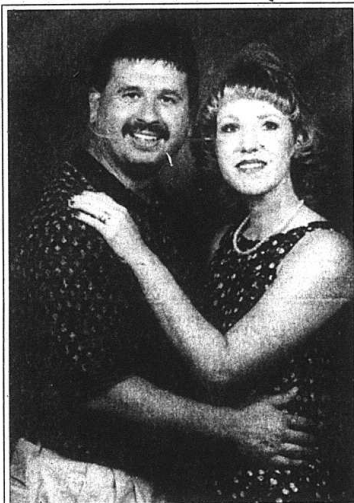

## Saxton's Cornet Band to perform at RCHS

On Thursday, December 14th at 6:30 p.m., Saxton's Cornet Band will perform at the Rockcastle County High School auditorium. No admission will be charged.

The modern day Saxton's Cornet Band recreates the sounds and appearance of American brass bands at the middle of the 19th Century. During the preceding decades innovations in the design of brass musical

instruments made these horns more versatile and easier to play than ever before. Critical to this process was the development of valve systems that allowed brass horns to play the full range of musical scales. Another important step was the development by Adolphe Sax of families of horn matched in pitch. The inventor named these instruments "Saxhorns." Brass bands became enormously popular

and replaced earlier ensembles based upon natural horns, keyed instruments, and woodwinds. Amateur and professional bands formed all across the country. Saxhorn bands were fully developed in time to provide music to both armies during the American Civil War.

Saxton's Cornet Band is comprised of some of the finest professional musicians in central Kentucky.

The band has performed in concert halls and parades, at Civil War reenactments and ceremonies, and for other special events from Massachusetts to Colorado and from Florida to Illinois. It appears regularly at National Park Service sites, including the Jefferson National Expansion Park in St. Louis, Harper's Ferry, Lincoln's Birthplace in Hodgenville, Kentucky, Fort Larned, Kansas and the Gettysburg Military Music Master. The band had performed most recently at the Tall Stacks Festival in Cincinnati, Ohio, which Family Magazine called, "the greatest family weekend in the world." Motion picture credits include the Turner productions *Gettysburg* and *The Day Lincoln Was Shot*. Saxton's Cornet Band appears most years at the Great American Brass Band Festival in Danville.

Last Friday night, the Rockets traveled to Knox Central for the first of many road trips this season, coming home with the 76-57 win.

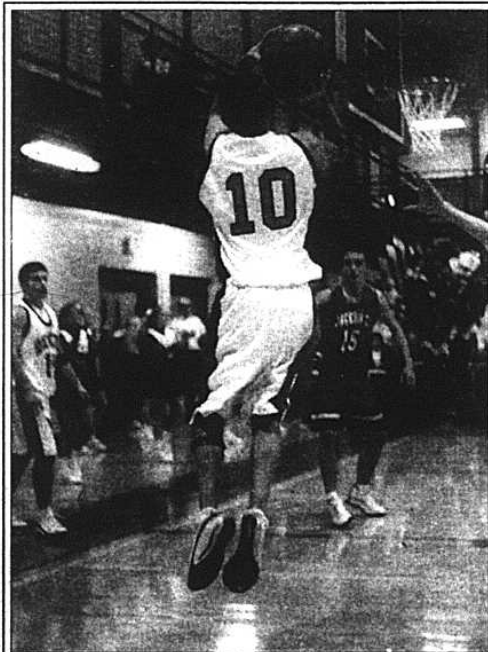
Jeremy Neeley had a career high 30 points against the Panthers, in a three point shooting exhibition.

