Governor delivers money to Rockcastle

Kentucky Governor Paul Patton came to Rockcastle County last Friday with money in hand for several projects.

Patton praised State Representative Danny Ford for his hard work on the projects and told the crowd that had it not been for Ford the money would not have been approved.

The Governor brought money for the Kentucky County Music Hall of Fame, Renfro Valley, the Livingston school project, the Technology Center at the Rockcastle County courthouse and money for five of the county's fire departments.

The Hall of Fame will receive \$1.5 million, on top of \$2 million they have already received from the state.

The federal government has also kicked in another \$2 million for road work in Renfro Valley.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court was expected to approve the bids on the project during a special called meeting Thursday morning.

Rockcastle Judge-Executive

Buzz Carlotis said construction should begin in January, weather permitting.

The Governor also brought \$100,000 for the former Livingston school property.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court owns the property, after Daniel Boone Development Corporation gave it to them, but because of lack of funding no work has been done on the property and it is becoming more and more dilapidated.

When Daniel Boone purchased the property with a state grant a few years ago, plans were for a community center, but money for the project could never be secured.

Carlotis has said that he would like to use the property as a work release prison facility, which would generate enough money from the state to remodel and maintain the property.

However, many Livingston area residents have voiced strong opposition to that idea.

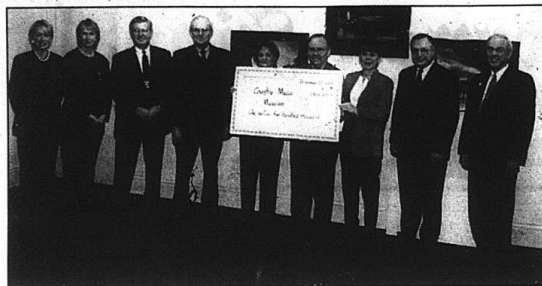
More snow was forecast for this weekend.

economic opportunities, and we must pursue those opportunities together. KHIC is proud to have been a partner in our region's economic development efforts for 32 years. In 2000, we invested more than \$4.5 million and secured another \$14.2 million for projects in our service area of Bell, Clay, Clinton, Harlan, Jackson, McCreary, Rockcastle, Wayne and Whitley counties. Our Readers Write

Dear Editor,
I read in a newspaper clip last week, from the Lexington Herald Leader, a short letter to the editor. In talking about abortion, the writer laments the "stream of letters from the anti-abortion crowd equating abortion with murder." The fellow writes, "The only part of the Bible that deals directly with harming a fetus is Exodus 21:22. The Bible states that causing the end of a pregnancy is punishable by a fine to the pregnant woman's husband." He went on to say, "Obviously, God considers the termination of a pregnancy to be nothing more than a misdemeanor." He concludes by saying, "Calling abortion murder is blasphemy." Let's examine these points carefully.

