ROCKCASTLE COUNTY HAS BEEN AWARDED FEDERAL FUNDS UNDER THE EMERGENCY FOOD AND SHELTER NATIONAL

BOARD PROGRAM. Rockcastle County has been chosen to receive \$8,099,00 to supplement food and shelter programs in the county.

The selection was made by a National Board that is chaired by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and consists of representatives from The Salvation Army, American Red Cross, United Jewish Communities, Catholic Chartlies, USA, National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA and United Way of American which will provide the administrative staff and function as fiscal agent. The Board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high-need areas around the country.

Qualifying organization sare urged to apply.

Rockcastle County has distributed Emergency Food and Shelter funds previously with Daniel Boone Development. This agency was responsible for providing 300 rights loding and provided utilities for more than 30 families.

The deadline for application is December 28, 2000.
