





DBDC distributing funds for assistance

During the winter months many low-income families may find it dif-income families may find it dif-is especially true after the recent drop in temperatures, compiled with the increase in the cost of natural gas and heating oil. However, help is avail-able.

Council is distributing funds to as-sist low-income families in Clay Jackson, Laurel and Rockeastle Counties with home hearing Jackson, Laurel and Rockcastle Counties with home heating costs through the Low-Income Home En-ergy Assistance Program (LHEAP). Since November 6, a total of 3,900 low-income families have been assisted in Clay, Jackson, Laurel and Rockcastle Counties through the pro-Rockeastle Counties through the pro-gram. Daniel Boone Development Council received an increase in fund-ing for the LHIEAP Program due to the rising costs of natural gas and heating oil. As a result in the in-creased funding and rising heating costs, benefits for low-income house-holds that use natural gas, propane, fuel oil and kerosene for heating have been increased by 41%. Additionally, Governor Patton re-

cently outlined a number of steps that people can take to avoid utility cutoff and to prepare for the winter heat-

ing bills ahead:

• Turn down your thermostat.

• Seal air leaks in windows and doors with caulk or plastic.

• Wrap your water heater with in-





Old-time five & dime still alive and doing well

Can an old-fashioned dime store
survive in today's mega-market maze
of Wal-Marts and glitzy shopping

malls?
Hiatt's 5&10, a Rockeastle
County landmark since the 1930s, is
a ghost of Christmasse past, to be
sure. But it also proof that with sound
management, a good location and the
right stuff, even your grandmother's
favorite small-town dime store of half a century ago can remain a friendly fixture on the corner of a new mil-

"I've been coming here ever since I was a little bitty girl, and that's a long time," said Mary Ann Bullock, who had brought her 7- and 10-year-old granddaughters to the store to buy

a present.

Billy Hiatt, 72, a former schoolteacher who has owned the store for the past 40 years, doesn't have any closely guarded secrets for success-just some good old common-sense marketing techniques. "We still have the basic items that you'd find in a 3 and 10, but I 've had to diversify into higher-priced merchandise in the last three or for latter Wal-Mart and Kmart, took a toll years, 'he said. "We still have toys, housewares and sewing notions, but we 've added Fenton Art Glass, Boyd Bears and other giftware."