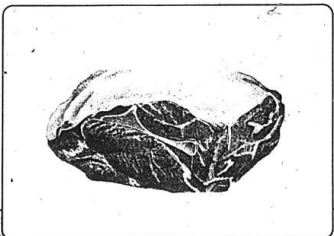

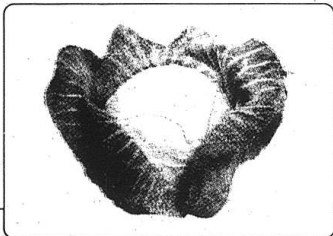

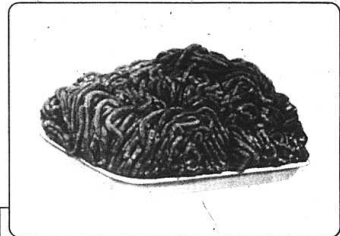

Mullins among Pew Scholars named

Continuing to support a new generation of biomedical researchers, The Pew Charitable Trusts has chosen 20 of America's most promising biomedical researchers to be the 2000 Pew Scholars in the Biomedical Sciences. Among those 20 is R. Dyché Mullins, formerly of Mt. Vernon and the son of Roland and Nancy Mullins. Mullins is an assistant professor at the University of California in San Francisco in the Department of Cellular and Molecular Pharmacology.
Since 1985, the Trusts have provided more than \$65 million for the support of 320 scholars. Each of the scholars, who are junior faculty members at medical schools and research institutions across the United States will receive a total award of \$240,000 to help support his or her research over a four-year period. Mullins' field of research will be Cell Biology/Biochemistry.
The awards, which are granted to young investigators who show outstanding promise in the basic and clinical sciences, are intended to encourage scholarly innovation in their research and to help them advance the state of knowledge in the biomedical sciences. The awards provide flexible support to the scholars as they establish their laboratories and continue their research in areas ranging from AIDS to cancer to childhood infectious diseases and to diseases affecting the elderly.
"These young scientists are the lifeblood of the research community," said Rebecca W. Rimel, president of The Pew Charitable Trusts. "After 15 years of funding the Scholars Program, we continue to see great value in nurturing outstanding young scientists to become tomorrow's leading investigators at the forefront of their fields."
This year, nominations from more than 120 institutions were received. The scholars were chosen by a 16-member national advisory committee appointed by the board of directors of The Pew Charitable Trusts

and chaired by Dr. Torsten N. Wiesel, president emeritus of the Rockefeller University, and a 1981 Nobel laureate in physiology or medicine.
The Pew Charitable Trusts, a national philanthropy based in Philadelphia, support nonprofit activities in the areas of conservation and the environment, culture, education, health and human services, public policy and religion. Through their grantmaking, the Trusts seek to encourage individual development and personal achievement, cross-disciplinary problem solving, and innovative, practical approaches to meet the changing needs of society.

Agricultural News

County Committee (COC) Election

The County committee election ballots for LA#2, Community B were obtained December 7, 2000. Darrell Wayne Whitaker was elected to fill the position for a three-year term, beginning January 1, 2001.

USDA Programs
Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman reminds farmers of pending application deadlines for emergency assistance programs.

"There are many USDA programs that are available to farmers this year to help them through difficult times," said Glickman. "I urge farmers to call or visit their local USDA office to ensure that they know about all the help they may be eligible for and to sign up before the deadline."

Application deadlines for programs previously announced this year are:

1. 2000 Oilseeds Program: \$500 million in payments is available to the more than 600,000 producers of 2000 crops of certain oilseeds. Eligible oilseeds include canola, canola, flaxseed, mustard, rapeseed, safflower, sesame, soybeans and sunflowers. Application deadline is January 12, 2001.

2. 2000 Crop Year Peanut Market Loss Assistance Program: An estimated \$61 million is available to partially compensate for 16,000 peanut producers for low commodity prices and increasing production costs. Application deadline is February 1, 2001.

3. Flood Compensation Program: \$24 million is available to producers to help offset losses due to land inundated with flood waters. Application deadline is January 19, 2001.

4. Wool and Mohair Market Loss Assistance Program: Approximately

\$11 million in relief is available for farmers who suffered economic loss due to low prices during the 1999 marketing year. Application deadline is December 29, 2000.

5. 2000 Lamb Meat Adjustment Assistance Program: Approximately \$10 million is available to producers whose lamb carcasses meet minimum grade specifications. Application deadline is August 15, 2001.

Local USDA Farm Service Agency offices also will begin accepting applications soon for the following programs:

1. 2000 Crop Disaster Program (CDP): Funds will be made available to producers who have been affected by crop disaster. The sign-up period will begin January 18, 2001.

2. 2000 Livestock Assistance Program (LAP): An estimated \$438 million is available to producers for grazing losses due to weather related disasters. The sign-up period will begin January 18, 2001.

3. Dairy Market Loss Assistance (DMLA III): Payments to operations that received assistance under DMLA II will be automatically issued to producers later this month. Payments will also be available to new operations and to operations that did not have 12 months of marketing established under DMLA II, and will be based on October 1999-September 2000 marketings. The four-week sign-up period for these producers will begin in late January 2001.

4. 2000 Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP): Up to \$10 million will be available to producers who lost livestock due to natural disaster, fire and anthrax. The sign-up period will begin January 18, 2001.

5. Extension of the 1999 Livestock Indemnity Program/Contact Growers (CG-LIP) Program coverage of last year's CG-LIP will be extended through February 7, 2000. The sign-up period will begin January 18, 2001.

6. Apple Market Loss Assistance: Up to \$100 million will be available to apple producers to help offset low market prices experienced during the 1998 and 1999 crop years. The sign-up period will begin January 18, 2001.

FSA Website

The Farm Service Agency, Natural Resource Conservation Service, and Rural Development agencies announced the availability of a new e-commerce service on the World Wide Web. The address of the new web site is <http://www.sc.egov.usda.gov>. The new web site will be available on December 18, 2000 and will replace other sites for these agencies that provide electronic forms.