The Rockets gained the lead in the opening minutes of the game and never looked back, as eight Rocket players saw scoring action, with Aaron Cash and Andrew

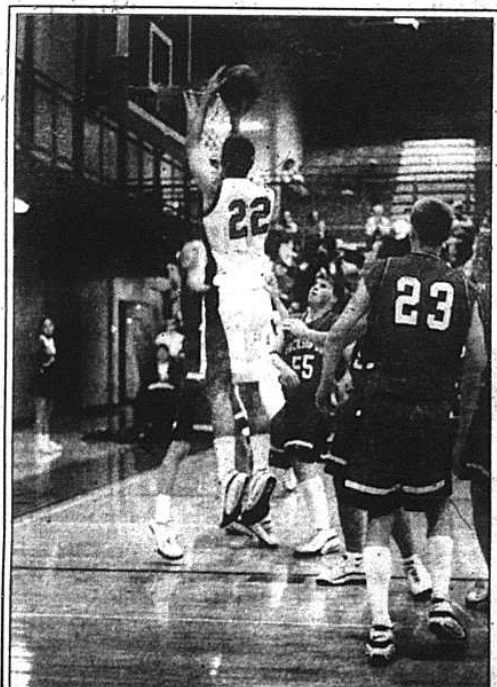
Hammond leading the way behind Neeley with 12 and 10 respectively.

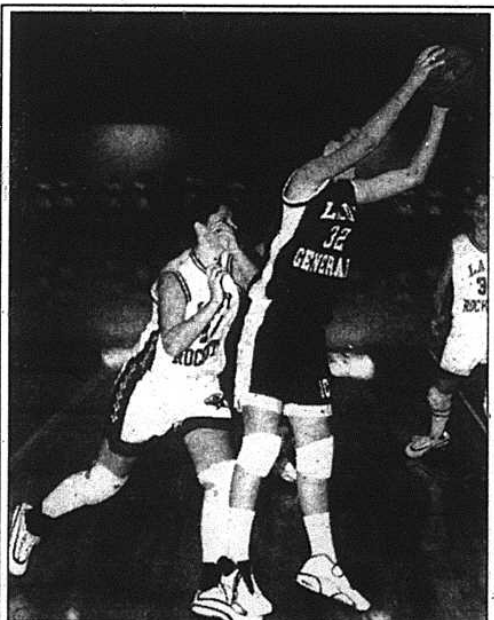

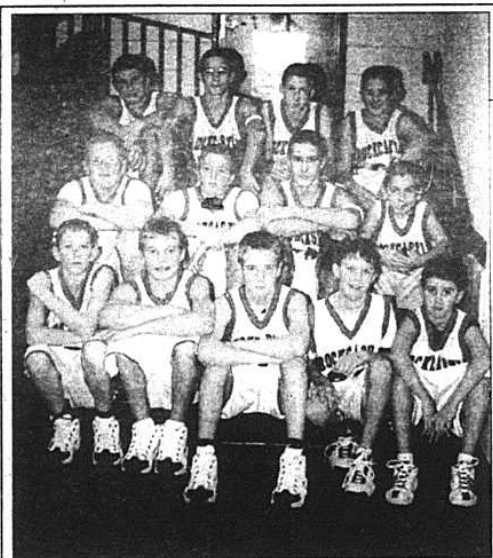

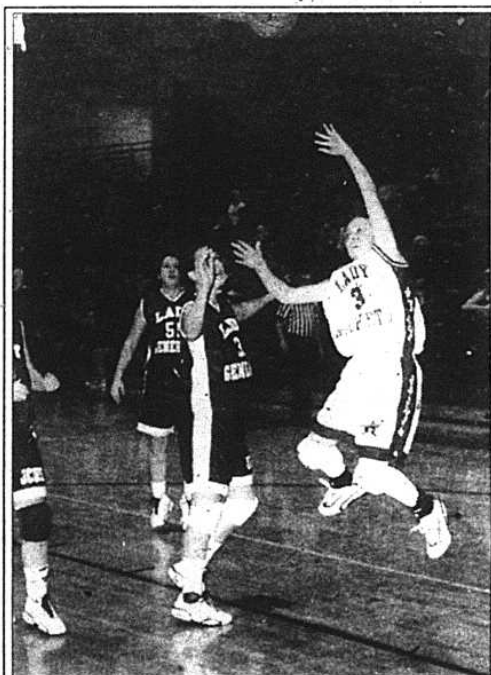