The first feature on the new web site is electronic forms (eForms). This service offers access to many of the forms customers most frequently use. To access it, log on to the Internet through your internet service provider and enter the address above. That will take you to the service center e-commerce home page. Click on the "eForms" icon to go to the page where you can search for forms by number, program area, or agency.

First time users need to download and install a "plug-in" to take full advantage of the services available

on the eForms web site. Installing the plug-in is easy. Connect to the Internet through your internet service provider. Once you're on-line, type <http://www.sc.egov.usda.gov> in the address and press the enter key. That will take you to the USDA eCommerce homepage. Now click on the eForms icon to go to the eForms page and click on the "help" link. Now click on the "Need help downloading and installing the OmniForms or Adobe Acrobat" link and follow the instructions.

Once the plug-in is installed on your computer, go back to the USDA eCommerce homepage and click on the eForms icon to go to the eForms page. Here you can search for forms either by their numbers or by a program area or agency's name. When you find the form you want, click on the blue highlighted OmniForms format and it will appear on the screen. Fill it out, print it, and you have a

completed form that's ready for faxing or mailing. Many of the forms are also available in the PDF format for a limited time.

Using the OmniForms version of the forms provides a significant advantage over the PDF version. The forms and information recorded into the OmniForms version can be downloaded and saved on your own computer, giving you access to the forms and information without having to go online. This will permit you to reuse standard information like your name and address, without having to retype it.

Your FSA, NRCS, or RD service center office will be available during normal business hours to provide any assistance you need in understanding the forms or the information that needs to be recorded. We will continue to be your point of contact for any questions of this nature.

Technical assistance on using the web site and the OmniForms plug-in is available by calling 1-800-457-3642. The technical help service is available Monday through Friday from 5 a.m. to midnight (mountain time) and from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. (mountain time) on Saturday and Sunday.

Office Closure
The USDA Service Center will be closed Monday, January 1st in observance of New Year's. The office will reopen on Tuesday, January 2nd.

Lady Rockets win three in Berea tournament

The Lady Rockets put together their best ever Berea Invitational Tournament with a first-time appearance in the finals of their bracket. Unfortunately, it was their only weak showing of the tournament and they fell to Garrard Co. 40-29.

Junior Amber Denney, who led her team in scoring in their final tournament game with 10 points, was named to the All-Tournament Team.

After beating West Jessamine 53-30 in the opening game, the rockets took on the Johnson Central Lady Eagles on Wednesday and it was a raucous affair from the outset.

For the Rockets, it was their best first half of basketball of the season. Their tenacious full court press sparked a hustling defense that completely befuddled the Lady Eagles and kept them off balance.

The Rockets were ahead at the end of the first quarter 13-11 but, in the second quarter, they really turned up the pressure. Sophomore Ashley Mink got the Rockets first score of the period, senior Jessie Rickles and sophomore Jessie Hayes combined for 13 points and Amber Falin added a free throw to give the Rockets a 29-19 half time bulge.

The Rockets intensity slipped somewhat in the third quarter as the Lady Eagles, with a lot of help from at least one of the striped shirts, outscored the Rockets 14-5. Senior Rachelle Hammond was the only Rocket to score in the period.

Falin, who led the Rockets in rebounds in the game with 11, got the first bucket of the fourth quarter for her team but it was in this quarter especially that the Rockets had to feel they were playing a seven-man squad. Falin was driving the baseline, after her original defender had had to switch on a screen when a five second call was made. Rickles got a five second call although her defender was being very aggressive to put it pointily.

The Rockets lost Hammond at the 2:42 mark of the fourth quarter to fouls and then Rickles, with 1:30 left to play, was tagged with her 5th offense. The Eagles had pulled to

within one, 46-45, on the foul shots but Denney put in a goal and Hayes added two free throws and a basket to give the Rockets a 52-45 lead with 37 ticks on the clock. But, Johnson Central wasn't through as they got a basket and then stole the ball on the Rockets rebounds pass and put in another goal. With 11 seconds on the clock, Central forced a jump ball with the arrow in their favor and had a chance to tie the game but couldn't get their final shot to fall.

Hayes, who scored two three point baskets and was 5 for 6 from the charity stripe, led the scoring for her team with 15; Hammond got 10; Falin had 9 points and 11 rebounds; Rickles got 7 points; Mink 4 and Ashley Lawson, who played an excellent defensive game, got the only other three point basket for the Rockets.

Rockets vs. Paris

The Rockets maintained their intensity on Thursday with their game against Paris, a very quick aggressive team.

The Rockets shot out to a quick 7-2 lead behind two goals by Falin and a three point bucket by Rickles, Hammond added a three point and a two point goal, and Falin two free throws to give the Rockets a 14-11 first quarter lead.

The Rockets got a little sloppy in the second quarter, committing several turnovers but still managed to take a 24-20 lead to the dressing room at the half.

In the third quarter, the referees became a factor, whistling three quick fouls on Rickles and bringing about Coach Christine Ashby's second technical of her 11 year coaching career.

In spite of that, Denney got half of her total 12 points in the game in the third period and the Rockets managed to increase their lead to 37-29 at the end of the period.

Rickles got the Rockets started in the fourth with two baskets and a free throw and the Rockets were up 50-38 with just over two minutes to go in the game. But, Paris came roaring back with an 11-4 run and were only down by 51-49 with 37 seconds left in the game. The Rockets managed two free throws in the closing seconds to hold on for the 53-51 win.

Rickles led the scoring with 14 points plus she had 8 assists, two blocks and a blocked shot. Amber Denney turned in a double-double with 12 points and 11 rebounds. She also had 2 assists, two steals and two blocked shots. Rachelle Hammond was credited with 12 points, two steals, two assists and the blocked four shots. Amber Falin had 10 points, 8 rebounds, 2 steals and 4 assists and Jessie Hayes got 3 points.

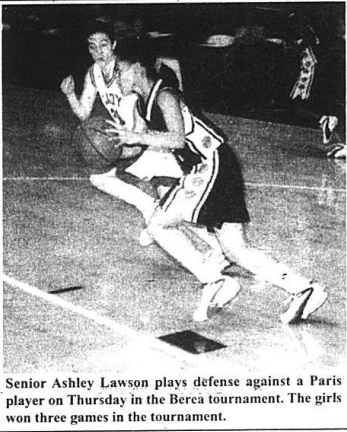

Garrard went on to win the entire tournament, defeating Madison Central in the Saturday night finals of the two brackets.

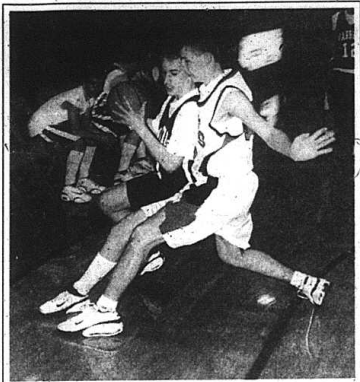
Amber Denney was the only player in double figures with 10 points; Hammond got 7; Hayes 6 and Falin, Rickles and Lawson had 2 each.



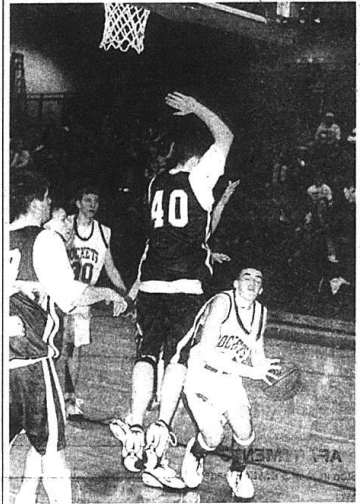
Jessie Rickles goes up for a shot against Paris. The Lady Rockets won 53-51. Rickles had 14.



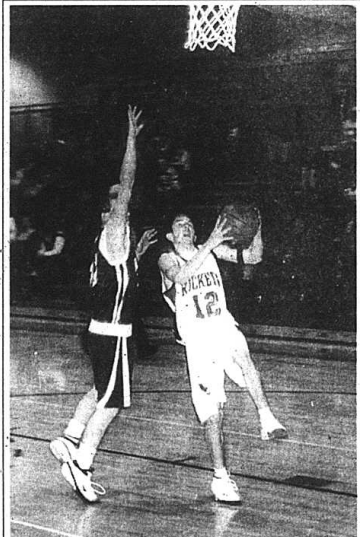
Senior Ashley Lawson plays defense against a Paris player on Thursday in the Berea tournament. The girls won three games in the tournament.
